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ABSTRACT

This Kids Count factbook examines statewide trends in the well-being of South Dakota's children. The statistical portrait is based on 25 indicators in the areas of demographics, health, education, economics, and safety. The indicators include: (1) poverty thresholds; (2) racial groups; (3) single age years; (4) households and families; (5) infant mortality; (6) low birth weight; (7) child death; (8) teen violent death; (9) births to single teens; (10) prenatal care; (11) immunizations; (12) school enrollment; (13) school dropout rates; (14) children with a disability; (15) poverty statistics; (16) personal income; (17) women employed; (18) TANF/food stamps/Medicaid; (19) child care; (20) free and reduced price lunch recipients; (21) juvenile justice; (22) child abuse and neglect; (23) youth related traffic accidents; (24) juvenile drug and alcohol abuse; and (25) youth risk behavior survey. The first section of the factbook presents introductory materials and comparative information between South Dakota and the United States. The major portion of the factbook presents state and county data tables for each indicator. Among the findings are the following: South Dakota has the highest percentage rate in the nation of children under 6 in paid child care while parents work; the state ranks 5th for children living with fully employed parents; children in low-income working families face uncertain futures; and improvement in child poverty rate outpaces the national rate. The factbook concludes with a section listing data resources, websites of interest, data calculation information, and interpretation

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INTRODUCTION





This is the 10th South Dakota KIDS COUNT Factbook. It is a book of numbers and statistics. More importantly, each of those numbers and statistics represents faces and places in the state.

The data are organized by indicators: Demographic, Health, Education, Economic & Safety. The state information is provided first, followed by data for each of the sixty-six counties.

A Sources and Definition section is provided at the beginning of each section to explain how each indicator is defined and where the data were obtained. A website is also provided.

HOW TO USE THIS BOOK

The South Dakota KIDS COUNT Factbook is designed to be used by organizations, communities, citizens, and government officials. It can be used for presentations, grant writing, research, education, advocacy, and/or policy development. In order to use the data effectively keep the following in mind:

Small numbers - Much of the data in the Factbook is calculated based on small numbers of events, (i.e., child death rate, infant mortality rate). As the population base becomes smaller, as it does in many South Dakota counties, the numbers or percents may vary considerably from year to year.

Understand the indicator - Rates are not reported for counties when the numbers of an event are too small to be meaningful. Some indicators are reported in numbers, some as percents and some as rates (rate per 1,000, or rate per 100,000). Read the data sources and definitions found at the beginning of each section. How to perform data calculations is found in the Resources Section on page 190.

Time period - Data are based on different time intervals (e.g., state fiscal year, five-year averages). The reader is cautioned to check each indicator. Also check definitions and data source to determine the exact time period being reported.

Executive summary - The summary provided on pages 7-8 highlights only a portion of the information included in the Factbook.

ABOUT KIDS COUNT

KIDS COUNT is a national and state-by-state effort, sponsored by the Annie E. Casey Foundation, to track the status of children in the United States. A major goal of the Casey Foundation KIDS COUNT Initiatives is to foster a nationwide commitment to improving outcomes for vulnerable children and their families. Data indicators measure the education, social, economic, and physical well-being of children. By providing policymakers and citizens with yearly indicators of child well-being, KIDS COUNT seeks to enrich local, state, and national discussions concerning ways to secure better futures for children and families.

The demographic, health, education, economic, and safety indicators provided in the South Dakota KIDS COUNT factbook have provided an important tool in the work of improving children's lives in the state.

- 1999** Added county summary for selected indicators. Published 1999 Trend Report
- 2000** Began Facts on KIDS monograph series. SD KIDS COUNT website reformatted.
- 2002** Published 10th SD KIDS COUNT Factbook; fact bulletin, county summary for selected indicators, and pocket data card. Published four Facts on KIDS monograph series. Updated Trend Report and published on website only.

JTH DAKOTA COMPARED TO THE UNITED STATES

The KIDS COUNT National Data Book: State Profiles of Child Well-Being, is published each year by the Annie E. Casey Foundation. In this publication, all fifty states are ranked from best to worst. The 2002 National Data Book, based on 1999 data, ranked South Dakota 20th (of 50 states) in child well-being.

The national composite rank for each state is obtained by converting the numerical values for each of the 10 indicators into standard scores. The standard scores are added to provide a total standard score for each state. States are ranked on the basis of their total standard score in sequential order from highest (best) (1) to lowest (worst) (51). Standard scores are derived by subtracting the mean score from the observed score and dividing the amount by the standard deviation for that distribution of scores. All measures were given the same weight in calculating the overall standard score. Highlights for South Dakota from the 2002 national data book show:

- South Dakota has highest percentage rate in the nation of children under age 6 in paid child care while parents work. The study reports that 52% of SD's children are in paid child care, double the national rate of 26%.

- South Dakota ranks 5th for kids living with fully employed parents. Although its rate did not change during the 1990s, SD ranked 5th among all states for children living with securely employed parents. In 1990 and 1998, 18% of the state's children lived with families where no parent had a full-time, year-round employment. The national rate improved from 30% in 1990 to 25% in 1999.

- Many kids growing up in low-income working families face uncertain futures. In SD, 21,000 children are poor or nearly poor despite having at least one parent working all year. The report shows that 12% of all children in SD are living in low-income working families, better than the national average of 15%.

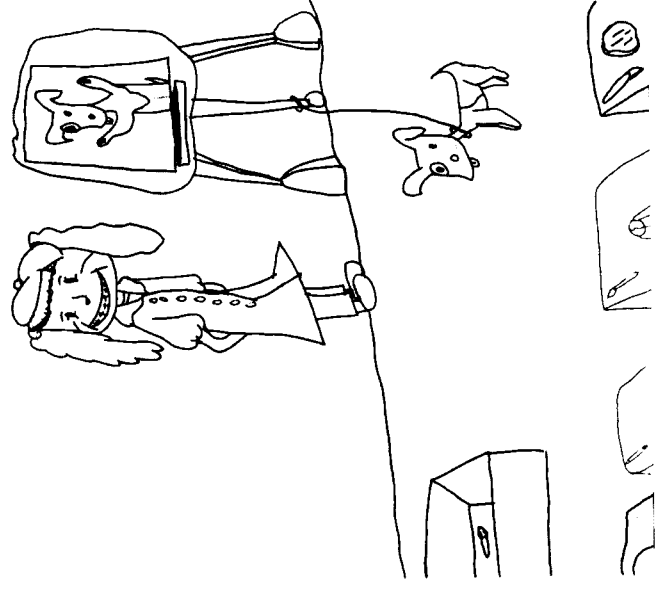
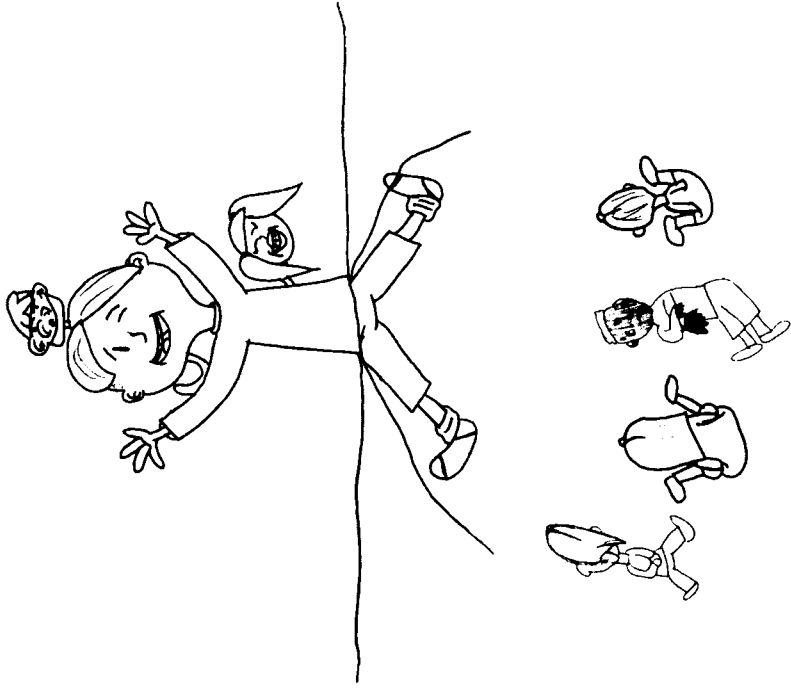
- Improvement in child poverty rate outpaces national rate. 18% of SD's children lived in poverty in 1998. This reflected a decrease from 20% in 1989. South Dakota's rate was slightly better than the national rate of 19%.

Definitions: Following the Office of Management and Budget's (OMB) *Statistical Policy Directive 14*, the Census Bureau uses a set of money income thresholds that vary by family size and composition to determine who is poor. If a family's total income is less than that family's threshold, then that family, and every individual in it, is considered poor. The poverty thresholds do not vary geographically, but they are updated annually for inflation using the Consumer Price Index (CPI-U). The official poverty definition counts money income before taxes and does not include capital gains and noncash benefits (such as public housing, Medicaid, and food stamps). Poverty is not defined for people in military barracks, institutional group quarters, or for unrelated individuals under age 15 (such as foster children). They are excluded from the poverty universe—that is, they are considered neither as "poor" nor as "non-poor."

While the thresholds in some sense represent families' needs, the official poverty measure should be interpreted as a statistical yardstick rather than as a complete description of what people and families need to live. Moreover, many of the government's aid programs use different dollar amounts as eligibility criteria.

Data Source: 2000 figures are from the U. S. Census Bureau. The data were compiled by the South Dakota State Data Center.

Definitions: The data on race were derived from answers to the question on race that was asked of all people. The concept of race as used by the Census Bureau reflects self-identification by people according to the race or races with which they most closely identify. The racial classifications used by the Census Bureau adhere to the October 30, 1997, Federal Register Notice entitled, "Revisions to the Standards for the Classification of Federal Data on Race and Ethnicity" issued by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). These standards govern the categories used to collect and present federal data on race and ethnicity. The OMB requires five minimum categories (American Indian and Alaska Native, Asian, Black or African American, Native Hawaiian and Other Pacific Islander, and White) for race, with a sixth category, "some other race." In addition to the five race groups, the OMB also states that respondents should be offered the option of selecting one or more races. People may have chosen to provide two or more races either by checking two or more race response check boxes, by providing multiple write-in responses, or by some combination of check boxes and write-in responses. The race response categories shown on the questionnaire are collapsed into the five minimum race groups identified by the OMB, and the Census Bureau "some other race" category. There are 57 possible combinations involving the race categories shown above.

Comparability. The data on race in Census 2000 are not directly comparable to those collected in previous censuses.

Household

A household includes all of the people who occupy a housing unit. A housing unit is a house, an apartment, a mobile home, a group of rooms, or a single room occupied (or if vacant, intended for occupancy) as separate living quarters. Separate living quarters are those in which the occupants live separately from any other people in the building and that have direct access from the outside of the building or through a common hall.

Householder. The data on relationship to householder were derived from the question "How is this person related to Person 1," which was asked of Persons 2 and higher in housing units. One person in each household is designated as the householder (Person 1). In most cases, this is the person, or one of the people, in whose name the home is owned, being bought, or rented. If there is no such person in the household, any household member 15 years old or over could be designated as the householder (that is, Person 1).

Households are classified by type according to the sex of the householder and the presence of relatives. Two types of households are distinguished: family households and nonfamily households.

A family householder is a householder living with one or more people related to him or her by birth, marriage, or adoption. The householder and all of the people in the household related to him or her are family members. A nonfamily householder is a householder living alone or with nonrelatives only.

Spouse (husband/wife). Includes a person married to and living with a householder. This category includes people in formal marriages, as well as people in common-law marriages. The number of spouses is equal to the number of "married-couple families" or "married-couple households" in 100-percent tabulations. Marital status categories cannot be inferred from the 100-percent tabulations since the marital status item was not included on the 100-percent form.

Family

A family includes a householder and one or more other people living in the same household who are related to the householder by birth, marriage, or adoption. All people in a household who are related to the householder are regarded as members of his or her family. Families are classified by type as either a "married-couple family" or an "other family" according to the presence of a spouse. "Other family" is further broken out according to the sex of the householder. The data on family type are based on answers to questions on sex and relationship that were asked on a 100-percent basis. Married-couple family. A family in which the householder and his or her spouse are enumerated as members of the same household.

Other family

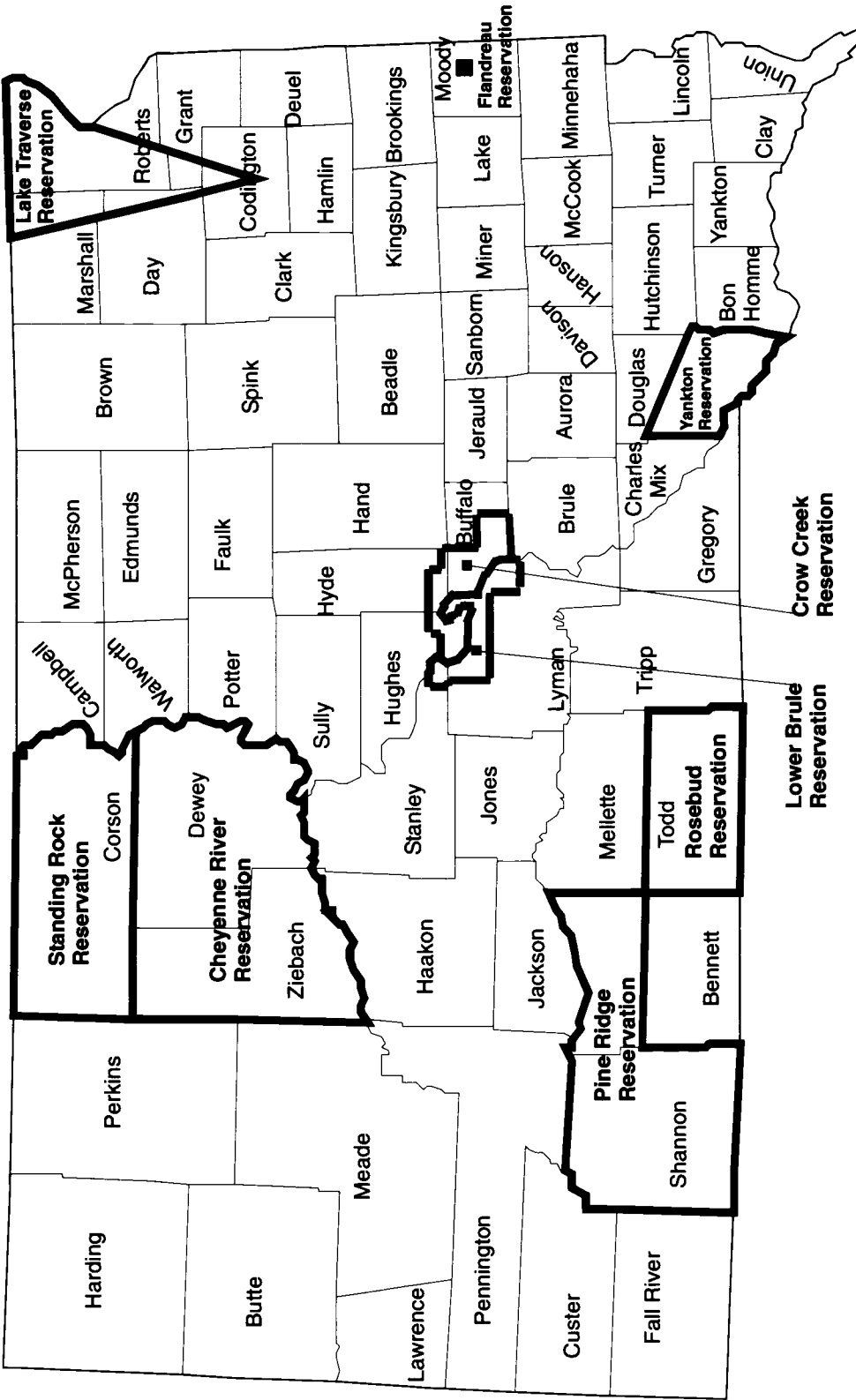
Male householder, no wife present. A family with a male householder and no spouse of the householder present. Female householder, no husband present. A family with a female householder and no spouse of the householder present. Related children in a family include own children and all other people under 18 years of age in the household, who are related to the householder, except the spouse of the householder. Foster children are not included since they are not related to the householder.

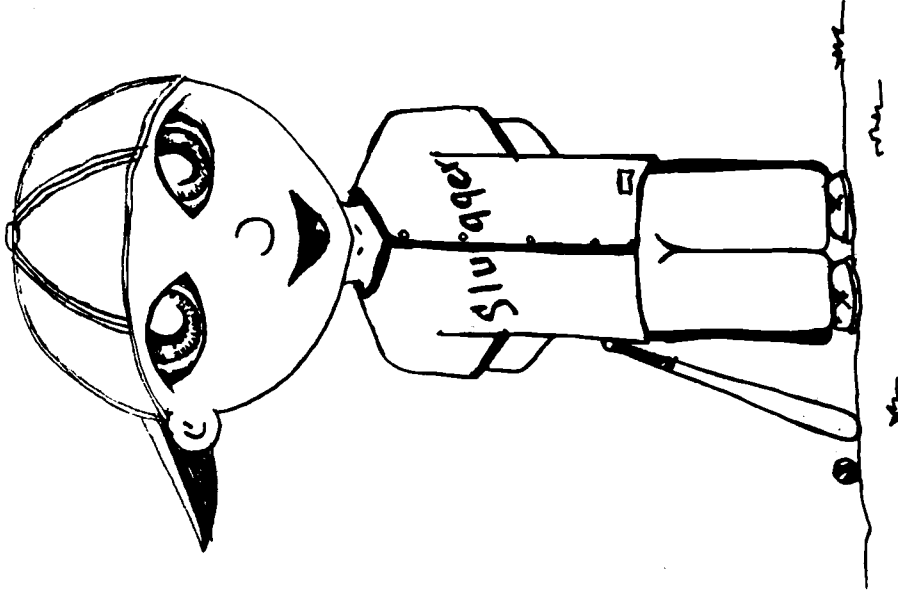

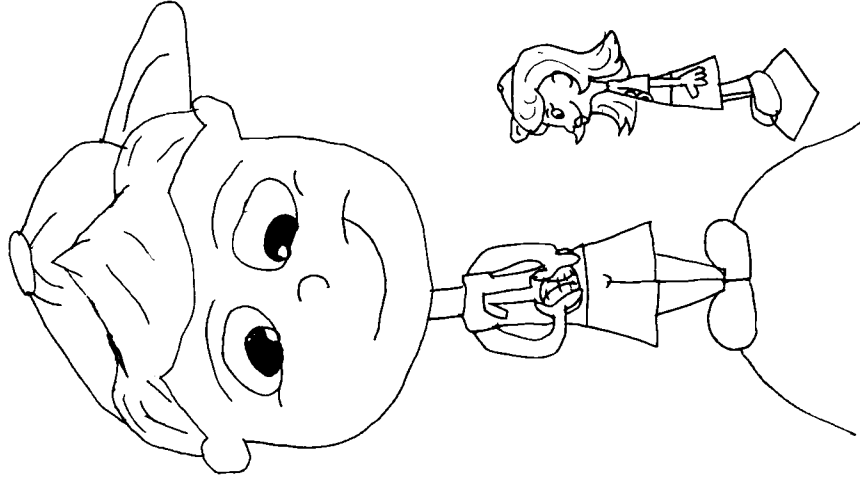
MAP OF SOUTH DAKOTA RESERVATIONS AND COUNTIES

Data Indicator and Definition: Infant mortality (rate): The number of deaths from all causes of infants under one year of age per 1,000 live births.

Low birth weight babies (percent): Low birth weight babies are those born weighing less than 2,500 grams (about 5 and one half pounds).

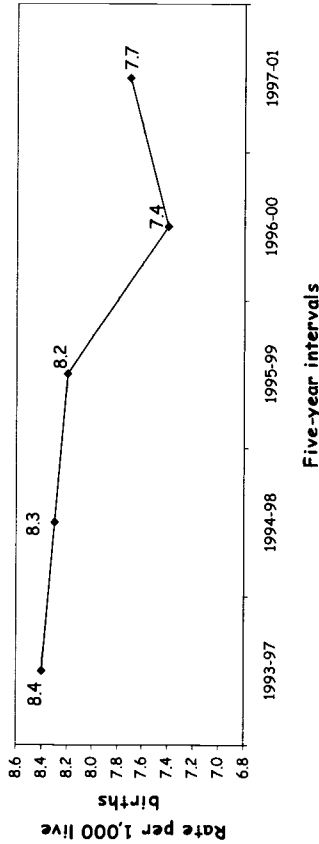
Retrospective Two Year Old Immunization Level

Definition: Every year the immunization records of all children entering kindergarten in the state are reviewed by their local school to make sure they have all the immunizations required by South Dakota law. The immunization rates reported are the percentages of this year's kindergarten students who were adequately immunized with 4 doses of D Tap, 3 doses of Polio, and 1 dose of Measles-Mumps-Rubella (MMR) vaccines when they were 24 months of age. If for example, a child received his third polio vaccine when he was 36 months old, he is not counted as being adequately immunized. We are measuring immunization rates of the kindergarten class as they turned 2-years old. This is called a retrospective survey.

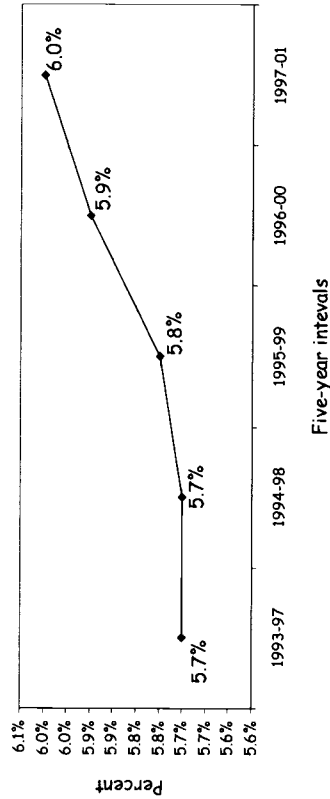
INFANT MORTALITY

The infant mortality rate reflects the number of infants who die before their first birthday, per 1,000 live births. Since the first year of life is more fragile than later years of childhood, negative social conditions, such as poverty, have a greater impact on this vulnerable group.

The five-year average infant mortality rate for 1997-01 in South Dakota was 7.7 per 1,000 live births; or for every 1,000 live births there were slightly less than 8 infant deaths. For the five-year period 1997-01 there were a total of 398 infant deaths. There has been a slight increase of infant deaths from the previous 5-year time period. The graph on the left shows the infant mortality rate for the time periods 1993-97 through 1997-01.

Infant mortality rates differed by race. Of the infant deaths for the 1997-01 time period, 259 were Caucasian, 127 were Native American, and 11 were other races. The rate for Caucasians was 6.1 per 1,000 live births; the rate for Native Americans was 15.2 per 1,000 live births; and for other race groups the rate was 10.3 per 1,000 live births.

LOW BIRTH WEIGHT BABIES

While many babies get off to a healthy beginning, babies weighing less than 2,500 grams (about 5.5 pounds) at birth have a higher probability of experiencing developmental problems. The percent of low birthweight babies reflects a group of children who are likely to have problems as they move through the growth stages.

The percent of all live births that were low birthweight was 6% for the 1997-01 time period. This means that for every 100 live births, 6 were low birthweight. The percentage of low birthweight babies shows a steady increase for the past time periods. The graph at the left indicates the number of low birthweight babies for 1993-97 through 1997-01.

Of the babies born with low birthweight from 1997-01, 2,507 (5.9%) were Caucasian, 505 (6%) were Native American, and 95 (8.9%) were of other races.

CHILD DEATHS

Once a child survives the first year of life, mortality drops sharply. A significant cause of child deaths is motor vehicle accidents. These data show death rates for children, ages 1-14, per 100,000 children.

The rate of 31.3 per 100,000 children ages 1-14, translates to 242 child deaths for 1997 through 2001. The child death rate hovers around 50 deaths per year. The graph at the right shows the trend in the number of child deaths for 1993-97 through 1997-01.

For the 1997-01 time period, 178 child deaths were Caucasian children (28.4 deaths per 100,000), 60 were Native American children (49.8 deaths per 100,000), and 4 were of other races (15.1 deaths per 100,000).

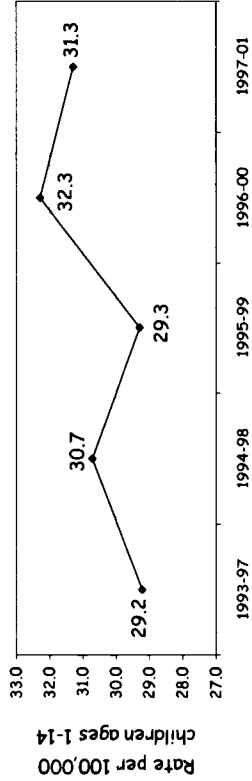
TEEN VIOLENT DEATHS

This indicator is deaths caused by accidents, homicides, and suicides per 100,000 teens ages 15-19.

The teen violent death rate for 1997-01 was 72.4 per 100,000 youth 15 through 19 years of age. This means that for every 100,000 youth in that age group, about 226 died from accidents, suicides, or homicides for the 1997-01 time period. In South Dakota, accidents have made up the highest percentage of teen deaths. The graph at the right indicates the number of teen violent deaths for 1993-97 through 1997-01.

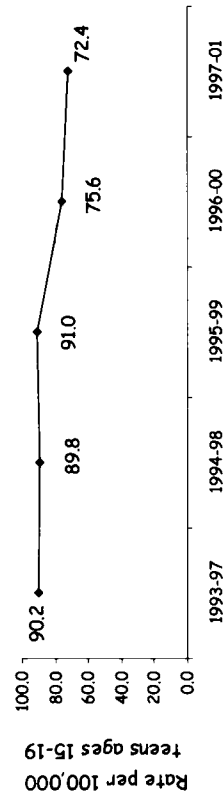
Of the teen violent deaths from 1997-01, 161 were Caucasian (60.5 deaths per 100,000) and 63 were Native American (163.0 deaths per 100,000).

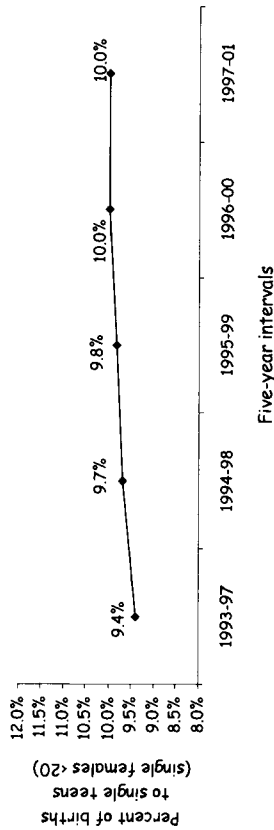
BIRTHS TO SINGLE TEENS

This indicator is included because teen childbearing has been shown to diminish the opportunities of both the child and the mother. Births to females under age 18 are particularly problematic because most of the teens are not married and have not completed high school.

Births to single teens made up 10% of all births from 1997-01. This means that for every 100 births, 10 occurred to single mothers under the age of 20. The graph at the left indicates the number of births to single teens for 1993-97 through 1997-01.

Single teen births, by race of the mother, for the time period 1997-01: 3,133 (7.4%) were Caucasian, 1,940 (23.2%) were Native American, and 90 (8.4%) were of other races.

Percentage for births to single teens (single females <20) for five-year intervals 1993-97 through 1997-01



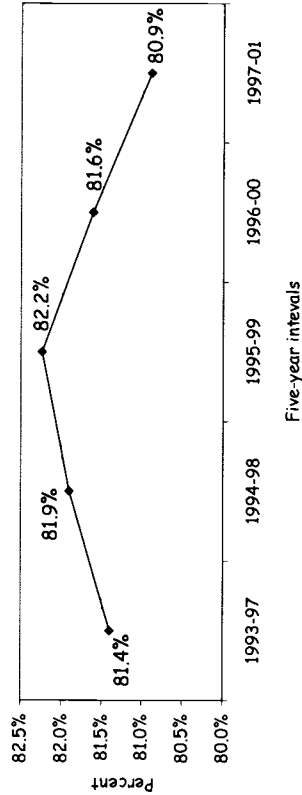

PRENATAL CARE

The graph at the left indicates the number of women receiving prenatal care during the first trimester for the five-year intervals 1993-97 through 1997-01. The percent of women receiving prenatal care in their first trimester of pregnancy was 80.9% [41,156 women] for the time period 1997-01. The percentage of women receiving prenatal care in the first trimester shows a decrease from the 1995-99 time period.

Of the women receiving prenatal care in the first trimester from 1997-01, 35,215 (84.7%) were Caucasian, 5,162 (62.9%) were Native American, and 777 (73.9%) were of other races.

Providers should consult the manufacturers' package inserts for detailed recommendations.

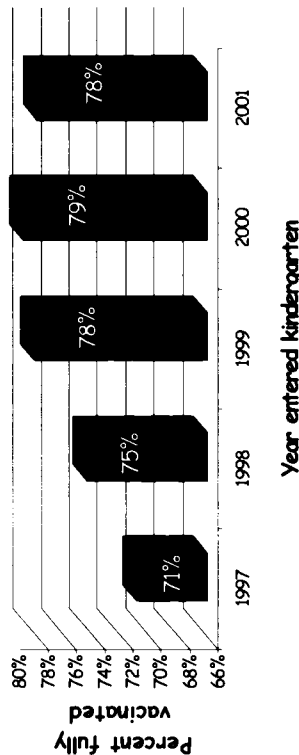
1. **Hepatitis B vaccine (Hep B).** All infants should receive the first dose of hepatitis B vaccine soon after birth and before hospital discharge; the first dose may also be given by age 2 months if the infant's mother is HBsAg-negative. Only monovalent hepatitis B vaccine can be used for the birth dose. Monovalent or combination vaccine containing Hep B may be used to complete the series; four doses of vaccine may be administered if combination vaccine is used. The second dose should be given at least 4 weeks after the first dose, except for Hib-containing vaccine which cannot be administered before age 6 weeks. The third dose should be given at least 16 weeks after the first dose and at least 8 weeks after the second

dose. The last dose in the vaccination series (third or fourth dose) should not be administered before age 6 months. Infants born to HBsAg-positive mothers should receive hepatitis B vaccine and 0.5 mL hepatitis B immune globulin (HBIG) within 12 hours of birth at separate sites. The second dose is recommended at age 1-2 months and

the vaccination series should be completed (third or fourth dose) at age 6 months. Infants born to mothers whose HBsAg status is unknown should receive the first dose of the hepatitis B vaccine series within 12 hours of birth. Maternal blood should be drawn at the time of delivery to determine the mother's HBsAg status; if the HBsAg test is positive, the infant should receive HBIG as soon as possible (no later than age one week). 2. **Diphtheria and tetanus toxoids and acellular pertussis vaccine (DTaP).** The fourth dose of DTaP may be administered as early as age 12 months, provided 6 months have elapsed since the third dose and the child is unlikely to return at age 15-18 months. Tetanus and diphtheria toxoids (Td) is recommended at age 11-12 years if at least 5 years have elapsed since the last dose of tetanus and diphtheria toxoid-containing vaccine. Subsequent routine Td boosters are recommended every 10 years. 3. **Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib) conjugate vaccine.** Three Hib conjugate vaccines are licensed for infant use. If PRP-OMP (PedvaxHIB® or ComVax® [Merck]) is administered at ages 2 and 4 months, a dose at age 6 months is not required. DTaP/Hib combination products should not be used for primary immunization in infants at ages 2, 4 or 6 months, but can be used as boosters following any Hib vaccine. 4. **Inactivated polio vaccine (IPV).** An all-IPV schedule is recommended for routine childhood polio vaccination in the United States. All children should receive four doses of IPV at ages 2 months, 4 months, 6-18 months, and 4-6 years. 5. **Measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine (MMR).** The second dose of MMR is recommended routinely at age 4-6 years but may be administered during any visit, provided at least 4 weeks have elapsed since the first dose and that both doses are administered beginning at or after age 12 months. Those who have not previously received the second dose should complete the schedule by the 11-12 year old visit. 6. **Varicella vaccine.** Varicella vaccine is recommended at any visit at or after age 12 months for susceptible children, i.e. those who lack a reliable history of chickenpox. Susceptible persons aged > 13 years should receive two doses, given at least 4 weeks apart. 7. **Pneumococcal vaccine.** The heptavalent pneumococcal conjugate vaccine (PCV) is recommended for all children age 2-23 months. It is also recommended for certain children age 24-59 months. Pneumococcal polysaccharide vaccine (PPV) is recommended in addition to PCV for certain high-risk groups. See MMWR 2000;49(RR-9):1-35. 8. **Hepatitis A vaccine.** Hepatitis A vaccine is recommended for use in selected states and regions, and for certain high-risk groups; consult your local public health authority. See MMWR 1999;48(RR-12):1-37. 9. **Influenza vaccine.** Influenza vaccine is recommended annually for children age 6 months or older with certain risk factors (including but not limited to asthma, cardiac disease, sickle cell disease, HIV, and diabetes; see MMWR 2001;50(RR-4):1-44), and can be administered to all others wishing to obtain immunity. Children aged 12 years or less should receive vaccine in a dosage appropriate for their age (0.25 mL if age 6-35 months or 0.5 mL if aged 3 years or older). Children aged 8 years or less who are receiving influenza vaccine for the first time should receive two doses separated by at least 4 weeks.

The 2001 retrospective immunization survey shows that 78% of the state's children entering kindergarten in fall 2001 were adequately immunized when they were 24 months old. Although this year's immunization rate was a small drop from last year's record high rate, the coverage has increased since 1994 when it was 62%.

The statewide goal is 90% of 2-year old children with full immunization coverage. Faulk County had the highest immunization rate in 2001 with 94% of their 31 children being fully immunized. Three other counties achieved the 90% goal, Hamlin 91%, McPherson 91% and Jerauld 90%. Three counties had less than 60% coverage, Custer 57%, Harding 56% and Bennett 48%. In both 2000 and 2001 McPherson and Jerauld counties had immunization rates greater than 90%.

There are many children who were very close to being fully immunized. In 2001, 7% (743) of children had all their immunizations, except their fourth DTap. Parents and health-care providers are urged to get children their fourth DTap between 15 and 18 months. Although there has been a shortage of DTap vaccine since early 2001, South Dakota providers have only experienced temporary delays in the receipt of vaccine orders, never the inability to get vaccine. Therefore, the shortage is not attributable to falling short of the 90% goal.

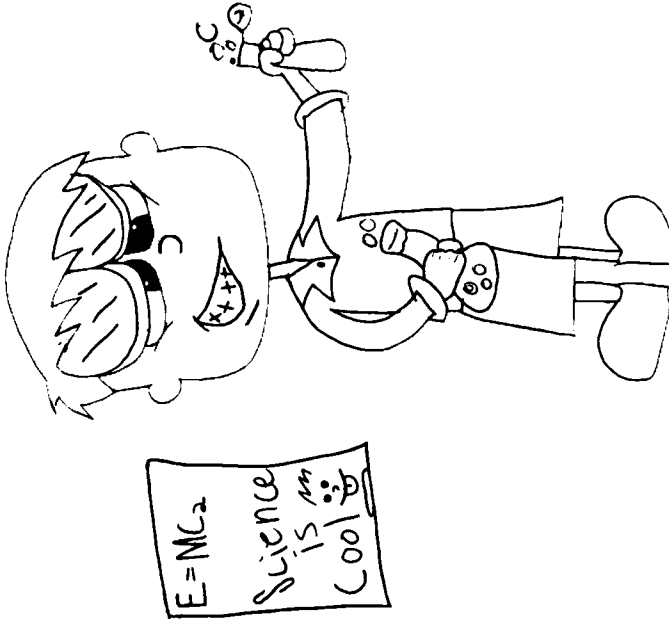
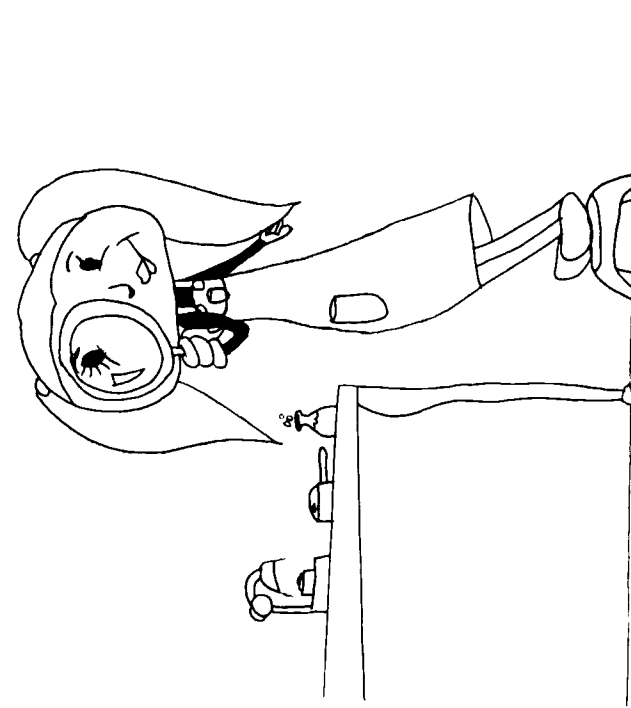
This retrospective survey identifies communities with low immunization rates that may need targeted help to improve. A high immunization rate protects the whole community by limiting the number of individuals who are susceptible to infectious diseases and limits the spread of diseases. Thanks to immunization, South Dakota was free of diphtheria, measles, mumps, rubella, tetanus, and polio in 2001. However, 5 cases of whooping cough were reported.

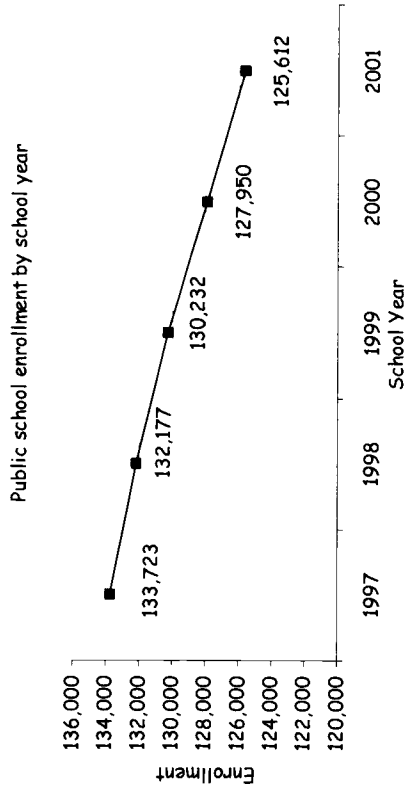

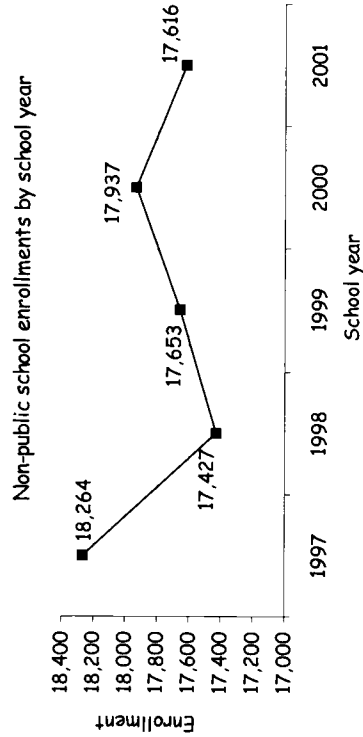
Definition: Child Count data on disabilities is for individuals age three through twenty-one. Children with a disability: This information is obtained from the Special Education Child Count done every December to determine age, placement alternatives, and disabling conditions for children with special needs. The number presented represents the number of children with disabling conditions in the designated school district. These conditions include: deafness, blindness, serious emotionally disturbed, mental retardation, hearing and visual impairments, specific learning disabilities, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairments, speech/language impairments, other health impairments, autism, and traumatic brain injury. Child Count data does not include data from private or Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) schools but does include Chapter I state operated/ state supported programs.

ENROLLMENT

Enrollment figures are gathered every year by the South Dakota Department of Education and Cultural Affairs on the last Friday in September. Figures are for kindergarten through 12th grade. From 1997 through 2001 there has been a steady decrease in enrollment in South Dakota public schools.



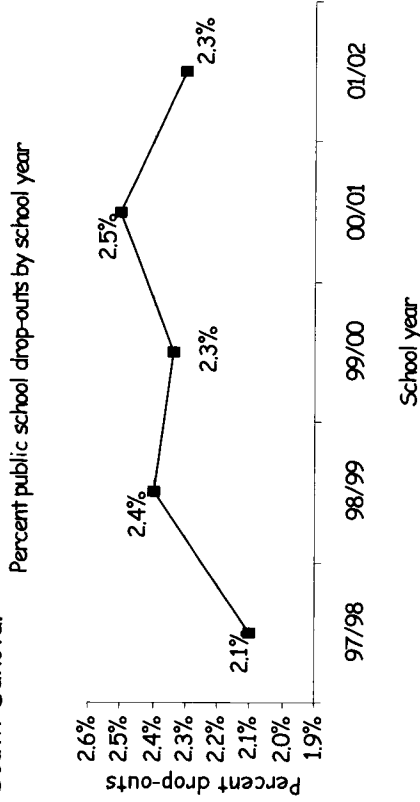
South Dakota's non-public schools have shown a pattern of growth and decline in enrollment figures. In the fall of 1997 there were 18,264 students enrolled in private schools in the state. 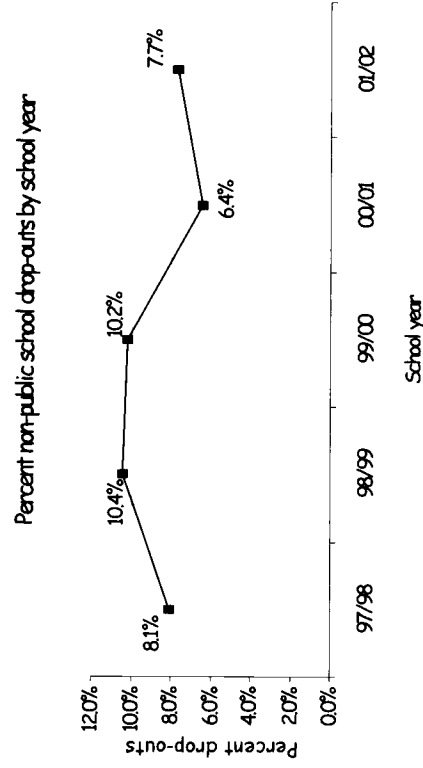

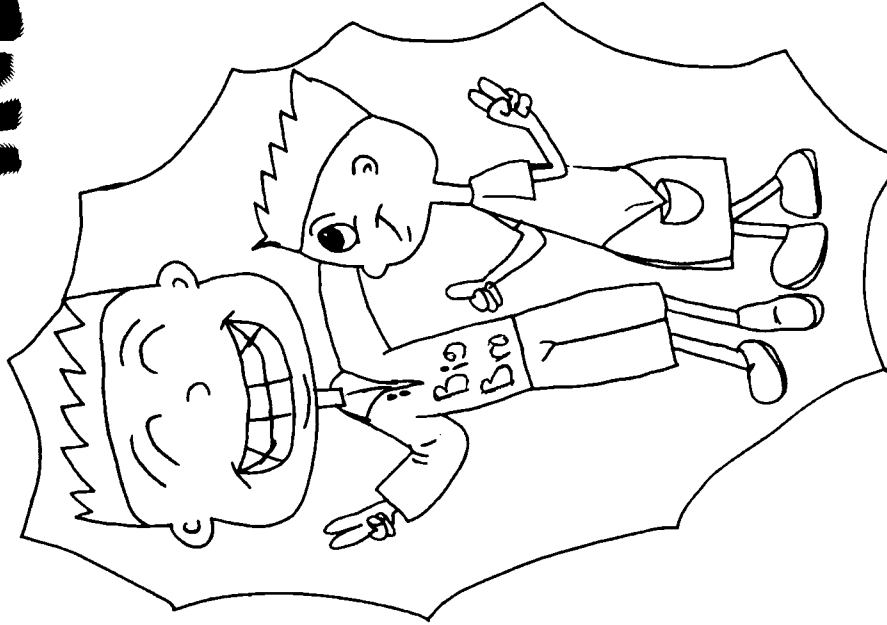
CHILDREN WITH A DISABILITY

Information on children with disabilities is obtained from the Child Count done every December by the Department of Education and Cultural Affairs. The count is done to determine age, disabling condition, and placement alternatives for children with special needs. This information includes Chapter I State operated/supported programs but does not include private or Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) schools. On December 1, 2001 there were 16,718 children with special needs in the State. South Dakota law mandates that a free special education program be provided to any person under the age of 21. The degree of interaction between the special education student and the regular education student is described through a continuum of placement alternatives available to the special education student. These alternatives include:

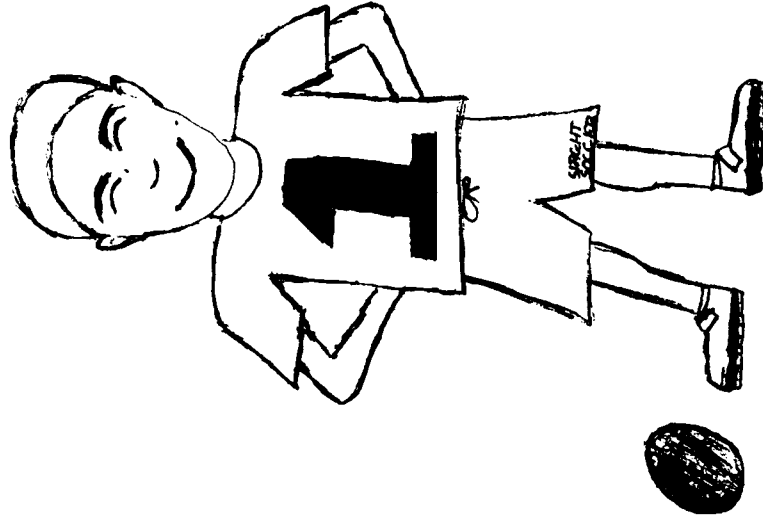
- Regular classroom with modifications.
- Resource Room - Services outside the regular classroom for more than 21% but less than 60% of the school day.
- Self-contained classroom - Services outside of the regular classroom for more than 60% of the day.
- Day program - A special education program in a facility other than the student's district of residence for more than 50% of the instructional day.
- 4-hour program - Placement in a 24-hour residential/educational program (in or out of state).
- Home/Hospital - Placement where children and youth with disabilities receive special education in medical treatment facilities or at home.

Types of Regulated Child Care: Family Child Care Home - Registered: South Dakota law defines a Family Child Care Home as one in which care is given on a regular basis for any part of a twenty-four hour day to twelve or less children from more than one unrelated family. This includes any children under the age of six who are living in the home. Family child care is a service provided in the provider's home.

Family child care providers are registered rather than licensed. Registration is a voluntary process whereby the applicants declare their intent to provide family child care and agree to comply with standards that have been established by the Department of Social Services. A registration certificate is in effect for 2 years. Registration is legally mandated when a provider receives compensation from public funds. Providers who are not receiving reimbursement from public funds and care for 12 or fewer children are exempt from registration. A registered family child care provider must be at least 18 years old.

Group Family Child Care Home - Licensed: South Dakota law defines a Group Family Child Care Home as a facility that provides child care for a part of a day as a supplement to regular parental care for 13 to 20 children from more than one family, including the provider's own children who are under the age of 6 years. A group family child care home may be located in the provider's own home or in a separate facility.

Group family child care homes are mandated by law to be licensed regardless of the funding source. A license is in effect for one year. Providers licensed as group family child care homes may be eligible to receive reimbursement through the Child Care Food Program if their program is located in a family home or residential area.

Child Care Center - Licensed: South Dakota law defines a Child Care Center as a facility which provides child care for part of a 24-hour period to 21 or more children from one or more unrelated families, including the provider's own children under the age of 6 years, regardless of the source of income. A child care center may be

located in the provider's own home or in a separate facility. In addition, programs that care for only school-age children may be licensed as a Before & After School Center.

Child care centers are mandated by law to be licensed regardless of the funding source. A license is in effect for one year. A child care center may be operated as a nonprofit organization or as an independent, proprietary facility. Nursery schools that do not provide regular daily care are exempted from licensure by SDCL 26-6-27.

Funding Categories Available for Child Care Assistance TANF Child Care: Provides payment of child care expenses for TANF families in approved work activities, which includes community service. Families must be receiving cash TANF benefits. No co-payment is required.

Non-TANF Assistance: Available for low-income families who work or work and attend school. Families may earn up to 200% of the federal poverty level. Students must work a minimum of 40 hours per month in order to receive assistance. High school, GED and technical education students who meet certain guidelines are exempt from the work requirement. Co-payment is based on family size and adjusted gross family income.

Transitional Child Care: Provides 12 months of child care payments for families whose TANF case closes because of income. May earn up to 200% of the federal poverty level. Co-payment is based on family size and adjusted gross household income.

POVERTY STATISTICS

The poverty data were derived from answers to the US Census Bureau's 2000 Census long-form questionnaire Items 31 and 32. The Census Bureau uses the federal government's official poverty definition. The Social Security Administration (SSA) developed the original poverty definition in 1964, which federal interagency committees subsequently revised in 1969 and 1980. The Office of Management and Budget's (OMB's) Directive 14 prescribes this definition as the official poverty measure for federal agencies to use in their statistical work.

The data below show the percent below poverty for related children under age 18 and under age 5 for all persons, families, and female headed households.

PERSONAL INCOME

According to 2001 data, South Dakota had a per capita personal income (PCPI) of \$26,664 (based on 2001 figures) ranking South Dakota 36th in the nation. It was 88% of the national average of \$30,472 (from data released September 2002).

South Dakota's total personal income in 2001 increased 3.4% to \$20,173,940,000 (the 2000 figure was \$19,509,280,000). Total personal income (TPI) includes the earnings (wage and salary) disbursements, other labor income, and proprietors' income; dividends, interest, and rent and transfer payments received by the residents of South Dakota.

Earnings of all reported persons employed in South Dakota increased from \$13,454,402,000 in 2000 to \$13,751,729,000 in 2001, an increase of 2.2%. The largest industries in 2001 were services, 24.9% of earnings; government and government enterprises, 19% of total earnings; manufacturing, 12.2% of total earnings; and retail trade, 10.1% of total earnings.

WOMEN EMPLOYED

The chart below shows women (age 16 and over) in the work force with children. The U.S. Census Bureau delineated women in the work force with children under age 6 only, women with children under age 6 and ages 6 - 17, and women with children ages 6 - 17 only. South Dakota is above the national figures for women in the work force in general and with children.

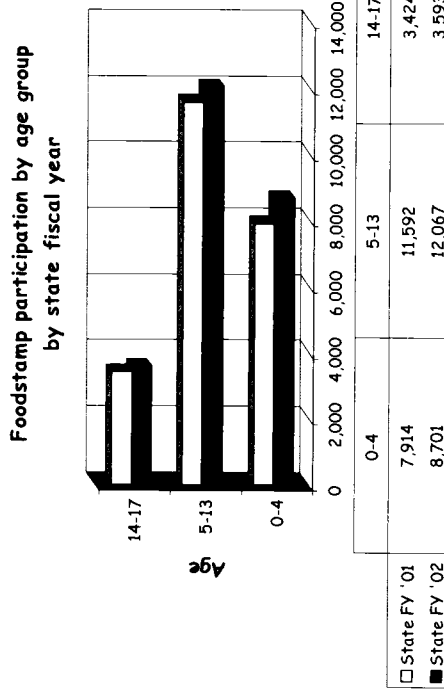
TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE TO NEEDY FAMILIES

For the state fiscal year 2002, there were 5,344 children receiving TANF benefits. This was 94 more children than last state fiscal year. There were 6,647 recipients of TANF funding for a total payment of \$11,066,794 for state fiscal year 2002. The average per family of TANF funds was \$323.93. The average per recipient was \$138.74.

FOODSTAMPS

For the 8th consecutive year, South Dakota's Food Stamps Program has had the highest accuracy rate in the nation for determining food stamp benefits. The state earned a \$768,456 bonus from the federal government. For state fiscal year 2002, 18,158 households in the state received food stamps. There were 46,920 recipients of food stamps. The fiscal year coupon value was \$43,932,486. The average coupon value per month per household was \$201.62. The average coupon value per month per recipient was \$78.03.

The graph below depicts the participation rate in the Food Stamps program. Participation increased slightly from the previous fiscal year.

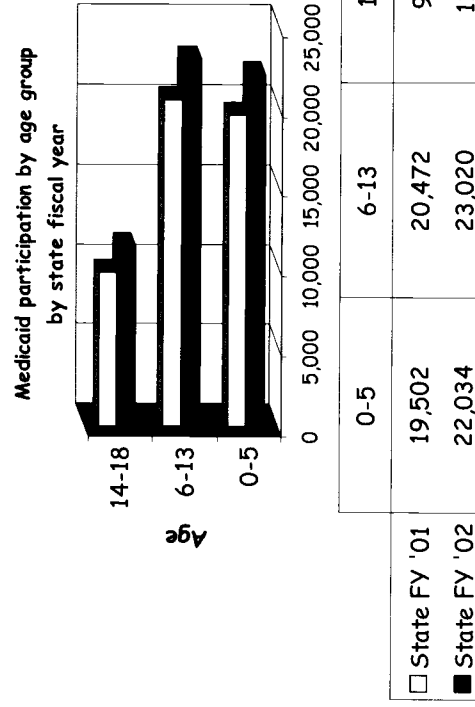

MEDICAID PARTICIPATION

South Dakota has chosen Medicaid for its CHIP program. It allows the Department of Social Services to use the existing Medicaid program to administer and deliver benefits. A Medicaid-based expansion also offered more expansive coverage for preventive, dental and optometry services, and participating families are not required to make co-payments or pay premiums for children under 18.

The graph below shows the medical participation by age group for state fiscal years 2001 and 2002. The Medicaid participation by age group has increased from the 2001 state fiscal year.

Child Care Services (CCS) at the South Dakota Department of Social Services has a number of responsibilities that include funding and technical assistance for Out-of-School-Time programs; child care facility development in response to local community needs; and a Health & Safety Continuous Funding cycle to help child care programs meet licensing requirements. In addition, CCS provides direct child care assistance payments for qualifying families; a statewide training delivery system for child care providers; and the licensing and registration of child care programs as authorized by SDCL 26-6.

Licensing of Child Care Programs Child care providers are invaluable members of a professional network attending to the developmental needs of children. Individuals or corporations who provide child care for more than 12 children are required by South Dakota law to be licensed. South Dakota Codified Law 26-6-9 requires licensure (regulation) of all child welfare agencies (including child care centers)

by the Department of Social Services. South Dakota Codified Law 26-6-19 authorized the Department to develop standards of child care to be used for the regulation of these agencies.

Child care licensing This is a means of reducing the risk of harm to children in child care settings by establishing and enforcing regulations that require maintenance of minimum standards. Licensing is a form of consumer protection. Without licensing, to achieve compliance with states regulations, children would be at higher risk from fire, unsafe buildings, unsafe play equipment, injury, disease, and developmental impairment. In addition to prevention efforts, licensing workers also offer consultation to providers to help them increase quality of care beyond the minimum standards.

The following table shows the number of registered and/or licensed child care programs for the state and each county. The data is from the month of October 2002. Counts vary throughout the year. **The data do not include family child care providers operating unregulated in their home.**

Direct Child Care Assistance- The chart on the right shows the average monthly number of children served by county (August through October 2002) by the child care assistance subsidy program. South Dakota families with incomes below 200% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) and families receiving TANF benefits and those transitioning off TANF may apply for financial assistance to help pay their child care costs. Eligibility for the program is based on household size and gross monthly income. A sliding fee scale is used to determine the amount of reimbursement and co-payments for each family. Families receiving child care assistance generally choose a provider who is licensed or registered (regulated) by the state. If a family chooses a provider who is unregulated by the state, certain criteria must be met such as TB testing, screening for child abuse and neglect, and basic training. Unregulated providers can be a close relative, a family friend, or someone who provides care in the home of the family requesting assistance. Unregulated providers are limited in the number of children they may care for and the amount of reimbursement they can receive. All providers must be 18 years old.

Out-of-School Time Programs-Out-of-school time (OST) program funding is the newest initiative in the Office of Child Care Services (CCS). Since 1997 a formal funding cycle has been established to support schools and communities that want to offer structured and safe environments for children when they are not in school. These incentive grants last three years and require recipients to raise matching funds. Funding is available for schools and/or private non-profit organizations in communities that partner to provide OST programs. The intent of each grant is to provide start-up funds that encourage partnering agencies to develop programs that not only provide a safe haven for children while their parents are at work; but also provide structured recreational and enrichment activities that allow children to explore their creative potential. Currently there are 138 licensed OST programs operating in South Dakota.

Training and Education-Early Childhood Enrichment (ECE) programs were established to meet the growing need for early childhood and out-of-school-time (OST) training and to assist CCS in efforts to recruit and retain quality child care providers across South Dakota. CCS has developed five ECE sites throughout the state to offer a variety of services that support child care providers, teachers and

others involved in the care and education of children. ECE programs offer training opportunities to help licensed or registered child care providers meet mandated training requirements. They also offer training to unregulated providers (i.e. relative and/or family friends) who are receiving public funds through the Child Care Assistance Subsidy program and are required to obtain 3 hours of training within the first 6 months. Registered family child care homes are required to obtain 6 hours of training each year; licensed group child care facilities are required to obtain 10 hours of training each year; and licensed child care centers are required to obtain 20 hours of training each year.

FREE AND REDUCED PRICE SCHOOL LUNCHES

The Child and Adult Nutrition Services (CANS) office in the Department of Education and Cultural Affairs (DECA) is responsible for administering the U.S. Department of Agriculture's (USDA) Food and Consumer Services (FCS) nutrition programs. These programs furnish resources to eligible local agencies that provide food in meals or commodities to participants. Programs include National School Lunch, School Breakfast, Special Milk, Summer Food Service, Child and Adult Care Food, Nutrition Education and Training, and Commodity Distribution for child nutrition programs, charitable institutions, emergency feeding programs, soup kitchens, and food banks.

Schools must be accredited in accordance with Department of Education and Cultural Affairs (DECA) policies, Residential Child Care Institutions must meet licensing criteria, and Day Care Homes/Centers must be registered or licensed. All local agencies annually renew the agreement and meal policy statement. Upon filing accurate and prompt claims/orders with CANS, agencies receive federal reimbursement for meals and snacks and/or commodities based on participation.

Every school day, more than 25 million children in 93,000 schools across the country eat a lunch provided through the National School Lunch Program (NSLP). More than half of these children receive the meal free or at a reduced price. The US Department of Agriculture (USDA) recognizes the program's national health responsibility to provide school meals that meet nutrition objectives. USDA updated the policy in the 1997 school year so that school meals would comply with the Dietary Guidelines for Americans.

Families are eligible for free or reduced price lunches through the USDA School Lunch Program based on their income level. During the 2001-2002 school year, 246 of the 321 school districts (public, non-public, tribal) offered school lunches. Of 173 active public school districts, 169 offered school lunches. Two educational cooperatives also participate in the National School Lunch Program. Two small public school districts and 5 small nonpublic districts participate in Special Milk Program.

For the 2001-2002 school year a total of 141,984 children were enrolled in Kindergarten through 12th grade in South Dakota schools, both public and private. A total of 49,595 children and youth were

eligible for free or reduced price lunches; 36,742 were eligible for free lunches and 12,853 were eligible for reduced price lunches. The chart on the next page shows the numbers of children and youth eligible for free and reduced price lunches. **Please note: Jones County does not offer a school lunch program.**

The income eligibility guidelines below are the income scales used to determine an applicant's eligibility for free or reduced price meals, if the family is at or below the guideline. The guidelines are for the 2001-2002 school year.

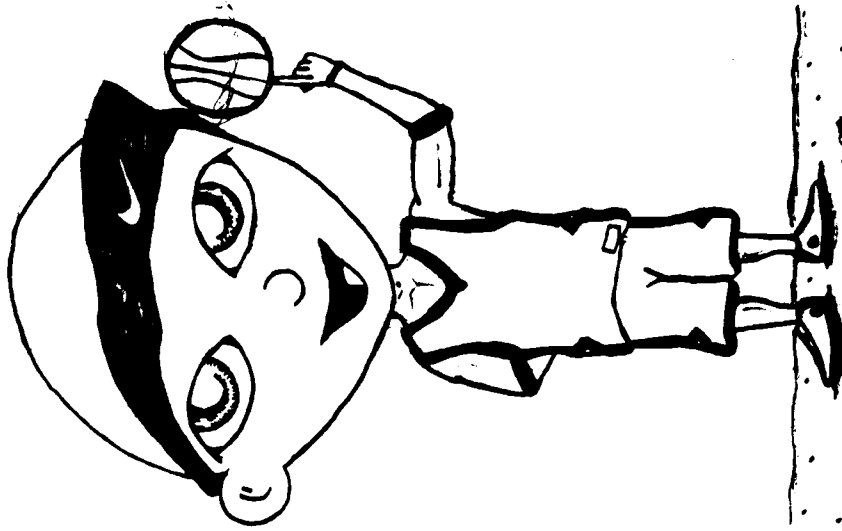

Definitions: These figures represent the number of youth under 18 years of age who are referred to the Unified Judicial System (UJS) by the states attorneys. Juvenile informational complaints may be filed with the states attorney by law enforcement officials, parents, court services officers (alleged probation violations), and others. The states attorney may decide to file a formal petition, refer the case to a court services department for a 90-day informal adjustment, refer the case to a private agency approved by the court, or take no action. Numbers are for the county in which apprehension took place and represent the number of cases rather than individuals. In other words, if a child was referred to UJS for several different offenses, that child would be counted several different times.

The person is counted once for every program in which the client participated. However, if a person was admitted to the same program more than once, the person is only counted once. Admissions include both residential and outpatient treatment programs. Admission totals may include juveniles who are counted more than once if they received services at different programs. The reason for this is because the system does not track clients by a common identifier but by facility. Although the possibility of a client being counted more than once exists, it is probably uncommon.

Systematic equal probability sampling, with a random start, was used to select schools to participate in the survey. Each participating school submitted a list of all classes with students in grades 9, 10, 11, or 12 which met during a given class period. Three versions of the survey were handed out in each class to ensure the privacy of the respondents, each with a different ordering of the questions. As a result if someone were to glance at another person's survey they would not necessarily know which question was being answered. Students sealed their answer sheets in an envelope, then sealed the envelope into a larger manila envelope.

JUVENILE JUSTICE

JUVENILE OFFENSE REFERRALS

The number of juvenile referrals represents the number of youth under eighteen years of age referred to the Unified Judicial System by the states attorney. Juvenile informational complaints may be filed with the states attorney by law enforcement officials, parents, court services officers (alleged probation violations), and others. The states attorney may decide to adjudicate (file a formal petition, i.e. the case goes to court), refer the case to a court services department for a 90-day non-adjudicated action (informal adjustment, i.e. refer the case to a private agency approved by the court, for example, alcohol treatment facility or program), or take no action.

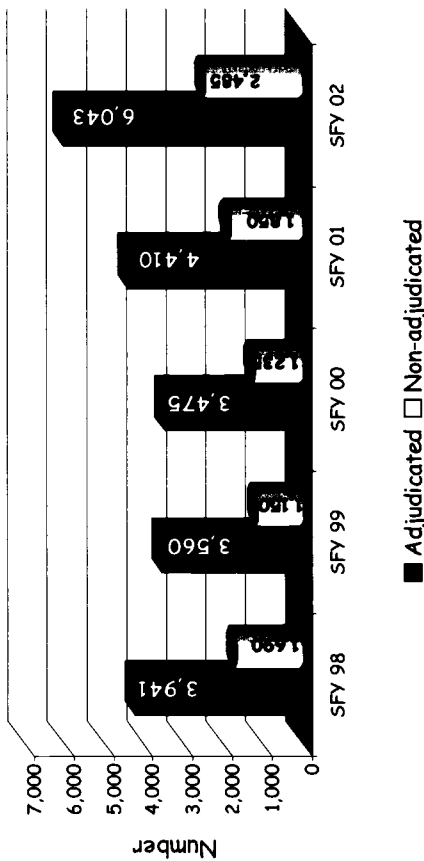
State FY 02 showed an increase in adjudicated and nonadjudicated actions (referred for some form of informal adjustment, i.e., juvenile did not actually go to trial).

COMMITMENTS TO THE DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTIONS

Since July 1, 1996, (state fiscal year 1997) judges no longer placed youth in specific facilities or programs pursuant to a Dispositional Order. Judges now commit youth to the Department of Corrections and the Department of Corrections places the youth in a juvenile corrections facility, residential treatment facility, group care facility, or foster care.

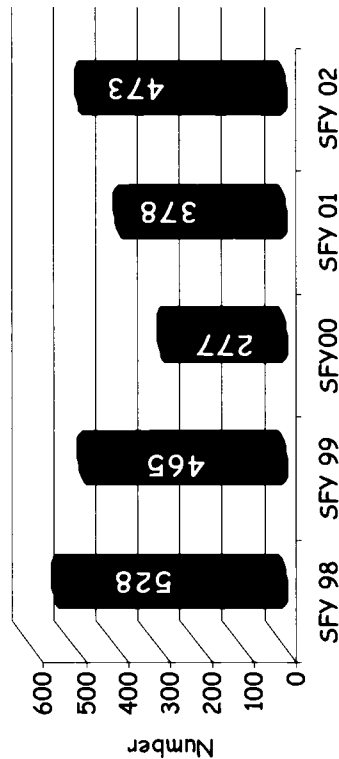
For state fiscal year 2002 the commitments to the Department of Corrections (DOC) was 473. This was an increase of 95 from state fiscal year 01.

CHILD ABUSE & NEGLECT

Child Protection Services is an office within the South Dakota Department of Social Services which,

1. identifies children who are abused or neglected;
2. assures provision of services to those children and families where protection of the child because of child maltreatment, safety and risk is a concern, and
3. provides permanent alternatives for abused or neglected children who cannot remain in their home or who cannot be returned home to their family.

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Child Protection Services responds to reports of child abuse or neglect by a parent, guardian, or custodian through an Initial Family Assessment which is a thorough family centered evaluation of child maltreatment and family functioning. Findings from the Initial Family Assessment relate to maltreatment, risk, and safety.

Initial Family Assessments also result in a disposition of substantiated, indicated, unsubstantiated, or administrative termination. Substantiated means that based on the facts and the definition in state law child abuse and neglect did occur. Indicated means there is circumstantial evidence or other isolated indicators that abuse or neglect did occur. Unsubstantiated means the facts do not provide any basis that abuse or neglect did occur. The category of administrative termination includes those investigations that were initiated but for various reasons could not be completed.

Initial Family Assessments were initiated for a total of 10,993 children during state fiscal year 2002. There are an additional 1,700 Initial Family Assessments which are in a pending status.

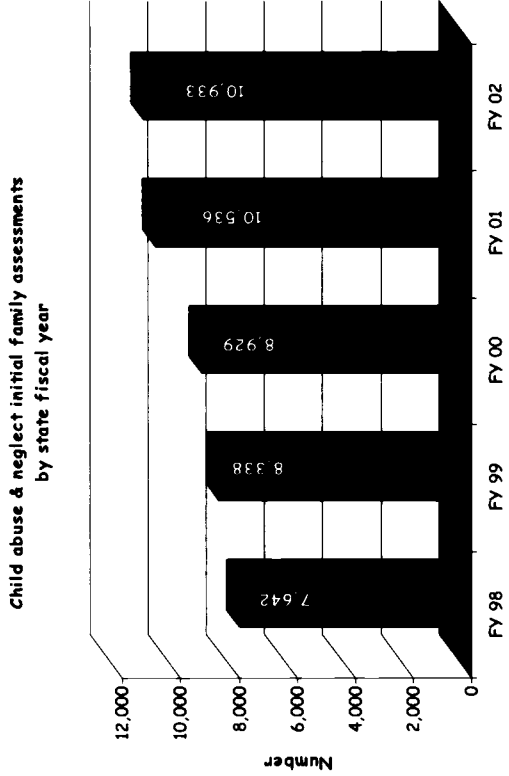
Of the 10,993 children for who an Initial Family Assessment was completed, there was a finding of substantiated or indicated for 4,247 children or 39%. The breakdown by type of abuse or neglect for that 39% is as follows:

physical abuse	849
sexual abuse	187
physical neglect	3,567
emotional maltreatment	934

Of the Initial Family Assessments which were completed, 3,284 children remained in their home with some form of intervention and 2,261 children were removed from their home.

The children who have to be placed could be returned home at a later stage of the case because the situation has improved, and the court has ordered the children's return home. The children who are found to be abused or neglected, and are not placed, could be placed at a later stage of the case while services are being provided.

ages 14-19. This compares with 20% of the total fatalities for youth age 14-19 for 1998, 17% for 1999 and 14% for 2000. There were 7,118 injuries from motor vehicle accidents, of which 2,207 (31%) were to youth between 0-19 years of age. Youth between the ages of 14-19 accounted for 24% (1,689) of the total injuries for 2001.

Motorcyclists in traffic accidents About 2.2% of all accidents, 12.3% of all fatal accidents, and 6.9% of all injury accidents are motorcycle accidents. While the under age 20 population represent 1.6% of the licensed motorcycle drivers, they represent 8.1% of drivers involved in motorcycle accidents, and 13.6% of the speeding drivers in motorcycle accidents.

Motorcyclists in traffic accidents & helmet use Helmets were used by 19 of the motorcycle drivers age 6-20 in accidents. effect on January 1, 1984, there have been 38 deaths to children under 5 years old in South Dakota. Of the total fatalities, four were restrained by a child safety restraint used properly and one was restrained by a lap belt only. No deaths have been reported where a lap and shoulder harness was used to restrain the child.

Youth fatalities and injuries There were 171 fatalities on South Dakota's roads in 2001. Thirty-six of these were youth between the ages of 0-19, representing 21% of the total fatalities. This compares with 28% of the total fatalities for youth age 0-19 for 1998, and 23% for 1999 and 20% for 2000. Twenty-three (13.4%) of all fatalities were between the

Pedestrians & bicyclists in traffic accidents

In 2001, 13% of all pedestrians who died in traffic accidents were under age 20. Injuries for pedestrians under age 20 in traffic accidents accounted for 45% (50) of all injuries.

There was one bicycle fatality under age 20 in 2001. Almost 66% (105) of traffic accident injuries were to the under age 20 bicyclists.

Age of drinking drivers in accidents

There were a total of 65 fatalities in alcohol related accidents in 2001; 11 of those were youth from ages 14 through 19. Alcohol involvement in fatal accidents is based upon a positive blood alcohol concentration (BAC) result and/or indication of alcohol use by at least one driver, pedestrian or bicyclist as reported by the officer who investigated the accident.

Drinking drivers under age 20 accounted for 14% (161 of 1,152 total) of all drinking drivers in 2001; 17% (11 of 65 total) of drinking drivers in fatal accidents; 15% of drinking drivers in injury accidents (87 of 565 total injuries); and 12% (63 of 522 total) of drinking drivers in property damage only (PDO) accidents.

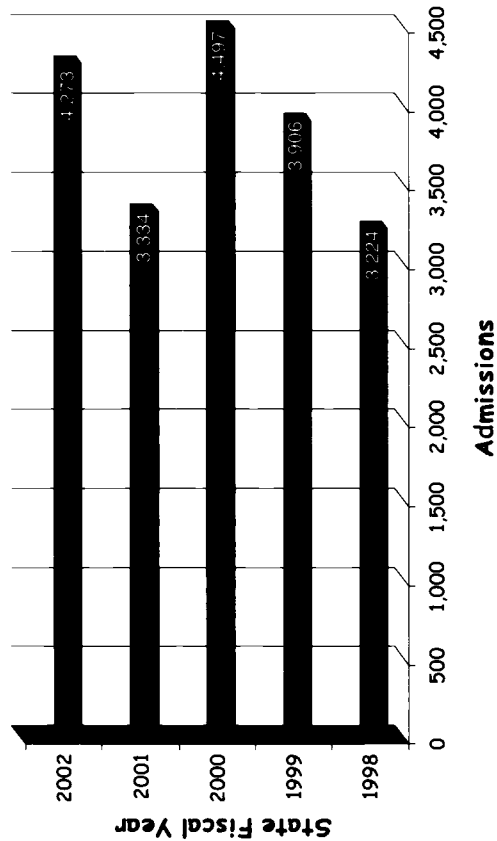
Licensed driver and accidents

The younger licensed driver (under age 20) is overrepresented as drivers in fatal and injury accidents, drinking drivers in fatal and injury accidents, and speeding drivers in fatal and injury accidents. Licensed drivers in South Dakota under age 20 represent just over 9% of the total licensed drivers, yet they represent 21% of drivers in fatal and injury accidents, 16% of drinking drivers in fatal and injury accidents, and 33% of speeding drivers in fatal and injury accidents.

JUVENILE DRUG & ALCOHOL

Juvenile admissions to drug or alcohol treatment programs The South Dakota Department of Human Services, Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse, tracks the number of juveniles who participate in state accredited drug and alcohol treatment programs. Admissions to drug or alcohol programs are noted in the graph below. The counting of juvenile admissions to drug and alcohol treatment programs include youth under age 18 who receive state accredited alcohol and drug services ranging from crisis intervention to structured treatment programs. The 4,273 admissions include 368 admissions of youth from out of state.

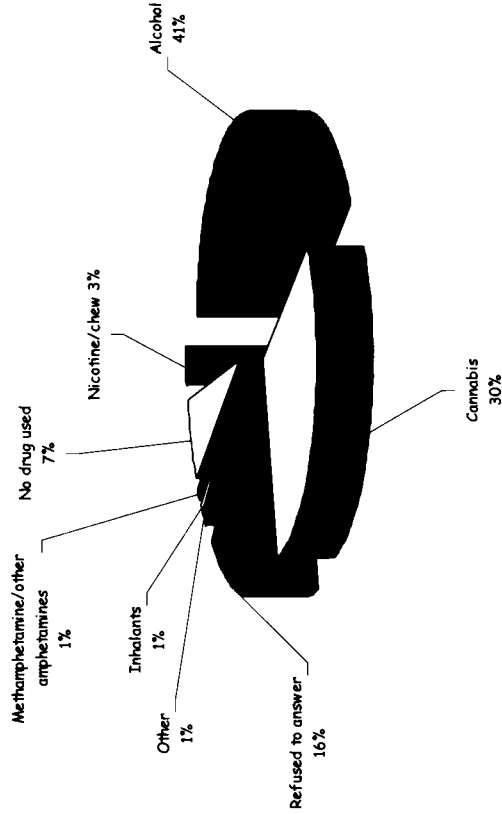

YOUTH RISK BEHAVIOR SURVEY

The health of children and youth is critically linked to their health behaviors. The Youth Risk Behavior Survey (YRBS) provides data on risk behaviors among youth in grades 9, 10, 11, and 12. These risk behaviors fall into six categories:

1. behaviors that result in intentional (violence and suicide) and unintentional injuries (motor vehicle crashes)
2. tobacco use
3. alcohol and other drug use
4. sexual activity that result in HIV infection, other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), and unintended pregnancy,
5. dietary behaviors
6. physical activity

The YRBS was developed by the Center for Disease Control and State Departments of Education across the United States. The purposes of the YRBS are to:

1. determine the prevalence and age of initiation of health risk behaviors.
2. focus the nation and relevant agencies on specific health-risk behaviors of young people.
3. assess whether health-risk behaviors increase, decrease, or remain the same over time.
4. provide comparable national, state, and local data.
5. monitor progress toward achieving the Healthy People 2000 objectives and the national education goals.

The following tables are a summary of the 1993, 1995, 1997, 1999, and 2001 surveys. Where possible all YRBS data have been included. **In the data, some questions were either not asked or asked in a slightly different manner and are therefore not comparable (NC).**

The release of the 2001 Youth Risk Behavior Survey marks a decade of work in the field of youth indicators. The YRBS was the first national effort to collect data at the state and local levels on the risk behaviors that affect the health of America's youth. 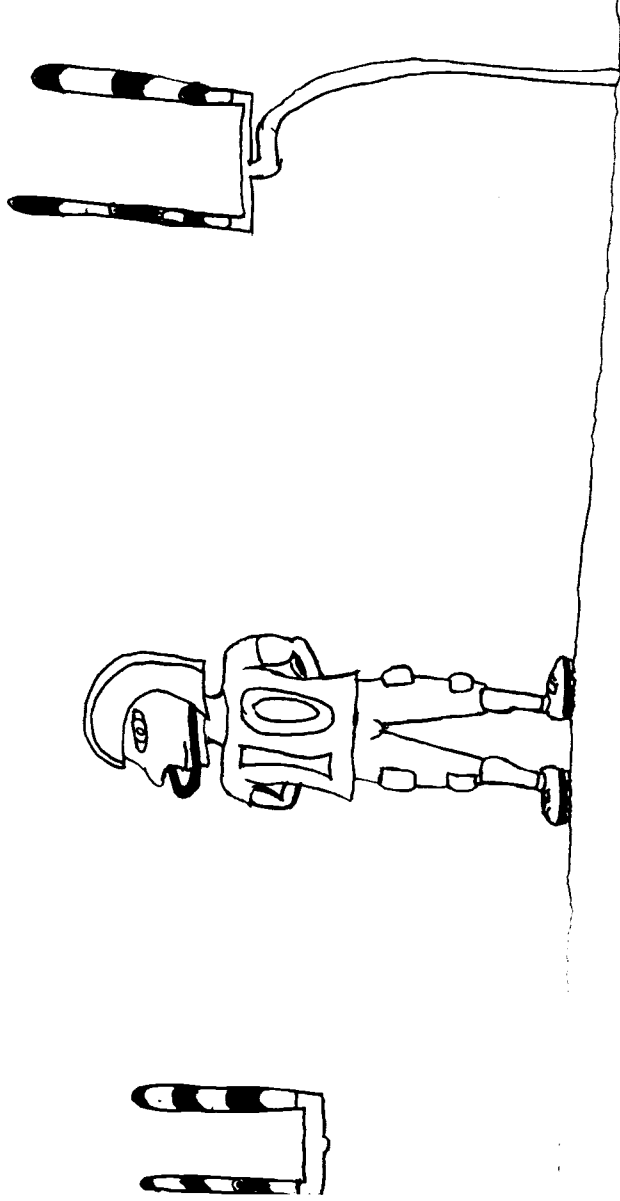

Surveillance is the process of measuring specific health indicators in a given population on a continuous basis, allowing for the evaluation of a population over time. This report provides a summary of the nutritional data collected in South Dakota through the Pediatric Nutrition Surveillance System (PedNSS) for the calendar year of 2000. Data is available by clinic, county, and state. Data is presented in this report for the state as a whole and by county for each of the six nutrition indicators:

- Low birth weight (less than 2,500 grams)
- Short stature (low height-for-age)
- Underweight (low weight-for-height)
- Overweight (high weight-for-height)
- Low hemoglobin and / or hematocrit
- Breast-feeding

HOW TO PERFORM DATA CALCULATIONS

There are numerous computations in this report that involve rates, percents, and percent change over time. Many of these calculations are similar. The one that is used depends on what one wants to say about the data. Basically, each of these calculations involves dividing one piece of data by another.

PERCENT

A 'percent' means one part in one hundred. Ten percent means 10 out of 100. To calculate a percent, divide the number in a subgroup (or smaller number) by the number in the total group and multiply by 100.

Example: Percent: (number in subgroup / number in whole group) (number of children born in South Dakota [10,475] / number of low birth weight babies born in South Dakota [675]) x100.

$$675 / 10,475 = 0.064 \times 100 = 6.4\%$$

Slightly more than 6% of babies born in South Dakota were low birth weight (less than 5.5 pounds).

RATE

A rate is simply the number of things per some other number, usually 100, 1,000 or other multiples of 10. A percentage is a rate-per 100. Depending on the size of the subgroup, a rate greater than 100 is often used. This is the case in health statistics such as infant mortality, child death, etc. To calculate a rate you need three pieces of information-(1) the total group number, (2) the number in the sub group and (3) the 'per' number—per 1,000, 10,000, or 100,000. The per number is your multiplier.

Example: Rate: (number in sub-group / number in whole group) x multiplier (number of infant deaths in the state [77] / number of live births in the state [10,475]) x multiplier.

$$77 / 10,475 = 0.0073 \times 1,000 = 7.3$$

So, the infant mortality rate for South Dakota was 7.4 per 1,000 live births. This means that for every 1,000 live births that occurred in the state in 2001, there were about 7 infant deaths.

Rates can also be obtained per month or per day. For 2001 the figures would show:

10,475 births /12 months = 873 infant births per month in South Dakota

10,475 births / 365 days = 29 infant births per day in South Dakota

PERCENT CHANGE

Change from one time period to the next can be calculated. This is called the 'percent change'. The percent change is found in the demographic section of the Factbook and for the age appropriate immunization in the health section.

The percent change is calculated in the following manner: (newer year number - older year number) / older year number x 100

Example:

2001 immunizations in Hanson County = 84.1% (newer number)

2000 immunizations in Hanson County = 69.8% (older number)

$$(84.1 - 69.8) = 14.3$$

$$14.3 / 69.8 = 0.2048 \times 100 = 20.5\%$$

This figure indicates that between 2000 and 2001 the number of children appropriately immunized by age two in Hanson County increased 20.5% between 2000 and 2001.

HOW TO INTERPRET HEALTH DATA

Information and limitations of the health data:

Mortality and death rates are calculated by taking the number of deaths in any given category, dividing it by the total number of individuals in that category, and multiplying by 1,000 or 100,000 (whatever number is chosen).

$$\frac{\text{Total death}}{\text{Population Base}} \times 1,000$$

Population Base

A percentage is calculated by the same formula only multiplied by 100.

As the population base becomes smaller, as it does in many counties in South Dakota, statistical variation becomes more prominent and more prone to anomalies. For example, let's say a county has 2 infants die out of 85 live births. If we divide 2 by 85 and multiply by 1,000 we get an infant mortality rate of 24 per 1,000. If the next year only 1 infant dies out of 85 live births, the infant mortality rate would be 12. This so-called large decrease is a result of statistical variation and the magnitude of the drop is exaggerated because of the use of a base of 1,000.

In an attempt to minimize chance variations five-year averages are used to minimize chance variations. Despite these precautions, in the most sparsely populated counties using 5 year averages will still not reduce chance variation significantly for some of the indicators due to the small number of events. **A rate or percent is not calculated for those counties where the event number is below 4.**

The standard error (SE) of a rate is used in health statistics when studying or comparing rates. The SE defines a rate's variability and can be used to calculate a confidence interval (CI) to determine the actual variance of a rate 95% of the time. Rates for two different populations are considered to be **significantly different** when their **confidence intervals do not overlap**.

The standard error and confidence intervals are calculated in the following manner. The Minnehaha county child death rate is 24.0. This was based on 36 deaths to children ages 1 to 14 during the time period 1997-01. The square root of 36 is 6. By dividing 24 by 6, the estimated standard error [SE] of 4 is obtained. The estimated SE can then be used to compute a 95% confidence interval [CI] for the rate. The standard formula for determining the 95% CI of a rate is:

$$\text{Rate} \pm (1.96 \times \text{SE})$$

Following this formula, we produce an equation of $24.0 \pm (1.96 \times 4)$. The result is 29.0 ± 7.83 . From this we can calculate the estimated 95% CI to be from 16.17 to 31.83. It can then be stated, with 95% certainty, that the actual 1997-01 child death rate for Minnehaha county is between 16.17 and 31.83 deaths per 100,000 children ages 1 to 14.

Therefore, Minnehaha's child death rate is **not significantly different** from the state rate. This is because the confidence intervals for Minnehaha county (16.17 to 31.83) and the state (27.36 to 35.24) **overlap**

Conversely, the child death rate for Lyman county (based on 7 deaths for 1997-2001) is **considered significantly different** from the state because the actual child death rates for Lyman county (37.54 to 252.26) **do not overlap** the state (27.36 to 35.24).
