ABSTRACT

Louisiana's initiative to assist local communities in developing and operating school-based health centers (SBHCs), in place since 1991, is a nationally recognized model. Starting with the basic premise that students must be healthy to learn and be educated in order to maintain a healthy lifestyle, this annual report describes the important role that SBHCs play in the lives of students and schools they serve. Section 1 of the report details the expansion of school-based health care since the passage of the Adolescent School Health Initiative Act in 1991. This section also highlights two projects related to continuous quality improvement: (1) the best practices initiative, a set of clinical guidelines for SBHC preventive services based on national recommendations; and (2) the outcome measures summary documenting the differences SBHCs make in immunization status and health insurance coverage of Louisiana students. Section 2 summarizes the leading reasons children visit SBHCs, and demonstrates the wide variety of services available at the centers, including preventive and primary health care, psychosocial services, and health education. Section 3 features profiles of each of Louisiana's operating school health centers, illustrating the strong links between the SBHCs and the communities they serve. The report's three appendices include sample diagnoses for each of the categories of conditions by which SBHC data are coded, the text of the state law that created the program, and the 2001-2002 financial statement. Dear Citizens of Louisiana:

It is with great pleasure that I present the 2001-2002 Louisiana School-Based Health Centers Annual Services Report. This report highlights the activities of Louisiana's state-funded school-based health centers (SBHCs) which provide accessible, affordable, quality care in nurturing environments for more than 50,000 students. Six new SBHCs opened this year in Cameron, Allen, Jackson, Grant, Iberville, and Ouachita parishes. At the end of 2002, there were 53 SBHCs in 23 parishes serving 84 schools throughout the state.

Now, more than ever, adolescents face very difficult challenges and choices in their lives. Alcohol and drug abuse, violence, teenage pregnancy, and HIV are just some of the threats adolescents encounter every day. At the same time, adolescents are known to delay and even sometimes avoid seeking medical services in traditional settings. When they forego care they are at an increased risk of physical and emotional health problems. SBHCs, conveniently located on school campuses, are an effective and proven way of reaching this age group and addressing their unique health concerns.

Louisiana SBHCs are staffed with multi-disciplinary teams, composed of doctors, nurse practitioners, nurses, and social workers. Staff focus on prevention and early intervention by promoting healthy lifestyle choices. Nationally, research has shown that SBHCs decrease emergency room and urgent care visits, hospitalizations, transportation, and medication expenses.

Clearly, SBHCs enjoy immense support in Louisiana, both at the local and at the state levels. They have remained a top priority of the Governor's Children's Cabinet for several years. I ask you to let this report stand as a call to continue our work together to provide our children with the necessary physical and mental health services and information in order that they may prosper and live healthy lives.

Executive Summary

The Adolescent School Health Initiative (ASHI) Act was signed into law in 1991. The Act authorizes the Office of Public Health (OPH) to facilitate the establishment of school-based health centers (SBHCs) in Louisiana public schools. At the time the law was enacted, there were only 4 SBHCs. At the end of 2001-2002, there were 53 state-funded SBHCs providing access to care to over 50,000 students. In addition to funding, OPH sets policies and standards for SBHC operation, provides technical assistance, monitors contract compliance, assures continuous quality improvement, and generates statistical reports on service delivery.

The SBHCs provide comprehensive primary and preventive health services to the students they serve. Many of these SBHCs are located in areas where medical care would otherwise be difficult or impossible to access. The major threats to the health and academic success of young people today are risky behaviors, poor choices, and lack of access to health care. SBHCs follow a comprehensive model in order to address these issues and provide care to the underserved.

The 2001-2002 Annual Services Report is a testament to the tremendous efforts of thousands of individuals working to support, develop, and deliver health and educational services in Louisiana SBHCs. Starting with the basic premise that students must be healthy to learn and be educated in order to maintain a healthy lifestyle, the data in these pages reveal the important role that SBHCs play in the lives of the students and schools they serve. Indeed, the success of this program rests in the incredible community support all around Louisiana.

Section One-Program Highlights and Overview, is a glance at the history and scope of Louisiana SBHCs since the passage of the ASHI Act in 1991. New in 2001-2002 are two projects related to Continuous Quality Improvement. First, the *Best Practices Initiative* is a set of clinical guidelines for SBHC preventive services based on national recommendations. Second, the *Outcome Measures Summary* documents the difference SBHCs make in immunization status and health insurance coverage of Louisiana students.

Section Two-Who Visits SBHCs and Why, details the leading reasons children visit SBHCs. It demonstrates the wide variety of services available at the health centers, including preventive and primary healthcare, psychosocial services and health education.

Section Three-Louisiana SBHC Profiles, features each of Louisiana's SBHCs. The community's involvement and commitment are integral to the operation and mission of SBHCs. Review of the community advisory boards and partner organizations demonstrates the strong link between the communities and the health centers.

Appendices A-C include sample diagnoses for each of the categories of conditions by which SBHC data are coded (A), the text of the state law that created the program (B), and the 2001-2002 financial statement (C).







Building Strong Support

Louisiana SBHCs Featured in "Congressional Roll Call"

Louisiana SBHCs were spotlighted in "Congressional Roll Call," a popular Capitol Hill newspaper in March of 2002. The newspaper noted that these health centers are more than an education to kids in need. U.S. Senator John Breaux commented on the story stating, "I am pleased Louisiana's SBHCs are featured prominently in 'Congressional Roll Call.' That puts Louisiana at the top of a good list, and shows our commitment to kids and their access to quality health care." State Senator Jay Dardenne was also pleased and commented, "I see the health centers as an economical way for policymakers and communities to provide medical care and mental health access to Louisiana's children and adolescents."

The Governor's Children's Cabinet Recommends SBHCs as a Top Priority

The Governor's Children's Cabinet, composed of Louisiana State Agency heads, made SBHCs a top priority in 2001-2002 along with the expansion of health insurance coverage to children and pregnant women through the Louisiana Children's Health Insurance Program (LaCHIP).

December Declared as Louisiana State Assembly on School-Based Health Care Month Governor Mike Foster declared the month of December as Louisiana State Assembly on School-Based Health Care Month.

Improving Access

Six New SBHCs Open in the State

In 2001-2002, six new SBHCs opened: Iberville Elementary SBHC in Iberville Parish; Oakdale High SBHC in Allen Parish; South Cameron High SBHC in Cameron Parish; Pollock Elementary SBHC in Grant Parish; Jonesboro High SBHC in Jackson Parish; and Riser Middle SBHC in Ouachita Parish. There are now SBHCs in 23 parishes serving 84 schools and providing access to over 50,000 children throughout the state.

Assuring Quality of Care

Eight SBHC Sponsors undergo CQI Review

As part of the Adolescent School Health Initiative's continuous quality improvement program, eight SBHC sponsors underwent a rigorous on-site continuous quality improvement review in 2001-2002. The process assures compliance with OPH contract requirements as well as the *Principles, Standards, and Guidelines for School-Based Health Centers in Louisiana*.

The Best Practices for Prevention in SBHCs Initiative is Rolled Out

The Best Practices for Prevention in SBHCs was launched by ASHI in 2001-2002 (see pages 11-12). As part of the Initiative, best practice guidelines are being developed to assure the consistent delivery of quality preventive services in all the SBHCs. Asthma was the initial focus with asthma nurse case management training provided to SBHC staff in the summer of 2001. Throughout the year, the SBHCs also developed best practice guidelines for hypertension and type 2 diabetes screening and management.



SBHC Staff Participate in Suicide Prevention Training

Suicide is the third leading cause of death among Louisiana youth as well as the nation. To address this problem, all SBHC staff members were given the opportunity to participate in a set of regional suicide prevention trainings. Several SBHC registered nurses, nurse practitioners, and social workers participated and gave positive comments about the training, including attaining an increased knowledge of suicidal risk factors and feeling better prepared to assess risk and provide appropriate referrals.

Promoting Physical Activity and Healthy Eating in Schools

SBHCs Promote Physical Activity Among Preteens

The Louisiana Department of Education, through funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and with the assistance of the four Louisiana AHECs (Area Health Education Centers), provided grants to SBHCs to increase physical activity among preteens.

SBHCs Partake in National Broadcast on Healthy Eating

Louisiana SBHCs were featured on a nationally broadcast teleconference hosted by Louisiana's Department of Education in the fall of 2001. The teleconference provided training to health educators and school staff on the U.S. Dietary Guidelines for healthy eating.

Schools Celebrate Healthy Kids Month

As part of the Louisiana Department of Education's December celebration of *Healthy Kids* Month, SBHCs throughout the state conducted special activities to promote healthy lifestyles among students.

SBHC Stories

In the school lunchrooms, teacher lounges, school board office and school hallways, individual staff members of the Family Service Center (FSC) are often stopped and thanked by school system employees for helping them get health insurance for their children. As an enrollment site for LaCHIP, the FSC lets the community know in many ways about eligibility for this free health insurance. Through a cooperative endeavor with the school system's business office, all employee payroll envelopes for the month of December contained a LaCHIP flier and the phone number of the FSC.

West Feliciana - Family Service Center

Through a grant from the State Department of Education, Butler School-Based Health Center was able to conduct a Nutrition Digi Walker Class for approximately forty 6th grade students, on a weekly basis, for six weeks. Heights, weights, and a fat analysis were taken on each student. The SBHC physician provided exercise ideas to each participant. Students were given weekly worksheets on self-esteem in relation to eating habits and body types, a copy of a Food Guide Pyramid, examples of healthy, "quick" breakfasts for before school, and a Digi Walker, which measures number of steps taken. Each student was responsible for recording the number of steps taken on an activities log. Two students were presented with Presidential Fitness Shirts for walking a minimum of 10,000 steps within a five-day period and one student was given a special jump rope for the same achievement. All participants received a choice of volleyball, basketball or football and roller skating passes.

Louisiana Standards for School-Based Health Centers

Primary Goal

- To provide convenient access to preventive and primary health services for students who might otherwise have limited or no access to health care.
- To meet the physical and emotional health needs of adolescents at their school sites.

Community Participation

All health centers must originate as a community initiative. State funding is dependent upon evidence of broad community participation.

Sponsoring Agency

The sponsoring agency must be either a public or a private non-profit institution locally suited and fiscally viable to administer and operate a health center serving the needs of adolescents (i.e., health center, hospital, medical school, health department, youth serving agency, school or school system).

School and School District

The host school should agree to work cooperatively with its health center, particularly in developing and implementing a full-scale coordinated school health program. School board approval is a prerequisite for a grant of state funds for planning or operation.

Services

A SBHC must offer comprehensive preventive and primary health services that address the physical, emotional, and educational needs of its student population. Services provided should include medical screenings; treatment for common illnesses and minor injuries; referral and follow-up for serious illnesses and emergencies; onsite care, consultation, referral and follow-up for pregnancy, chronic diseases and disorders, and emotional and mental problems; comprehensive physicals; immunizations; laboratory testing; and preventive services to reduce high risk behaviors.

Parental Consent

A parent or guardian must sign a consent form, approved by school authorities, for a student to receive health center services. Parents may indicate which services they do not wish their children to receive at the centers.

Operating Policies

The hours of operation should ensure that students have easy access to the center's services. In general, a SBHC should have both before and after-school hours and should operate for some period of time during the summer.

Every school-based health center is required to promote abstinence. Centers are prohibited by State law from distributing contraceptives or abortifacient drugs or devices, and from counseling or advocating abortion, or referring any student to an organization for counseling or advocating abortion.

Staffing

Services at the school health centers are provided by multi-disciplinary teams including physicians, nurse practitioners, registered nurses, and licensed mental/behavioral health professionals. In addition, the SBHC is staffed with a medical office assistant and an administrator.

Selection Criteria

The ASHI seeks to provide services to young people with limited or no access to health care providers. Grants are made through a competitive call for proposals process with decisions based upon the socioeconomic and health needs of the student population to be served, the health services available in the communities, the level of community support, the likelihood of success in developing and operating SBHCs that will fulfill its service objectives, and the working relationship between the schools and health care communities.

Continuum of Care

Centers must execute cooperative agreements with community health care providers to link students to support and specialty services not provided at the school site. Centers must arrange 24-hour coverage ensuring that students have access to services during non-operating hours, including nights, weekends, holidays, and summer vacation.



Continuous Quality Improvement Program

The Adolescent School Health Initiative's (ASHI) Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) Program is designed to assure that quality medical, psychosocial, and educational health services are delivered in accordance with current best practices to children seen at Louisiana School-Based Health Centers (SBHCs).

Best Practices for Prevention in 584Cs

A Look at Louisiana's Children & Youth

OVERVIEW

As part of the Adolescent School Health Initiative's (ASHI) continuous quality improvement program, the *Best Practices for Prevention in School-Based Health Centers*, Louisiana's Preventive Services Improvement Initiative, was launched in 2001-2002. The *Best Practices* are a set of clinical guidelines for SBHC preventive services based on national recommendations. SBHC staff participate in ongoing educational workshops where the guidelines are highlighted. As the SBHCs implement the best practices, they also are measuring their success by collecting outcome data.

Asthma Best Practice For Prevention

GOALS:

In 2001-2002, SBHCs embarked upon improving the medical management of students with asthma with the goals of improving the quality of life, improving school attendance, and reducing emergency room visits and hospitalizations for students with asthma.

BACKGROUND:1

Nationwide, asthma is the most common chronic disease among children, affecting nearly 5 million people who are younger than 18 years of age. Asthma's effects on children and adolescents include the following:

- Asthma accounts for 14 million missed school days annually.
- Asthma is the third-ranking cause of hospitalization among those younger than 15 years of age.
- The estimated cost of treating asthma in those younger than 18 years of age is \$3.2 billion per year.

ASTHMA IN LOUISIANA:

In Louisiana alone, it is estimated that 62,700 children² are affected. Low-income populations, minorities, and children living in inner cities experience disproportionately higher sickness and death due to asthma. The current nationwide estimate of childhood asthma is approximately 5.3%.³

NURSE CASE MANAGEMENT:

In August of 2001, twenty-four SBHC nurses and nurse practitioners underwent training for school-based asthma case management. The purposes of this training included becoming familiar with the latest guidelines for the diagnosis and management of asthma, learning techniques to train students on the proper use of asthma inhalers and peak flow meters, discovering new nursing case management styles, and incorporating behavior-change techniques into asthma case management.



RESULTS:

Data was collected on 53 students with asthma who were followed for one school year at two of the SBHCs. The students self-reported school absences as well as emergency room visits and hospital admissions due to asthma for the previous year. Next, information was collected on school absences, emergency room visits, and hospital admissions due to asthma for the current year from the students and the information from the two years was compared. In addition to a total of 101 fewer absences, these children also reported fewer overall emergency room visits and hospital admissions for asthma.

(From national estimates, 5.3% of Louisiana children are affected by asthma. Therefore, it is probable that 2,650 children with access to a Louisiana SBHC suffer from the disease. Based on the above figures from the sample of 53 children, it is extrapolated that the cost savings to Louisiana is \$757,400.)

CONCLUSIONS:

While this cost savings is dramatic, it is in fact the improved quality of life and medical progress of the children that are of utmost importance. Many children reported less symptoms of asthma while performing routine activities and felt less frightened during asthma attacks. The improvement was felt not only by the children, but also by their parents. A large number of parents reported that they missed less work than they had the previous year.

FUTURE PROGRAMS:

ASHI and the SBHCs are in the process of developing Best Practices for:

- Diabetes Screening and Management
- Hypertension Screening
- Oral Health
- Obesity Evaluation and Treatment

One of the SBHC nurse practitioners, Enid Broyard, said of the program "the parents were very receptive to the idea, as they felt it empowered them to take better care of their children's asthma." Tracy Parker, another nurse practitioner involved with the project, saw the asthma training as "very beneficial, as it helped change the way I practiced by providing an effective and set curriculum."

Outcome Measures: 5BACs Improve the Health of the Students Served

In 2001-2002, as part of ASHI's continuous quality improvement program, SBHCs began looking at specific outcomes. ASHI has documented specific areas of improvement of the SBHCs by using outcome measures in two key areas: up-to-date documentation of immunization status and health insurance enrollment.

Immunization Status


Random chart audits were performed at the SBHCs in order to determine documentation of immunization status of students based on the OPH immunization program schedule. The first audit was done in the fall, prior to initiation of outreach efforts to immunize children and update records. The second audit was performed at the end of the school year.

The results from the first audit showed an overall up-to-date documented immunization rate of 42%. However, due to the efforts of the SBHC staff, the second audit showed an overall increase to 80%. While to date the results have been impressive, over the next year, ASHI's goal will be to improve the up-to-date immunization rate to over 90%.

Insurance Enrollment

One of the goals of the SBHCs is to ensure that all eligible students are insured through Medicaid or Louisiana's Children's Health Insurance Program (LaCHIP). Data was retrieved both at the beginning and end of the school year to ascertain the change in the insurance status of SBHC enrollees. As a result of the hard work of the SBHC staff over the course of the year, 326 students obtained health insurance. The number of uninsured students decreased from 7,710 to 7,385 of the overall SBHC enrollment. This change was statistically significant (p<.001). Efforts to enroll eligible students in LaCHIP and Medicaid will be ongoing.

Number of Uninsured Enrollees at SBHCs Statewide










Louisiana School-Based Health Centers



Number of Conditions Seen at SBHCs, by Category




Leading Reasons for General Preventive Medicine Visits


Leading Mental & Behavioral Health Issues Addressed, By Category






Total Visits by Grade for all SBHCs



Comparison View of Rural Versus Urban Sites

The Adolescent School Health Initiative began in urban schools with high concentrations of economically disadvantaged and uninsured students. Immediately after its inception, however, rural communities also recognized the value of health centers in their schools which could provide services to adolescents lacking access to health care. While all adolescents experience similar physical and mental health challenges, both the obvious and subtle differences can be addressed by the local school-based health center because it remains a community-based initiative.








Type of School That Houses the SBHC


Although the program is mandated to serve middle and high school students, children in primary and elementary grades at "feeder" schools are also served (see Visits by Grade on page 18). Sources of SBHC Funding




Insurance Status of Those Using the SBHC



Leading Gynecological and Pregnancy Related Visits



Of 131,566 visits in 2001-2002, 3,530 (less than 3%) were for conditions related to gynecological and reproductive health issues. These visits were associated with routine gynecological health, treatment for sexually transmitted diseases and pregnancy care in centers that provide prenatal care. It is the policy of SBHCs in Louisiana, in compliance with the laws of the State on sexuality education, counseling, services and referral, to promote and encourage abstinence from premarital sexual activity. SBHCs serve to reinforce ways to prevent pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Abstinence is also emphasized for teens seeking treatment for diseases resulting from sexual activity.







Top 5 Mental & Behavioral Health Issues Addressed During 2001-2002, by Category





Top 4 Mental & Behavioral Health Issues Addressed During 2001-2002, by Category









Appendix A

Examples of Diagnoses within Each Category of Conditions Seen at Louisiana SBHCs

International Classification of Disease, Version 9 (ICD-9) codes are grouped into general categories. Examples of diagnoses within each category follow:

Cardiovascular & Blood: hypertension, hypotension, and blood disorders

Central Nervous System & Head: concussions, headaches, seizure disorder, cerebral palsy, and syncope

Dental & Oral: dental caries and other diseases of teeth and gums

Drug Abuse & Dependence: diagnoses related to alcohol abuse, cannabis abuse, and tobacco use **Ear, Nose & Throat:** diagnoses related to conditions of the ear, such as ear infections and wax build-up; the nose, such as nose bleeds and diseases of the nasal cavity and sinuses; and the throat, such as pharyngitis and strep throat

Eyes: diagnoses related to eyes and vision such as vision problems, conjunctivitis, injury to the eye, and near-sightedness

Gastrointestinal: diarrhea, irritable bowel syndrome, constipation, gastroenteritis, and other digestive disorders

General Preventive Medicine: immunizations, comprehensive physical examination with risk assessment, and special screenings

Genitourinary: urinary tract infection

Gynecology & Breast: dysmenorrhea (painful menstruation), irregular menses, and other gynecological disorders

Health Counseling & Education: not limited to, but includes dissemination of information on personal health, consumer health, nutritional health, substance use and abuse, HIV/AIDS, and injury prevention and safety Mental & Behavioral Health: includes all mental health service provisions such as individual counseling, treatment intervention groups, and case management. Reasons for mental and behavioral health visits are grouped into subcategories such as mental health disorders, academic problems, substance use/abuse problems, and illness-related problems.

Metabolic & Nutrition: obesity and dehydration

Miscellaneous: reported conditions not related to a specific diagnosis category such as abnormal results of blood tests, malaise and fatigue, and administrative procedures

Musculoskeletal & Trauma: joint pain, joint swelling, tendonitis, scoliosis, and any bone, cartilage, or muscle disorders; includes injuries

Pregnancy & Related Issues: suspected pregnancy, pregnancy counseling, prenatal care, postpartum care, and bleeding in pregnancy

Pulmonary & Respiratory: acute lower respiratory infections, asthma, and other respiratory disorders
Sexually Transmitted Diseases: chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, genital warts, and genital herpes
Skin & Subcutaneous: diagnoses related to skin disorders such as acne, warts, psoriasis, scabies, head lice, ringworm, athlete's foot, contact dermatitis, and ingrown nail



Appendix B

ADOLESCENT SCHOOL HEALTH INITIATIVE ACT R.S. 40:31.3

To enact R.S. 40:31.3, relative to adolescent school health; to require the Office of Public Health, Department of Health and Hospitals, to establish an adolescent school health initiative; and to provide for related matters.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of Louisiana:

Section 1. R.S. 40:31.3 is hereby enacted to read as follows:

31.3. Adolescent school health initiative; health centers in schools

A. The Office of Public Health, Department of Health and Hospitals, shall establish an adolescent school health initiative to facilitate and encourage development of comprehensive health centers in public middle and secondary schools in Louisiana which shall provide preventive health services, counseling, acute health services, and appropriate referral for acute health services. Such initiative shall be subject to the approval of the local school systems.

- B. The Office of Public Health shall:
- (1) Coordinate efforts to facilitate and encourage establishment of health centers in schools by providing information, technical assistance, direction, and, to the extent appropriate, funds to locally based entities for the establishment and operation of health centers in middle and secondary schools.
- (2) Convene and participate in an intergovernmental coordinating council which shall be composed of representatives from the department of education, social services, health and hospitals, and other governmental entities or programs



related to health services to assist in implementation, oversight, and funding assistance for health centers in schools.

- (3) Apply for and assist local efforts to apply for all available public and private funds to establish and operate health centers in schools.
- (4) Establish procedures for allocation of funds appropriated or otherwise available to the program in a manner which prioritizes funding according to the urgency and degree of health care needs among the various middle and secondary school populations.
- (5) Establish criteria to be considered in selection of locations or placement of health centers in schools.
- C. Health centers in schools are prohibited from:
- (1) Counseling or advocating abortion in any way or referring any student to any organization for counseling or advocating abortion.
- (2) Distributing at any public school any contraceptive or abortifacient drug, device, or other similar product.
- D. The provisions of this Section shall be applicable only to the extent that funds are made available for this purpose from public or private sources.

Section 2. This Act shall become effective upon signature by the governor or, if not signed by the governor, upon expiration of the time for bills to become law without signature by the governor, as provided in Article III, Section 18 of the Constitution of Louisiana.


