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
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ABSTRACT



The Center for Population and Family Health in the Columbia University School of Public Health established a Psychiatric Service Program in their school based clinics, in order to help overcome some of the barriers to health care faced by minority adolescents. Some of these barriers include cultural factors, language problems, financial difficulties, and logistical problems of navigating the health care system. The CPFH school based clinics operate in 4 junior high schools and 1 high school in urban areas of New York City, serving approximately 30,000 minority adolescents, mostly Dominican students. The Program consists of 10 social workers and 3 psychiatrists. Students are referred to the social workers by school personnel, other clinic staff members, self-referral or by indication of risk on the patient intake form. The psychiatrist reviews cases with the social workers, and performs evaluations of patients at risk. Diagnostic assessments, referrals to appropriate care facilities and follow-up are performed.

Under the direction of Robert S. Pynoos, M.D., M.P.H., the UCLA Trauma Psychiatry Program has collaborated in conducting an elementary school-based mental health intervention program for children exposed to intra and extra-familial violence. Educators, mental health professionals, and child developmentalist are increasingly recognizing the detrimental impact on academic achievement caused by repeated exposures to violence. The UCLA Trauma Psychiatry Program has carefully documented how such exposures can result in children suffering from chronic posttraumatic stress, grief and depressive reactions that compromise their emotional, academic and social functioning. As a result, the program has expanded the focus of current youth violence prevention-intervention strategies to incorporate therapeutic approaches to counter these debilitating effects. The overall goals of this program are to provide early accessible mental health assistance to children and adolescents in order to reduce acute psychological distress, maintain normal developmental maturation and academic performance, and to promote nonviolent behavior and a constructive orientation toward the future.

This innovative approach has been initiated under the auspices of the State of California, Office of Criminal Justice Planning, the Los Angeles County, District Attorney Victim-Witness Assistance Program and the Inglewood Unified School District. This is the first program in the United States to combine a systemic screening of elementary school children at risk for these of exposures with a school-based trauma-grief focused psychotherapy intervention and a mentorship module. The program has devised unique methods to incorporate community-based police officers, teachers and parents into overall intervention strategy. Being school-based, all of the therapeutic and mentorship components have been integrated within the school community, thus permitting direct efforts to improve the classroom and school milieu. Preliminary results indicate that these interventions are leading to significant improvements in academic functioning and reduction from the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors as representing the best new approach in the field of youth programs for chid victims of crimes.
