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#### ABSTRACT

**IDENTIFIERS** 

Evaluation and Research (E&R) staff of the Wake County Public Schools (WCPSS), North Carolina, have conducted spring surveys of school staff since 1992. This report contains information from the survey distributed in March 2001. Completed surveys were returned by 5,755 staff members. Survey results indicate that in the year 2000, more staff respondents enjoyed their work, 91% as compared with 85% the previous year, and more respondents thought that the climate at their school promotes learning. More respondents believed that their building facilities were adequate, and more thought that their school promotes understanding among students from a variety of backgrounds. Among the areas of concern was the fact that only 71% of the staff thought that staff development opportunities were adequate, and nearly 30% thought that the use of drugs and alcohol affected academic achievement. More staff respondents than in the previous year thought that students who threaten each other or fight are a serious problem in the schools, and only 66% of respondents agreed that students are aware of effective ways to keep themselves from behaving violently. #### **BACKGROUND**

Evaluation and Research (E&R) staff have conducted spring surveys of WCPSS school staff since 1992. From the spring of 1992 through 1996 surveys were conducted annually, then changed to biannually until 2000 (1998 and 2000). The state now requires surveys to be conducted annually; therefore a staff survey was conducted in spring of 2001. Surveys have provided important information about staff perceptions of individual schools, the system overall, and specific programs and initiatives.

Other changes that have taken place are the length and content of the survey. Previously, the staff survey was two pages and roughly 55 questions. There were separate surveys for the school administrators (principals and assistant principals) and for the professionals (teachers, guidance counselors, media specialists, social workers, and nurses). In 2001, only one survey form was used for all staff (administrators and professionals combined), and the survey was limited to one page with 23 questions. No separate Building Administrator survey form was utilized in 2001. The staff surveys used at the elementary, middle, and high school levels are included as Attachment 1.

When staff survey forms were distributed, surveys of students and parents were also conducted, using randomly selected samples of each group at each school.

In March of 2001, E&R distributed 7,290 staff surveys to elementary, middle and high schools. 5,755 surveys were returned, resulting in a return rate of approximately 80% at each of the levels. This rate is a slightly better return rate than from the survey conducted in April 2000.



#### **RESULTS SUMMARY**




#### **GOOD NEWS**

Compared to the previous survey conducted in April, 2000:

- More staff respondents enjoy their work (up from 85 to 91%).
- More respondents felt the climate at their school promotes student learning.
- More respondents agreed that staff members had high expectations for all children (up from 84 to 87%).
- More respondents believed that their building facilities were adequate (up from 69 to 72%).
- More staff respondents felt their school promotes understanding among students from a variety of backgrounds (up from 77 to 82%).

#### AREAS FOR CONCERN



- Only 71% of the staff respondents felt that staff development opportunities were adequate.
- 41% of the respondents felt violent behavior affected academic achievement.
- Nearly 30% felt the use of drugs and alcohol affected academic achievement.
- More staff respondents agreed that students who threaten or fight with other students were a serious problem (up from 20% in 2000 to 23% in 2001).
- Only 66% of respondents agreed that students are aware of effective ways to keep themselves from behaving violently, and less than 50% felt their students are aware of effective ways to react if they became a bystander to violence.

More detail on all of the findings is provided in the following section.

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#### 2000-2001 RESPONSE PATTERNS

#### **TEACHER SATISFACTION**

Figure 1 shows that more professionals agreed that they enjoy their work than in the prior two surveys. Overall across levels, 91% of the professionals agreed or strongly agreed that they enjoy their work, up six points from both 2000 and 1998 survey results of 85%.

While professionals enjoy their work, responses indicate that staff development opportunities do not meet the needs of nearly one-third of the professionals across school levels. Figure 2 shows that both middle and high school professionals were less likely than their elementary school peers to agree or strongly agree that staff development opportunities are adequate.

These were the only two questions related to personal job satisfaction on this year's survey.



#### **SCHOOL CLIMATE**

Figure 3 illustrates the generally positive patterns of responses at each school level about various facets of school climate.

As in past years, staff at all levels (elementary, middle and high school) were generally pleased with their school climate, the high expectations set for all students, and the school's promotion of understanding among students from a variety of backgrounds. Further, compared to the same questions in the surveys of 1998 and 2000, the responses of 2001 were even more positive, gaining 1.7%, 3% and nearly 5% respectively.

Less than three quarters of the staff were satisfied with the school facilities, or felt the school had the necessary materials and equipment needed by staff.

As with previous years, elementary staff were somewhat more satisfied than secondary staff, with middle school staff being the least satisfied.



#### SCHOOL INSTRUCTION

There were three statements regarding school instruction on the 2001 Staff Survey. Two were specifically related to the instructional methods used in classrooms. Figure 9 illustrates the patterns of responses at each school level regarding facets of school instruction.

As Figure 10 shows, a high percentage of staff members of all levels agreed that a variety of instructional methods were used to meet student needs. Figure 11, however, refers primarily to a specific instructional method—curriculum mapping—and the results were more variable: 86% of the staff in elementary schools indicated that they used curriculum mapping to align lessons, whereas only 75% of middle school staff and 69% of high school staff indicated that they used this method.

A third statement on the survey that related to School Instruction referred to the school as a whole, not individual classroom practices. The percentage of staff members who agreed or strongly agreed there was collaborative planning and decision-making at their school declined slightly from previous years. The percentage at the middle school level was much lower than the other two levels, with only 62% agreeing this occurred at their school.

#### **SAFETY**

#### School is a Safe Place

As shown in Figure 13, 90% of the 5,738 staff respondents agreed or strongly agreed that their school was a safe place to work. However, there were significantly fewer middle school respondents that agreed or strongly agreed (85%) than any other level. The differences in specific responses are largest in the Uncertain category (chosen by 10% of middle school staff) and the Strongly Agree category (chosen by 29% of middle school staff).

Figure 13: Response to Survey Item: School is a safe place to work.



While the staff members at the middle school level felt less safe than staff members at other schools, it is important to note that more staff members are feeling safer with each passing survey year. Figure 14 shows the comparisons between years, and all levels show improvement over time as indicated in the following findings:

- At the elementary level, responses through the years have remained fairly consistent, ranging from a low of 87% in 1992 and 1994 up to 92% in 2000 and 2001.
- At the middle school level, positive responses increased, from a low of 77% in both 1992 and 1993 to a high of 85% in 2001.
- At the high school level, positive responses increased significantly, from 58% in 1992 to a low of 54% in 1993 then increasing each year to a high of 91% in 2000, and edging down to 90% in 2001.

#### School Safety From Different Perspectives

This table shows several important comparisons:

- > Overall, while 90% of the staff agreed that school is a safe place, only 87% of the parents, and 77% of the students agreed or strongly agreed with that statement.
- ➤ Variation by level is larger among parents and students. 93% of elementary parent survey respondents agreed or strongly agreed that school is a safe place and only 76% of high school parents. Middle school parents tallied 81%.
- ➤ While 85% of the elementary student survey respondents agreed or strongly agreed that school is a safe place, both middle school and high school students tallied significantly lower 68% and 69% respectively.
- While fewer secondary parents and students agreed that their school is a safe place, only small percentages disagreed. More middle school and high school parents and students chose Uncertain as their response.



#### Violence and Drugs at School

There were several questions on the 2001 Staff Survey that related to violence and drugs at school. Overall, violence and drugs were a problem area at all levels of school – elementary, middle and high. However, upon closer review, these issues should be addressed separately. Staff responses indicated that violence was a significant issue at the elementary and middle school level and slightly less of an issue at the high school level. Drugs, on the other hand, were primarily a critical issue at the high school level, and less so at the elementary and middle school levels.






Figure 17: Summary Graph of Responses to Violence and Drug Issues

Figures 16 and 17 show the results of violence and drug related issues for elementary, middle and high school staff respondents. In Figure 16, the percentage that agreed or strongly agreed should be high, but they are not very high in two of the three issues. Figure 17 is the opposite where low percentages are the goal, however these are not low at all.

Figure 16: Summary Graph of Responses to Violence and Drug Issues (High Agreement is Good)

(Low Agreement is Good)




Figure 18 shows that, overall, the majority of staff respondents agreed or strongly agreed that students were aware of effective ways to keep themselves from behaving violently. However, these percentages are not as high as some people might want. Only 71% of elementary staff respondents, 63% of middle school respondents, and 59% of high school respondents felt their students knew effective ways to keep themselves from behaving violently.

As was the case in the previous item, Figure 19 shows that the percentages of staff respondents who agreed or strongly agreed that their students would know how to react if they became a bystander to violence are low. Only one half of the elementary and middle school staff respondents felt their students would know how to react, and just 44% of the high school staff respondents. As with some other questions, there was a high level of uncertainty at all three levels.

Figure 20 shows that 48% of the middle school staff members agreed that violent behavior affects academic achievement, and 41% of elementary school members believed violent behavior affects academics. Only 37% of the high school staff members agreed with the statement.

As shown in Figure 21, nearly one quarter of the staff members at all levels agreed or strongly agreed that students who threaten or fight with other students are a serious problem at their school. Responses to this statement have shown little change from previous years when 21% to 24% of the staff members agreed with the statement.



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This issue is particularly problematic at the middle school level, with 32% of the staff respondents in agreement. This is 11% higher than at elementary schools. High school staff respondents tallied the lowest percentage, with only 19% in agreement.

Since Figures 18 through 21 show that undesirably large percentages of staff respondents agreed or strongly agreed that violent behavior is a problem at their school, it is not surprising that Figure 22 shows that 44% of the middle school respondents agreed that they spend too much instructional time disciplining students. 41% of elementary staff respondents and 34% of high school staff respondents also agreed or strongly agreed that too much time is spent disciplining students.

Even though the overall percentage of respondents that agreed or strongly agreed with this issue is 3% less than the previous survey results (43%), respondents clearly agreed it is an issue at their school.

Figure 23 shows that an average of 92% of all school staff respondents agreed or strongly agreed that schools should teach the prevention of violence and substance abuse. High school staff agreement was slightly lower which may indicate a problem given the responses shown in Figures 18 and 19.

While violent behavior is perceived as impacting academic achievement at the middle school level, the use of drugs and alcohol was seen as affecting academic achievement at the high school level. More than 50% of the high school staff respondents agreed or strongly agreed that the use of drugs and alcohol affected the academic achievement of students at their school.

Overall, almost 30% of the staff respondents agreed or strongly agreed that drugs and alcohol were a problem at their school, as shown in Figure 24. It was not only an issue at the high school level, but staff members at the middle and elementary levels also believed this to be a problem (31% and 19% respectively).

It should be noted that these percentages were very similar in the previous two surveys.

#### The WAVELINE: "Save A Friend"

The WAVELINE: "Save A Friend" Tipline program was put into place by Governor Hunt in February of 2000. The WAVELINE telephone hotline is available for students, parents and community members to anonymously call in concerns that they may have about friends and/or acquaintances involved in violence and/or substance abuse activities. As this program is new, and the promotion and marketing is still in its infancy, two questions were put on the survey form to track its progress.

Figure 25 shows that most staff members were not aware of the WAVELINE "Save a Friend" Tipline. Only 39% of the middle school staff respondents and 22% of the elementary school staff respondents knew of the Tipline initiative.


