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ABSTRACT

Community service learning (CSL) is a growing interest in teaching, learning, and curriculum development. Recent research illustrates the ways CSL is benefiting students through improved learning outcomes, and helping faculty by enriching their research. The annotated bibliography lists resources about CSL, grouped into categories for: (1) overview; (2) implementation; (3) outcomes; (4) research; and (5) policy. The bibliography describes 2 Web sites and 41 print resources, all of which are in the ERIC database. (SLD)

Community service learning (CSL) is a growing interest in teaching, learning and curriculum development. Community service learning emerged from the experiential education movement of the 1970s and focuses on integrating community service into the formal curriculum. Since CSL challenges many conventional learning beliefs, it is sometimes met with resistance. Recent research illustrates the way CSL is benefiting students through improved learning outcomes, and faculty through enriching their research.

There several organizations that readers may want to contact, or whose publications they may want to receive, since they are actively involved with integrating service into the college curriculum. The National Society for Experiential Education (http://www.nsee.org) probably has the longest standing commitment to service learning. The Society has a number of publications, some of which are listed below, as well as electronic lists, newsletters, and a national conference. The American Association for Higher Education (http://www.aahe.org) has a service learning initiative that will generate publications over the next few years. In addition, the University of Michigan Center for Learning through Service publishes the Michigan Journal of Community Service Learning, and the University of Georgia publishes the Journal of Public Service and Outreach which often contains articles on service learning.

Introduces a theme issue, discussing the journal's purposes and evolution, and reviewing historical landmarks related to service learning research. Reviews the articles within this issue, discussing planned next steps, and concludes with a call for service learning research efforts to broaden the knowledge and practice bases and further expand the boundaries of potential research related to this work.

Stanton, T. K., Giles, D. E., Jr., & Cruz, N. I. (1999). Service-learning: A movement's pioneers reflect on it's origins, practice, and future. San Francisco: Jossey-Bass Inc. This books deals mainly with the history of service learning and traces the work of 33 advocates, scholars, and practitioners from the 1960s.

Jacoby, Barbara, & Others. (1996). Service-learning in higher education: Concepts and practices. San Francisco, CA: Jossey-Bass Inc.

The 14 readings in this book focus on service learning in higher education, its theoretical framework, the advantages of various techniques, and practical means for implementation. Service learning is seen to offer students the chance to combine academic knowledge/skills with community experience.

This collection of 17 papers focuses on the important role of service-learning in the education of students at liberal arts colleges, drawing on the activities of the Learning and Service Alliance sponsored by the Council of Independent Colleges.

This monograph examines the role and action of higher education in service programs including: curricular changes; service-learning education; work-study programs; collaborative efforts between higher education, government, and the private sector; outreach opportunity leagues; campus compacts; faculty participation; and evaluating the effects of civic participation.

Redefines service learning as a valuable instructional tool that can be applied across a variety of disciplines and content areas. Presents a set of steps for using it and examples of successes and failures.

Forman, Susan G., & Wilkinson, Louise C. (1997, Summer). Educational policy through service learning: Preparation for citizenship and civic participation. *Innovative Higher Education*, 21, 4, 275-85.

Describes a Rutgers University course to prepare undergraduates to participate effectively in civic life and public decisions about education and schooling.

Specific activities for implementation of such a program are delineated for the four constituencies of institution, faculty, students, and the community.

This article argues that the trend in college student public service cannot be sustained unless it is linked to the faculty's teaching mission, both disciplinary and interdisciplinary. This includes institutionalization of service learning in the field of pedagogy and within specific disciplines, and the linking of service learning to other higher education reform efforts, particularly faculty employment policy.

This report presents evaluation results of the Learn and Serve America, Higher Education (LSAHE) federal initiative. It addresses the impact of LHASE on students, communities, and higher education institutions.

Battistoni, Richard. (1995, Winter). Service learning, diversity, and the liberal arts curriculum. *Liberal Education*, 81, 1, 30-35.

A faculty member's experiences with service learning programs at Rutgers University (New Jersey) and Providence College (Rhode Island) illustrate how college student involvement in community service causes them to consider their membership in diverse communities and develop critical thinking skills. Service learning is felt to connect issues of diversity and democracy within a liberal arts framework.

Miller, Jerry. (1994, Fall). Linking traditional and service-learning courses: Outcome evaluations utilizing two pedagogically distinct models. *Michigan Journal of Community Service Learning*, 1, 1, 29-36.

Examines a study in which students from two advanced introductory psychology courses were offered simultaneous enrollment in a community service-learning course. Students selecting the option didn't differ from nonparticipants demographically, or in terms of self-reporting or final grades, but they did report enhanced ability to apply concepts outside of the classroom.

Gorman, Margaret, & Others. (1994, Summer). Service experience and the moral development of college students. *Religious Education*, 89, 3, 422-31.

Reports on a study of the impact of service learning on the moral development of 70 undergraduate students. Finds that those with service learning experience showed a significantly higher rate of growth on a moral development measure than those who did not participate. Makes recommendations for further research.

Batchelder, Thomas H., & Root, Susan. (1994, August). Effects of an undergraduate program to integrate academic learning and service: Cognitive, prosocial cognitive, and

identity outcomes. Journal of Adolescence, 17, 4, 341-55.

Investigated effects of characteristics of service-learning experiences on development of undergraduates. Service-learning students made significant gains on certain cognitive dimensions and had significant increases in prosocial decision making, prosocial reasoning, and identity processing.

Stanton, Timothy K. (2000, Fall). Bringing reciprocity to service-learning research and practice. [Special Issue]. *Michigan Journal of Community Service Learning*, 119-23. Recommends bringing practitioners and researchers together to strengthen future service learning research, suggesting a more empirically based approach to practice and more practical approach to research. The empirically based approach would help practitioners strengthen programs and influence the direction of research.

Driscoll, A., Gelmon, S.B., Holland, B.A., Kerrigan, S., Spring, A., Grosvold, K., & Longley, M.J. (1998). Assessing the impact of service learning: A workbook of strategies and methods (2nd ed.). Portland, OR: Center for Academic Excellence. This guide, in workbook form, offers an assessment model for service learning programs that focus on the four constituencies of service learning: students, faculty, community, and the institution.

Rhoads, Robert A. (1998, May/June). In the service of citizenship: A study of student involvement in community service. *Journal of Higher Education*, 69, 3, 277-297. This study explores the ways in which college students' community service contributes to citizenship education.

Bass, Scott A., & Silverstein, Nina M. (1996, Winter). Action research: A practical model to link teaching, research, and community service. *Metropolitan Universities*, 7, 3, 85-94. Theme issue: Highlights of the Meeting of the Coalition of Urban and Metropolitan Universities (Orlando, FL. June, 1996). Action research, in which the college teacher leads students in design and implementation of a study responsive to specific community needs, is proposed as one way of linking faculty imperatives of teaching, research, and public service. The approach allows faculty to gather and analyze data for publication while meeting instructional requirements, and students are challenged by participation in research.

Mettetal, Gwynn, & Bryant, De. (1996, Winter). Service learning research projects: Empowerment in students, faculty, and communities. *College Teaching*, 44, 1, 24-28. A model of service learning that can serve as a vehicle for teaching, research, and community service is suggested to college faculty.

Cohen, Jeremy, & Kinsey, Dennis F. (1994, Winter). "Doing good" and scholarship: A service-learning study. *Journalism Educator*, 48, 1, 4-14.

Discusses service learning (learning that combines public service with related academic work) and service learning projects in an undergraduate course on mass communication and society. Finds that it is an effective means of teaching that increases student understanding of complex material.

Pollack, Seth. (2000, Fall). The role of research and policy in constituting the service learning field. [Special Issue]. *Michigan Journal of Community Service Learning*, 105-12.

Examines the interplay between service learning policy and research, noting their impact on practice. Discusses traditional roles of research in policymaking, describing an alternative approach to understanding policy. Recommends that service learning practitioners and researchers make usable knowledge available to help clarify contested concepts and shape the construction of service learning policy so it is consistent with best practices.

This report responds to an extended community discussion, UALR 2000, of the future role and service that the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR) can offer central Arkansas and its metropolitan area.
