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## ABSTRACT

This report summarizes information from a faculty matrix which demonstrates the patterns of faculty employment at Nova Southeastern University (Florida). The University prepared a faculty matrix using data from different departments in 1997, and that report served as a basis for this report. In the fall term of 1999, Nova Southeastern University employed 1,463 faculty members. Of these faculty members, approximately 40% were full time, and the remainder were part time faculty. About 50% of all fall term 1999 course sections were taught by full-time faculty. The faculty matrix also shows that about two-thirds of all faculty received their highest degree since 1980 and less than 10% received their highest degree before 1970. Slightly less than 30% of all faculty earned their highest degree from Nova Southeastern University. It is also noted that more than 85% of all faculty members at the University have a terminal degree. (Contains 12 tables and 12 references.) (SLD)

## EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Nova Southeastern University employed a 17-member faculty and 38 staff to serve the 1967 charter class of 17 Ph.D. students. Now, approximately 35 years after classes were first offered, the University's Fall Term 1999 enrollment has grown to 17,954 students at end-of-term. To serve this large and academically-diverse student body, the University used a faculty of 1,463 members during Fall Term 1999.

Because the faculty have such a critical role in the accreditation process, and also to support management of human and physical resources, the University has created a systematic information reporting process on faculty teaching activities. Each Center completed a form (matrix), the data from which served as the basis for this report. This reporting process goes well-beyond the reporting requirements of Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System surveys, which are required by the United States Department of Education.

The University first offered a detailed analysis of the University's faculty for Winter Term 1997. Using that report as a basis, the purpose of this current report was to summarize findings from the University's Fall Term 1999 faculty matrix.

A set of tables is attached to this report, highlighting the University's Fall Term 1999 faculty. Overall, the University employed a faculty of 1,463 members. Approximately 40 percent of all faculty were full-time employees of the University and the remaining 60 percent were employed on a part-time basis.

Focusing on overall staffing activities instead of faculty headcount statistics, approximately 50 percent of all Fall Term 1999 course sections were taught by full-time employees of the University. Using the faculty matrix as a resource, it was also possible to determine that approximately two-thirds of all faculty received their highest degree since 1980 and less than 10 percent received their highest degree before 1970. Further, slightly less than 30 percent of all faculty earned their highest degree from Nova Southeastern University. Finally, over 85 percent of all faculty members at the University have a terminal degree.

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## INTRODUCTION

### Background

Nova University was chartered in 1964 and instruction was first offered in 1967 (*Nova Southeastern University Fact Book*; 2000, p. 8). Southeastern College of Osteopathic Medicine admitted students to its charter class in 1981. As it is presently organized, Nova Southeastern University was formed in January 1994, after the merger of Nova University and Southeastern University of the Health Sciences (*Nova Southeastern University Fact Book*; 2000, p. 11).

The University's Fall Term 1999 enrollment, as reported to the United States Department of Education's National Center for Education Statistics, was 17,810 students (*Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System Fall Enrollment Survey (For 4-Year Institutions) 1999, Form IPEDS-EF-1*; 1999, p. 10) and by the end of Fall Term 1999, University enrollment had reached 17,954 students (*Nova Southeastern University Fact Book*; 2000, p. 46). To serve this large and academically-diverse student body, the University used a faculty of 1,463 members during Fall Term 1999.

### Purpose of This Study

In regard to the extreme importance of an institution's faculty, The Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools stated that:

The selection, development and retention of a competent faculty at all academic levels is of major importance to the educational quality of an institution. Because of the importance of the faculty, the Commission on Colleges and its committees will give special attention to all criteria pertaining to faculty during institutional evaluations (*Criteria for Accreditation*; 1998, p. 42).

Because the faculty have such a critical role in the accreditation process, the University has created a systematic information reporting process on faculty teaching activities. This reporting process goes well-beyond the broad level of reporting about faculty that is required by the United States Department of Education (*Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System Salaries, Tenure, and Fringe Benefits of Full-Time Instructional Faculty Survey 1999-2000, Form IPEDS-SA*; 1999). Indeed, the Faculty Matrix reporting process and other sources of extant data offer a wealth of information about the University's faculty that greatly exceeds federal reporting mandates. In turn, Research and Planning has used this information to prepare a wide variety of

reports on faculty<sup>1</sup>. The purpose of this current report was to continue with this reporting process and to summarize findings from the University's Fall Term 1999 Faculty Matrix.

## METHODOLOGY

Since Fall Term 1995, Research and Planning has distributed to all academic center deans and directors a memorandum to guide the construction of a Faculty Matrix. The Fall Term 1999 Faculty Matrix memorandum was jointly distributed by the Office of Human Resources and the Office of Research and Planning on September 29, 1999, and completed Faculty Matrix listings were returned throughout the term. Center directors were asked to provide the following information for each full-time and part-time faculty member:

- Name
- Highest degree: date, major, and institution awarding the degree
- Courses taught this term and the number of sections taught for each course, with course section location information identified for:

- Faculty affiliation status with the University:
    - 1 = Full-time faculty in this center
    - 2 = Administrator in this center
    - 3 = Full-time faculty from another NSU center
    - 4 = Administrator from another NSU center
    - 5 = Adjunct who has taught at least two courses per year for more than five years
    - 6 = Adjunct who has not taught at least two courses per year for more than five years

Data were put into electronic format by staff assigned to Research and Planning. SPSS-X<sup>®</sup> was used to generate all analyses associated with this report.

## RESULTS

As presented in Table 1, the University employed a faculty of 1,463 members during Fall Term 1999. Approximately 40 percent of all faculty (N = 590) were full-time employees of the University and the remaining 60 percent were employed on a part-time basis (N = 873) (Table 2).

Overall, 33.6 percent of all faculty (N = 492) were full-time faculty teaching in their assigned academic center (Table 3). This composite statistic included 55 full-time faculty who did not have assigned courses as the instructor of record during this term (Table 4), but were either on leave or engaged in other activities.

There was a wide degree of variance by academic center regarding the representation of full-time faculty teaching in their assigned academic center (Table 5):

- In the Oceanographic Center, over 80 percent of all faculty were classified as full-time faculty in their assigned center (Faculty Affiliation Status Code = 1).
- In contrast, in the Fischler Graduate School of Education and Human Services, the Farquhar Center for Undergraduate Studies, and the Huizenga Graduate School of Business and Entrepreneurship, less than 20 percent of all faculty were classified as full-time faculty in their assigned center (Faculty Affiliation Status Code = 1).

In addition to findings about faculty based on headcount, Tables 6.A to 6.D identify various components of the University's faculty based on the number of course sections taught. Among the most important outcomes presented in these tables, it should be mentioned that:



- Approximately 50 percent of all Fall Term 1999 course sections were taught by a full-time employee of the University (Faculty Affiliations Status Codes = 1, 2, 3, or 4).
- Although the University is widely-known for its long history of involvement with distance education, over two-thirds of all course sections taught during Fall Term 1999 were taught in South Florida:
  - Broward County . . . . . 65.8 percent
  - Miami-Dade County . . . . . 7.9 percent

By using the faculty matrix as a resource, it was also possible to present a frequency distribution of when the University's faculty received their highest degree. Approximately two-thirds of all faculty received their highest degree since 1980 and less than 10 percent received their highest degree before 1970 (Table 7).

Based on the caution that "Institutions are encouraged to recruit and select faculty whose highest degree is earned from a broad representation of institutions" (*Criteria for Accreditation*; 1998, p. 42), Table 8 is organized to identify *by center* breakouts of faculty who earned their highest degree from Nova Southeastern University. Slightly less than 30 percent of all Fall Term 1999 faculty earned their highest degree from the University, although there was extreme variance in this finding:

- In the School of Computer and Information Sciences, 63 percent of all faculty earned their highest degree from the University.
- In contrast, no faculty members in the Oceanographic Center earned their highest degree from the University.

Table 9 provides a summary of Fall Term 1999 faculty members who have a terminal degree. Over 85 percent of all faculty members at the University have a terminal degree. All Fall Term 1999 faculty members in the following centers had a terminal degree: Center for Psychological Studies, Shepard Broad Law Center, School of Social and Systemic Studies, and Oceanographic Center.

## SUMMARY

Statistics about faculty, gained from various *Integrated Postsecondary Education Data Systems* (IPEDS) surveys that the University regularly submits to the United States Department of Education, are all useful for University management. However, as evidenced in this report, detailed reporting on faculty is currently only possible through the more systematic and broad Faculty Matrix reporting process, with data provided by each Center.

Unfortunately, this reporting process demands considerable staff resources, both for the University's academic centers as well as for Research and Planning. It is expected that this reporting process will soon change and that beginning in Fall Term 2001, this reporting activity will be achieved through the University's comprehensive Banner information management system.

Some levels of monitoring will be needed, to provide quality assurance of reported statistics about the University's faculty. Even so, the automation of this process will greatly facilitate this annual reporting activity and, if it supports on-demand *ad hoc* reports by end users, it should improve the use of this data at the level of the major. The use of faculty-oriented data at this level would possibly be helpful for preparation of information related to the University's Institutional Effectiveness reporting process.

Until this process is automated, the current Faculty Matrix reporting process will be used to provide detailed information about the University's faculty. This current report, for all faculty members during Fall Term 1999, continues a reporting process that has been extensively used to support the University's many decision-making activities related to faculty.
