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ABSTRACT

This student informational booklet reports that more than 11,000 students transferred from California community colleges to the University of California (UC) in 2000. The publication also answers frequently asked questions. There are three ways to become eligible to attend UC: (1) meet the requirements upon graduating from high school; (2) make up missing requirements by taking transfer-eligible classes in community college; or (3) take 60 transferable units in a community college if you are unable to meet eligibility in the other two ways. Completing major preparation coursework and general education requirements at a community college can make the student a more competitive applicant and will help the student graduate sooner after transfer. Nearly two-thirds of community college students complete a bachelor's degree within 3 years of entering a UC campus, and more than 75% complete a degree 4 years after entering. These graduation rates are comparable to those for students who entered as freshmen. This document offers a brief description of financial aid options for UC students, makes suggestions for choosing a campus, and includes an Internet address for online applications. It also contains a listing of campus tours and/or admissions advising hours for each campus, as well as a listing of pertinent addresses, phone numbers, and Web sites. (Author/NB)

Transfer students have an important role at the University of California. Students who begin their studies at a community college bring insights, life experiences and a real-world perspective to UC's classrooms and campuses. Regardless of which general campus you select—Berkeley, Davis, Irvine, Los Angeles, Riverside, San Diego, Santa Barbara or Santa Cruz—the University of California has a lot to offer you.

We hope this booklet will answer your questions about applying and transferring to the University of California.





Why should I attend UC?

The University of California offers a dynamic learning environment and an affordable, world-class education. In just over a century, the University of California has built an international reputation for academic excellence, opening doors as well as minds. Each year, thousands of students from all over the world compete for the opportunity to attend the University of California. The University has outstanding academic programs, faculty, libraries and research facilities. Whether you want a broad liberal arts education, preparation for graduate study or training for a particular profession, the University has a program to meet your needs. When you graduate, you will find that your University of California degree is a passport to new opportunities. UC graduates enjoy high acceptance rates at graduate and professional schools, compete successfully in the job market and often become leaders in their fields.

How do I know if I'm eligible to attend UC?

There are several routes to UC eligibility. Your community college counselor or transfer center director can help you assess whether you are UC-eligible. There are three ways to become eligible for UC, although most transfer students become eligible using number 3:

[1] If you were eligible for admission to the University when you graduated from high school — meaning you satisfied the Subject, Scholarship and Examination Requirements, or were identified by the University during your senior year in high school

as eligible under the Eligibility in the Local Context (ELC) program — you are eligible to transfer if you have a C (2.0) average in your transferable coursework.

[2] If you have met the Scholarship and Examination Requirements, but are missing required high school courses in “a-f” subjects, you can become eligible to transfer by taking transferable college courses in the missing subjects, earning a C or better in each required course, and achieving an overall C average in all transferable coursework.

[3] If you were not eligible for admission to the University when you graduated from high school and cannot make up deficiencies in one of the ways described in number 2, you need to fulfill the requirements for basic eligibility. This requires that you take particular transferable courses and complete 60 semester (90 quarter) units of transferable college credit with a GPA of at least 2.4 if you are a California resident and 2.8 if you are not.

Keep in mind as you review the eligibility requirements that you need to satisfy these requirements before you enroll, but not necessarily before you *apply*. A counselor can help you decide which path to eligibility is right for you and can help you choose courses to meet the requirements. You can also check out ASSIST (www.assist.org) for a list of UC-transferable courses at your community college. In addition, the University publishes a planning guide for prospective transfer students called *Answers for Transfers*. It is available from your community college counselor and the UC campuses. You can also access it online at www.ucop.edu/pathways.

BASIC REQUIREMENTS FOR MINIMAL TRANSFER ELIGIBILITY

60 transferable semester units (or 90 quarter units) with a 2.4 GPA for California residents (2.8 GPA for non-residents) including:

2 transferable English composition courses

1 transferable math course in mathematical concepts or quantitative reasoning

4 transferable courses from at least 2 of the following areas: arts and humanities, social sciences, behavioral sciences, or physical and biological sciences

Become a Competitive Applicant

In addition to becoming minimally eligible, it's a good idea to complete coursework that will help you to graduate faster after you transfer and will increase the likelihood of your acceptance to the campus and major of your choice. Some campuses and majors will not accept students who only meet the requirements for minimum transfer eligibility.

MAJOR PREPARATION VS. GENERAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Some majors prefer that you focus on pre-major requirements, rather than general education (GE) or the Intersegmental General Education Transfer Curriculum (IGETC). These majors vary by campus but typically include engineering, physical, biological, or natural sciences, and some business programs. Deciding on a possible major will help you choose the best course pattern. You can check www.assist.org to see which preparation courses are required for your major. Remember that completing coursework in both major preparation and general education will help you become a more competitive applicant.

MAJOR PREPARATION COURSES You should try to complete as much of your lower-division coursework as possible, especially courses that prepare you for your major. Some UC campuses and majors require completion of major preparation courses prior to admission to UC. Talk to a counselor and use www.assist.org to help plan your coursework.

GENERAL EDUCATION VS. IGETC General education (GE) requirements are designed to give University undergraduates a broad background in all major academic disciplines. You can either complete the GE requirements for a specific UC campus or you can complete the IGETC, which will fulfill all GE requirements at any UC or CSU campus. IGETC offers more flexibility if you are not sure where you will attend but must be completed before you transfer. Some majors and colleges may not accept IGETC, so check with a counselor first.

ELECTIVES Having to complete 60 semester transferable college units (or 90 quarter units) gives you an opportunity to take elective courses. Use electives to explore new academic areas and to take courses in other subjects that interest you.

Do I have a good chance of being admitted?

If you meet the eligibility requirements, there is a place for you at one of the UC campuses. California community college transfer students receive first priority over other transfer applicants to UC, including applicants from four-year institutions and the University's own intercampus transfers. Of the 16,310 California community college students who applied to transfer to UC for fall 2000, more than 77% were accepted to a UC campus. Overall, nearly 90% of all transfer students at the University of California started out at a California community college.

Not every student can be admitted to his or her first choice UC campus. In fact, only about a third of the students who apply to UC's two most selective campuses — Los Angeles and Berkeley — are admitted. But several UC campuses usually admit all eligible students. While you are attending a California community college take courses that are UC-transferable, that satisfy University and college requirements, and that fulfill prerequisites in your major.

You can increase your chances of being admitted in two ways:

[1] Your chances for admission to the University of California increase significantly when you apply to several campuses. About half of the students who apply to just one campus are admitted, but more than 90% of students who apply to four or more UC campuses are accepted. If application fees are a concern, contact a UC campus Admissions Office for information about obtaining a fee waiver. If you are enrolled in an EOPS program, fee waivers are also available through your community college EOPS office. *Contact numbers for UC are listed on pages 8-9 of this booklet.*



[2] Completing major preparation coursework and general education requirements while at a community college campus can also make you a more competitive applicant. Doing so will also help you graduate sooner after you transfer. Information on which courses to choose is available from the transfer center, a counselor or online at www.assist.org.



Will I have a hard time adjusting to UC?

Transfer students from California community colleges are well prepared to succeed at the University of California. Community college students who enter UC as juniors perform as well academically as students who entered the University as freshmen. Nearly two-thirds of community college students complete a bachelor's degree within three years of entering a UC campus and more than 75% complete a degree four years after entering UC. These graduation rates are comparable to those for students who entered UC as freshmen.

Every UC campus except Berkeley is on the quarter system. Some transfer students who come from the semester system find it difficult initially to adjust to the fast pace of the ten-week quarter system. The high levels of success though show that students do adjust.

Can I afford to come to the University of California?

Financial aid programs make a world-class University of California education accessible to all eligible UC students. The University administers a variety of financial aid programs, including grant and scholarship programs, which do not have to be repaid, student loans, which do not have to be repaid until you are no longer attending school, and work-study jobs on campus. Nearly two-thirds of UC students receive some form of financial aid. About half of UC undergraduates receive grants and schol-

arship assistance averaging over \$5,700 each year. Many students from particularly low-income families receive substantially larger grants. The goal of UC's financial aid programs is to assist students in covering the cost of attending full time without having to work more than part-time. The University is meeting that goal: in the last two years increased financial aid and stable student fees have allowed students to borrow less money to attend than in previous years, making UC even more affordable.

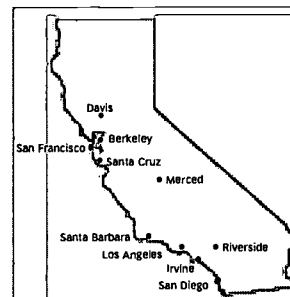
Which campus should I choose?

There is a place for every eligible California student at one of the University's eight general campuses. If you are familiar with only one or two campuses, you may be surprised to learn that all UC campuses offer exceptional opportunities for undergraduates. All eight general campuses have accomplished faculty, outstanding facilities, a wealth of services and challenging academic programs that will prepare you for a successful future.

If you have decided on a major, you have already begun the campus selection process; all majors are not available at every campus. University publications — including *Introducing the University* and the

campus General Catalogs — can help you learn more about the campuses and specific academic programs.

The academic programs, the physical setting, the size of the student body and the students themselves are just a few of the factors that contribute to the individual



character of each campus. Other considerations include the campus' distance from your home, the type of community that surrounds the campus and available cultural and recreational activities. If possible, you should arrange to visit the campuses that interest you. All campuses offer guided tours and special programs for prospective students, including campus open houses each fall and spring. Whether you choose the oldest UC campus or the youngest, an urban campus or a rural setting, a major in engineering or dance, you will be part of a group of the brightest, most talented, imaginative and motivated students to attend any university.

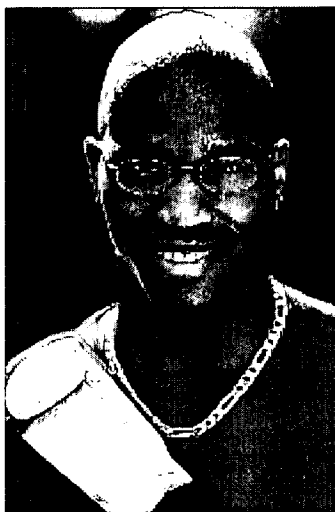
Can UC address my individual interests and needs?

The University of California helps students with their individual needs, both academic and personal. Because your ability to succeed academically is influenced by factors outside the classroom, UC provides a wide array of opportunities to explore and contribute to campus life.

There are countless opportunities to get involved. Each University of California campus provides students numerous opportunities to get involved with activities that interest them and to meet people with similar interests. Each of the eight general campuses offers a balanced program covering all basic areas of undergraduate study. In addition, each campus has clubs and organizations representing every imaginable interest and affiliation, be it academic, cultural, social, political, ethnic, professional, religious, musical, recreational, artistic, literary, or service-oriented. All campuses have outstanding sports and recreational facilities and active student governments that advocate for students, sponsor cultural events, manage a variety of services and projects, and run student-operated publications and radio and TV stations.

The University will help you work toward the future you want. Each campus has a career planning center to help you identify your career options and develop skills to find the job you want. Counselors will help you match your interests and abilities with possible careers. They offer workshops on career planning, resume writing, interviewing techniques and conducting a job search. You'll find planning and information materials, lists of potential employment opportunities and information about graduate education.

UC can help you with childcare, housing and health care. The University has a variety of housing options for undergraduates, including on-campus residence halls and apartments for students with families. University-sponsored off-campus housing is also available at each



campus. Housing for single undergraduates ranges from apartments shared by several students to residence halls with suites and double and single rooms. All are equipped with laundry facilities, lounges, and study areas. Several campuses guarantee housing for at least one year to new, single transfer students who meet housing application and contract deadlines and requirements. For students who have children, the campuses offer part- and full-time care for a limited number of children. The nature of the programs and the manner in which they are administered vary by campus. Each

campus also has a student health center and offers a health insurance plan.

How do I apply?

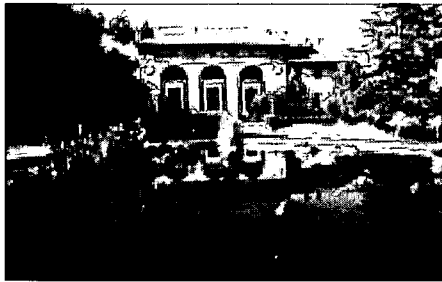
The University's *Application for Undergraduate Admission and Scholarships* is available from your college counselor or from any of the campus Admissions Offices beginning in September. You may also apply online or download a copy of the application form and booklet in PDF format at UC's PATHWAYS Web site at www.ucop.edu/pathways. The application period for fall enrollment is November 1–30. Some campuses also offer admission to winter and spring terms. Information is available at www.ucop.edu/pathways/appctr.html.

The application process, fees and fee waivers and information about the items that you must submit with your application are explained in the application booklet and Web site. Be aware of the importance of the application filing periods.

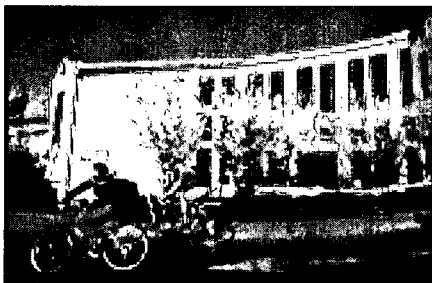


UC Berkeley

Campus tours are held daily, seven days a week. Knowledgeable student guides lead the 90-minute walking tours. Reservations are not required. Weekday tours are Monday–Friday at 10 am and are followed by an optional

information session with an admissions counselor. Weekday tours leave from the Visitor Center at 101 University Hall, located at the corner of University Avenue and Oxford Street. UC Davis

Admissions advising is available on a drop-in basis Monday–Friday from 9 am–noon and 1–4 pm, except on observed holidays.

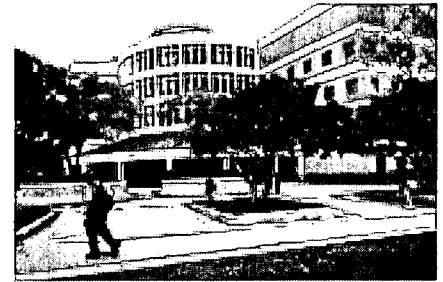

UC Irvine

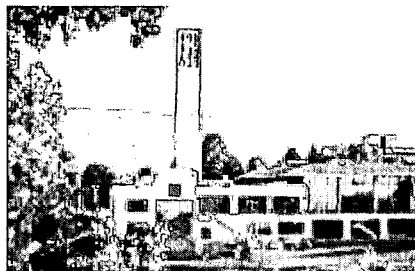

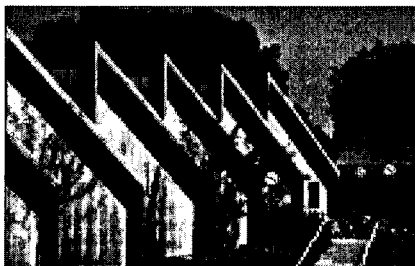

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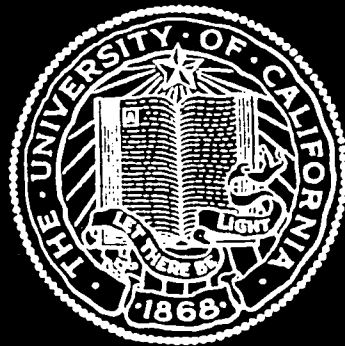
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
