An index of institutions is also provided. Data were gathered from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System survey, the National Center for Education Statistics Web site, and the Web sites of individual institutions. #### INTRODUCTION

This document provides data on the characteristics of each public and private postsecondary institution in the state of Maine. Important telephone numbers, website addresses, accreditation information, tuition and fees, enrollment and awards data, programs offered and financial aid information are included for each institution. The document is divided into four parts. Part I contains data for all public institutions in Maine, part II provides information on the Technical Colleges in Maine, and part III presents figures on the private colleges within the state. The fourth part of the document lists colleges by national and regional accreditation, and by their 1994 Carnegie Classification. An index of institutions appears on page 161.

The figures reported here were gathered from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) survey, the National Center for Education Statistics website (http://nces.ed.gov/ipeds), and the website of individual institutions. The IPEDS surveys, submitted by each of Maine's postsecondary institutions, are compiled annually for the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES.) Of the ten postsecondary education instruments administered through the Maine Department of Education in cooperation with the United States Department of Education, this document contains data from the institutional characteristics survey, the fall enrollment survey, and the completions survey. To date, NCES does not compile educational statistics for private business, and trade and technical schools, hence; this document does not include enrollment data unique to Maine's proprietary institutions.

This document was prepared by Kimberly Stowers, the 2001 Margaret Chase Smith Center for Public Policy summer intern in the Department of Education. The Department acknowledges her valuable assistance and this contribution to higher education in Maine.





#### The Purpose of the College:

Bowdoin College believes strongly that there is an intrinsic value in a liberal arts education, for the individual student, for the College as an institution, and for society as a whole. Historically, the arrangement of courses and instruction that combine to produce liberal arts education has changed and undoubtedly will continue to change, but certain fundamental and underlying goals remain constant.

It is difficult to define these goal without merely repeating old verities, but certain points are critical. The thrust of a liberal arts education is not the acquisition of a narrow, technical expertise; it is not a process of coating young people with a thin veneer of "civilization." That is not to say that liberal arts education in any way devalues specific knowledge or the acquisition of fundamental skills. On the contrary, an important aspect of a sound liberal arts education is the development of the power to read with critical perception, to think coherently, to write effectively, to speak with force and clarity, and to act as a constructive member of society. But liberal arts education seeks to move beyond the acquisition of specific knowledge and skills toward the acquisition of an understanding of humankind, nature, and the interaction of the two, and toward the development of a characteristic style of thought that is informed, questioning, and marked by the possession of intellectual courage. When defined in terms of its intended product, the purpose of the College is to train professionally competent people of critical and innovative mind who can grapple with the technical complexities of our age and whose flexibility and concern for humanity are such that they offer us a hope of surmounting the increasing depersonalization and dehumanization or our world. The College does not seek to transmit a specific set of values; rather, it recognizes a formidable responsibility to teach students what values are and to encourage them to develop their own.

Liberal arts education is, in one sense, general, because it is concerned with many different areas of human behavior and endeavor, many civilizations of the world, many different aspects of the human environment. It seeks to encourage the formation of habits of curiosity, rigorous observation, tolerant understanding, and considered judgment, while at the same time fostering the development of varied modes of communicative and artistic expression. This concern for breadth and for the appreciation of varying modes of perception is combined with a commitment to study some particular field of learning in sufficient depth to ensure relative mastery of its content

and methods. In short, a liberal arts education aims at fostering the development of modes of learning, analysis, judgment, and expression that are essential both to subsequent professional training and to the ongoing process of self-education by which one refines one's capacity to function autonomously as an intellectual and moral being.

To achieve these goals, the faculty of the College must strive constantly to live up to their commitment in their course offerings, as must students in their course selections. The commitment is a collective one on the part of the College community. Each of the academic components of the College is under a heavy obligation to make its field of study accessible in some manner to the entire student body and to satisfy the needs of the nonmajor as well as those of the specialist.

The College is not and should not be insulated from the problems of the world. Rather, the College is a collection of people deeply involved in their community, their nation, and their world. When liberal arts education is faithful to its mission, it encourages and trains young people who are sensitive to the crucial problems of our time and who have the kind of mind and the kind of inspiration to address them fearlessly and directly. This is its goal and the standard by which it should be judged.

Colby is committed to the belief that the best preparation for life, and especially for the professions that require specialized study, is a broad acquaintance with human knowledge. The Colby experience is designed to enable each student to find and fulfill his or her own unique potential. - 4. To learn how people different from oneself have contributed to the richness and diversity of society, how prejudice limits such personal and cultural enrichment, and how each individual can confront intolerance;

- 6. To become familiar with the art and literature of a wide range of cultures and historical periods:
- 7. To explore in some detail one or more scientific disciplines, including experimental methods, and to examine the interconnections between developments in science and technology and the quality of human life;
- 8. To study the ways in which natural and social phenomena can be portrayed in quantitative terms and to understand the effects and limits of the use of quantitative data in forming policies and making decisions;
- 9. To study one discipline in depth, to gain an understanding of that discipline's methodologies and modes of thought, areas of application, and relationship to other areas of knowledge;
- 10. To explore the relationships between academic work and one's responsibility to contribute to the world beyond the campus.






