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ABSTRACT .

This form is used to renew an application for federal and state grants, work study, and loans. The renewal version contains preprinted information that the student reported for the 2002-2003 school year. As a result, it is faster and easier for the student to use than the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The form contains instructions, deadline information, and instructions for renewing an application on the Web. Sections request student and family financial information, and information is also provided about the Privacy Act and use of social security numbers and state certification. Students submitting the Renewal FAFSA should expect to receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) within 4 weeks. (SLD)

Use this **Renewal FAFSA** to apply for federal and state grants, workstudy, and loans. Because the Renewal FAFSA contains preprinted information that you reported to us for the 2002-2003 school year, it is faster and easier for you to use than the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA).

If you are filing a **2002 income tax return**, we recommend that you complete it before filling out this form. However, you do not need to file your income tax return with the IRS before you submit this form.

If you or your family has unusual circumstances not shown on this form (such as loss of employment) that might affect your need for financial aid, submit this form and then consult with the financial aid office at the college you plan to attend.

You can submit your 2003-2004 Renewal FAFSA over the internet. To start:

1. Know Your PIN

To file your Renewal FAFSA on the Web, you will need a special code called a PIN, which we mailed to you when you applied last year. If you don't have your PIN, you can request another copy by going to www.pin.ed.gov and selecting the link "PIN Request and Information."

Information on the Privacy Act and use of your Social Security Number
