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ABSTRACT

This guide is designed to help students choose the institution and course of study best suited to their plans. The guide contains information about more than 50 colleges and universities in Maryland, including a comprehensive list of private career schools approved by the Maryland Higher Education Commission. The first section of the guide contains brief profiles of higher education institutions in Maryland, indicating where they are, what they teach, how much they cost, what their admissions standards are, and other facts. "What To Study" outlines some of the academic programs available in Maryland and suggests some out-of-state options for the student who wants something else. Programs are grouped as: (1) bachelor's, graduate, and professional degree programs; (2) two-year associate programs; (3) occupational and technical career programs; and (4) statewide community college programs. The next two sections discuss the "academic Common Market," majors available in other states at Maryland in-state tuition rates, and military education programs. Military academies and private career schools are also described. The final section of the guide contains information on financial aid types, eligibility, and where to get more information about specific programs. (SLD)

THE ACADEMIC COMMON MARKET

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Maryland is a member of the Academic Common Market, a consortium of fifteen southern states that allow non-resident students to enroll in specific degree programs at in-state tuition rates if the academic programs are not offered in the home state.

To be eligible, applicants must be United States citizens or legally admitted permanent immigrant aliens and must have resided (or their parents have resided if the student is under 24 years old) in Maryland for 12 months. Applicants must have been accepted into an approved program of study not offered at a Maryland college or university. The application form is available from the Maryland Higher Education Commission and high school guidance offices.

The participating states are Alabama, Arkansas, Delaware, Florida (graduate level only), Georgia, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Texas (graduate level only), Virginia, and West Virginia.

- Check out the instructors' qualifications.
- Ask about job placement.
- Obtain a copy of the school's catalog and read it carefully.
- Read and understand what you sign.

PAYING FOR COLLEGE

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WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID?

Financial aid is money that helps you pay for college. It is added to the amount that you and your family can personally afford to pay for college. Merit-based financial aid is aid given to students who have special talents, skills, or who have earned good grades. Need-based financial aid is given to students who show they have financial need.

WHAT KINDS OF FINANCIAL AID ARE AVAILABLE?

- Grants and scholarships are gifts that you do not have to pay back. Grants are usually given because the student has financial need, while scholarships are usually given to recognize the student's academic achievement, athletic ability or other talent. The State of Maryland also provides scholarships that require students to complete a specific employment obligation after graduation.
- Loans must be repaid, usually with interest, after you graduate or stop going to school.
- Work Study or student employment, allows you to work and earn money to help pay for school. These jobs are usually on-campus.

Most students receive a combination of these types of aid in a financial aid package put together by their college financial aid office.

WHO GIVES FINANCIAL AID?

The federal government provides most student financial aid. The Federal Pell Grant, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG), Perkins and Stafford Loans, and Federal Work Study are examples of federal programs. The State of Maryland offers scholarships and grants based on a student's financial need, talents, or career choice. Colleges and universities also give scholarships to students. Some of the scholarships are based on need and some on talents and grades. A number of civic organizations, associations, clubs, foundations, churches, and businesses also provide financial aid.

This year, the State of Maryland will award more than \$81 million in financial aid to more than 38,000 Maryland residents. Students use this aid at Maryland community colleges, private colleges and universities, private career schools, and the state's 13 public four-year institutions. The State Scholarship Administration, a division of the Maryland Higher Education Commission, awards state financial aid funds.

APPLYING FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID

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WHO SHOULD APPLY FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID?

All students should apply for need-based financial aid. Many families mistakenly think they may not qualify for this type of aid based on their income and assets. However, if you choose not to apply for need-based financial aid, you may be closing the door on opportunities that could help you pay for college. There are other sources of financial assistance available regardless of your need, but most require you to first file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

HOW DO I APPLY FOR NEED-BASED FINANCIAL AID?

The FAFSA is the form used to apply for need-based financial aid. You must complete the FAFSA to apply for Maryland's need-based grants, as well as for federal financial aid and for financial aid from colleges. You must submit your FAFSA no later than March 1, to be considered for need-based aid from the State of Maryland, and you must apply every year. The US Department of Education supplies and processes the FAFSA. The processed information is then sent to the State Scholarship Administration and to all the colleges you list on the form.

Many colleges may require that you complete one or more supplemental application forms. Ask the colleges you plan to attend for information about any additional applications you may need to complete. That way, you will make sure you are considered for all types of college financial aid.

There are two types of FAFSAs. If you are applying for financial aid for the first time (or did not apply for the past year), you must complete the regular FAFSA. The form has many questions that you and your family must answer. You can apply for academic year 2002-2003 by filling out a paper copy of the FAFSA and mailing it in the envelope that comes with the form. You may also apply electronically from your home computer or from a computer at your high school or college and submit your application "on-line" at www.fafsa.ed.gov.

The second type of FAFSA is the Renewal Form. If you filed a FAFSA last year, you will probably file the 2002-2003 Renewal FAFSA this year. Your Renewal FAFSA will either be sent to your home address or to your college. You may also be able to file the Renewal FAFSA electronically.

If you do not receive your Renewal FAFSA by January 1, you should complete and file a regular FAFSA form.

WHERE CAN I GET A FAFSA?

The 2002-2003 FAFSA should be available in November. You can get this form from your high school guidance office, a college financial aid office, a public library or from the State Scholarship Administration. FAFSA Express software, which allows you to apply for financial aid from a personal computer, is available from your high school or through the US Department of Education's web site located at <http://www.ed.gov/offices/OPE/express.html>.

WHAT KIND OF INFORMATION DO I PUT ON MY FAFSA?

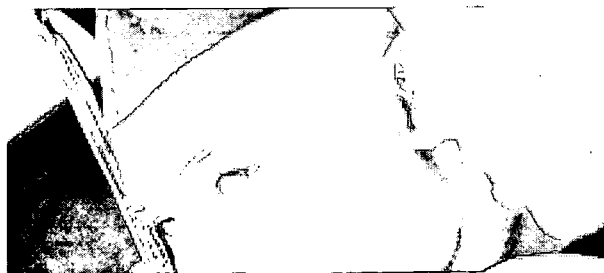
The FAFSA asks for your family financial information. To complete the 2002-2003 FAFSA, you must use information from your and your parents' 2001 federal income tax return.

If you or your parents will not have your tax returns completed before the March 1 deadline, you can carefully estimate your answers on the FAFSA and correct them later.

Along with the tax return information, you will need bank statements, W-2 forms and any benefit statements you receive from the Social Security Administration, Social Services or other agencies. If you and your parents (if you are dependent) will not file a tax return, you will still need bank statements, W-2 forms (if you or your parents worked), and any benefit statements you received from the Social Security Administration, Social Services or other agencies.

You should list all the schools you are thinking of attending on the FAFSA. But please make sure that you put the college you'll probably go to at the top of your list. **If you do not list a Maryland college, you will not be considered for Maryland financial aid.** In addition to the name of the college, you must list the college's Federal Title IV Institution Code. You can get Title IV codes from your high school guidance office, college financial aid office, public library, the State Scholarship Administration, or by calling the US Department of Education at (800) 433-3243.

If you use an APO or a Post Office Box in your address, the State Scholarship Administration will ask you to provide your actual Maryland street address.



WHEN DO I APPLY FOR NEED-BASED AID?

You must file the FAFSA or Renewal FAFSA between January 1 and **March 1** each year. Do not sign, date, or mail your FAFSA before January 1, 2002. Your eligibility is determined one award year at a time. The results from your 2002-2003 application are good only for the 2002-2003 academic year. Because your financial circumstances can change from one year to the next, you must complete a FAFSA each year.

Make sure you fill out, stamp and mail the postcard that comes with your FAFSA. That way, you will know when your FAFSA has reached the federal processor. To prove that you mailed the FAFSA, you should get a Certificate of Mailing from the post office when you mail your form.

Do not use a special mailing service - it will delay the processing of your FAFSA.

Some colleges may have a deadline other than March 1, so it is very important that you contact all the colleges you are interested in attending to confirm their deadline.

SHOULD I USE THE SERVICES OF A CONSULTANT TO HELP FIND SCHOLARSHIPS OR TO HELP ME COMPLETE THE FAFSA?

The State Scholarship Administration urges you to look carefully at these services. Make sure you are not paying for something that is available free from your high school guidance office, the public library, a college financial aid office, the web, or from the State Scholarship Administration. If the consultant guarantees that you will receive some sort of financial aid, learn as much as you can about the consultant, the company, and the students who have used the service, before you spend the \$50 to \$1000 that some consultants may charge.

WHAT HAPPENS AFTER I APPLY?

The federal processing center will check your FAFSA for proper signatures, correct social security numbers and other information. If you leave items blank on your FAFSA, it may be returned to you to complete. This delay could keep your application from being considered for financial aid. After your FAFSA has been processed, you will receive a report of your answers to the FAFSA questions. That report is your Student Aid Report (SAR). Your 2002-2003 SAR will be printed on blue paper.

It will take approximately four weeks to process your paper FAFSA. If there are no questions or problems with your FAFSA, your SAR will tell you how much money your family is expected to contribute to your college expenses. This figure is your EFC – Expected Family Contribution.

If you file your FAFSA electronically, processing will take about one week. You will receive a SAR in the mail.

WHAT IF I HAVE TO MAKE A CHANGE TO MY FAFSA?

Please take a careful look at each answer on your SAR. If you find a mistake, or if you need to change something, you should make corrections right on your SAR. You should also correct any information that you may have estimated when you first completed the FAFSA. Make copies of your complete SAR; send one copy, by April 1, to the State Scholarship Administration and then send the original back to the federal processor. Be sure to keep the second copy with all of your other financial aid materials.

ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR NEED-BASED AID

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HOW DOES THE STATE DETERMINE HOW MUCH AID I'M ELIGIBLE FOR?

When you apply for financial aid, the information on your FAFSA is used to calculate your Expected Family Contribution (EFC). The State Scholarship Administration also uses your EFC to determine your eligibility for Maryland financial aid.

Your EFC will determine if you will be eligible for a Federal Pell Grant. The amount of your Pell Grant depends on your EFC, the cost of attendance at the college you plan to attend, and your enrollment status (full-time, three-quarter time, etc.). The cost of attendance at your college is the total amount of money you will need to go to a college for one year.

Your financial need is the difference between what it costs to attend college, your EFC, the amount of certain state scholarship awards (if any), and the amount of your Pell Grant (if any).

Cost of Attendance
-EFC
-Certain scholarship awards (if eligible)
-Federal Pell Grant (if eligible)
=Financial Need

WHAT OTHER REQUIREMENTS DO I HAVE TO MEET TO BE ELIGIBLE?

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents to receive financial aid from the state. Students and their parents (if you are a dependent student) must reside in Maryland for 12 months prior to attending a four-year college, or three months prior to attending a community college or private career school.

To be considered Maryland residents, you and your parents (if you are dependent) must:

- own or rent and occupy living quarters in Maryland;
- keep most of your personal property in Maryland;
- pay Maryland income tax on any of your earned income;
- register all vehicles in Maryland;
- have a valid Maryland driver's license (if you drive);
- be registered to vote in Maryland (if you are registered); and
- receive no public assistance from another state (or entity).

If you or your parents (if you are a dependent student) are active duty military personnel stationed and residing in Maryland, you are considered Maryland residents for financial aid purposes. If you or your parents (if you are a dependent student) are Maryland residents and in the military, then you will be considered for Maryland financial aid whether stationed in Maryland or not.

If you are entering college directly from high school, you are probably a dependent student. If you are dependent, you must report both your and your parents' financial information on the FAFSA. To be considered an independent student, you must meet one of the following conditions:

- you were born before January 1, 1979;
- you are married;
- you are a graduate or professional student (beyond a bachelor's degree);
- you are a veteran of the US Armed Forces;
- you have a dependent other than a spouse; or
- you are an orphan or ward of the court (or were a ward of the court until age 18).

Each scholarship or grant program has specific enrollment requirements. You must enroll for a minimum of 12 credit hours each semester to be considered a full-time undergraduate. To be considered a full-time graduate student, you must take at least 9 credit hours each semester. To be considered a part-time undergraduate or graduate student, you must enroll for at least 6 credits each semester. If you go to a Maryland private career school, you must enroll for at least 18 clock hours per week.

Each Maryland financial aid program has other specific eligibility requirement. Please refer to the program description section.

WHAT IS VERIFICATION?

Verification is the process used to confirm the information you report on the FAFSA is accurate. If the State Scholarship Administration selects you for verification, you must complete a Verification Worksheet. You must also provide us with copies of your and your parents' (if you are dependent) signed federal income tax forms, Maryland tax forms, W-2 forms, or other documents the State Scholarship Administration may request, and statements from any agencies from which you and your parents received benefits.

If there is a significant difference between the information reported on your FAFSA and the information you provided for verification, the State Scholarship Administration will re-calculate your need. Your scholarship award may remain the same, decrease, increase or be cancelled.



APPLYING FOR MERIT, CAREER AND OTHER TYPES OF STATE SCHOLARSHIPS

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The State of Maryland offers a number of other State scholarship programs that are based on merit or other criteria. Some programs consider a student's need as well as other factors. Some programs require a student to work in Maryland in a specific employment field after graduation.

The various grants and scholarships offered by the State of Maryland have different application forms and deadlines. Please read the individual descriptions of Maryland's financial aid programs for more specific application information. Please pay close attention to the deadlines and other required information to be submitted with the applications.

Scholarships may also be available from your Maryland State Senator or Delegates. A list of all the Maryland legislators is available from the State Scholarship Administration. Some legislators allow the State Scholarship Administration to select the students who will receive a Senatorial or Delegate Scholarship and some Senators and Delegates make their own awards. If your legislators make their own awards, you must contact them to find out the application procedures they require.

FINANCIAL AID AWARD NOTICE

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HOW WILL I KNOW IF I AM AWARDED FINANCIAL AID?

You will receive an award letter from the State Scholarship Administration along with information about the award you are being offered. First review the letter to make sure everything is correct. Your address may have changed or you may have decided to go to a different college other than the one listed on the award letter. Be sure that your correct social security number is listed. You can make any changes right on the letter. You must sign the letter and check the box showing that you accept the award. Make a copy of the letter for your records and return the original to the State Scholarship Administration by the deadline listed in the letter.

The financial aid office at your college is responsible for determining how much federal and college financial aid you will be awarded, and coordinating all of your aid.

WHAT IF I HAVE TO MAKE CHANGES AFTER I RETURN MY AWARD LETTER?

Call or write to the State Scholarship Administration to make corrections to your address or to tell us you will be attending a different college.

HOW IS MY COLLEGE NOTIFIED OF MY AWARD?

The State Scholarship Administration will send a list of students who have been offered a State grant or scholarship to each college.

WHEN IS MY AWARD PAID TO MY COLLEGE?

At the beginning of each semester your college will be asked to certify that you meet the requirements for the award. When the certification is complete and sent back to the State Scholarship Administration, your award will be processed for payment. Payment to the college will be made four to six weeks after the college completes the certification.

CAN I APPEAL THE STATE SCHOLARSHIPS ADMINISTRATION'S DECISIONS?

The State Scholarship Administration will consider appeals for several situations (i.e., special financial circumstances or failure to maintain a required GPA). You must call or write your State Scholarship Administration staff person for further information.

JANUARY

- Complete and mail your FAFSA to the federal processor. **Do not mail the FAFSA before January 1.** We recommend that you mail your FAFSA no later than February 15. You can also file the FAFSA electronically using the FAFSA Express software or do it online on the World Wide Web.
- Call or write the State Scholarship Administration for specific Maryland state scholarship applications.

MARCH 1

- **March 1 is the mailing deadline for the FAFSA so you can be considered for Maryland state scholarships.** If you mail the FAFSA after March 1, your application is late and you may not be considered for state scholarships.

APRIL 1

- Make a copy of any changes you made to your Student Aid Report (SAR) and send it to the State Scholarship Administration no later than April 1.

MID-APRIL

- Renewal and new Guaranteed Access Grants, Educational Assistance Grants, and HOPE Scholarship award letters are sent to students beginning in mid-April.

JUNE

- Senators and Delegates begin to make scholarship awards.

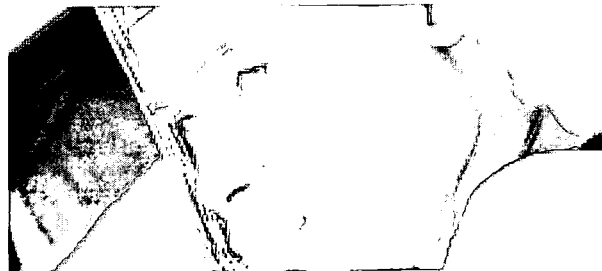

FEDERAL TUITION TAX CREDITS*

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THE HOPE AND LIFETIME LEARNING TAX CREDITS

If you're paying for your own or your dependent student's college education, there are two federal tax credits available for you---the Hope and Lifetime Learning credits.

WHAT'S A TAX CREDIT?

A credit is subtracted directly from your federal income tax on a dollar-for-dollar basis. This fact saves you more money than a deduction, which you subtract from your income before you calculate your tax and which yields much less than dollar-for-dollar savings.

WHO GETS TO CLAIM THE CREDIT?

If someone claims the student as a dependent for tax purposes, that person, not the student, may receive the tax credit, even if the student files a tax return. Otherwise, only the student may receive the credit.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE CREDITS?

The Hope credit can be claimed for each of the first two years of college or vocational school for classes that lead to a degree or recognized certificate. The student must be enrolled at least half-time to qualify for the Hope credit. The Lifetime Learning credit is available for any post secondary education, including graduate and professional school, and unlike the Hope credit, there is no minimum enrollment. If you qualify for both credits, it will usually be to your advantage to claim the Hope credit.

WHAT COLLEGE COSTS QUALIFY?

Qualified expenses include tuition and required fees, minus any grants and scholarships that are received tax-free. Expenses for books and supplies are not included unless they are paid to the institution as a condition of enrollment. The costs of room and board, insurance, transportation, and medical fees (including health fees) are not qualified expenses, even if required for enrollment.

WHAT THE HOPE TAX CREDIT IS WORTH:

The amount of the credit equals 100% of the first \$1,000 of qualified expenses plus 50% of the second \$1,000 for a maximum of \$1,500. After the year 2002, the credit will be adjusted according to inflation.

WHAT THE LIFETIME LEARNING TAX CREDIT IS WORTH:

Through the year 2002, the credit equals 20% of the first \$5,000 of qualified expenses, for a maximum of \$1,000. After 2002, the credit will be 20% of the first \$10,000, for a maximum of \$2,000. Unlike the Hope credit, this credit will not be adjusted for inflation.

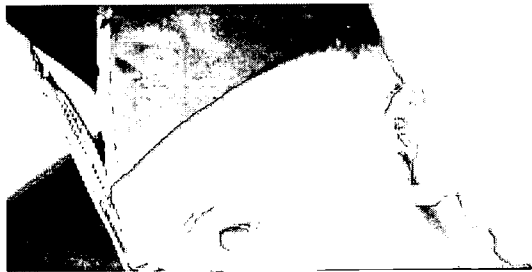
IS THERE AN INCOME LIMIT?

Single tax filers with up to \$40,000 of adjusted gross income (AGI) and joint tax filers with up to \$80,000 of AGI qualify for the full credit. It is gradually phased out for single filers in the \$40,000-\$50,000 range and for joint filers in the \$80,000-\$100,000 range, and it is not available for those whose income exceeds the upper limit of those ranges.

IT'S EASY TO CLAIM THE CREDIT!

- The college will send the student IRS Form 1098-T Tuition Payments Statement, which will report the tuition and related expenses paid for the student.
- The person claiming the credit needs to fill out IRS Form 8863 (PDF) and attach the form to his or her federal tax return. You can call (800) 829-3676 to order the form. It is a worksheet that will help to calculate the amount of the Hope or Lifetime Learning credit that will be claimed on the return.

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors **and** full-time, degree-seeking undergraduates.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA.
- When to apply:** January 1 through March 1, each year. Late applicants will be placed on a waiting list.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate. You must demonstrate financial need.

All applicants are ranked by Expected Family Contribution (EFC). Your EFC is based on information reported on the FAFSA. Students with the lowest EFC are awarded first.

FINANCIAL NEED

An EA Grant is determined by student need. Your need is determined using the following formula:

College Cost of Attendance
- EFC
- Federal Pell Grant (if eligible)
- Certain State Scholarships
= Financial Need

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of an EA Grant equals 35% of the student need. The minimum annual award amount is \$400 and the maximum award is \$2700. Should you be offered and accept certain state scholarships, your EA Grant will be re-calculated. You may also hold the EA Grant with: Distinguished Scholar award; State Nursing Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; Physical and Occupational Therapists and Assistants award; Child Care Provider award; and the Sharon Christa McAuliffe Memorial Teacher Education award.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew an award, you must maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you will attend and submit the FAFSA no later than March 1, each year. You must also continue to demonstrate financial need. You may be a recipient of an EA Grant for a total of 4 years.

GUARANTEED ACCESS (GA) GRANT

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors who will complete a college prep or articulated tech prep program.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA, **and** complete and file the GA Grant application.
- When to apply:** Students are encouraged to apply by March 1. Applications submitted after March 1 will be considered as long as funds remain available.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate and you must demonstrate financial need. All applicants must have a minimum, unweighted cumulative 2.5 high school Grade Point Average (GPA) and meet the following income requirements.

A GA Grant is determined by student need. Your need is determined using the following formula.

College Cost of Attendance

- EFC

- Certain State Scholarships (if awarded)

- Federal Pell Grant (if eligible)

= Financial Need

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of a GA Grant equals 100% of the student need. The minimum annual award amount is \$400 and the maximum award is \$9,200. Should you receive and accept certain state scholarships, your GA Grant will be re-calculated. You may also hold the GA Grant with: Distinguished Scholar award; State Nursing Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; Physical and Occupational Therapists and Assistants award; Child Care Provider award; and the Sharon Christa McAuliffe Memorial Teacher Education award.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew an award, you must maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you will attend. Students are encouraged to submit the FAFSA no later than March 1 each year. Eligible students who submit the FAFSA after March 1 will be considered as long as funds remain available. You must also continue to demonstrate financial need. You may receive a GA Grant for a total of 4 years.

JACK F. TOLBERT MEMORIAL STUDENT GRANT PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Students attending a private career school. Anyone who plans to attend a private career school.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) by March 1. Apply to the financial aid office of the private career school you will attend.
- When to apply:** Rolling deadline.
- Eligible major:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at an approved Maryland private career school. You must enroll for at least 18 clock hours per week.

FINANCIAL NEED

These awards are made on the basis of need, as demonstrated by the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of the Tolbert grant is \$300. You may hold this award with a Senatorial Scholarship, a Delegate Scholarship, or the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Scholarship.

RENEWING AN AWARD

The award may be renewed one time.

PART-TIME GRANT PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Part-time, degree-seeking undergraduates and students who are simultaneously enrolled in a secondary school and an institution of higher education (dually enrolled).
- How to apply:** Part-time undergraduates must complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA. Contact the financial aid office of the institution you will attend and ask to be considered for the Part-time Grant. Dually enrolled students must contact the College Financial Aid Office to determine the application process.
- When to apply:** January 1 through March 1, each year. Contact financial aid office of institution you will attend for their deadline.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR PART-TIME UNDERGRADUATES

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate. You must demonstrate financial need.

Recipients are selected by the institution.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS FOR DUALY ENROLLED STUDENTS

Students who are simultaneously enrolled in a secondary school and an institution of higher education in Maryland must contact the college Financial Aid Office to determine eligibility and application requirements.

FINANCIAL NEED

A Part-Time Grant is determined by student need as demonstrated on the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum Part-Time Grant award is \$200, and the maximum award is \$1,000. You may also hold a Part-time Grant with: Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship, Joan L. Hoffman Loan Assistance Repayment Program award; Firefighters, Ambulance and Rescue Squad members Tuition Reimbursement award; and the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew your award, you must maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend and submit the FAFSA no later than March 1 each year, or earlier if required by your school. You must also continue to demonstrate financial need. You may be a recipient of a Part-Time Grant for a total of 8 years.

CHILD CARE PROVIDER SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** High school seniors, high school graduates or GED recipients, and degree-seeking undergraduates.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a Child Care Provider Scholarship application.
- When to apply:** Application deadline is June 15.
- Eligible majors:** Child development program or early childhood education program.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate. You must enroll in a child development program or an early childhood education program. You may only attend part-time if you are working at least 15 hours a week at a child care or family day care center.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

An award for full-time attendance at a community college is \$1,000; a part-time award is \$500 per year. An award for full-time attendance at a 4-year institution is \$2,000 per year; a part-time award is \$1,000 per year. You may hold a Child Care Provider Scholarship with a Guaranteed Access Grant and an Educational Assistance Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award may be renewed if you: maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend; maintain a minimum cumulative 2.0 GPA; and remain enrolled in an approved program. Your parents must also remain Maryland residents. The award may be renewed for an additional three years.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to provide child care services in Maryland, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within 12 months of graduation.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE TRANSFER STUDENT HOPE SCHOLARSHIP

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- Who may apply:** Currently enrolled Maryland community college students who will complete at least 60 credits or who will earn an associate's degree by the end of the semester in which they will transfer to a Maryland 4-year institution.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA, and complete and file the HOPE Scholarship Application.
- When to apply:** January 1 through March 1, each year. Late applicants will be placed on a waiting list.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must attend a Maryland community college and have completed at least 60 credits or have earned an associate's degree by the end of the semester in which you will transfer to a Maryland 4-year institution. All applicants must have a minimum, cumulative 3.0 GPA. Your family income may not exceed \$95,000 annually. You must enroll at a 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate.

AWARD AMOUNT

This award is \$3,000 annually. You may hold the Community College Transfer Student Hope Scholarship with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; and Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew an award, you must: maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in your college course work; remain enrolled as a full-time undergraduate; and maintain the satisfactory academic progress stands of the institution you attend.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work full-time in Maryland, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within 12 months of graduation.

DEVELOPMENTAL DISABILITIES AND MENTAL HEALTH WORKFORCE TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors, full-time and part-time undergraduate and graduate students.
- How to apply:** Complete and file Developmental Disabilities and Mental Health Workforce Tuition Assistance application.
- When to apply:** By July 1, each year. Late applicants will be considered as long as funds remain available.
- Eligible majors:** Human services degree program:

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must attend a Maryland 2- or 4-year institution full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester), as a degree-seeking undergraduate or a full-time (9+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-8 credits per semester) as a degree-seeking graduate student. You must enroll in a human services degree program.

AWARD AMOUNT

Students attending a 2-year institution may receive up to \$2,000 per year, and students at a 4-year institution may receive up to \$3,000 per year. You may hold the Developmental Disabilities and Mental Health Workforce Tuition Assistance Program award with a Senatorial Scholarship and/or a Delegate Scholarship.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew an award, you must maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution you attend and remain enrolled in a human services degree program.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to provide direct support or care to individuals with developmental disabilities or work as a first-line supervisor of employees providing direct support or care in a non-profit, community-based program, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within six (6) months of graduation.

DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Current high school juniors may apply or may be nominated by their high schools. Finalists in the National Merit Scholarship and National Achievement Scholarship Programs will automatically receive the award if they attend a Maryland institution.
- How to apply:** Achievement applications may be obtained from the high school guidance counselor.
- When to apply:** Applications for the academic achievement category must be submitted to the high school guidance office in February of the applicant's junior year. The high school guidance counselor submits talent nominations in April of the nominee's junior year.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university or a private career school as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate student.

Academic Achievement Category: Applicants must have earned a minimum cumulative unweighted GPA of 3.7 on a 4.0 scale in academic subjects taken during their first five semesters of high school. The applicant's highest PSAT, SAT1, or ACT scores from tests taken in January of the junior year or earlier are used with the GPA to determine final selection placement. ACT may be submitted only if PSAT or SAT1 was not taken.

National Merit Scholarship and National Achievement Category: An award will automatically be offered to students in these Scholarship Programs when they have been selected as finalists and indicated they will attend a Maryland institution.

Talent in the Arts Category: Your high school can nominate five juniors for an audition in visual art, instrumental music, vocal music, dance or drama. Officially designated magnet schools for the arts may each nominate 10 students. In early June, nominated students must appear in person for an audition or portfolio review before a panel of professional judges

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The award is \$3,000 each year. You may hold the Distinguished Scholar award with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; any HOPE Scholarship Program award; Professional Scholarship; State Nursing Scholarship; Tolbert Grant; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; Firefighters, Ambulance and Rescue Squad members Tuition Reimbursement award; and the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award is automatically renewed if you: maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you will attend; maintain an annual minimum 3.0 GPA; and your parents remain Maryland residents; and remain enrolled full-time at a 2- or 4-year Maryland college or university or private career school. The award may be renewed for an additional three years.

DISTINGUISHED SCHOLAR TEACHER EDUCATION PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Distinguished Scholar recipients.
- How to apply:** Complete and file application included with your Distinguished Scholar award letter or renewal letter.
- When to apply:** Applications should be filed immediately upon receipt of the Distinguished Scholar award.
- Eligible majors:** An approved teacher education program.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate. You must enroll in an approved teacher education program. All applicants are ranked according to the subject they plan to teach. Applicants planning to teach in a critical shortage area receive priority; and remaining applicants are ranked on basis of GPA by class standing.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The award is \$3,000 each year. You may hold the Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; any HOPE Scholarship; Professional Scholarship; State Nursing Scholarship; Tolbert Grant; Firefighters, Ambulance and Rescue Squad members Tuition Reimbursement award; and the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award is automatically renewed if you: retain your Distinguished Scholar award; maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend; maintain an annual, minimum 3.0 GPA; and remain enrolled full-time at a 2- or 4-year Maryland college or university in an approved teacher education program. Your parents must also remain Maryland residents. The award may be renewed for an additional three years.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work as a full-time classroom teacher in a Maryland public school, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. If you fail to remain eligible for a Distinguished Scholar award, you must still fulfill the obligations of the Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education promissory note. You must begin the service obligation within nine (9) months of graduation.

FIREFIGHTER, AMBULANCE AND RESCUE SQUAD MEMBER TUITION REIMBURSEMENT PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Active career or volunteer firefighters, ambulance or rescue squad members.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a Firefighter, Ambulance and Rescue Squad Member Tuition Reimbursement application.
- When to apply:** Applications must be received at the State Scholarship Administration office by July 1, 2002.
- Eligible majors:** Fire service technology and emergency medical technology.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must be an active career or volunteer firefighter, ambulance or rescue squad member. You must serve a Maryland community while you take college courses and continue to serve for another year after you complete the courses. You must attend a Maryland 2-year or 4-year institution as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester) undergraduate, or as a full-time (9+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-8 credits per semester) graduate student. You must enroll in a degree or certificate program in either fire service technology or emergency medical technology.

AWARD AMOUNT

You will receive the actual dollar amount of tuition charges you have paid. Reimbursement cannot exceed the tuition charged to a resident, undergraduate student at the University of Maryland, College Park. You may hold the Firefighter, Ambulance and Rescue Squad Member Tuition Reimbursement award with a: Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant; and Part-Time Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew award, you must maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution you attend and remain enrolled in an eligible program. You may reapply for the award each year.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must serve a Maryland community as a career or volunteer firefighter, ambulance or rescue squad member while you take college courses. You must continue to serve for one year after you complete the courses.

MARYLAND HOPE SCHOLARSHIP

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA, and complete and file the HOPE Scholarship Application
- When to apply:** January 1 through March 1, each year. Late applicants will be placed on a waiting list.
- Eligible majors:** 2002-2003 Eligible Programs:

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. All applicants must have a minimum, cumulative 3.0 high school GPA in academic core courses. Your family income may not exceed \$95,000 annually. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and major in an eligible program.

AWARD AMOUNT

Students attending a community college will receive \$1,000 annually. Students attending a 4-year institution will receive \$3,000 annually. You may hold the Hope Scholarship with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; and Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew an award, you must: maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in your college course work; remain enrolled in an eligible program; and maintain the satisfactory academic progress stands of the institution you attend.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work full-time in Maryland, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within 12 months of graduation.

MARYLAND TEACHER SCHOLARSHIP

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors, full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students and college graduates who have not completed a teacher education program or who do not currently hold teacher certification. Part-time graduate students who do not currently hold teacher certification may also apply.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the HOPE Scholarship application.
- When to apply:** By March 1, each year. Late applicants will be placed on a waiting list.
- Eligible majors:** A course of study leading to a Maryland professional teacher's certification.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. Applicants not currently enrolled in college must have a minimum, cumulative 3.0 high school GPA in academic core curriculum courses. All applicants currently enrolled in college or graduate school must have a minimum, cumulative 3.0 GPA. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate (12+ credits per semester) or graduate student (9+ credits per semester) or as a part-time graduate student (6-8 credits per semester) and major in course of study leading to a Maryland professional teacher's certificate.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

If you attend a community college, you will receive \$2,000 annually. If you attend a 4-year institution, you will receive \$5,000 annually. If you are a part-time graduate student, you will receive \$2,500 annually. You may hold the Maryland Teacher Scholarship with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Distinguished Scholar award; and Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed if you: maintain a minimum 3.0 cumulative GPA in your college course work; and remain enrolled in an eligible program. Your award may be renewed for an additional year if you attend a community college, for an additional 3 years if you are attending a 4-year institution and for an additional year if you are attending as a graduate student.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work full-time as a classroom teacher in a Maryland public school, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within 12 months of graduation.

SHARON CHRISTA MCAULIFFE MEMORIAL TEACHER EDUCATION AWARD

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- Who may apply:** College students with at least 60 semester credit hours, college graduates **and** teachers in a non-critical shortage area.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Sharon Christa McAuliffe Memorial Teacher Education application.
- When to apply:** Applications are available in late October. Deadline is December 31.
- Eligible majors:** An approved teacher education program.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate student or full-time (9+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-8 credits per semester), degree-seeking graduate student. You must enroll in an approved teacher education program in a critical shortage field. You must have a minimum cumulative 3.0 GPA on 4.0 scale. All applicants are ranked and selected by a committee of educators from the Maryland State Department of Education using objective criteria.

Critical shortage fields change yearly, and will be listed, for academic year 2002-2003, on the Sharon Christa McAuliffe Memorial Teacher Education Award application.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The maximum award is the amount of tuition, mandatory fees, room and board for a student at the University of Maryland College Park. You may hold the Sharon Christa McAuliffe Memorial Teacher Education award with the Guaranteed Access Grant and Educational Assistance Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award may be renewed if you: maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend; maintain a minimum cumulative 3.0 GPA; and remain enrolled full-time at a 2- or 4-year Maryland college or university in an approved teacher education program. Your parents must also remain Maryland residents. The award may be renewed for an additional year.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work as a full-time classroom teacher in a Maryland public school in the critical shortage area you have chosen, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within six (6) months of graduation.

STATE NURSING SCHOLARSHIP AND LIVING EXPENSES GRANT

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors and degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the State Nursing Scholarship application. Students who wish to be considered for the Living Expenses Grant must also file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA.
- When to apply:** Complete and file the State Nursing Scholarship Application by June 30. If applying for the Living Expenses Grant, also file the FAFSA by March 1, each year.
- Eligible majors:** Nursing program that leads to a nursing degree.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must have a minimum, cumulative 3.0 GPA in high school or college. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 semester credits) undergraduate or a full-time (9+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-8 credits) graduate student in a program leading to a degree in nursing. You must receive the State Nursing Scholarship to be eligible for the Living Expenses Grant.

Recipients are selected competitively based on GPA and the type of nursing degree program in which they enroll.

FINANCIAL NEED

The State Nursing Scholarship is not based on need. The Living Expenses Grant is based on student need as demonstrated by information reported on the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The nursing scholarship is for the amount of tuition and mandatory fees up to \$3,000 per year. The amount of the Living Expenses Grant varies up to \$3,000 per year. Recipients enrolled in an accelerated nursing program that requires summer enrollment may receive a maximum annual award of \$4,500. You may hold the State Nursing Scholarship and Living Expenses Grant with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; and the Distinguished Scholar award.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed for up to three years if you: maintain a minimum 3.0 annual GPA in your college course work; remain enrolled in an eligible program; maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of your institution; and, if receiving the Living Expenses Grant, continue to demonstrate financial need.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work as a full-time nurse at an eligible organization in Maryland (licensed hospital, public health agency, nursing home, home health agency, or adult day care center), one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within six (6) months of graduation.

HEALTH MANPOWER SHORTAGE PROGRAM TUITION REDUCTION FOR NONRESIDENT NURSING STUDENTS

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- Who may apply:** Non-residents of Maryland who attend a 2- or 4-year public institution in Maryland.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a Tuition Reduction for Non-Resident Nursing Students application and submit it to the financial aid office at the school you attend.
- When to apply:** Applications become available in May.
- Eligible Programs:** Undergraduate nursing program.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must not be a resident of Maryland. You must attend a Maryland 2- or 4-year public institution as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) or part-time (6-11 credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate. You must enroll in a nursing program.

AWARD AMOUNT

Your college may reduce your tuition so that you pay the tuition charged a Maryland resident.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will automatically be renewed for an additional one year if you attend a 2-year public institution or for an additional three years if you attend a 4-year public institution. You must maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution you will attend and remain enrolled in an eligible program.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to serve as a full-time nurse in Maryland in an eligible institution or at a home that provides domiciliary, personal or nursing care for two or more unrelated individuals. You must work for two years if you attended a 2-year school, or for four years if you attended a 4-year school, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin your service obligation within six (6) months of graduation.

OPTOMETRY TUITION REDUCTION AWARD INTERSTATE COMPACT PENNSYLVANIA COLLEGE OF OPTOMETRY/STATE OF MARYLAND

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- Who may apply:** Students admitted to the Pennsylvania College of Optometry.
- How to apply:** Complete and file an Optometry Tuition Reduction Award application.
- When to apply:** Application deadline is July 7.
- Eligible major:** Optometry

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must be a Maryland resident. You must have been admitted to the Pennsylvania College of Optometry. You must enroll full-time in the Doctor of Optometry program leading to licensure as an optometrist in Maryland. Only ten (10) students in each class may receive this award.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum annual award, contingent upon state funding, is \$8,275.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may renew your award up to three years if you remain enrolled in the Doctor of Optometry program and maintain the satisfactory academic progress stands of the institution.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to serve full-time as a practicing Doctor of Optometry or professional in the field of optometry in Maryland, one year for each year, you received the tuition reimbursement or repay the amount with interest.



PHYSICAL AND OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS AND ASSISTANTS GRANT PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors and full-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a Physical and Occupational Therapists and Assistants Grant Program application.
- When to apply:** File the Physical and Occupational Therapists and Assistants Grant application by July 1.
- Eligible majors:** Professional program in physical therapy, physical therapist assistant, occupational therapy or occupational therapist assistant.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) undergraduate or a full-time (9+ credits per semester) graduate student in a professional program leading to a license as a Maryland physical therapist, physical therapist assistant, occupational therapist or occupational therapist assistant.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need. Applicants are selected competitively on the basis of college or high school GPA.

AWARD AMOUNT

This maximum grant is \$2,000 per academic year for full-time students. You may hold the Physical and Occupational Therapists and Assistants Grant with the Guaranteed Access Grant and the Educational Assistance Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may renew your award up to three years if you remain enrolled in an eligible program and maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of your institution.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work as a full-time therapist or therapy assistant in a Maryland facility that accommodates or provides service to handicapped children, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest.

PROFESSIONAL SCHOOL SCHOLARSHIP

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- Who may apply:** Degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA-and complete and file a Professional School Scholarship application.
- When to apply:** File the FAFSA and the Professional School Scholarship application by March 1, each year.
- Eligible majors:** Graduate programs in dentistry, law, medicine, nursing, pharmacy, or social work and undergraduate programs in nursing and pharmacy.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester) undergraduate in nursing or pharmacy, or a full-time (9+ credits per semester) graduate student in the following programs: dentistry; law; medicine; nursing; pharmacy; or social work.

FINANCIAL NEED

Applicants are ranked on basis of the student need as demonstrated on the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum award is \$200 per year and the maximum award is \$1,000 per year. You may hold the Professional School Scholarship with: Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; Joan L. Hoffman Loan Assistance Program; and the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may renew your award for an additional three years if you: remain enrolled in an eligible program; maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of your institution; file a FAFSA each year by March 1, and demonstrate need; and, file a Professional School Scholarship award each year by March 1.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY SCHOLARSHIP

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Who may apply: Current high school seniors and full-time degree-seeking undergraduates who begin attending college within 5 years after graduating from high school.

How to apply: Complete and file the HOPE Scholarship application

When to apply: January 1 through March 1, each year. Late applicants will be placed on a waiting list.

Eligible majors: 2002-2003 Eligible Programs:

biological sciences computer information science engineering
mathematics physical sciences

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. Applicants not currently enrolled in college must have a minimum, cumulative 3.0 high school GPA in academic core curriculum courses. All applicants enrolled in college must have a minimum, annual 3.0 GPA. You must intend to enroll, or be enrolled, at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time (12+ credits per semester), degree-seeking undergraduate and major in an eligible associate's or bachelor's degree program.

All high school or post-high school applicants are ranked beginning with the highest cumulative GPA. The highest annual GPA ranks all enrolled college students beginning with those closest to their degree.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

If you attend a community college, you will receive \$1000 annually for two years. If you attend a 4-year institution, you will receive \$3000 annually for four years. You may hold the Science and Technology Scholarship with: Guaranteed Access Grant; Educational Assistance Grant; Senatorial Scholarship; Delegate Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; and the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed if you: maintain a minimum 3.0 annual GPA in your college course work; and remain enrolled in an eligible program. Your award may be renewed for an additional year if you attend a community college, and for an additional 3 years if you are attending a 4-year institution.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to work full-time in Maryland in an occupation directly related to your eligible program of study, one year for each year of the award, or repay the scholarship with interest. You must begin the service obligation within 12 months of graduation.

DELEGATE SCHOLARSHIP

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors, full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students. Students attending a private career school.
- How to apply:** If your delegates make their own awards, you should call or write them for further instructions. The State Scholarship Administration (SSA) can provide a list of all state legislators. Some delegates ask the State SSA to make awards for them. These awards are made on the basis of need demonstrated on the FAFSA. Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA.
- When to apply:** Complete and file the FAFSA by March 1. Contact your delegates in April for further instructions.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university as a full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate or graduate student, or attend certain private career schools

You may use this scholarship at an out-of-state school if your major is not available at a Maryland school, and if your delegate agrees. The SSA must verify that your major is unique. Contact the SSA for further information.

FINANCIAL NEED

If the SSA makes the awards for your delegates, you must demonstrate financial need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum annual award is \$200. You may hold the Delegate Scholarship with: Senatorial Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; any HOPE Scholarship Program award (except the Maryland Teacher Scholarship); Joan L. Hoffman Loan Assistance Repayment Program award; Professional Scholarship; State Nursing Scholarship; Tolbert Grant; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; Firefighters, Ambulance and Rescue Squad members Tuition Reimbursement award; Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant; and the Part-Time Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

To renew your award, you must maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you will attend. You must re-apply each year to your delegate(s). If required, you must complete and file the FAFSA by March 1. You may be a recipient of a Delegate Scholarship for a total of four years.

SENATORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors, full-time and part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate and graduate students. Students attending a private career school.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid – FAFSA. If your senator makes his/her own awards, you must call or write to your legislator for further instructions. The State Scholarship Administration (SSA) can provide a list of all state legislators.
- When to apply:** Complete and file the FAFSA by March 1. Contact your senator in April for further instructions.
- Eligible majors:** All majors are eligible.

You may use this scholarship at an out-of-state school if your major is not available at a Maryland school, and if your senator agrees. The SSA must verify that your major is unique. Contact the SSA for further information.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You and your parents (if you are a dependent student) must be Maryland residents. You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university, as a full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate or graduate student, or attend or certain private career schools. You must demonstrate financial need. You must take the SAT 1 or the ACT unless: you graduated from high school five or more years ago; have earned 24 college credit hours; or are attending a community college or a private career school.

FINANCIAL NEED

Some senators ask the State Scholarship Administration (SSA) to make awards for them. These awards are made on the basis of need demonstrated on the FAFSA.

AWARD AMOUNT

The minimum annual award amount is \$200 and the maximum award is \$2,000. You may hold the Senatorial Scholarship with: Delegate Scholarship, Distinguished Scholar award; a HOPE Scholarship (except the Maryland Teacher Scholarship); Joan L. Hoffman Loan Assistance Repayment Program award; Professional Scholarship; State Nursing Scholarship; Tolbert Grant; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; Firefighters, Ambulance and Rescue Squad members Tuition Reimbursement award; Edward T. Conroy Memorial Grant; and a Part-Time Grant.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be automatically renewed if you maintain satisfactory academic progress at the college you attend. Full-time students may receive a Senatorial Scholarship for total of 4 years. Part-time students may receive a Senatorial Scholarship for a total of 8 years.

EDWARD T. CONROY MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

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- Who may apply:** Current high school seniors, full-time and part-time degree-seeking undergraduates and graduate students.
- How to apply:** Complete and file an Edward T. Conroy Memorial Scholarship application.
- When to apply:** Applications are available in June. Deadline is July 15.
- Eligible major:** All majors are eligible.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must enroll at a 2-year or 4-year Maryland college or university, as a full-time or part-time, degree-seeking undergraduate or graduate student or attend a private career school. You must be:

- the son or daughter of a member of the United States Armed Forces who died or was 100 percent disabled as a direct result of military service;
- a veteran who suffers, as a direct result of military service, a disability of 50% or greater and has exhausted or is no longer eligible for federal veterans' educational benefits;
- a POW/MIA of the Vietnam Conflict or his/her son or daughter;

- the son, daughter or surviving spouse (who has not remarried) of a state or local public safety officer or volunteer who died in the line of duty; or
- a state or local public safety officer or volunteer who was 100 percent disabled in the line of duty.

The parent, veteran, POW or public safety officer or volunteer must have been a resident of Maryland at the time of death or when declared disabled.

FINANCIAL NEED

This award is not based on need.

AWARD AMOUNT

The amount of your award may be equal to your tuition and fees, but may not exceed the equivalent annual tuition and mandatory fees of an undergraduate, resident student at the University of Maryland, College Park. You may hold the Edward T. Conroy Memorial Scholarship with; Senatorial Scholarship, Delegate Scholarship; Distinguished Scholar award; Science and Technology Scholarship; Professional Scholarship; Janet L. Hoffman Loan Assistance Repayment Program award; Tolbert Grant; Distinguished Scholar Teacher Education award; and Firefighters, Ambulance and Rescue Squad Members Tuition Reimbursement award. The minimum annual award is \$200 per year.

RENEWING AN AWARD

Your award will be renewed if you: complete and file the renewal application by July 30, each year, and continue to meet eligibility requirements. Awards may be held for five years of full-time study (12+ credits per semester) or eight years of part-time study (6-11 credits per semester) attendance or a combination of both.

TUITION WAIVER FOR FOSTER CARE RECIPIENTS

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- Who may apply:** Certain students, under the age of 21, who have resided in foster care.
- How to apply:** Complete and file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).
- When to apply:** Apply between January 1 and March 1, each year.
- Eligible Programs:** All programs.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must have resided in a foster care home on or after your 18th birthday, or must have resided in a foster care home on your 14th birthday and were then adopted out of a foster care home after your 14th birthday.

The Department of Human Resources must also confirm that you are eligible for the waiver.

You must enroll as a degree candidate at the public 2-year or 4-year high education institution in Maryland on or before age 21.

AWARD AMOUNT

You are exempt from paying tuition and mandatory fees at a public college in Maryland.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may renew your award for an additional 4 years or until your bachelor's degree is awarded, whichever comes first. You must maintain the satisfactory academic progress standards of the institution you will attend and remain enrolled in an eligible program.

JANET L. HOFFMAN LOAN ASSISTANCE REPAYMENT PROGRAM (LARP)

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Who may apply: Maryland residents who work for Maryland state or local government or nonprofit agencies.

How to apply: Complete and file a LARP application.

When to apply: Applications become available in June. The application deadline is September 30.

Eligible employment fields: 2001-2002 eligible employment fields:

lawyers (judicial clerks in-any court are not eligible)
nurses (degree or diploma holding registered nurses)
physical and occupational therapists
social workers (either a bachelor's or master's degree)
speech pathologists
teachers with the following areas of certification:
art; career and technology education (secondary) - agriculture; computer science (secondary);
earth/space science (secondary); English for speakers of other languages-ESOL (elementary
and secondary); foreign languages – Spanish; mathematics (secondary); physical science
(secondary); physics (secondary); and special education: generic (infant to grade 3; grades 1-8:
grades 6 to adult); and severely and profoundly handicapped.

The eligible employment fields for award year 2002-2003 will be included in the LARP application.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must have graduated from a college in Maryland or from a law school. You must be employed full-time in state or local government, or in a nonprofit organization in Maryland. Your employer must help low-income, underserved residents or underserved areas in the state. You must have loans from a university, government or commercial source that you used to pay college expenses. You may not be in default on a loan. Your gross salary cannot exceed \$50,000 and, if married, your combined salaries cannot exceed \$110,000.

AWARD AMOUNT

A formula is used to determine the amount of each award. This formula uses your total student loan debt and your expected contribution to determine your award amount up to \$7,500 a year.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may reapply for this award each year, provided you continue to meet all eligibility requirements.

LOAN ASSISTANCE REPAYMENT PROGRAM – PRIMARY CARE SERVICES (LARP-PCS)

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- Who may apply:** Primary care physicians and medical residents in a residency program specializing in primary care.
- How to apply:** Complete and file a LARP-PCS application available from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) at: (410) 767-5695.
- When to apply:** Rolling deadline.
- Eligible specialties:** General internal medicine; family practice medicine; general pediatrics; obstetrics/gynecology; and gynecology.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must have graduated from a college in Maryland or from a medical school. If you are a physician, you must have a valid unrestricted license to practice primary care medicine in Maryland and work in an approved underserved area in Maryland. If you are a medical resident, you must have at least one year remaining in a residency program specializing in primary care. You must have outstanding eligible higher education loans. You cannot be in default on a loan or have incomplete service obligations.

AWARD AMOUNT

Physicians will receive between \$25,000 and \$30,000 per year, depending on the length of their service commitment. The award to medical residents may not exceed \$25,000. All recipients will receive a supplemental amount equal to 39% of the annual repayment amount to help defray the associated tax liability.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may re-apply for this award after completion of the service obligation.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note agreeing to serve full-time as a primary care physician in an underserved area in Maryland for a period of two to four years. You must be a resident of Maryland at the time the service obligation begins. Physicians must begin their service obligation within three months of the close of the fiscal year in which the contract is executed. Medical residents must begin their service obligation within three (3) months of completion of training.

MARYLAND DENT-CARE LOAN ASSISTANCE REPAYMENT PROGRAM (MDC-LARP)

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- Who may apply:** Practicing dentists.
- How to apply:** Complete and file an MDC-LARP application available from the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene (DHMH) at: (410) 767-5695.
- When to apply:** Rolling deadline.
- Eligible field of employment:** Dentistry

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

You must be a Maryland resident. You must have graduated from an accredited US dental school. You must have a valid unrestricted license to practice dentistry in Maryland and be employed full-time as a dentist providing care to Maryland Medical Assistance program (MMAP) recipients in Maryland. You must have at least 30 percent of your patient population as MMAP recipients. You must have outstanding eligible higher education loans. You cannot be in default on a loan or have incomplete service obligations.

AWARD AMOUNT

The maximum yearly award amount is \$23,000, with a supplemental amount equal to 39% of the annual repayment amount to help defray the associated tax liability.

RENEWING AN AWARD

You may renew your award up to two years.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

You must sign and return a promissory note stating that you will remain employed full-time as a dentist. You must agree to maintain at least 30 percent of your patient population as Maryland Medical Assistance Program (MMAP) recipients.

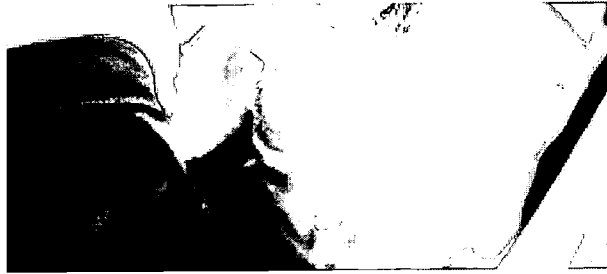

IMPORTANT TERMS

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AWARD LETTER

When the State of Maryland offers you a scholarship or grant, the State Scholarship Administration will send you an official award letter. This letter will list the name and amount of the scholarship or grant, and which school the award is for. You must sign, date and initial the letter informing that you accept or reject the scholarship and return the letter to the State Scholarship Administration.

COST OF ATTENDANCE

The total amount of money it will cost for you to go to college for a year is called the cost of attendance. This amount includes tuition and fees, room and board or housing/living costs, allowances for books, supplies and other necessities. Where you choose to live (on-campus, off-campus or with your parents) is also a factor used in deciding the total cost of your college.

EXPECTED FAMILY CONTRIBUTION

This figure is determined by the information you report on the FAFSA and is calculated by the Federal Methodology.

FAMILY INCOME

Family income includes all income (taxed and untaxed) for you and your parent(s)/guardian(s) (if you are a dependent student) that is reported on the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

FEDERAL METHODOLOGY

Federal Methodology is a formula used to calculate the amount of money that you and your family are expected to pay for college. This formula, established by Congress, is used nationwide for all students. The most important factors in the formula are: the income, assets and net worth of your parents; your income and assets; and the size of your family.

FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT AID (FAFSA)

The FAFSA is the basic application you must complete and file to apply for federal student aid, State of Maryland financial aid and much of the financial aid your college may give to you. If you are a dependent of your parents, you must complete the student section of the FAFSA and you must have your parents complete the parent section of the FAFSA. You may file the FAFSA, the Renewal FAFSA, or an electronic FAFSA/Renewal FAFSA using FAFSA Express software or FAFSA on-line on the web at: www.fafsa.ed.gov.

FINANCIAL AID PACKAGE

Your financial aid package consists of the total amount of financial aid you receive. Your package may contain federal grants, loans and work-study, state scholarships or grants, and scholarships, grants or loans from your college.

FINANCIAL NEED

The gap between the cost of attending your college and the amount of your EFC is your need. Your financial aid package is based on the amount of your financial need.

FULL-TIME STUDENT

If you enroll as an undergraduate for 12+ credits per semester, you are considered a full-time student. If you enroll as a graduate student for 9+ credits per semester, you are considered a full-time student.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

Your GPA is the average of your grades, where the grades have been converted to a 4.0 scale. On this scale a 4.0 is an A, 3.0 is a B, and 2.0 is a C. A cumulative GPA is the average of all your grades when you attended a high school or college (i.e., cumulative GPA of grades 9-12 of high school).

GRADUATE STUDENT

A college student who is enrolled in a masters or doctoral program is called a graduate student.

GRANT

Grants are financial aid you do not have to pay back and are usually for students who have a financial need. The largest Maryland state grant program is the Educational Assistance Grant. The largest federal grant program is the Federal Pell Grant.

LOAN

A loan is money that you borrow and must pay back later with interest. Federal funds provide most of the money used in making educational loans. The Stafford Loan and the Perkins Loan are federal loan programs.

OFFICIAL TRANSCRIPT

An official transcript is a list of all classes taken and all grades received by the student, and is sent by the school in a sealed envelope, usually with an original signature of a school official and an official seal.

PART-TIME STUDENT

If you enroll as an undergraduate for 6-11 credits, you are considered a part-time student. If you enroll as a graduate student for 6-8 credits, you are considered a part-time student.

PROMISSORY NOTE

If you accept a grant that has a service obligation, you must sign a promissory note. The note is a binding legal document that states the terms and conditions of repayment of the grant should you not complete the service obligation.

SCHOLARSHIP

A scholarship is financial aid you don't have to pay back and is usually given to students who are recognized for academic achievement, athletic ability, or other talents.

SERVICE OBLIGATION

Some scholarships and grants require that you work in state or local government or non-profit agencies in your chosen field after you complete your education. If you fail to complete your service obligation, you must then repay the money you received, with interest.

STUDENT AID REPORT (SAR)

The SAR summarizes the information you included on the FAFSA you filed. The SAR will tell you your EFC and whether you are eligible for a Pell Grant. You should receive your SAR 4-6 weeks after you mail your FAFSA to the processor. This year (2002-2003 academic year) your SAR will be blue.

TITLE IV SCHOOL CODE

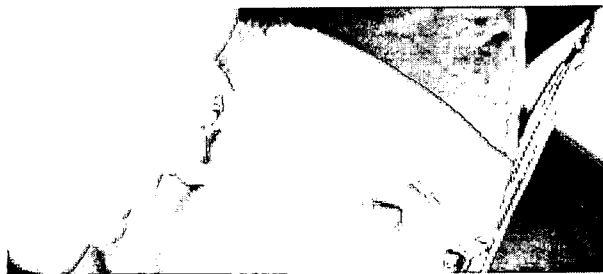
When you fill out the FAFSA, you need to put in the six-digit Title IV code for each school to which you are applying. You can find a list of the Title IV school codes at your high school guidance office, college financial aid office, public library, the Federal Student Aid Information Center, the State Scholarship Administration, or at: www.ed.gov/studentaid.

UNDERGRADUATE STUDENT

A college or private career school student who is enrolled in a certificate, nursing diploma, associate's degree or bachelor's degree program is called an undergraduate student.

WORK STUDY

Work study is part-time employment during the school year, usually at an on-campus job.
