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ABSTRACT

This Kids Count data book examines statewide trends in the well-being of Indiana's children. The statistical portrait is based on indicators in 10 general areas: (1) child and family demographics; (2) economic well-being; (3) poverty; (4) child safety; (5) child abuse and neglect; (6) education; (7) child health; (8) mortality; (9) high risk behavior; and (10) juvenile justice. The first part of the data book summarizes findings in the areas listed above. The data indicate an increase in single parent households, cases of child abuse, and infant mortality. The data also indicate a decrease in teen birth rates, high school graduation rates, cigarette smoking, alcohol consumption, marijuana use, juvenile arrest rates, and juvenile delinquency cases. The second section of the data book includes indicator definitions and data sources. The remainder and bulk of the data book contains state and county profiles for the indicators, with comparison data for the current year and a baseline year. (SD)

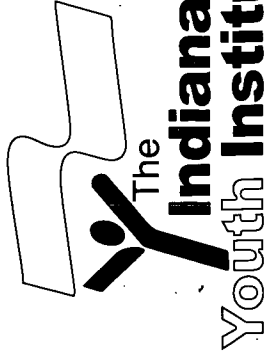

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Executive Director's Message

In the face of horrific tragedy on September 11 - a day of death and despair - life started all over again.

Children who woke up that morning and went to school returned home to a different world. Same house. Different world. And life was starting all over again.

To say that "virtue" or "good" can be found in the ashes of the attack on America can dangerously imply that it's a good thing the attack happened. This, of course, is not true. A nation now longs for the relative tranquility that existed when they went to bed on September 10.

But search for good we must. After all, life has started all over again.

Encouraging evidence recently was reported in a national news story quoting therapists, mimisters, employers, and psychologists, all of whom have noticed a distinct re-shuffling of American priorities following September 11. Career, wealth and material gain have been knocked off their perch, replaced by renewed devotion to faith, family, and community.

One corporate executive from Chicago told USA Today, "We're seeing it big time. The event de-emphasized what most people value, the money and the luxuries. People are questioning what's really important." A Florida state senator added, "This has encouraged me to think about the time I devote to my political life, my work life, my kids and my family. You realize life is very fragile."

A Cleveland rabbi summarized these sentiments: "This has people talking about the most basic issues in their lives. It's a deepening of a reflection of what life is all about. People think, 'What do I want to accomplish? What do I want to leave behind?'"

This cathartic moment bodes well for the well-being of children and youth. Focusing on "the most basic issues in (our) lives" and on "what's really important" can only lead to more adults actively and passionately involved in the lives of more kids. The multiplication of these caring relationships has great potential to transform the world

- a transformation even greater than the painful changes forced on us by terrorism.

Yes, indeed. Despite death and destruction, life itself has started all over again.

This reformation of personal priorities sets the context for this year's KIDS COUNT in Indiana Data Book. A renewed emphasis on personal relationships with children, combined with the very public displays of charity, compassion, and heroism we've recently witnessed across our nation, definitively demonstrate that ample human and financial resources exist to promote healthy youth development and resolve the challenges faced by children and youth.

The highlights from this year's data book include:

According to the 2000 Census, 27.6% of Hoosier family households are headed by single parents, up from 22.1% in 1990.

Indiana's teen birth rate is 51.3 per 1,000 females ages 15-19, down from 53.2 the previous year, yet higher than the national rate of 49.6.

Indiana's child poverty rate is lower than the national rate, but Indiana's child poverty rate has remained steady at 14% while the nation's child poverty rate has decreased to 17%.

The number of substantiated cases of child abuse in Indiana increased by 15.2%, while the substantiated cases of child neglect rose by 19.4%.

The Indiana Department of Education reports a high school graduation rate for the Class of 2000 of 89%, down from 89.5% the previous year. However, only 68.3% of the students who started as high school freshmen in 1996 graduated in the Spring of 2000.

Indiana's infant mortality rate (death before the child's first birthday) rose from 75 per 1,000 infants in 1998 to 78 deaths in 1999. This increase has occurred while the national rate has remained at 72 deaths per thousand infants.

While significant percentages of Indiana youth are smoking cigarettes, those percentages are declining. For example, the percentage among high school seniors over the last four years has declined from 41.6% to 35.1%. Similarly, the percentage among 8th graders over the last five years has dropped from 27.1% to 16.1%.

The consumption of alcohol by Indiana youth also has declined at all grade levels. For example, over the last decade the percentage for 8th graders has dropped from 33.6% to 24.7%, and the percentage for 10th graders has declined from 50.7% to 39.1%.

The rate of marijuana use among Indiana teens has declined recently, but remains higher than a decade ago. In 2001, 23.5% of high school seniors report smoking marijuana, down from 25.4% in 1996, but higher than the 14.4% reported in 1992.

In criminal justice, Indiana's estimated juvenile arrest rates declined from the previous year and are lower than national averages. For example, our state's estimated juvenile arrest rate for violent crimes of 304 per 100,000 youth is lower than the national rate of 394 per 100,000. For property crimes, Indiana's estimated rate of 1,696 arrests per 100,000 juveniles trailed the national rate of 2,130 per 100,000.

The number of juvenile delinquency cases in the Hoosier State dropped by 14.4%, the third straight year the number of cases has declined.

The opportunities and challenges presented by these data are clear. A renewed focus on "what's really important" offers renewed hope in an era when life itself is starting all over again.

The mark of a great person lies not only in their knowledge of a selected field, but also in their quest for exploring new areas and developing new interests.

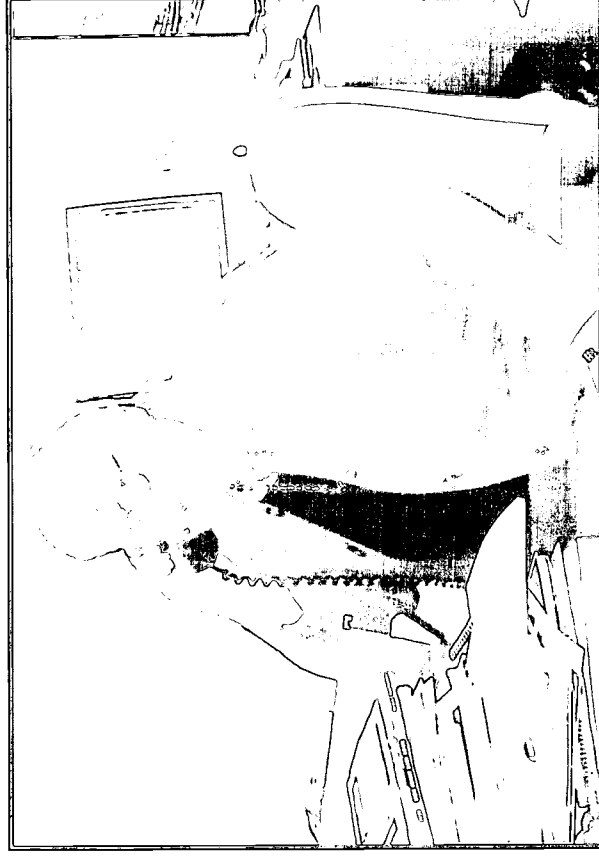

Using the Kids Count Data Book

The 2001 Kids Count in Indiana Data Book is the eighth in a series of annual sourcebooks. This report brings together a great deal of information about Indiana's youngest citizens and their families. The data come from many sources and in many forms; altogether, they provide a picture of how well Indiana's young people and their families are faring.

Frequently Asked Questions

Where do the data come from?

The Indiana Youth Institute (IYI) does not generate the statistical information contained in the data book. Most of the numbers are supplied by Indiana state agencies such as the Indiana State Department of Health, the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration, the Indiana Department of Correction, and the Indiana Department of Workforce Development that collect the information for administrative purposes. Some of the numbers come from federal sources such as the U.S. Census Bureau, the FBI, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and the U.S. Department of Education. Also included is information from studies conducted by academic institutions and research organizations such as the Hudson Institute, Indiana Prevention Resource Center, the Indiana Business Research Center, and the Indiana Economic Development Council. For information about a specific indicator, consult the "Definitions and Data Sources" section.

Are the numbers accurate?

Every effort is made to make sure that the numbers in the data book are accurate. Errors do creep in, however. Some errors may be made when the information is collected, others when it is transferred to an electronic database and still others when it is reported. When IYI recognizes that an error has been made in the book, an "errata notification" is published. Where there are known problems with an indicator, we try to point them

out. Further information can be found in the endnotes and in the "Definitions and Data Sources" section.

Many indicators are expressed in the form of rates, calculated either directly on 1990 and 2000 census population data or on annual population estimates created by the U.S. Census Bureau. The new census data will provide the statistical base for the first decade of the 21st century.

Why are some of the numbers so old?

This data book contains the most current information available at press time. State agencies, the sources for most of the data, must collect information from all 92 counties and compile it into a single data set for the state as a whole. This can be a daunting task, particularly in those county-level agencies that still do not have computer systems available. Periodically, IYI will update the on-line Kids Count Database on IYI's Web site when updated information becomes available. It may also be possible to obtain more recent information from state agencies through the Access Indiana Information Network, the state's official Web site (www.state.in.us), or directly from the county offices that collect the information for the state.

State and County Profiles

The profiles for Indiana and each of the 92 counties contain more than 40 indicators related to the well-being of Hoosier young people. Most of the indicators appear year after year. They have been chosen because:

- ▢ The data come from a reliable source;
- ▢ The data are available for the state and each county;
- ▢ The data are gathered in the same way each year and will probably be available in the future, and

- ▢ Data book users have told us this is the information they need.

The information provided in the data book allows you to ask such questions as:

- ▢ How is my county doing overall?
- ▢ How do the most current numbers compare with the 1990 figures?
- ▢ What indicators appear to be moving in a positive direction? In a negative direction?
- ▢ How does my county compare with the state as a whole?
- ▢ How does my county compare with neighboring counties or with counties of similar size?

The answers to such questions can be helpful in discussing what research, planning, and action are necessary to improve the well-being of the young people in your county.

Some Cautions For Interpreting Data

We offer the following precautions for using the information in this data book.

Understand the indicator: Understand what is being measured and how the information is presented. Some figures represent actual numbers while others are given as rates or percentages. **Rates and percentages** permit comparisons from one group or county to another, or for different years in the same group or county. **"Percent change"** indicates how much change has occurred between two points in time. Percent change is calculated using the formula:

$$\frac{\text{Value at Time 2} - \text{Value at Time 1}}{\text{Value at Time 1}} \times 100 = \text{Percent Change}$$

Beware of small numbers: Indiana's counties vary greatly in size and composition. What may be a fairly regular event in one county may be a very rare event in another. There may also be greater variations from year to year in some counties than in others. In general, the smaller the county the smaller the number of some events that can be expected to occur. For example: If two child deaths occur in County X in 1997, but three deaths occur the following year (1998), there will be a 50% rise in child deaths between 1997 and 1998. If only one death occurs in 1999, there will be a 67% decrease in child deaths between 1998 and 1999. Using the above formula, the calculations would be as follows:

% change between 1998 (Time 2) and 1997 (Time 1):

$$\frac{3 - 2}{2} \times 100 = \frac{1}{2} \times 100 = .5 \times 100 = 50\% \text{ increase}$$

% change between 1999 (Time 2) and 1998 (Time 1):

$$\frac{1 - 3}{3} \times 100 = \frac{-2}{3} \times 100 = -.67 \times 100 = -67\% \text{ decrease}$$

In the case of "rare events," longer trends rather than year-to-year differences are more useful as a gauge of whether progress is being made toward improving the well-being of your county's children.

Many indicators are related: Look at the patterns among indicators in your county. Unemployment rates and poverty are obviously related. Perhaps less obvious are the relationships among teen births, maternal smoking, low birthweight, and infant mortality. Talk with people in your community to help uncover more subtle links among the indicators. Share information with people from other counties; find out what they are doing to promote change.

Remember the limits and uses of data: Numerical data provide important information, but they are just one type of information. A number may reflect more or less accurately how many Hoosier children live below the poverty line, but a number cannot describe the day-to-day complexities for a family living in need. A

number can tell us how many Hoosier infants are born too soon or too small, but a number cannot express the anxieties of parents who watch their tiny children struggle for life. A number can tell us how many Hoosier children have completed high school, but a number cannot describe the efforts of families, teachers, and students themselves that brought them to this point, nor can a number express the pride in accomplishment that comes with the diploma. Numbers must be used with care, and their meaning must derive from what is actually happening in the lives of the people represented by the numbers.

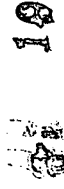

Indiana's Children and Their Families

Indiana's Population

From 1990 to 2000, Indiana's population increased 9.7% to 6,080,485. This increase reflects the combined effects of births, deaths, and migration into and out of the state. During this same period of time, the U.S. population increased 13.2%.¹ Indiana's population growth has not occurred evenly throughout the state. Eighty-one of Indiana's 92 counties experienced growth during the last 10 years, and 11 experienced slight declines in their populations.² Indiana's fastest growing counties include:

- ▢ Hamilton County, which grew 67.8% during the past decade, adding 73,804 residents.
- ▢ Hendricks County, which grew 37.5% during the past decade, adding 28,376 residents.
- ▢ Johnson County, which grew 30.8% during the past decade, adding 27,100 residents.

Indiana's population is expected to continue growing during the next 10 years. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates there will be over 6.3 million Hoosiers in 2010.³

Indiana's Children

The population of Hoosiers under the age of 18 increased by 8.1% during the past decade to a total of 1,574,396. In 1990, children made up 26.3% of Indiana's total population; in 2000, children represent 25.9% of the Hoosier state.⁴

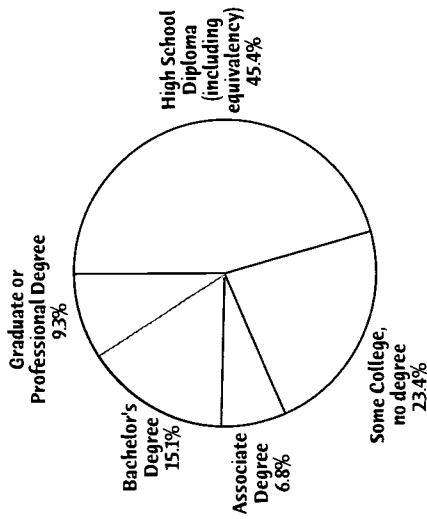
Figure 1. Percent Growth in Child Population by Race/Ethnicity, Indiana: 1990 to 2000

Indiana's child population continues to diversify, although at a slower pace than that of the rest of the nation. Hispanics are the fastest-growing ethnic group of children in the state, with a 108% increase in child population since 1990 (Figure 1). Although Hispanic children currently make up 4.8% of the total child population in Indiana, the growth of the Hispanic child population has been more dramatic in some counties. For example, in 2000, Hispanic children represented 16.4% of the child population in Lake County, 11.4% in Elkhart County, 10% in Clinton County, and 9.9% in Noble County.⁵

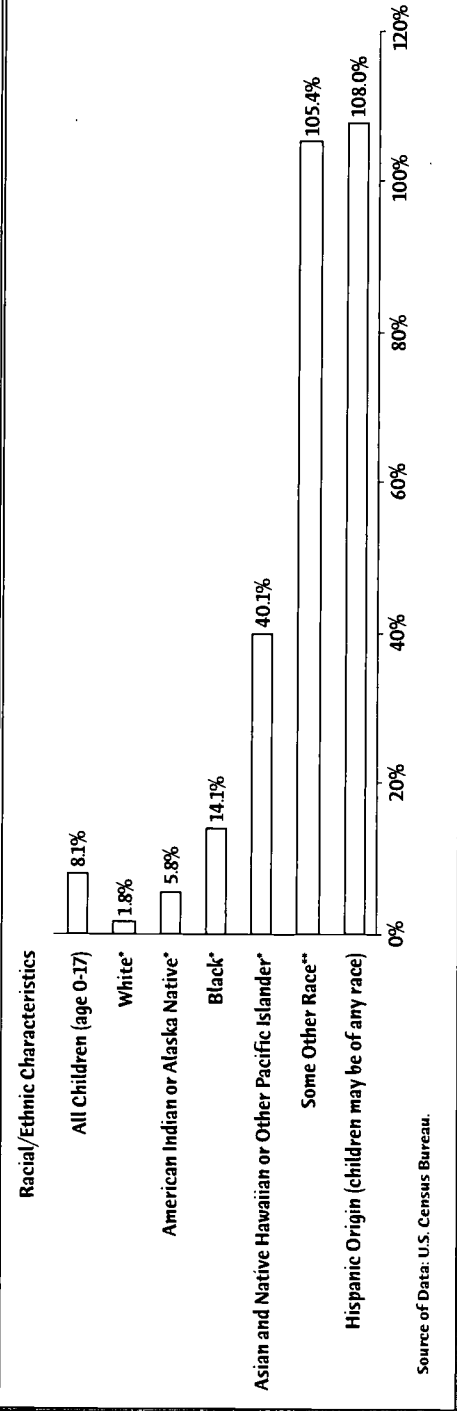
Place of Birth

Hoosiers are more likely to stay in their home state than other U.S. residents. In 2000, it was estimated that 72% of all Hoosiers had been born in the state of Indiana. In the United States as a whole, only 59.7% of the population currently live in the same state in which they were born. Just over 3% of Hoosiers were born outside the United States, compared with 11.2% of all Americans.⁶

Educational Attainment in Indiana

Among Hoosiers age 25 and over, 18.3% do not have a high school diploma (Figure 2). Of the remaining 3,104,485 Hoosier adults with high school diplomas or GEDs, 6.8% have an associate's degree, 15.1% have a baccalaureate degree, and 9.2% have a graduate or professional degree. These numbers are slightly lower than those of the nation as a whole. Among all Americans 25 and older with a high school diploma or GED, 7.9% have an associate's degree, 19.7% have a baccalaureate degree, and 11% have a graduate or professional degree.⁷

Marriage and Divorce in Indiana

In 2000, 58.3% of men and 54.4% of women age 15 and over were currently married in Indiana.⁸ Data from 1999 indicates that the average age for first marriages has increased since 1995. In 1999, the average age for first-time brides was 24.4, and the average age for first-time grooms was 26.3. In 1995, the average ages were 23.8 for brides and 25.7 for grooms. In Indiana, 48,373 marriages were

performed in 1999.⁹ This is more marriages than in 1998, but fewer than in 1995.

Data from the 2000 Census Supplementary Survey indicates that 10% of men and 11.3% of women were divorced in 2000.¹⁰ However, because Indiana is one of three states that does not compile statistical information about divorce, it is not known how many divorces are granted to Hoosiers each year or how many involve couples with children.

The only estimate of divorce trends in the state of Indiana is found in the Court Services Administration annual judicial report of domestic relations case filings. *Case filing data are not a substitute for actual divorce data* since they include instances of couples who withdraw from the process after filing, as well as other couples who may file more than once in a single year.

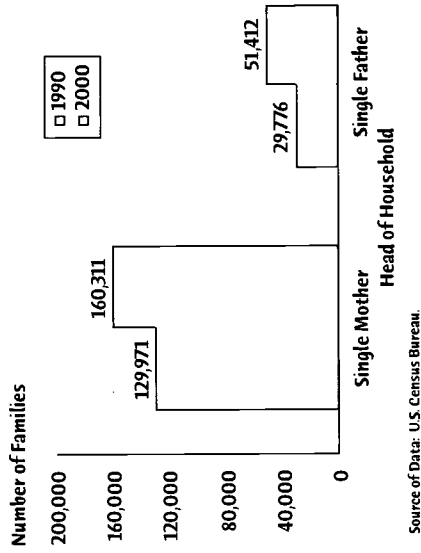
Since 1991, there has been an overall downward trend in divorce case filings in Indiana. In 2000, there were 39,144 cases filed in circuit, probate, and county courts. This number represents a 17% decrease since 1991 when 47,157 filings were recorded.¹¹

Single Parent Households¹²

Since 1990, the number of family households with their own children that are headed by a single parent in Indiana has increased 32.5% to 211,723. *Family households with their own children* are those that include sons or daughters by birth, stepchildren, or adopted children who are unmarried and under the age of 18. In 1990, 22.1% of family households with their own children were headed by single parents. Results from the 2000 Census indicate that 27.6% of Hoosier family households with their own children are now headed by single parents.

While most single parents are mothers, a growing number of fathers are now raising their children alone in Indiana. In 1990, the number of Hoosier families with their own children headed by a single mother was 129,971. By 2000, this figure had increased to 160,311, representing an increase of 23.3%. The number of family households with their own children headed by single fathers was 29,776 in 1990. In 2000, that figure rose 72.7% to a total of 51,412 families with their own children headed by single fathers (Figure 3).

Indiana's Workforce

Indiana's labor force picture still remained strong in mid-2001 but, as is true for the rest of the nation, the state is faced with increasing job loss and rising rates of unemployment. Figures for July 2001 show an estimated 3,156,100 Hoosiers, aged 16 and older able and available for work. The Department of Workforce Development noted that job loss has occurred in both the goods and service producing sectors of Indiana's economy in the past year.¹

For a majority of Hoosier children younger than age 18, all parents in the home are in the labor force:

➤ The Supplementary Survey (C2SS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau in 2000, examined the numbers of children who had all parents in their home in the labor force. The survey estimated that in Indiana 62.3% of children younger than age six had working parents, compared with 60.4% nationally. An estimated 67.9% of the state's children ages six through 17 had working parents, compared with 69.2% nationally.

Unemployment

The preliminary unemployment rate in Indiana was 4.1%, continuing an upward trend that began in September 2000. An estimated 128,800 Hoosiers were unemployed in July 2001, an increase of 17.7% from a year earlier. In July 2000, 3.5% of Indiana's labor force was unemployed. The July 2001 rate for Indiana remained below the national rate of 4.7%, sustaining trends of the 1990s. A smaller proportion of Indiana's labor force was unemployed in July 2001 than in the adjoining states of Illinois (5.4%), Ohio (4.4%), Kentucky (5.1%), and Michigan (5.3%). As in past years, there was wide variation in unemployment rates within Indiana.

➤ Orange County had the highest preliminary unemployment rate in July 2001—8.7%—followed by Greene (7.4%) and Fayette (7.0%) Counties.

➤ Hamilton County continued to have the lowest unemployment in the state (1.8%) in July 2001. Boone, Hendricks, and Decatur Counties all had rates of 2% or less.

Wages and Income

In 2000, incomes in the United States remained at the all-time high reached in 1999.² There are several ways of reporting incomes, and Table 1 presents four of the most frequently used: the average wage per job, per capita income, median household income, and median family income.³ However calculated, the figures collected in 2000 for 1999 income show that Indiana continues to lag behind the nation as a whole. While it is true that the cost of living in Indiana is somewhat lower than the U.S. as a whole, it is also true that the incomes for Hoosier households and families are frequently sustained by more than one wage earner and/or by wage earners who hold more than one job.

What it costs to raise a child

Since 1960, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has issued annual estimates of expenditures on children by U.S. families. The estimates are for raising children up through age 17—and do not include postsecondary education. In 1960, low-income families (with an average pre-tax income of \$23,800) spent an estimated \$121,230 per child (in 2000 dollars), while upper-income families (average pre-tax income of \$95,800) spent \$241,770. In 1960, a middle-income family (average pre-tax income of \$50,600) spent about \$146,780 (in year 2000 dollars) per child. In 2000, estimated expenditures per child had risen to \$165,630 for a middle-income family. The greatest increases in spending between 1960 and 2000 among middle-income families were for food (18% vs. 24%), child care and education (1% vs. 10%), and health care (4% vs. 7%). For children born in 2000, it is anticipated that expenditures will rise to \$171,460 for low-income families, and to \$233,530 and \$340,130 for middle- and upper-income families, respectively.⁴

Youth in the Labor Force

Typically, American youngsters begin working for pay outside their own homes during elementary school. For the first years, most of their work is sporadic, informal, and undertaken voluntarily. By middle school, however,

many students report they spend more time working. A recent study examined the work patterns of young people. Just under half of the participants in the study who had turned 12, but were younger than age 13 in 1995-97, reported a work activity. Of those who reported working, 56% did babysitting and 40% did yard work. By the time they had reached age 14, the legal age for work in nonagricultural industries (under both federal and state limits), their work had diversified and their work-time had increased.⁵

The work patterns of Hoosier students are similar, according to self-reports of work activity given in the Indiana 2001 Prevention Resource Center Survey.⁶ Fewer than half (48.3%) of the 6th-grade respondents reported no work activity for pay outside of the home. That proportion dropped steadily to 18.2% of 12th-graders who reported no work activity. Figure 1 shows that among the students who worked between one and 59 days while school was in session, patterns among boys and girls were similar. More boys than girls reported working 60 to 180 days of the school year in grades 6 through 10. In the upper two grades, more girls reported working between 60 and 180 days than did boys—49.6% vs. 46.8% in grade 11, and 55.8% vs. 51.4% in grade 12.

The overall figures are consistent with estimates of the employment of 16- through 19-year olds published annually by the U.S. Department of Labor. In Indiana, an estimated 50.8% of this age group was employed in 2000 (an estimated total of 146,000 teens), compared with 45.4% nationally. Youth unemployment rates in Indiana, as true for the nation as a whole, are higher than for the population of all ages in the workforce. The

estimated 2000 youth unemployment rate in Indiana was 11.1%, compared with 13.1% nationally. For both Indiana and the nation, youth unemployment declined slightly between 1999 and 2000 (from 12.4% in Indiana and from 13.9% in the U.S. as a whole).⁷

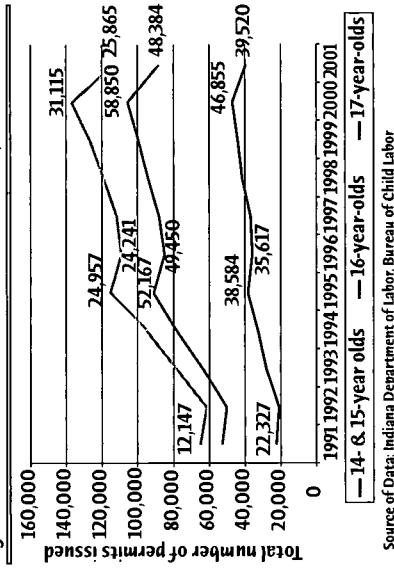
Minors wishing to work in Indiana must obtain a work permit (if they have not graduated from high school or received a General Educational Development (GED) diploma). Young workers are subject to restrictions on the types of jobs they may hold, work conditions, and the daily and weekly hours they may work. Work permits may be revoked for students who miss too many days of school or are not making satisfactory academic progress.⁸ These last aspects of the state's Child Labor Laws are variously enforced by different school corporations.

Youth employment is a bellwether for the economy in general: more youth are able to find jobs in good economic times than in bad. The general trend for

youth employment in Indiana was upward between 1991 and 2000. Between SFYs 2000 and 2001, however, there was a sharp drop, of 16.8%, in the number of work permits issued—from 136,820 to 113,769. Fourteen- and 15-year-olds had the biggest decline, and 17-year-olds the smallest.⁹ The loss of federal support for summer jobs programs also had an impact on the number of youths who were able to find employment.

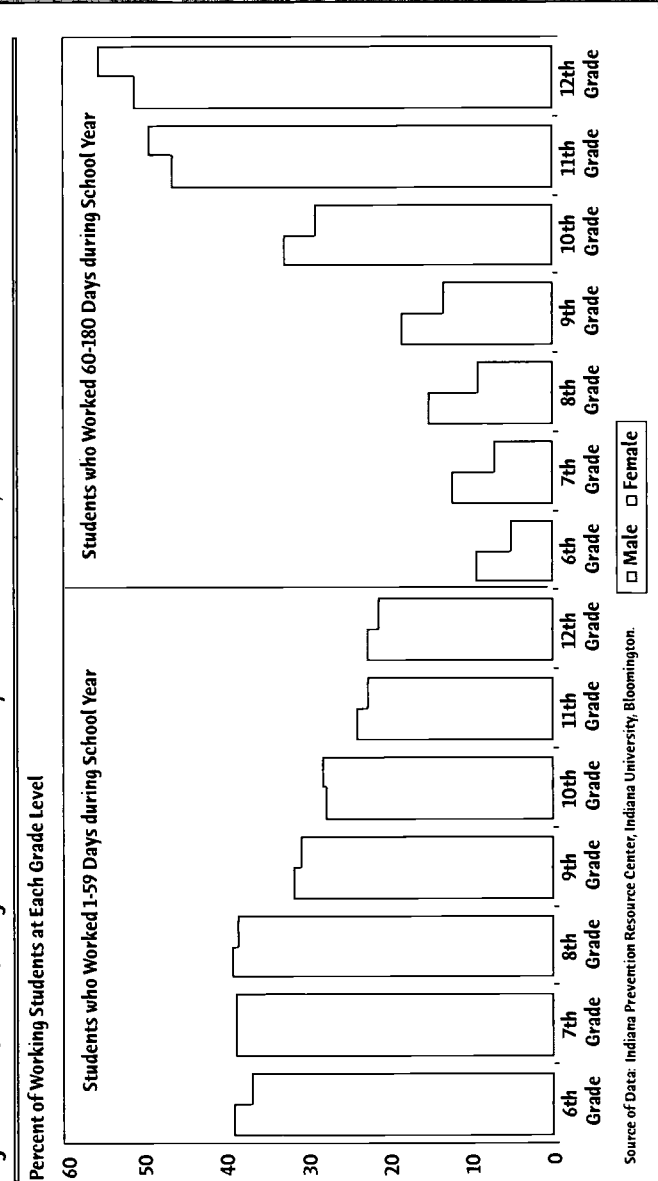
Figure 2: Work Permits Issued to Indiana Teens, SFYs 1991-2001

Families in Need

Poverty

Two statistics are used by the federal government to define poverty. Poverty thresholds are updated annually by the U.S. Census Bureau and are used mainly for statistical purposes such as calculating the number of Americans living in poverty each year. *Poverty guidelines*, published by the Department of Health and Human Services, are a simplified version of the poverty thresholds used for administrative purposes, such as determining financial eligibility for certain federal programs (TANF and food stamps, for example).¹

Income data for 1999 collected in the 2000 U.S. Census will not be released until 2002. Although the figures will be more accurate than other estimates, they will already be three years out of date – a problem in a rapidly changing economy. Between censuses, the U.S. Census Bureau uses several different models to estimate the number of Americans living in poverty; the estimates differ depending on the model used.

Between the decennial censuses, the annual Current Population Survey (CPS) conducted by the U.S. Census Bureau is used to estimate U.S. and state populations living below the poverty threshold. Figures for 1999

represent a three-year average of CPS data (1998-2000). Using this model, an estimated 8.2% of Hoosiers of all ages (compared with a national rate of 11.9%) were living in households with incomes below the poverty level.²

The Census Bureau also creates a series of Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE) to help the U.S. Department of Education distribute Title I funds. Figures based on 1998 income showed an estimated 14.1% of Hoosier children younger than age 18 (compared with 18.9% nationally) to be living in families with incomes below the poverty threshold.³ These figures include an estimated 4% of Indiana's children (compared with 8% of the nation's) living in extreme poverty—i.e., in households with incomes less than half of the poverty level. Table 1 contains SAIPE poverty estimates for income year 1998.

More current poverty estimates come from the U.S. Census Bureau's 2000 Supplementary Survey. These estimates, also presented in Table 1, show 14.3% of young Hoosiers younger than age 18 living in poverty, compared with 10.4% of the population of all ages.

Of the children younger than age five—the period when poverty has the greatest impact on healthy development—an estimated 16.5% of Hoosier children were living in poverty (compared with 19.7% of all U.S. children). The figures drop to 13.6% and 16.1% for children ages five through 17 in Indiana and the U.S., respectively.

Children have become the poorest age group in the nation. The 2000 Supplementary Survey estimated that children younger than age 18 represent about 27% of the population of both the U.S. and Indiana. Children, however, are nearly 36% of the individuals living below the poverty line in Indiana (and just over 35% in the U.S.).⁵ Recently released figures for the U.S. as a whole, based on the 2000 Current Population Survey, estimate that the U.S. child poverty rate was 16.2%, while the rate for the elderly (the poorest group before 1974) was 10.8%.⁶

We have presented several estimates of the numbers and proportions of the state's and nation's poor to demonstrate that poverty estimates are just that: estimates.

Table 2 summarizes the federal poverty thresholds for 2000, the poverty guidelines for 2000 and 2001, and the hourly wage required to reach each poverty income level in 2001.⁷

Low-income families

Although the percentage of Indiana's children living in families with incomes below the poverty level has declined since the early 1990s and remains below the percentage for all U.S. children, many of the once-poor (by federal standards) families have moved into the economic group designated as "low income." These families have household incomes ranging between 100% and 200% of the poverty level (between \$17,650 and \$35,300 for a family of four in 2001).

The federal poverty level does not represent "income that will meet the basic day-to-day needs of family living." Considerably more resources are needed if families are to live without sacrificing basic necessities. Two, more realistic estimates of the earned income needed to meet the bare requirements of living in Indiana are available. Wider Opportunities for Women, in partnership with the Indiana Coalition on Housing and Homeless Issues, created a "Self-Sufficiency Standard" for Indiana counties in 1998, and the Indiana Economic Development Council has developed "Basic Needs Budgets" for Hoosier families in 2000.

The Self-Sufficiency Standard calculated income needed to provide housing, food, health care, child care, as well as cover transportation, miscellaneous expenses and taxes, taking into account the child care tax credit and the Earned Income Tax Credit. Estimates varied by place and family composition, and ranged between an estimated \$22,400 (Orange County) and \$29,400 (Marion County) for families of three (one adult, two children), and between \$28,800 and \$34,600 for

families of four (two adults, two children).⁸ These figures were well above the poverty guidelines for 1998: \$13,650 for a family of three and \$16,450 for a family of four, and in urban counties, even exceeded the upper limit of the "low-income" designation of 200% of the poverty guideline.⁹

The Indiana Economic Development Council's "Basic Needs Budgets" includes food, housing (assumes families are renting), health care, child care, transportation, personal and household items, and taxes. This budget also takes into account the earned income and child care tax credits. Estimates vary by the size of the family and where in Indiana they are living. The Basic Needs Budget was estimated at \$26,532 for a family of three (one adult, two children) living in a rural area. The same family living in an urban area would require \$31,214. A rural family of four (two working adults, two children) would require \$31,380 for a Basic Needs Budget, while the same family living in an urban area would need \$34,613 to meet their basic needs.¹⁰ For the rural families, the Basic Needs Budgets would have been about 185% of the federal poverty guidelines in 2000; for the urban families, the Basic Needs Budgets would have exceeded 200% of the federal poverty guidelines.

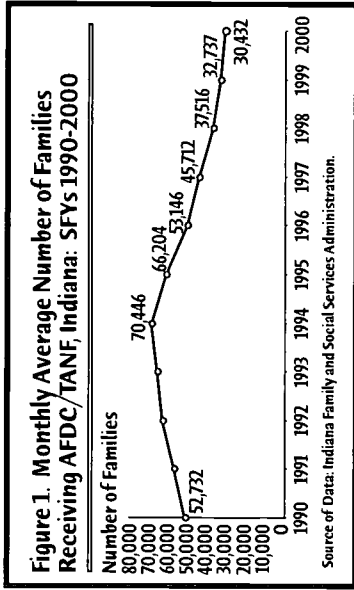

Programs to Assist Poor Families

Welfare reform efforts in Indiana place an emphasis on "work first" and "personal responsibility," by replacing cash assistance with transitional services that help people gain employment. Eligibility criteria for these programs are tied to income as a percentage of the federal poverty guidelines. Since 1994, the number of Indiana families receiving public assistance has fallen dramatically (Figure 1).



Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF)

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) replaced AFDC (Aid to Families with Dependent Children) in 1997. The TANF program provides cash assistance to families with children younger than age 18 who are deprived of financial support by a parent due to death, absence from the home, unemployment, physical

or mental incapacity. Financial eligibility for TANF is determined by comparing family size and total family income (Table 1). At the point of application, the family's pre-tax (gross) income may not exceed 185% of the standard, and after-tax (net) income may not exceed the standard. Once eligibility is determined, benefits continue until the family's net income reaches 100% of the federal poverty guidelines.

In SFY 2000, the monthly average number of families receiving TANF benefits was 30,432. This number is down from 32,737 in SFY 1999 and represents a 57% decrease since 1994, before the implementation of Indiana's welfare reforms (Figure 1).

The monthly average number of recipients receiving benefits in SFY 2000 was 76,602. 2000 Census figures indicate this number represents 0.37% of Indiana's population.

The total value of TANF benefits paid in SFY 2000 was \$80.6 million, down from \$87.3 million in SFY 1999 and \$216.6 million in 1994.¹

Food Stamp Program

Indiana's Food Stamp program is designed to raise the nutritional level of low-income households by supplementing their available food-purchasing dollars with food stamp coupons. The program is federally funded, but administered through each state. Federal regulations developed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), Food and Nutrition Services, govern implementation of the program. In Indiana, the Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) is responsible for ensuring that federal regulations are implemented and consistently applied in each county.

In order to qualify for food stamp benefits, applicants must meet both financial and non-financial requirements. Financial criteria include income and asset limits. Non-financial requirements include state residency, citizenship/alien status, work registration,

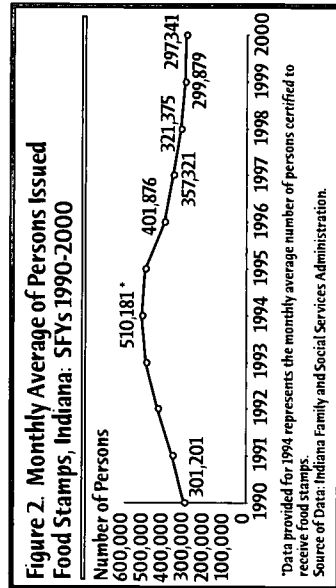
and cooperation with the IMPACT program. Eligible participants receive food coupon benefits based on family size (Table 2).

Food stamp benefits are used like cash to buy eligible items at any store, supermarket or cooperative approved by the USDA. From May 2001 through March 2002, Indiana will be replacing paper food stamps with an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) system in each of the 92 counties. EBT will allow for benefits to be accessed with a plastic Hoosier Works card, similar to commercial debit and ATM cards.

In SFY 2000, a monthly average of 297,341 Hoosiers received nutritional assistance through the food stamp program. This number is down from 299,879 in SFY 1999 and represents a 42% decrease since 1994 (Figure 2).



▣ The total value of food stamps issued in SFY was \$261.8 million, down from \$416.7 million in 1994.¹

IMPACT Program

The Indiana Manpower and Comprehensive Training (IMPACT) Program provides services designed to help TANF and food stamp recipients reach economic self-sufficiency. The IMPACT program emphasizes job placement and retention, complemented by education and training services.

IMPACT program participants receive job search assistance, job readiness training, on-the-job training, educational and vocational training, and community work experience. Additional supportive services can provide participants with clothing and shoes, drivers' training, books and training manuals, activity fees, transportation stipends, medical expenses, child care subsidies, and assistance with vehicle repair and maintenance.

▣ In SFY 2000, 23,216 Hoosiers received job placements through the IMPACT program. This number is up from 4,665 in SFY 1994.¹

National School Lunch and Breakfast Program

The National School Lunch Program was initiated after the end of World War II, and the School Breakfast Program was added in 1975. Participating students from families with incomes below 130% of the poverty guidelines are eligible for free meals, while students from families with incomes below 185% of the poverty guidelines are eligible for reduced-price meals. Students who attend both public and private schools are eligible to receive free or reduced-price meals. Under a state program initiated during the 1999-2000 school year, all public school students in Indiana who are eligible for free and reduced-price meals are also eligible for free textbooks.

Supplemental Food Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC)

The federally-funded WIC program provides support for pregnant and postpartum women, infants, and children younger than age six living in households with incomes less than 185% of the federal poverty guidelines. Eligible participants receive vouchers that can be redeemed for foods with high nutritional value through any approved retailer.

Sources of Support for Indiana Families

Alimony and child support

A comparison of data from the 1990 and 2000 U.S. Censuses reveals that the number of households headed by only one parent in Indiana has risen markedly—by 32.5% overall, by 23% for families headed by a single mother, and by 73% for families headed by a single father. Mothers remain the heads of more than three-fourths of the single-parent families, however. Child support has become an ever more important source of income for those children who *actually receive it*. Both federal and state governments have increased efforts to collect child support from absent parents, but results remain mixed. Indiana has done better than the nation as a whole.

The 2000 KIDS COUNT national data book reports that 47% of Indiana mothers, compared with 34% nationally, received child support or alimony from the absent parent. Comparable figures for the number of single fathers receiving child support or alimony are not available.¹

The Indiana Child Support Program

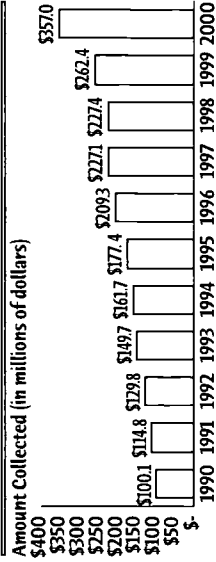
Funds paid for child support by non-custodial parents are collected and disbursed by the Indiana Child Support Bureau of the Division of Family and Children. The Bureau and its agents, the County Prosecutors' Offices, provide services to establish paternity and court orders, enforcement of court orders, and location of absent parents. The Bureau aggressively pursues funds due to Hoosier children, using such tools as income withholding, property liens, interception of tax refunds and unemployment compensation benefits, as well as suspension of driver's, professional and recreational licenses, and interceptions of lottery winnings.²

Two statistics reflect Indiana's intensified efforts to obtain child support: the dollar amount actually collected and disbursed, and the number of paternity

cases filed in Indiana courts.³ Between SFYs 1995 and 2000, the state more than doubled the amount of child support collected, and in CY 2000, more paternity cases were filed in Indiana courts than in any previous year.

In SFY 2000, \$357,002,273 was collected from absent parents to provide support for Hoosier children—more than three and one-half times the \$100.1 million in child support collected in 1990 (Figure 1). The amount of child support collected increased by 36% between 1999 and 2000.

Figure 1. Child Support Collected, Indiana: SFYs 1990-2000

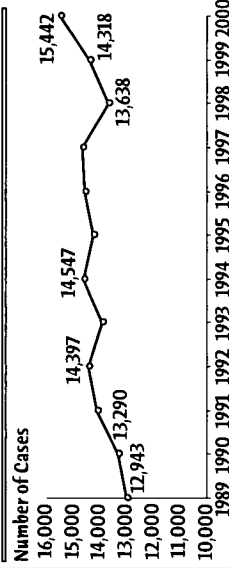

In FFY 2000, the total number of cases for which paternity had been established in Indiana was 365,076.

The number of paternity cases filed in Indiana courts rose by 8% between CYs 1999 and 2000. There were 15,442 paternity cases filed in CY 2000, up 16% from the 13,290 cases filed in 1999.

The Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC)

Since 1994, the federal government has provided the EITC, a refundable tax credit to ease the tax burden for working Americans with low to moderate incomes. Workers who qualify for the credit may get back some or all of the federal income taxes withheld from their paychecks; workers with incomes too low for withholding may also be eligible for the credit. The maximum credit available differs according to the amount of earned income and the number of children. In tax year (TY) 2000, a household with two children and earnings between \$9,700 and \$12,700 could qualify for a maximum credit of \$3,888. A household with the same earnings, but with one child could receive a maximum credit of \$2,350. Overall, just under 18.8 million working families and individuals received nearly \$31 billion in federal Earned Income Tax credits for TY 1999. Complex changes in the federal tax law for 2001 are expected to provide an increase of \$88 billion in refundable tax relief for low-income families during the next 10 years.⁴ The latest tax year for which comparable state and national data are available is 1999.


In TY 1999, 351,821 Hoosier working families and individuals received \$551,110,000 in federal earned income tax credits; most refunds went directly into Indiana's economy.⁵

The Washington-based Brookings Institution has studied the impact of the EITC in 27 metropolitan areas across the nation, including the Indianapolis region. Their figures are derived from returns filed in 1998 for TY 1997. In the nine-county Central Indiana region alone, 94,342 households (12.9% of all tax returns filed) claimed more than \$146 million in EITCs for 1997. The study concluded the EITC provides significant support for Hoosier families and their communities, but also found many eligible working families failed to claim the benefit, and further, fees paid to tax preparers took a significant proportion of the refund many families received.⁶ The study was conducted before Indiana

replaced the state's "earned income credit" with a refundable earned income tax credit.

Indiana's Earned Income Tax Credit

Beginning with TY 1999, Indiana offered a state earned income tax credit, in addition to the federal credit already available. To be eligible, an individual or couple must have at least one qualifying child in the household and have Indiana income of less than \$12,000 per year (including wages, salaries, tips, net earnings from self-employment, and other employee compensation). At least 80% of the income must be from earnings. The maximum Indiana credit is \$400, and declines as income increases toward \$12,000. In 2001, the Indiana legislature reauthorized this state credit through TY 2003.⁷

 In TY 1999, \$15.9 million in state earned income tax credits were returned to Hoosier taxpayers.⁸

Child Abuse and Neglect

The rates of child abuse and neglect remain stubbornly and unacceptably high. Nearly three million U.S. children were the subject of nearly two million investigations for maltreatment in 1999, the most recent year for which national data are available. After rising steadily to a rate of substantiated maltreatment of 15.3 per thousand children younger than age 18 in 1993, the national annual rates declined just as steadily, reaching 11.8 per thousand in 1999.¹ (National data for 2000 will not become available until 2002.) Although the number of reports of suspected maltreatment in Indiana fell steadily from a high of 69,458 in SFY 1995 to 42,979 in SFY 2000, the picture of the outcomes of investigations is less clear, and less encouraging (Table 1 and Figure 1).²

Indiana once recorded three outcomes for investigations: substantiated, indicated, and unsubstantiated. Early in 1995, the state eliminated the "indicated" category and outcomes were designated either substantiated or unsubstantiated. Also in SFY 1995, the number of child protection caseworkers was increased and their training strengthened. These changes led to a marked increase in the rate of substantiated cases—up from 12.1 per 1,000 children in SFY 1994 to 17.1 per 1,000 in SFY 1995. The rate declined to 15.9 per 1,000 in SFY 1996, and by 1998 had fallen

markedly to 10.8 per 1,000. The nature of the declining rates was somewhat ambiguous; county offices of the Division of Family and Children (DFC) were using a new computer system and some counties' data were not fully recorded as workers adapted to the new system. Data recording stabilized in SFY 1999. The overall rate of substantiated maltreatment that year rose to 13.9 cases per 1,000 children younger than age 18. The percentages of reported cases of abuse that were substantiated also rose, to 48% in SFY 1999, and of substantiated neglect, to 47% (from 34.0% and 34.4% respectively in SFY 1998). In SFY 2000, both the rate and numbers of children for whom maltreatment was substantiated rose again.³

There were 42,979 reports to offices of the DFC in SFY 2000—a decline of 782 children from the number reported in SFY 1999 (Figure 1).

Of the 15,532 reports of abuse, however, 9,052 were substantiated. Suspected sexual abuse was reported for 6,924 children, of which 4,637 (67%) cases were substantiated. Suspected physical abuse was reported for 8,608 children, of which 4,415 (51%) cases were substantiated. For both types of abuse, 58% of the reports were

substantiated. The number of children for whom abuse was substantiated in 2000 increased by 15.2% over substantiations in SFY 1999.

There were 27,447 reports of suspected neglect in SFY 2000; of these, 15,634—57%—were substantiated. The number of children for whom neglect was substantiated in 2000 also increased—by 19.4%—over substantiations in SFY 1999.

Maltreatment of children varied by age. Nearly 15% of physical abuse victims were younger than age four; 16% were ages 4-6; 37% ages 7-12, and 27% were ages 13-17. Of the sexual abuse victims, just below 5% were younger than age four; nearly 15% ages 4-6; and 30% were ages 7-12, while nearly 40% were ages 13-17. Of the neglect victims, more than 30% were younger than age 4; more than 17% were ages 4-6; more than 31% were ages 7-12 and more than 15%, ages 13-17. (Figures do not total 100% because of rounding and the numbers of victims whose ages were not recorded.)

76% of the victims of maltreatment were white; 19% were African American; one percent were Native American, and fewer than one percent each were Asian/Pacific Islanders or multi-racial. Hispanic children may be of any race, and they are included in the previous percentages. There were 731 Hispanic victims of maltreatment—just under 3% of the total number of victims.

Boys were slightly more likely than girls (53% vs. 46%) to be physically abused, while victims of sexual abuse were overwhelmingly girls (77% vs. 22%). Victims of neglect were nearly evenly divided by gender.

Most physical abuse (64%) and neglect (85%) were perpetrated by the victim's natural parent(s). Children were more likely to be sexually abused by an unrelated individual (52%) or a relative other than a parent or grandparent (12%).

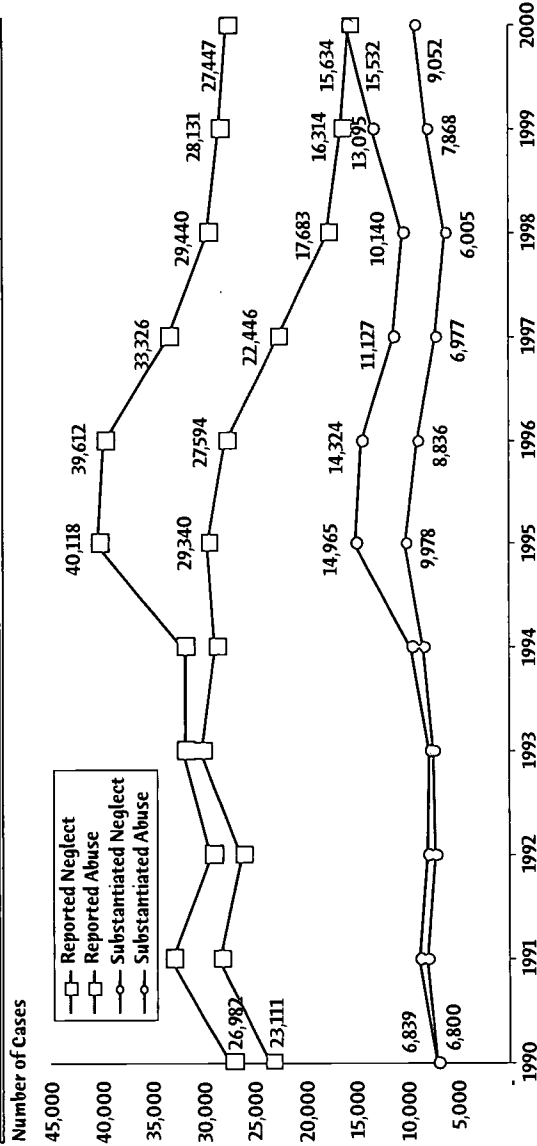

The distribution of victims in SFY 2000 by age, race/ethnicity, gender, and relationship to the perpetrator did not differ substantially from SFY 1999.

Institutional maltreatment

Institutional abuse and neglect is that which takes place when a child is in an out-of-home setting such as a school, child care center, home or ministry, state institution, or foster home responsible for his or her well-being.

There were 384 child victims of substantiated institutional abuse in SFY 2000; of these, 242 (63%) were sexually abused, and 142 (37%) physically abused. Of the 132 substantiated cases of sexual abuse that took place in residential facilities, 81 (61%) were perpetrated by another resident, while a surprising 52 (39%) were perpetrated by a staff member.

Fatalities

There were 45 fatalities from abuse and neglect in SFY 2001—one more than in SFY 2000, but fewer than the all-time high of 65 children who died in SFY 1998. Of the 45 children who died of maltreatment in SFY 2001, 26 (58%) died from abuse and 19 (42%) died from neglect.

Of the 26 abuse victims, 6 (23%) were killed by their natural mothers, and 13 (50%) by their natural fathers. Of the 19 victims of neglect, the child's mother was the perpetrator in 11 (58%) deaths, and the child's father in one (5%) death. There were no deaths in 2001 in which the perpetrator had no relationship to the child victim.⁴

Protecting Indiana's Children

Substitute Care

Substitute care is needed for children who—because of abuse or neglect by their primary caregiver(s) or their own behavior—cannot remain safely in their own homes. At the end of SFY 1999, there were 11,402 children in substitute care; these figures include children declared delinquent. During SFY 2000, 5,220 children entered, while 5,326 left, substitute care. At the end of June 2000, 11,305 young Hoosiers were being cared for outside of their own homes. Nearly half of these children (48%) were living in foster homes.¹

Indiana's Family Preservation Program seeks to prevent the unnecessary separation of families. The most desired outcome for children who have been removed from their own homes is safety, and when deemed prudent, reunification. In SFY 2000, 1,745 children (32.8%) returned to their own homes while an additional 216 (4.1%) were placed permanently with relatives. There are many children who cannot return to their own homes who still experience multiple substitute care placements once they have left their own families.

Adoption

The federal Adoption and Safe Families Act of 1997 (P.L. 105-89) was passed to promote permanency planning. The law clarifies that the child's health and safety are to be paramount in the decisions related to removal or reunification. The federal law also established incentive payments to states in which adoptions of foster children in the current fiscal year exceed those in any previous fiscal year after FY 1996. States are required to file a petition to terminate parental rights when a child has been in substitute care for 15 of the more recent 22 months, the child has been abandoned as determined by the courts, or the parent has assaulted the child or killed or assaulted another child in the home.²

Before a child becomes available for adoption, the rights of the parents must be terminated by court action. The number of termination of parental rights cases filed in

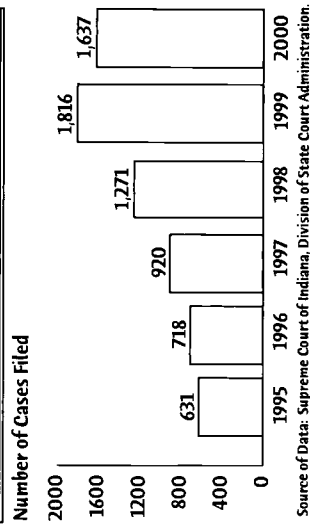
Indiana courts increased steadily between CYs 1995 and 1999—to 1,816—but declined in CY 2000 to 1,637 (Figure 1).³

In SFY 2000, 1,118 adoptions of children in state care were finalized in Indiana.

The Special Needs Adoption Program (SNAP). This public/private partnership program to promote adoption of children with special needs was implemented in 1989. "Special needs" include factors such as racial or ethnic background, age, membership in a minority sibling group, a medical condition or physical, mental, or emotional handicaps. The Children's Bureau of Indianapolis coordinates the publication of the *My Forever Family* book containing photographs and information about children available for adoption. Additional outreach efforts to potential adoptive parents include the internet, the adoption "hotline," and media campaigns. In CY 1999 alone, the Division of Family and Children received 10,365 inquiries about adoption.

In CY 1999, 1,133 children were placed in adoptive homes—an increase of nearly 19% over the 954 placements made in CY 1998—and another all-time high for Indiana. Adoptions were finalized for 1,014 "SNAP" children in CY 1999.

Between CYs 1990 and 1999, a total of 5,168 "special needs" children were placed in adoptive homes. In 1999, an additional 1,193 children were awaiting termination of parental rights.

Programs to help prevent maltreatment

Healthy Families Indiana (HFI)

This voluntary program—a collaborative project of the Indiana State Department of Health, the Criminal Justice Institute, the Division of Mental Health, the Division of Family and Children, the Children's Trust Fund, Prevent Child Abuse-Indiana, and numerous community-based organizations—serves families in all 92 counties whose children may be at risk for abuse and/or neglect. HFI is designed to improve family coping skills and functions, encourage positive parenting skills and parent-child interaction to promote optimal child development, and to prevent child maltreatment.

In FFY 2000, some 9,600 families received services through Healthy Families Indiana, an increase of 7% over the 9,000 families served in 1999.⁴

The Children's Trust Fund (CTF)

Indiana created the CTF in 1994 with revenues from the sale of "Kids First" license plates. The CTF supports community-based programs that promote the well-being of all children as well as programs targeted to families at particular risk for abusing and/or neglecting their children. As the number of special license plates has proliferated, CTF has received a smaller share of revenues from sales.

For SFY 2000, CTF provided 66 projects with \$2.6 million in support; in SFY 2001, 69 projects were awarded \$2.2 million, and in SFY 2002, 83 programs were awarded \$2.4 million.⁵

"Heirloom" birth certificates were introduced in 1997, and revenues from sales were designated to support, develop, and operate programs that address infant mortality. Birth certificate revenues have been disappointingly low; to date, no grants have been made from this fund.

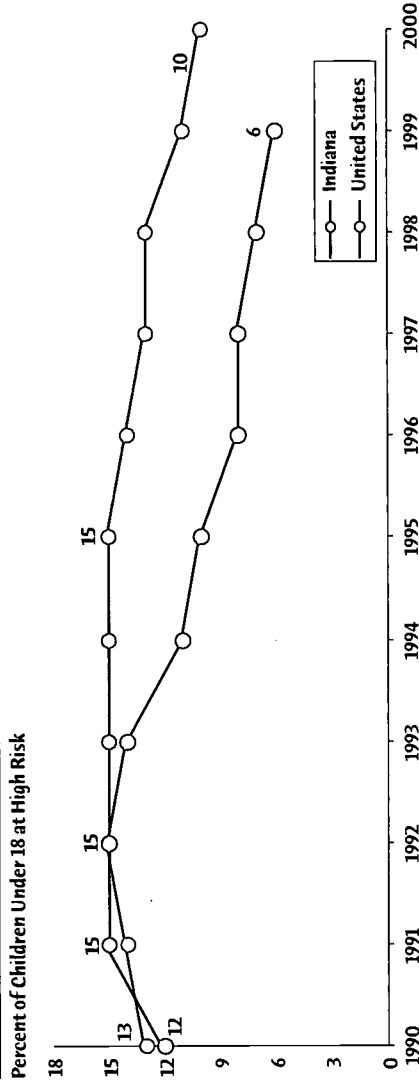
Children at "high-risk"

The Annie E. Casey Foundation has developed a KIDS COUNT "Family Risk Index" to estimate the number of children who are potentially at high risk for negative outcomes—only one of which would be maltreatment. The index represents the percentage of children living in families that have four or more of the following characteristics:

- ☐ child is not living with two parents,
- ☐ household head is a high-school dropout,
- ☐ family income is below the poverty line,
- ☐ child is living with parent(s) who is/are underemployed,
- ☐ family is receiving welfare benefits, and
- ☐ child does not have health insurance.

Indiana made marked improvement in the percentage of children falling into the "high-risk" category based on this index between 1990 and 1999: from 12% to 6%, a reduction of 50% (Figure 2).⁶ Only two states, South Dakota and Wisconsin, had smaller percentages (5%) of children estimated to be at high risk. Still, use of the index estimates that 99,000 children in Indiana may live in circumstances that place them at high risk.

Early Childhood Education

In 2000, 62.3% of Indiana families with children under the age of six had all parents in the workforce.¹ As a result, three out of five young children spend some or all of their day being cared for by someone other than their parents. As the number of mothers entering the workforce continues to increase, the need for high-quality, affordable, and accessible child care will also continue to grow.

Educare

The Educare program is administered by the Bureau of Child Development in the Indiana Family and Social Services Administration (FSSA) and subsidizes child care for children younger than age 13 living in working families with incomes of 85% or less of the state median income. Educare is funded through the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), Child Care and Development Funds (CCDF), and School Age Child Care Funds. Educare funds are available for eligible families in all 92 counties and are administered through the voucher and child care contracts system. In Indiana, 78,788 children received services through Educare in SFY 2000.²

New legislation passed in 2001 outlines eight minimum requirements all child care providers must meet in order to receive vouchers from the state for subsidized child care. Beginning July 1, 2001, all child care providers who receive state vouchers must:

- ☞ have a working smoke detector,
- ☞ have an annual TB test and provide the results to the voucher agent,
- ☞ have a written emergency plan available to parents,
- ☞ maintain current certification in infant/child CPR and First Aid,
- ☞ have a working telephone,
- ☞ have monthly documented fire drills,

- ☞ lock up all firearms, ammunition, poisons, chemicals, bleach and cleaning materials, and
- ☞ provide a criminal history check for the provider and all adults who are residents of the provider's home.³

Licensed and Registered Child Care

As the need for out-of-home child care has grown, the number of licensed child care centers, homes, and registered ministries increased. Between SFY 1990 and 2000, the number of licensed child care centers increased 12%, the number of licensed child care homes increased by 107% over the same period of time (Figure 1).⁴

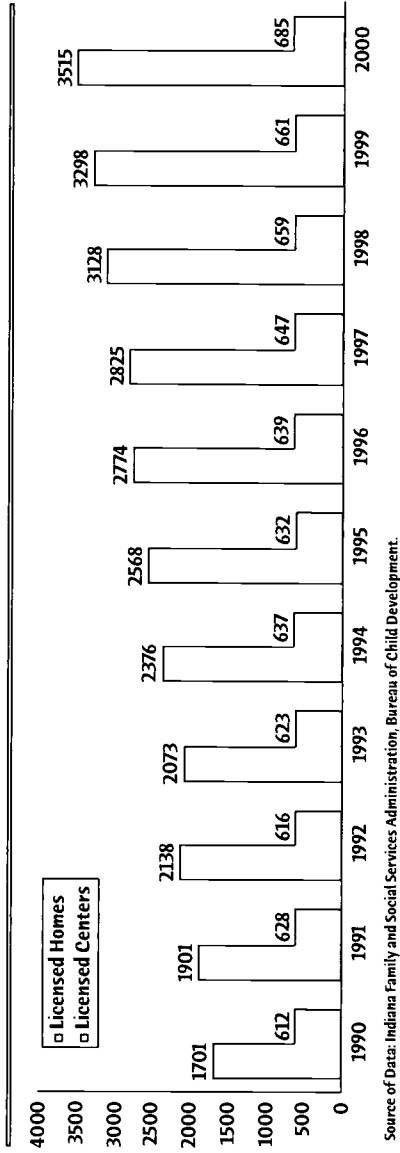
- ☞ Licensed child care centers are nonresidential buildings in which child care services are provided for more than 10 consecutive work days. The maximum number of children cared for in each center is determined by the square footage of the facility and the number of caregivers. In SFY 2000, 62,482 children were cared for in 685 licensed child care centers.

- ☞ Licensed child care homes provide care for up to 12 children in a residential setting (homes that provide care for five or fewer unrelated children are license-exempt). In SFY 2000, 3,515 licensed child care homes cared for 40,247 children.

- ☞ Registered child care ministries are facilities operated by a church or religious organization exempt from federal taxation. These facilities may choose to become licensed centers, but are not required to do so. In SFY 2000, there were 504 registered child care ministries. Information on the number of children cared for in child care ministries is not available.

Recent legislation has addressed the need for licensed providers to maintain certain standards in Indiana. Senate Bill 110, passed by Indiana's General Assembly in 2001, sets higher educational standards for licensed child care providers in Indiana by requiring all new licensed providers in homes and centers to have a high school diploma or GED. In addition, licensed providers are required to complete a Child Development Associate credential (CDA) or the equivalent of an associate's degree in Early Childhood Education.

Senate Bill 110 also reinstates state licensing of Class II child care homes. If providers meet certain eligibility requirements, Class II licensure allows for them to care for up to 16 children in a residential setting. Class I homes, which have been previously allowed to care for up to 12 unrelated children, are now allowed to care for up to three additional school-age children during breaks from school if they meet certain provisions specified in the bill.⁵

Head Start and Early Head Start

Head Start and Early Head Start are federally funded programs that provide comprehensive developmental services to children ages birth to two (Early Head Start) and three to five (Head Start) and their families. The majority of children in Head Start and Early Head Start are from low-income families. These programs provide extensive health, nutritional, educational, social and other services to help children achieve their full potential. In Indiana, every county is served by a Head Start grantee.

☞ In SFY 2000, the funded capacity of Head Start increased to 12,678, from serving 11,170 children in SFY 1999.

☞ Early Head Start programs, although not available to all Indiana counties, served 608 children in SFY 2000.⁶

First Steps

First Steps is a locally-based coordinated system to provide services to infants and young children age two to three with disabilities or who are developmentally vulnerable. First Steps services include special instruction, physical therapy, transportation, respite care, assistive technology, nursing and health services, and nutritional assistance. In SFY 2000, 11,737 children received services through First Steps.⁷

T.E.A.C.H. Indiana

Introduced in 1998, T.E.A.C.H. provides scholarships for increased educational opportunities for Indiana's child care workers. Teachers, directors, and other providers are given financial assistance in order to work toward a CDA credential or an associate's degree in Early Childhood Education. Scholarship recipients also receive increased compensation in the form of a raise or bonus when they accomplish their educational goal. Since June 1999, T.E.A.C.H. has provided scholarships for more than 778 child care providers in 76 different counties.⁸

Indiana's Schools, Grades K-12

State aims for education

In April 2001, the Department of Education adopted the following aims for education in Indiana:

- ▢ safe and caring schools,
- ▢ high standards, assessments, and accountability,
- ▢ a system preparing high-performing, responsible, and responsive citizens,
- ▢ high student achievement, and
- ▢ effective use of resources.

The Indiana legislature passed a series of laws (P.L.146-1999, P.L.193-1999, and P.L.221-1999) in 1999 that spell out higher standards, school improvements and enhanced accountability policies.¹ A permanent body and working group called the Education Round Table has been appointed by the governor and the superintendent of public instruction to make recommendations on academic standards and on the content and format of the ISTEP examination program. Indiana is now debating the recommendations of the Education Round Table as well as the study of the state's standards. completed by Achieve, Inc. in January 2000.² Indiana's academic standards are among the strongest in the nation.³

In October 2001, the Indiana State Board of Education set requirements for placing Indiana's schools into five performance improvement categories as required by P.L. 221. They are:

- ▢ exemplary progress,
- ▢ commendable progress,
- ▢ academic progress,
- ▢ academic watch/priority, and
- ▢ academic probation/high priority.

The new accountability procedures will be implemented gradually and the plan will be fully operational in 2005.⁴

To assist with monitoring school progress and accountability, P.L. 221 permits Indiana to assign identification numbers to individual students for the first time. In the fall of 2001, some of the state's third-

graders will be the first to receive the nine-digit IDs in a voluntary trial program. By the beginning of SY 2003-04, all students will have unique numbers that will stay with them throughout their careers in Indiana's public and accredited non-public schools.⁵ The new tracking system will facilitate better record-keeping at all levels of administration and make feasible, accurate compilations of heretofore rather fuzzy statistics in important areas such as ISTEP+ test-retest passing rates, and student dropout and graduation rates.

Enrollment

In SY 1999-2000, there were 1,125,834 students enrolled in Indiana's schools. Table 1 compares student population figures for SYs 1994-95, 1998-99, and 1999-00.⁶ Public school enrollment (including children in pre-kindergarten) increased by just over two percent in five years, while enrollment in state-operated schools⁷ declined by nine percent. Non-public school enrollment grew by nearly 9.6%, but the number of home schooled students increased by 308%.⁸ Public school enrollment in grades K-12 only, was 983,090 in SY 1999-2000.

Ethnic diversity

The racial/ethnic composition of the student bodies within Indiana's public school corporations varies widely, but overall, Hoosier students are predominantly white. This is even more true of those who teach them and administer their schools. The student enrollment figures for SY 1999-00 reflect the growth of the Hispanic population of the state. Although the proportion of

African-American students has remained essentially the same since SY 1994-95, the number of African-American school personnel declined slightly (Table 2). In general, teachers and administrators continue to be less diverse than their students.⁹

Expenditures

Spending for Indiana's public schools (including transportation and federal grant expenditures) rose to more than \$6.1 billion in SFY 2000—an increase of 4.6% over expenditures in SFY 1999 and an increase of 30% over spending in SFY 1995. In that five-year period, tuition support for regular instruction rose by 26.6%, while expenditures for special education rose by 63.9%. There was also a five-year increase of 184.3% in tuition support for "at risk" students. Spending for ISTEP+ remediation was increased by 87.5% to nearly \$21.5 million. An additional \$5 million was spent on remediation for high school students who failed the Graduation Qualifying Examination.¹⁰

Statewide, the per pupil expenditure rose as well, to \$6,698 in SFY 2000, up 3.8% from SFY 1999 and up 25.9% from \$5,322 in SFY 1995. Per pupil expenditures vary considerably from one school corporation to another depending on local resources, and from one student to another, depending on identified educational needs.¹¹



Alternative schools

Alternative school programs received a boost when the Indiana General Assembly amended the Indiana Administrative Code in 1997. Alternative education has expanded options for students in grades 6-12. Students are eligible for alternative public education if they have withdrawn from school or intend to do so; do not comply academically and would benefit from a different type of instruction; are parents or expectant parents, are employed and their wages are necessary for their own support or the support of their immediate families; or are "disruptive" students whose own behavior affects their learning in regular classrooms. Most programs offer students more individualized instruction using alternative teaching and learning strategies. In the past year, there has been greater emphasis on alternative schooling for middle school students. Schools are also doing more to keep students in these programs until they can either return to regular classrooms or graduate from high school.²

Home Schooling in Indiana

Home schooling continues to be an increasingly popular option for Hoosier families. In Indiana, participation of home schooled students in public school classes and extra-curricular activities may take place with the permission of the school superintendent. If a student is enrolled in a public school by the time the official student count is taken in September, the public school will receive state funding for that student based on the number of classes taken. Although Indiana law does not require ISTEP + or other testing for home schooled students, the Department of Education does recommend periodic, standardized achievement testing.

➤ The final estimate of the number of Indiana's home schooled students in SY 1999-2000 was 19,941 – up 13% from the previous year, and representing a ten-fold increase since the 1991-92 school year.

Making an accurate count of home schooled students continues to be a challenge for the Indiana Department of Education. Some home-schooled children never enter public or private schools and remain unidentified, while others transfer or re-enter schools, or are withdrawn completely without reporting the change to the local superintendent as required by law.¹³

Charter Schools

Public Law 100-2001, sec. 21 passed by the legislature in its 2001 session makes possible the establishment of charter schools in Indiana school corporations.¹⁴ A "charter school" is a public school that is nonsectarian and nonreligious, and operates under a charter, that is, a written contract between an organizer and a sponsor. The "organizer" must be a group or an entity that has been determined by the Internal Revenue Service to be operating under not-for-profit status or has applied for such determination; a "sponsor" must be one of the following: (a) a governing body,¹⁵ (b) a state educational institution that offers a four-year baccalaureate degree, or (c) the executive of a consolidated city. An existing school may be converted to a charter school.¹⁶

According to the law, a charter school may be established to provide innovative and autonomous programs that do the following:

- serve the different learning styles and needs of public school students,
- offer public school students appropriate and innovative choices,
- afford varied opportunities for professional educators,
- allow public schools freedom and flexibility in exchange for exceptional levels of accountability, and,
- provide parents, students, community members, and local entities with an expanded opportunity for involvement in the public school system.

Charter schools are subject to all federal and state laws and constitutional provisions that prohibit discrimination on the basis of disability, race, color, gender, national

origin, religion or ancestry.¹⁷ In passing this legislation, Indiana has tried to learn from both the successes and failures of other states' experiences in chartering and monitoring these innovative public schools. It is expected that Hoosier children will have the option of attending the state's first charter schools in 2002.

Test Scores in Indiana

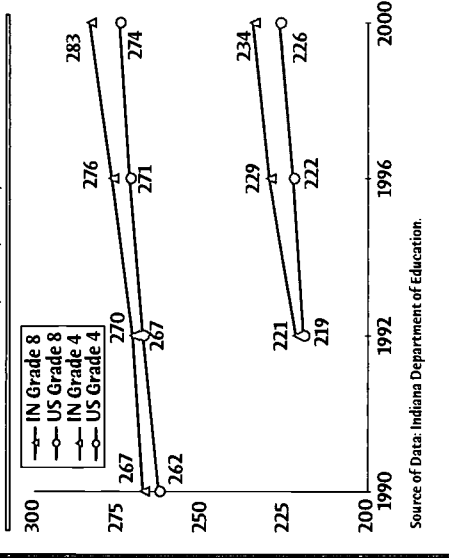
The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)

In 1969, the U.S. Department of Education began to make periodic assessments of student performance through administering NAEP examinations in selected subject matter in grades 4, 8, and 12. Since 1990, state-level assessments have also been conducted, using separate representative samples of students from each participating state. Indiana 4th-grade students participated in a state-level assessment of mathematics in 1992, 1996, and 2000; Hoosier 8th-graders participated in these assessments and in 1990 as well. Each time they have participated in NAEP, Indiana students have increased their scores from the previous test administration and have done better than students in the nation as a whole (Figure 1). Student math performance is reported as an average score that ranges from 0 to 500.¹ Indiana's NAEP 2000 math scores are particularly encouraging and reflect the ongoing efforts of students, teachers, and parents to improve academic preparedness.

Grade 4

Fourth-graders in Indiana earned an average NAEP math score of 234—above the national average score of 226. Indiana's scores were the second highest achieved by any state, tying with Connecticut for second place (Massachusetts and Minnesota tied for first place, both with scores of 235). Mathematics performance is reported at three achievement levels: Basic, Proficient and Advanced. Indiana's students were again ahead of national averages: 78% of Hoosier 4th-graders (vs. 67%) scored at the basic level or higher; 31% (vs. 25%) achieved the Proficient level; and, 3% (vs. 2%) achieved scores at the Advanced level. Less than a fourth (22%) of Indiana's 4th-graders (vs. 33% nationally) had scores below Basic level, but this means there is work still to be done.

Grade 8

Indiana's 8th-graders also performed very well on the NAEP 2000 mathematics exam, with the fourth highest score of 283, placing them above the national average of 274. Indiana's 8th-grade scores tied with those of Massachusetts, North Dakota, Ohio, Vermont, and Connecticut (Minnesota, Montana, Kansas, and Maine had higher scores than Indiana). More than three-fourths (76%) achieved scores at the basic level or higher (vs. 65% nationally); 31% (vs. 26%) were scored as Proficient; and 5% (also 5% nationally) received scores qualifying for the Advanced level. As was true for 4th-graders, however, just under a fourth (24%) of Hoosier 8th-graders scored below the Basic level (vs. 35% nationally).

College entrance examinations

Most college-bound students take standardized entrance examinations. Although some schools have stopped requiring test scores, a majority of colleges and universities continue to consider the test scores of applicants in making admission and scholarship decisions, academic advising, and course placement.

The two most widely used entrance examinations are the SAT, first given in 1941, and the ACT, first given in 1959. The SAT has two parts, verbal and mathematics, each of which has a perfect score of 800. Scores on the two portions of the test are summed to yield a maximum composite score of 1600. The ACT is scored on a scale of 1 to 36. The composite score is based on subscores in four academic areas: English, reading, mathematics, and science reasoning.

The scores of individual students on both examinations are sensitive to many variables—among them: household income; parental educational attainment; race/ethnicity; type, location, and size of school attended; rigor of high school coursework completed; and grades earned. In addition, a state's aggregated scores are strongly affected by the percentage of its students who take the test. The students who take these examinations are self-selected, and the College Board (SAT) and ACT strongly advise against making state-by-state comparisons. The practice continues, however.

The SAT^{®2}

In 2000-2001, more than 45% of the nation's high school graduates—1,276,320 in all—took the SAT. The 41,424 students from Indiana represented 60% of the state's graduating Class of 2001; they achieved a total score of 1000, compared with the national average of 1020. Compared with scores for the Class of 2000, the 2001 average of Indiana students' verbal test scores increased by one point to 499; math test scores remained the same for both years at 501. National scores averaged 506 for the verbal test (also up one point) while math scores, at 514, remained the same as for the previous class. Indiana's increasing diversity and the high percentage of students taking the SAT have been deemed factors in the state's SAT scores. Although racial/ethnic diversity has increased in recent years, Indiana's schools remain considerably less diverse than those in the nation as a whole. Fourteen states had greater participation than Indiana in the SAT in 2001. The average verbal score for these states was 503.9 and mathematics, 504.4 — higher than Indiana's. The state's five-year gain of five points on the verbal score and seven points on the math test scores outpaced the improvement for the group of states with higher participation in 2001 (1.5 and 6.9, respectively). During the past 10 years, Indiana's average scores increased by 14 points on the verbal test and 16 points on the math test—greater than the national increases of 7 and 14 points on the two parts of the test, respectively.

The ACT³

The national average composite score on the ACT, taken by 1,069,772 students in the graduating class of 2001 (38%), remained unchanged at 21.0 for the fifth year in a row. The composite score for the 20% of Indiana's students who took the test also remained the same as in 2000, at 21.4. Consistently, Indiana students have achieved composite scores above the national average. If the proportion of graduating students were the major factor in determining scores, it would be expected that

states with lower participation would have higher scores. In 17 states, fewer than 20% of the students took the ACT; the average composite score for these states was 21.3—below Indiana's composite score of 21.4.

High-School Graduation

The public school graduating Class of 2000 received 56,999 diplomas. Of these, 45.7% of the students received regular diplomas, 23.5% academic honors diplomas, and the remaining 30.8%, Core 40 only diplomas. These figures include 2,691 students who graduated following a regular appeal waiver and 110 who received a Core 40 waiver. The number of students awarded diplomas declined by three percent from the previous year. An additional 864 students in the Class of 2000 received Certificates of Achievement—a figure 76% higher than in the Class of 1999 and 137% higher than in the Class of 1995. The number of students ages 19 and younger earning GEDs also increased—by four percent between 1999 and 2000, and by 106% between 1995 and 2000.¹

To calculate the graduation rate, the Indiana Department of Education (IDOE) uses methodology employing an “odds ratio” that a 9th-grade student will graduate from high school four years later. In SY 2000, students who graduated during the summer were included in the total numbers.

The IDOE reports a graduation rate for the Class of 2000 of 89.0%, down from 89.5% for the Class of 1999 and from 89.7% for the Class of 1998.

A simpler estimate of student progression through the state’s public high schools is obtained by dividing the number of graduates by the number of students who were enrolled in Grade 9 four years earlier. The state and county data pages provide these figures as the “percent of freshman class graduating in four years.” This measure has been calculated by IYI. It does not calculate student transfers in and out of the state or county, students transferring in and out of private or home schools, incarcerated students, deaths, or those who graduated in less than four years, earned a GED, or entered college without a high-school diploma.

The number of public school graduates in SY 1999-2000 represents 68.3% of the number of students enrolled as freshman in SY 1996-97.

The Graduation Qualifying Examination (GQE)

Indiana was one of 18 states in which high-school graduation is contingent on passing a statewide exit examination in SY 2000-01; six additional states are expected to add an exit examination requirement between 2002 and 2008.² Members of the graduating Class of 2000 were the first required to demonstrate they had acquired the 9th-grade skills assessed by the GQE. They first took the test in the fall of 1997 and at that time, 54% met the standards in both mathematics and English/language arts. By the spring of 2000, an additional 32% of the students hoping to graduate had passed both parts of the examination (94% had passed the English/language arts portion, and 89% had passed the math portion). The estimates are based on the number of Grade 10 students tested in Fall 1997.³ By the time the Spring 2001 GQE results were announced, 93.7% of the class had met the GQE standards, 4.6% had earned a diploma via the appeal process, and 0.2% via the Core 40 waiver. Only 1.5% of the Class of 2000 who have completed all necessary course requirements must still pass the GQE to receive their diplomas.⁴

Although sued by the Indiana Civil Liberties Union (ICLU) on behalf of the students with disabilities who had not passed the GQE, the Department of Education remained firm that all students had to pass the exam or obtain a waiver as outlined in P.L.146. The court agreed, saying that providing remediation would be better than throwing out the test results. The ICLU appealed the decision, and again lost. At the time this report was completed, the ICLU was waiting to hear whether or not the Supreme Court of Indiana would hear the case.

The first-time passing rate for the GQE has increased among each succeeding class of 10th graders taking the exam. While 54% of the Class of 2000 passed both parts of the exam the first time it was administered in 1997, 55 % of 10th-

graders passed in 1998, and 57% passed in 1999. The final figures for the Classes of 2001 and 2002 were not available at the time this report was written.

Educating Special Populations

Federal and state laws establish the right of every child to receive a free and appropriate education, in the least restrictive environment possible. Both nationally and in Indiana, special education services have been made available to increased numbers of students with disabilities; the costs of providing these services have continued to increase as well. Some of the escalating numbers reflect expanded eligibility criteria and the development of better strategies for identifying and serving children with special needs. Beyond this, however, there may simply be more of them to identify and serve. As medical technologies have improved, for example, children are surviving conditions related to low birthweight and injury in greater numbers, enabling them to participate in regular classrooms. Indiana schools have also identified and provided services to more emotionally handicapped students. The Division of Special Education predicts the same factors that have led to recent increases will be sustained over the next three to five years, and that the numbers of students requiring special education services will continue to grow.¹

The unduplicated federal count of students receiving special education services reached 155,206 in 2000-01, a figure that includes students ages three through 21 attending Indiana's public schools. The number of special education students increased by 3.1% from the previous year, and by 47.9% from a decade earlier. Overall public school enrollment increased by .18% and 3.7% in the same periods, respectively.

In 1990-91, just over 11% of public school students received special education services. By 2000-01, 15.7% of the students were receiving services.

Some of the increased need for special education services relates to slow or no progress in meeting those Healthy People 2000 environmental and behavioral goals in areas which research has shown to be related to children's physical disabilities, developmental delays, and learning problems. These factors include: inadequate maternal and child nutrition, inadequate prenatal care and low birthweight, maternal use of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs during pregnancy, inadequate health care (whether by choice or inaccessibility), poor parenting skills and teen parenthood, as well as exposure to environmental hazards such as lead, mercury, and other toxins.²

Postsecondary Education

While a high school diploma now represents a minimum standard for well-paying work, most jobs require postsecondary training or education. Indiana's adults have a relatively low level of postsecondary educational attainment. The most recent estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau showed that only 19.9% of Hoosier adults aged 25 and older have earned baccalaureate degrees or more. Although this figure represents an improvement over adults' educational attainment in 1990 (15.6%), Indiana's rate in 2000 was well below the U.S. rate of 25.1%. It is encouraging that increasing numbers of Indiana's young people are planning to continue their education. Seniors graduating in the Class of 2000 were asked about their plans for additional education after high school. Well over half (56.3%) intend to enter a four-year college program, an increase of 14% from the percentage (49.3%) who intended to pursue a baccalaureate degree in the Class of 1995. A higher percentage (8.4%) of graduating seniors intended to enter vocational or technical training from the Class of 2000 than in the Class of 1999 (7.7%).¹ In most Indiana counties, the percentages of students expecting to attend a two-year college has been relatively low. As statewide access to two-year college programs grows, the numbers of graduating seniors expecting to enter community colleges undoubtedly will increase. According to the National Center for Education Statistics, in 1998, 60.5% of Indiana's students went on to college, compared with 57.2% in the nation as a whole. Indiana moved to 17th place among the 50 states in 1998, up from 40th place in 1986.²

Community Colleges of Indiana

A community college system for Indiana became a much-awaited reality in Fall 2000, when a partnership of Vincennes University and Ivy Tech formed the Community College of Indiana (CCI). Pilot programs opened on campuses in Gary, Lafayette, Indianapolis, and Evansville; six more campuses were added in 2001 in Anderson, East Chicago, Marion, Michigan City, Muncie, and Valparaiso. "CCI combines Ivy Tech's strong technical training programs with Vincennes' broad range of liberal arts to form the state's first comprehensive community college

system," Governor O'Bannon's office noted.³ As anticipated, enrollment has increased rapidly. CCI enrollments reached 26,986 in Fall 2001, up from 22,979 in Fall 2000 and from 19,255 in Fall 1999. Enrollments in CCI grew by 40% between 1999 and 2001. CCI and its Ivy Tech and Vincennes partners saw systemwide enrollment growth of 36% between 1999 and 2001.⁴

Twenty-first Century Scholars Program

The Twenty-first Century Scholars initiative was announced in SY 1990-91 to increase Indiana's high-school graduation rate and provide access to postsecondary education for low- and moderate-income students. The program provides tuition support in addition to the regular state grant program to students who pledge as 8th-graders to prepare themselves for college, including maintaining a C average and graduating from high school, staying out of trouble with the law, and remaining drug-free. The first Scholars to graduate from college in four years would have done so in 1998-99.

In the 11 years of the program, 11,035 students have enrolled. Well over half of the scholars have affirmed the pledge made as 8th-graders. In 2001, 19% of the scholars earned Academic Honors diplomas and 22% met Core 40 criteria.

Scholars are 10% to 12% more likely to enter college than other students; the percentage of scholars graduating from college within four years increased from about 43% in 1998 to nearly 60% in 2000. More than 66% of the scholars who entered college attend public colleges in Indiana.⁵

An evaluation of the impact of the program completed in 2001 by the Indiana Education Policy Center concluded that the Scholars Program provides an incentive for low-income students to prepare themselves academically for college and ensures that they will get ample student aid. The study noted that the Scholars Program represents a model that states can adopt "to provide financial access to students from low-income families."⁶

Other Supports for Postsecondary Education

The *Indiana Career and Postsecondary Advancement Center (ICPAC)* was established in 1986 to inform, encourage and support the education and career development of Hoosiers. ICPAC provides numerous publications and services to Indiana's students and their families as they prepare for life after high school. ICPAC works under the direction of the Indiana Commission for Higher Education in partnership with the Department of Workforce Development, the State Student Assistance Commission of Indiana, and other agencies. It is a sponsor of the state's "College Goal Sunday" held annually in early February to assist students and their families with applications for financial aid.⁷

The *Indiana College Savings Plan*—made possible by legislation passed by the Indiana General Assembly in 1996—encourages families to save and invest in tax-deferred accounts for their children's education. The account owner may live anywhere and the beneficiary may attend any accredited school in the country.⁸

Health Care for Young Hoosiers

Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

In 1997, Congress passed the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP) as part of the federal Balanced Budget Act to encourage states to provide health insurance to uninsured children. At that time, an estimated 15% of all children in the U.S. and 12.4% of Hoosier children were uninsured. The Indiana General Assembly responded by replacing Medicaid with the Hoosier Healthwise program for low-income pregnant women and children. Hoosier Healthwise provides coverage for children younger than age 19 living in households with incomes below 150% of the federal poverty guideline (currently \$26,475 for a family of four). In January 2000, families with incomes of 150% up to 200% of the federal poverty guideline (currently \$35,300 for a family of four) could also receive coverage by paying a small monthly premium. The Plan covers routine checkups, well-child visits, doctor visits, hospital stays and specialty care, prescription drugs, mental health, vision and dental care, screenings, immunizations, diagnoses and treatments.¹

Since the program went into effect in July 1998, Indiana has been highly successful in enrolling pregnant women and children in Hoosier Healthwise. Outreach has been accomplished in cooperation with a network of 521 enrollment centers throughout Indiana—including schools, township trustees, community action programs, WIC centers, local departments of health and health clinics, community-based agencies and organizations, as well as the 92 local offices of the Division of Family and Children.²

By June 2001, 178,139 children, adolescents, and pregnant women had been enrolled in Hoosier Healthwise, in addition to the 210,423 already enrolled in Medicaid. Total enrollment has increased by 75% since May 1998 (the last time persons could enroll under the "old" program).

The number of Primary Medical Providers working with Hoosier Healthwise has increased by 13.5%, from 1,832 to 2,080 in all 92 counties. Additionally, more than 128 dentists have joined the program.

While health insurance coverage among low-income children increased between 1998 and 1999, the mothers of these children are less likely to have coverage. An analysis of national data from the 2000 Current Population Survey estimated that some 5.9 million (16%) women caring for young children were without health insurance. The same study estimated that 92,000 low-income mothers in Indiana—12%—were uninsured.³

Immunizations

The widespread vaccination of the nation's children since the early 1970s has prevented millions of illnesses and many thousands of deaths. The recommended immunization schedule for children younger than age two becomes increasingly complex as new vaccines become available. The 4:3:1:3 Series of Coverage recommended immunizations for two-year-olds (i.e., 24 through 35 months of age) includes: four doses of DPT (diphtheria and tetanus toxoids, and pertussis vaccine); three doses of poliovirus vaccine (IPV); one dose of MMR (measles, mumps, and rubella) and three doses of Hib (haemophilus influenza, Type B). The 4:3:1:3:3 adds three doses of hepatitis B. In addition, varicella (chickenpox) and heptavalent conjugate pneumococcal vaccines are also recommended by the American Academy of Pediatrics.⁴ Neither Indiana nor the nation as a whole attained the goal of 90% coverage (using the 4:3:1:3 Series) in 2000. The same target has been set for Healthy People 2010.⁵

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention conduct an annual National Immunization Survey (NIS) to monitor coverage among U.S. two-year-olds.

In 2000, 76.2% of U.S. children ages 19-35 months had received the 4:3:1:3 Series of Coverage; 72.8% had received the 4:3:1:3:3 Series, and 77.6% had received the 4:3:1 Series. Comparable coverage figures for Indiana children were 76.3%, 72.0%, and 77.7%, respectively.⁶

Prenatal Care

A healthy start in life begins with early and adequate prenatal care for both mother and child; such care is associated with lowered risk of premature birth, normal infant birthweight and maternal weight gain, and with early detection and better management of medical and obstetrical conditions. A greater percentage of Hoosier mothers began prenatal care in the first trimester in 1999 (79.5%) than in 1998 (77.0%). The national rate is also improved, to 83.3% in 1999. Indiana continues to lag behind the nation as a whole as the state works toward the Healthy People 2010 target of 90% receiving first trimester prenatal care (the same goal as in 2000). The percentages of women beginning care in the first trimester also vary by age and race/ethnicity (Table 1).

Only 44.2% of all 10- to 14-year olds who gave birth in 1999 began prenatal care in the first trimester. The percentage dropped to 37.8% among the 74 African-American teens in this age group. Among teens ages 15-17, 61.2% began prenatal care in the first trimester and 68.7% of teens ages 18-19 also did so. In these age groups and as a whole, fewer non-white women began care early. The rate for Hispanics, at 62.9%, was the lowest for all groups.¹

Drinking alcohol during pregnancy

Recent studies of the impact of alcohol on unborn children have concluded that there is no safe limit for alcohol consumption. The risk of fetal alcohol syndrome and fetal alcohol effects are widely known. There are more subtle behavioral consequences of prenatal alcohol exposure, however, that show up later in childhood (even when statistical controls for all of the other factors that influence child behaviors are applied). Children of mothers who drank—even in amounts as small as one drink per week—during pregnancy were found to be more likely to have attention and other cognitive problems, mental health problems such as anxiety or withdrawal, and behavior problems such as aggression and delinquency. The severity of the problems was related to the magnitude of prenatal alcohol exposure.²

Few Hoosier women reported using alcohol during pregnancy in 1999. The rate fell slightly to 0.8% in 1999 (down from 0.9% in 1999). While such a change is welcome, alcohol consumption figures for Hoosier women may represent an undercount, since women have been found prone to supplying inaccurate information about use of substances known to affect pregnancy outcomes.

Alcohol consumption varies by the race/ethnicity of the mother. Use of alcohol was more frequently reported by American Indian/Eskimo/Aleut (1.8%) and African-American (1.3%) than for other race/ethnic groups of Hoosier women. Alcohol consumption was more often reported by women aged 20 and older, than by teens.

Smoking during pregnancy³

More than one in five (20.9%) Hoosier women who gave birth in 1999 reported smoking during pregnancy. This figure represents a small, but encouraging decline from the rate of 21.3% in 1998. Hoosier female high-school students are more likely to smoke than students nationally⁴. Likewise, pregnant Hoosier women of whatever age, were much more likely to smoke than pregnant women nationally—20.9% vs. 12.6% in 1999.

Although the smoking rate for all pregnant women declined in 1999, there was no change in the direction of a disturbing trend first noted five years earlier: an increase in smoking among teen-aged mothers. Nationally, earlier increases in teen-aged smoking have begun to have an impact on smoking patterns among 20- to 24-year-old mothers. These same trends have appeared in Indiana: there were slightly higher proportions of 10- through 17-year-olds who reported smoking during pregnancy in 1999 than in 1998.

Women of all ages in different race/ethnic groups had great variation in reported smoking rates: 21.8% of white women; 15.8% of African-American women; 4.2% of Asian/Pacific Island and 5.3% of Hispanic women. American Indian/Eskimo/Aleut women reported the highest rate of all: 32.7%.

Low birthweight

Infants who weigh less than 2,500 grams (5 lb. 8 oz.) at birth are defined as having low birthweight (LBW); infants weighing less than 1,500 grams (3 lb. 5 oz.) are considered to be at very low birthweight (VLBW). An infant may have a birthweight that is low for gestational age or low because of premature birth (i.e., less than 37 completed weeks of gestation). The lower the birthweight, the greater the probability an infant will have neurological and health problems, developmental delays, attention and learning disorders, and behavioral problems.

Below normal birthweight is associated with environmental toxins, the age and race/ethnicity of the mother, her general physical health and nutritional status, oral health, adequacy of prenatal care, maternal behaviors such as drug, alcohol, and tobacco use, multiple births and the spacing of births, and maternal infections such as sexually transmitted diseases. Other infections such as bacterial vaginosis (BV), which affects only women and is caused by an imbalance in the bacteria normally found in the vagina, are also related to pregnancy outcomes. BV has been linked with ectopic pregnancy and infertility, preterm labor resulting in low birthweight, and uterine infections after pregnancy. BV also increases susceptibility to sexually transmitted diseases and HIV infection if the woman is exposed to the virus. Studies have found that bacterial vaginosis is common in women of reproductive age and affects as many as 16% of all pregnant women. Diagnosis and treatment have increased in recent years, but many women remain unaware that this relatively common condition can undermine a healthy pregnancy and birth. Rates of infection vary widely among ethnic groups: six percent among Asians, nine percent among whites, 16 percent among Hispanics, and 23 percent among African-Americans. More research is needed to identify the impact of this disease on the differential rates of low birthweight among the infants of women in different ethnic groups.⁵

Nationally, the percentage of babies born at low birthweight has increased steadily since the mid-1980s (from 6.8%) to 7.6% in 1998 and 1999. Preliminary data for 2000 suggest no change. In Indiana, the percentage of LBW babies increased from 7.7% in 1997, to 7.9% in 1998. In 1999, however, the rate of low birthweight declined slightly to 7.8%.

The late 1990s saw essentially no change in the percentage of babies born at very low birthweight in the nation as a whole; the rate remained at 1.4%, but up from 1.2% in the 1970s. In Indiana, the rate increased slightly between 1998 and 1999—from 1.4% to 1.5%.

LBW is also associated with multiple births. The number of multiple births in Indiana increased by 10% between 1998 and 1999—from 2,533 to 2,787—representing 29.8 and 32.6 per thousand live births, respectively (the rate of multiple births increased by 9.4%). Of the multiple live births in 1999, 2,590 were twins, 178 were triplets, and 19 were quadruplets.

In Indiana in 1999, infant birthweight continued to vary by the age and race/ethnicity of the mother. The younger the mother, the greater the likelihood her child would weigh less than 5.5 pounds. While low birthweight rates among African-American infants born to women of all ages were well above those of any other race/ethnic group, this was particularly true for infants born to teen mothers.⁶

Starting Life

The number of infants born in Indiana has continued to rise since 1995, to 85,489 in 1999, up from the most recent low point of 82,522 in 1994. Births to women younger than age 20, however, have declined again, continuing the trend that began in 1996. There were 11,301 births to women younger than age 20 in 1999—representing 13.7% of all births. In 1999, the birth rate among Hoosier women ages 15-19 declined to an all-time low of 51.3 births per 1,000 females in the age group, down from 64.1 per thousand in 1995. Decline in the teen birth rate (ages 15-19) in the United States also reached an all-time low in 1999, 49.6 per 1,000, and preliminary figures for 2000 show a further decline, to 48.7. Nationally, the decline in teen births began in 1991 when the rate was 62.3 per 1,000. Between 1990 and 1994, Indiana's teen birth rate was below that of the nation; in 1995 the rate jumped and has remained above the national rate since.

- ☞ 165 infants were born to 10- to 14-year-old Hoosier mothers in 1999; 3,528 to mothers' ages 15- to 17; and 7,608 to mothers' ages 18- to 19.

 - ☞ increased public education about HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases,
 - ☞ a focus on males as targets for policies affecting reproductive behavior,
 - ☞ a rise in conservative attitudes toward premarital sex among religious youth, and

☞ an emerging social consensus that non-marital childbearing does not relieve a mother from the responsibility of working to help support her child(ren).¹

A recent national survey asked teens themselves about the primary reason for the decline in teen pregnancy. The most frequent responses were "worry about AIDS/STDs" and that "more birth control or protection is available." Other responses included: increased attention to the issue (14.9%), more parental involvement (8.9%), changing morals and values (5.2%), fewer teens having sex (3.7%), the improved economy (1.9%), and welfare reform (1.0%).²

In Indiana, most of the births to women younger than age 20 in Indiana were first births, although the percentage declines with age (Table 2). More than a fourth of the 18- and 19-year-old women who gave birth in 1999 already had one or more children. A comparison of the 1998 and 1999 percentages reveals that repeat births among Indiana's teens increased slightly between 1998 and 1999.

Rates of reported pregnancies are calculated the same way as age-specific birth rates—the number of occurrences per 1,000 women in the age group. Reported adolescent pregnancy rates are higher than birth rates, but are also declining in both number and as rates. The pregnancy rate among Hoosier teens ages 15-19 was 62.1 per 1,000 young women in 1999, compared with a reported rate of 64.6 per 1,000 in 1998.

Fetal deaths and abortions are the source of the difference between numbers of pregnancies and live births (Table 1).

☞ 11,676 abortions were performed for Hoosier women in 1999—2,322 for women younger than age 20.

The younger the mother, the more likely she was to terminate her pregnancy. Teens reported 14% of the pregnancies and nearly 20% of the abortions. Contrary to public perception, however, teen pregnancies do not account for a majority of abortions performed.³

Non-marital births

Trends in the United States

Historically, the rates of births to women younger than age 20 have been much higher than in the 1990s, but most of these women were married by the time their children were born. In 1970, about one in ten U.S. births (11%) to women of all ages was to an unmarried woman.⁴ While earlier, pre-marital pregnancies usually resulted in a "shot gun" marriage by the time of the infant's birth, since the late 1970s fewer women have been choosing

marriage as an option. In the 1960s, 60% of pre-maritally pregnant women younger than age 30 married; by the 1990s, that figure had dropped to 23%. By 1999, one in three (33%) U.S. births to women of all ages was non-marital.

Teens no longer represent the large proportion of women giving birth outside of marriage they once did. In 1970, 50% of non-marital births were to women younger than age 20; by 1999, the teen proportion of non-marital births had fallen to 29% nationally. Of concern still, however, is the increased likelihood that a woman who has had one non-marital birth will have another. Only 50% of non-marital births to women of all ages were first births in 1999. A majority of non-marital pregnancies were unintended.

Non-marital births in Indiana

Table 3 presents information about non-marital births to Hoosier women in 1999. More than one in three (34.6%) births in Indiana was non-marital—above the figure for the U.S. as a whole (33.0%). In 1998, 33.6% of births were non-marital, compared with 32.8% for the U.S. as a whole. The percentages differ by the age and race/ethnicity of the mother. The younger the mother, the less likely she was to be married; in Indiana, 99.4% of all births to 10- to 14-year olds were non-marital; among 18-19 year olds, the figure had dropped to just below half (48.9%) of all births. The proportion of Hoosier births to women of all ages that were non-marital was much higher for African-American women—77.0%—than for any other racial/ethnic group.

82.8% of all 1999 births in Indiana to women younger than age twenty occurred outside of marriage; for white births, the figure was 79.0% and for African-American births, 97.5%. Asian/Pacific Island women had the lowest percentage (11.1%) of non-marital births, while about half (50.9%) of births to American Indian/Eskimo/Aleut women were non-marital.

Hispanics/Latinos may be of any race, and are included in the previous statistical breakdowns. When separated by ethnicity, 45.2% of births to Hispanic women were non-marital. Between 1998 and 1999, the percentage of non-marital births fell slightly for all racial/ethnic groups but white and Hispanic.

Mortality: Dying Too Young

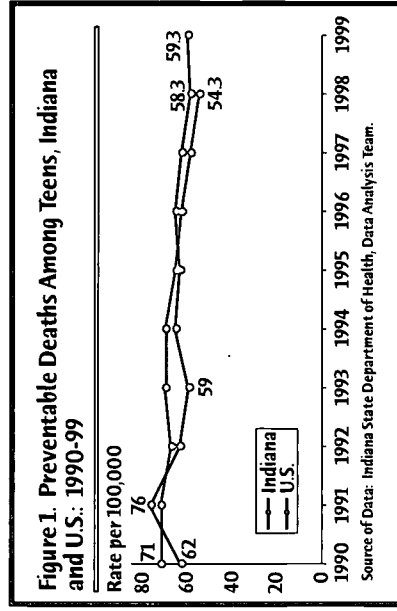
One of the great achievements of the twentieth century was the reduction in infant and child deaths. Yet as we begin this next century, an excessive number of children die too young—some from readily preventable deaths, others from congenital conditions, or from diseases for which preventative measures or cures have not yet been found.

Infant deaths

In 1999, the infant mortality rate in Indiana rose slightly from 75 per 1,000 live-born infants in 1998 to 78 deaths in 1999.¹ For the nation as a whole, the most recent data available from 1998 indicate that the infant mortality rate remains at 72 (the same rate as in 1997).² The general trend in Indiana has continued downward since 1988 when the infant mortality rate reached 11.0. Still, 671 Hoosier infants did not reach their first birthdays in 1999.

Infant mortality in Indiana differs markedly by race. Among white infants, the mortality rate was 6.8 per thousand live births, while among African-American infants, the rate was 17.0—two and one-half times higher than for white infants.

In 1998, when the state infant mortality rate was 76, the most recent national KIDS COUNT rankings placed Indiana 31st among the 50 states (with a rank of one being best).



Child deaths

Deaths among children in Indiana rose slightly in 1999 over 1998 to 275 deaths per 100,000 children ages one through 14. Leading causes of death in this age group were non-vehicular accidents, motor vehicle crashes, cancer, congenital anomalies, and homicide.

In 1998, Indiana's child death rate was 26 and the U.S. rate was 24. Indiana placed 27th among the 50 states in the most recent national KIDS COUNT rankings.³

Preventable deaths among teens

In 1999, there were 336 deaths among teens ages 15-19 from four causes: motor vehicle crashes (128), other accidents (49), suicide (36), and homicide (50). The teen preventable death rate from these causes rose slightly in 1999 to 59.3, up from 58.3 per 100,000 teens ages 15-19 (Figure 1).

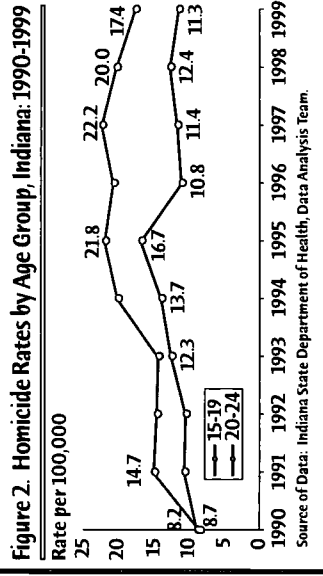
In 1998, Indiana's teen preventable death rate was 59 and the national rate was 54. Indiana ranked 25th among the 50 states.⁴

Homicide Trends. Although there were variations from year to year, the general trend in homicides among teens ages 15 through 19, and young adults ages 20 through 24, was upward between 1990 and 1999 (Figure 2).⁵

In 1999, the homicide rate for teens dropped for the first time in three years to 11.3 per 100,000 youth, ages 15 through 19. The 50 homicide deaths represent a decrease from a rate of 12.4 (55 deaths) per 100,000 in 1998.

The homicide rate per 100,000 young adults ages 20-24 (69 deaths) declined to 17.4 in 1999—the lowest rate since 1994.

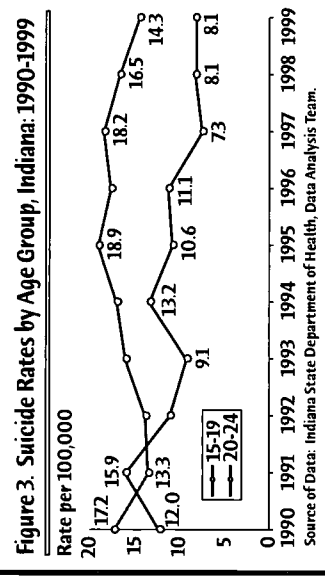
Suicide trends. Deaths from suicide in Indiana have also varied from year to year, but the overall trend



among young adults ages 20 through 24 has been upward, while the trend throughout the decade among teens ages 15 through 19 has been generally downward (Figure 3).⁶

In 1999, the suicide rate for 15- through 19-year-olds was 8.1 per 100,000 youths in that age group, an increase from the lowest rate of the decade, 7.3, in 1997.

Among young adults, the suicide rate dropped to 14.3 per 100,000 persons ages 20-24 (57 deaths). The suicide rate for 1999 was the lowest for this age group since 1993.

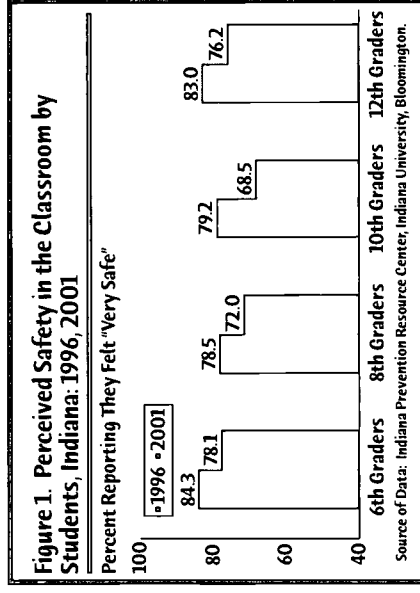

safety, Weapons, and Violence

Through its annual survey of alcohol, tobacco, and other drug (ATOD) use, the Indiana Prevention Resource Center (IPRC) also collects data on Indiana students' perceptions of safety as well as the prevalence of weapon use and violence in their schools. Although the IPRC has been conducting its annual survey since 1991, data on school safety and violence has been collected since 1996. In March and April 2001, the IPRC collected data from 96,079 students in 292 Indiana schools.

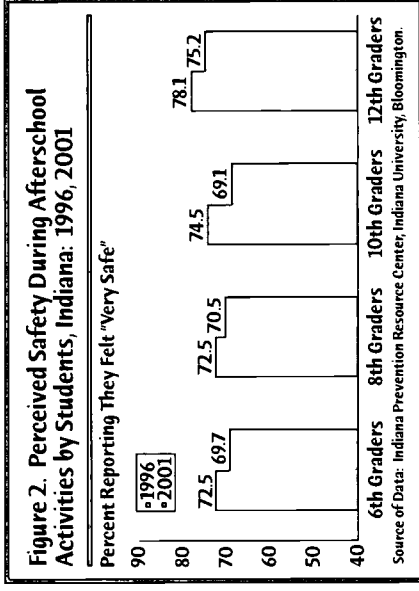
Perceived Safety in School

Overall, most students in Indiana report feeling "very safe" in school. In 2001, 84.3% of 6th graders, 80.6% of 8th graders, 79.2% of 10th graders, and 83% of 12th graders reported they felt "very safe" while in class at school (Figure 1). Approximately 2% of the students in each grade level reported they felt "very unsafe" in class. Data collected in 1996, however, show that students felt safer in the classroom six years ago.



Perceptions of school safety while on campus for afterschool activities are very similar to perceptions of classroom safety. While the majority of Indiana students feel "very safe," fewer students report feeling "very safe" in 2001 compared to 1996 (Figure 2). For example, 74.5% of 10th graders felt "very safe" during afterschool

activities in 1996, but only 69.1% of 10th graders felt "very safe" in 2001.



Guns and Other Weapons at School

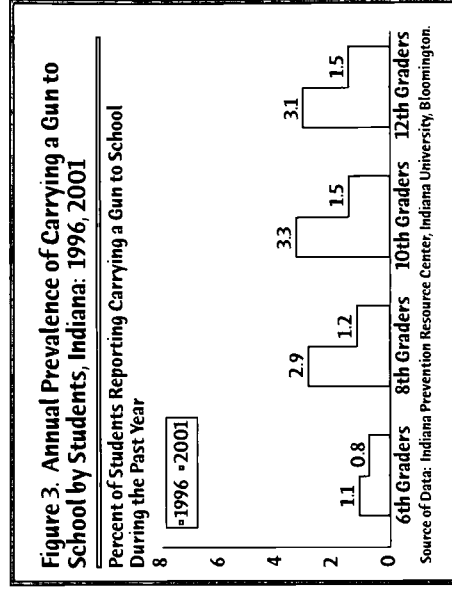
Data on the prevalence of weapons in Indiana schools show fewer students brought guns and other weapons to school in 2001 compared with 1996. While it could be argued that even one student carrying a gun or other weapon to school is too many, these data suggest that far fewer weapons are being brought into Indiana schools now compared with six years ago.

In 2001, .8% of 6th graders, 1.2% of 8th graders, 1.5% of 10th graders, and 1.5% of 12th graders reported they had carried a gun to school during the past year. Within each grade level, these figures represent nearly a 50% reduction from 1996 when the proportions were 1.1%, 2.9%, 3.3%, and 3.1%, respectively. Similarly, the percentage of students who reported carrying a weapon other than a gun to school during the past year has dropped over 50% since 1991 (Figure 3).

Physical Fights and Threats with Weapons

Fewer Indiana students reported engaging in physical fights during the past year in 2001 compared to 1996. In 1996, 40.3% of 6th graders, 42.7% of 8th graders, 33.8% of 10th graders, and 25.3% of 12th graders reported participating in a "physical fight" during the past year. In 2001, those percentages dropped to 36.5%, 38.1%, 29.5%, and 20.9%, respectively.

Despite the recent reductions in the percentage of students who reported carrying a weapon to school during the past year, a number of Indiana youth reported being threatened by a weapon during the past year. In 2001, 8.5% of 6th graders, 8.5% of 8th graders, 9% of 10th graders, and 3.6% of 12th graders reported being threatened by a weapon while on school property during the past year. While comparable estimates do not exist for 1996, data from 1998 indicates those proportions have remained relatively constant over the past three years.

Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drug Use

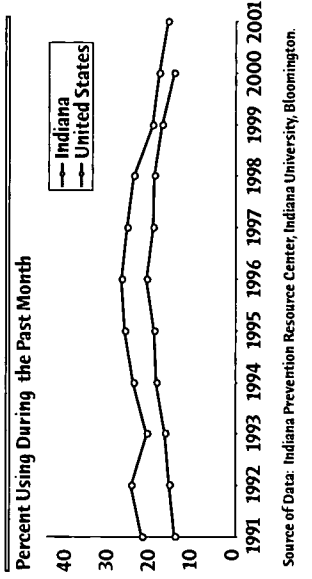
Since 1991, the Indiana Prevention Resource Center (IPRC), with support from the Division of Mental Health and Addiction, has conducted an annual survey of alcohol, tobacco, and other drug (ATOD) use among Indiana students in grades 6-12. In March and April of 2001, the IPRC collected data from 96,079 students in 292 Indiana schools.

The results of this survey over the past 11 years show that, in general, ATOD use among Indiana's youth has decreased for all grade levels. In particular, rates of cigarette smoking and smokeless tobacco use have decreased markedly. Less dramatic decreases have been observed with alcohol and marijuana use. However, despite reductions over the past decade, Indiana's rates of ATOD use continue to remain somewhat higher than national rates.²

Cigarette Smoking

Between 1991 and 1997, smoking rates among Hoosier youth increased to their highest levels of the decade. For example, 41.6% of 12th graders reported monthly smoking in 1997. In 2001, monthly smoking rates among 12th graders dropped to 35.1%. The decrease in smoking rates among middle school students was even more marked, with rates among 8th graders dropping from 27.1% in 1996 to 16.1% in 2001 (Figure 1). Although

smoking rates among youth in Indiana are decreasing, they still remain somewhat higher than national rates.

Interestingly, decreases in youth rates of cigarette smoking in Indiana have been paralleled by increased perceptions of health risks associated with smoking. In 1997, 36.8% of 8th graders, 40.7% of 10th graders, and 44.7% of 12th graders reported smoking a pack or more of cigarettes a day posed a "great risk" to one's health. In 2001, those percentages rose to 47.1%, 53.7%, and 55.9%, respectively. While these data suggest Hoosier youth are becoming better educated about the health risks of cigarette smoking, national data indicate that Indiana's youth still lag behind national trends in their perceptions of risks associated with smoking.

Specifically, national data from 2000 show that 58.8% of 8th graders, 65.9% of 10th graders, and 73.1% of 12th graders reported smoking a pack or more of cigarettes per day posed a "great risk" to one's health.

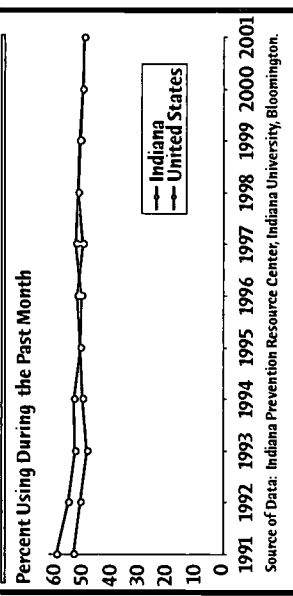
Alcohol Consumption

Alcoholic beverages—which include beer, wine, coolers, and hard liquor—are the most commonly used substances among Indiana's youth. In 2001, 20.3% of 6th graders and 70.5% of 12th graders reported consuming alcohol during the past year. In addition, 9.2% of 6th graders and 49.9% of 12th graders reported consuming alcohol during the past month.

Since 1991, the proportion of Hoosier youth who consumed alcohol during the year or month before the survey has declined at all grade levels. For example, in 2001, 24.7% of 8th graders consumed alcohol during the past month, compared to 33.6% in 1991. Among 10th graders, the proportion dropped from 50.7% in 1991 to 39.1% in 2001. Reductions in alcohol use among high-school seniors have been less dramatic. Monthly rates of alcohol use among 12th graders declined from 1991 through 1996 (Figure 2). Since 1996, however, rates have remained somewhat constant, mirroring rates at the national level.

Perhaps just as important as the consumption of alcohol among young Hoosiers, are behaviors related to drinking and driving. In 2001, 25.9% of 12th graders reported they had driven a car while under the influence of alcohol during the year prior to the survey. Included in that figure are the 8.5% of high school seniors who reported they had combined drinking and driving more than five times during the past year. The 2001 survey also showed that 21.7% of 8th graders, 29.5% of 10th graders, and 33.3% of 12th graders had ridden in a car with a drunk driver during the past year.

Figure 2. Percent of 12th Graders Using Alcohol Monthly, Indiana and U.S.: 1991-2001

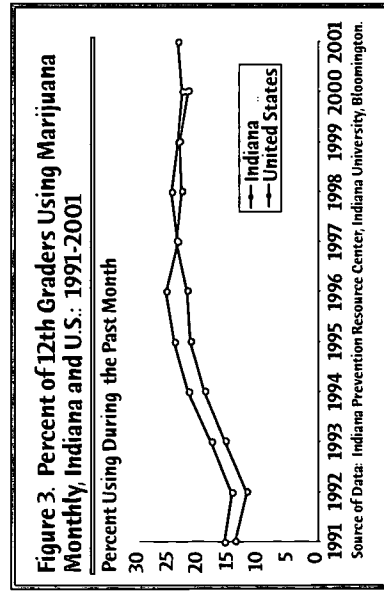


Smokeless Tobacco Use

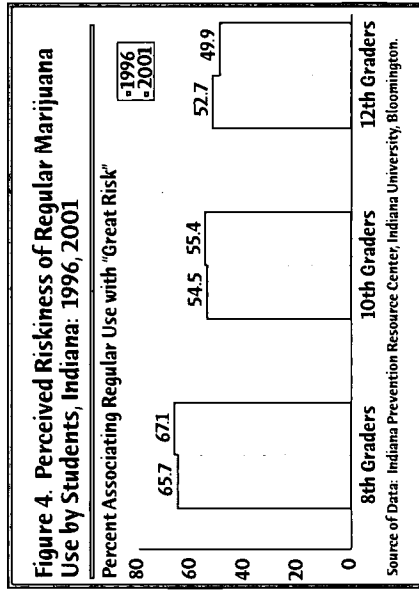
In 1991, smokeless tobacco ranked behind alcohol and cigarettes as the third most commonly used substance by Indiana youth. Monthly rates of smokeless tobacco use among Indiana's 10th graders in 1991 were substantially higher than national rates. In 2001, only 3.5% of 8th graders, 6.9% of 10th graders, and 9.7% of 12th graders reported using smokeless tobacco during the month prior to the survey, rates that are similar to the 2000 national rates. These figures are down sharply from 1991 when the proportions of young smokeless tobacco users were 13.7%, 18.1%, and 38%, respectively.

Marijuana Use

During the past decade, marijuana has been the most widely used illicit drug among youth in Indiana and in the nation as a whole. From 1992 to 1996, marijuana use rates among Hoosier youth increased substantially for all grade levels. For example, in 1992, 14.4% of high-school seniors had used marijuana during the past month. By 1996, that figure had risen to 25.4% (Figure 3) and the decline since then has been only slight. In 2001, 23.5% of 12th graders reported using marijuana during the past month.



The sluggish rate of decline in marijuana use since 1996 has been paralleled by very little change in the perceived risks of marijuana use as well as perceived peer approval of marijuana use, for example. In 1996, 65.7% of 8th graders, 54.5% of 10th graders, and 52.7% of 12th graders reported that smoking marijuana regularly is associated with "great risk" of harm. These figures are relatively the same in 2001 (Figure 4). Additional data collected by the IPRC suggest that young Hoosiers' perceptions about their peers' attitudes toward smoking marijuana haven't changed much since 1996 either. In 2001, 69.7% of 8th graders, 62.6% of 10th graders, and 62.6% of 12th graders reported their close friends would disapprove if they smoked marijuana on a regular basis. With the exception of 8th graders, these proportions are similar to those reported in 1996, suggesting that Indiana's high-school students' attitudes towards regular marijuana use haven't changed much in the past five years.

Adolescent Sexuality

Sexuality education

The National Campaign to Prevent Teen Pregnancy recently conducted a survey among a nationally-representative sample of teens (ages 12-19) and adults, asking for their views on various issues related to adolescent sexuality. More than one-third of teens reported "they have not had even a single helpful conversation with their parents about sex." Yet when asked who was the "most influential" when it comes to sexual decision-making, 38.3% of teens named parents and 31.7% named friends (50% of the adults named friends and 31.7% named parents). While 91% of the adults disagreed with the statement that "sex education is primarily the responsibility of schools," 88% agreed that "parents believe they should talk to their kids about sex but often don't know what to say, how to say it, or when to start." Thus, Americans are faced with dilemma regarding what to tell young people, when and how to tell them, and who should do it.

Students in Indiana currently have varied access to sexuality information. Although the state mandates that students receive education about AIDS, it does not mandate a broader sexuality education. Some school corporations provide it, and some do not. Where sexuality education is provided, parents may request their children be excused. Indiana receives funding from federal and state sources for adolescent pregnancy prevention. Federal funds may be used for programs that teach abstinence only (until marriage) as the sole strategy; state funds may be used for programs that, while stressing abstinence, also provide information about family planning, contraception and/or disease risk-reduction methods.

After a thorough review of the research literature, a recent report by the U.S. Surgeon General concluded that there are effective programs available to community-based organizations, schools, religious groups, and clinics that offer a variety of approaches, but that the limited studies of abstinence-only programs make it too early to draw conclusions about their value. The report also notes that:

Youth development programs, although they typically do not specifically address sexuality, have been shown to have a significant impact on sexual health and behavior. Programs that improve education and life options for adolescents have been demonstrated to reduce their pregnancy and birth rates.¹

The report cites the need to "research, develop, disseminate, and evaluate educational materials and guidelines for sexuality education, covering the full continuum of human sexual development, for use by parents, clergy, teachers, and other community leaders."²

Sexually transmitted diseases (STDs)

A recent national report noted that: "Teens are at high behavioral risk for acquiring more STDs. Teenagers and young adults are more likely than other age groups to have multiple sex partners, to engage in unprotected sex and, for young women, to choose sexual partners older than themselves."³ Nationally, sexually transmitted diseases (including sexually transmitted HIV) cost the nation some \$16.6 billion.

Indiana tracks the incidence of three sexually-transmitted diseases: gonorrhea, syphilis, and chlamydia, as well as HIV (Table 1). The good news is that the total number of diagnosed primary and secondary syphilis cases in Indiana declined between 1999 and 2000. The bad news is that the number of gonorrhea and chlamydia cases rose (Table 1) in the same period. In 1999, Indiana had the second highest rate (76 per 100,000) of primary and secondary syphilis in the nation. With a rate of 50.0 cases per 100,000, Indianapolis topped the list of cities with the highest rates. The primary and secondary syphilis rate for Indiana in 1999 was three times higher than the rate for the U.S. as a whole (2.5 cases per 100,000). Indiana and Marion County have waged vigorous public awareness campaigns since recognizing that syphilis had reached epidemic proportions. Cases of syphilis in Indiana dropped 22%, from 449 in 1999, to 352 in 2000. The number of cases among teens ages 10 through 19 however, increased by 47% from 51 in 1999, to 75 in 2000.

Overall, cases of diagnosed gonorrhea increased nearly 5% from 6,154 in 1999 to 6,445 in 2000. The change for teens and young adults varied; among 10- to 14-year-olds, diagnosed gonorrhea infection rose by 26%. The overall number of diagnosed chlamydia cases rose by 17%, from 11,884 in 1999, to 13,894 in 2000. The numbers of cases among young adults, ages 20-24 rose by 24% between 1999 and 2000.⁴

HIV/AIDS

The numbers of persons with HIV and AIDS infections continued to grow between December 1999 and December 2000. HIV diagnoses increased by 5.4% and AIDS diagnoses by 6.7% in one year. (The HIV and AIDS registries are distinct; when a case meets the surveillance case definition of AIDS, it is moved from the HIV to the AIDS registry.) Nearly half of the cumulative AIDS cases in the nation as a whole have been transmitted by men having sex with men (MSM). In Indiana, the proportion was higher: for 62% of AIDS cases and 60% of HIV cases, transmission was via MSM. Nationally, 10% of AIDS has been transmitted heterosexually; in Indiana, 9% of the AIDS cases and 17% of HIV cases have been heterosexually transmitted.⁵

Table 2 shows the age at which the 3,478 HIV cases and 6,089 AIDS cases had been diagnosed among Indiana residents by December 2000.⁶ By June 2001, an additional 117 cases of HIV, and 151 cases of AIDS were diagnosed. There have been relatively few diagnoses established for children younger than 13. Of these, however, most were children born to infected mothers who transmitted the disease perinatally. Better diagnosis of maternal HIV/AIDS has identified these infants, and better treatment and obstetrical techniques have meant that more of these children do not contract the disease. Understanding the scope of HIV/AIDS in the adolescent population remains problematic. Because symptoms may take years to show up and adolescents are somewhat less likely to receive regular medical care, their disease often goes undiagnosed. It is believed that many of the persons who receive diagnoses in their 20s and early 30s actually contracted HIV as adolescents.

Juveniles and the Law

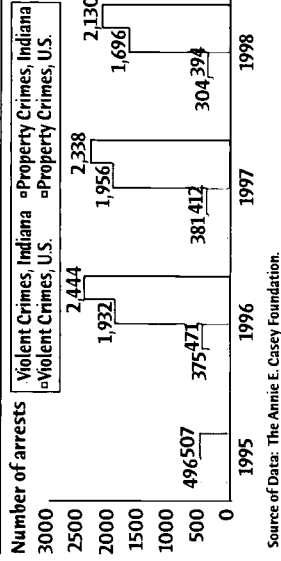
The F.B.I. Uniform Crime Report (UCR)

The Federal Bureau of Investigation publishes an annual compilation based on their uniform system of voluntary crime reporting from the nation's 16,500 law enforcement jurisdictions. Nationally, UCR arrest data are used to chart trends in crime. These data have several limitations, including that they only record the most serious crime committed and do not differentiate multiple arrests for the same individual, multiple arrests for a single crime, nor the disposition following arrest. Furthermore, Indiana remains one of a few states that do not mandate reporting to the F.B.I., and in any given year, about a third of the state's arrest data are missing—and not the same third in any given year. The published annual UCR report, *Crime in the United States*, contains adjusted figures. The figures for Indiana are consistently inflated by the urban bias that results from better reporting from jurisdictions in the state's largest cities. Indiana is not the only state with incomplete data. The National Archive of Criminal Justice Data (NACJD) at the University of Michigan has refined the methodology for adjusting for missing data. The adjusted estimates for 1998 (the most recent year for which data are available) show a decline in Indiana's juvenile arrest rates from 1997, and that Indiana's rates are again below the rates for the nation as a whole (Figure 1).¹

☞ In 1998, an estimated 304 per 100,000 juveniles (ages 10-17) were arrested for violent crimes (homicide, rape, assault, and robbery) in Indiana. The U.S. violent crime rate was 394 per 100,000. In 1997, the juvenile violent crime arrest rate in Indiana was 381 per 100,000 and for the U.S., was 412 per 100,000.

☞ The rate of estimated juvenile arrests for property crimes (burglary, larceny-theft, motor-vehicle theft, and arson) was 1,696 per 100,000 in Indiana compared with a U.S. rate of 2,130 per 100,000. The respective property crime arrest rates in 1997 were 1,956 and 2,338 per 100,000.

Commitment to the Department of Correction

Young people who have run afoul of the law are detained in many local and county facilities across the state. Only a small proportion of the total number of delinquent and status offenders is committed to the Indiana Department of Correction. Commitment may be the outcome of a single serious offense, but more likely it comes at the end of a long, troubled road which other institutions—family, school, faith communities, and social services agencies—have failed to alter.

☞ There were 2,036 youths committed to the Indiana Department of Correction in 2000—up two percent from the 1,991 committed in 1999, but below the high of 2,182 committed in 1998.⁴

☞ In January 2001, there were 1,382 juveniles incarcerated in the Department of Correction's 10 facilities. The average per diem cost per juvenile was \$122.08, which amounts to more than \$61.58 million annually. Tabulating only the most serious offenses, it was reported that 37% had committed a property offense and nearly 31%, a crime against another person; 8.6% of the juvenile offender population had one or more drug offenses.⁵

Indiana Judicial Report

The annual judicial report issued by the Division of State Court Administration provides another source of information about Hoosier juveniles and the law.² These data also have limitations. In many instances, it is the judge who decides whether a juvenile is to be charged with a delinquency or status offense or is to be a "Child in Need of Services" (CHINS). Further, the report does not provide information about the outcomes of the cases filed. In the absence of better data, we continue to use this information to chart trends.

☞ The number of juvenile delinquency cases filed declined for the third successive year to 24,643 in 2000, down 14.4% from the high number of 28,775 such cases filed in 1997.

☞ After falling for two years, case filings for status offenses rose by 3.3% between 1999 and 2000—to 6,033. This number was still below the peak of 6,069 status cases filed in 1997.

☞ 8,080 CHINS filings were made in 2000, continuing the consistent upward trend from 1989, the first year for which we have data. Since 1997, CHINS filings have increased 179% (from 6,854).³

Afterschool Time

Through its annual survey of alcohol, tobacco, and other drug (ATOD) use, the Indiana Prevention Resource Center (IPRC) also collects data on Indiana students' participation in afterschool activities. The data are collected by having students report the estimated number of days per school year they spend engaging in various afterschool activities.

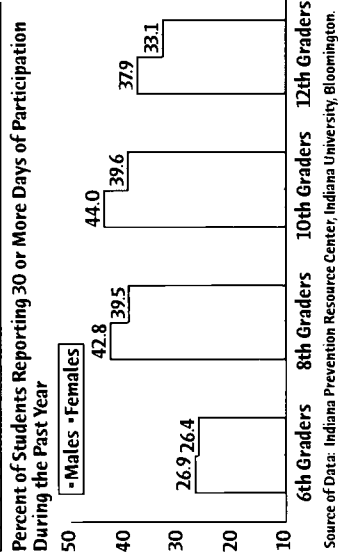
In March and April 2001, the IPRC collected data from 96,079 students in 292 schools. The 2001 data from the IPRC illustrates a number of trends in how young Hoosiers spend their afterschool time. A summary of their findings appears in Table 1.

Regular participation in school sports increases during middle school and the first two years of high school. Rates of participation in school sports taper off slightly after 10th grade. Data from the IPRC indicate that at least half of 6th, 8th, and 10th graders spent some time during the past year participating in school sports during their afterschool hours. The slight decline in sports participation for high school seniors may be related to the greater proportion of 12th graders who worked outside the home for pay.

Male and female students report equal levels of regular participation in sports in 6th grade, but slightly more males participate regularly in sports in middle school and high school. Participation in school sports was the most common supervised afterschool activity reported by Hoosier students. Among 6th graders, nearly equal proportions of male and female students reported regular participation (defined as at least 30 days out of the school year). Approximately 4-6% more males than females in 8th, 10th, and 12th grade reported regular participation in sports (Figure 1).

Regular participation in supervised youth activities (such as 4-H, Little League, and Scouts) decreases about 50% between 6th and 12th grade. In 2001, 14.5% of 6th graders reported participation in supervised youth activities for at least 30 days out of the school year. During the same year, 6.4% of high-school seniors reported regular participation in the same type of activities.

Figure 1. School Sports Participation During the Afterschool Hours, by Gender, Indiana: 2001

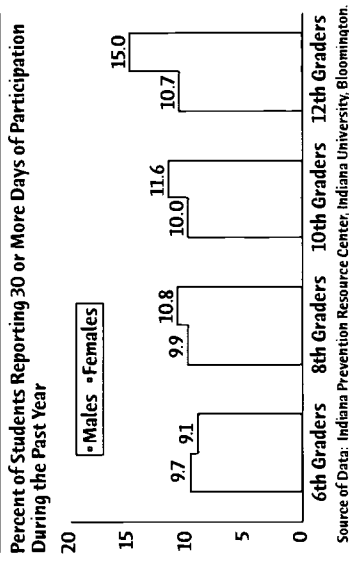


Equal proportions of male and female students regularly volunteer outside the home in 6th and 8th grades. However, more females regularly volunteer while in 10th grade, and do so even more during the 12th grade. In 2001,

approximately 10% of 6th and 8th grade boys and girls regularly volunteered outside the home after school. Among 10th graders, however, slightly more females than males (11.6% versus 10%) spent more than 30 days volunteering during the school year. Among 12th graders the difference between females and males is more marked: 15% of females regularly volunteer compared with 10.7% of males (Figure 2).

The percentage of young Hoosiers who spend regular time working outside the home increases significantly from middle school to high school, with nearly two-thirds of high-school seniors regularly working outside the home in 2001. In 2001, 13.2% of 6th graders, 21.6% of 8th graders, and 42.5% of 10th graders reported working outside the home 30 or more days during the school year. High-school seniors had the highest rates of out-of-home employment, with 64.7% of 12th graders regularly working outside the home.

The percentage of Indiana youth who regularly spend time at home alone unsupervised by adults increases as students get older. In 2001, 26.3% of 6th graders regularly spend time at home alone unsupervised by an adult. There is a sharp increase between 6th and 8th grade with 46.7% of 8th graders regularly spending time at home unsupervised by adults. Among 10th and 12th graders, roughly equal proportions regularly spend unsupervised time at home (56.9% and 59.3% respectively).

Racial/Ethnic Child Characteristics of Indiana's Child Population

All race and ethnicity data come from the 2000 Census. The 2000 Census was the first to allow respondents to identify themselves and other household members with

more than one race. Therefore, racial characteristics of Indiana's children from the 2000 Census are not directly comparable with 1990 Census data. It should also be noted that "White", "Black", "Asian", etc. are racial categories, while "Hispanic" and "Non-Hispanic" are ethnicity categories. Therefore, children can be of any race and of either "Hispanic" or "Non-Hispanic" origin.

White only – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as "White" and no other race. These children were also identified as "non-hispanic".

Black only – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as "Black" and no other race. These children were also identified as "non-hispanic".

Asian only – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as "Asian" and no other race. These children were also identified as "non-hispanic".

NHOPI only – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as "Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander" and no other race. These children were also identified as "non-hispanic".

American Indian or Alaska Native – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as "American Indian or Alaska Native" and no other race. These children were also identified as "non-hispanic".

Two or more races – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as being of more than one race. These children may be of two races (e.g., white and black), or they may be of more than two races (e.g., White, Black, and Native American). These children were also identified as "non-hispanic".

Hispanic – The percent of children age 0-17 who were identified in the 2000 Census as being of Hispanic origin. These children may be of any of the above racial categories.

Total # Teen Deaths by Accident, Homicide, and Suicide (CY) – The number of deaths among teens age 15-19 due to accident, homicide, and suicide in 1990 and in 1999. Deaths are reported by place of residence, not place of death.

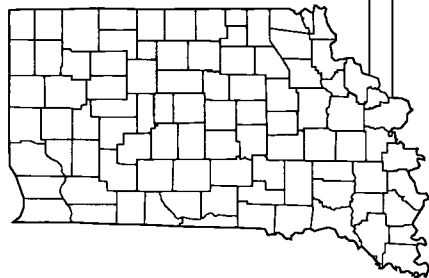

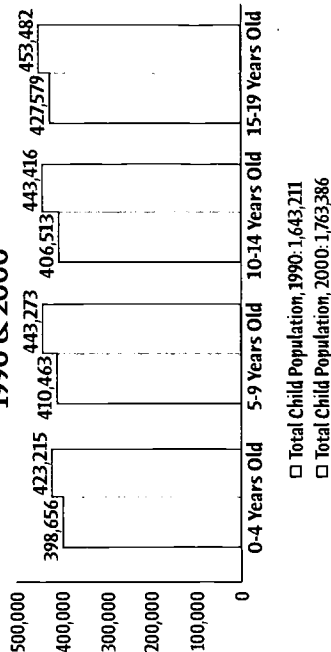

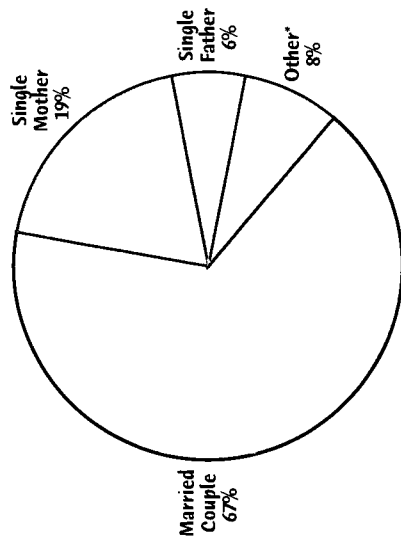

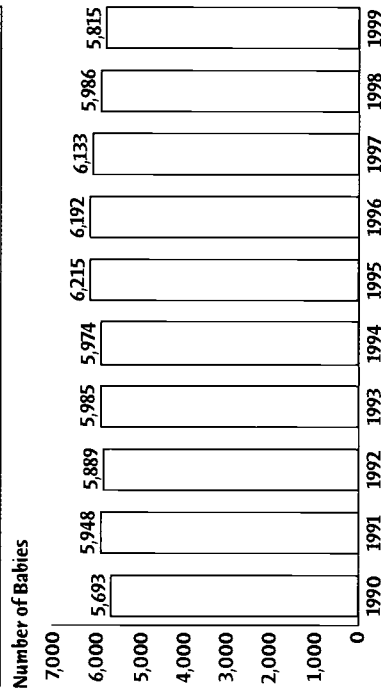

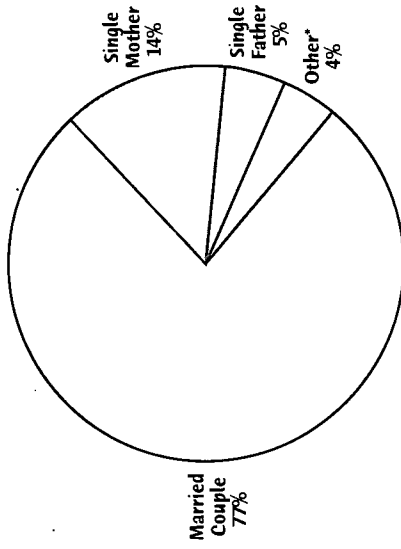

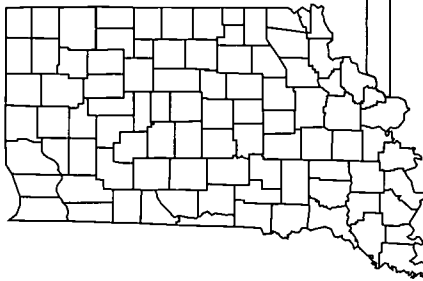

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



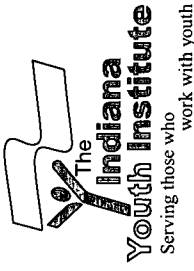

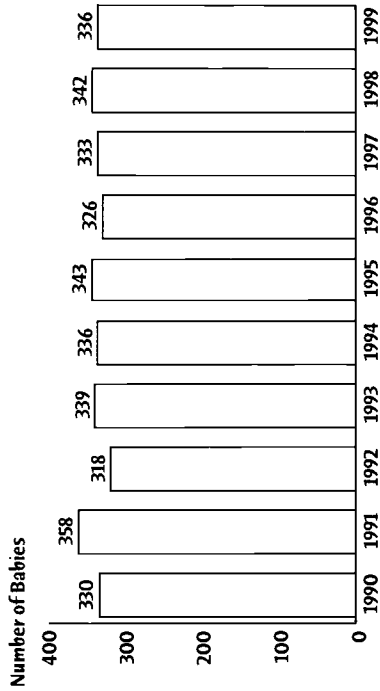

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



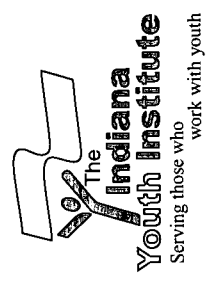

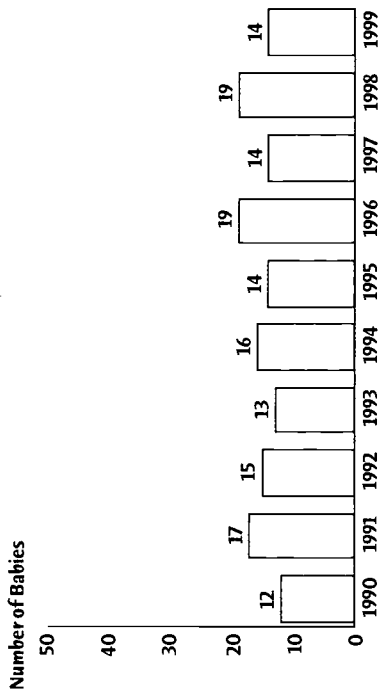

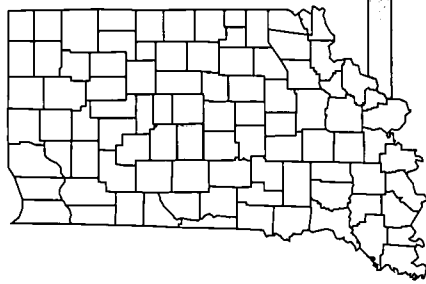
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

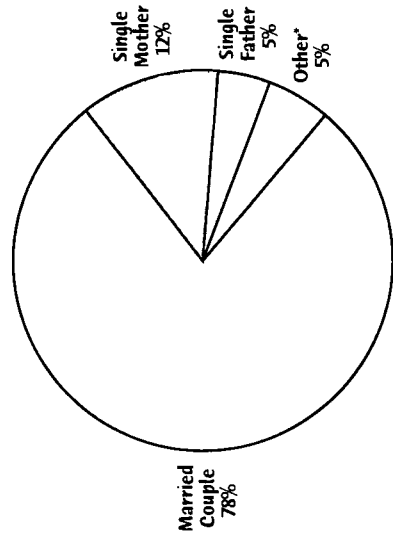

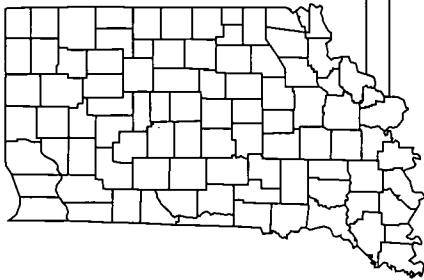

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

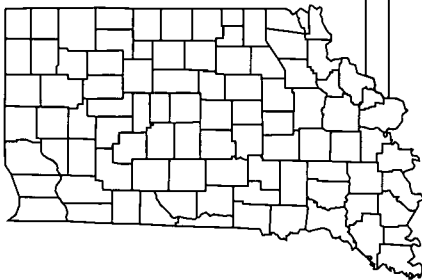

Number of Children Under the Age of 20 1990 & 2000



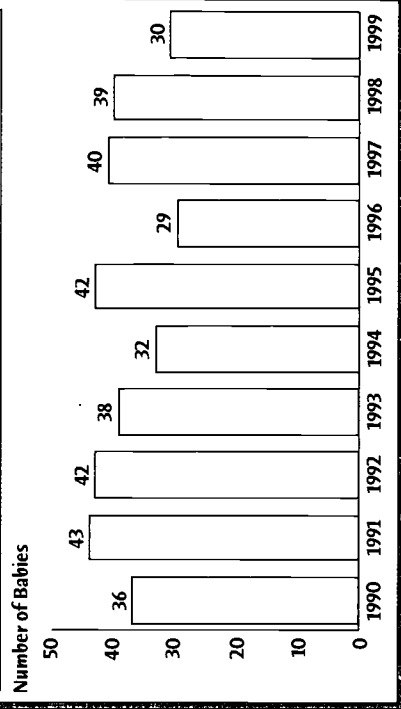

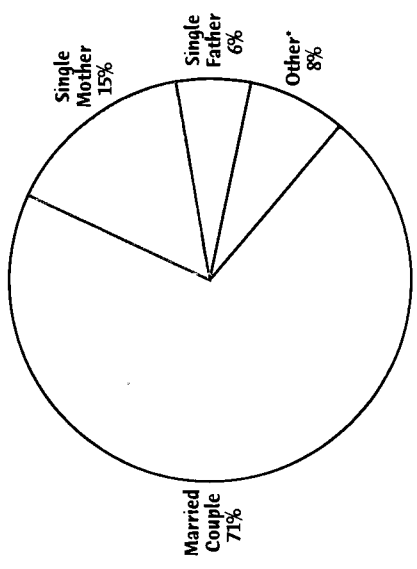

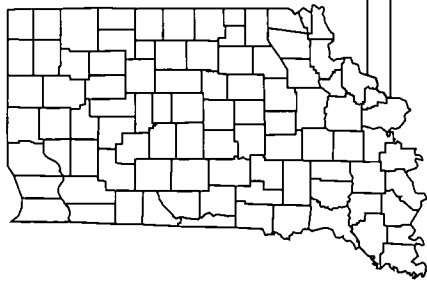
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

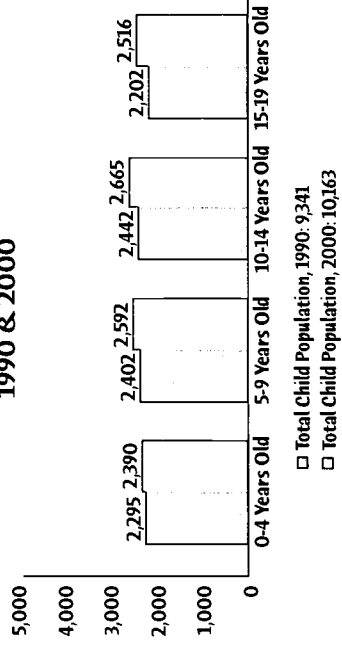

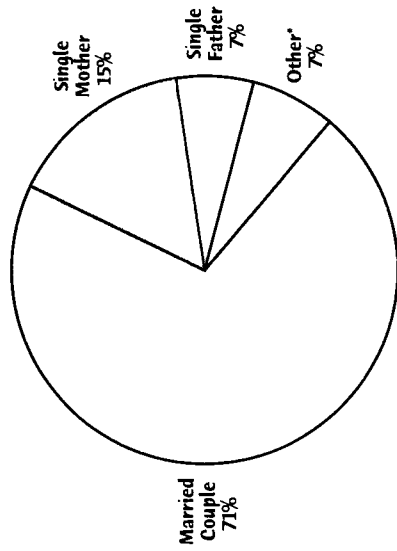

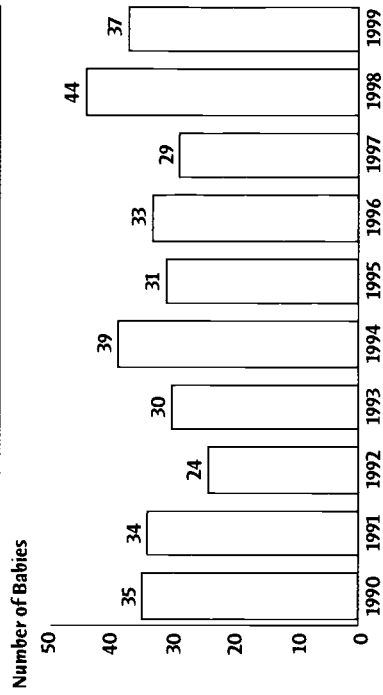

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



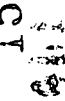

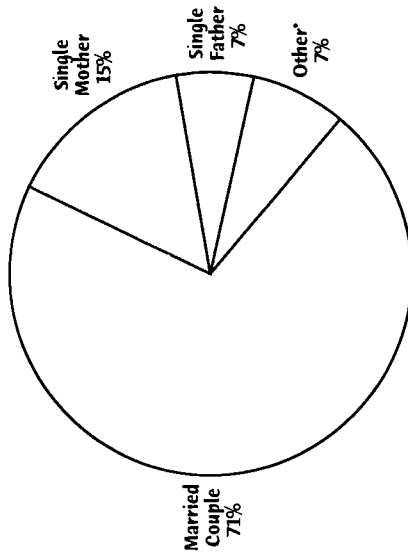

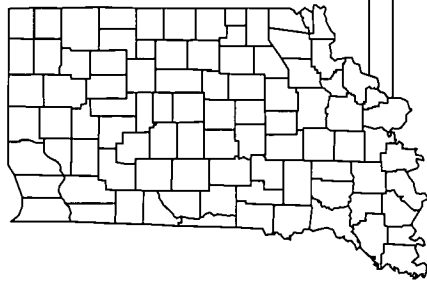

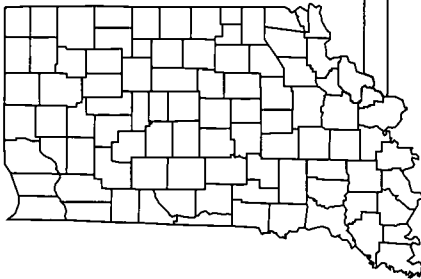
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

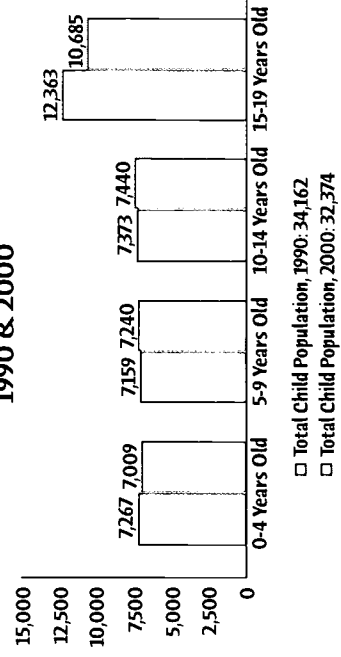

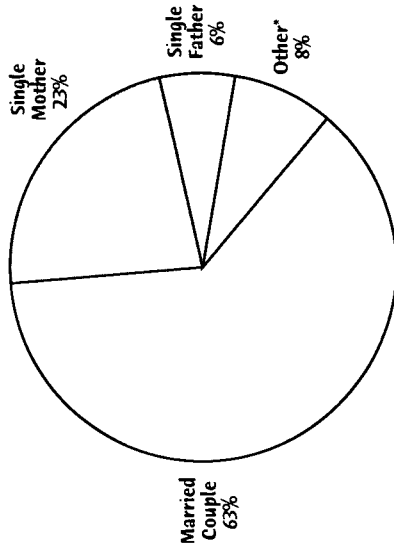

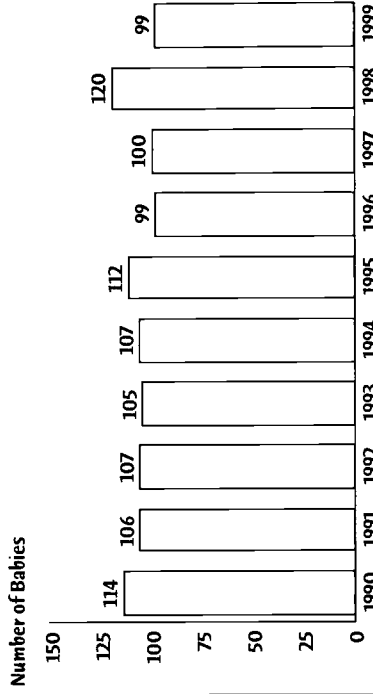

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



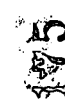
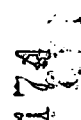

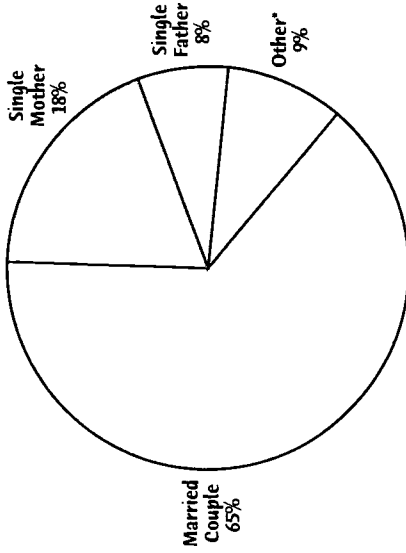

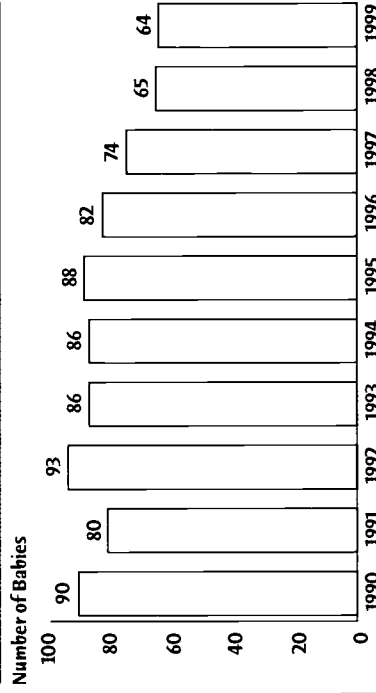

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



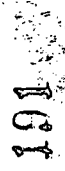

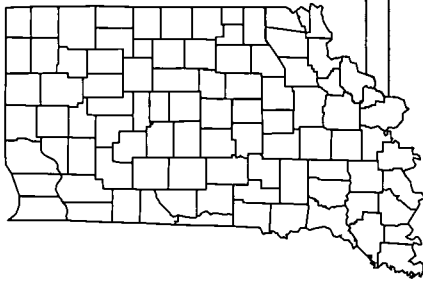
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

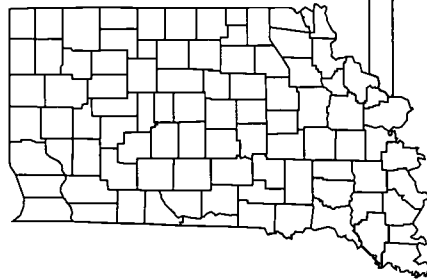

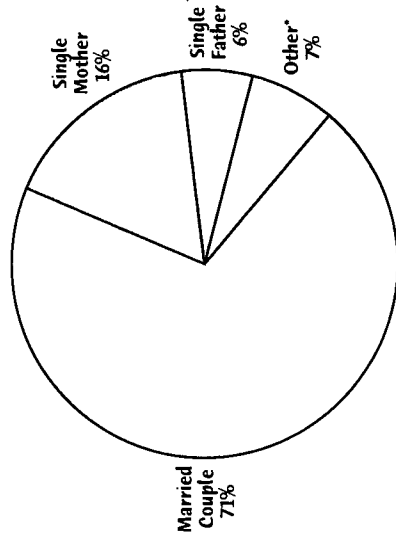

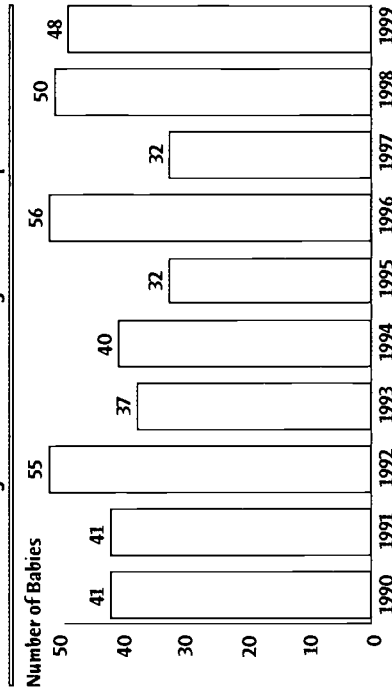

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



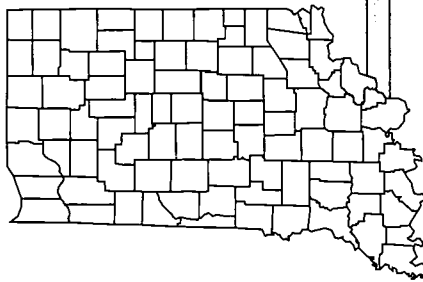

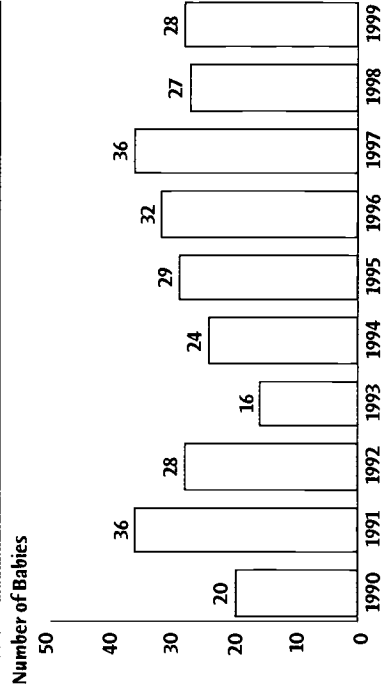

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



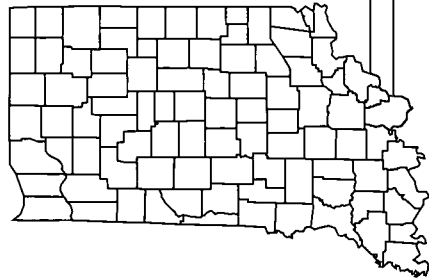

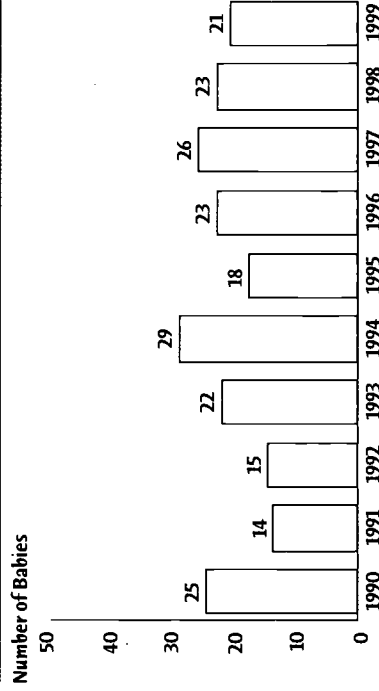
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



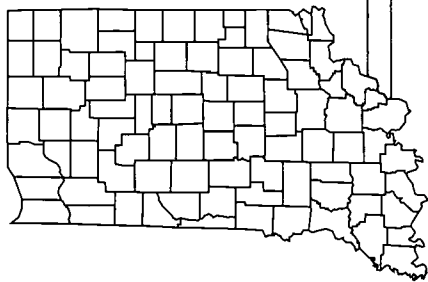

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

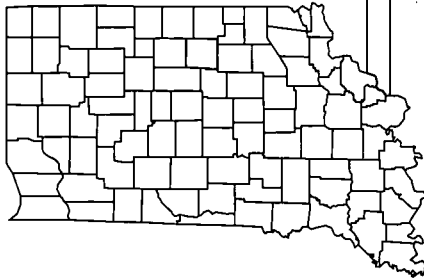

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



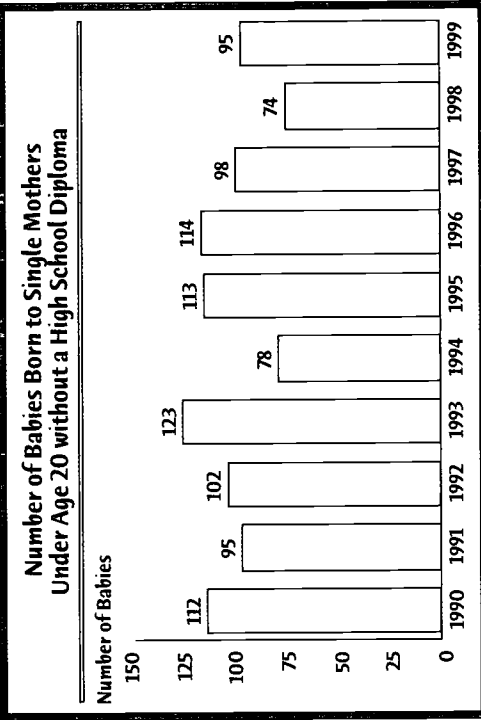

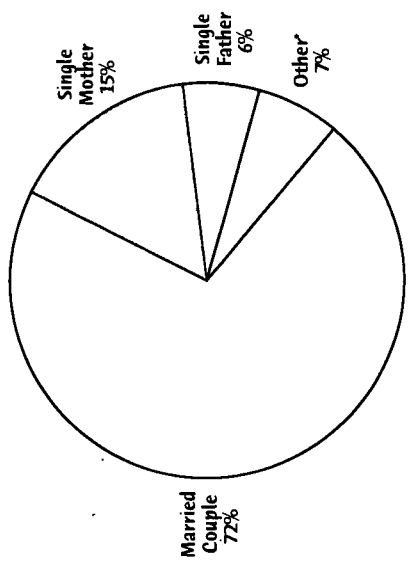

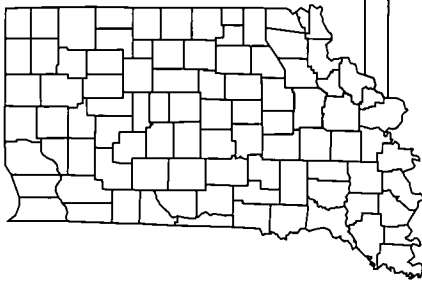

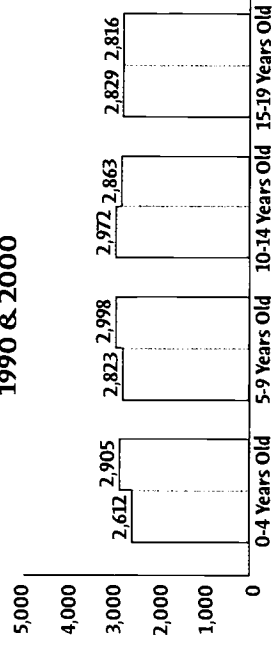

Number of Children Under the Age of 20 1990 & 2000



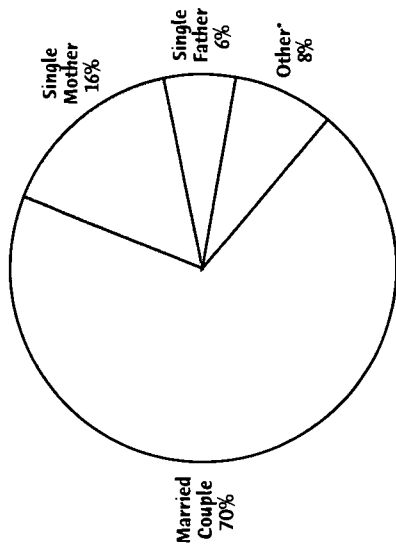

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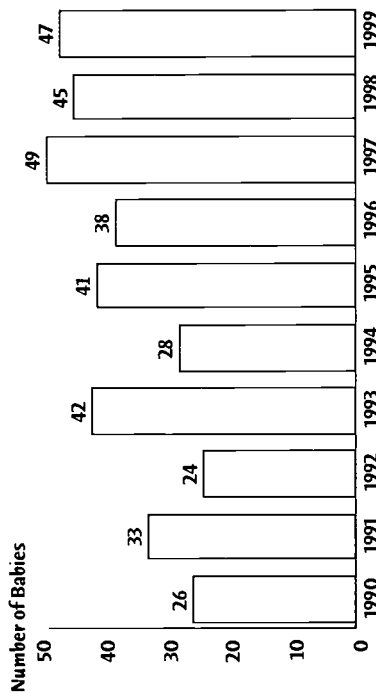

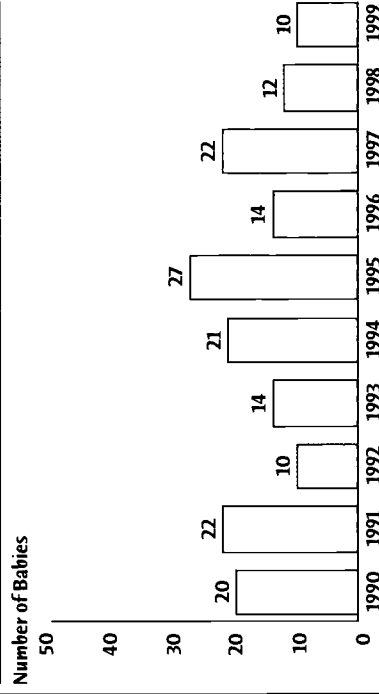

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



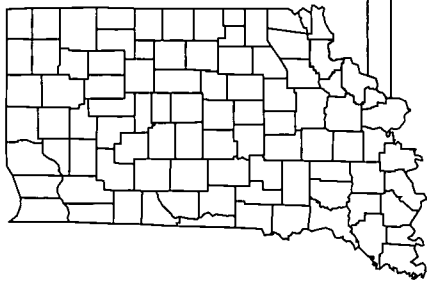

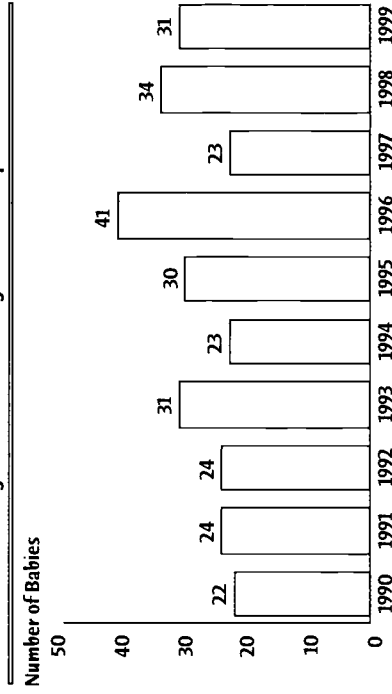

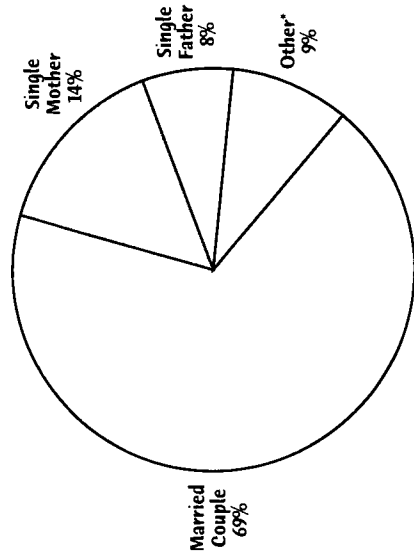

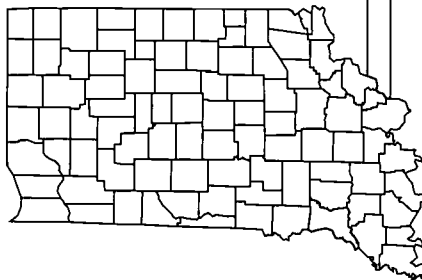

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



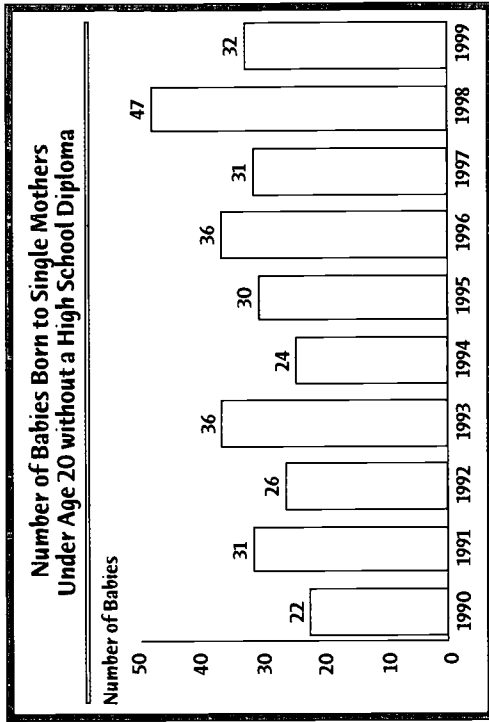

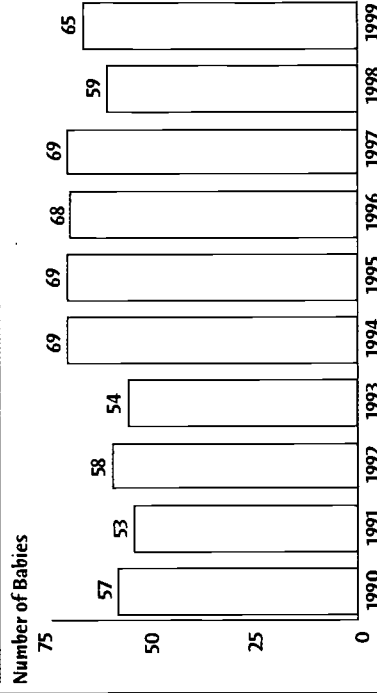

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



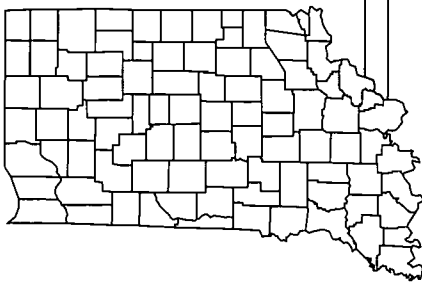

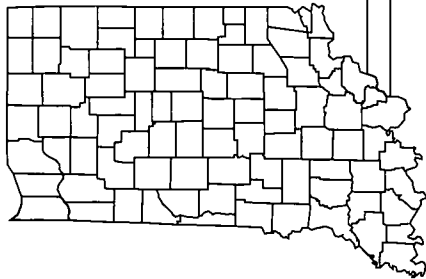
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

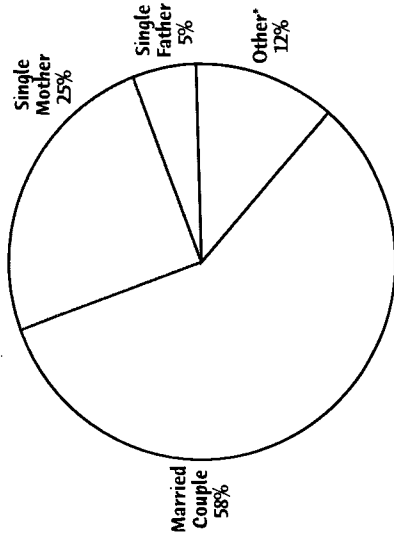

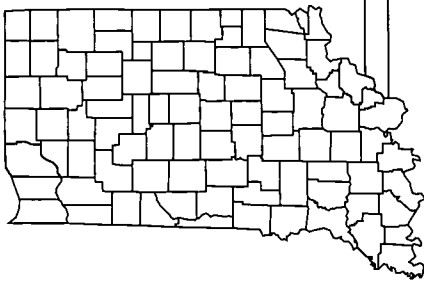
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

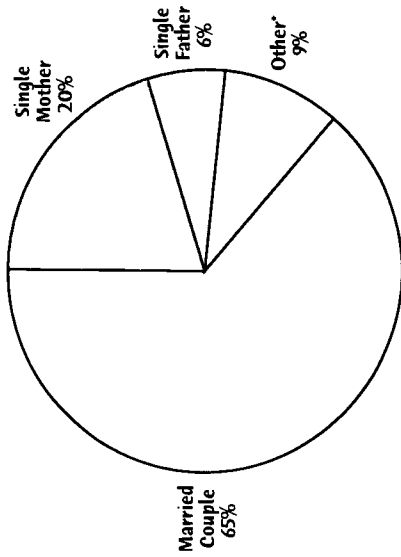

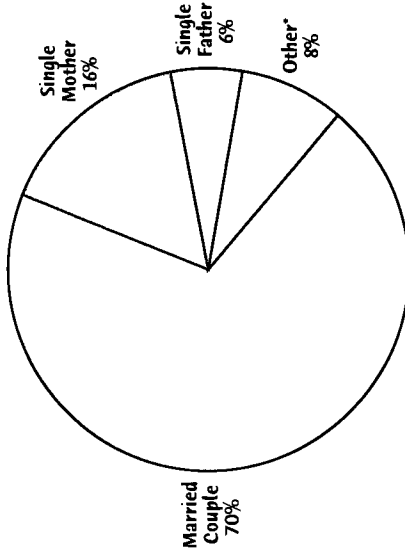

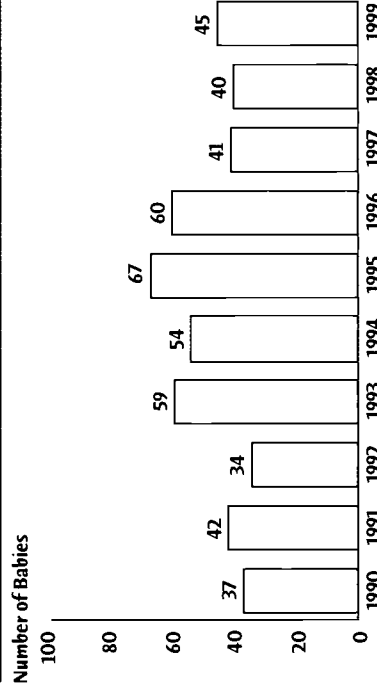
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



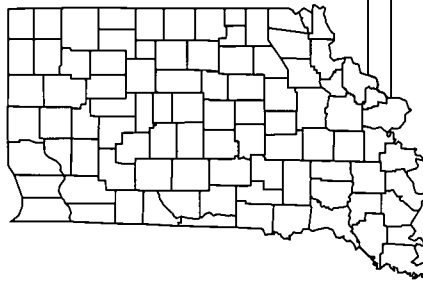

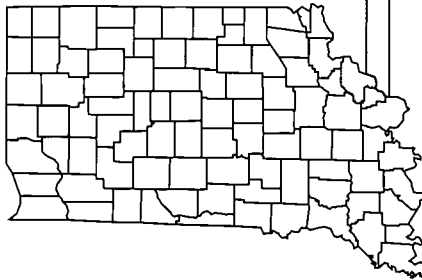

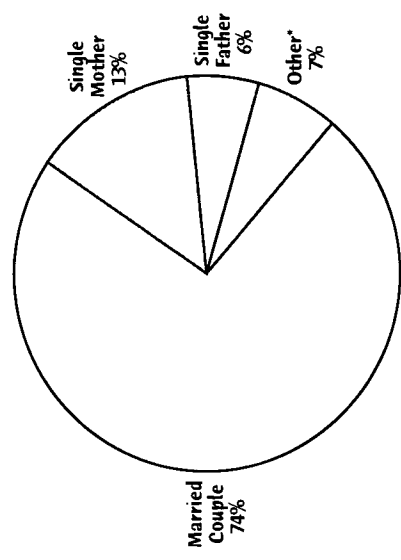

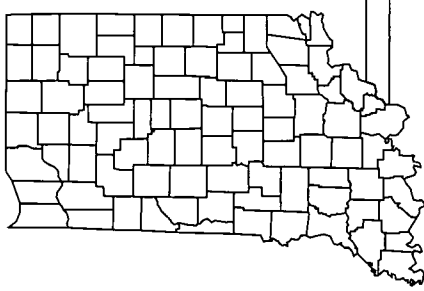

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

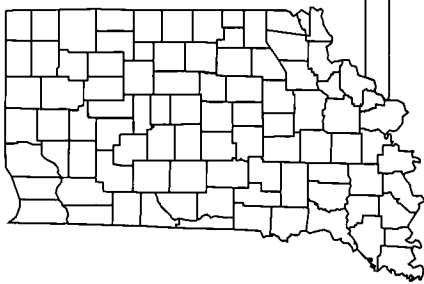

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



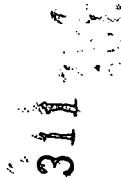

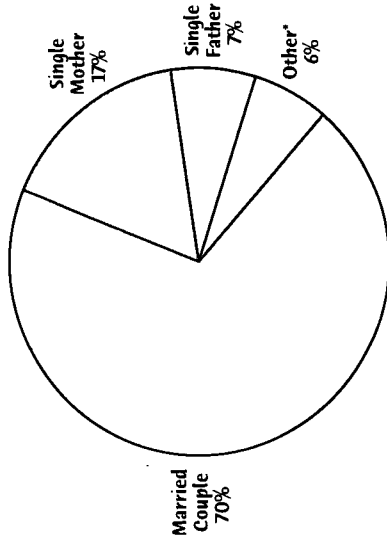

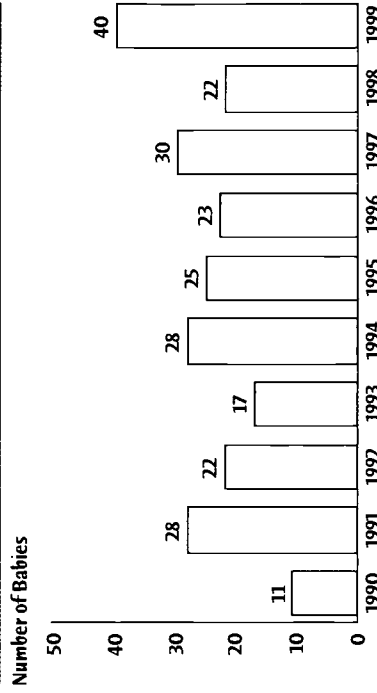

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



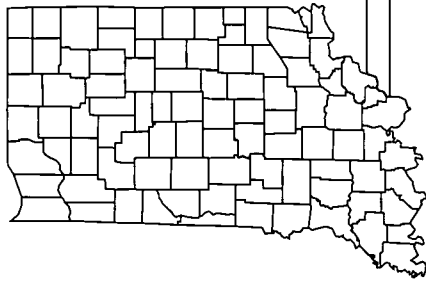

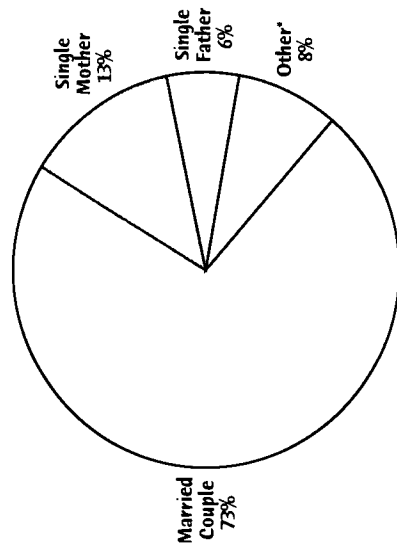

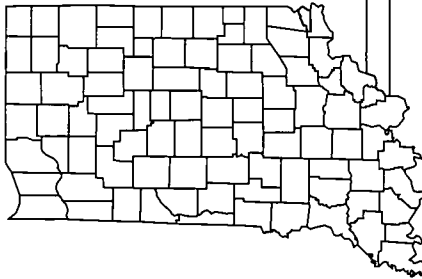
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

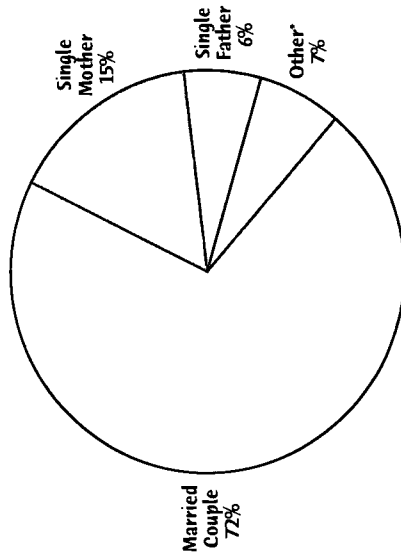

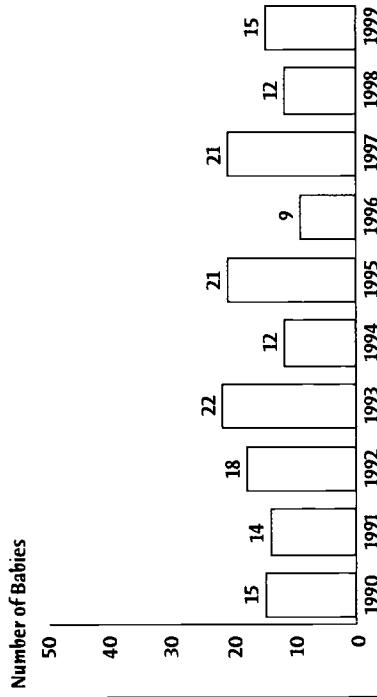

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

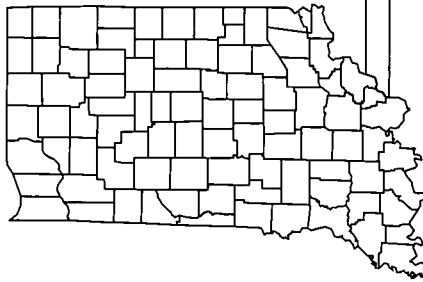

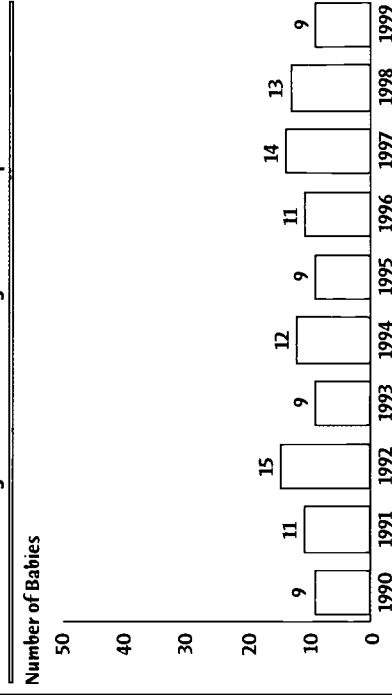

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



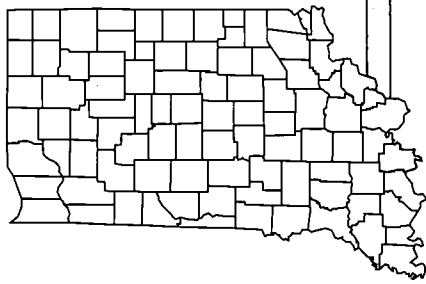

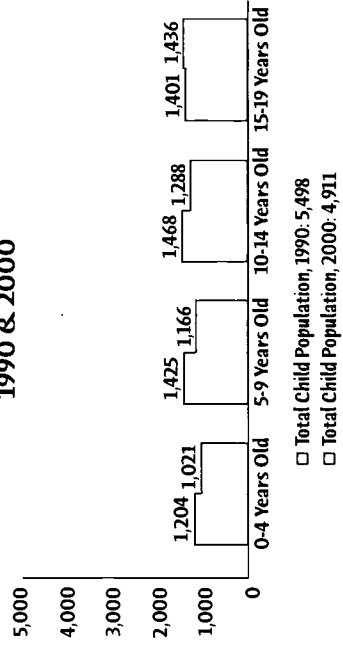

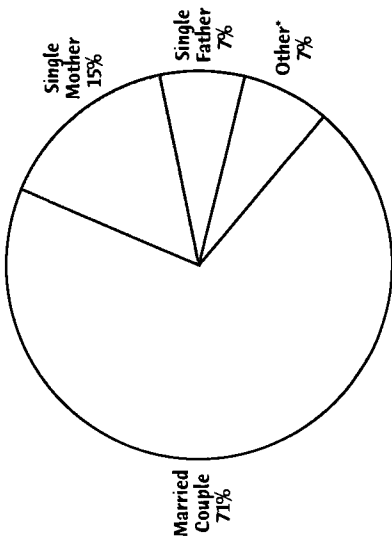

Number of Children Under the Age of 20 1990 & 2000



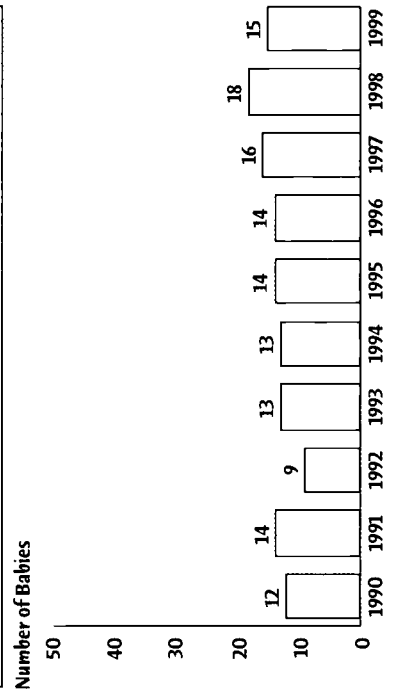
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000

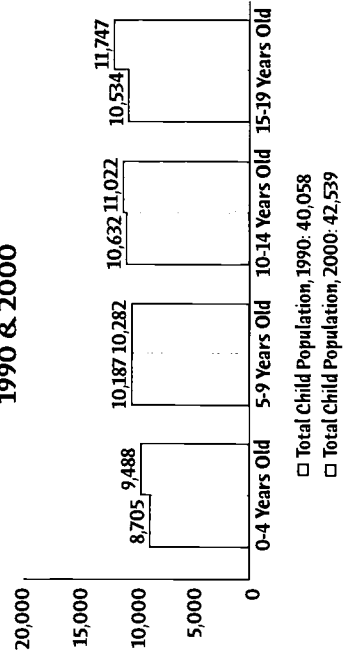

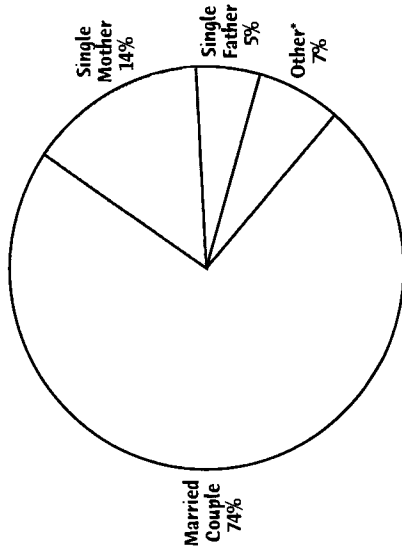

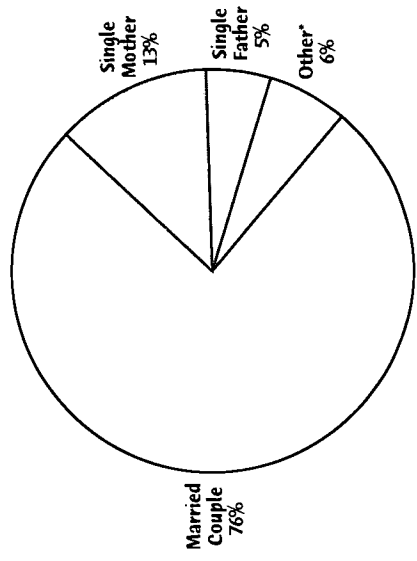

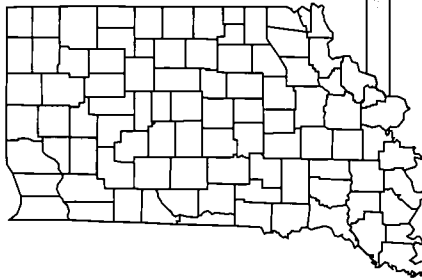

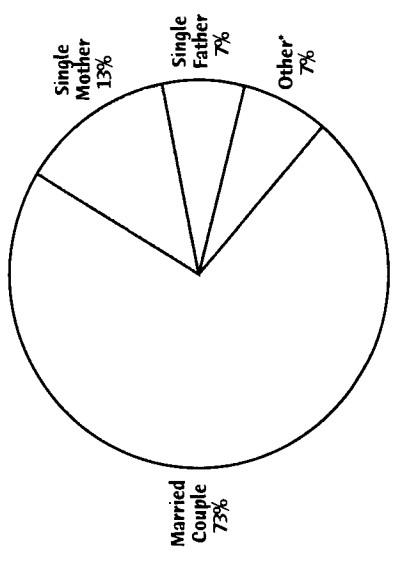

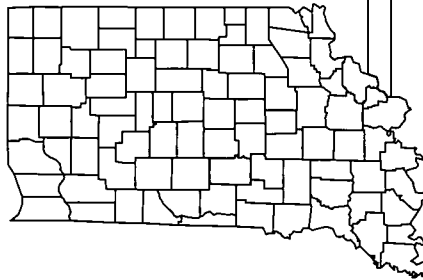

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

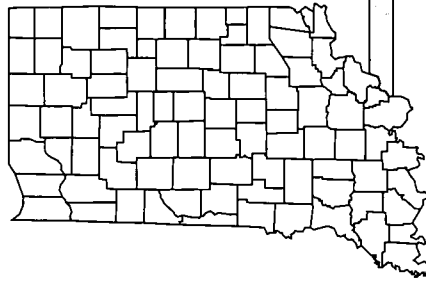

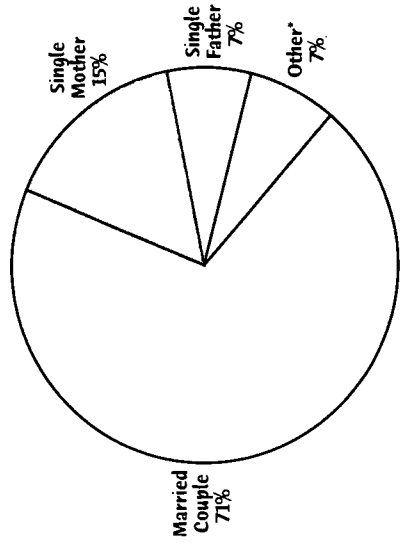

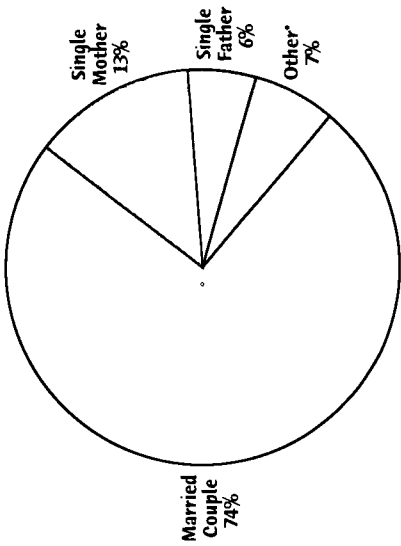

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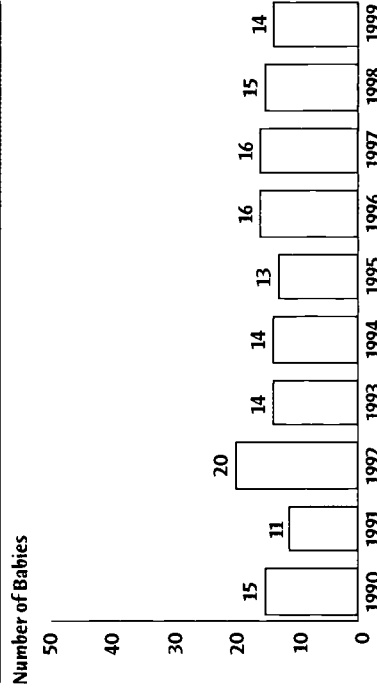
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000

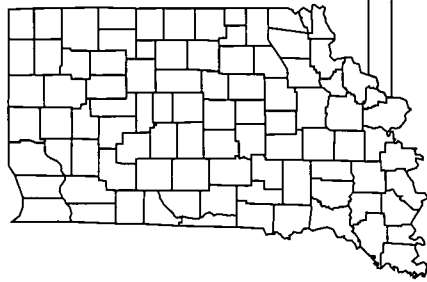
Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma

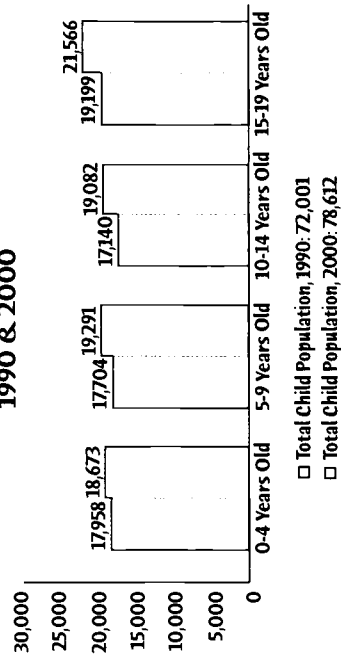

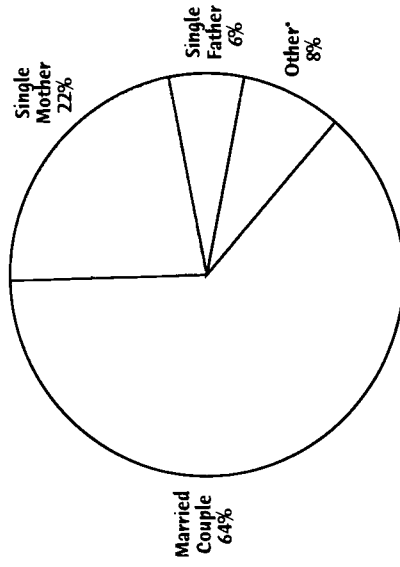

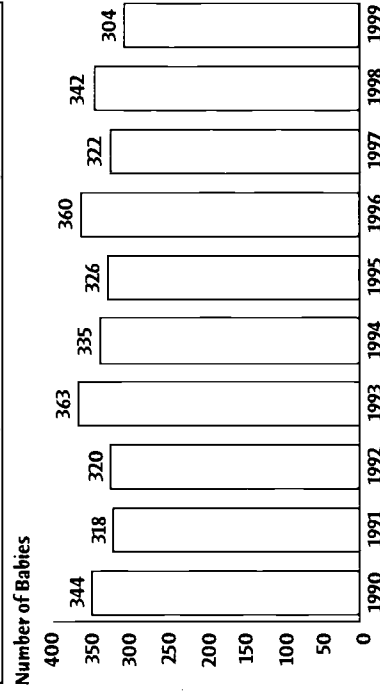

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



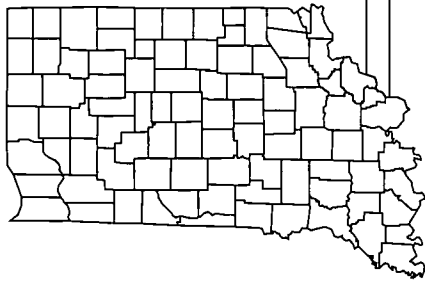

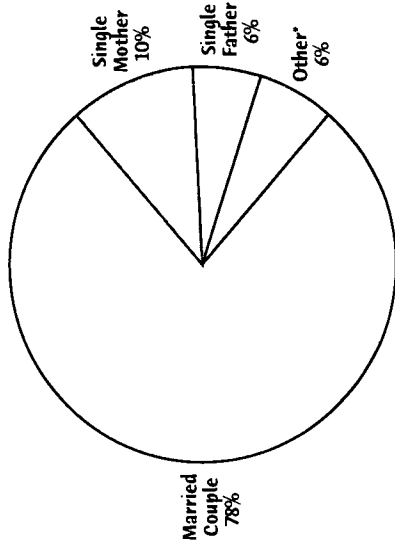

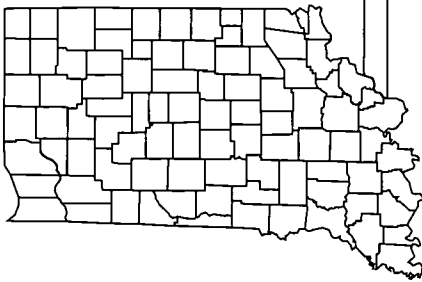

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



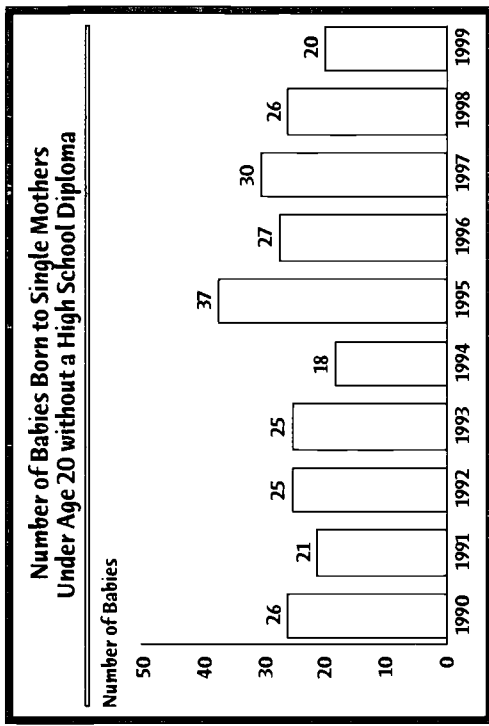

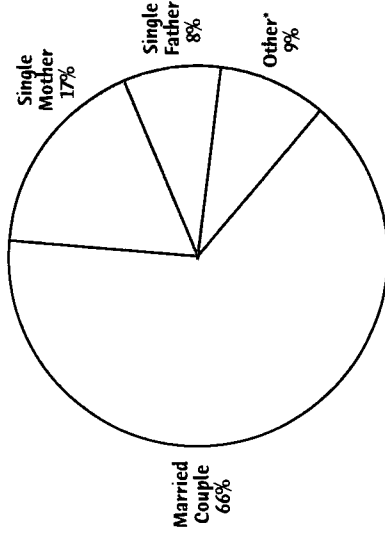

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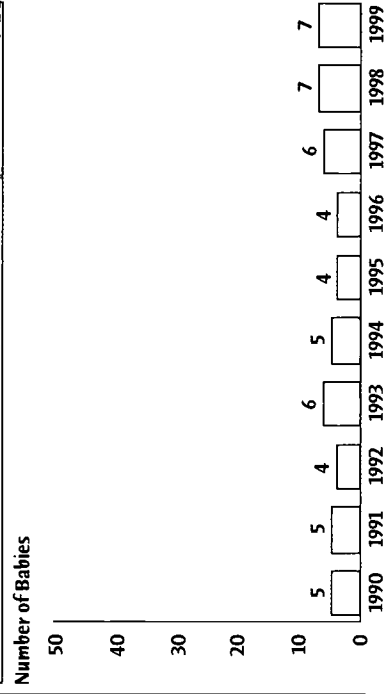
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



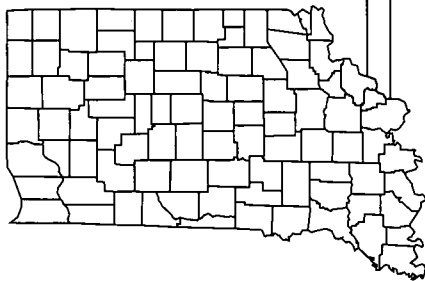

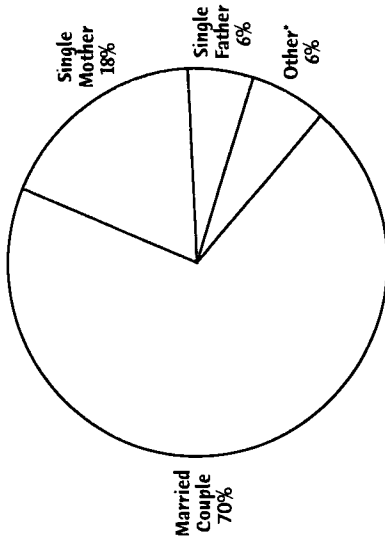

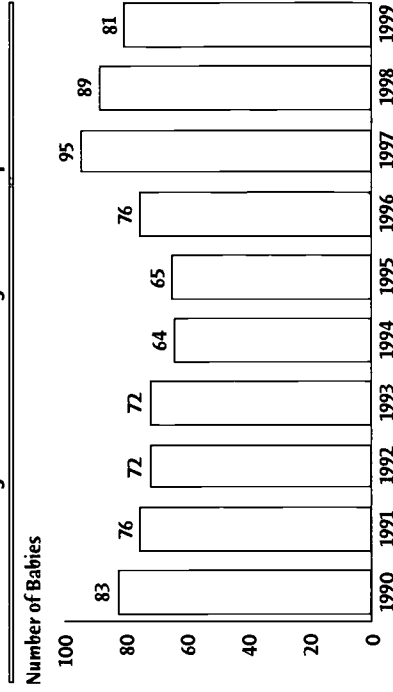

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



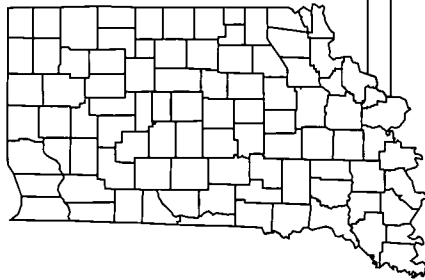

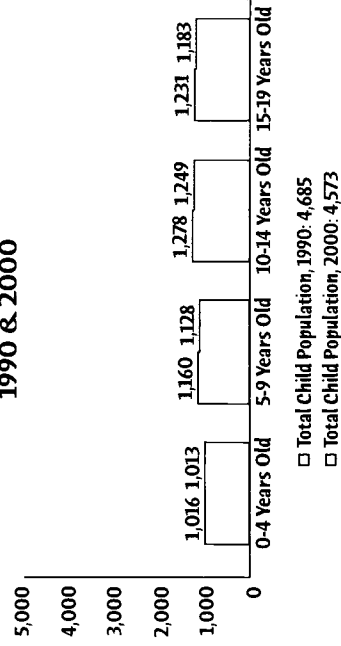

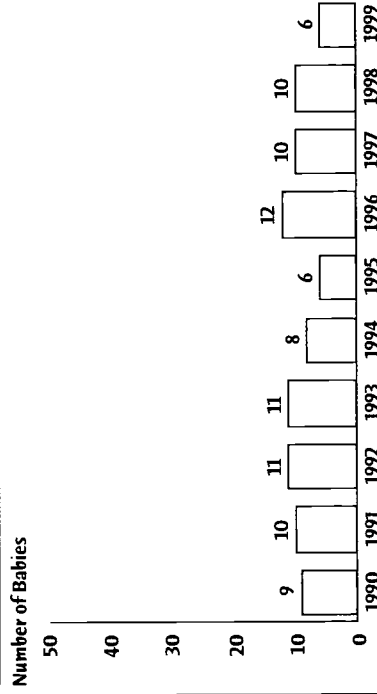

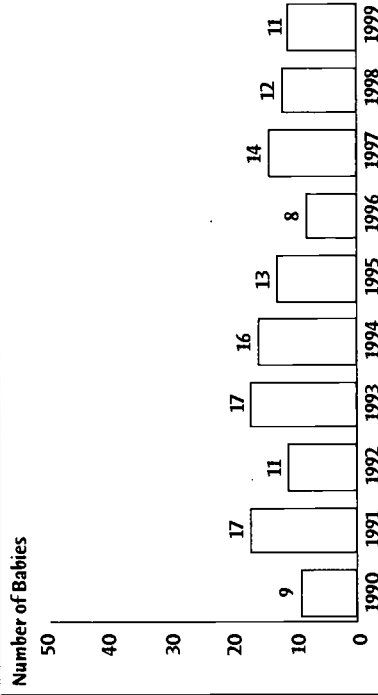

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



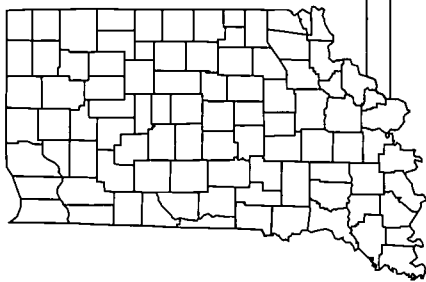

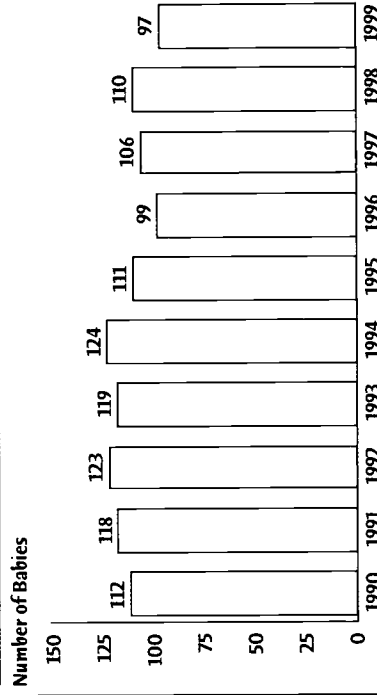

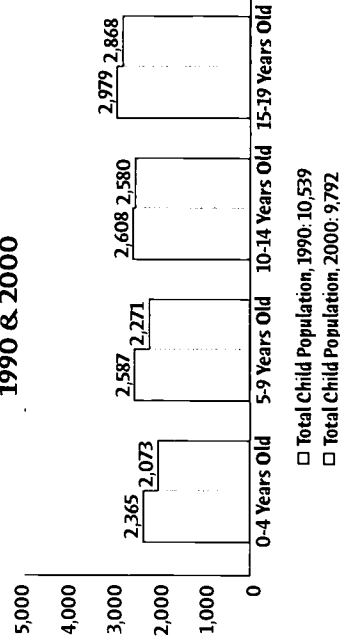

Number of Children Under the Age of 20 1990 & 2000

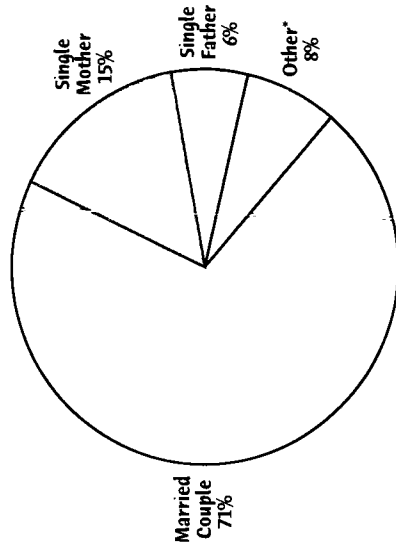


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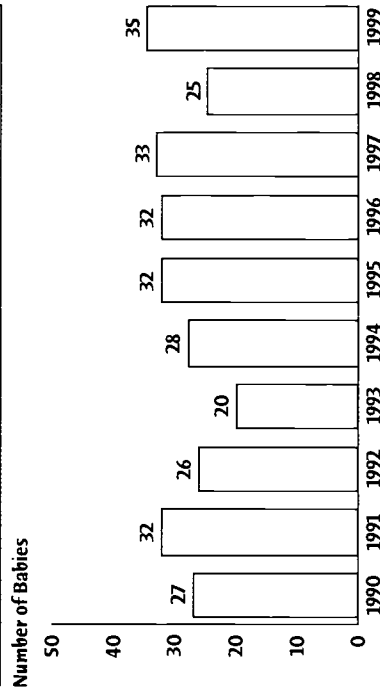

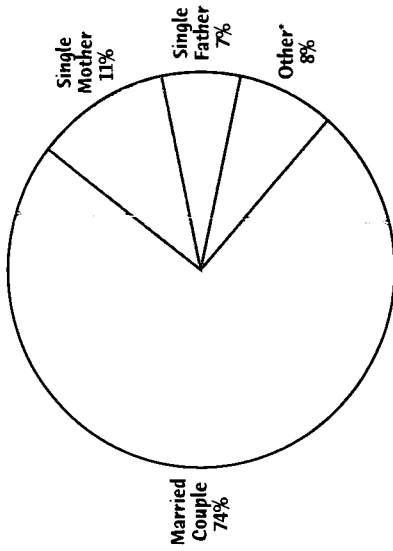
Number of Children Under the Age of 20 1990 & 2000



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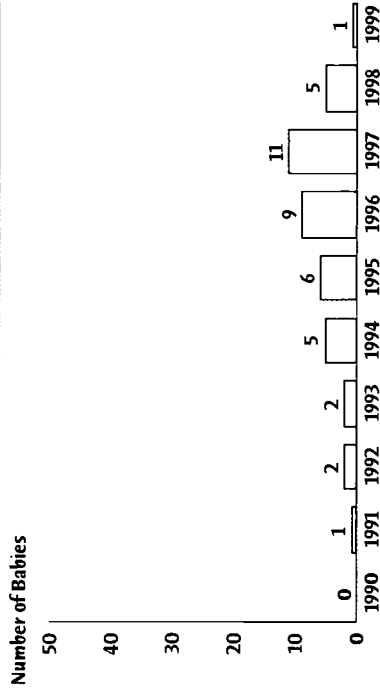
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000

Number of Babies Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 without a High School Diploma



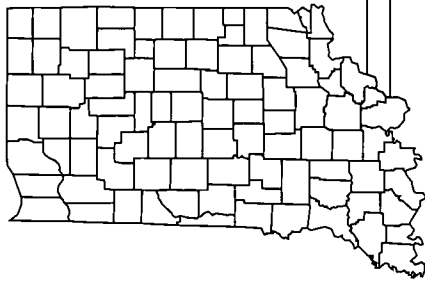

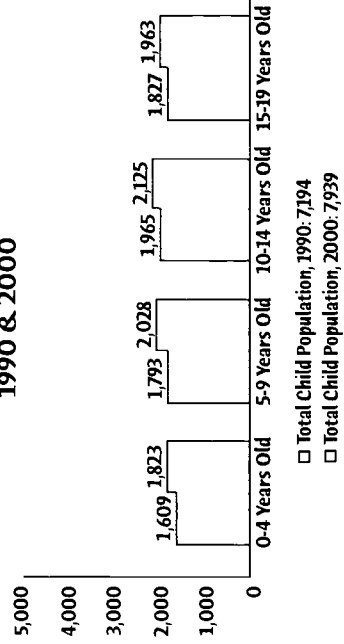

Number of Children Under the Age of 20 1990 & 2000

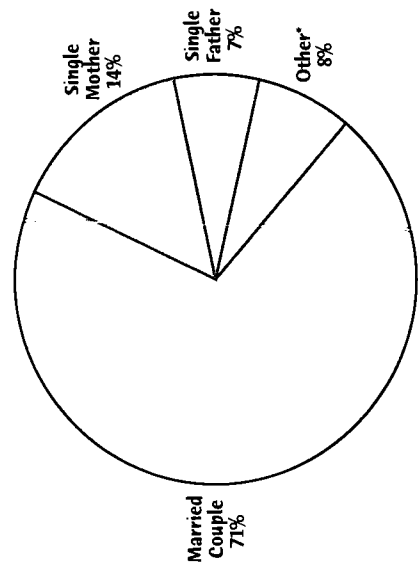


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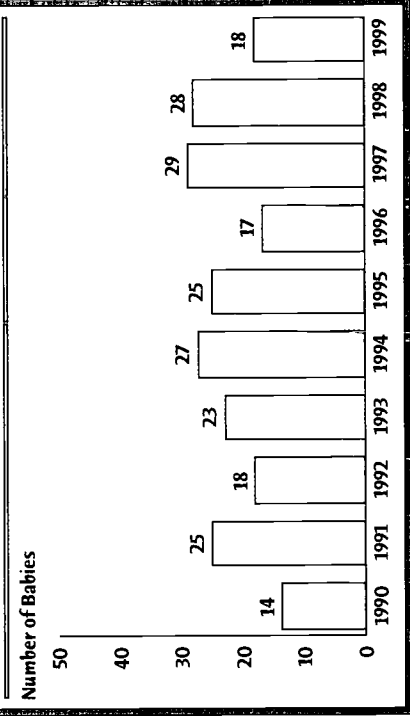
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Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000

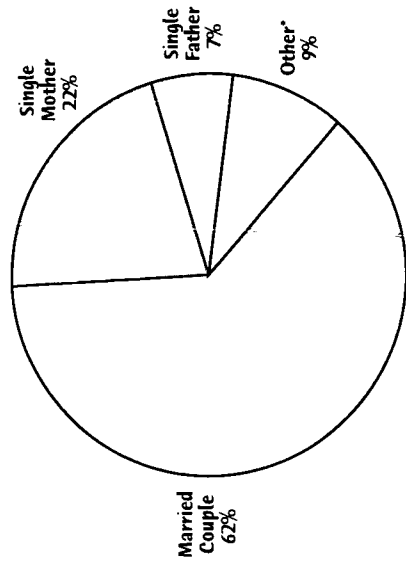

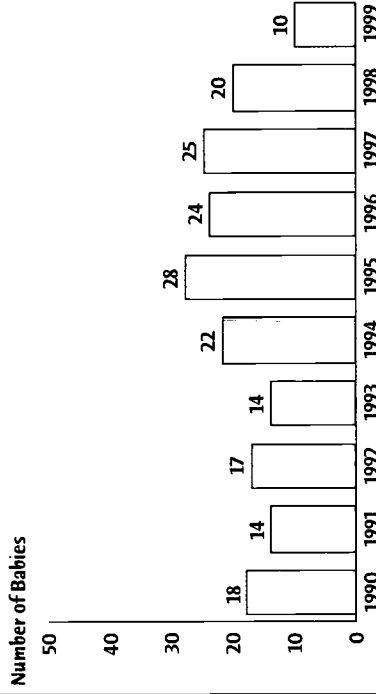

Percent of Households with Children Under 18 Headed by Parents and Others, Census 2000



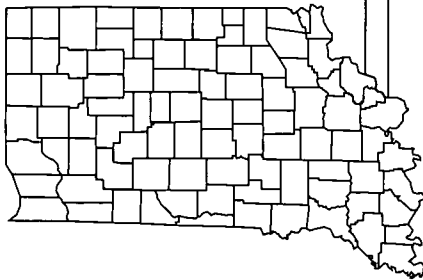
