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ABSTRACT

This update provides the most current facts about the 50 independent, nonprofit colleges and universities that are members of the Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Ohio (AICUO). AICUO member institutions enrolled 32.1% of the students attending four-year institutions in Ohio. Their total enrollment for fall 2000 was 120,343. Over the last 10 years, enrollment has grown by 16.3%. In the 1999-2000 academic year, independent colleges and universities awarded 34.1% of all bachelor's degrees in the state and 24,919 associate through graduate and professional degrees. In 1999-2000, U.S. minorities and international students represented 14.2% of the undergraduate student body. The undergraduate tuition and fees average for independent colleges represented by AICUO is \$15,457. AICUO members awarded \$404 million of their own revenue in financial aid for students in 1999-2000. Approximately 73% of independent college freshmen received financial aid in that school year, for an average financial aid package of \$13,621. Ohio's Student Choice Grant program benefited 49,537 students at AICUO member institutions in the 1999-2000 academic year. Nearly 112,000 students received need-based financial aid funded by the state of Ohio. Enrollment in AICUO institutions saves Ohio substantial sums because they do not have to educate these students at public expense. (SLD)

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

ENROLLMENT


AICUO member institutions enroll 32.1 percent of the students attending four-year institutions in Ohio. Their total enrollment for fall 2000 was 120,343.




Total Enrollment Composition AICUO Members, Fall 2000




The 2001-02 undergraduate tuition and fees average for independent colleges represented by AICUO is \$15,457.

Increase in Institutional Financial Aid


Share of Financial Aid (excluding loans) to Ohio Independent College Students at AICUO Members *Source: IPEDS Finance Surveys*






OHIO STUDENT CHOICE GRANTS

The Student Choice Grant program - financial aid for Ohio residents enrolled full time in baccalaureate programs at Ohio independent, nonprofit institutions - benefited 49,537 students at AICUO member institutions during the 1999-2000 academic year. These students saved Ohio \$340 million in instructional subsidy alone by attending independent institutions.



OHIO INSTRUCTIONAL GRANTS Nearly 112,000 students receive need-based financial aid funded by the State of Ohio. The Ohio Instructional Grant and Part-time Instructional Grant programs benefit full-time and part-time students attending public, private nonprofit or proprietary institutions. Improvements to these programs include increasing the income ceiling caps and individual grant awards.

Dear Friends,

The Association of Independent Colleges and Universities of Ohio (AICUO) is pleased to provide this 2001-02 Update to the 2000-01 Fact File. This update provides the most current facts about AICUO's 50 independent, nonprofit colleges and universities.

Independent colleges and universities have experienced 15 consecutive years of enrollment growth, demonstrating that Ohio students value the education provided by these institutions. Students are attracted to independent institutions because of the personal attention they receive - the average student to faculty ratio is 14.4 to 1. Students attending independent colleges are successful. Nearly 81% of freshmen enrolled return as sophomores, and 47% of Ohio independent college students graduate in four years (compared to only 23% of students attending public universities).

By meeting the needs of Ohio's students, independent colleges and universities are also serving the state in many important ways. Ohio's independent colleges enroll one of the largest private college student bodies in the nation, enrolling just over 32% of all students attending Ohio four-year institutions. This leads to substantial savings for Ohio by not having to educate these students at public expense.

Ohio's independent higher education sector is an important and essential resource for the state, the nation and college-bound students.


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
