ABSTRACT

This Kids Count report examines statewide trends in the well-being of Pennsylvania's children. The statistical portrait is based on trends in 19 indicators of child well being: (1) early prenatal care; (2) low birth weight; (3) infant mortality; (4) child deaths; (5) child violent deaths; (6) births to single mothers under age 20; (7) mothers with less than a high school education; (8) mothers using tobacco during pregnancy; (9) substantiated child abuse or neglect; (10) out-of-home placement; (11) delinquent children in out-of-home care; (12) school dropout rate; (13) child poverty rate; (14) children in families receiving TANF/AFDC; (15) unemployment; (16) per capita income; (17) average annual wage; (18) labor force participation; and (19) employed workers per child. The report is presented in six sections. Section 1 of the report summarizes the findings and includes a state minority profile and education profile. Section 2 provides statewide indicator information, including graphic multi-year profiles of the state as a whole and urban, rural, and mixed counties as groups. Section 3 is organized by county and provides profiles of each county, with graphs of multi-year trends, usually from 1990. This section also provides county-level racial/ethnic breakdowns and municipality breakouts. Section 4 profiles Pennsylvania's 501 school districts, with data on student population, test scores, programs, and other indicators of educational progress. Section 5 defines and lists data sources. Among the

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findings, indicators showing improvement include lack of prenatal care and children enrolled in Medicaid and Children's Health Insurance Program. Indicators losing ground include per pupil expenditures and children in single-parent homes. (KB)

Introduction

Children get our attention. Dressed in Halloween costumes, singing a song, sharing their art, or winning the league championship, they catch our eye and make us smile.

But there are other children we don't see, those not gathered in one playground or classroom, who also deserve our undivided attention. Their commonalities don't spring from a family, neighborhood, faith community, or school. These are the children who share a life circumstance that hinders their healthy development. Their status is measured in statistics called indicators – so called because they indicate the well-being, or lack of it. Many indicators represent an obstacle that could send children down a path that ends in dependency, crime, or some other mark of failure.

The indicators in *The State of the Child* help us shape policies that make children's lives better – those programs that keep children on a straight track to success. They are tools for accountability, gauges to measure, first, the areas most in need of interventions and, second, the effectiveness of our policy solutions.

Several new indicators to *The State of the Child* - pregnant women's use of tobacco, mothers' lack of a high school education, housing, female-headed households, class size, and school violence - further illuminate child well-being in Pennsylvania. Also new are the designations for each of Pennsylvania's 501 school districts in the School District Profiles – "R" for rural, "U" for urban, and "S" for suburban. Like the population classifications used for counties, the designation allows apples-to-apples comparisons among school districts on their progress and challenges.

The 2002 edition of *The State of the Child*, refreshed with data from the 2000 Census, reveals areas of progress for Pennsylvania's children - sparked, in large part, by the strong economy of the 1990s - but also a number of areas that are dangerously static, such as teen births and delinquency. For children's well-being, all these areas, whether improving or not, call for the effective application of innovative policy solutions.

We know that policies can make a difference. The Children's Health Insurance Program, Medicaid, and nurse home visiting, for instance, keep children healthy and support struggling families, but the indicators tell us that they could be extended for a broader impact.

Other policies, such as preschool funding, aren't in place in Pennsylvania, but we clearly see the need for them. When children are denied the benefits of effective policies, their health, education, and well-being are undermined.

We promise to protect children and give them the tools to achieve their dreams. That is not a blind promise, nor an empty one. With the facts at hand, we can pinpoint their needs and create policy solutions that spare children from the ravages of poverty and guide them toward success.



Gained Ground

Lack of Early Prenatal Care

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999: 14.8% of pregnant women didn't seek early prenatal care, or 1 pregnant woman in 7.
- 1996: 15.8% of pregnant women didn't seek early prenatal care, or 1 pregnant woman in 6.

Why it matters: Early prenatal care, delivered by the third month of pregnancy, can encourage the mother's good health habits, detect maternal and infant medical problems early, and direct expectant mothers to parenting support, education, and help with nutrition, housing, and other services. Early prenatal care also reduces the risk of low birth weight babies, minimizing the risk of health problems and costs. Women are more likely to get early prenatal care as their education levels, ages, and incomes rise, while health insurance status and an ongoing relationship with a health care provider also play a key role.






Children Born to Mothers with Less than a High School Education

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999: 14.8% of babies were born to mothers with less than a high school education, or 1 birth in 7.
- 1990: 16.4% of babies were born to mothers with less than a high school education, or 1 birth in 6.

Why it matters: Children born to parents without a high school education or GED are likelier to live in poverty - a major barrier to future lifetime success - and have lower reading skills. Pregnant women without a high school education are more likely to smoke during pregnancy and receive late or inadequate prenatal care.

Children Born to Mothers Who Used Tobacco During Pregnancy

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND

- 1999: 17.3% of pregnant women used tobacco, or 1 pregnant woman in 6.
- 1995: 23.1% of pregnant women used tobacco, or 1 pregnant woman in 4.

Why it matters: The babies of women who smoked during pregnancy face greater likelihood of premature birth and low birth weights, stillbirth and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, and poor lung development, asthma, and respiratory infections. Pregnant women are less likely to smoke and use tobacco if they get early prenatal care and participate in nurse home visiting and smoking cessation programs.

Child Deaths Ages 1-19

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999: 33.1 children in every 100,000 died, or 1 death in every 3,024 children.
- 1997: 36.3 children in every 100,000 died, or 1 death in every 2,755 children.

Why it matters: Nationally, the top three causes of child deaths are preventable – unintentional injuries, including motor vehicle accidents, drowning, and accidents in the home (41%), homicide (14%), and suicide (7%). Lack of health care access and childhood poverty, which exposes children to more risks, are major factors in child deaths, while poor parenting, child abuse and negligence, substance and alcohol abuse, and access to guns also play a role.

Children Under Age 18 Abused or Neglected - Substantiated Cases

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 2000: 1.7 substantiated abuse cases per 1,000 children, or 1 child abused in 588.
- 1997: 2 cases per 1,000 children, or 1 child abused in 500.

Why it matters: Child abuse and neglect hurts children physically and emotionally. Child abuse victims are more likely to perform poorly in school, have social, emotional, and physical health problems, and be arrested as juveniles or adults. Children who grow up in poverty are nearly seven times more likely to be abused.

Children Under Age 18 Receiving TANF/AFDC △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 2001: 6.0% of children received Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF), or 1 child in 17.
- 1998: 9.8% of children received TANF, or 1 child in 10.

Why it matters: Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF, formerly AFDC) provides cash welfare payments for needy children under 18. Parents receive \$365 to \$422 a month (family of 3) while working to increase their own earnings capability. In the late 1990s, welfare reform combined with a booming economy to shave TANF rolls. By late 2001, the economy had moved into a steady decline, creating uncharted territory by pairing tightened welfare rules with a shrinking job market.

Unemployment △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 2000: 4.2% unemployment, or 1 unemployed worker in 24.
- 1998: 4.8% unemployment, or 1 unemployed worker in 21.

Why it matters: The unemployment rate indicates the ease or difficulty that parents may have in finding work and providing for their children. For children, a parent's long-term unemployment can lead to poverty and its related risk factors, while high unemployment brings higher rates of poverty, crime, delinquency, and public assistance to the community.

Per Capita Income Adjusted △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999: The statewide annual per capita income adjusted was \$27,127.
- 1996: The statewide annual per capita income adjusted was \$24,151.

Why it matters: By reflecting personal income for every man, woman, and child in an area, per capita income measures a community's prosperity. Depending on the local cost of living, communities with low per capita incomes may need additional local, state, and federal resources to support children and their families. When adjustments for inflation are made, there is an approximate 6% increase since 1996.

Average Annual Wage Adjusted △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999: The statewide average annual wage adjusted was \$30,817.
- 1997: The statewide average annual wage adjusted was \$29,086.

Why it matters: The average annual wage is compiled from non-agricultural, Unemployment Compensation-covered employees — people who are working and earning regular salaries. The higher the average annual wage, the likelier that workers - including parents with children - are economically self-sufficient. Working parents whose salaries can't meet children's basic needs may need supports, such as tax benefits and job training, to bridge the gap and attain self-sufficiency. When adjustments for inflation are made, there is an approximate 2% increase since 1997.

Children Enrolled in Medicaid and the Children's Health Insurance Program △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 2001: 716,298 children enrolled in Medicaid, or 1 child in 4; 104,527 children enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP), or 1 child in 30.
- 1999: 697,932 children enrolled in Medicaid, or 1 child in 4.4; 68,376 children enrolled in the Children's Health Insurance Program, or 1 child in 45.

Why it matters: Children's health is a cornerstone of their development. But without health coverage, children are less likely to have a consistent relationship with a primary care provider or get regular, preventive health care. When they're sick, they're more likely to seek delayed - and costly - emergency room care. Medicaid is available for low-income pregnant women and children who are very low income. CHIP is available for children who live in families whose income exceeds Medicaid guidelines, up to 235% of poverty, and don't have employer-based or private health insurance. In Pennsylvania, about 180,000 children are eligible for Medicaid or CHIP but not enrolled, most often because parents shun government help, don't realize they're eligible, have difficulty with the enrollment process, or face literacy and language barriers. Another 78,000 children are uninsured but ineligible for either program.

Children Enrolled in Head Start △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 2000: 50.8% of eligible children enrolled in Head Start, or 1 eligible child in 2.
- 1999: 47.6% of eligible children enrolled in Head Start, or 1 eligible child in 2.

Why it matters: Head Start, the federally funded preschool program for 3- and 4-year-old children from families with incomes below 100% of poverty, gives at-risk children a solid educational footing when they enter kindergarten. High-quality preschool such as Head Start can help at-risk children achieve in school, graduate on time, avoid delinquency, and succeed as adults. Pennsylvania is one of nine states that fails to fund preschool, so with Head Start enrollment largely limited by funding restrictions, affordable - and quality - preschool options for low-income families are few.

High School Graduates Planning Further Education △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999-00: 74% of graduating seniors planned to continue their schooling.
- 1996-97: 71.8% of graduating seniors planned to continue their schooling.

Why it matters: Pennsylvania has a wide array of postsecondary options to enhance residents' earning and learning power, from technical schools to community colleges to public and private colleges and universities. However, state financial support extends only to higher education institutions and grants and loans for students, and the location of institutions is left to chance. As a result, rural students plan to attend postsecondary education at lower rates than urban and suburban students.

Elementary School Lunch Eligibility △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 2000-01: 36.2% of elementary school students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunches, or 1 child in 3.
- 1998-99: 37.8% of elementary school students were eligible for free or reduced-price lunches, or 1 child in 3.

Why it matters: Traditionally, schools have had greater difficulty educating low-income students, especially when they are concentrated in higher numbers. Eligibility for subsidized lunches among elementary school pupils is an excellent measure of student poverty because qualifying children must be in families below 185% of federal poverty guidelines (\$32,653 for a family of four in 2001).

Kindergarten Enrollment △

CHANGE: GAINED GROUND.

- 1999-00: 28.8% of all 5-year-olds in kindergarten attended full-day rather than half-day classes, or 1 kindergartner in 3.
- 1997-98: 25.9% all 5-year-olds in kindergarten attended full-day rather than half-day classes, or 1 kindergartner in 4.

Why it matters: Students who attend full-day kindergarten, and especially low-income and minority children, have higher scores on first grade reading readiness tests, on reading tests in the early grades, and on achievement tests in grades 3, 5, and 7. They have better report cards and fewer grade retentions and are referred less often for remedial and special education. More than 70% of kindergarten pupils attend only half-day programs, compared with about 50% across the nation. Districts that offer full-day kindergarten - at their own expense, because the state, in large part, funds only a half day - may sacrifice other priorities, especially those districts with high concentrations of low-income students and the greatest needs.

Lost Ground, No Change, or New Indicator

Babies Born at Low Birth Weight ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999: 7.9% of births were low birth weight, or 1 newborn in 13.
- 1996: 7.5% of births were low birth weight, or 1 newborn in 13.

Why it matters: Babies born at low birth weight - less than 5 pounds, 9 ounces - are likelier to die in the first year of life. As they grow, they have trouble with social skills and show higher rates of depression, anxiety disorders, physical disabilities and hyperactivity and aggression than babies at higher birth weight.

Infant Mortality ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999: 7.1 deaths per 1,000 infants, or 1 death in 141 infants.
- 1996: 7.7 deaths per 1,000 infants, or 1 death in 130 infants.

Why it matters: Infants are likelier to die before their first birthday if they suffer from congenital anomalies, complications from low birth weight and short gestational age, or succumb to SIDS. Communities where problems such as poverty, unemployment, and low literacy converge to worsen the atmosphere for vulnerable infants tend to have higher infant mortality rates.

Child Violent Deaths Ages 1-19 ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1995 to 1999: 21.3 children in 100,000 suffered violent deaths, or 1 violent death in 4,687 children.
- 1993 to 1997: 21.1 children suffered violent deaths, or 1 death in 4,739 children.

Why it matters: Violent deaths, caused by automobile accidents and other unintentional injuries, homicide, and suicide, reflect societal undercurrents that endanger children. Homicide points to delinquent behavior, hostility, anger, access to firearms, and unsafe communities. Suicide indicates mental illness, stress, substance abuse, and missing community and family supports. Accidental deaths indicate children's health and risk-taking behaviors, especially among older teens.

Children Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999: 9.2% of babies were born to single mothers under 20, or 1 baby in 11.
- 1996: 9.4% of babies were born to single mothers under 20, or 1 baby in 11.

Why it matters: Teenage, unmarried parenthood adversely impacts both mother and child. Young mothers are less likely to finish high school and are more likely to be poor, unmarried, and on government assistance. They are less likely to get prenatal care, and their babies have a greater risk of being born at low birth weights, dying before their first birthdays, and living in poverty.

Children in Out-of-Home Placements ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999: 8 children in 1,000 were placed out of the home, or 1 child in 125.
- 1997: 7.8 children in 1,000 were placed out of the home, or 1 child in 128.

Why it matters: Children are placed out of the home, in foster care or other arrangements, when family instability, poverty, abuse and neglect, crime, violence, homelessness, substance abuse, or serious illness in the home seriously jeopardize their well-being. The consequences linger, as children who endure disruptions of parenting are likelier to have developmental delays, anxiety disorders, depression, poor academic performance, and poor social development.

Delinquent Children Ages 10-17 Placed Out-of-Home by Juvenile Court ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999: 3.3 youths per 1,000 were placed out-of-home by juvenile court, or 1 youth in 299.
- 1996: 3.1 youths per 1,000 were placed out-of-home by juvenile court, or 1 youth in 294.

Why it matters: Juvenile criminal activity is a picture of youths whose futures are already tarnished, because they are likelier to become criminals as adults. It also diminishes community safety and quality of life, and drains state dollars for costly detention options. For instance, one placement in a state-run Youth Development Center costs \$82,000 a year.



Children Dropping Out of Public School ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999-00: 3.8% of ninth through twelfth graders dropped out of school, or 1 high schooler in 26.
- 1997-98: 3.9% of ninth through twelfth graders dropped out of school, or 1 high schooler in 26.

Why it matters: Because most jobs require at least a high school diploma and some postsecondary education, dropouts often wind up unemployed or in dead-end, low-paying jobs. They then have difficulty raising their children and supporting their children's education. More than half of high school dropouts in 1999-2000 said they left because they were having academic difficulty or disliked school – many more than those who were leaving for jobs or for behavioral problems.

Children Under Age 18 in Poverty ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1997: 16.6% of children lived in poverty, or 1 child in 6.
- 1995: 17.4% of children lived in poverty, or 1 child in 6.

Why it matters: Poverty almost surely diminishes a child's chances for success. Children in poverty - for example, those living in a four-person family earning \$17,650 - are significantly more likely to be born at a low birth weight, get lead poisoning, have learning disabilities, repeat a grade, drop out of school, suffer from child abuse and neglect, and abuse drugs and alcohol. (See Federal Poverty Income Guidelines, page 19).

Labor Force Participation ▽

CHANGE: LOST GROUND

- 2000: 80.3% labor force participation, or 80 workers in 100.
- 1998: 81.9% labor force participation, or 82 workers in 100.

Why it matters: Labor force participation shows an area's economic vitality by counting people who hold full- and part-time jobs plus those who are looking for work. Strong participation in the labor force reveals a community of workers able to provide for children's needs.

Employed Workers Per Child ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 2000: The statewide rate is two workers for every child under 18, unchanged from 1998.

Why it matters: Children can't care for themselves, so others must do it — parents, but also neighbors who earn salaries and strengthen a community's economic vitality. When the economy is strong, labor force participation hums and children benefit, while low labor force participation can reflect depressed local economies, such as those that have lost major employers and have trouble attracting new businesses.

Children in Single-Parent Homes ▽

CHANGE: LOST GROUND.

- 2000: 25.1% of Pennsylvania children lived in single-parent homes, or 1 child in 4.
- 1990: 20.1% of Pennsylvania children lived in single-parent homes, or 1 child in 5.

Why it matters: Single parents, particularly women, have lower incomes than two-parent families. Children living in single-parent homes are more likely to live in poverty, have fewer relationships with male role models, have less time to interact with parents, have diminished social support, and have lower academic and social well-being than children from two-parent families.

Fifth Grade Students Scoring Below Proficient on PSSA Exams ◇

CHANGE: NONE; NEW REPORTING METHOD.

- 1999-00: On state exams, 44% of fifth graders scored below proficient in reading, or 1 fifth grader in 2, and 47% scored below proficient in math, or 1 fifth grader in 2.

Why it matters: The Pennsylvania System of School Assessment exams (PSSA) are the only consistent statewide measure of student performance, assessing knowledge and skills in reading and mathematics at grades 5, 8, and 11 and in writing at grades 6, 9, and 11. Fifth grade scores are particularly important, because the earlier that educational problems are detected, the easier it is to help students catch up.

Current Expenditures Per Pupil ◇

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999-00: Current expenditures per pupil were \$7,458, and the gap between the highest and lowest spending district was 2.5-to-1.
- 1996-97: Current expenditures per pupil were \$7,013, and the gap between the highest and lowest spending district was 2.8-to-1.

Why it matters: Educating children requires money for teacher salaries, other personnel, textbooks and materials, technology, transportation, and maintenance. Despite a tightening per-pupil spending gap, the state's highest-spending district has almost \$150,000 more to spend every year on a 25-student classroom than the average-spending - not the lowest-spending - district. The state subsidy system for public education doesn't reflect actual students or spending, but instead gives districts arbitrary annual increases on top of their earnings under a decade-old formula. Because the state share of funding has decreased from 54% to 38% in the past two decades, the quality of education increasingly depends upon local property taxes, and wealthier districts are better able to provide for their children. When inflationary increases are taken into account, the 6.4% increase is actually a 0.2% decrease. (This analysis excludes the Bryn Athyn School District, which operates no schools and pays tuition to send its students to other districts.)

Instruction Expenditures Per Pupil ▽

CHANGE: LOST GROUND.

- 1999-00: Instruction expenditures per pupil were \$4,854, or 65.1% of current expenditures per pupil.
- 1996-97: Instruction expenditures per pupil were \$4,628, or 66% of current expenditures per pupil.

Why it matters: This indicator is at the heart of education, because it doesn't count spending on related services and supports, such as maintenance, transportation, and management. Among districts, the share of spending on instruction ranges from 53% to 74%, and rural districts with high transportation expenses show a smaller share. Because the increase in instructional spending has trailed the overall growth in school district budgets, the share

of spending devoted to instruction has declined since 1996-97. When inflationary increases are taken into account, the 4.9% increase is actually a 1.5% decrease.

Special Education Expenditures Per Pupil ❖

CHANGE: MIXED RESULTS.

- 1999-00: Special education expenditures per pupil were \$835.
- 1996-97: Special education expenditures per pupil were \$692.

Why it matters: Without special education, many of the nearly 223,000 Pennsylvania students with disabilities would not succeed in school. But special education programs are controlled largely by state and federal laws and regulations - and local school districts must pay an increasing share of the costs. Pennsylvania adopted a formula to fund special education in 1991-92 that does not account for the distribution of students with disabilities among districts or the associated costs. Since then, the state's share of school district special education spending has declined from 52% to 45%. This has exacerbated funding inequities among districts, since special education costs as a percentage of current expenditures range from 4.9% to 25.7%. When inflationary increases are taken into account, the 20.7% increase is actually a 13.3% increase.

Revenues ▽

CHANGE: LOST GROUND.

- 1999-00: 37.9% of revenues came from the state and 57.5% from local taxes.
- 1996-97: 39.2% of revenues came from the state and 54.2% from local taxes.

Why it matters: To maintain program quality, school districts must turn increasingly to local taxpayers, since the state share of revenues has declined steadily for two decades. State subsidies are relatively more generous to poor communities than wealthy ones, but as the state share declines, poor districts need to raise taxes - particularly a problem because the poorest communities generally have the highest concentrations of students in need and the smallest tax bases to tap for revenues.

Enrollment by Race/Ethnicity

CHANGE: MIXED RESULTS.

- 1999-00: Total public school enrollment was 1,782,444. Changes in racial and ethnic categories were relatively minor at the state level.
- 1997-98: Total public school enrollment was 1,791,100.

Why it matters: While there are exceptions that offer valuable lessons, schools with high concentrations of low-income, minority, and non-English-speaking students tend to have relatively low performance. They generally have fewer resources than their more affluent neighbors, lower-paid teachers, older textbooks and materials, and less adequate facilities. Statewide, there were increases in the percentage of African-American students (4.5% to 4.6%), Hispanic students (3.8% to 4.2%), and other minority students (2% to 2.1%).

Students with Disabilities

CHANGE: MIXED RESULTS.

- 1999-00: Students with disabilities comprised 12.3% of all students, or 1 student in 8.
- 1997-98: Students with disabilities comprised 11.3% of all students, or 1 student in 9.

Why it matters: Students with disabilities generally require special education services and programs, some of them very costly. While students with disabilities comprise between 10% and 14% of the student body in most school districts, the range for all districts is very wide, from 5% to 23%. Among the 204,271 students with disabilities, the Pennsylvania Department of Education classifies 16,350 as having severe disabilities, tending to be the most costly and complicated to educate. They are 1.2% of all students statewide, and while they comprise up to 1.5% of students in most districts, they comprise 3% or more of students in 20 districts.

Elementary Class Size

CHANGE: NEW INDICATOR TO THE STATE OF THE CHILD.

- 1999-00: 33.1% of elementary school classes had fewer than 20 pupils.

Why it matters: Smaller class sizes are associated with improved academic performance, especially in the early

grades and especially for low-income and minority students. In recent years, many states have supported smaller classes in districts with high concentrations of low-income and minority children, and some have supported class-size reduction across the board. Pennsylvania is not among these states.

School Attendance

CHANGE: NO CHANGE.

- 1999-00: Attendance rates were 94.8% for elementary students and 91.3% for secondary students.
- 1996-97: Attendance rates were 94.7% for elementary students and 90.6% for secondary students.

Why it matters: Poor attendance in the early grades often reflects academic problems, almost inevitably leading to even lower attendance in secondary school and further failure. All 12 of the state's empowerment districts (those performing lowest on the state's PSSA exams) are among the 44 districts with secondary school attendance rates below 90%, and the only district with an elementary school attendance rate below 90% is also an empowerment district.

School Violence

CHANGE: NEW INDICATOR TO THE STATE OF THE CHILD.

- 1999-00: Almost 9,000 assaults on students and staff were reported, or 5 incidents per 1,000 students, and 3,250 incidents involving weapons were reported, or 1.8 incidents per 1,000 students.

Why it matters: An orderly school is essential for learning. Students do not learn well, and teachers do not teach effectively, if they fear for their own physical safety. Research links higher rates of discipline problems with lower student achievement.

Policy Directions

Child well-being improves when indicators - the statistics compiled in this book and elsewhere - guide good policy-making. Some existing policies, such as the Children's Health Insurance Program, have made enormous differences in children's health and well-being. But research shows that many other policies can have an even greater impact on child well-being. Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children recommends five policy approaches that would combine to put all children, particularly those at risk of later-life failure, on a path to success.

All Pennsylvania children should enter kindergarten ready to learn.

Research base: Children who start school ready to learn, primed by educational experiences at home and in quality preschool and child care, are well positioned to achieve throughout their school years. As they grow, they are likelier to have better school attendance, avoid delinquency, graduate from high school, pursue higher education, and succeed as adults.

Policy directions: Early learning happens by design, not by chance. In preschool and child care, young children need educationally stimulating experiences that help their minds develop. However, Pennsylvania remains one of nine states that fails to fund preschool, denying many at-risk, low-income children the opportunity to absorb new learning concepts and prepare for school. And although Pennsylvania does offer safe child care services for low-income, working families, the program does not adequately address quality issues - the educational standards and teacher training and compensation that assure children an enriching school readiness experience.

Indicator impact: School readiness can improve the critical predictors of a child's lifetime success - state test scores, school attendance, delinquency, and high school dropout rates. For low-income children, as indicated by poverty and school lunch eligibility, school readiness services can lift them over the barriers that impede lifetime success.

All Pennsylvania children should have access to health insurance with coverage that meets their needs.

Research base: Uninsured children are six times less likely than insured children to have a "usual source of care" - a



primary care provider where their records are maintained and parents can partner with providers to meet children's health needs. They are also less likely to get needed medical care, even when they're sick, and more likely to seek costly emergency room care. Uninsured children with disabilities are three times less likely to see a physician than insured children with disabilities.

Policy directions: Pennsylvania offers good, comprehensive health coverage for low-income, working families through CHIP and Medicaid, but about 180,000 eligible children aren't enrolled. Pennsylvania should maximize enrollment by continuing its outreach efforts, to break through the barriers of misinformation, culture, geography, and language. To reach the additional 78,000 uninsured children who qualify for neither program, Pennsylvania should develop coverage for children whose families exceed CHIP income limits. Pennsylvania should also take steps to assure that its health coverage programs offer the benefits children need.



Indicator impact: Health care coverage and access keep children healthier throughout their lives, impacting such indicators as lack of early prenatal care, tobacco use during pregnancy, low birth weights, infant mortality, child deaths, and child abuse. For all parents, health coverage provides a layer of reassurance and prevents the need to use costly emergency room care for children's health needs.

All Pennsylvania school-age children should have access to effective after-school and youth development programs during non-school hours.

Research base: Children and youths who attend quality after-school programs are less likely to commit crimes or experiment with drugs, alcohol, and sex. With safe supervision and alternative activities, after-school and youth development programs enhance educational achievement, decrease dropout rates, and support the successful transition of youth to adulthood.

Policy directions: To keep more children and youths engaged and out of trouble, Pennsylvania should invest in



more after-school and youth development programs, utilizing research-based approaches to assure success and gauge effective performance.

Indicator impact: Youth development policies could improve many child well-being indicators that reflect endangerment and delinquency, such as out-of-home placements, teen births, state education test scores, high school dropout rates, and school violence.

All Pennsylvania children should be raised in families with loving and knowledgeable parents.

Research base: Many pervasive problems facing young children result from adverse maternal health behaviors during pregnancy, poor infant caregiving, and stressful environmental conditions. However, nurse home visits to first-time mothers in poverty can improve prenatal health-related behaviors, decrease child abuse, help families become self-sufficient and avoid substance abuse and crime, and keep children from becoming delinquent as teens. Family centers, where families can find local support and information, have been shown to increase parents' education levels and employment prospects. And, tax forgiveness for low- and moderate-income families can help lift families out of poverty and free more household resources for children's well-being.

Policy directions: The state should promote parenting success by investing more heavily in family support programs, such as nurse home visiting to educate parents about child development, and family centers, which offer family support, job training and life skills. Tax strategies for working families - already a success through the state's TAX BACK program - should grow to give more parents more income to devote to their children's needs. In general, the state should work to infuse parent education into all social service programs, further partnering with parents by sharing information on nutrition, health care, education, and family self-sufficiency.

Indicator impact: Indicators of child well-being springing directly from home conditions and parent education include lack of early prenatal care, pregnant women's use of tobacco, low birth weights, infant mortality, child abuse, delinquency, and out-of-home placements. For children on TANF and for struggling parents, especially those without a high school education or living in poverty,



family supports can help bridge the gaps that diminish child well-being.

All Pennsylvania children should have access to a quality public education that prepares them for successful futures in college, at work, and as citizens.

Research base: Two factors affecting school achievement are an inequitable school finance system, which fuels wide disparities in children’s educational achievement, and a missing focus on the earliest years, when the foundation for long-term achievement is built. Full-day kindergarten and smaller classes through third grade have been shown to yield better grades, attendance, and social adjustment in later school years.

Policy directions: Low-income children generally perform more poorly in school, and cash-strapped districts educating large low-income populations often must vault over higher bars with shorter poles. Pennsylvania should change its education funding system, enhancing state support to end reliance on shrinking local tax bases, to assure all children and communities the opportunity to succeed. At the same time, school districts should be held accountable for spending the funds wisely, in programs proven to yield higher student achievement. Concentrating on solidifying the learning experience in the early years, with full-



day kindergarten and smaller classes, is a good beginning, because children who start behind stay behind.

Indicator impact: Education equity and accountability would improve the direct indicators of school district wealth and expenditures, which give more students an equal opportunity to achieve school success. Wise investments of education dollars in full-day kindergarten and smaller classes could also yield improvements in state test scores, school attendance, and high school dropout rates.

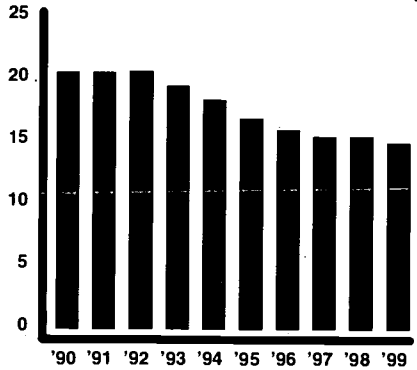

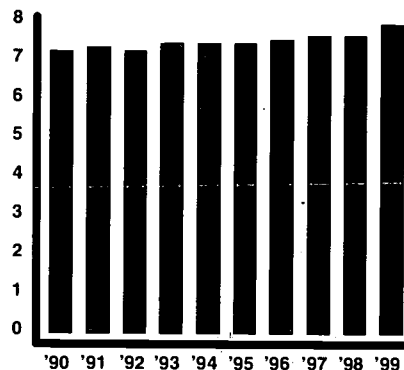

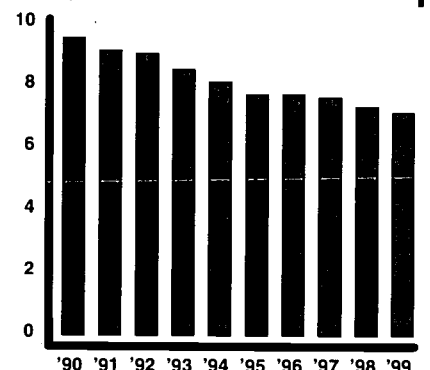

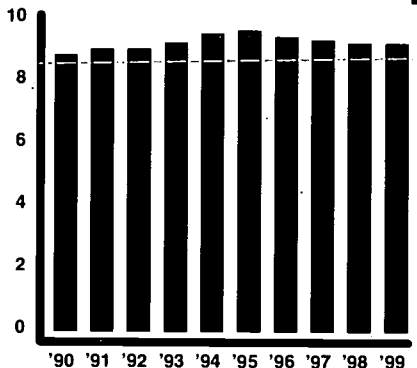

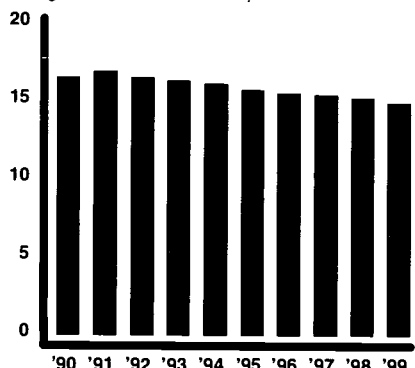

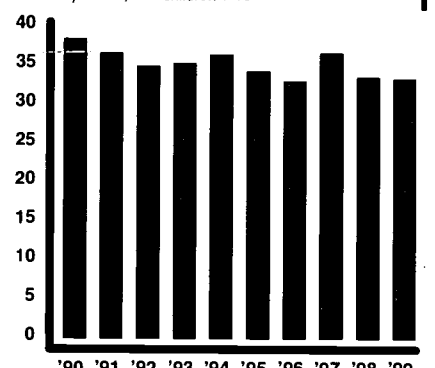

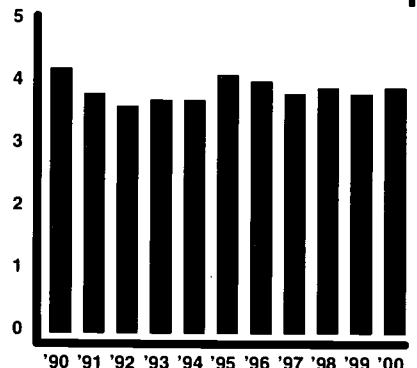

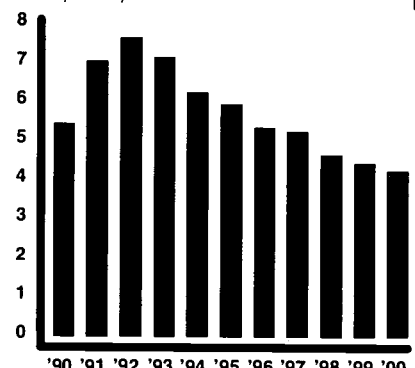

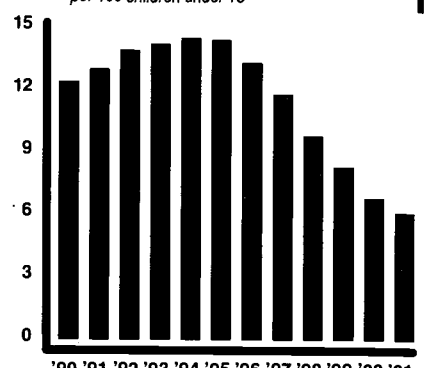

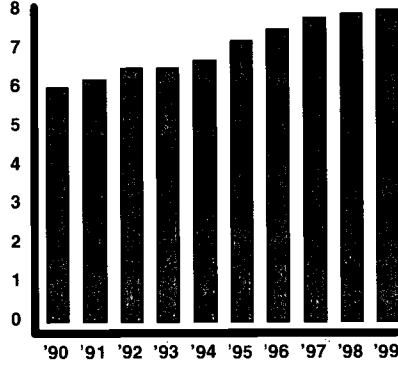

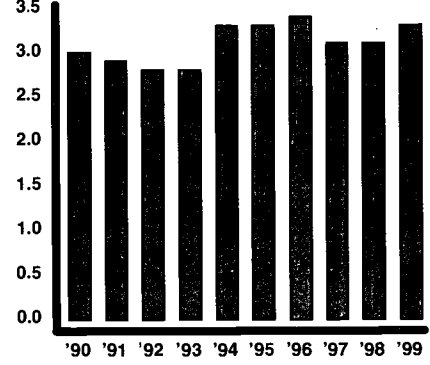

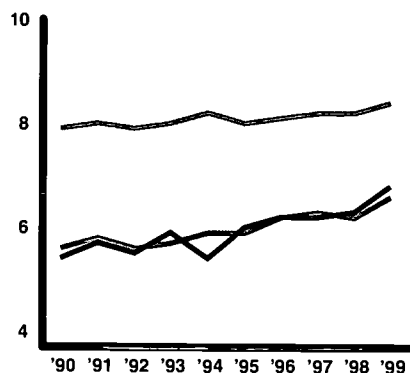

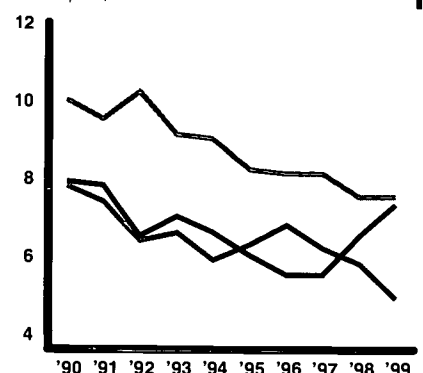

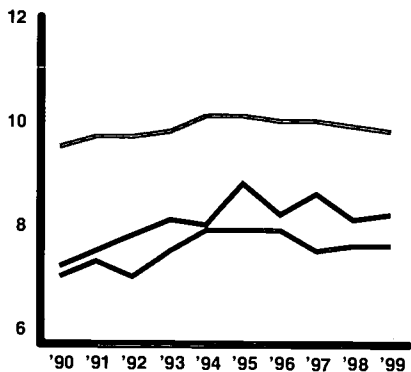

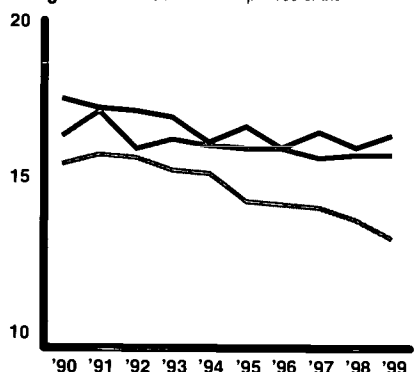

Children Born to Mothers with Less Than a High School Education

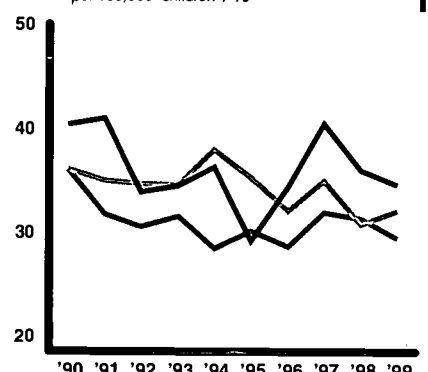

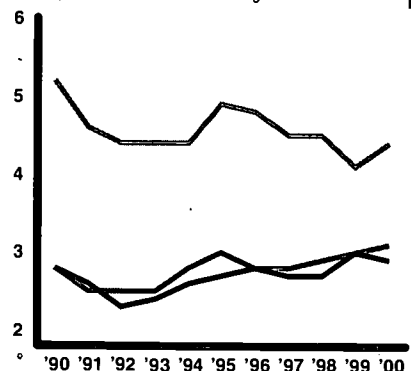

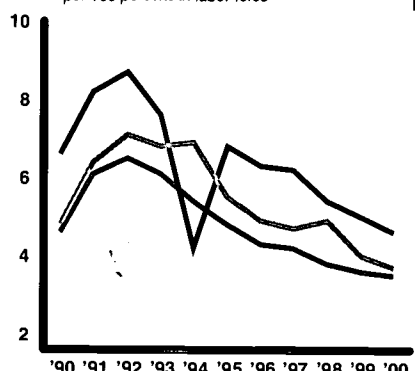

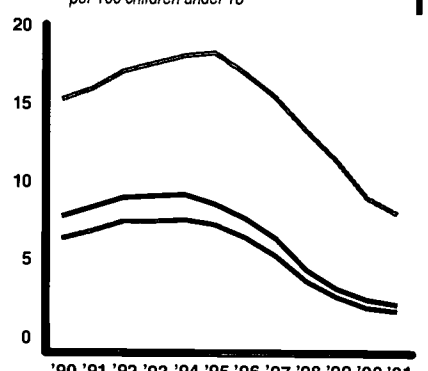

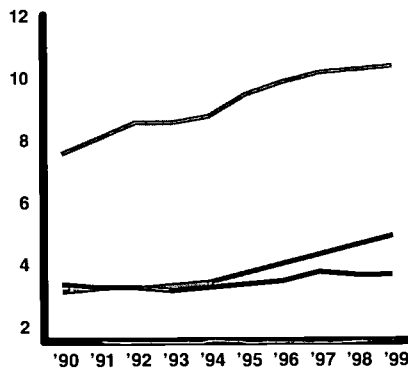

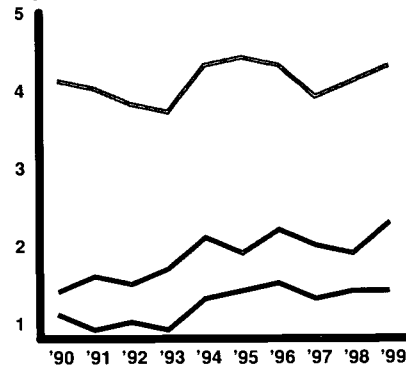

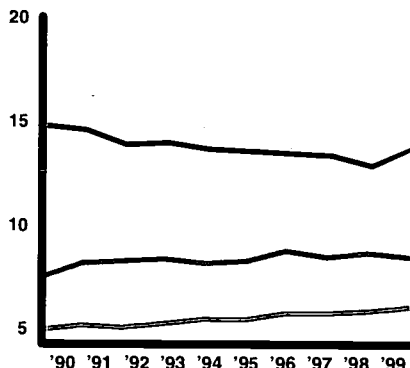


Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



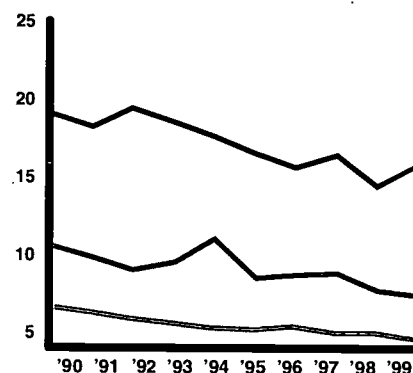

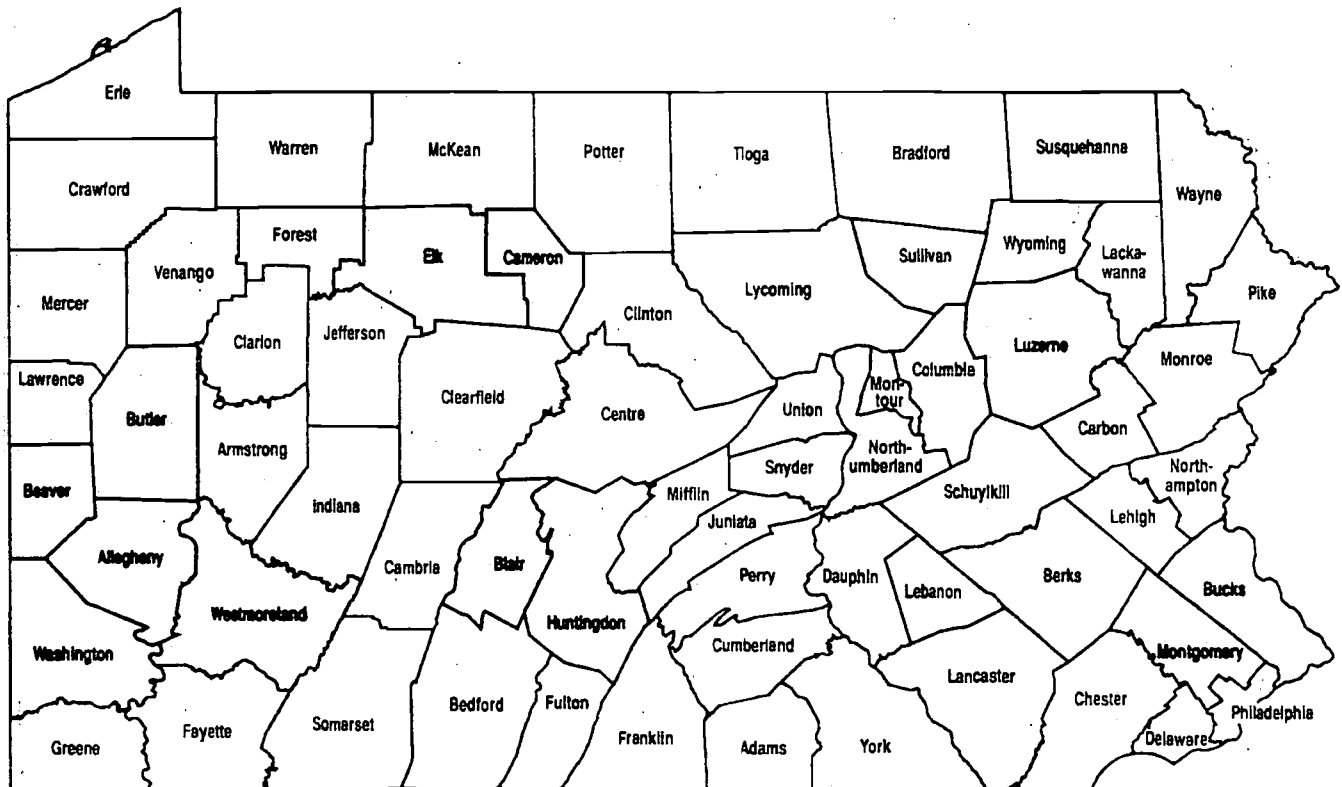

Women who receive early and comprehensive care are significantly more likely to deliver normal weight, healthy infants. Early prenatal care can encourage good health habits during pregnancy, can lead to early detection of maternal and infant medical problems, and can become a gateway to parenting support, education, and assistance with nutrition, housing, and other services and supports. Early prenatal care can also reduce health care costs associated with neonatal intensive care services for low birth weight babies. Births lack early prenatal care if care begins after the third month of pregnancy.

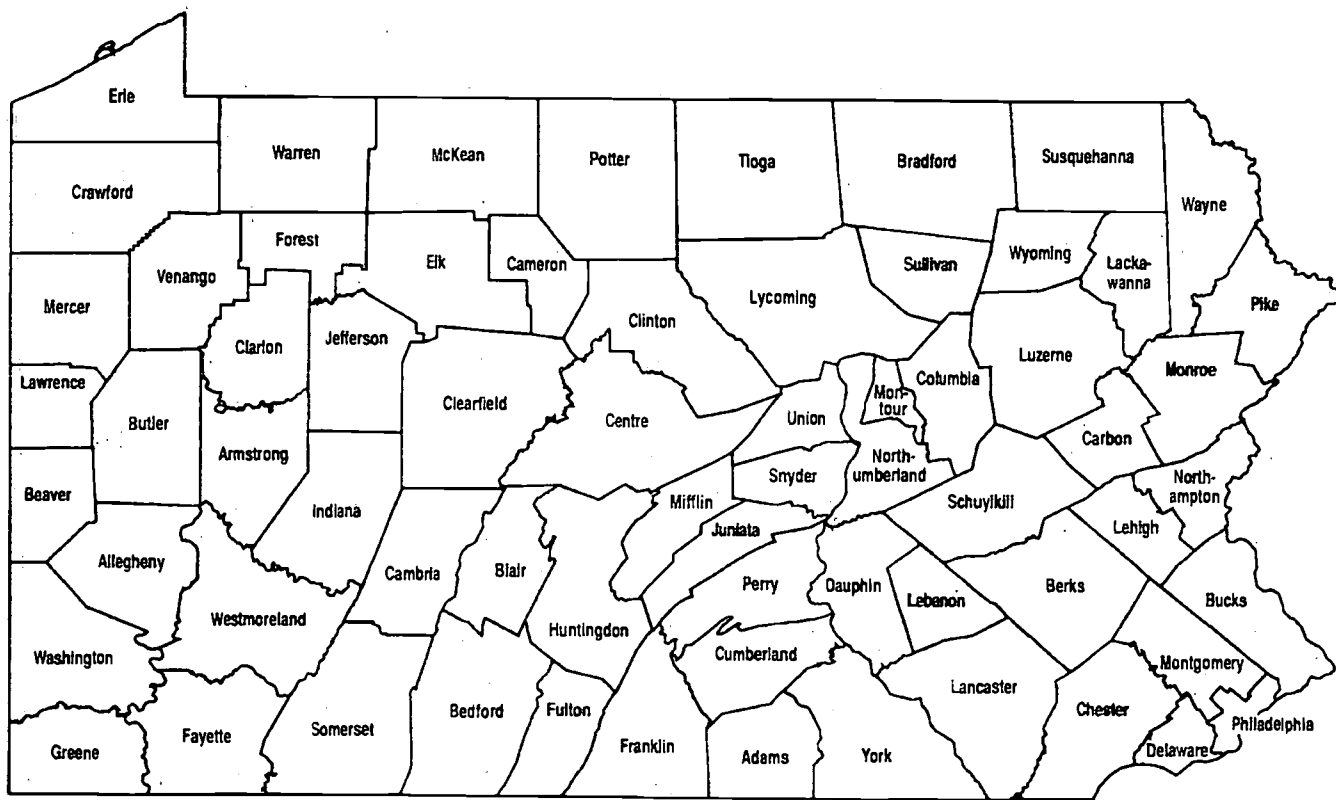

The weight of a baby at birth is a key indicator of infant survival, health, and development. Babies born at low birth weight are more likely to die during the first year. Underweight babies can experience disabilities and health problems such as developmental delays, visual and hearing impairments, chronic respiratory ailments, and learning difficulties that interfere with normal development and progress in school. Babies born weighing less than 5 pounds 9 ounces (or 2,500 grams) are low birth weight.

- 1 baby in 13 was born at a low birth weight in 1999.
- The trend: Babies born at a low birth weights have risen slightly, from 7.2% of all births in 1990 to 7.9% in 1999.
- Most low birth weight babies - 63 % - were born in urban counties, although urban counties accounted for 54% of all births. With a few exceptions, rural and mixed counties showed better rates for low birth weight babies.

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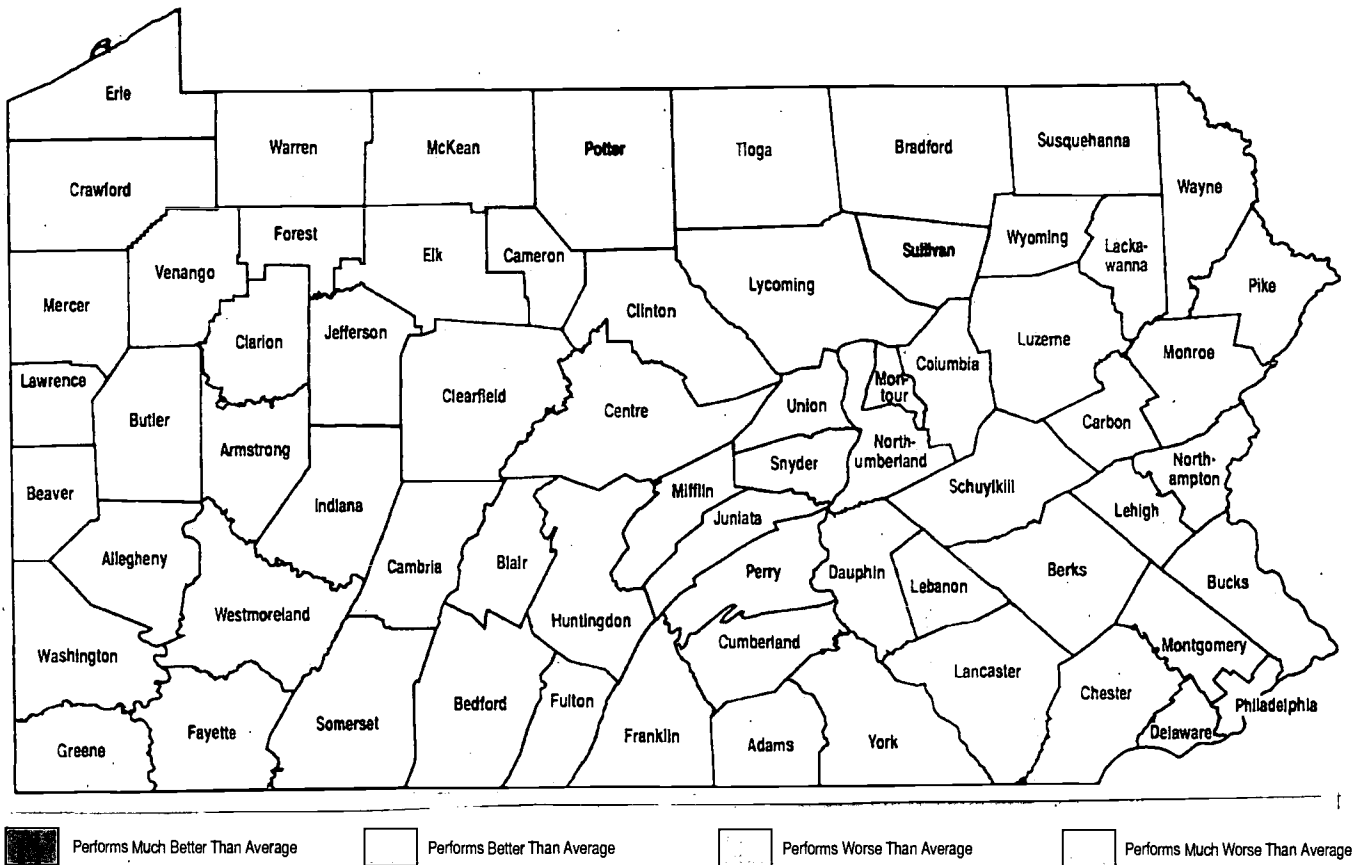

Infant mortality, or the rate of babies dying between birth and their first birthday, is a readily available and widely used indicator of a country's general child health status. An infant's vulnerability to inadequate health care and nutrition, poor housing, and other risks indicates that the infant mortality rate reflects a broad range of economic, social, and medical conditions. Communities where there is a confluence of several problems, such as poverty, unemployment, and low literacy, tend to have higher infant mortality rates.

- 1 baby born in 141 died in the first year of life in 1999.
- The trend: The infant mortality rate improved from 9.5 deaths per 1,000 babies in 1990 to 7.1 deaths per 1,000 infants in 1999.
- Most urban, rural and mixed counties had about the same infant mortality rate, although some higher rates may be a factor of small populations and number of births.

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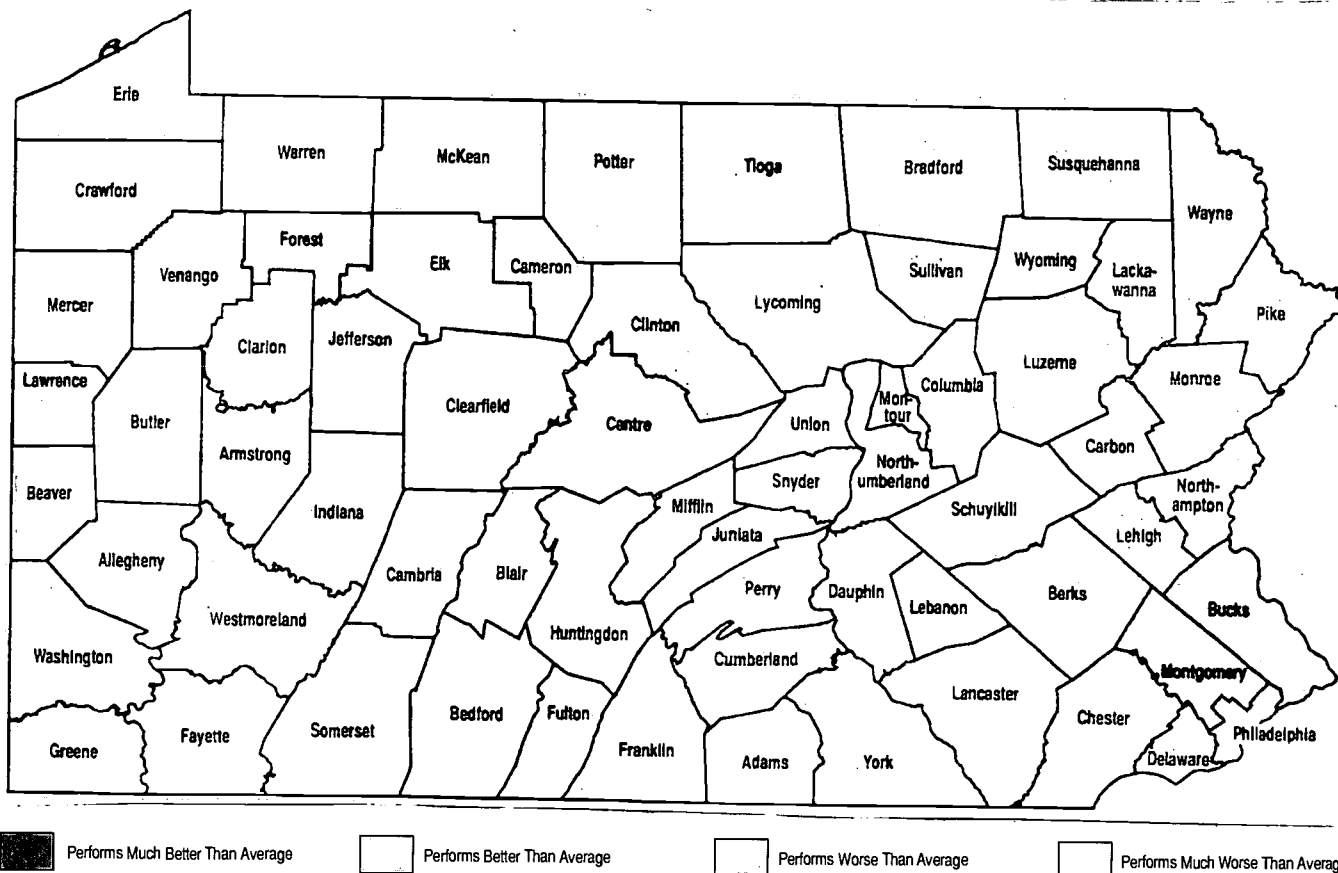

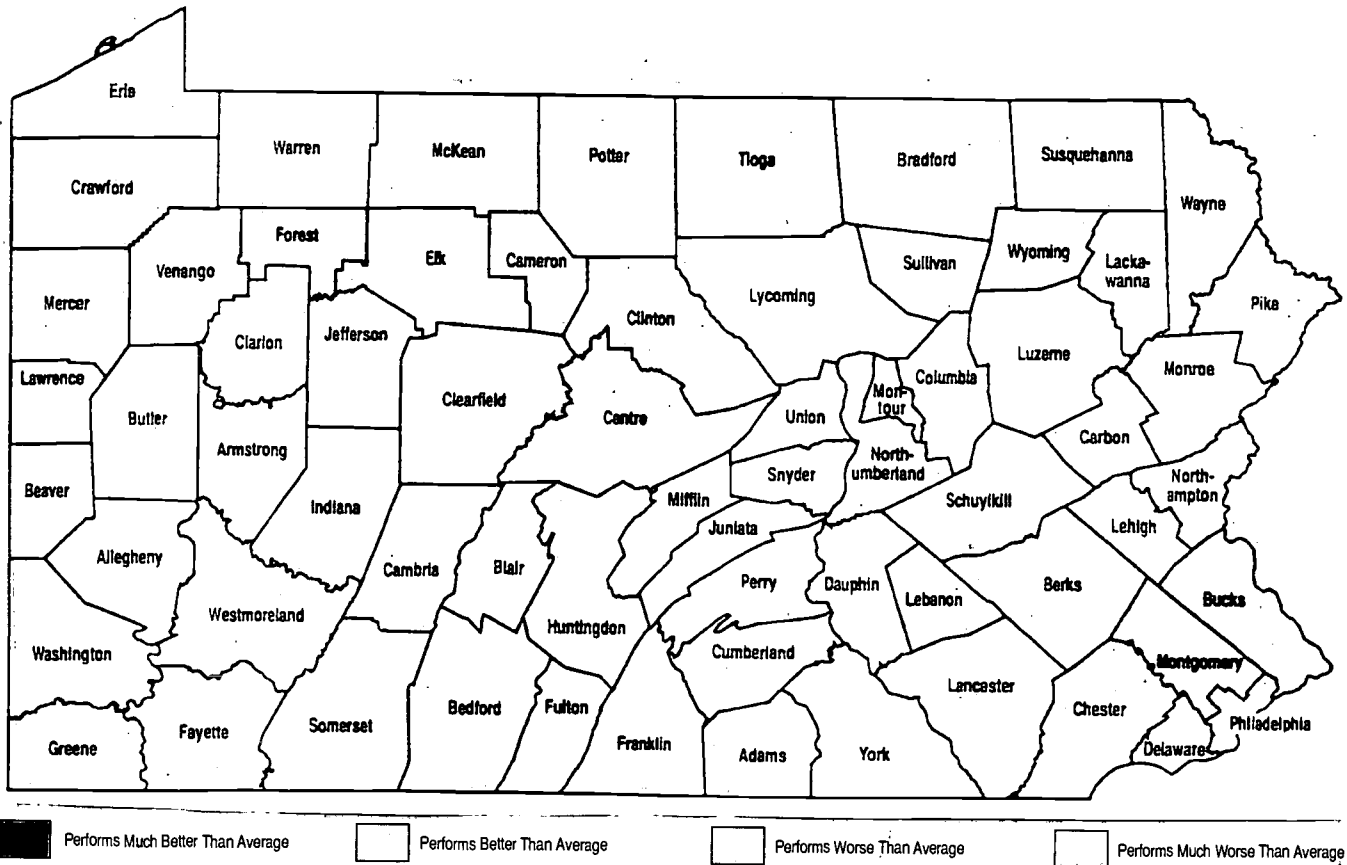

Child violent deaths include deaths due to automobile accidents and other unintentional injuries, homicide, and suicide for youths ages 1 through 19. The incidence of deaths by homicide is an indicator of delinquent behavior, hostility, and anger. It is also a reflection of access to firearms and an indicator of community safety. The incidence of suicides is an indicator of stress, mental health, and a lack of community and family support. Accidental deaths, or unintentional injuries, are an indicator of children's health and of risk-taking behavior, especially among teens. Unintentional injuries are also a measure of the adequacy of a broad range of public health and accident prevention strategies including public education, product development and use (e.g. bike helmets, safety belts, smoke detectors, etc.) and risk reduction and treatment sources (e.g. alcohol abuse prevention and treatment, poison control centers, recreation opportunities).

- 1 child in 4,687 suffered a violent death in 1999.
- The trend: The child violent death rate has remained level, at 21.1 violent deaths per 100,000 children in 1993, and 21.3 violent deaths per 100,000 children in 1999.
- The violent death rate was highest in urban and mixed counties. Rural rates for violent deaths were better than the state average.

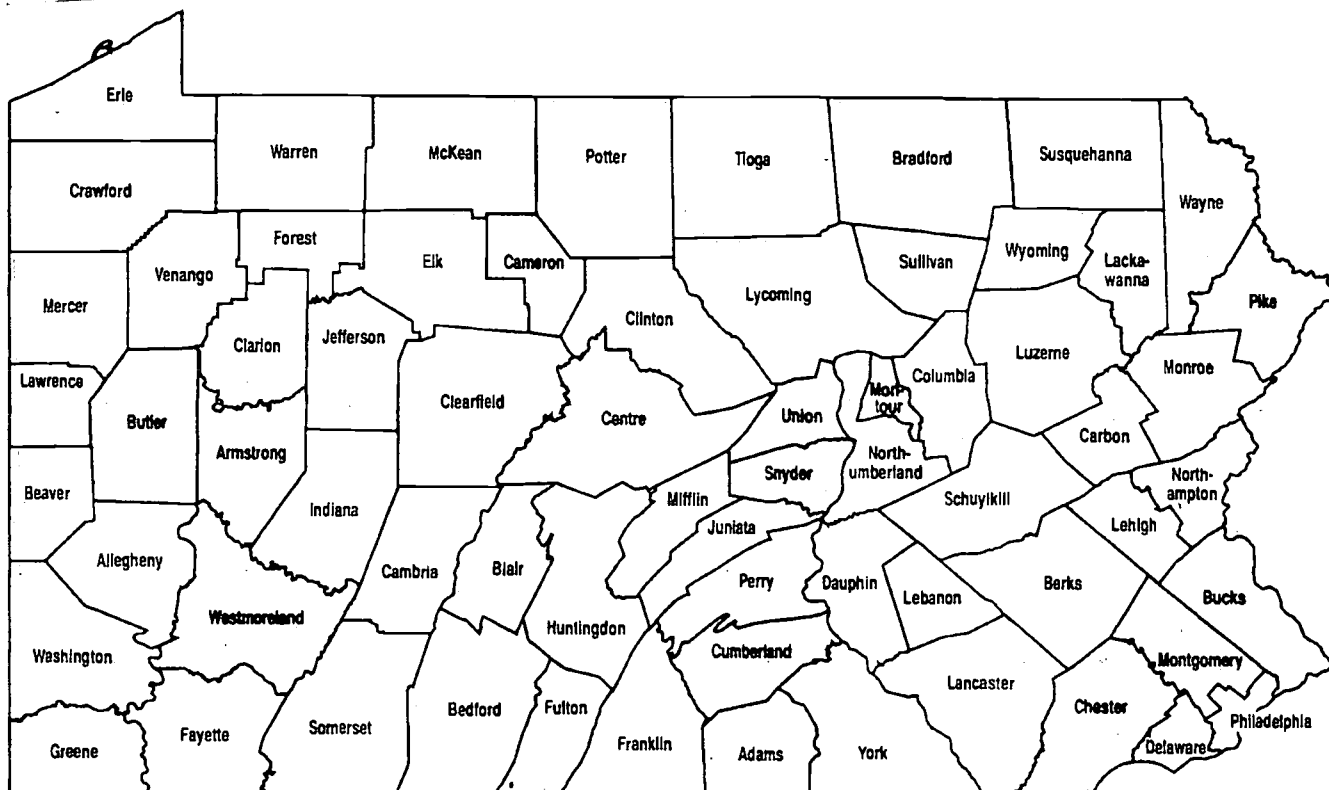

Unmarried mothers under 20 are at risk of future economic hardship for both themselves and their new child. Young mothers are less likely to finish high school, and are far more likely to be poor, unmarried, and to receive welfare for some period of time than those giving birth at later ages. Children born to single mothers under age 20 are more likely to be at risk for failure throughout their lives. High teenage birth rates are closely associated with other factors such as low birth weight, reduced levels of prenatal care, and elevated infant mortality.

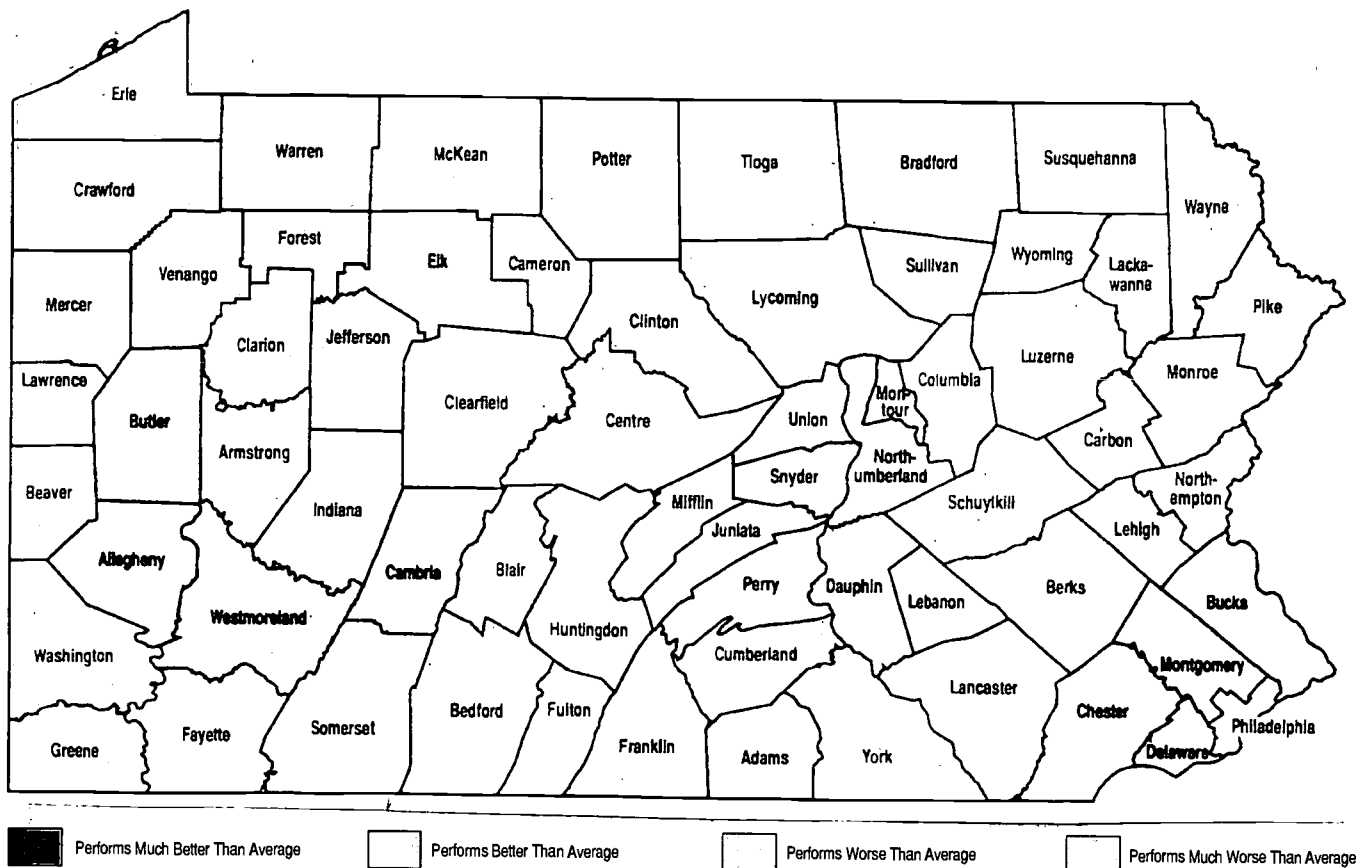

Children Born to Mothers with Less Than a High School Education

1997-1999

A parent's lack of a high school diploma or GED has a direct, and detrimental, impact on children's well-being and educational achievement. Children born to parents with less than a high school education - parents with limited schooling and fewer employment prospects - are likelier to live in poverty and have lower reading skills. Pregnant women without a high school education are likelier to endanger their fetuses by smoking and receiving inadequate prenatal care.

The Pennsylvania Picture

- 1 child in 7 was born to a mother with less than a high school education in 1999.
- The trend: In 1999, 14.8% of children were born to mothers with less than a high school education. This is an improvement from 16.4% in 1990.
- The urban rate was slightly higher than the rest of the state, but the problem was not exclusively urban, as shown by below-average rates in 15 of the state's 33 rural counties.

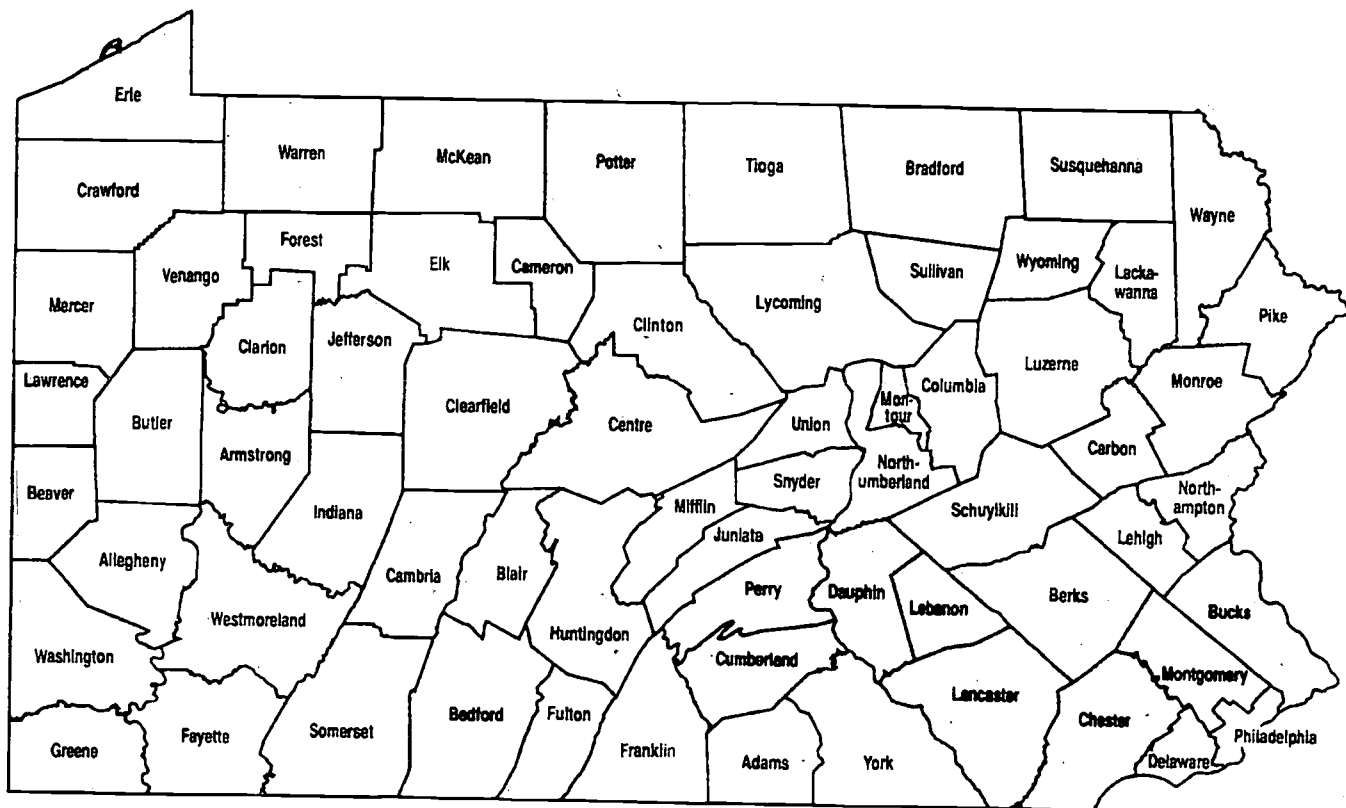

Tobacco use during pregnancy can contribute to physical, mental and developmental disabilities in children, while also increasing health care costs. Infants born to women who smoked during pregnancy face greater likelihood of premature birth and low birth weights, stillbirth and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome, and poor lung development, asthma, and respiratory infections.

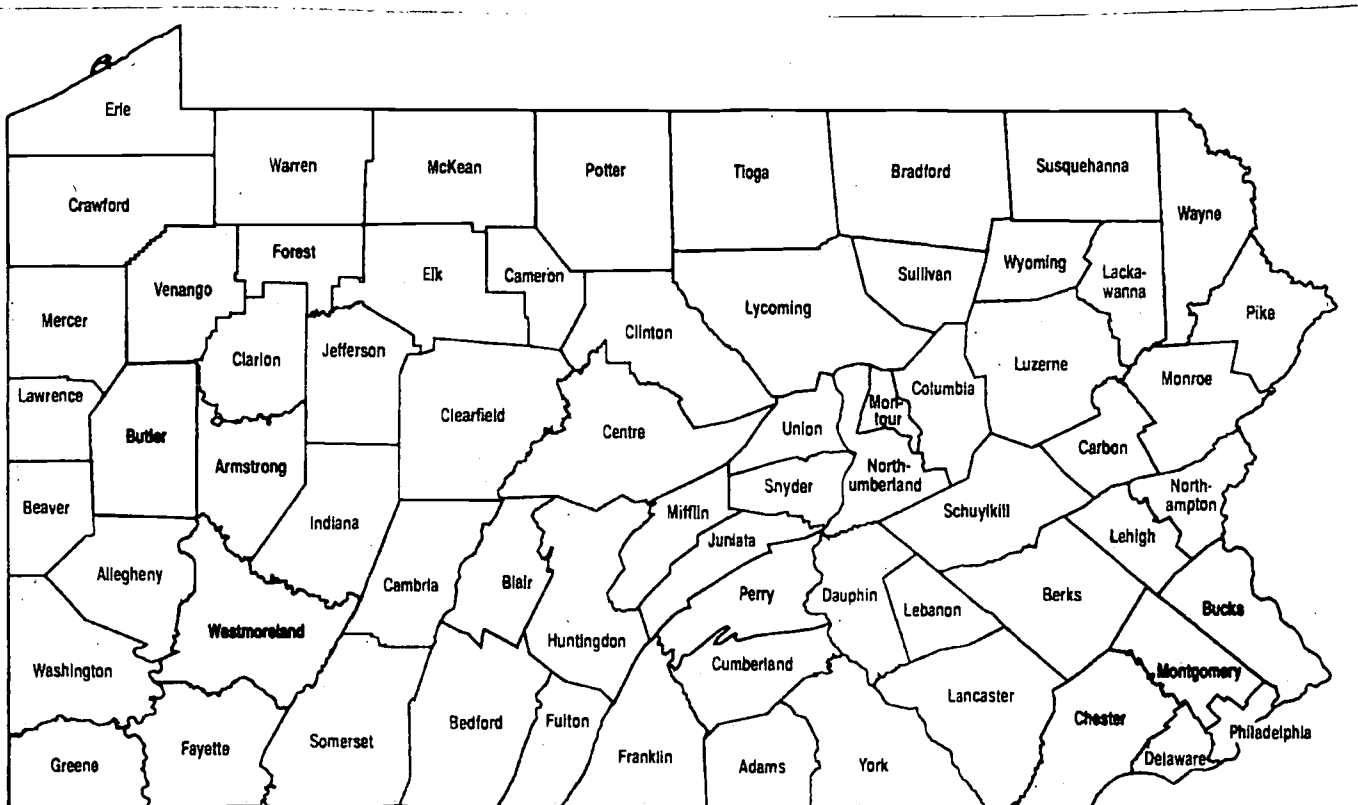

1998-2000

Reports of suspected abuse and neglect of children are investigated by county children and youth agencies. Substantiated abuse cases include children that a judge or child protective service staff have determined were abused based on medical evidence, the investigation, or an admission by the perpetrator. Child victims of abuse are more likely to perform poorly in school, have health problems, and be arrested as juveniles or adults. Very young children are most likely to be abused. The incidence of abuse is believed to be much higher than cases that are reported to authorities. In Pennsylvania close to 15 percent of substantiated abuse cases involve children who were previously abused.

- The trend: Substantiated child abuse cases have dropped steadily, from a peak of 3 cases per 1,000 children in 1992, to 1.7 cases per 1,000 children in 2000.
- Urban and rural counties showed the same rate of 1.9 substantiated abuse and neglect cases per 1,000 children.

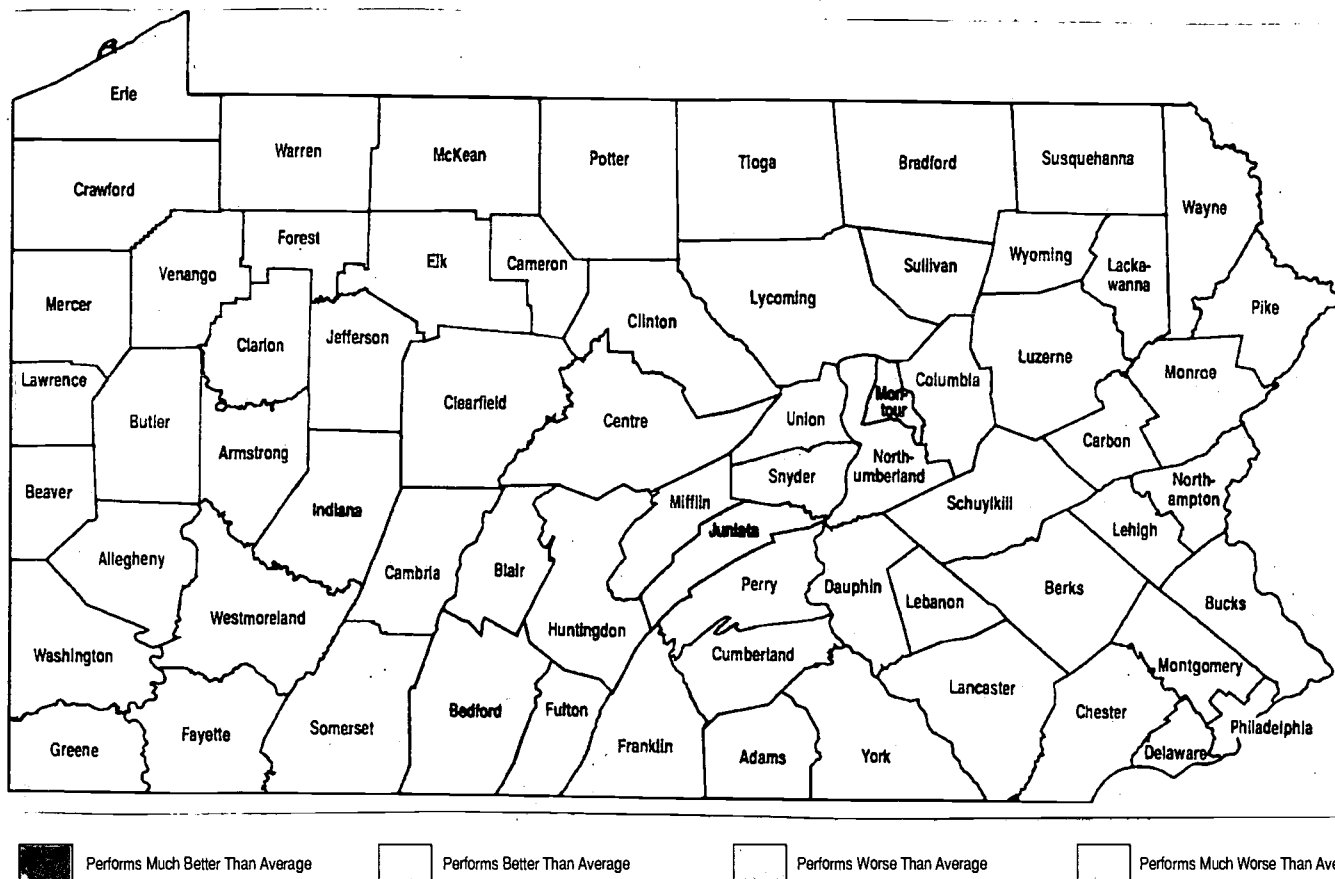

Children Under Age 18 in Out-of-Home Placements

1997-1999

The number of children in out-of-home child welfare placements such as foster care, group homes, and other substitute residential care reflects social conditions and the conditions within families which pose substantial risk for children. Family instability, poverty, crime, violence, homelessness, substance abuse, and serious illness contribute to the need to place children out of their own homes. Increases and decreases in the number of children in out-of-home care, however, are not intrinsically good or bad as this may occur for a variety of reasons. Any interpretation of data trends must be accompanied by analysis of other factors to determine the nature of the trends. Unlike many other indicators in this publication, this indicator is a count of children in placement on one day of the year. Children enter and leave placements all the time, and the one-day snapshot count reflects children who have been in placement for several years as well as those who have been in care for a short time.

- In 1999, 1 child in 125 was placed out of the home.
- The trend: Since 1990, out-of-home placements have risen from 6 children in 1,000 to 8 children in 1,000.
- Only a handful of counties - all of them rural - performed much better than average, while a mix of rural and suburban counties showed below-average rates.

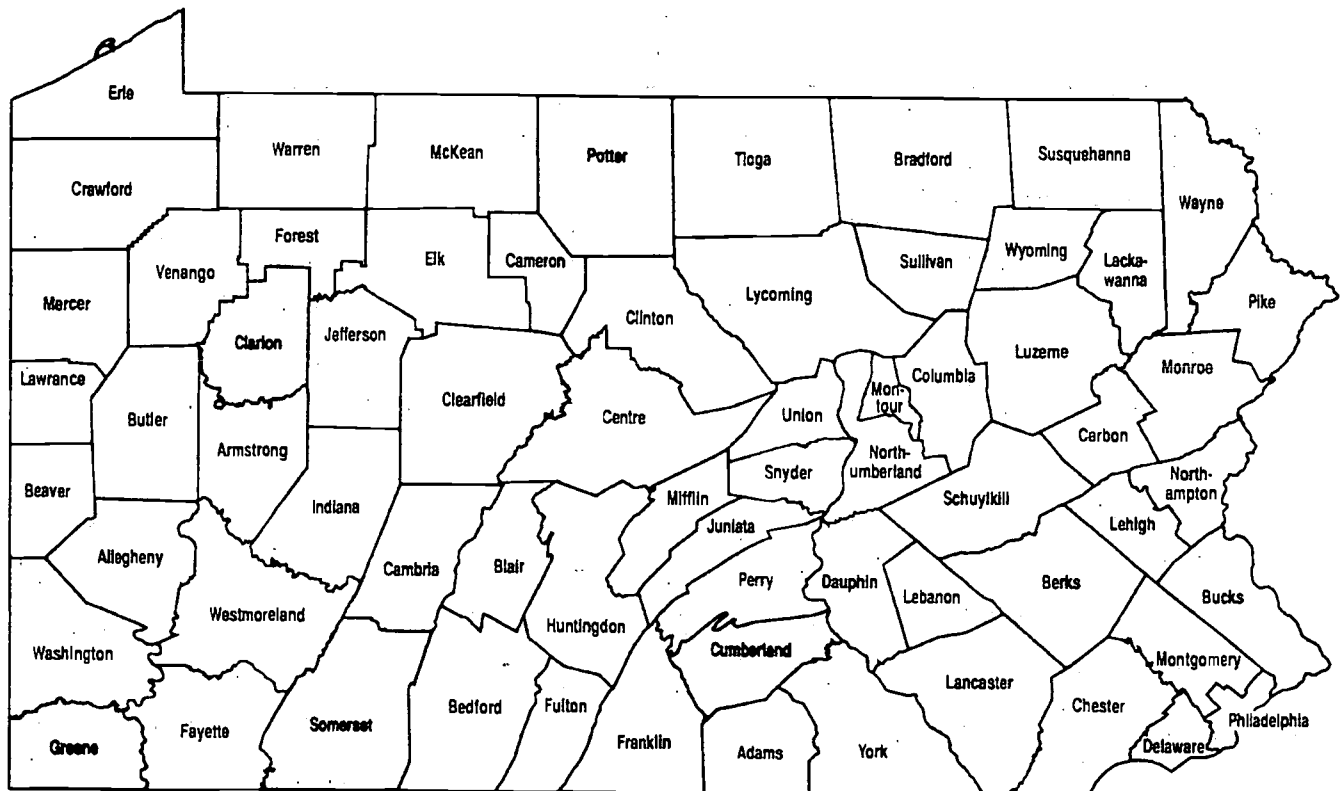

1997-1999

Delinquent children placed out-of-home by juvenile court have been involved in criminal activity and status offenses such as school truancy, curfew violations, and running away from home. This is an index of court decision-making regarding this anti-social and self-destructive behavior and the decision to place a child out of his or her home for punishment or treatment. Involvement in criminal activity is a negative outcome for children, represents a group of adolescents who may be on a problematic path to adulthood, and diminishes community safety. The use of out-of-home versus other placement options for juveniles may increase or decrease for a variety of reasons, and any interpretation of data trends must be accompanied by analysis of other factors to determine the nature of the trends.

- With a few notable exceptions, rural and mixed counties generally performed better than average.

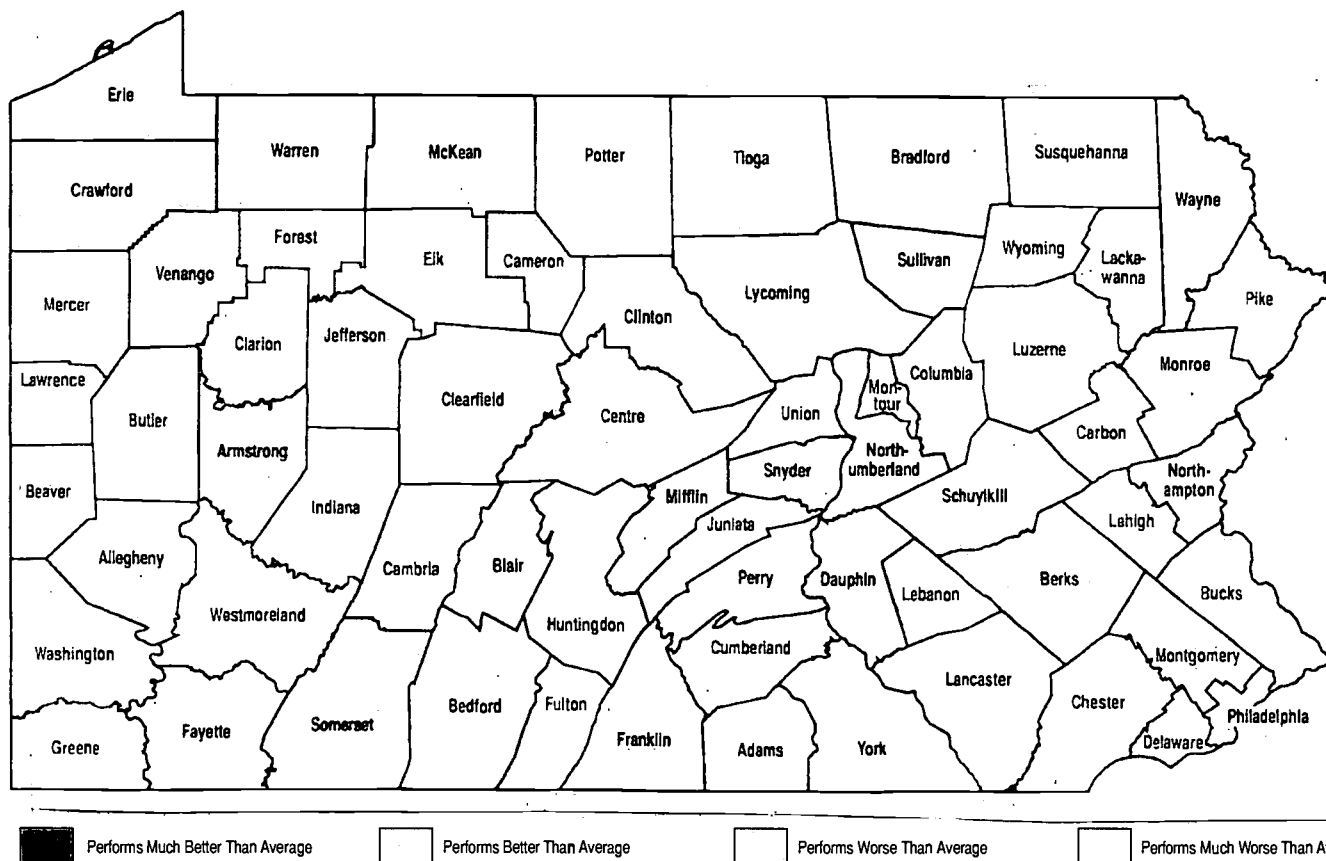

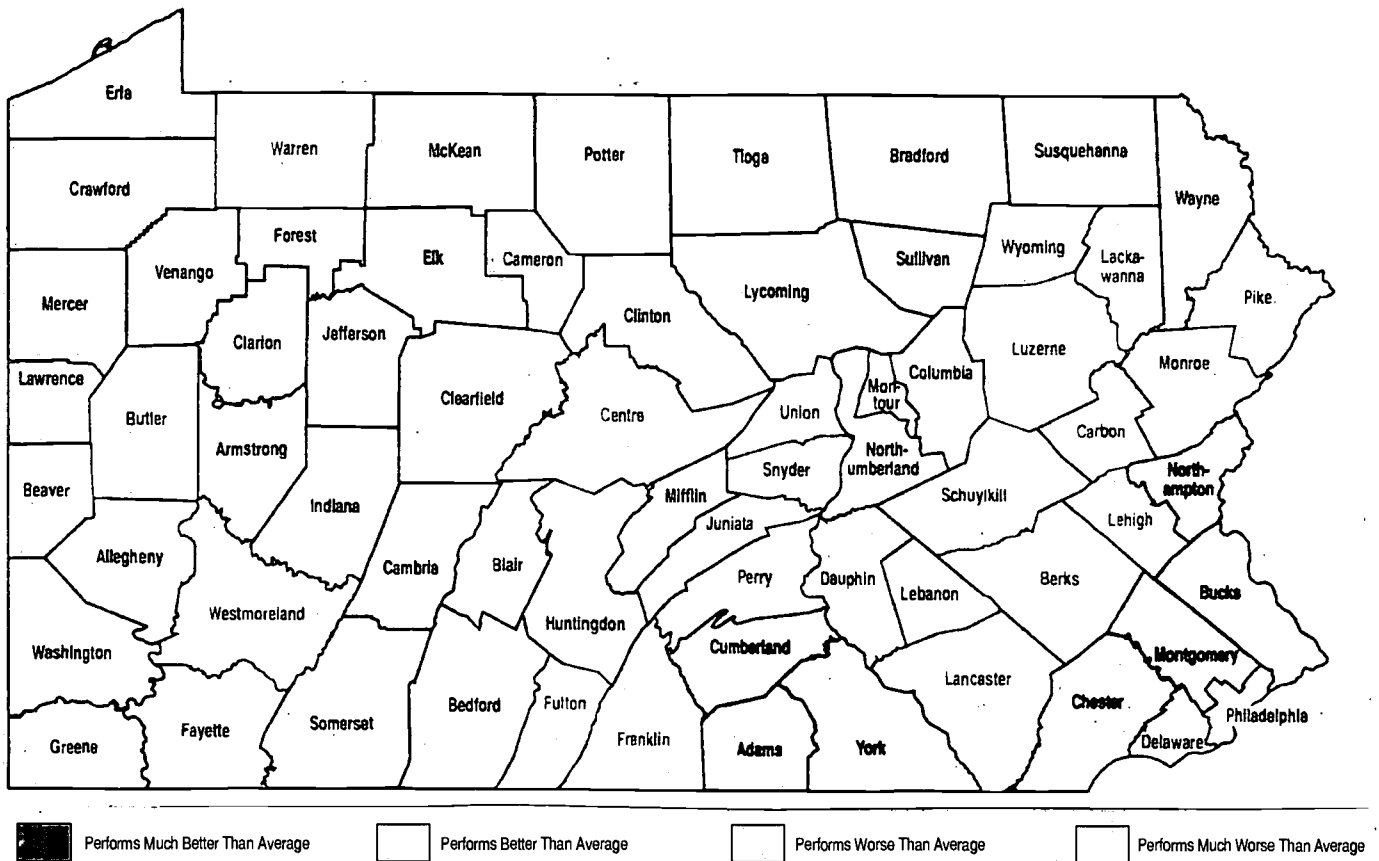

Poverty is the greatest, most consistent risk factor that accompanies nearly every major problem of children and families. These problems include infant mortality, slower cognitive development, juvenile delinquency, and lower levels of educational and socioeconomic attainment as adults. By contrast, families with more financial resources are able to give their children a far broader range of experiences, which increases their access to opportunities and helps build confidence and aspirations to succeed.

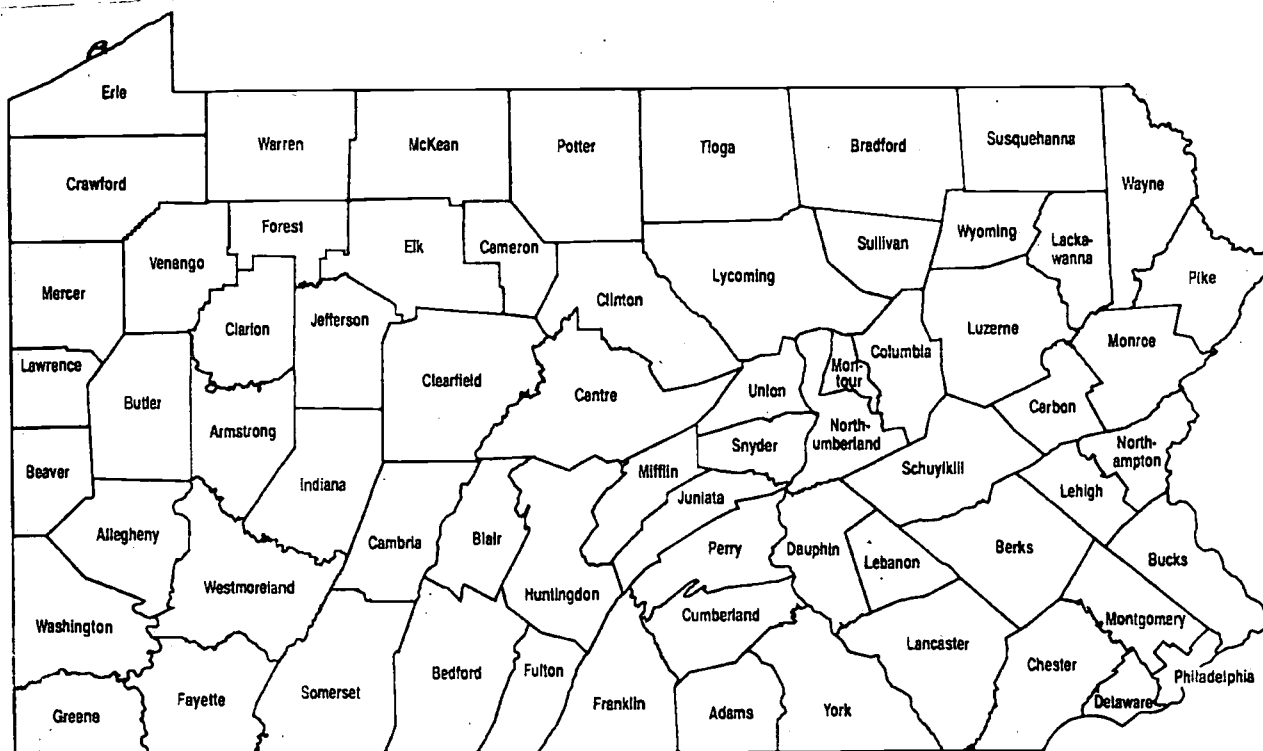

Children receiving Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF; formerly AFDC) are the poorest of poor children. The TANF program provides cash welfare payments for needy children under 18 who would otherwise be deprived of parental support and care. Changes in state and federal welfare laws in 1997 put TANF support on a time-limited basis while the parent(s) are increasing their earnings capability. Adult recipients, who are the parents of children under age 18, with a few minor exemptions, must be working 20 hours or more a week within two years of receiving assistance, and receipt of benefits is limited to a maximum of five years in a lifetime.

- 1 child in 17 received TANF in 2001.
- The trend: Children receiving TANF/AFDC dropped sharply from 12.3% in 1990 to 6.3% in 2001. TANF rolls peaked in 1994 and 1995 and have been dropping steadily.
- Urban children, who make up 53% of the state's children, accounted for 77% of children receiving TANF. Rates were lower for rural and mixed counties.

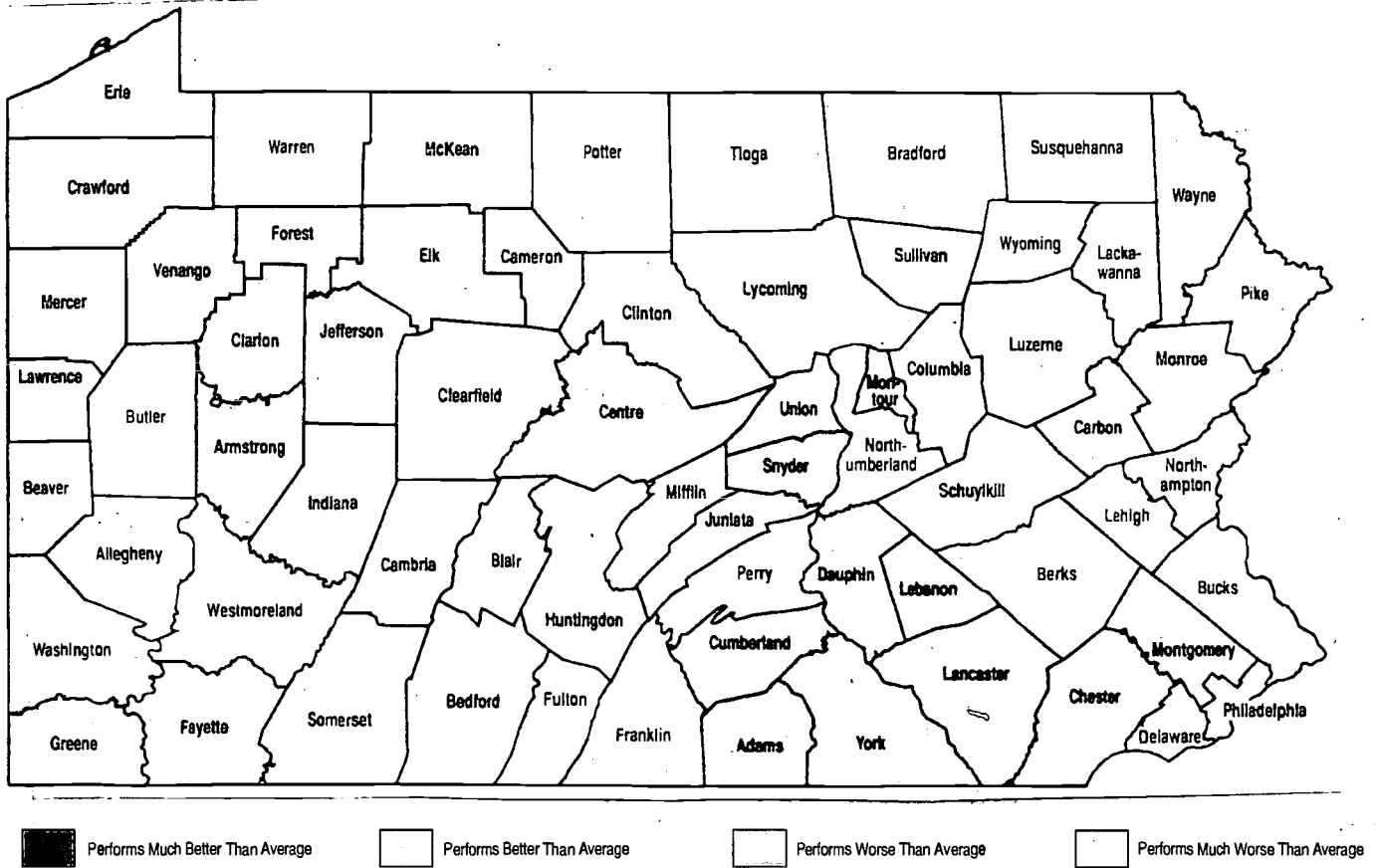

The unemployment rate is widely regarded as a key indicator of economic well-being. It indicates the difficulty that parents and others are likely to experience in finding work. The unemployment rate is the number of unemployed persons divided by the civilian labor force, multiplied by 100. The civilian labor force includes employed and unemployed persons. Unemployed persons are those 16 and over without jobs but available for and actively looking for work. Those who do not meet the definitions for being employed or unemployed are classified as "not in the labor force", including school students, retirees, and those with family care responsibilities or disabilities.

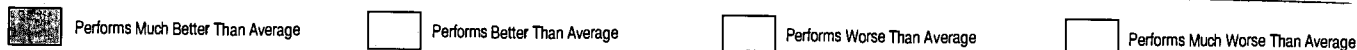
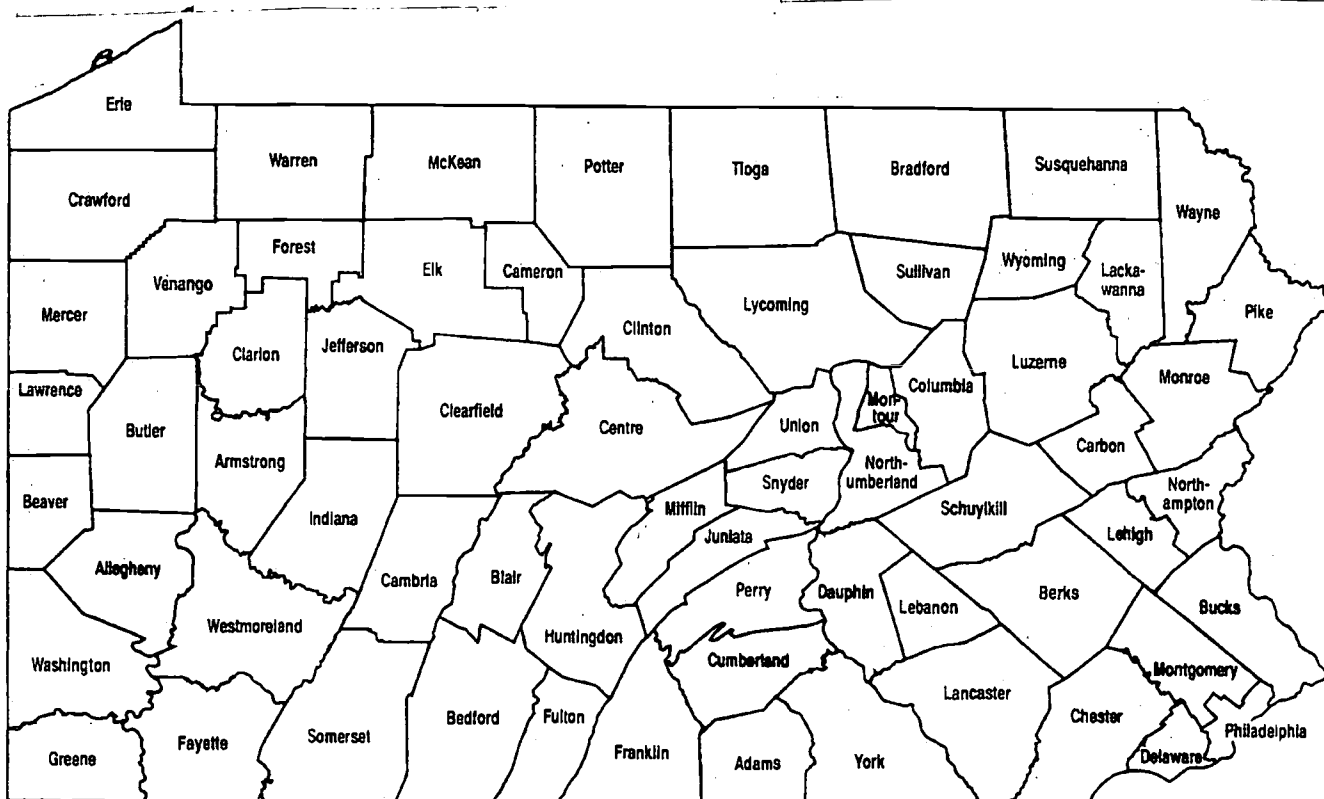

Personal income per capita is a measure of the economic well-being of the community and its ability as individual families and through its local institutions to provide for all of its residents. It is computed by dividing the total income of an area by its total population. Personal income includes wages and salaries, fringe benefits, interest, Social Security and cash welfare payments, and rent, profit, and dividend income accruing to individuals and small businesses. When comparing across geographic areas, figures with a cost of living adjustment (COLA) provide a better picture of relative economic conditions. Adjustment can change the ranking of some counties markedly, such as those counties where the cost of living is high.

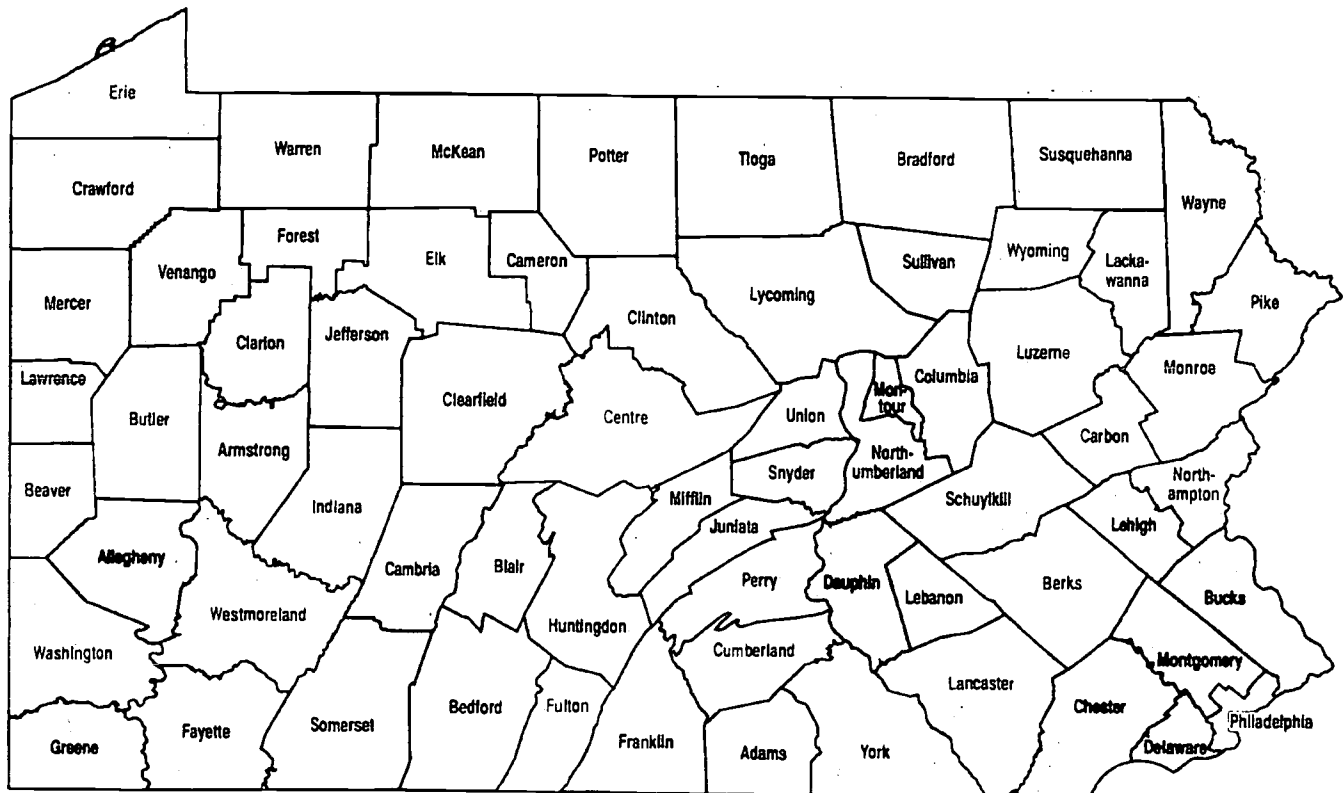

Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



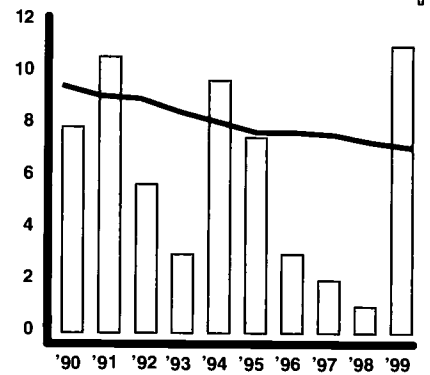

Babies Born at Low Birth Weight per 100 births



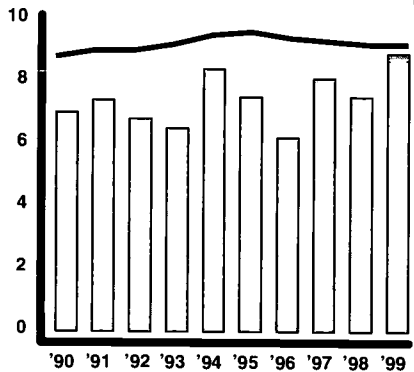

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



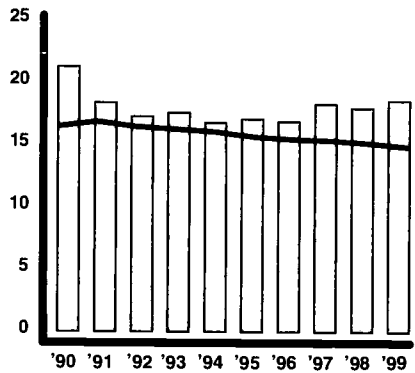

Children Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 per 100 births



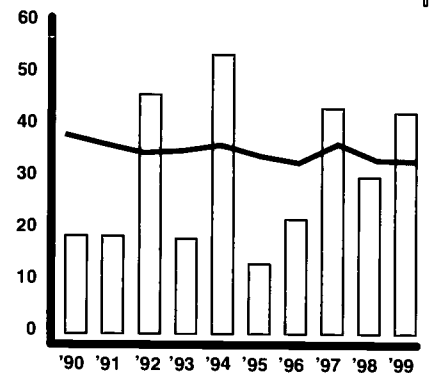

Children Born to Mothers with Less Than a High School Education per 100 births



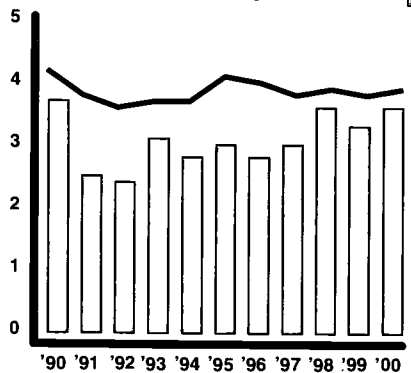

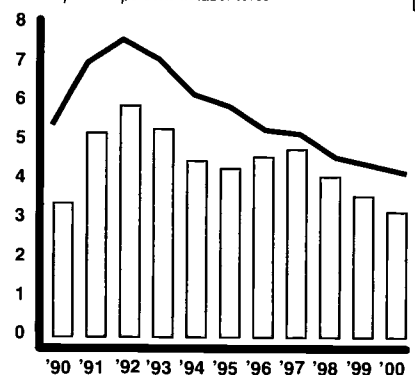

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



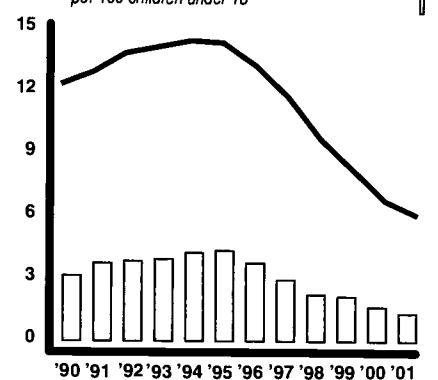

Unemployment per 100 persons in labor force



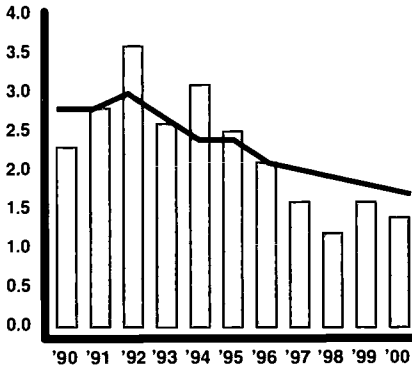

Children Receiving TANF/AFDC per 100 children under 18



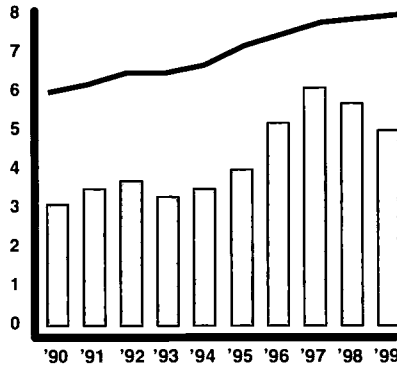

per 1,000 children under 18



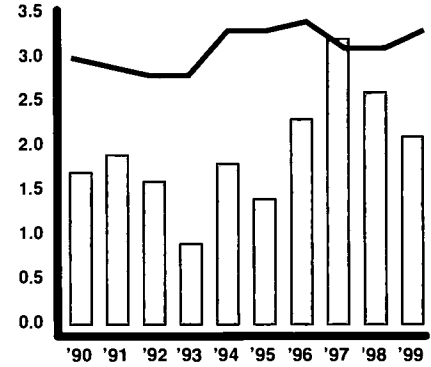

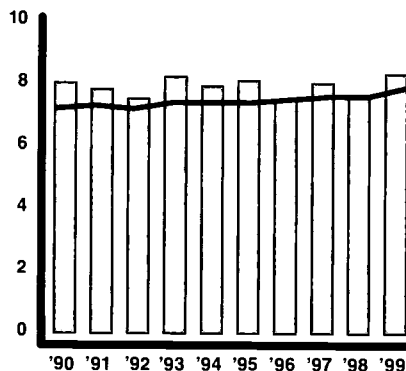


Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



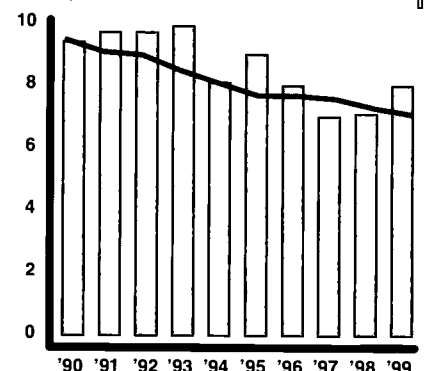

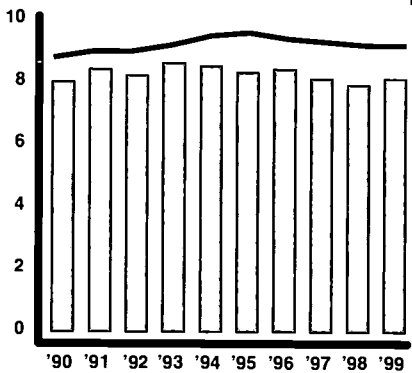

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



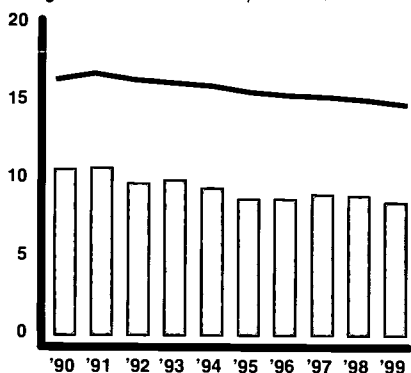

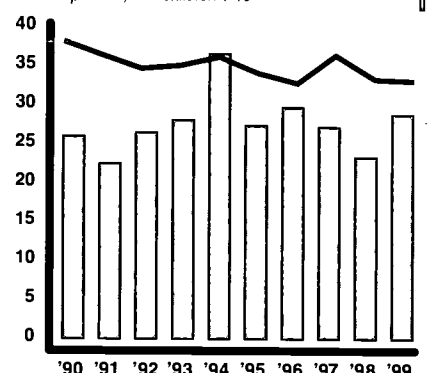

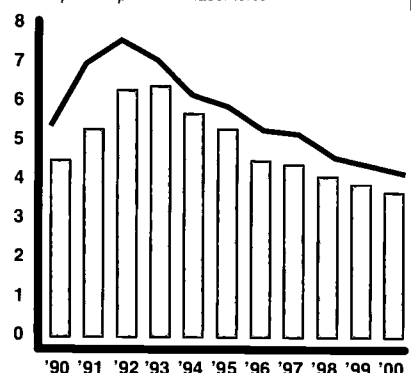

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



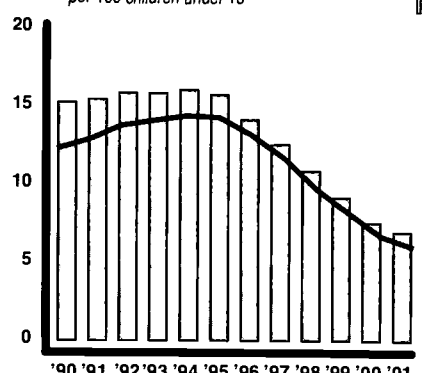

Unemployment per 100 persons in labor force



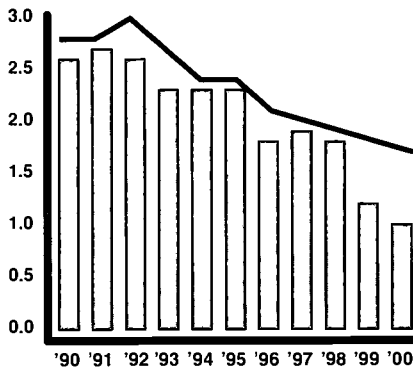

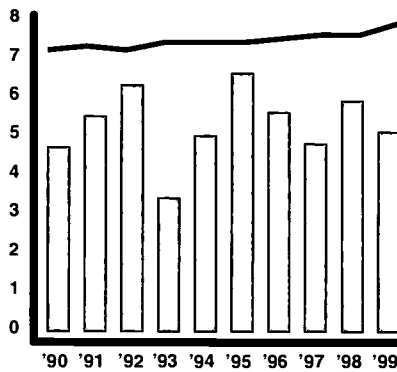

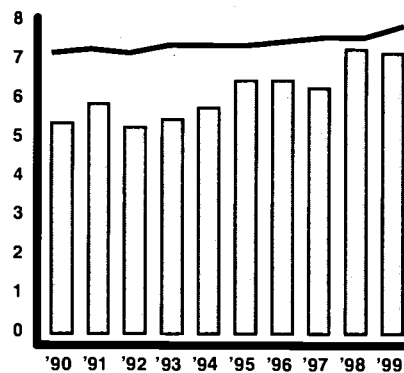


Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



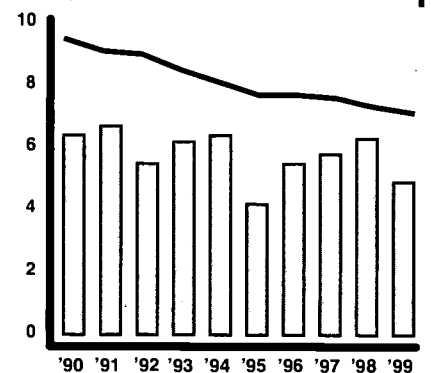

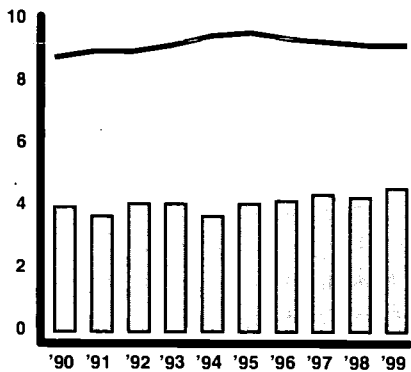

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



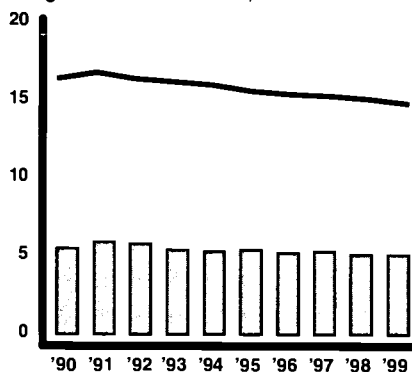

Children Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20 per 100 births



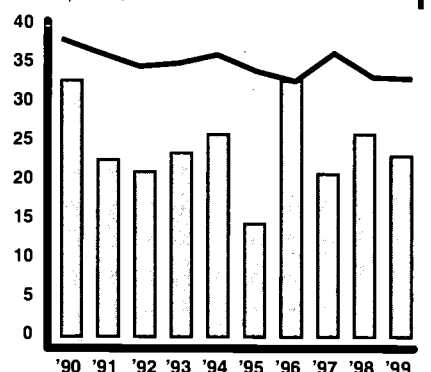

Children Born to Mothers with Less Than a High School Education per 100 births



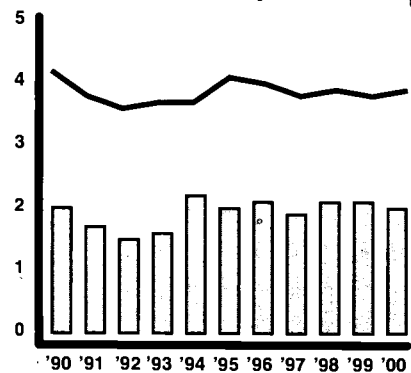

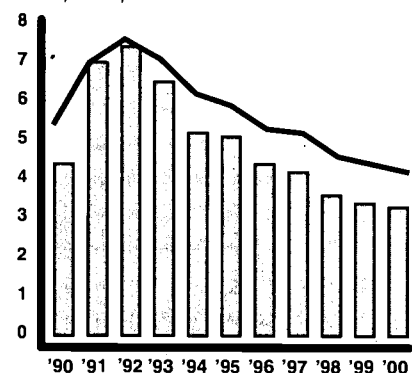

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



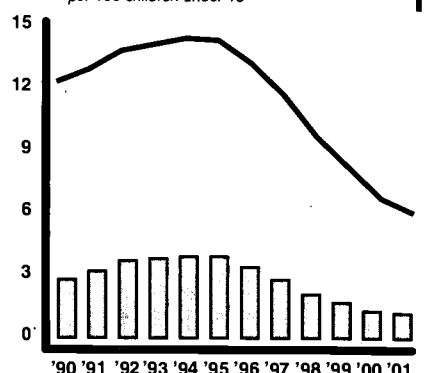

Unemployment per 100 persons in labor force



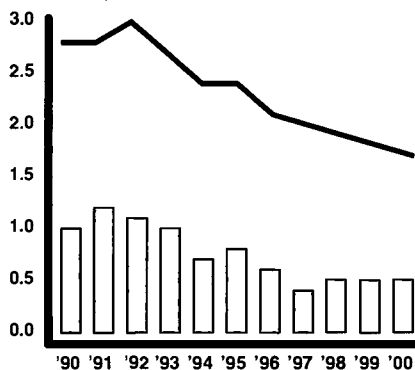

Children Receiving TANF/AFDC per 100 children under 18



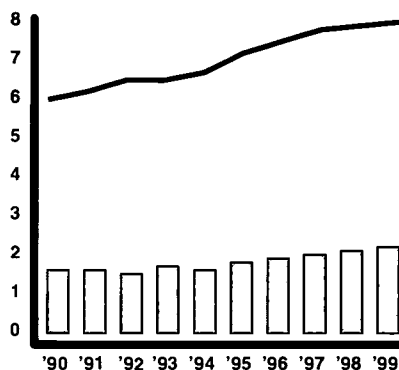

Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



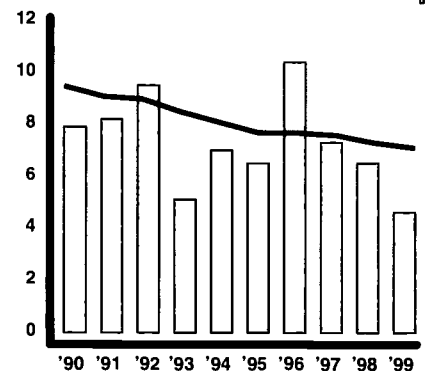

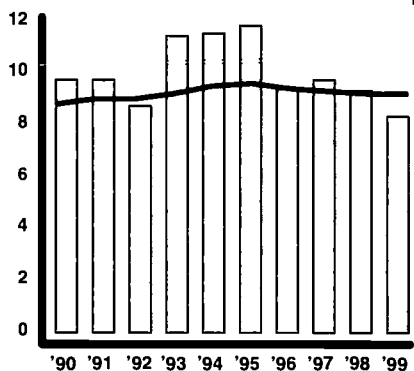

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



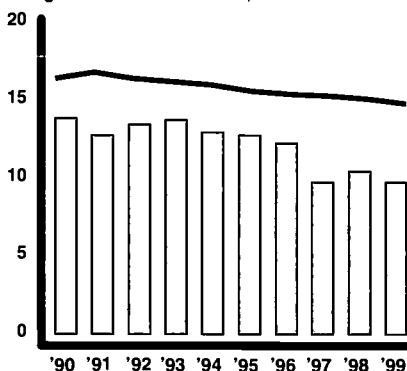

per 100 births



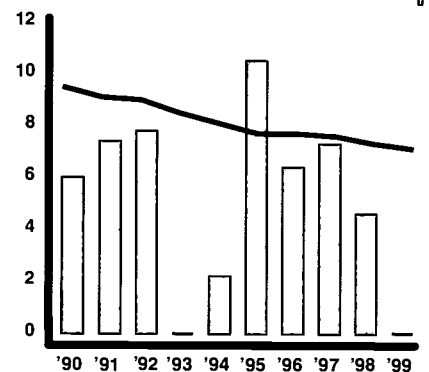

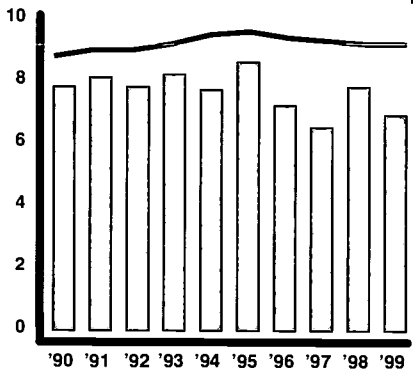

per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



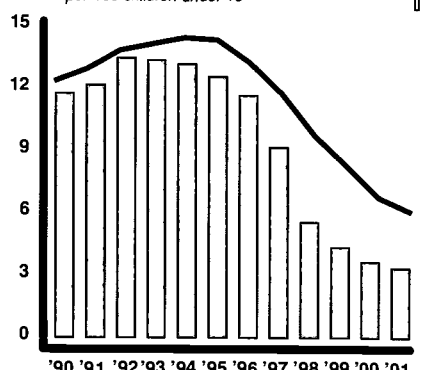

Babies Born at Low Birth Weight per 100 births



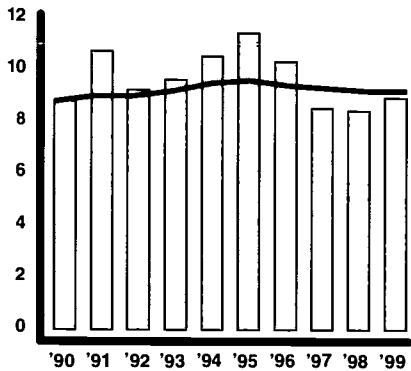

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



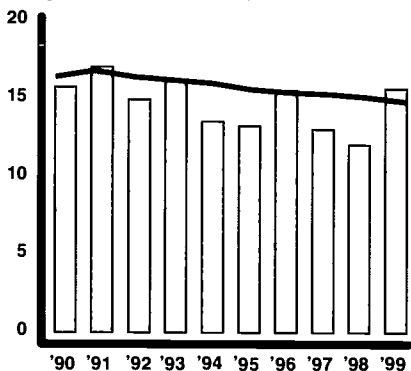

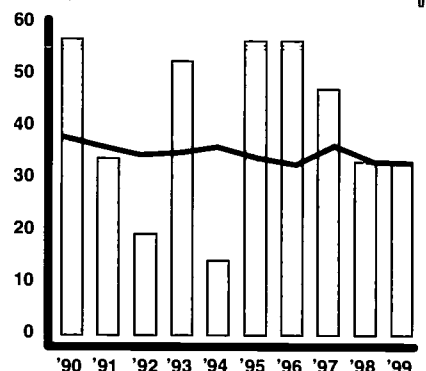

Children Born to Mothers with Less Than a High School Education per 100 births



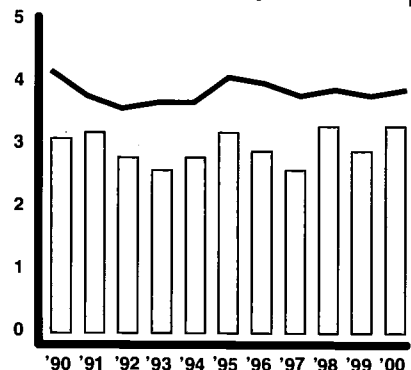

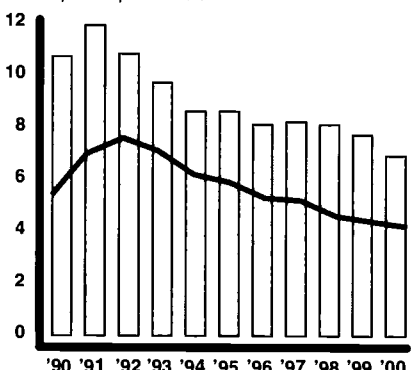

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



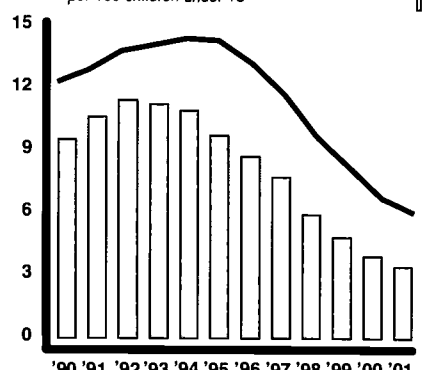

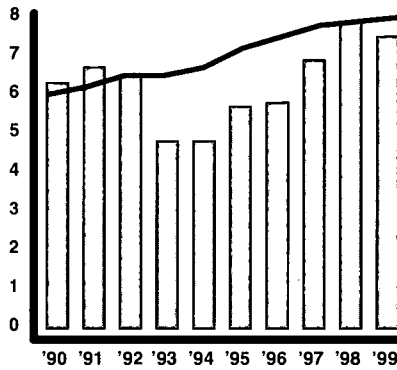


Children Abused or Neglected - Substantiated Cases

Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



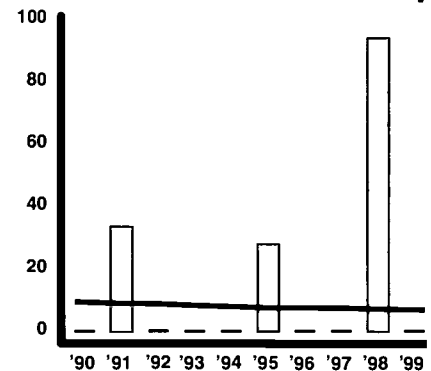

per 100 births



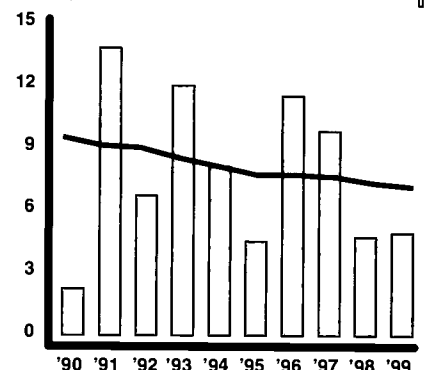

per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



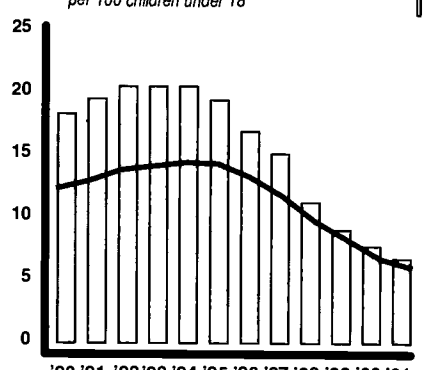

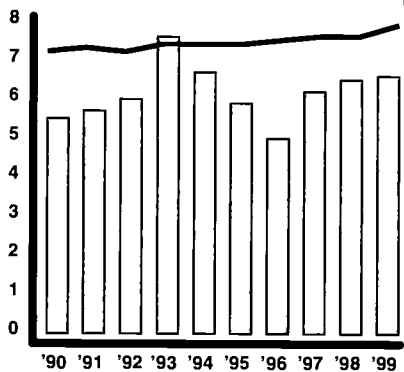

Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



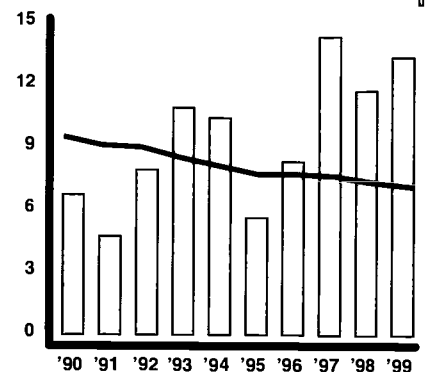

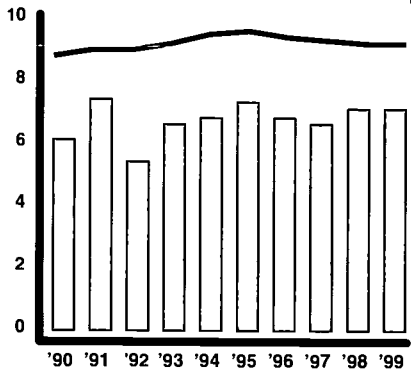

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



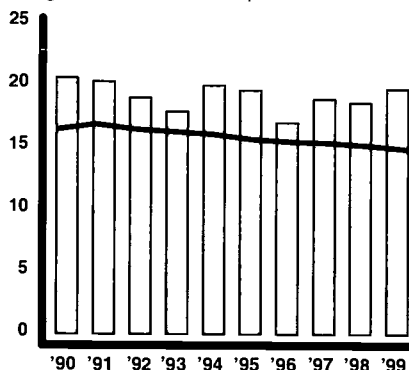

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



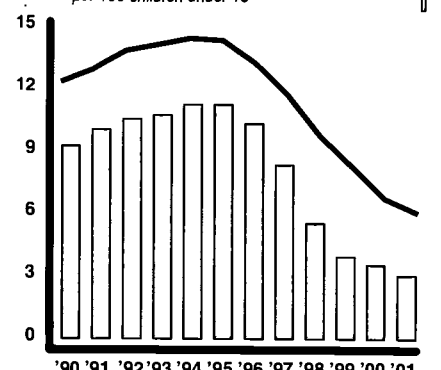

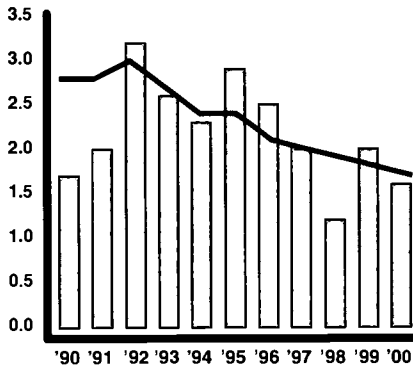

Children Receiving TAN/FD/C per 100 children under 18



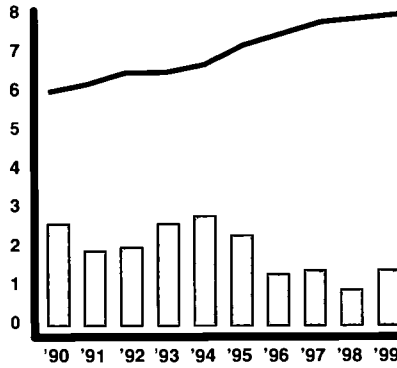

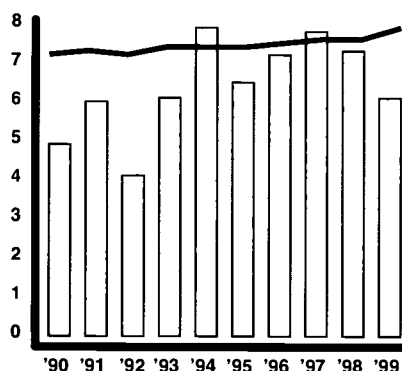

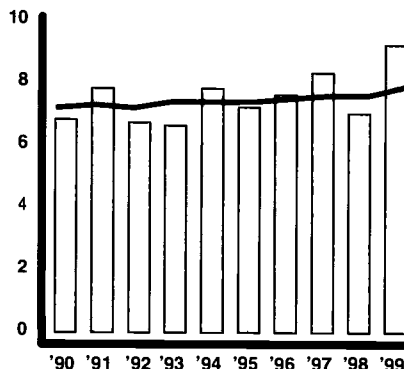

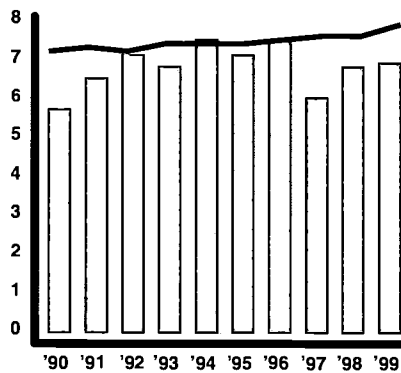

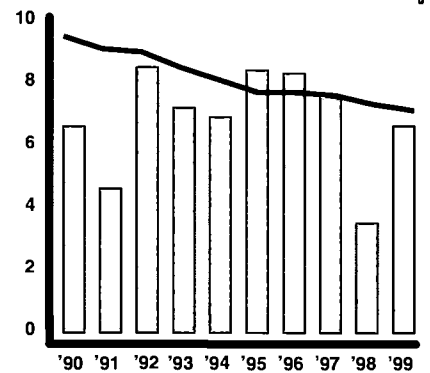

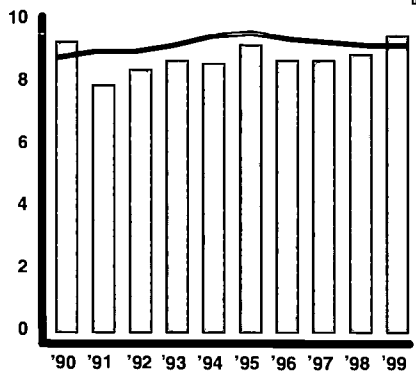

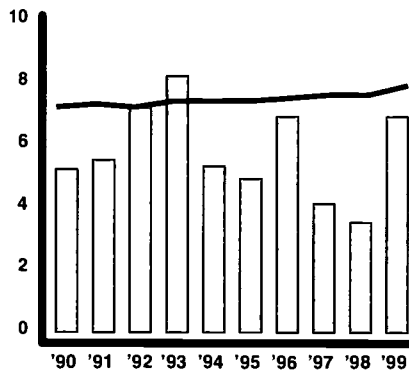

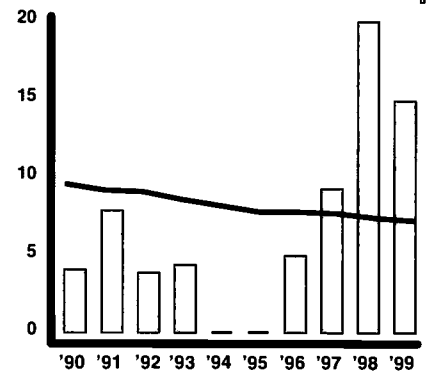

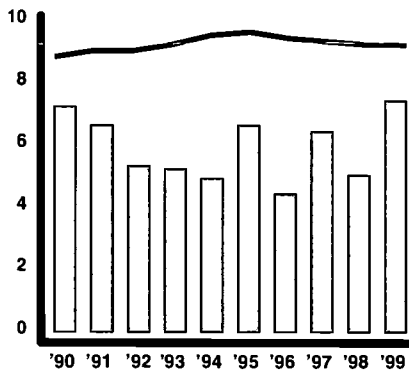

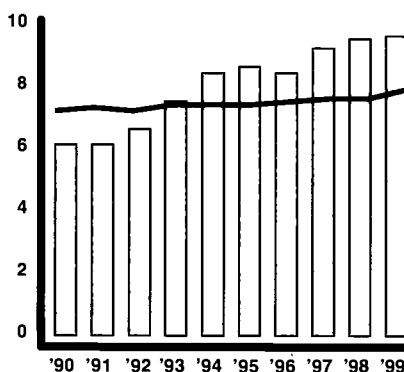

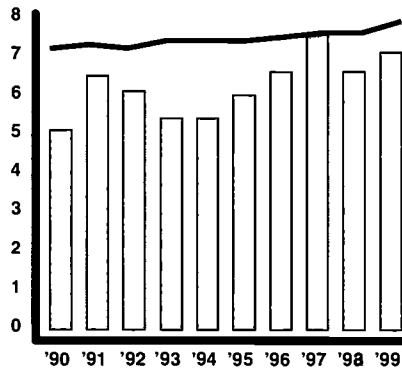

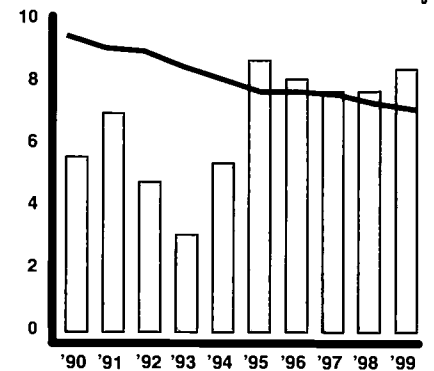

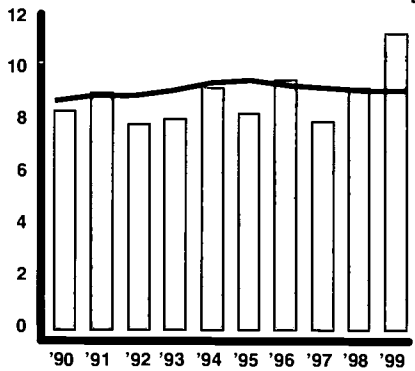

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



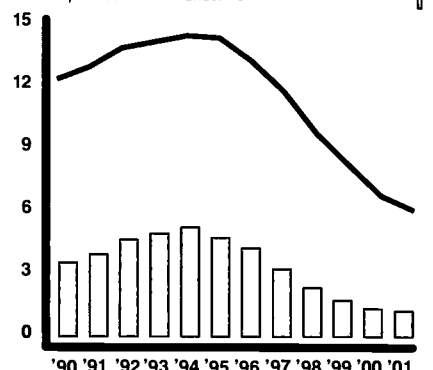

per 100 births



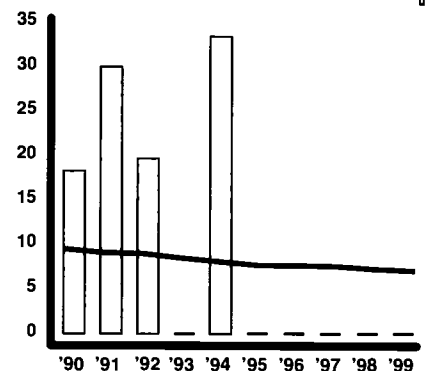

Infant Mortality per 1,000 births



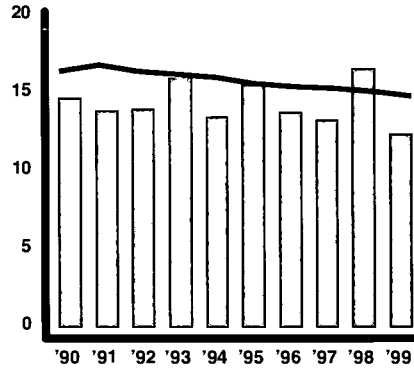

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



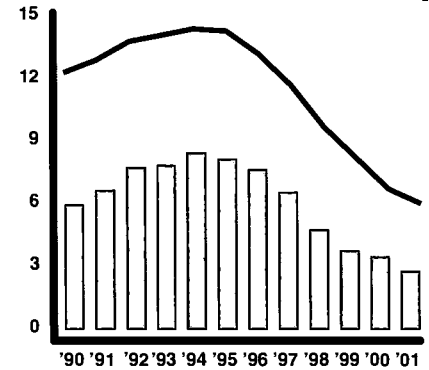

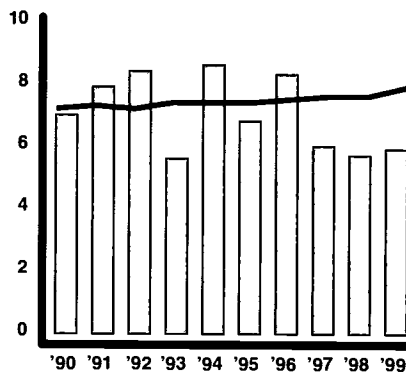

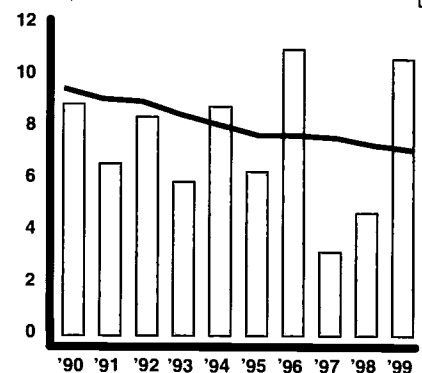

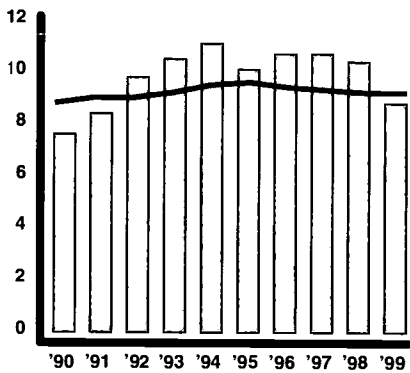

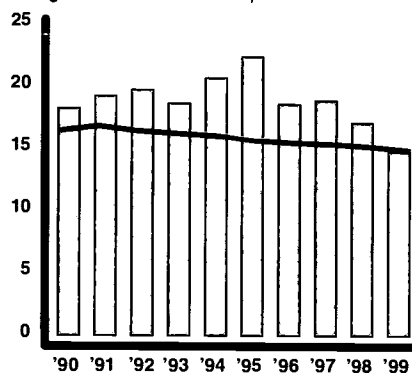

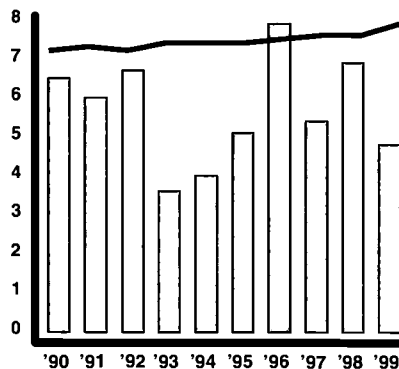

Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



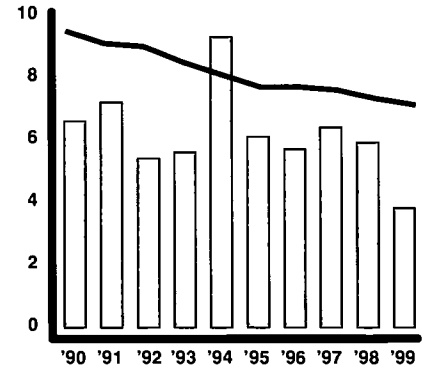

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



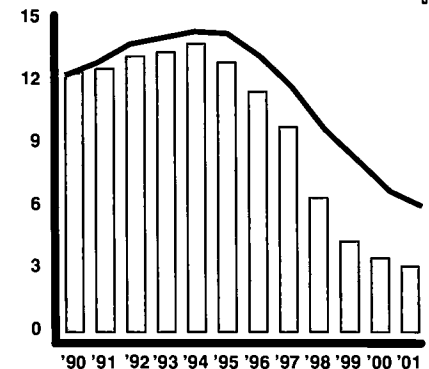

Lack of Early Prenatal Care per 100 births



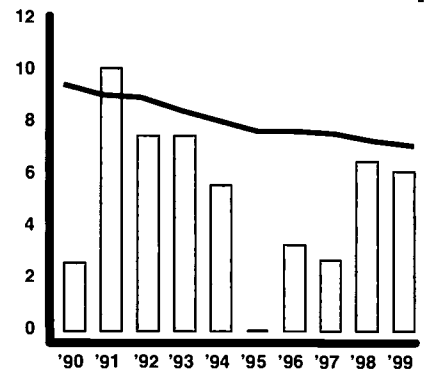

Children Dropping Out of Public School per 100 students enrolled in grades 9-12



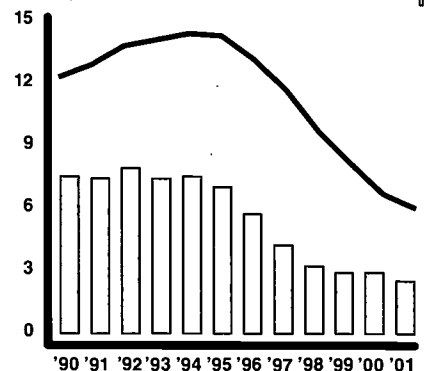

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Indicator Definitions and Sources

Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children gathers data for *The State of the Child* from the most reliable sources available, as reported to or collected by them. Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children is not responsible for discrepancies between the data as reported and the existing status of an indicator.

Average Annual Wage Adjusted

Average annual wage represents the gross wages for a county divided by the average number of employees in a geographic area. Overtime pay is included in the gross wages, but bonuses and benefits are not included. Average annual wage is for the non-agricultural sector and includes employees in the Unemployment Compensation system only. Persons not in the UC system include: clergy, persons working in their own family-owned businesses, and persons freelancing, working as self-employed consultants, or independent contractors. Federal employees are not in the UC system and have been excluded from the totals. Average annual wage is adjusted using a “weight” developed by the Center for Rural Pennsylvania. Notes on this adjustment index are provided in “General Note on Cost-of-Living Adjustment”, below. The data reflect a calendar year.

The child death rate is the number of child deaths from all causes, ages 1 through 19, divided by the population of children 1 through 19, multiplied by 100,000. The data reflect a calendar year.

Child Violent Deaths Ages 1-19

The child violent death rate is the number of child “violent” deaths (due to homicide, suicide, and nonintentional injury), ages 1 through 19, divided by the population of children 1 through 19, multiplied by 100,000. The data reflect a calendar year.

Children Born to Single Mothers Under Age 20

The percentage of births to single mothers under age 20 is the number of births to unmarried women under age 20 divided by the total births, multiplied by 100. The data reflect a calendar year.

Children Born to Mothers Who Used Tobacco During Pregnancy

The percentage of babies born to mothers who used tobacco during pregnancy is the number of births to women who used tobacco during pregnancy divided by the number of births with tobacco use known, multiplied by 100. The data reflect a calendar year.

Children Born to Mothers with Less than a High School Education

The percentage of babies born to mothers with less than a high school education is the number of births to women with less than a high school education divided by the number of births with mothers' education status known, multiplied by 100. The data reflect a calendar year.

Children Dropping Out of Public School

A dropout is any student from grades 7 through 12 who, for any reason other than death, leaves school before graduation without transferring to another school or institution, and is recorded by the school and reported to the Pennsylvania Department of Education. The vast majority of Pennsylvania public school dropouts occur in grades 9-12 (over 95% in each academic year). The school dropout rate is the number of dropouts in grades 7 through 12 recorded for an academic year divided by the annual one-day count enrollment for grades 9 through 12 plus ungraded secondary enrollments, multiplied by 100. Data reflect a September-June academic year with the later calendar year used for labeling.

Children Enrolled in Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)

CHIP is a joint federal-state program providing health insurance coverage for children in families whose income exceeds the eligibility guidelines for Medicaid but do not have employer-based or private health insurance. Within federal guidelines, each state designs and administers its own program. CHIP is not an entitlement program. In Pennsylvania, benefits under CHIP are defined by the Department of Insurance and provided through private health insurance companies. CHIP is free to families under 200% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines and is available at low-cost to families whose income is less than 235%. The data reflect an estimated average monthly enrollment for the state fiscal year (July to June) with the later calendar year used for labeling.

Children Enrolled in Head Start

Head Start is a federally supported and locally administered preschool program for disadvantaged children from low-income families. Program services include education, parent involvement, social services, nutrition services, and medical and dental care.

Most of Pennsylvania's Head Start programs serve 3- and 4-year-old children. The rate of children in Head Start is the number of Head Start enrollees divided by the estimated number of 3- and 4-year-olds in poverty, multiplied by 100, measuring the penetration of the program into its target population. The Head Start enrollment rate is the rate of children served by Head Start compared with children in need of Head Start. The data reflect a September-June academic year with the later calendar year used for labeling.

Several factors can affect the reliability of the estimated "penetration rate" for an individual county. First, the numerator will sometimes reflect the county with the Head Start site rather than the county of residence of the child, which could inflate or deflate the county's rate. Second, estimates of poor 3- and 4-year-olds are experimental. Third, not all families may be under the Health and Human Services 100% poverty guidelines for a particular year. Head Start programs may accept up to 10% of enrollees over the poverty line. These enrollees are frequently special needs children. In addition, children enrolled may continue in the program even if their family income increases over the poverty line.

Children in Out-of-Home Placements

The rate of children placed out-of-home reflects the total number of children receiving public children and youth services on a one-day census count, usually in December of each year, for out-of-home placements including family foster homes, group homes, community-based placement, emergency placement, supervised independent living, residential placement, secure detention, and secure residential placement.

The child welfare placement rate is the number of child welfare placements out-of-home divided by the population of children birth through 17, multiplied by 1,000.

Children Under Age 18 Receiving TANF/AFDC

Historically, the AFDC program provided cash welfare payments for needy children under 18, and some household members, who were deprived of parental support or care because their father or mother was absent from home continuously, incapacitated, deceased, or unemployed. Each state defined "need", set its own benefit levels, established income and resource limits, and administered or supervised the AFDC program.

The AFDC program ceased in 1997 and was replaced by the Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) program. Adult recipients, with a few minor exemptions, must work 20 hours or more a week within two years of receiving assistance. Receipt of benefits under the TANF program is limited to a maximum of five years in a lifetime.

The percentage of children receiving TANF or AFDC (prior to 1997) is the average monthly number of children under 18 receiving TANF or AFDC benefits, divided by the number of children under 18, multiplied by 100. The data reflect the Commonwealth's July 1 through June 30 fiscal year, with the later calendar year used for labeling.

Children Receiving Medicaid

Medicaid is a joint federal-state individual entitlement program providing medical care for a wide range of individuals, including low-income adults, pregnant women, children, the disabled and low-income elderly. Individuals or families with extraordinary medical bills may also qualify. Within federal guidelines, each state designs and administers its own program. States must provide Medicaid to all persons receiving cash assistance under TANF or Supplemental Security Income (SSI), families transitioning from welfare to work, families who would have qualified under the old AFDC rules, and other related groups not actually receiving cash assistance. Children under 21 enrolled in Medicaid are entitled to all "medically necessary" care.

The percentage of children receiving Medicaid is the average monthly number of children under 19 receiving those benefits divided by the total number of children under 19, multiplied by 100. The data reflect the Commonwealth's July through June fiscal year, with the later calendar year used for labeling.

Children Under Age 18 Abused or Neglected — Substantiated Cases

Substantiated abuse includes children a judge has officially found were abused (“founded”), and also includes children that child protective services staff determine were abused based on medical evidence, the investigation, or an admission by the perpetrator (“indicated”). Child abuse includes serious physical injuries, serious mental injury, sexual abuse, imminent risk of serious physical injury or sexual abuse, and serious physical neglect which endangers a child's life or development or impairs the child's functioning.

The substantiated child abuse rate is the number of children for whom child abuse has been substantiated divided by the number of children under 18, multiplied by 1,000. The data reflect a calendar year.

Children Under Age 18 in Poverty

The estimated population in poverty by age data is developed by the U.S. Census Bureau, Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates program. These estimates have large confidence intervals. The Census Bureau reports the upper and lower range of all estimates for the 90% confidence interval. The estimate reported is this midpoint of the interval. The range of these estimates suggests that comparison among counties would be problematic, but that examination of the estimates within a single county may be useful for planning purposes.

Delinquent Children Ages 10-17 Placed Out-of-Home by Juvenile Court

A juvenile court disposition is a referral disposed by the probation department and/or the court. Within a single delinquency referral, a youth may be charged with a number of offenses that may include a number of petitions. Any youth may be involved in a number of petitions and any youth may be involved in a number of petitions within a calendar year. In addition, a youth may be referred on more than one occasion during a calendar year and receive only one disposition. A juvenile court disposition of placement refers to an out-of-home commitment for the juvenile (usually less than 15% of total dispositions of new referrals). Placement dispositions include referrals to: private institutions (private sector institutions which typically house 25 or more juveniles), group homes, drug and alcohol treatment facilities, wilderness-based facilities; open-setting Youth Development Center facilities run by the Department of Public Welfare; public secure facilities (secure Youth Development Centers); foster care placements; independent living arrangements; Youth Forestry Camps run by the Department of Public Welfare; private secure facilities; and selected other placements.

The rate of delinquent children placed out-of-home by the juvenile court is the number of juvenile court dispositions of out-of-home placement for delinquency referrals, divided by the total eligible youth population 10-17, multiplied by 1,000. Data reflect a calendar year.

Employed Workers Per Child

The rate of employed workers per child under age 18 is number of persons of all ages working (full-time or part-time), divided by the population of children under 18. The data reflect persons employed within a calendar year.

Employed workers reflect those tracked by the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry, Bureau of Research and Statistics, and are part of the civilian labor force.

Infant Mortality

The infant mortality rate is the number of deaths of children under 1 year of age (infants) in a year divided by the number of live births for that year, multiplied by 1,000. The data reflect a calendar year.

Labor Force Participation

Persons who are either employed or unemployed but actively looking for work within the past four weeks are considered to be participants in the “labor force”. Persons discouraged from looking because of previous lack of success, persons working part-time and looking for additional hours, retired persons, persons under 15, disabled persons not looking for work, and persons taking care of home and family are not counted as in the labor force. The size of the labor force is the sum of the employed plus the unemployed.

The labor force participation rate is the number of persons of all ages working (full-time or part-time) or unemployed and actively looking for work, divided by the working-age population 18-64, and multiplied by 100.

Lack of Early Prenatal Care

Births without early prenatal care are those births for which prenatal care began after the first trimester (or after the first three months of a pregnancy), or for which there was no reported prenatal care. The percentage of births without early prenatal care is the number of births without early prenatal care divided by the total births for which prenatal care status is known, multiplied by 100. Data reflect a calendar year.

Per Capita Income Adjusted

Per capita personal income reflects an estimated personal income for every man, woman, and child in a geographic area. Personal income is more than wage and salary income. This aggregation of personal resources includes: wages and salaries (gross pay); fringe benefits (paid by the employer for the benefit of employees); interest (income that private businesses pay to individuals such as interest payments by banks on accounts and certificates of deposits, and by corporations on their bonds); rent (income from property received by households); profits of proprietors and unincorporated businesses (i.e. profits/earnings of small businesses and self-employed persons); dividends (i.e. money that goes to shareholders as dividends but not the portion of profits of incorporated businesses that remain in the business as “retained earnings”); cash transfers (i.e. government payments to persons including Social Security payments and cash welfare payments); and indirect business taxes such as sales tax, excise taxes such as gas and cigarette, license fees, and business property taxes.

Per capita personal income is a measure of the economic well-being of the community and its ability as individual families and through its local institutions to provide for all of its residents. It is computed by dividing the total income of an area by its total population, and applying the COLA factor developed by the Center for Rural Pennsylvania. The income year is a calendar year.

Unemployment

The civilian labor force includes employed civilians and unemployed persons, and unemployed persons are those 16 and over without jobs but available for and looking for work. Persons who are either employed or unemployed but actively looking for work within the past four weeks are considered to be participants in the “labor force”. The size of the labor force is the sum of the employed plus the unemployed, and the proportion of the labor force that is unemployed is the unemployment rate. Measurements of the unemployment rate are completely separate from counts of persons filing for or receiving unemployment compensation. Those who do not meet the definitions for being employed or unemployed are classified as “not in the labor force”, including school students, those with family care responsibilities, disabled persons, retired persons, and discouraged job seekers no longer looking for work. The unemployment rate is the number of unemployed persons divided by the civilian labor force, multiplied by 100. Historical data are updated with revised figures as provided by the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry. Data reflect annual calendar year averages.

Data Analysis and Other Notes

General Note on Data and Rate Calculations

Rates based on low incidences should be interpreted with caution. Rates for counties and municipalities with a low number of incidences each year or a variable number of incidences over a period of several years should be used with caution. Change in rate calculations may not add to total due to rounding.

General Note on Demographic Data

The 100-percent enumeration counts from the U.S. Census of Population and Housing, 1990 and 2000, are used whenever possible and appropriate. Estimates published by the Pennsylvania State Data Center and from the Bureau of the Census are used when available for years between the 1990 and 2000 Census. The census data presented for Bethlehem City includes portions of the city in both Lehigh and Northampton counties. Population by race appears in State and County profiles in categories used by the U.S. Census Bureau. Hispanic persons are classified by both race and Hispanic ethnicity (thus Hispanic persons are counted in both the Hispanic classification and in one of the racial categories). Minority profiles provide health indicators for Caucasian, African-American, and Hispanic populations, by special request to the Pennsylvania Department of Health. For a discussion of race and ethnicity in the school district profiles where Hispanic ethnicity is treated somewhat differently, see the School District Profiles Definitions and Sources section.

The categories presented include the following – White, Black or African American, American Indian and Alaskan Native (AIAN), Asian, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander (HAW-OPI), Some other race, and more than 2. Median age. U.S. Census of Population and Housing, SF1, 2000.

Housing occupancy status. U.S. Census of Population and Housing, SF1, 2000.

This status was determined by census enumerators obtaining information from landlords, owners, neighbors, rental agents, and others. The percent owner or renter occupied is the number of owner or renter occupied units divided by the total number of occupied housing units.

Children in single parent households. U.S. Census of Population and Housing, STF1, 1990, and SF1, 2000.

Own children includes children under 18 years old who are a son or daughter by birth, marriage (a stepchild), or adoption. Families may be a married couple family, single parent family, stepfamily, or subfamily. The percent of own children in single parent households is the number of children in single parent families divided by the total number of own children of householders. The percent of own children in female headed households is the number of children in families with a female householder, no husband present, divided by the number of own children of householders. These calculations do not include children in other relative, non-relatives, or group quarters. More information on children's living arrangements can be found on the census web site, www.census.gov.

General Note on Cost-of-Living Adjustment

The State of the Child in Pennsylvania adjusts "per capita income" and "average annual wage" for cost-of-living. A major shortcoming of comparing states across the U.S., or counties within a state, on income- and wage-based measures without adjustment, as it is usually done, is that non-adjusted numbers assume that there is no variation in the cost-of-living in different geographic areas. Not adjusting the income or wages implies that a dollar in each area can buy the same amount of goods and services, or economic well-being, in different areas. For example, Philadelphia's average annual wage and per capita income before adjustment is above average in the state, but the higher cost of housing and of many other goods and services in Philadelphia is well understood by people who have spent time in both that area and in other less expensive counties in the Commonwealth. While the Consumer Price Index and other price indices measure changes in the cost-of-living over time, there is a dearth of data by which to compare cost of living differences in different geographic areas at a single point in time.

The Center for Rural Pennsylvania has estimated a cost-of-living index for each of Pennsylvania's 67 counties based on the ACCRA Cost of Living Index of 60 selected items purchased by a middle-management family. While this is a standard of living above the norm, cost-of-living differences for a moderate-income family may well be about the same. Adjustment narrows the differences in economic well-being across counties.

Pennsylvania County Type Groups: Urban, Rural, Mixed

The county classifications "Urban", "Rural", and "Mixed" were derived in collaboration with the Pennsylvania State Data Center, using population categories and data from the 1990 U.S. Census of Population and Housing. Pennsylvania counties are assigned to one of three categories by the proportion of their 1990 population that was "urban" or "rural". The county is "Urban" if two-thirds of the county population was living in an urban area (inside or outside an urbanized area); the county is "Rural" if two-thirds of the county population was living in a rural area; and the county is "Mixed" if the population was neither two-thirds urban nor two-thirds rural. Pennsylvania has 12 Urban counties, 33 Rural counties, and 22 Mixed counties, according to this definition. (See the Section II State County Type Profile map or any indicator in Section III for locations and listings of counties by type.)

Urbanized Areas (UAs) are "[d]efined by population density, each includes a central city and the surrounding closely settled urban fringe (suburbs) that together have a population of 50,000 or more with a population density generally exceeding 1,000 people per square mile." [Census '90 Basics, 1990 CPH 1-8, p. 5]. The Census Bureau defines persons living in urbanized areas and in places of 2,500 or more population outside of UAs as "urban", and all others "rural".

Performance Indicators for Counties

In Section III, counties are grouped according to their performance on individual indicators, from best outcome to the worst outcome. Counties are grouped by "standardizing" their rates for individual indicators. The performance indicators are not based on the actual state average, but on the average of county rates. For each indicator the unweighted average of county rates is subtracted from each county's rate. This difference is then divided by the standard deviation of the rates for all 67 Pennsylvania counties. Counties are classified into performance groups in the tables and color-coded on the maps in Section III - "Performs Much Better Than Average"; "Performs Better Than Average"; "Performs Worse Than Average"; and "Performs Much Worse Than Average".



School District Profiles Definitions and Sources

Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children gathers data for *The State of the Child* from the most reliable sources available, as reported to or collected by them. Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children is not responsible for discrepancies between the data as reported and the existing status of an indicator.

Rural Urban Suburban Classification

Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children (PPC) has categorized all 501 of the state's school districts as urban, suburban, or rural, using the following methodology:

The method used by the state's urban and rural loan forgiveness program (Act 155) was reviewed and rejected because its reliance solely upon population density did not accurately reflect the characteristics of many districts.

The three methods used by the federal government were reviewed:

Beale Codes designate counties as metropolitan or non-metropolitan and then treat all school districts within the county as either metropolitan or non-metropolitan. Many Pennsylvania counties include districts that clearly are urban, suburban, and rural, and many districts cross county boundaries. This method was rejected.

Metro Status Codes indicate whether a school district superintendent's office is in the central city of a CMSA or SMA, whether it is in the CMSA or SMA but not in a central city, or whether it is outside a CMSA or SMA. For Pennsylvania, this results in many suburban communities being labeled as rural and several small cities being labeled as either suburban or rural. This method was rejected.

Locale Codes are assigned to each school, and a district's status is determined by the location of the plurality of schools. This is still an imperfect system, but with eight separate locale codes that could be assigned to each school, it yields reasonably good results. Therefore, the locale codes were used as a starting point in designating districts.

PPC designated as **urban** locale codes 1 (central city of CMSA or MSA, with at least 250,000 people), 2 (central city of CMSA or MSA but not a large city), and 5 (place not within CMSA or MSA but with at least 25,000 people and characterized as urban). This yielded 22 districts.

PPC designated as **suburban** locale codes 3 (place within CMSA or MSA of a large central city) and 4 (place within CMSA or MSA of a mid-size central city). This yielded 231 districts.

PPC designated as **rural** locale codes 6 (place not within CMSA or SMA with a population between 2,500 and 25,000), 7 (place not within CMSA or SMA and designated as rural), and 8 (place within CMSA or MSA designated as rural). This yielded 248 districts.

PPC then made the following adjustments to reduce anomalies:

Some districts thus designated as suburban really have the character of urban communities in terms of population density and local wealth. Therefore, suburban districts with at least 2,500 people per square mile and aid ratios in excess of .6500 were re-designated as urban.

Some districts thus designated as suburban really have the character of rural communities in terms of population density and local wealth. Therefore, suburban districts with fewer than 350 people per square mile and aid ratios in excess of .6500 were re-designated as rural.

Some districts thus designated as rural or urban really have the character of suburban communities in terms of local wealth. Therefore, urban or rural districts with aid ratios below .3500 were re-designated as suburban.

The result is 32 urban districts (an increase of 10), 209 suburban districts (a decrease of 22), and 260 rural districts (an increase of 12).

County-Level Enrollment

A complete picture of K through 12 education includes children enrolled in public schools, children enrolled in nonpublic schools, and children being home-schooled. Nonpublic enrollment is not available by local school district so the county level data show the overall picture of children in educational settings. For county level enrollments, public schools totaled 3,228

which included: 14 comprehensive area vocational-technical schools (AVTSS), 66 occupational AVTSS, 47 charter schools, four consortium-operated alternative high schools, 12 juvenile correctional institutions, two state-owned schools and 3,083 schools in school districts. There were 2,477 private and nonpublic schools.

Total Pupils

Total Pupils is the sum of public enrollment, nonpublic enrollment, and home-schooled children.

Public Enrollment

Public enrollment is the number of students enrolled in local school districts of that county and in other public K-12 education programs broader than a single school district in the county. Public school districts are listed under only one county (usually the county in which the district administrative offices are located) and all of their enrollment is included in that one county, even if they are one of the school districts in Pennsylvania that span two or more counties and have children from two or more counties attending their schools. The county of assignment is not necessarily the county in which the majority of the students reside. Public education is provided to students enrolled not only in local district schools but also in the following types of non-single district public education programs: nondistrict special education classes in intermediate unit-operated classes and/or approved private schools, comprehensive full-time area vocational-technical schools (AVTSS), consortium operated alternative high schools, charter schools, juvenile correctional institutions, and state-owned schools. Students who are part-time in a local district high school and part-time in one of the "occupational" AVTSS are counted in local district enrollment figures. The public enrollment percentage is the number enrolled in public education divided by the total number of pupils, and multiplied by 100.

Nonpublic School Enrollment

Nonpublic school enrollment is the number of students enrolled in nonpublic schools in the county on October 1. The county level nonpublic school enrollment data is compiled on the basis of the county the nonpublic school is located in, and the students may come from other counties as well. Nonpublic school students who are residents of other states are excluded from the county and Pennsylvania figures. The nonpublic enrollment percentage is the number of nonpublic enrollees divided by the total number of pupils, and multiplied by 100.

Home-schooled

This is the number of children being educated at home under the authority of Act 169 of 1988 as reported by local school districts. This does not include children in homebound instruction. The home-schooled percentage is the number of home-schooled children divided by the total number of pupils, and multiplied by 100.

School District Profiles

Fifth Grade Students Scoring Below Proficient on PSSA Exams

The Pennsylvania System of School Assessment (PSSA) exams are the only statewide measure of student performance. For the 2000-01 school year, student scores were reported in four performance categories for the first time: advanced, proficient, basic and below basic. The percent of students scoring below proficient represents the percent of students scoring in the bottom two categories.

Public School Dropouts

The number of dropouts represents all students dropping out of local district schools from grades 9 through 12 and secondary ungraded students. The dropout percentage is the number of dropouts divided by the students enrolled in district schools in grades 9 through 12 plus secondary ungraded enrollment, and multiplied by 100.

High School Graduates - Number and Percent Planning Further Education

The number of high school graduates represents all students graduating from local district high schools.

Students planning further education have stated an intention to enter either four-year colleges or universities, community colleges, other two-year colleges, other post-secondary schools that are legally authorized to grant associate degrees in specialized fields, or non-degree schools that are licensed or approved by the state to offer a diploma, certificate, or similar recognition of achievement. The percentage planning further education is the number of graduates planning further education divided by the number of high school graduates, and multiplied by 100.

Not included in the number of graduates for individual districts nor the state total of Pennsylvania are graduates from comprehensive area vocational-technical schools, charter schools and consortium-operated alternative high schools. The change in percent is the percentage planning further education in 1999-00 minus the percentage planning further education in 1996-97.

School District Resources - Expenditures

Current Expenditures Per Pupil (Average Daily Membership)

This is the total dollar amount of current expenditures of the school district divided by the average daily membership of the school district, rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Current expenditures include all general fund spending except for construction, facility acquisition, debt service, and inter-fund transfers. Major new school building and renovation projects and debt service payments to cover such projects are not spread evenly over the years for most districts. Therefore, current expenditures has an advantage over total expenditures when comparing expenditures across districts in any one year. In general, Average Daily Membership (ADM) would be as large as October 1 enrollment counts if no students dropped out or moved into or out of the district. If a student is enrolled in a district for the first 90 days of the school year out of a total year of 180 days, then the student would be fully counted in the October enrollment count, but would contribute 0.5 to ADM. If a student is enrolled in a district for the last 90 days, the student would not be counted in the district's October enrollment, but would also contribute 0.5 to ADM. Local school district expenditures do not include those expenditures that are reported



separately for such entities as area vocational-technical schools (AVTSs) and various special schools. However, these other entities' average daily membership is tied back to and included in the local sending school districts' ADM. The Pennsylvania figures for Current Expenditures per Pupil, however, reflect all public education current expenditures; that is, not only local district current expenditures but also AVTSs and other special schools' current expenditures, divided by Pennsylvania ADM. Pennsylvania ADM is the same as the sum of the 501 local district ADMs. This approach to the local school district and Pennsylvania figures is repeated for instruction expenditures and special education expenditures. The percentage change is the difference between 1999-00 and 1996-97 current expenditures per pupil divided by 1996-97 current expenditures per pupil.

Instruction Expenditures per Pupil (Average Daily Membership)

This is the total dollar amount of district expenditures classified as instruction (the "1000" major expenditure category) divided by the average daily membership of the school district, rounded to the nearest whole dollar.

These instruction expenditures include all spending for activities of teachers and students and related costs of the regular, special education, vocational education and other instructional programs. They include aides and classroom assistants. Instruction does not include support services spending such as guidance counselors, school nurses, school bus transportation, and building maintenance. Instruction expenditures as a percent of current expenditures is the district's instruction expenditures divided by current expenditures and multiplied by 100. The percentage change is the difference between 1999-00 and 1996-97 instruction expenditures per pupil divided by 1996-97 instruction expenditures per pupil.

Special Education Expenditures per Pupil (Average Daily Membership)

This is the total dollar amount of district expenditures classified as special education instruction (the "1200" minor expenditure category) divided by the average daily membership of the school district, rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Special education instruction spending includes spending on children with disabilities and those who are gifted. It is a subcategory of instruction, and as such is included within the instruction spending already cited. Special education instruction as a percent of current expenditures is the district's special education expenditures divided by current expenditures and multiplied by 100. The percentage change is the difference between 1999-00 and 1996-97 special education expenditures per pupil divided by 1996-97 special education expenditures per pupil.

Revenues

In contrast with expenditures, all revenues are attributed to school districts and none to other education entities such as AVTSs. Pennsylvania figures reflect both the sum of the data of the 501 school districts and a total Pennsylvania figure.

Revenues from the State

This is the total dollar amount of general fund revenues that school districts report as received from the state, rounded to the nearest whole dollar. The state revenue as percent of total revenue is the revenues from the state divided by the total revenues from all sources and multiplied by 100. Change in percent of total is the percentage of revenues from the state sources in 1999-00 minus the percentage of revenues from state sources in 1996-97.

Local Tax Revenues

This is the total dollar amount of general fund revenues that school districts report as received from local taxes, rounded to the nearest whole dollar. Revenues from all local tax sources are included such as real estate taxes and per capita, occupational, and all special school taxes. Local taxes as a percent of total revenue is the revenues from local taxes divided by the total revenues from all sources, and multiplied by 100. Change in percent of total is the percentage of revenues from local taxes in 1999-00 minus the percentage of revenues from local taxes in 1996-97.



School District Enrollment and Racial/Ethnic Enrollment Percentages

This is the number of students enrolled on October 1 in local district schools in all grades and in ungraded classrooms. Most special education students are included in local district enrollment; however, a few students with disabilities who receive all of their instruction outside of district schools such as in intermediate unit-operated classes and/or approved private schools (“full-time out-of-district special education”) are not included in local district enrollment. Also included are the students who are part-time in a local district high school and the rest of the time in one of the “occupational” AVTSs. However, students enrolled full-time in any of the comprehensive AVTSs are not counted in local district enrollment figures. Other students not included in local district enrollment are students at charter schools, at the consortium-operated alternative high schools, at state juvenile correctional institutions called Youth Development Centers (YDCs) and Youth Forestry Camps (YFCs), and students at the state-operated educational facilities of Scotland School for Veterans’ Children and Scranton School for the Deaf.

Public school enrollment is broken down by the race or ethnicity of the students. Each student is counted in only one category, and every student is classified. Individuals are not dually classified as, for example, Hispanic and Caucasian. The racial/ethnic categories for public education enrollment are:

African-American/Black (Non-Hispanic);

Hispanic - a person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race;

White (Non-Hispanic); and

Other - for Other the categories of American Indian/Alaskan native and Asian/Pacific Islander/Indian subcontinent were added together.

The racial/ethnic percentages are calculated by Pennsylvania Partnerships for Children as the number of local school district enrollees in the given race/ethnicity category divided by the total local school district enrollment, and multiplied by 100.

Students with Disabilities

Students with disabilities are the number of exceptional students receiving special education services from school districts, intermediate units, approved private schools and other qualified agencies. Students with disabilities enrollment includes students with a number of disabilities such as mental retardation, speech impairment, emotional disturbance, and specific learning disabilities. Special education students as a percent of enrollment is the number of special education students divided by total district enrollment, and multiplied by 100. Data are shown for both 1999-00 and 1997-98.

Students with Severe Disabilities

This is the number of special education students determined to have a severe disability. Examples include students who are deaf, blind, autistic, and children with various disabilities whereby they receive their education in special schools including residential schools. Data are shown for both 1999-00 and 1997-98.

Elementary Class Size, Percent of Classes with Under 20 Students

The percent of classes with under 20 students is the total number of classes in elementary schools with under 20 students divided by the total number of classes. The data should be used with caution as some schools did not report classes by class size and therefore were not included in the analysis (NR indicates no data reported). Only the elementary schools within a district that reported class size data were included.

School Attendance

Attendance rates are computed by dividing total days of attendance by total days of membership, or the ratio of average daily attendance (ADA) to average daily membership (ADM). ADA and ADM include all resident pupils of the school district for

whom the school district is financially responsible, including public education students not in local district schools. They consider the aggregate days of attendance and membership for all children on active rolls for the number of days the school is in session during the school year. Elementary attendance is the total number of days of attendance by students in kindergarten through sixth grade plus ungraded elementary students divided by their total number of days of membership, and multiplied by 100. Secondary attendance is the total number of days of attendance by students in grades 7 through 12 plus ungraded secondary students divided by their total number of days of membership, and multiplied by 100.

Elementary School Free and Reduced-Price Lunch

The percentage eligible is the number of local district public elementary students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch divided by local district public elementary school enrollment, and multiplied by 100. These show the percentages of local district public elementary school students who apply and are income-eligible for free or reduced-price school lunches and whose schools participate in the national school lunch program. Children eligible for free lunch live in families with incomes under 130% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines (FPIG); children eligible for reduced-price lunch live in families with incomes between 130% and 185% of the FPIG (see FPIG chart, page 19). Elementary school participation levels are used because participation among middle grades and high school students tends to drop as peer influences grow and children are more aware of the stigma associated with low-income programs. Some elementary schools do not have a lunch program. Change in percent eligible is the percentage of elementary students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch in 2000-01 minus the percent eligible in 1998-99.

Kindergarten

K4 Enrollment

K4 enrollment is the number of students enrolled in half-day and full-day local district kindergarten programs for 4-year-olds. K4 enrollment is to be reported if the district offers a district-wide K4 program. Enrollment is the count of students on October 1. See school district enrollment definition above for an explanation of counts of students in local district schools versus students in other public education settings.

K5 Half-Day

K5 half-day enrollment is the number of students enrolled on October 1 in half-day local district kindergarten programs for 5-year-olds.

K5 Full-Day

K5 full-day enrollment is the number of students enrolled on October 1 in full-day local district kindergarten programs for 5-year-olds.

Full-day as % of All K5

This is the number of full-day K5 students divided by the sum of half-day K5 students plus full-day K5 students, and multiplied by 100. Data are shown for 1999-00 and 1997-98.

School Violence

Data are collected from school districts and reported to the U.S. Department of Education as required by the federal Gun-Free Schools Act and the Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities Act. Data on acts of violence should not be used to compare one district with another as each school determines its own threshold for reporting incidents of violence. Assaults include assaults on staff and other students. Weapons incidents include all incidents involving any type of weapon. Assaults and weapons incidents per 1,000 students are the number of incidents divided by the total enrollment, and multiplied by 1,000.
