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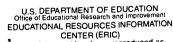
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ABSTRACT

The purpose of this report on the Iowa Community College System was to review Iowa community college programs and related services. The report is comprised of the following basic sections: (1) the introduction, which includes a history of Iowa Community Colleges; (2) Credit Student Enrollment, offering a variety of reports; (3) Credit Student Demographics; (4) Credit Student Awards; (5) Non-Credit Enrollment and Programs; (6) Community College Programs, including programs accredited by other agencies; (7) Success of Community College Credit Students, including data from the Iowa Board of Regents that refers to transfer students and graduation rates data; (8) Adult Basic Education; (9) Economic Development; (10) Human Resources; (11) Financial, including revenues and expenditures; (12) Tuition and Fees; and (13) Financial Aid. The data in the Credit Student Enrollment section includes the following highlights: (1) credit enrollment in the system in 2000-2001 was an unduplicated headcount of 98,602, compared with 95,556 the previous year; and (2) 69.27% of total enrollment in 2000-2001 was in the Arts and Science programs, nearly the same (69.17%) as in the previous year. Highlights of the Credit Student Demographics section include: (1) in 2000-2001 57.13% of students were female, similar to 57.23% in the previous year; and (2) the largest age group of credit students in 2000-2001 was 18-22 (53% of total enrollment). 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Section 1: Purpose of the Report

lowa's 15 Community Colleges offer thousands of credit and non-credit courses. The 2001 Condition of lowa Community Colleges report will review lowa Community College programs and related services. The report is supported by Management Information System (MIS) data, as reported by lowa Community Colleges to the lowa Department of Education, and additional references, which are identified in the body of the report. Data is based on Fiscal Year 1998-1999 (the first year of Management Information System (MIS) reporting), Fiscal Year 1999-2000, and Fiscal Year 2000-2001.

The report is comprised of the following basic sections:

<u>Introduction</u>: A history of lowa's Community Colleges and reference to lowa Code, Chapter 260C.1, which is the statement of policy describing educational opportunities and services provided.

<u>Credit Student Enrollment</u>: A variety of reports including, year-end and fall credit headcount and total credit hours, with full-time and part-time student enrollment data. Credit Arts and Science programs and Career and Technical Education program totals, majors by occupational program cluster.

<u>Credit Student Demographics</u>: Consists of gender, age, ethnicity, and residency of credit students.

<u>Credit Student Awards</u>: Awards, certificates, diplomas, and/or degrees granted Fiscal Year 1998-1999, Fiscal Year 1999-2000, and Fiscal Year 2000-2001.

<u>Non-Credit Enrollment and Programs</u>: Programs and services provided through non-credit divisions of community colleges. Non-credit enrollments by occupational program cluster and a variety of program area enrollments are presented.

<u>Community College Programs</u>: lowa Career and Technical Education programs, national pathways and reporting clusters, new programs for Fiscal Year 2000-2001, programs discontinued in Fiscal Year 1999-2000, programs accredited by other agencies, targeted industries programs as identified by the Governor of lowa, and credit/non-credit apprenticeship programs are included.

Success of Community College Credit Students: Reports include data from the lowa Board of Regents referring to lowa Community College transfer students and six-year graduation rates data. An additional report identifies the number of credit students currently enrolled in community colleges who have completed the General Educational Development (GED) diploma. Geographic location of community college alumni from the lowa College Student Aid Commission reflects the largest portion of graduates are living in lowa.

Adult Basic Education (ABE): Highlights of Program Year 2001 Adult Basic Education accomplishments.



Economic Development: Training and retraining programs provided by community colleges in cooperation with the Iowa Department of Economic Development. Enrollments and occupational types of programming include Iowa Industrial New Jobs Training Programs (260E), Iowa Jobs Training Programs (260F), Accelerated Career Education (ACE 260G), and Apprenticeship Programs.

<u>Human Resources</u>: Staff of Iowa Community Colleges is reported within categories of Administration, Instructional, Professional, Secretarial & Clerical, and Service. Fiscal Year 2000-2001 is the first year base salary of full-time Instructional staff is reported and this section includes comparison salary reports from *The Chronicle of Higher Education* and lowa College Student Aid Commission.

<u>Financial</u>: Revenues by Source, Expenditures by Category, Expenditures by Function, surrounding state comparison of General Operating Funds from Local Support and Tuition and Fees. Full-Time Equivalent Enrollment (FTEE) calculation for State General Aid information is presented.

<u>Tuition and Fees</u>: Costs to students of Iowa Community Colleges, Regent institutions, and surrounding states are compared.

<u>Financial Aid</u>: Reports from *The Chronicle of Higher Education* and Iowa College Student Aid Commission present information on financial aid and scholarships received by students.

<u>Glossary</u>: Definitions of terms utilized through the Condition of Iowa Community Colleges 2001 Report.

<u>Appendices</u>: Community College Management Information System (MIS) Data, which supports the tables in the text of the report.

Section 3: Introduction

"The mission of lowa's System of Community Colleges in the 21st Century is to provide world-class educational and community services to meet the needs of the people of lowa."

Community colleges have an "open door" policy, which means that virtually everyone who applies may be accepted.

Each of the 15 community colleges offers comprehensive programs including Arts and Science, College Transfer (Parallel) courses, Career and Technical Education programs, training and retraining programs for the workforce of lowa's businesses and industries, and an expanding variety of adult education and non-credit courses for residents of each community college district.

History of Iowa's Community Colleges

Mason City schools established the first two-year postsecondary educational institution in Iowa in 1918. At the time this junior college was organized, there was no law authorizing two-year postsecondary educational programs. Mason City Junior College proved to be successful and was accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools in 1919.

Additional public junior colleges were organized beginning in 1920, and the movement spread rapidly, until, by 1930, at least 32 towns and cities in lowa had organized public junior colleges as part of their public school systems.

In 1927, the 42nd General Assembly passed the first law authorizing the establishment of public junior colleges. The law permitted the establishment of schools offering instructional programs at a level higher than an approved four-year high school course. The colleges had to be duly authorized by the voters and approved by the State Superintendent of the Iowa Department of Public Instruction (now the Director of the Iowa Department of Education). Such colleges were able to include postsecondary courses of one or two years. The Superintendent was authorized to prepare standards and provide adequate inspection of these junior colleges.

The lowa public junior college movement reached its crest in 1927 when nine public junior colleges were organized. After the year 1930, no public junior colleges were organized until 1946, when Clinton Junior College was founded. In 1931, the 44th General Assembly approved the first restriction to the development of public junior colleges, prohibiting the establishment of a public junior college in any school district having a population of less than 20,000. The 49th General Assembly in 1941 reduced the population requirement to 5,000.

Between the years 1918 and 1953, a total of 35 different public junior colleges were established through the operation of public school districts. Some of these colleges closed, although 10 of the closed colleges later reopened. The enrollment trend steadily increased over the years with the exception of the World War II years. During the 1955-66 decade, which immediately preceded the initiation of a community college system, enrollment almost quadrupled. By 1965, 16 public junior colleges were operating in lowa and the total enrollment during the fall semester of the 1965-66 school year was 9,110. Local public school districts operated colleges; a dean who reported directly to the local superintendent administered each. These institutions offered arts and science programs equivalent to the first two years of the baccalaureate program and a limited number of occupational programs and adult education opportunities.



In 1958, Congress initiated a development parallel to the public junior college movement. Title VIII of the National Defense Education Act (NDEA) made federal funds available to states on a matching basis to develop area vocational programs. To implement this legislation, the lowa State Board of Education modified the state vocational education plan to make local school districts and lowa State University eligible to operate as "area schools." This legislation included a specific allocation of funds to develop area vocational programs under NDEA's Title VIII, a designation of area vocational-technical high schools, and the authorization for tuition-paying students to attend these schools and programs.

The lowa State Board of Education eventually designated a total of 15 schools as area vocational-technical high schools. These schools were also designated as area schools for the purposes of Title VIII, and were to be used to initiate programming for the Manpower Development and Training Act. A total of 1,816 full-time day students enrolled in postsecondary vocational programs for the 1965-66 school year; the majority entered programs administered by agencies operating the area vocational-technical high schools or programs.

Even though public junior colleges and area vocational-technical high schools offered some opportunities for arts and science and preparatory vocational education, enrollment opportunities were limited for most lowans. In 1959, the 58th General Assembly appropriated \$25,000 to the lowa Legislative Research Bureau to conduct a policy study of the needs of higher education in lowa. Included in this report was a recommendation to establish regional community colleges. The report also contained the recommendation that the state pay at least half the cost of building and operating these colleges. As a result of this study, the General Assembly directed the lowa Department of Education to conduct a two-year study of the need to develop a statewide system of public community colleges. Legislators indicated that this study should investigate the availability of vocational and technical education in lowa high schools and provide recommendations for improving this education.

The lowa Department of Education submitted its report. Education Beyond High School Age: The Community College, to the General Assembly in December 1962. The report made recommendations and proposed enabling legislation. It recommended restructuring the county educational system and forming 16 area education districts whose boundaries should be drawn along existing school district lines. These districts were intended to provide programs and services that would complement those provided by local school districts. It was envisioned that the area districts would also serve as a legal structure through which a statewide system of community colleges could be developed.

In 1963, the 60th General Assembly took no action on the report. However, an interim legislative committee concluded that it would be appropriate to put vocational and two-year college education together in a single comprehensive system. Staff of the Iowa Department of Education worked closely with various groups throughout the state, and arrived at conclusions similar to those of the interim committee. Passage of the Vocational Education Act of 1963 provided additional impetus to this planning.

After receiving the interim committee's report in 1964, the 61st General Assembly in 1965 enacted legislation that permitted the development of a statewide system of two-year postsecondary educational institutions, identified as "merged area schools." The lowa Department of Education was to direct the operation of the development of merged area schools as either area community colleges or area vocational schools.



Legislation authorizing merged area schools, which are now referred to as "community colleges," provided for fiscal support for these institutions through a combination of student tuition and federal, state, and local funds. These resources included a local three-quarter mill levy on the property within the merged area for operational purposes, and an additional three-quarter mill levy for the purchase of sites and construction of buildings. State general aid was distributed to community colleges on the basis of \$2.25 per day for the average daily enrollment of full-time students and the full-time equivalent of part-time students who were residents of lowa. The 63rd General Assembly changed this formula in 1969 to provide for the payment of state aid equivalent to the full-time equivalent enrollment determined on the basis of actual contact hours of instruction. Individual colleges were granted authority to establish tuition rates, except that tuition was not to exceed the lowest tuition rate charged by any one of lowa's three Regent Universities.

Legislation approved in 1965 was enthusiastically received. The lowa Department of Education received the first plan for a community college on July 5, 1965; one day after the legislation was effective. Plans for the other community colleges followed in quick succession. Fourteen (14) community colleges were approved and organized in 1966, and a 15th in January 1967. Fourteen of these community colleges began operation during the 1966-67 school year. (Although the original plans called for 20 areas that was quickly reduced to 16. Then, two of the areas merged as the plan was being implemented.)

Seven (7) districts were originally approved as Area Community Colleges: (2001 names)

North Iowa Area Community College Iowa Lakes Community College Iowa Central Community College Iowa Valley Community College District Eastern Iowa Community College District Des Moines Area Community College Southeastern Community College

The remaining eight were approved as Area Vocational Schools: (2001 names)

Northeast Iowa Community College Northwest Iowa Community College Hawkeye Community College Kirkwood Community College Western Iowa Tech Community College Iowa Western Community College Southwestern Community College Indian Hills Community College

Currently, all 15 operate as comprehensive community colleges, offering arts and science (college transfer), vocational preparatory, and adult and continuing education programs. In 1987, Hawkeye Community College, the final lowa college operating as a vocational school, received approval to operate as a comprehensive community college.

In 1989, the 73rd General Assembly passed Senate File 449, requiring that secondary vocational programs be competency based, and that the competencies be articulated with postsecondary vocational education. This resulted in increased cooperation between local education agencies and the community colleges and a growth in programs in which high school students are awarded college credit for coursework completed in these articulated and 2+2 programs.



In 1999, the 78th General Assembly passed House File 680 mandating the Department of Education convene a committee to identify and study options for restructuring the governance of Iowa's Community Colleges. The report, which was submitted to the Legislature in December 1999, reaffirmed the existing governance structure of Iowa's Community Colleges, with locally elected boards of directors and the State Board of Education with responsibility for statewide oversight and coordination. The study recommended the development of a statewide strategic plan for the system of community colleges.

House File 2433 mandates the development of a statewide strategic plan for the statewide system of community colleges. It was approved by community college presidents, the lowa Association of Community College Trustees, and the State Board of Education, and forwarded to the legislature by July 2001. Specific objectives included:

- Provide high quality, comprehensive educational programs and services accessible to all lowans.
- 2. Develop high-skilled workers to meet the demands of lowa's changing economy.
- Maximize financial and human resources to assure provision of comprehensive community
 college services to lowans and to allow lowa to compete on a national and international
 level.
- 4. Demonstrate effectiveness and efficiency for achieving the system mission and goals.

lowa Code

The statement of policy describing the educational opportunities and services to be provided by community colleges is included in Section 260C.1 of the Iowa Code. This statement of policy identifies the following as services that should be included in a community college's mission.

- The first two years of college work, including pre-professional education.
- Vocational and technical training.
- Programs for in-service training and retraining of workers.
- Programs for high school completion for students of post-high school age.
- Programs for all students of high school age who may best serve themselves by enrolling in vocational and technical training, while also enrolled in a local high school, public or private.
- Programs for students of high school age that provide advanced college placement courses
 not taught at a student's high school while the student is also enrolled in the high school.
- Student personnel services.
- · Community services.
- Vocational education for persons who have academic, socioeconomic, or other handicaps that prevent succeeding in regular vocational education programs.
- Training, retraining, and all necessary preparation for productive employment of all citizens.
- Vocational and technical training for persons who are not enrolled in a high school and who have not completed high school.
- Developmental education for persons who are academically or personally under prepared to succeed in their program of study.

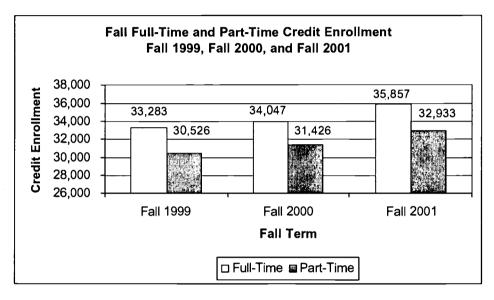


Section 4: Credit Student Enrollment

Fall Credit Enrollment

lowa Community College fall enrollment figures are based on student enrollment on the 14th day of the fall term and are then electronically transmitted to the lowa Department of Education. As shown in Figure 1 and Table 1, fall credit enrollment has increased each year, with Fall 2000, 1,664 (2.61%) and Fall 2001, 3,317 (5.07%).

Table 2 below shows increasing credit hours from Fall 1999 to Fall 2000 of 12,510.70 (1.97%) and Fall 2000 to Fall 2001 of 34,070.95 (5.27%). Total increase from Fall 1999 to Fall 2001 was 46,581.65 (7.24%).

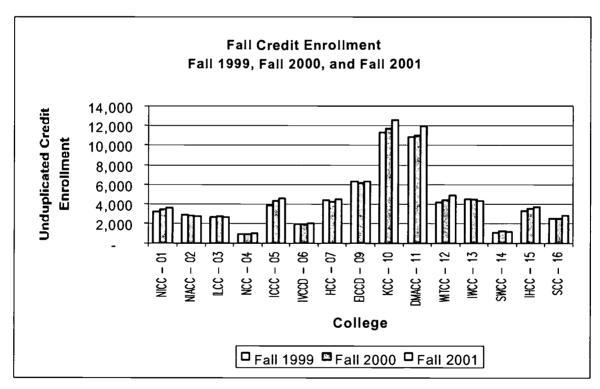

Figure 2 below illustrates the total fall credit enrollment by college, which reflects 2 of the 15 community colleges reporting decreases in credit enrollment from Fall 1999 to Fall 2001. The remaining 13 community colleges increased from Fall 1999 to Fall 2001.

- Students may enroll in credit classes for a variety of reasons including personal enrichment, upgrading jobrelated skills, and/or earning an associate degree, diploma or certificate.
- Even through unduplicated headcount enrollments increased 2,416 (2.59%) from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 1999-2000 and 3,046 (3.19%) from Fiscal Year 1999-2000 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001, total credit hours increased at a lower rate; as the text box to the left indicates, the average credit hour per student decreased from 14.85 to 14.64 from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001.
- Arts and Science enrollments have remained at approximately 69% of total enrollments (Table 4).

Credit Program Majors by Occupational Program Cluster

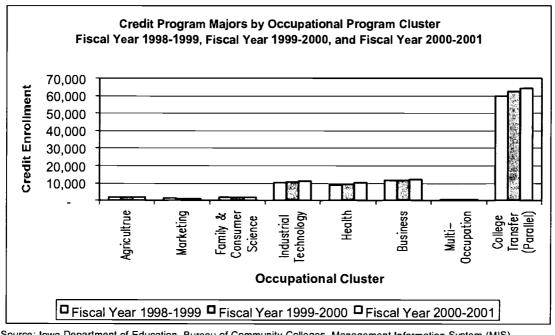
Since Fiscal Year 1998-1999, enrollments in Health and College Transfer (Parallel) program majors increased as a percent of the total enrollment; all others declined. Health major enrollments have increased from 8,964 (9.34%) to 10,451 (10.15%) of total enrollment. College Transfer (Parallel) major enrollments increased form 59,615 (62.15%) to 64,400 (62.55%) of total enrollment (Table 5).

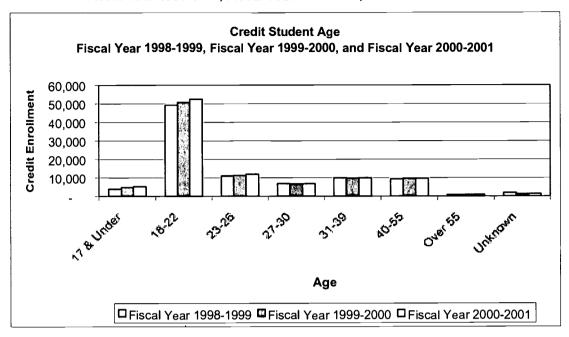

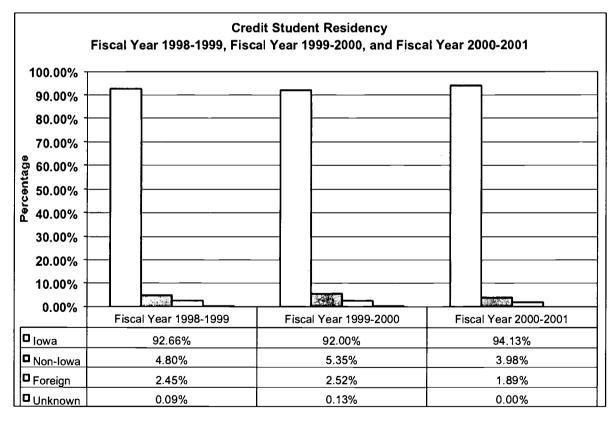

Degrees offered include Associate in Arts (AA), Associate in Science (AS), Associate in General Studies (AGS), Associate in Applied Arts (AAA), Associate in Applied Science (AAS), Non-Graduate, Diplomas, and Certificates.
- Associate in Arts comprised 3,809 (31.14%) of the total credit student awards granted during Fiscal Year 2000-2001.
 Associate in Applied Science awards accounted for another 3,511 (28.71%) of awards issued (Table 13, Page 9).

Credit Student Awards by Occupational Program Cluster

Credit student awards by occupational program cluster have remained fairly consistent over the past three years. All areas reflect minor fluctuations between Fiscal Year 1998-1999 and Fiscal Year 2000-2001. In Career and Technical Education programs, the largest number of awards are granted to Health programs; followed by Industrial Technology and Business programs.

Section 7: Non-Credit Student Enrollment and Programs

Non-Credit Student Enrollment

Non-credit offerings range from basic skills for personal development, skill building for preparation of individuals entering the workforce, highly technical courses directly related to job skills, and offers opportunities to pursue special interests. In Fiscal Year 2000-2001, 347,578 individuals (unduplicated headcount) participated in courses and programs that totaled 12,022,353 contact hours. Unduplicated enrollments in non-credit courses increased approximately 23,207 (7.15%) participants and contact hours increased 913,127 (18.22%) hours from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001.

Non-Credit Student Enrollment by Program Type

While enrollments in the "Other" non-credit program type decreased 4,640 (17.78%) from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001, enrollments in ABE/HS increased 19,653 (109.36%), followed by Secondary Jointly & Administered increased 164 (105.13%), Adult Vocational Technical Supplementary 45,449 (20.54%), Continuing and General Education increased 7,944 (18.66%), and Continuing Education Avocational/Recreational increased 375 (1.07%).

Adult/Continuing and General, Eligible

Categories eligible in the calculation of Full-Time Equivalent Enrollment (FTEE) for the community college portion of State General Aid appropriations include community resource development, legal and consumer rights, health, employment and business, programs for individuals with restricted income, environmental education, consumer and homemaking adult education, and state mandated courses or state approved programs. Programs reported separately include the lowa Course for Drinking Driving (DUI), lowa Course for Driver Improvement (DIP), and Recertification/Relicensure (Degree) programs. While unduplicated headcount increased 5,690 (14.07%) from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001, contact hours increased 462,009.50 (69.48%) during the same time period.

Iowa Course for Drinking Driving (DUI)

The lowa Course for Drinking Driving (DUI) is the state mandated 12-hour instructional course for drinking drivers convicted of driving while under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol. Beginning Fiscal Year 2000-2001, both lowa Community Colleges and private providers, licensed under Iowa Code, Chapter 125, through the Iowa Department of Public Health, offer the state approved 12-hour program. Community college enrollments in DUI classes dropped 3,137 (23.42%), from 13,396 in Fiscal Year 1999-2000 to 10,259 in Fiscal Year 2000-2001. Iowa substance abuse providers reported enrollments for Fiscal Year 2000-2001 of 2,976 students; when added to community college enrollments total participants equal 13,235.

Mine Safety Health and Administration (MSHA)

The lowa Department of Education administers a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Labor and Mine Safety and Health Administration (MSHA), which provides funds for training and services delivered to mine owners/operators/contractors in the State of Iowa. Approximately 230 mine operators employing an estimated 2,700 miners at 1,100 different locations within Iowa trained 6,600 mine employees and contractors through programs offered by community colleges in Fiscal Year 1998-1999, Fiscal Year 1999-2000, and Fiscal Year 2000-2001.

Section 9: Success of Community College Credit Students

Transfers from Iowa Community Colleges

It is reported by Fields & Ebbers (2001 "lowa's Community College Transfer Students: How do they compete academically at Iowa Regent Universities?") that community college transfer students comprise one quarter to one third of all third year students at Iowa Regent Universities, ranging from 22.2% at the University of Iowa, 24.2% at Iowa State University, and 33.5% at the University of Northern Iowa (Fall 1996).

According to the November 6, 2001 *lowa Board of Regents Annual Report on Student Retention and Graduation Rates*, the largest portion of students (1,829) that transfer to Regent Universities is from lowa Community Colleges (Fall 1995).

<u>Six-Year Graduation Rates of All Transfer Students Compared to Iowa Community College Transfer Students to Regent Universities</u>

For the past eight reporting years, community college transfer students to the Regent Universities have posted an average six-year graduation rate of 55.8% at the University of Iowa; 63.7% at Iowa State University; and 70.2% at the University of Northern Iowa (Table 34).

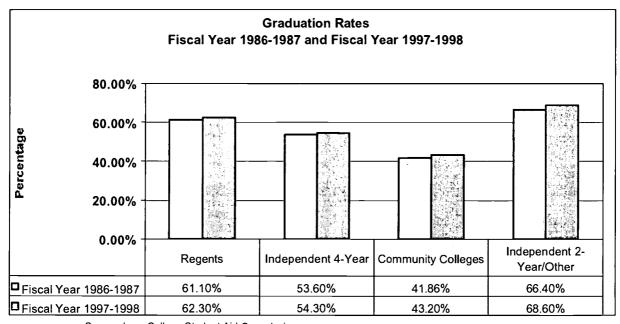

Graduation Rates

The institutions, as a part of their Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) report, submit graduation rates at Iowa Colleges and Universities annually. The data indicate that Iowa Community College graduation rates have increased from 41.86% Fiscal Year 1986-1987 to 43.20% Fiscal Year.

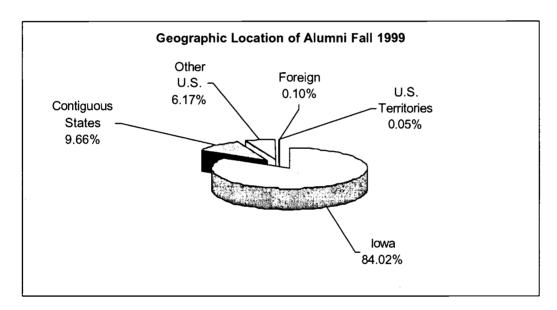
Students Entering Iowa Community Colleges with the General Education Development (GED) High School Award

Fiscal Year 2000-2001, unduplicated credit enrollment of 98,602 students included 4,629 (4.69%) individuals that identified a high school award type of GED. Students earning 24 or more credit hours (full-time students) totaled 27,507 and 1,189 (4.32%) of that total were individuals who had attained a GED prior to enrolling in Iowa Community Colleges, according to the Management Information Systems (MIS).

Geographic Location of Alumni

In Fall 1999, the lowa College Student Aid Commission, survey of lowa Institutions, reports a total number of community college alumni of 365,380 individuals. Total known addresses of 249,149, allow identification of geographic location of alumni.

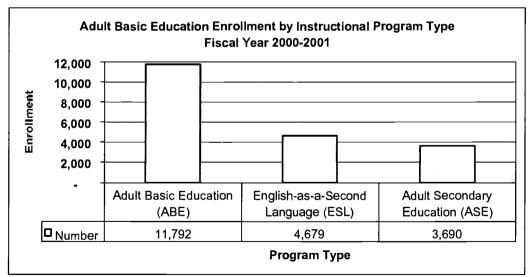
Section 10: Adult Basic Education (ABE)

lowa's Adult Basic Education (ABE) is delivered through lowa's system of 15 community colleges. Adult Basic Education is defined as a program of instruction designed for adults who lack competence in reading, writing, speaking, problem solving or computation at a level necessary to function in society on a job or in a family.

Highlights of the Program Year 2001 Adult Basic Education accomplishments:

- 75% of individuals enrolled in ABE programs whose goal was to get a job, got a job.
- 71% of individuals who enrolled in ABE programs whose goal was to keep their job, kept their job.
- The number of Basic Literacy Skills Certificates issued increased from 323 in the initial program year of 1998 to 3,214 in 2001. Since inception of the program in 1998, a total of 5,694 Basic Skills Literacy Certificates have been awarded.
- The number of community colleges that issue the Basic Literacy Skills Certificate increased from an initial 4 in 1998 to all 15 community colleges in 2001.
- Over the past ten years, the number of General Education Development (GED) diplomas issued range from 4,544 to 5,764.
- lowa's GED test pass rate has remained consistently high, ranging from 89% to 96% over the past ten years.
- Adult Basic Education enrollments progressively increased from 1966 through 1990 and have stabilized over the recent years; ABE enrollments are expected to hold steady or decrease through 2005.
- Community colleges have successfully implemented the national reporting system for Adult Basic Education and in Fiscal Year 2000-2001 established baseline data for measuring progress toward attainment of benchmark performance levels for the purpose of federal reporting and state eligibility for incentive grant. In Fiscal Year 2000-2001, students met or exceeded 11 of the 16 benchmarks levels.

Section 11: Developmental Education

Developmental education is a significant factor in the success of students in Iowa and across the nation and prepares the student for the rigor and level of academic skill necessary for completion of postsecondary classes.

Eighty percent of pre-World War II jobs were unskilled or semiskilled as compared to 20% today.

Eighty percent of new jobs will require some post secondary education.

- Across the country, increased numbers of under-prepared or unprepared students enter postsecondary education to acquire these skills and to obtain advanced degrees necessary to obtain high skill/high wage jobs.
- Students often find their passage to higher education through the doors of their community college.
- National research (McCabe, 2000) concludes that approximately 40% of the nation's community college students and 70% of urban area students qualify through testing for developmental education
- According to McCabe, students who participate in developmental education succeed as well as non-developmental students in the next sequence of classes and their retention in subsequent classes is better than non-developmental education students.

Developmental Education, as defined by National Association of Development Education (NADE), is a comprehensive process, which focuses on intellectual social and emotional growth, and development of all students. Developmental education includes but is not limited to tutoring, personal and career counseling, academic advisement, and course work.

Developmental Education Goals:

- To preserve and make possible educational opportunity for each postsecondary learner.
- 2. To develop in each learner the skills and attitudes necessary for the attainment of academic, career, and life goals.
- To ensure proper placement by assessing each learner's level of preparedness for college coursework.
- To maintain academic standards by developmental education is a significant factor in the success of these community college students in Iowa and across the nation.
- 5. To enhance the retention of students.
- 6. To promote the continued development and application of cognitive and affective learning theory.

The lowa Department of Education conducted a survey in Fall 2001 of developmental education services available to lowa Community College students. The department collected statewide information about assessment tests, numbers of entering students who take assessment tests, mandatory placement, test retakes, academic probation and developmental education policies, procedures and organizational structure.

 Fourteen of the fifteen lowa Community Colleges responded to the survey.

Assessment Tests

Assessment Tests Utilized by Iowa Community Colleges

Community colleges use a variety of assessment tests.

The most commonly used assessment tests used are the Compass and the Asset.

Additional tests used are the SAT, ACT, and the Nelson Denny/Mechanical Reasoning Test.

Generally, the ACT or SAT are accepted and with a high score, additional testing is not required.

- · Length of time out of school
- High school courses
- Application of math, reading, and writing skills in the interim since high school
- Student maturity level
- Test anxiety/Self-esteem
- Score established at the college for successful passage (cut-off score)
- Program for which the student is applying

Assessment Test Scores are used for:

- · Placement in developmental education courses
- Determination of class placement in specific math or English classes
- "Recommendations" for class placement
- Faculty use to recognize potential learning problems

Approximately 1,118,350.75 contact hours (reported by 11 of 14 participating colleges) and approximately 28,450 students (reported by 12 of 14 participating colleges) were served in community college learning and student centers.

The 14 colleges replying to the survey reported that, of the entering students taking college assessment tests, the following were placed in developmental education due to low scores:

- Over 40% in math
- Over 20% in reading
- Over 20% in writing



Impact of Fiscal Reductions

State budget cuts of 2001 impacted developmental education services at lowa Community Colleges. Survey responses indicate student assistance centers and developmental education will be impacted by budget cuts, but are not limited to the following:

Section 12: Economic Development

Training and retraining programs delivered by Iowa Community Colleges, monitored by the Iowa Department of Economic Development, and reported on the Management Information System (MIS) for Fiscal Year 2000-2001, are separated into four areas. The areas include Iowa Industrial New Jobs Training Programs (260E), Iowa Jobs Training Programs (260F), Accelerated Career Education - ACE (260G), and Apprenticeship. Community college reports are based on fiscal year, while economic development program timeframes may be up to 10 years.

Three community colleges did not report 260E hours for Fiscal Year 2000-2001 on the MIS. The number of students is unduplicated. Definitions for programs are from the lowa Department of Economic Development (IDED).

Section 13: Human Resources

Community College Employees

Employees of Iowa Community Colleges, as reported on the Management Information System (MIS) for Fiscal Year 2000-2001, total 13,424, which includes Administrative, Instructional, Professional, Secretarial & Clerical, and Service. Some employees are included in more than one reporting category. Therefore, the total number of individuals working at community colleges is 11,774 and 1,650 less than the number of positions. The Management Information Systems (MIS) data does not include employees teaching only non-credit courses for community colleges.

Employee Positions

Fiscal Year 2000-2001 reports Full-Time positions of 5,337 (39.75%), Part-Time 3,076 (22.92%), Temporary/Seasonal 905 (6.75%), and Adjunct 4,106 (30.58%). Of the total 13,424 positions, Administrative total 133 (0.99%), Instructional 6,814 (50.76%), Professional 2,458 (18.31%), Secretarial & Clerical 2,419 (18.02%), and Service 1,600 (11.92%). Total positions are higher than the number of employees due to the possibility of individuals working in more than one position at a college. Positions may be a combination of Full-Time, Part-Time, Temporary/Seasonal, and/or Adjunct.

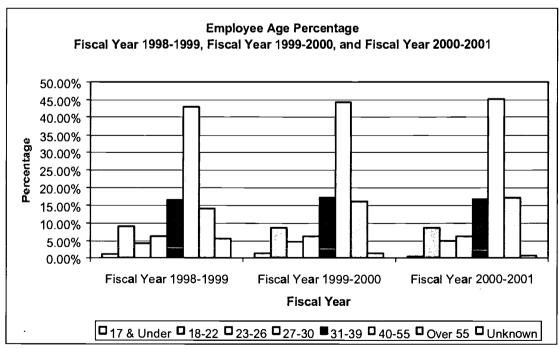

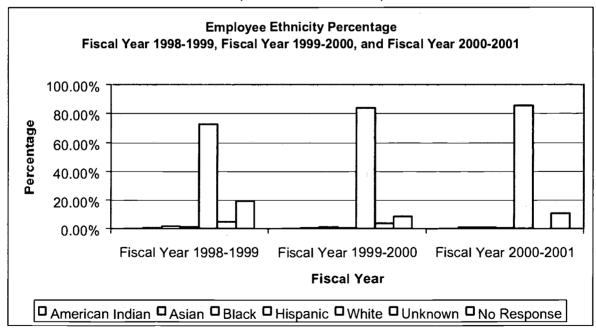

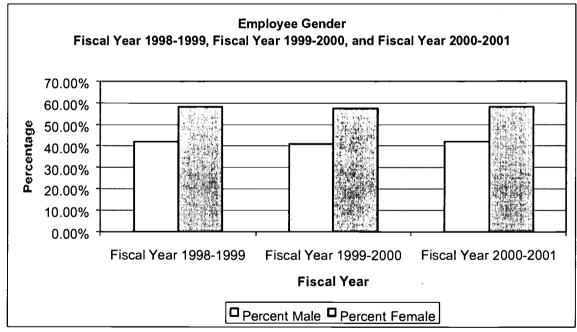

Salaries Full-Time Instructional

Fiscal Year 2000-2001 is the first year the Management Information System (MIS) is reporting Salaries. Average base salary for 1,998 Full-Time Instructional employees reported by community colleges is \$34,695 for Fiscal Year 2000-2001. Iowa Community College base salary is a 9 month teaching contract. In addition to the Management Information System (MIS), there are a number of other state and federal reports that publish faculty salaries; variances across these reports are due to differences in factors (i.e., definitions, classification systems, and contract periods).

Expenditures by Category include:

- Salaries all salaries paid by the community college including Administrative, Instructional, Professional, Secretarial & Clerical, and Service staff. Includes other payroll costs such as fringe benefits and worker's compensation insurance.
- 2. Services –items such as professional fees, memberships, publications, rental of materials, buildings, and equipment, and insurance.
- 3. Materials, Supplies, and Travel expenses such as materials and supplies, periodicals, vehicle materials and supplies, and travel expenses.
- 4. Current Expenses items such as purchase for resale, payment on debt principal, student compensation, and transfers.
- 5. Capital Outlay items such as furniture, machinery, and equipment, lease purchase equipment, vehicles, land, buildings and fixed equipment, and other structures and improvements.

- Arts & Science expenditures as a percentage of total expenditures increased from 20.71% in Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to 21.28% in Fiscal Year 2000-2001.
- Career/Vocational Technical expenditures as a percentage of total expenditures increased from 24.95% in Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to 25.26% in Fiscal Year 2000-2001.

Expenditures by Function include:

- 1. Arts & Science all administrative and instructional organizational units of the community college that provide instruction in the area of College Parallel and College Transfer (Parallel)/Career Option.
- 2. Career/Vocational Technical all organizational units designed to provide vocational, technical, and semi-professional training.



Expenditures by Function, include Continued

- Adult Education all organizational units designed to provide services, courses, and programs intended mainly for part-time students who are not a part of one of the instructional divisions of Arts & Science or Career/Vocational Technical Functions. Some examples include Adult Basic Education, High School Completion, and Short-Term Preparatory.
- 4. Cooperative Programs or Services all organizational units designed to provide instruction for Secondary Joint Effort activities and all activities concerning Chapter 260E Industrial New Jobs Training and Chapter 260F Jobs Training.
- 5. Administration all expenditures of the Community College Board of Trustees, the CEO, and business office, which serves the entire community college.
- Student Services all organizational units, which are primarily concerned with providing services for students.
- 7. Learning Resources all organizational units, which provide for storage, distribution, and use of educational materials throughout the entire community college.
- 8. Physical Plant all organizational units, which are responsible for the operation and maintenance of the community college's physical facilities.
- 9. General Institution all other expenditures except those included in the above functions. Some examples include institutional development, data processing, general printing, communication, alumni affairs, early retirement, and telecommunications.

Arts & Science expenditures increased 563% from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 1999-2000, and 6.03% from Fiscal Year 1999-2000 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001. Career/Vocational Technical expenditures increased 6.12% from Fiscal Year 1998-1999 to Fiscal Year 1999-2000, and 3.96% from Fiscal Year 1999-2000 to Fiscal Year 2000-2001.

Surrounding State Comparison

Table 55 shows Local Support for lowa and surrounding states for Fiscal Year 1998-1999 as shown in the Education Commission of the States publication, *State Funding for Community Colleges: A 50-State Survey.* In Fiscal Year 1998-1999, Iowa ranked 28th in the nation for percent of revenue collected via Local Support. Of the seven surrounding states (as shown in Table 55), Iowa ranked 6th in percentage of Local Support. Wisconsin ranked 1st in the surrounding states for Local Support with 53.00% of total revenues collected being Local Support. As Table 56 indicates during this same time period, Iowa ranked 4th in the nation for the percentage of revenues obtained through the collection of Tuition & Fees. Wisconsin ranked 32nd in the nation and 7th in the surrounding states for Tuition & Fees Revenue.

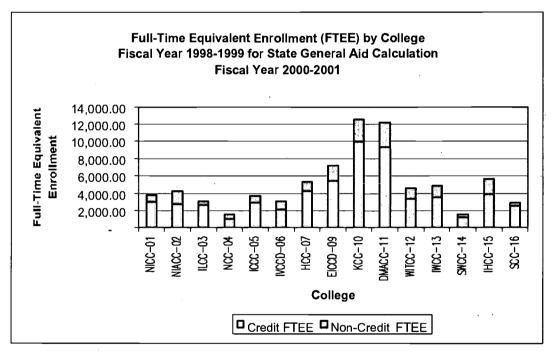

Full-Time Equivalent Enrollment (FTEE)

The Full-Time Equivalent Enrollment (FTEE) calculation is utilized when determining State General Aid. Due to timing of the calculation to meet Iowa Legislative deadlines, the enrollment used to calculate State General Aid is two years behind the year of the aid (i.e., Fiscal Year 2000-2001 enrollments are used to calculate Fiscal Year 2002-2003 State General Aid). Therefore, the Fiscal Year 1998-1999 FTEE was utilized in calculating Fiscal Year 2000-2001 State General Aid. Twenty-four (24) credit semester hours equals one FTEE, while 600 non-credit contact hours equals one FTEE.

State General Aid Appropriations

The appropriations request consists of two components, the appropriations base and the new State General Aid. Both are driven by the current and projected costs of operations. The appropriations request recommendation seeks: 1) a rolling appropriation base equal to the previous year's appropriation 2) an increase in State General Aid equal to 75 percent of the adjusted general operating fund (adjustments approved in the Community College Funding Report submitted to the Legislature January 1998) and multiplied by the allowable growth factor for K-12 schools, as established by the lowa General Assembly.

The distribution of State General Aid is prepared as follows:

1. Base Funding – The base funding for a fiscal year shall be equal to the amount each community college received as an allocation from appropriations made from the general fund of the state in the most recent fiscal year.



The distribution of State General Aid is prepared as follows, Continued:

- 2. Distribution for Inflation First priority shall be to give each college an increase based upon inflation. The inflation increase shall not be less than 2 percent. However, the inflation increase shall be equal to the national inflation rate, if it exceeds 2 percent, if the amount of state aid appropriated is equal to or greater than the national inflation rate.
- 3. Distribution Based on Proportional Share of Enrollment The balance of the growth in state aid appropriations, once the inflation increase has been satisfied, shall be distributed based on each college's proportional share of enrollment. However, a minimum of one percent of the total growth shall be distributed in this manner.
- 4. If the total appropriation made by the general assembly is less than 2 percent growth, the entire increase shall be distributed as inflation.

The Fiscal Year 2001-2002 State General Aid appropriation from the Iowa General Assembly for the 15 Iowa Community Colleges totals \$142,722,759, a reduction from the previous fiscal year total of \$4,854,644 (3.29%). Effective with the November 15, 2001 State General Aid payment, there was an additional total reduction in State General Aid of \$5,137,079 (3.60%). The total reduction in State General Aid from Fiscal Year 2000-2001 to Fiscal Year 2001-2002 totaled \$9,991,723 (6.77%).

State General Aid Increase Compared to Community College Salary Increase

Though State General Aid and Salaries have both increased over the past three years state funding has not increased at the same rate of expenditures. The rate Salaries expenditures has increased was higher than the rate State General Aid increased. In Fiscal Year 1998-1999, Salaries increased 5.54% with State General Aid increasing only 3.66%. See Table 58 for a comparison of Salaries and State General Aid.

State Funding for Iowa Students

Table 59 presents state funding per student at community colleges, state universities, and private colleges in lowa. For Fiscal Year 2000-2001, state funding per community college student totaled \$2,391, a decrease of \$248 (9.4%) from Fiscal Year 1999-2000; state funding per state universities equals \$10,752, and private colleges is \$3,307.

Section 15: Tuition and Fees

Costs to Students

There is a direct relationship between state support to lowa Community Colleges and the cost of Tuition & Fees charged to the student. As the level of State Support decreases, the charge to the student increases. Over the past several years, State Support has decreased from 49.51% of total revenues in Fiscal Year 1979-1980 to 45.50% of total revenues in Fiscal Year 2000-2001. During this same time period, Tuition & Fees increased from 24.39% of total revenues in Fiscal Year 1979-1980 to 39.00% of total revenues in Fiscal Year 2000-2001 (Source: Table 6: General Operating Fund Revenues by Source as a Percentage of Total Revenues, 2001-2002 Academic Year, Iowa Community Colleges, Tuition and Fees Report, included in Appendix I-1).

Fees at lowa Community Colleges range from no separate fee to a substantial portion of the cost of enrollment. In Academic Year 2001-2001, fees ranged from 0.00% of the Tuition & Fees charged up to 22.92% of the total charges for a 15-hour semester (\$660.00 in fees from a total tuition and fees charge of \$2,880.00).

Academic Year 2001-2002 tuition increased 11.62% at lowa Community Colleges, while increasing only 7.23% at lowa Regent Universities, as presented in Table 60. Due to mid-year cuts in state appropriations, several community colleges instituted tuition increases effective mid year.

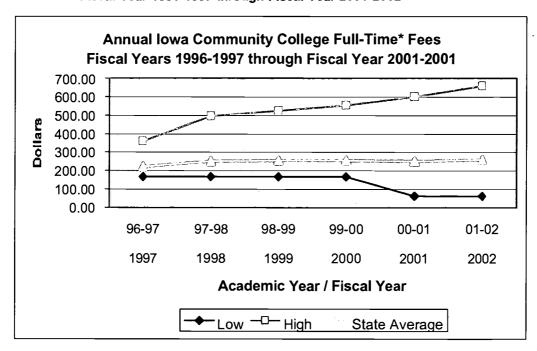

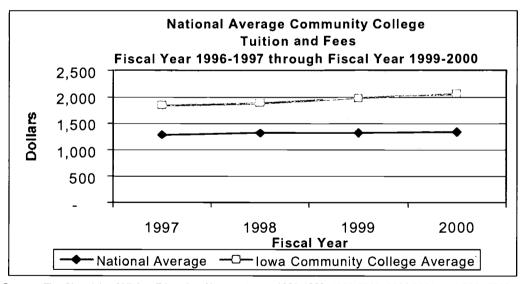

Surrounding States

As shown in Table 56 on page 49, lowa Tuition and Fees are the highest charged in surrounding states during Fiscal Year 1998-1999 per the *State Funding for Community Colleges: A 50-State Survey* published by the Education Commission of the States. This same survey ranks lowa 4th in the Nation for percentage of revenue received through tuition and fee charges.



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Section 16: Financial Aid

The Chronicle of Higher Education, Almanac Issue 2001-2002 reports that the State of Iowa spends a total of \$51,351,000 on student aid for need-based students and \$472,000 for non-need-based students. A summary of average student expenses at Iowa 2-Year institutions compared to National and Midwestern averages reveals higher levels of expenses in Iowa.

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The following report provides tuition and fee costs and related information. Some findings include the following:

- The average annual full-time lowa Community College tuition increased \$714 or 49.3% from fiscal year 1993 to fiscal year 2002.
- The average annual full-time Iowa Community College tuition for academic year 2001-2002 increased \$225 (11.6%) to \$2,162. (As set in the Fall 2001. Tuition may be changed by Board approval between fall and spring terms)
- The difference in annual tuition cost among Iowa Community Colleges decreased from \$626.00 in 1993 to \$270.00 in 2001. In Fiscal Year 2002 the difference between Iowa Community Colleges increased to \$360.00.
- In 1980, tuition and fees generated 24.4% of the total operating funds of lowa Community Colleges. In fiscal year 2001, 39.0% of the total operating funds of lowa Community Colleges was generated through tuition and fees.
- The Chronicle of Higher Education Almanac Issue 2001-2002 cites Iowa Community College average tuition at 54% above the national average.
- lowa ranks 4th in tuition when compared to the surrounding states of South Dakota, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Illinois, Missouri, Nebraska, and Kansas.
- In fiscal year 2000, lowa Community Colleges collected \$120.8 million from tuition and fees, which represents 38.74% of the general operating funds. According to the *Tuition Policy of the Board of Regents Report* prepared by the Legislative Fiscal Bureau, in the same year the regent institutions collected \$246.1 million from tuition and fees, representing 30.00% of general university funding.
- The average community college semester hour tuition rate in Fall 2001 is \$72.05. The increase in Fall 2001 semester hour tuition ranges from 8.06% to 17.46%; the state average rate of increase in community college semester tuition in the Fall 2001 is 11.57% over Fall 2000.
- Fees can be a substantial part of the cost at a community college. The percentage of total

Iowa Community College Tuition and Fees 2001-2002 Academic year

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Table 1 demonstrates how the average annual tuition for Iowa Community Colleges continues to become more uniform across the state. Iowa code limits the total tuition for Iowa residents attending community colleges so as not to exceed the lowest tuition rate per semester charged by a regent institution for a full-time resident student.

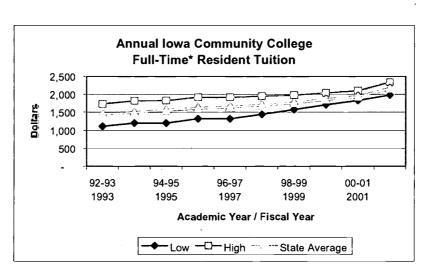
- Since 1993, the difference from the highest annual tuition to lowest annual tuition has decreased from \$626.00 in fiscal year 1993, to \$360.00 in fiscal year 2002.
- Over this period of time, the community college with the highest annual tuition increased \$604.00 or 38.4% while the lowest annual tuition increased \$870.00 or 78.4%.
- The total increase in annual full-time average tuition over the time period from 1993-2002 is \$714.00 or 49.3%.

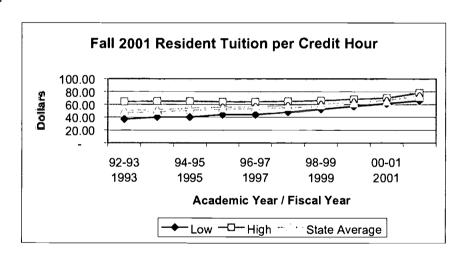

- In Fall 2001, the average per credit hour tuition is \$72.05.

The low fee charged does not consider those colleges who do not charge separate fees. The purpose of fees charged varies from college to college. These fees are only basic fees charged and do not include any program specific fees that may be charged. See Page 15 for a detailed listing of fees charged by college.

- Over the past six years, the average per credit hour fee rate has increased \$37.85.
- In Fall 2001, the average per credit hour fees is \$260.52.

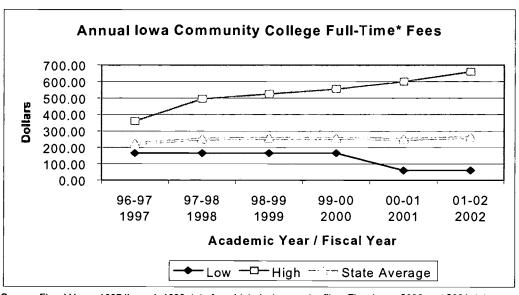

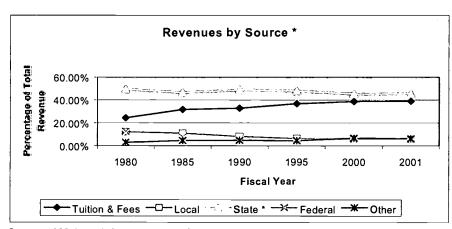

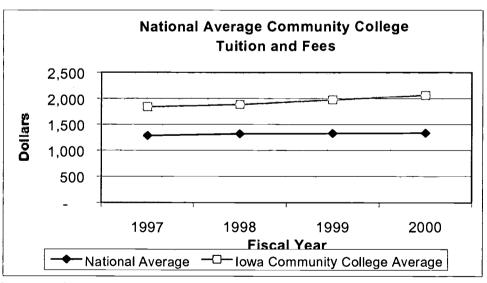
- From 1996-97 to 1999-00, lowa's tuition increased 11.96% while the national average increased 4.13%.

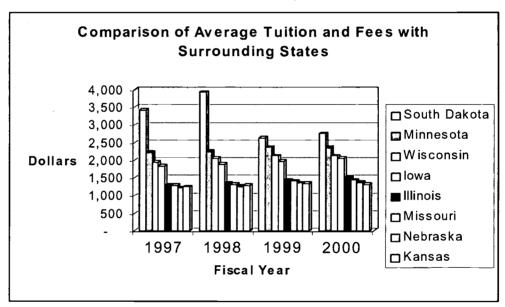

Tables 9, 10, and 11 provide a comparison of the lowa Community College average annual full-time resident tuition rate to the average tuition rate of lowa Regent institutions.

- The lowa Regent institutions increased tuition between 3-5% annually from 1993 through 2001. In 2002, the average tuition increased 7.2%.
- Iowa Community Colleges increased tuition between 3-5% annually from 1993 through 2001. In 2002, the average tuition increased 11.6%.
- Iowa Community College tuition increased a total of 49.3% between fiscal year 1993 and fiscal year 2002 compared to 49.2% increase for the regent institutions in the same period of time.
- In 2001-2002, the Regent institutions capped their full-time resident tuition at the three universities at \$3,116.
- Three (3) Iowa Community Colleges have tuition caps. Iowa Community College caps range from 19-21 credits. (Students are not charged the per credit hour costs for taking courses above the cap)

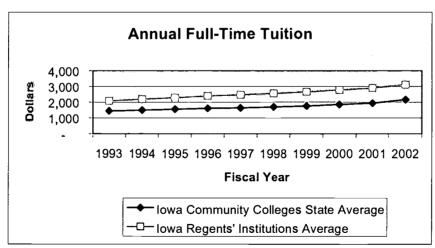

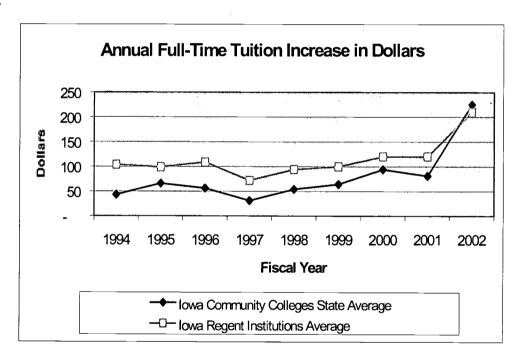

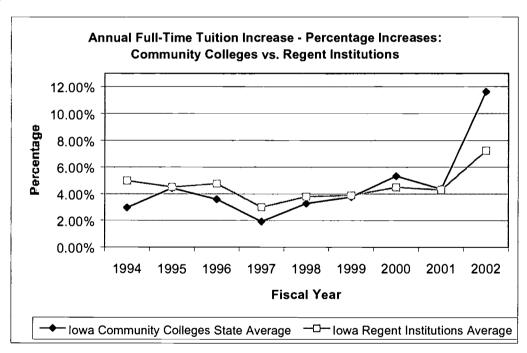
