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ABSTRACT

This document is a PowerPoint presentation intended for K-12 public school educators, administrators, and policy analysts as well as college and university educators involved or interested in teacher preparation programs. The presentation chronicles the partnership between Oswego State University and Parish Elementary School in north central New York state. The document outlines Parish Elementary's first 3 years as a Professional Development School (PDS). Included in the first 3 years was the development of the cornerstone of the program, an onsite teaching methods and student practicum course. An entire section of university methods/practicum students is immersed into Parish Elementary School, where they spend 2 full days per week. One day is spent studying pedagogy and theory, while the second day is spent in classrooms putting that theory to practice. Instruction and supervision are provided by the Parish Elementary teaching staff. All faculty members, including special area teachers, are actively engaged in the methods/practicum experience. Other PDS initiatives include the development of study groups and the formation of a school-based PDS management team. The PowerPoint presentation includes perspectives from the school's teachers, principal, and college staff related to the complexities of PDS work. (SM)






This document it is a PowerPoint presentation that was made at the 2002 Professional Development Schools' (PDS) National Conference held in Orlando, Florida. It is intended for K-12 public school educators, administrators and policy analysts as well as college and university educators involved in, or interested in, teacher preparation programs. The presentation chronicles the partnership between Oswego State University and Parish Elementary School in the Altmar-Parish-Williamstown School District in North Central New York State. The document outlines Parish Elementary's first three years as a Professional Development School (PDS). Included in the first three years was the development of the cornerstone of the program, an on-site Teaching Methods and Student Practicum course. An entire section (20-26 college students) of Oswego State University Methods/Practicum students is immersed into Parish Elementary School where they spend two full days per week. One day is spent studying pedagogy and theory while the second day is spent in classrooms putting that theory to practice. Instruction (of the Methods course) and supervision (of the Practicum experience) are provided by the Parish Elementary teaching staff. All faculty members including special area teachers (art, library, music and physical education) are actively engaged in the Methods/Practicum experience. Other PDS initiatives include the development of study groups and the formation of a school-based PDS management team. The PowerPoint presentation included perspectives from the school's teachers, Principal and college staff relative to the complexities of PDS work.


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













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


- Teachers from Parish Elementary School explored the feasibility of teaching a Methods/Practicum Course on site
- ◆ The first PDS Methods/Practicum Course was developed
















Self-Study Recommendations....
