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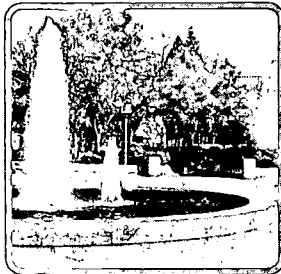
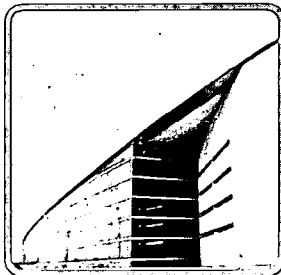
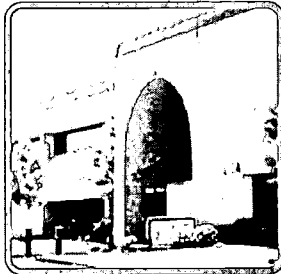

ABSTRACT

The State Center Community College District (SCCCD) 2002-2003 Fact Book presents institutional data on the following topics: (1) student and enrollment trends; (2) planning and decision making; and (3) service area demographics. The Student and Enrollment Chapter profiles the student body and contains demographic data self-reported on the admission application. With respect to enrollment trends, district enrollment drops from fall to spring terms, though the percentage of "continuing students" is higher in spring terms. In comparing fall 2001 to fall 1999, enrollment increased at all sites. Of students enrolled at SCCCD, 28% report a desire to attain a Bachelor's degree. Of these students, an average 80% plans to first earn an Associate's degree. The Fact Book also reports data on the ethnic diversity of SCCCD students. The majority of the student body is comprised of Hispanic and White/non-Hispanic students at 70%. The data indicate these trends have remained consistent over the seven-term period. Finally, the majority of SCCCD students attend school part-time at an average 65%. The data included in the planning and decision-making chapter of the book contains information used by the District and college administration to make informed decisions in areas such as personnel and program planning. 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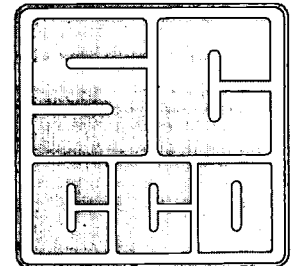

Welcome to State Center Community College District's 2002-2003 Fact Book. As you look through the following pages, you will see the tremendous amount of growth that we are experiencing. You will also see the remarkable diversity throughout our district. At State Center Community College District, we are working hard to meet the needs of the many students we serve. 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Technical Notes

You will note that most demographic trends in this book include Spring 1999 - Spring 2002. All demographic data is based on graded students. Specifically, we count students who receive a mark on their official transcript of: A, B, C, D, F, CR, NC, I or W. If a student is enrolled at more than one campus they are included in the demographics of each location. Therefore, counts are "unduplicated" by location, but "duplicated" across the district. The number of cross-enrolled students is too small to significantly impact the data.

In the narrative sections, references to change over time pertain more often to percentages rather than to raw numbers. This is appropriate since the base population has typically risen and fallen over the period of analysis, and the total population is so varied across locations. Percentages therefore provide us with a reasonable method of comparison.

All student data reported in this book, with the exception of transfers has been obtained from the Datatel STUDENT.ACAD.CRED file, which is the file that generates the official transcript. Other data sources will be referenced as appropriate. All data are "cleaned"* and analyzed.

These data may not exactly match data coming from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office MIS database due to different methods of data collection, file specifications and standards of accuracy.

From this point forward, State Center Community College District will be referred to as SCCCDC.

*Cleaning data refers to the process of filtering out/correcting flawed records and creating categories for descriptive data.

Chapter 1

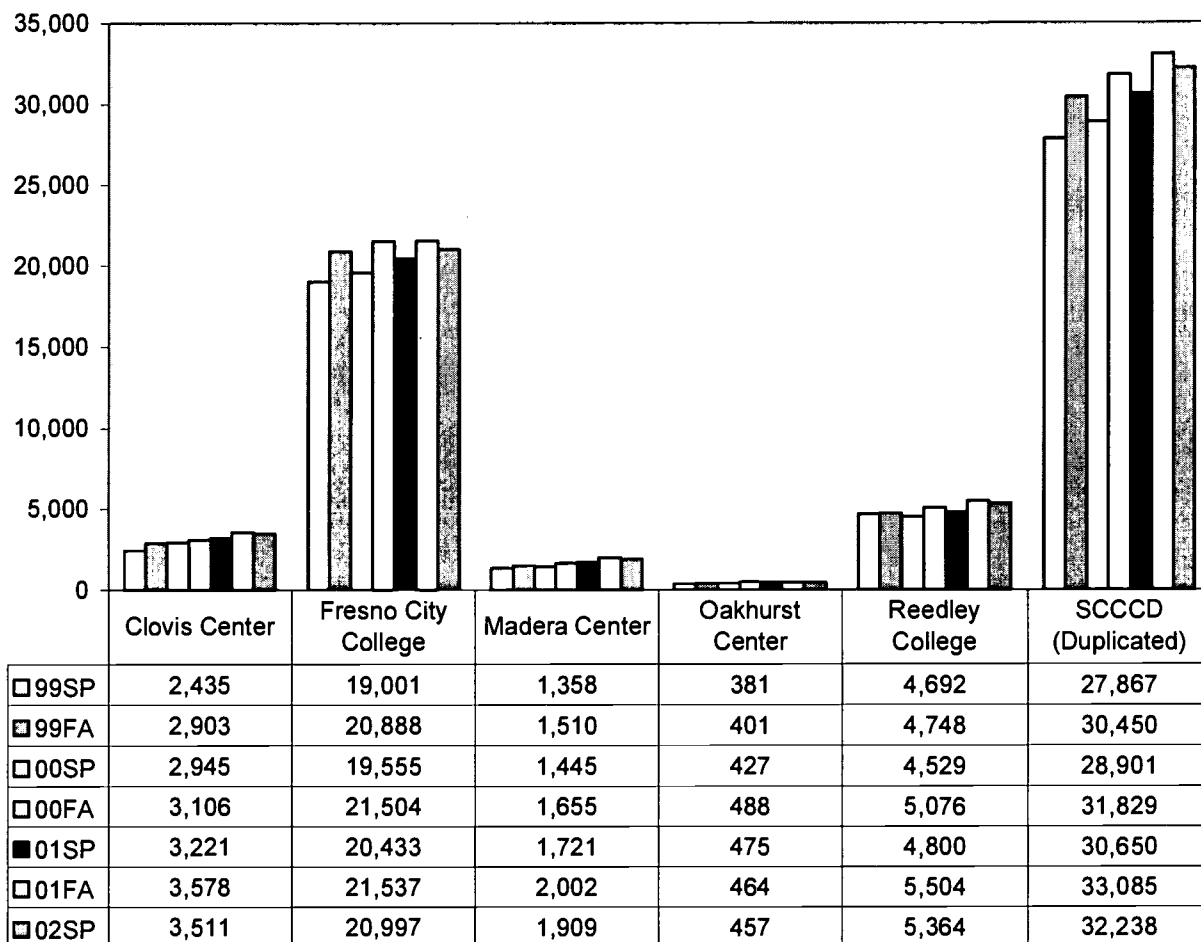
Student & Enrollment Trends

This chapter of the Fact Book profiles the SCCCD student body. All demographic data are self-reported on the admission application. All enrollment data are calculated in the Datatel system.

SCCCD Enrollment Trends

Figure I.1 summarizes headcount enrollment for seven semesters beginning with Spring 1999 and ending with Spring 2002. Enrollment for the District drops from fall to spring terms, though the percentage of “continuing students” is higher in spring terms (Figure I.4). However, in comparing Fall 2001 to Fall 1999, enrollment has increased at all sites.

Student Educational Goals

Figure I.2 summarizes self-reported student educational goals. Of students enrolled at SCCCD, an average 28% report a desire to attain a Bachelor's degree. Of these students, an average 80% plans to first earn an Associate's degree. Approximately 33% of students have not reported or decided their educational goal. Excluding students with an undecided/unreported goal, the majority of SCCCD students intend to attain a Bachelor's degree after completing an Associate degree.

The rates at which students plan to graduate and transfer appear to be much higher than the actual graduation and transfer rates. For example the 1999-2000 Partnership for Excellence transfer and graduation rates are 3% and 3.19% respectively. This number is calculated by dividing the raw number of transfer or awards by the total student body. This means of calculating a true rate is erroneous, as it includes students who have enrolled in as few as one term. These students would be included in those that did not transfer or graduate, even though that is not a reasonable expectation for such students.

The Student Right to Know (SRTK) study conducted by the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office (CCCCO) may provide a more accurate reflection of student goal attainment. SRTK is a cohort study of first-time, full-time, degree-seeking freshman and their outcomes over a three-year period of time. This is the rate used by California Community Colleges to meet the federally mandated public disclosure of graduation and transfer rates (**Figure I.3**). A longitudinal study such as SRTK allows the appropriate time frame to track goal attainment. Students in this study were selected because a) they more closely represent "traditional" college students than other student groups, b) their demographic composition is reasonably comparable to the student body, and c) these data provide transfer rates which are only available through cohort studies, rather than the entire college population. This study allows us to compare self-reported student goals with actual transfer rates.

SCCCD Student Educational Goals

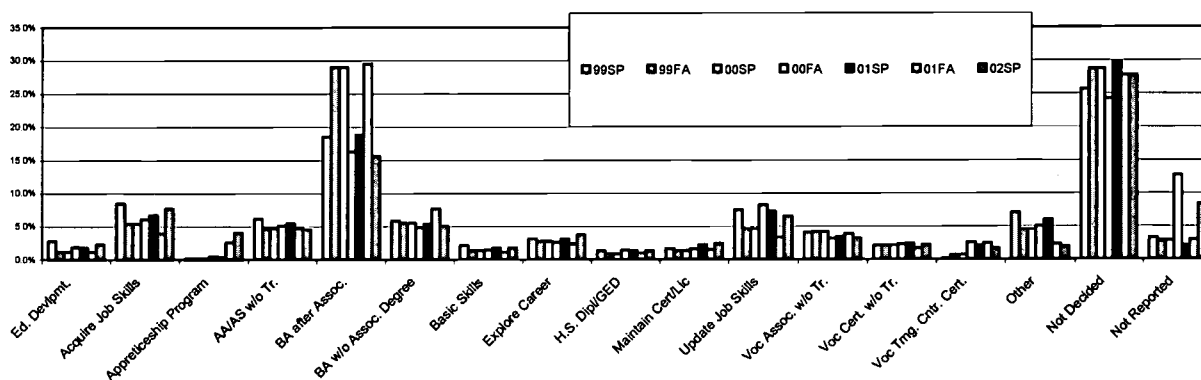

SCCCD Student Right to Know Rates

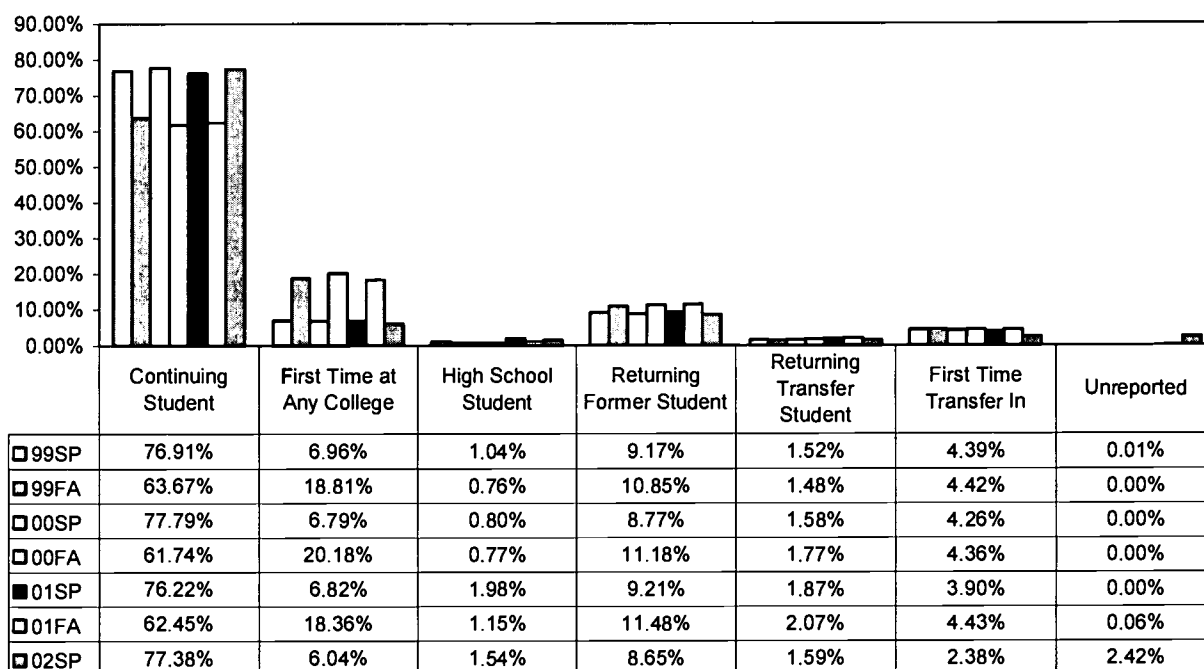

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Student Enrollment Status

Student enrollment statuses are summarized in **Figures I.4 - I.9**. Districtwide, "continuing students" maintain the largest group at an average 77% for spring terms (**Figure I.4**). The number of "first time" students in the District decreased 1.82% from Fall 2000 to Fall 2001. However, the number of "continuing students", "high school students", "returning former students", "returning transfer students", and "first time transfer in" students increased for the same time period.

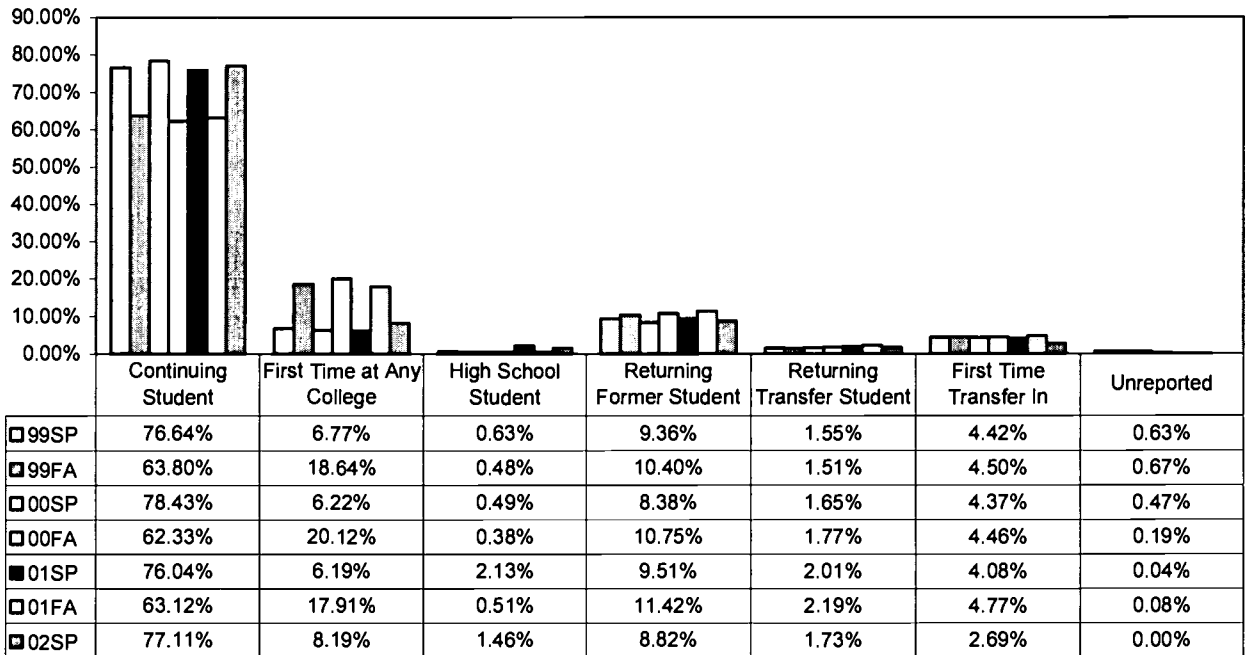

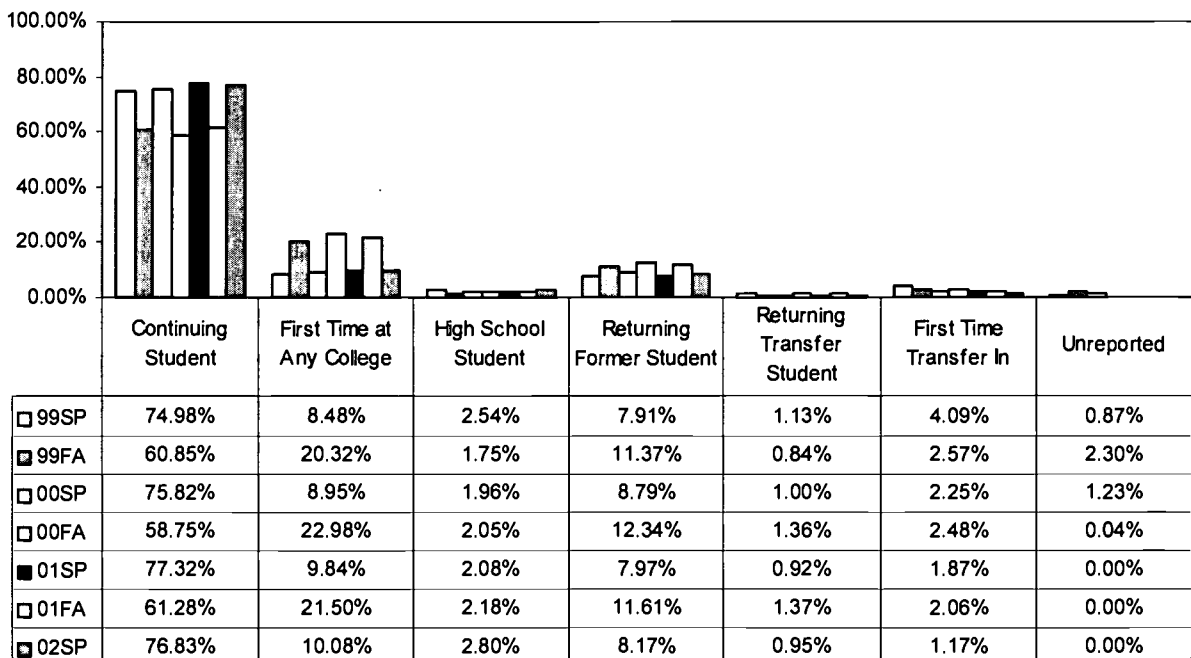

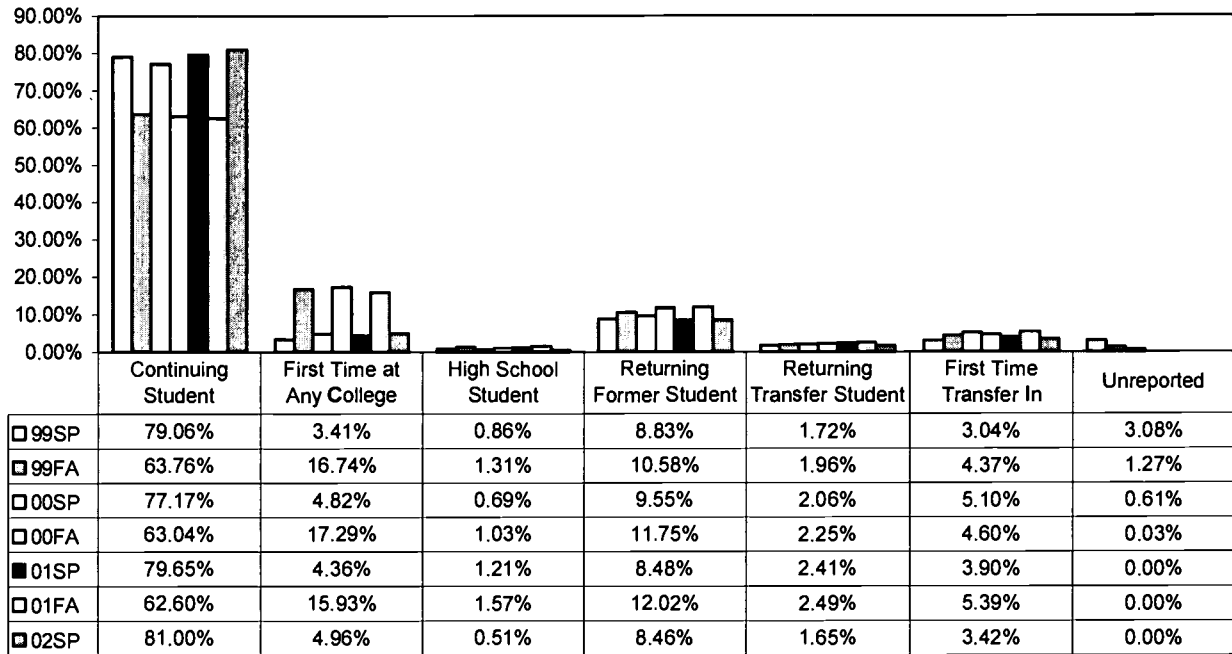

Madera Center: Student Enrollment Status**

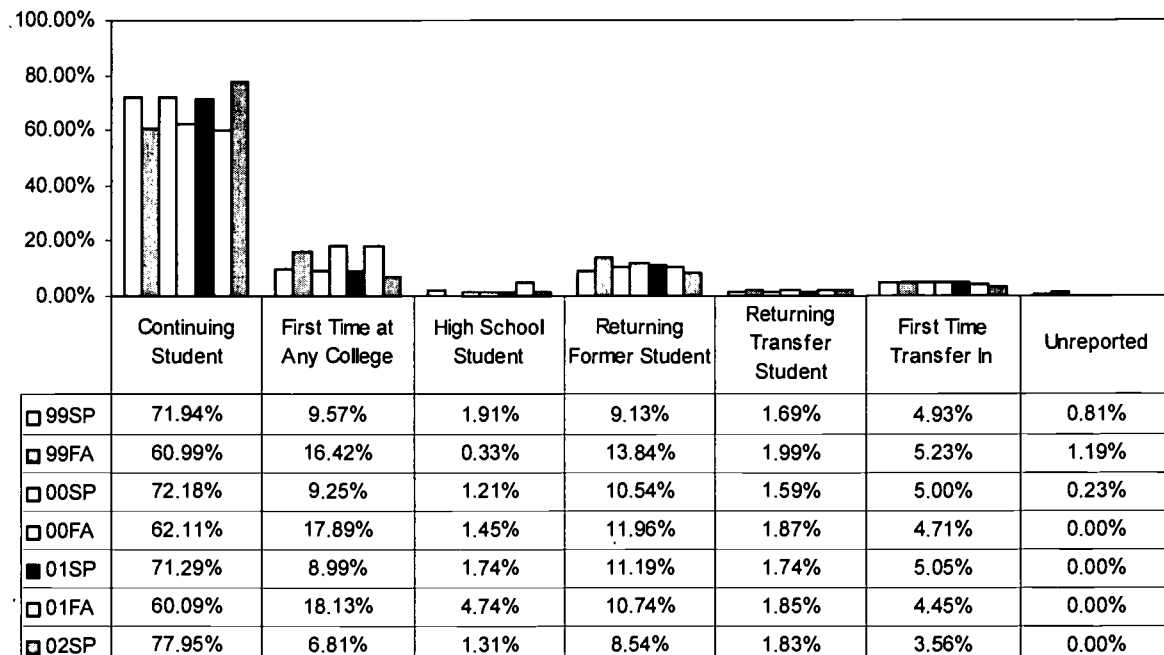
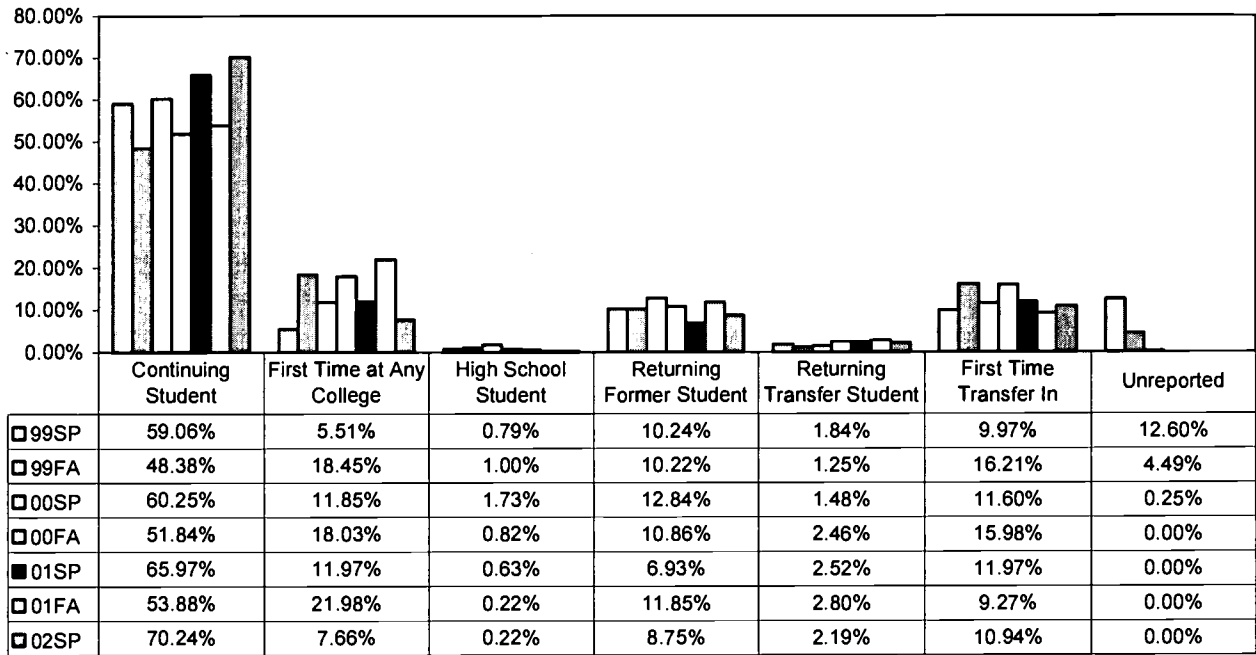


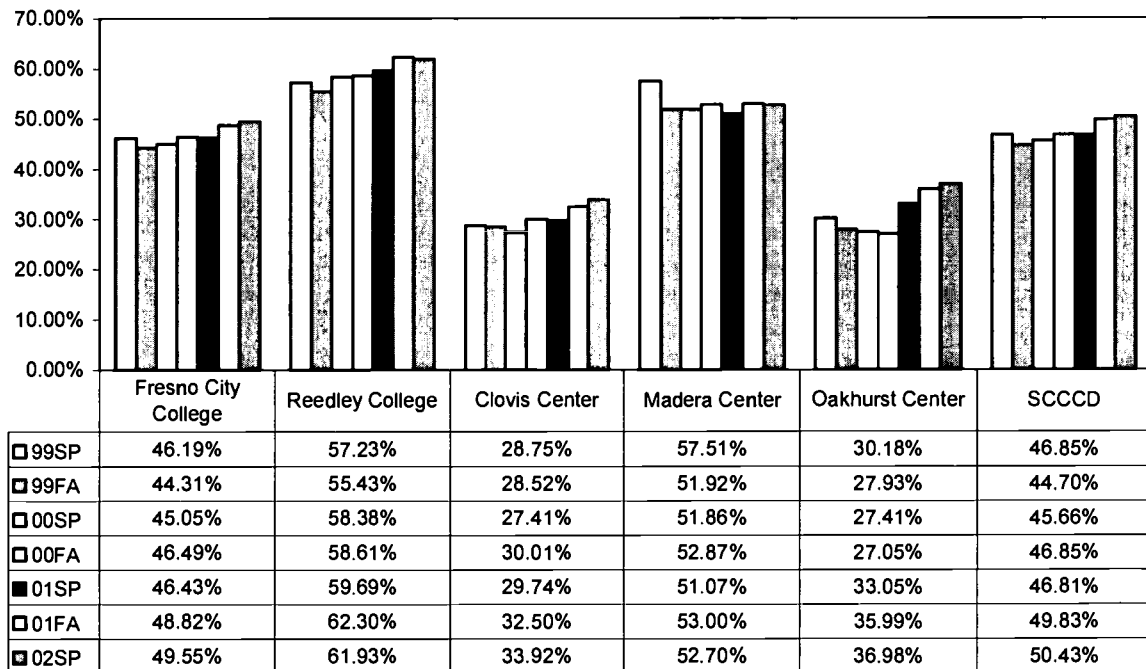

Student Financial Aid Status

According to **Figure I.10** in Fall 2001, approximately 50% of SCCC students were awarded financial aid. These students completed a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and were awarded aid however; they may not have collected the award. This includes all award types, the majority being Board of Governor's Grant (BOGG) and Federal PELL grants. Reedley College and the Madera Center continue to have the highest award rate at 62.30% and 53.00% respectively, for Fall 2001. Clovis and Oakhurst Center continue to award at the lowest rates. District wide, the overall percentage of students awarded financial aid is up 5.13% from Fall 1999 to Fall 2001.

Student Ethnicity

Figures I.11 - I.16 summarize the ethnic diversity of SCCCD students. The majority of the SCCCD student body is comprised of Hispanic and White/non-Hispanic students at 70%. These two populations are near equal proportion in the district at approximately 35% each (Figure I.11). Fresno City College trends mirror the district (Figure 1.12), while Hispanic students represent an average 56% of the Reedley college student body (Figure I.13). The data indicate these trends have remained consistent over the seven-term period.

At Oakhurst, White/non-Hispanic students comprise the largest group of students at 72% in Spring 2002, an increase of 6% from Spring 2001 (Figure I.16). However, the number of students with race/ethnicity unknown dropped 6% for the same time period and may explain the increase. At Madera Center approximately half the students are Hispanic (Figure I.15), and at Clovis Center White/non-Hispanic students are the largest population at an average 60% (Figure I.14).

SCCCD: Student Ethnic Distribution

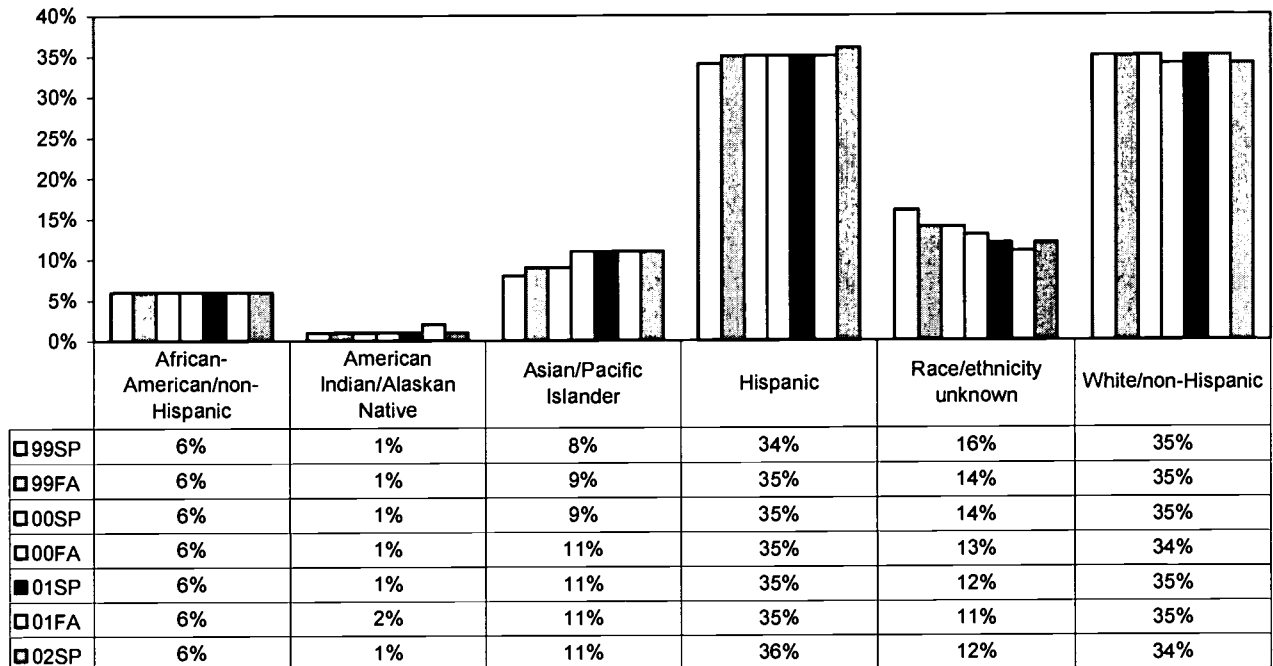

Fresno City College: Student Ethnic Distribution

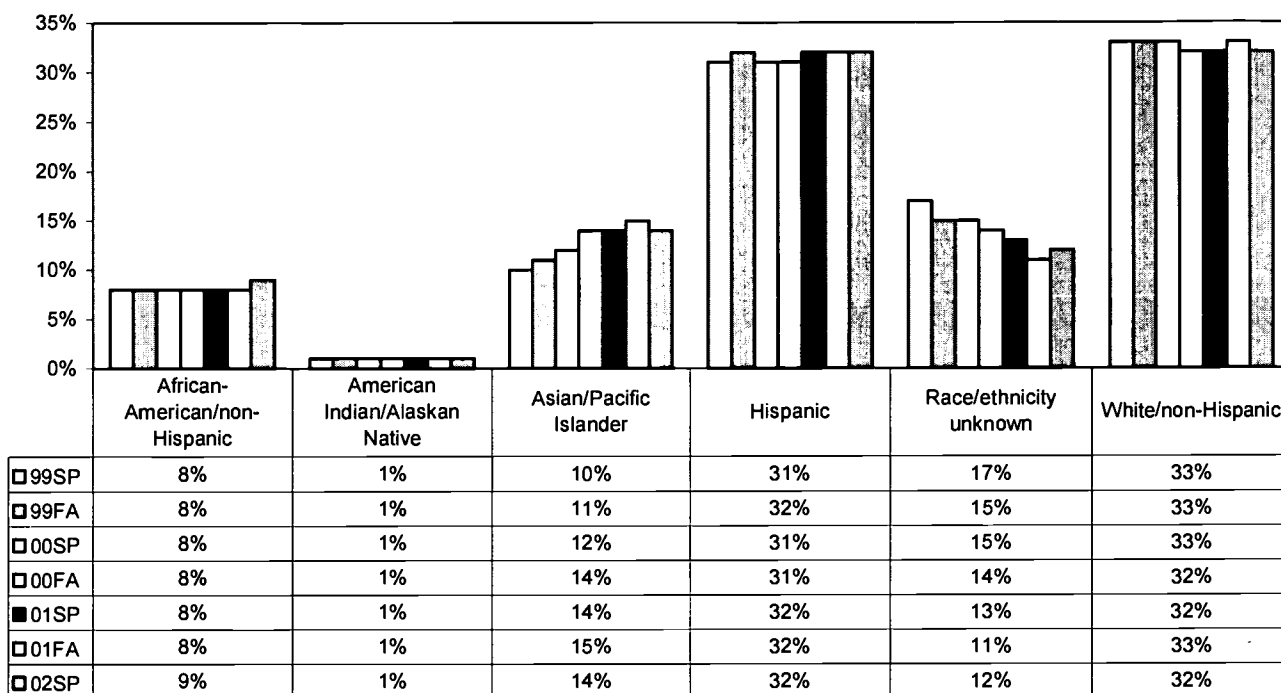

Reedley College: Student Ethnic Distribution

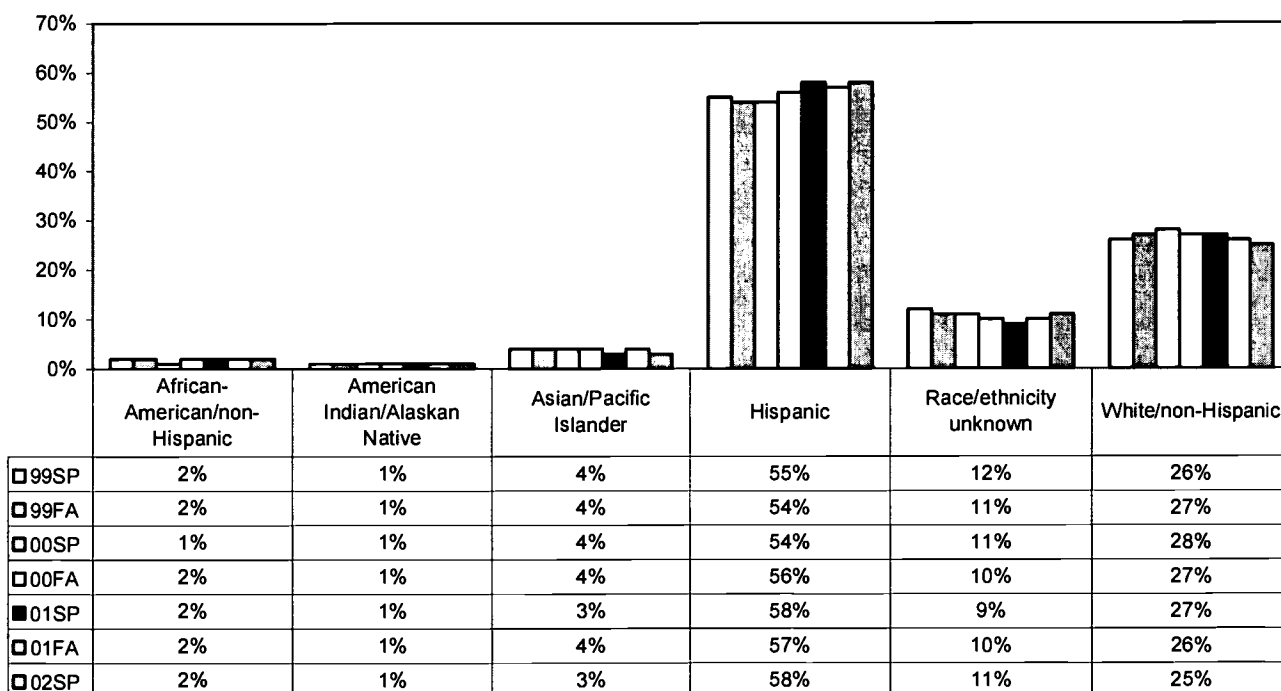

Clovis Center: Student Ethnic Distribution

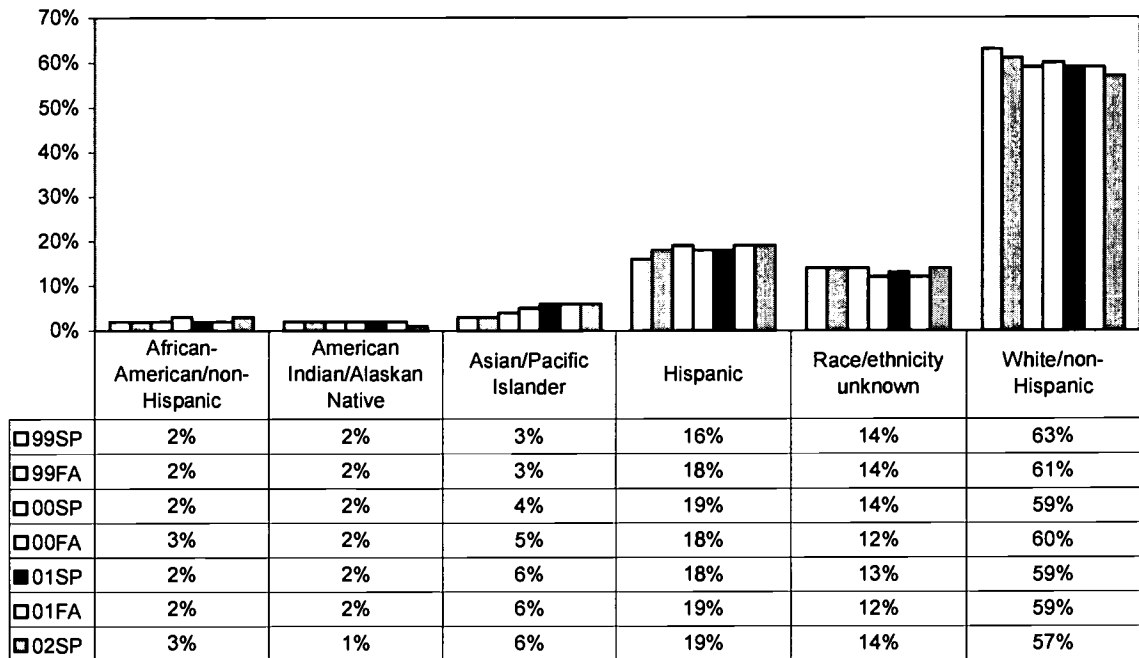

Madera Center: Student Ethnic Distribution

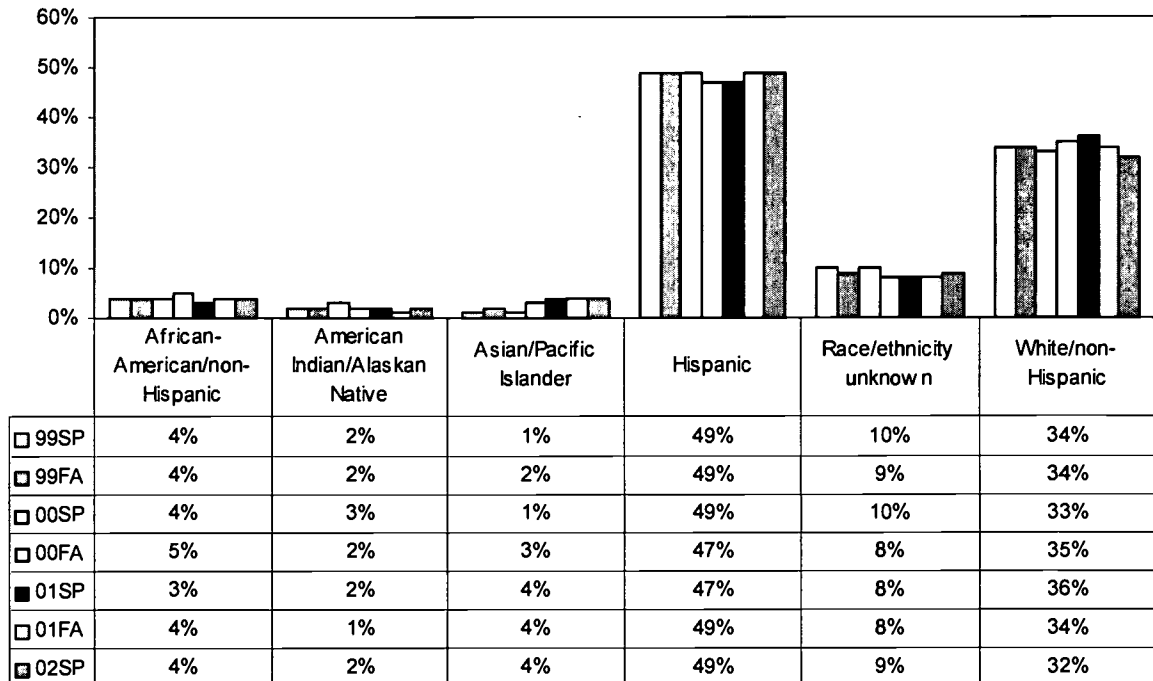
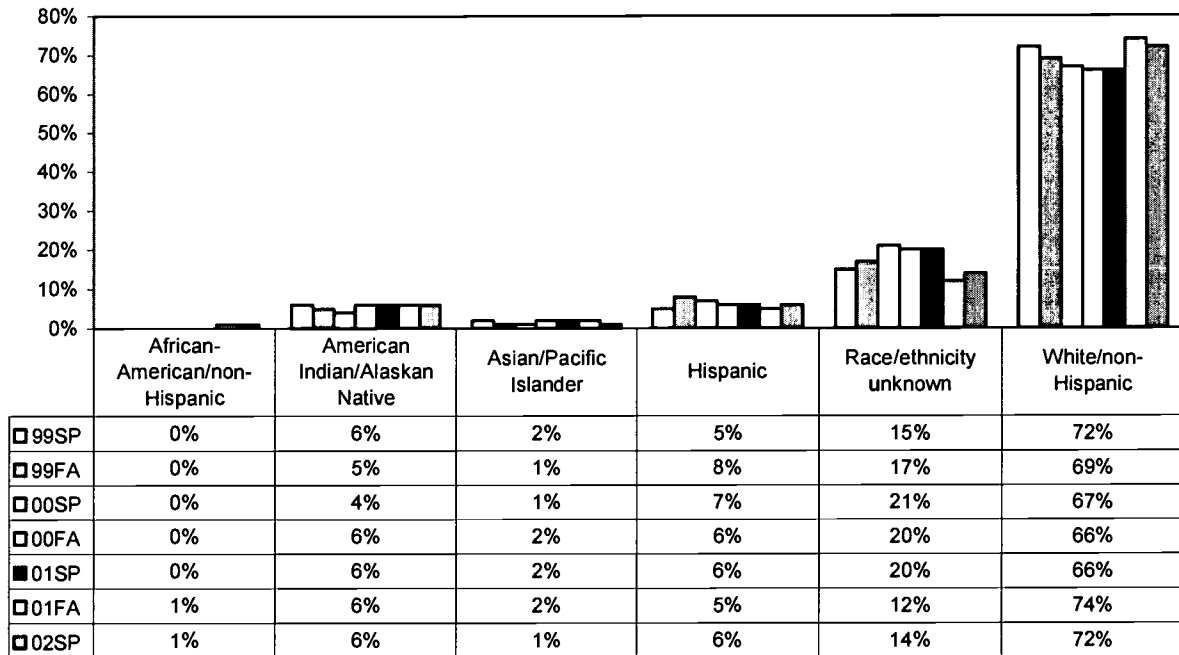

Student Loads

The majority of SCCC students attend school part-time at an average 65% (Figures I.17 - I.22). The greatest percent of full-time students (those enrolled in 12 or more units) attend Reedley College at an average 46%. Reedley College also comes closest to having an even split of part-time and full-time students at an average 46% and 54% respectively (Figure I.19). Oakhurst serves the lowest percentage of full-time students at an average 27% (Figure I.22).

SCCCD: Student Loads

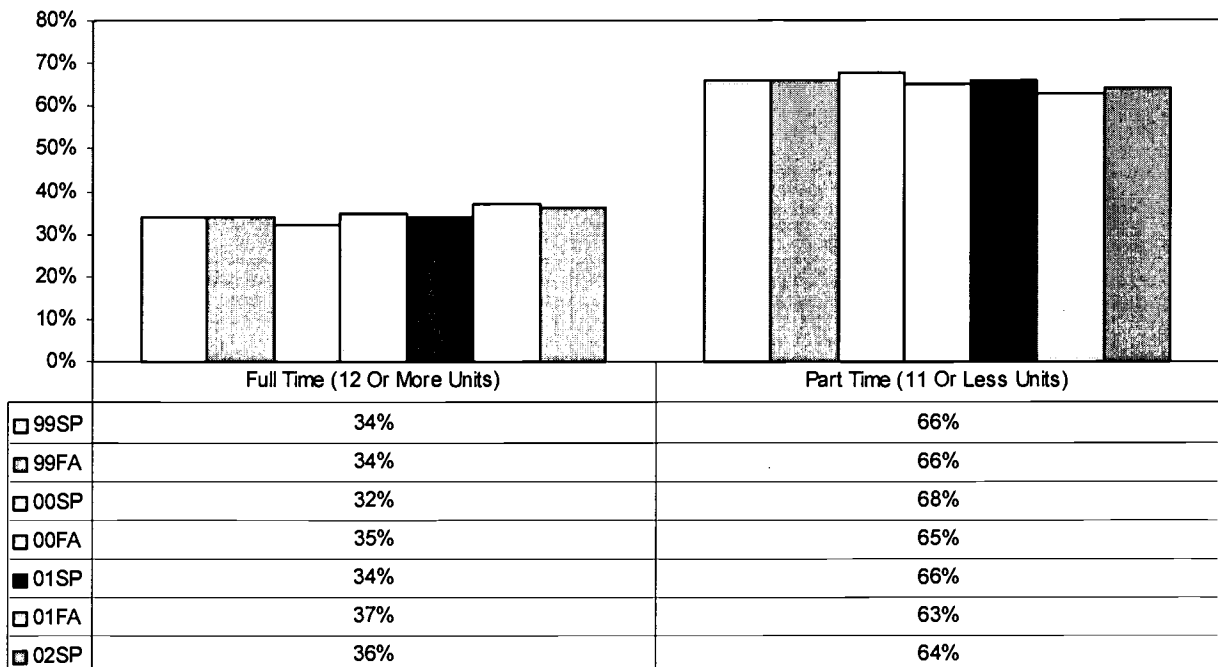

Fresno City College: Student Loads

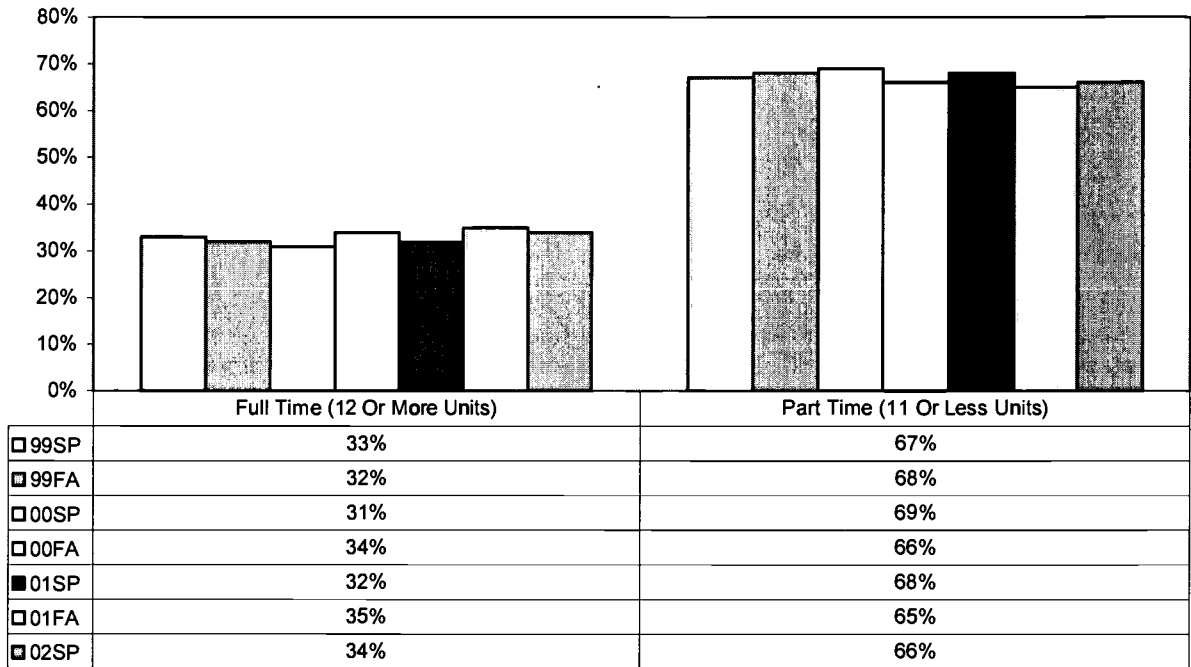

Reedley College: Student Loads

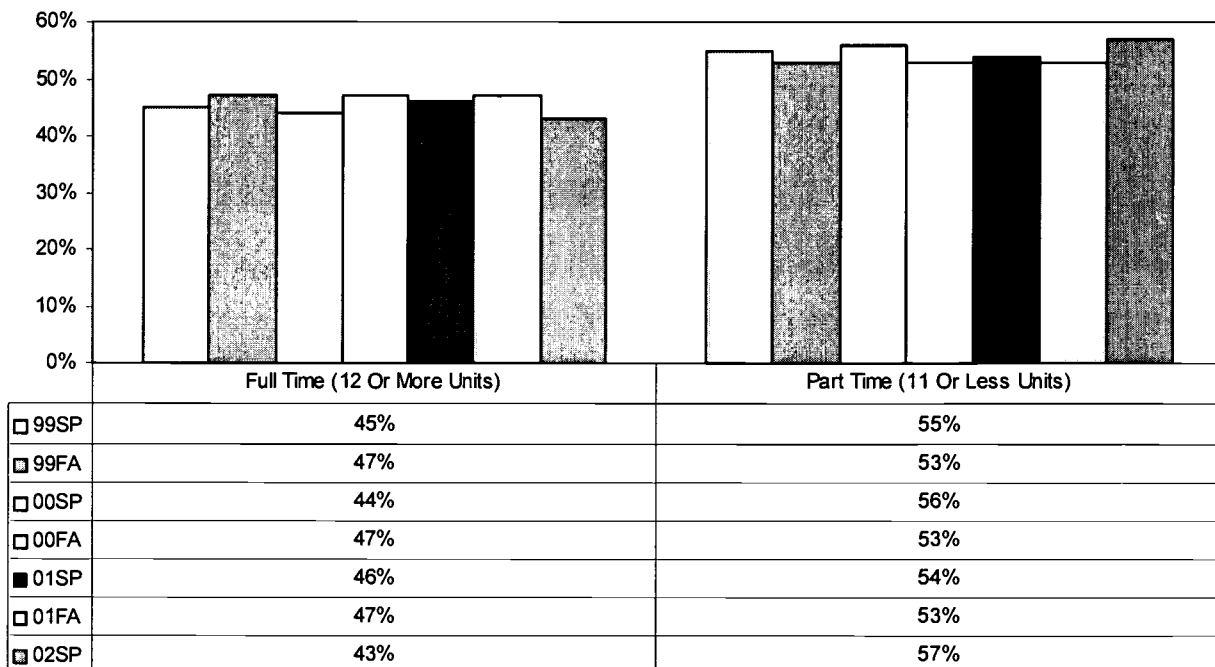

Clovis Center: Student Loads

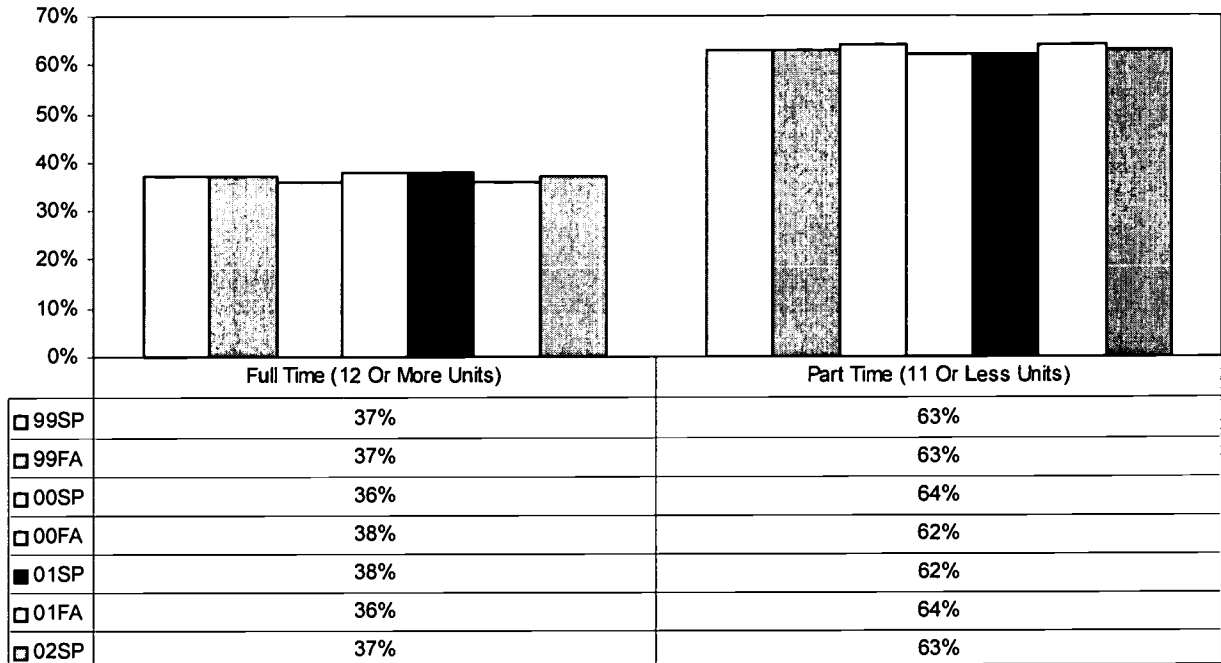

Madera Center: Student Loads

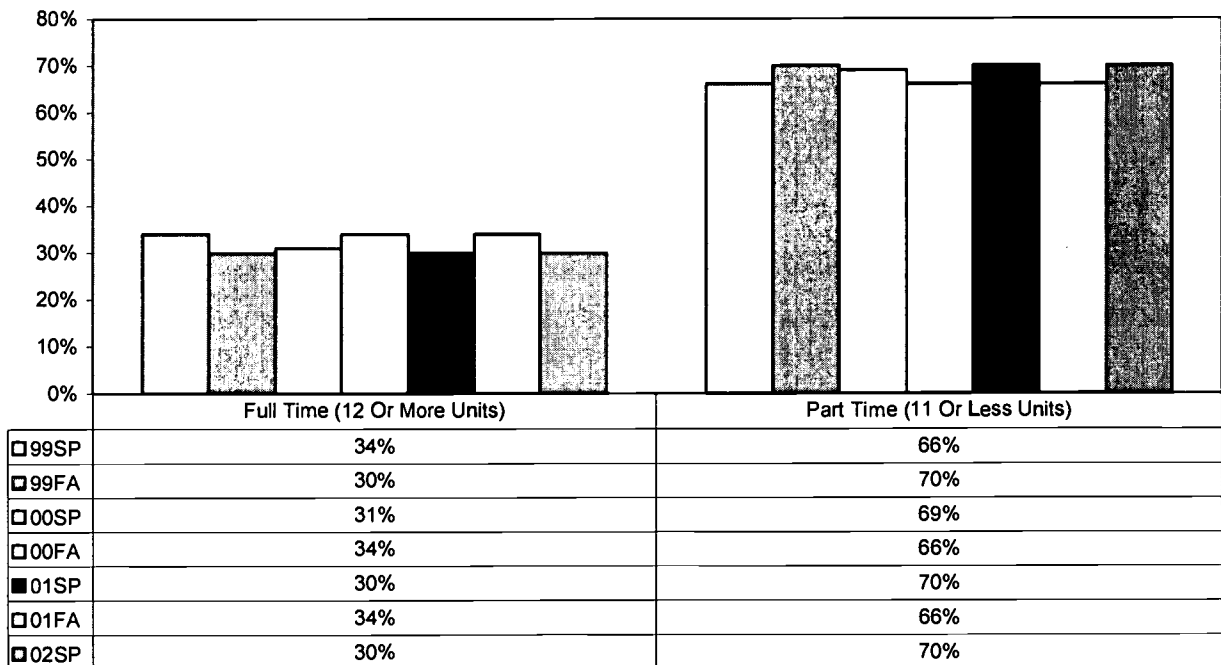
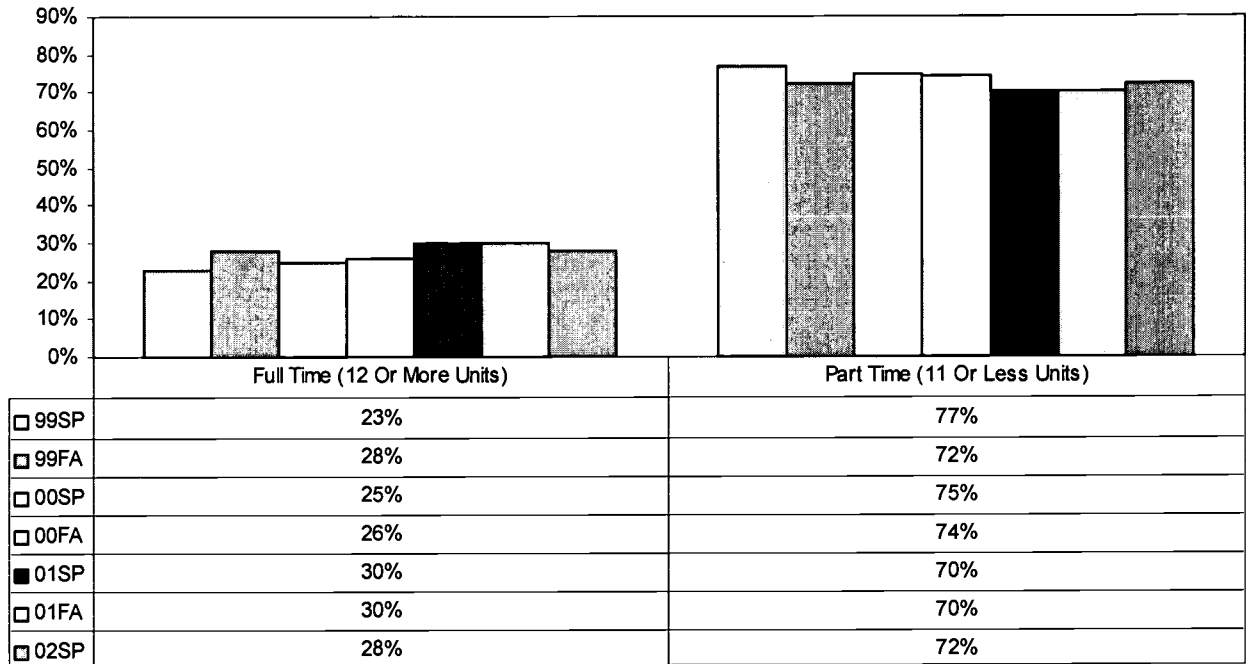


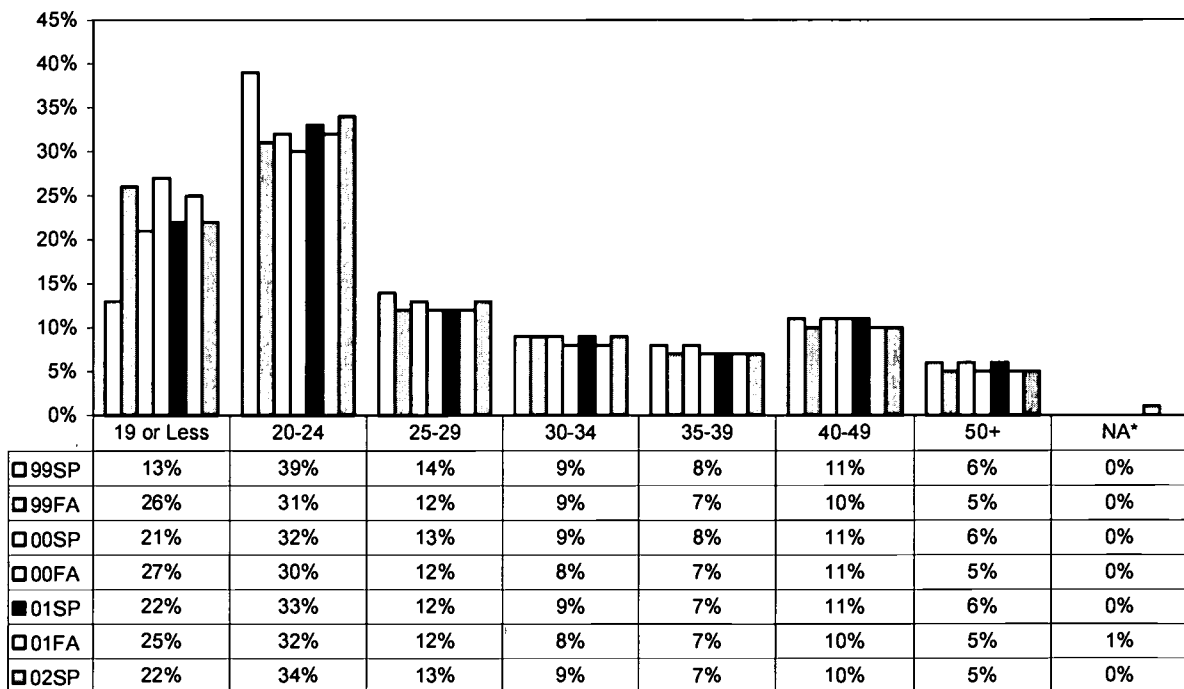

Student Ages

Figures I.23 - I.28 present the age distribution of the student population for Spring 1999 through Spring 2002. The largest percentage of students served by SCCCD remains the 20-24 age group, an average of 34% (Figure I.23). Oakhurst serves the largest population of students over 40, at 29% for Fall 2001 while Clovis serves the largest population of students under 25, at 63% for the same semester (Figures I.26-I.28).

Fresno City College: Student Age Distribution

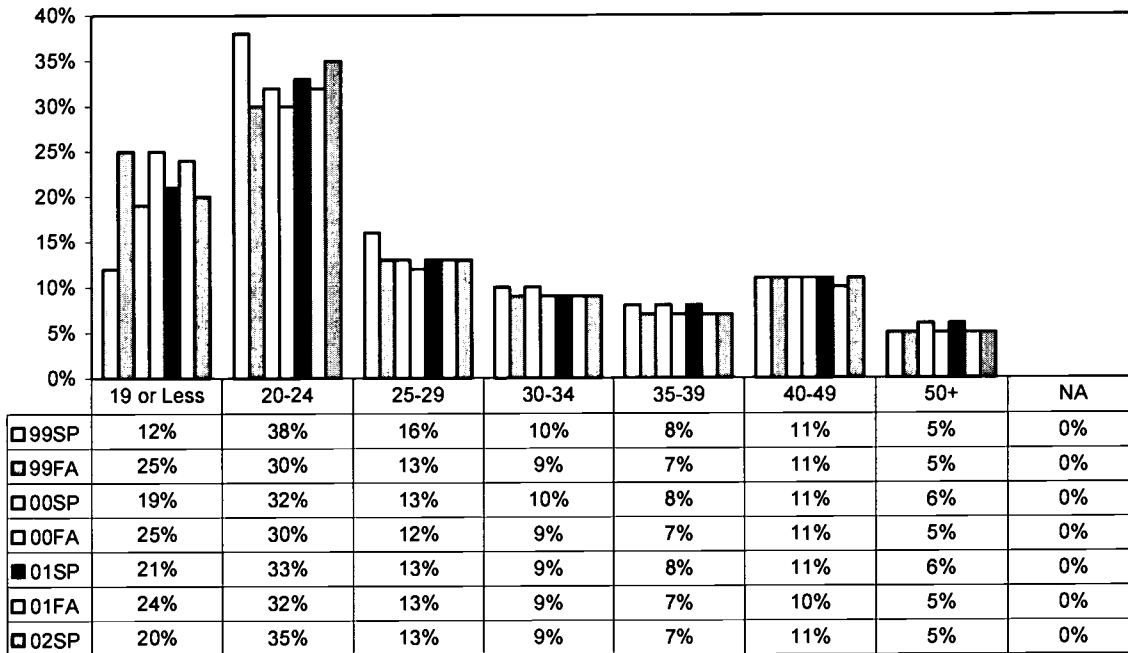

Reedley College: Student Age Distribution

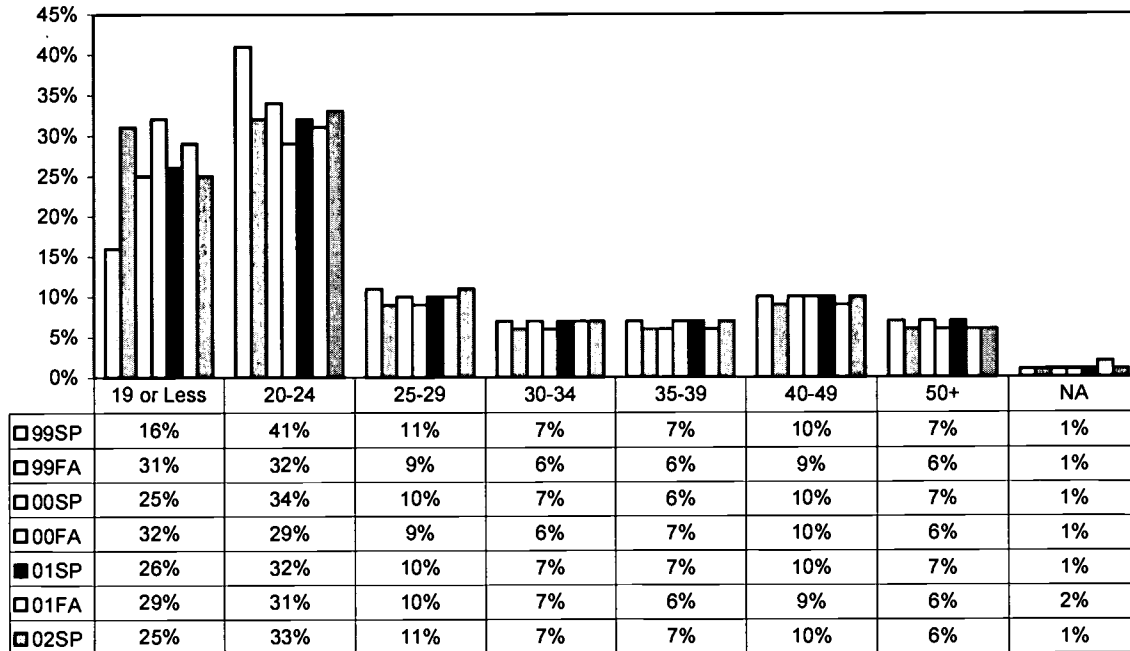

Clovis Center: Student Age Distribution

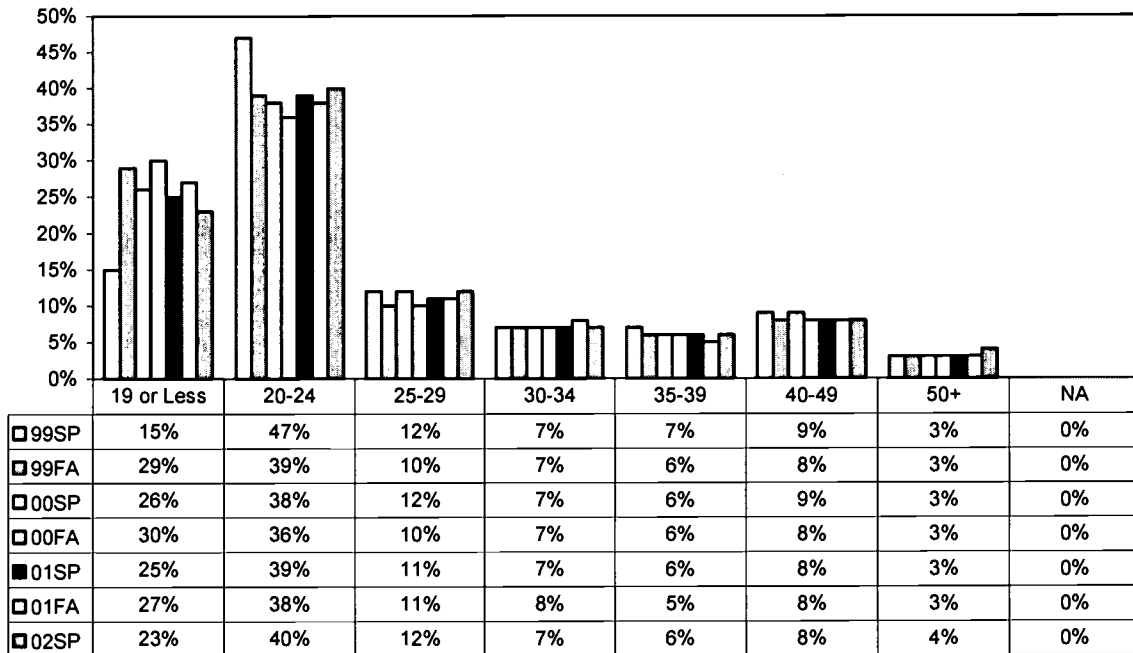

Madera Center: Student Age Distribution

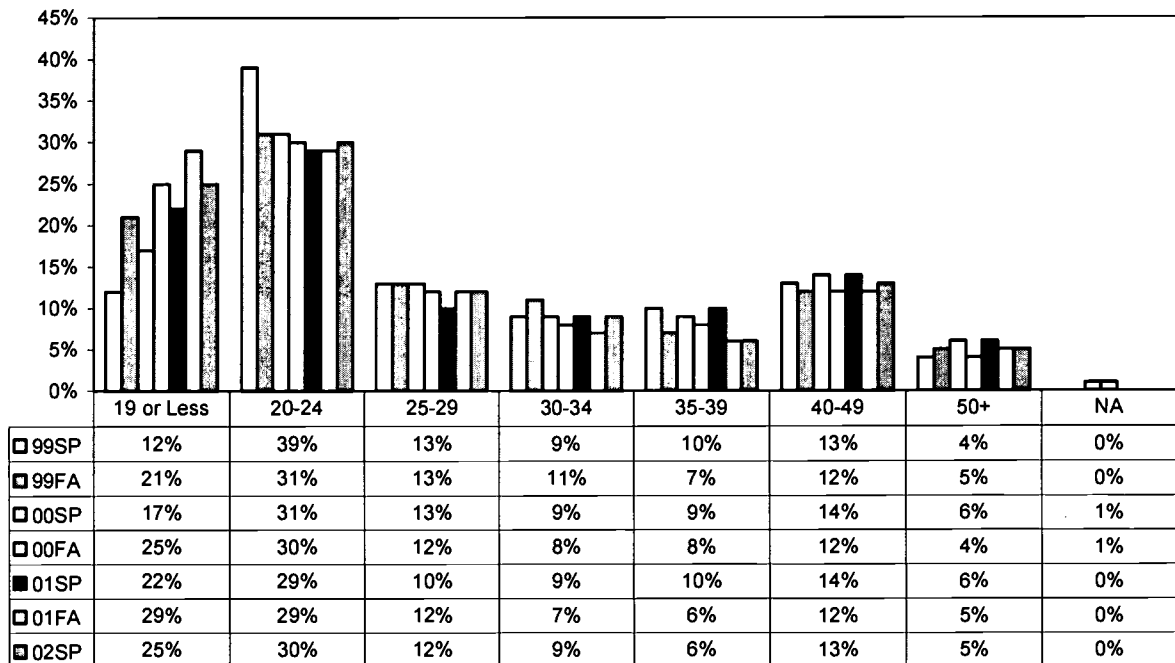
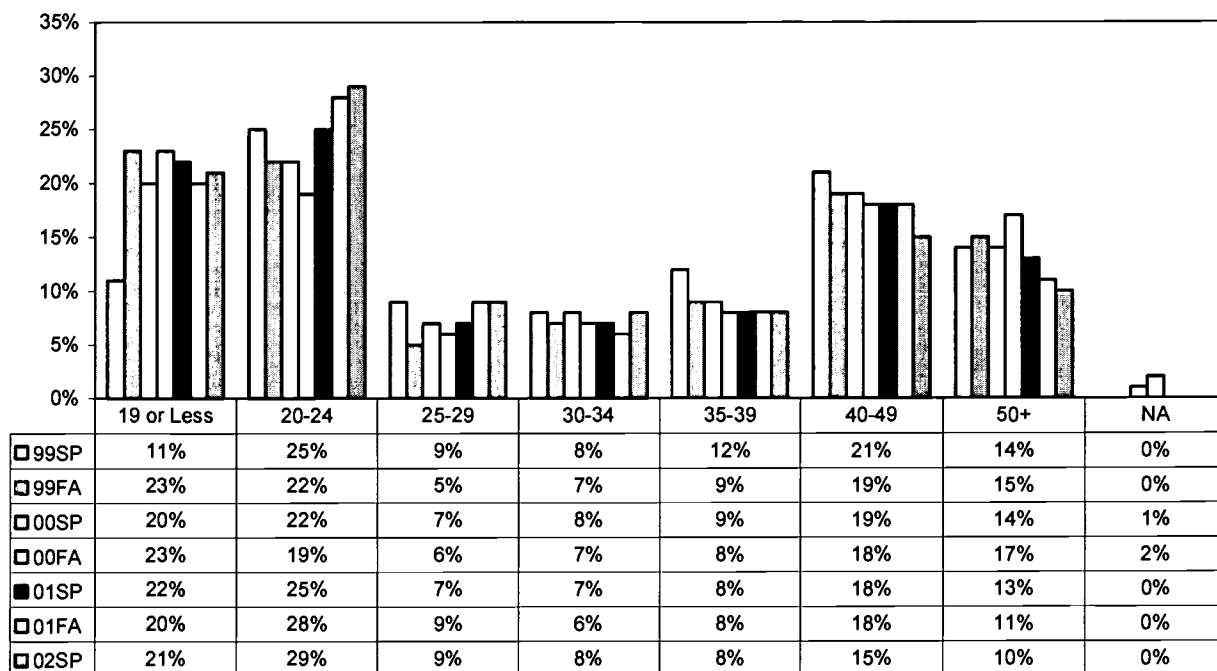

Student Gender

Gender by campus is illustrated in **Figures I.29 - I.34**. The SCCC student body is comprised of 55% females on average (**Figure I.29**). Fresno City College serves close to an equal number of females and males (**Figure I.30**). Reedley College is slightly higher than the District average for females at 60% (**Figure I.31**). Although female students continue to outnumber male students in the district as a whole, from Spring 1999 to Spring 2002 the Clovis, Madera, and Oakhurst Centers have had a decrease in the female population while the male population has increased (**Figures I.33-I.34**).

SCCCD: Student Gender

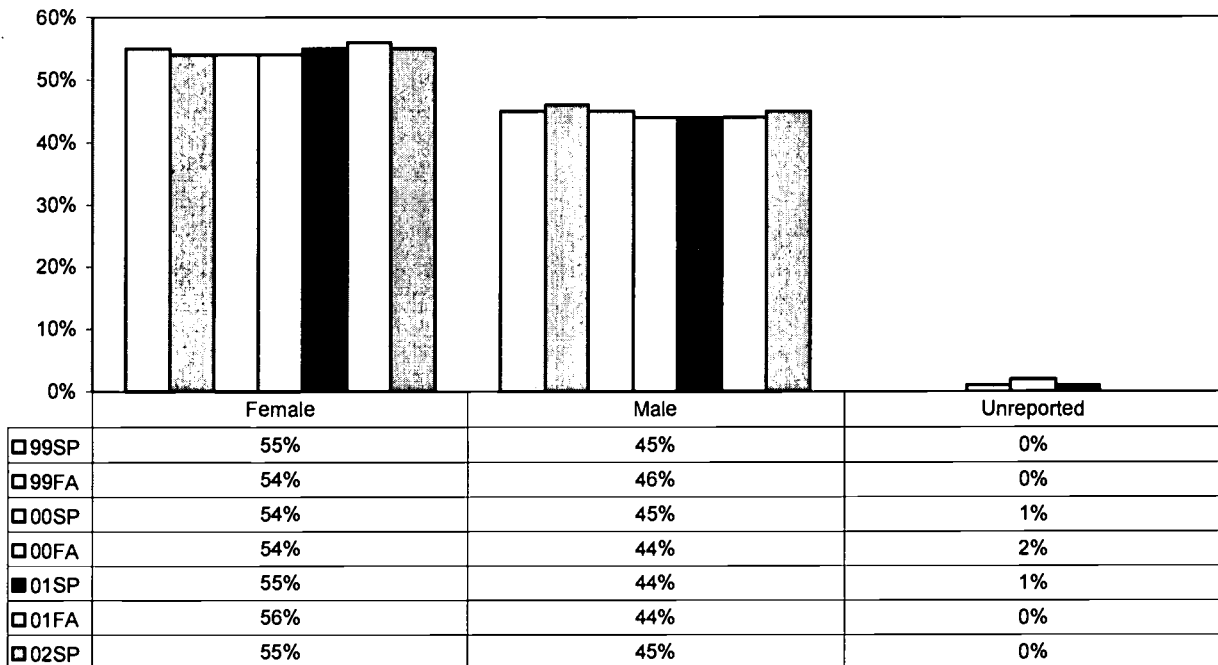

Fresno City College: Student Gender

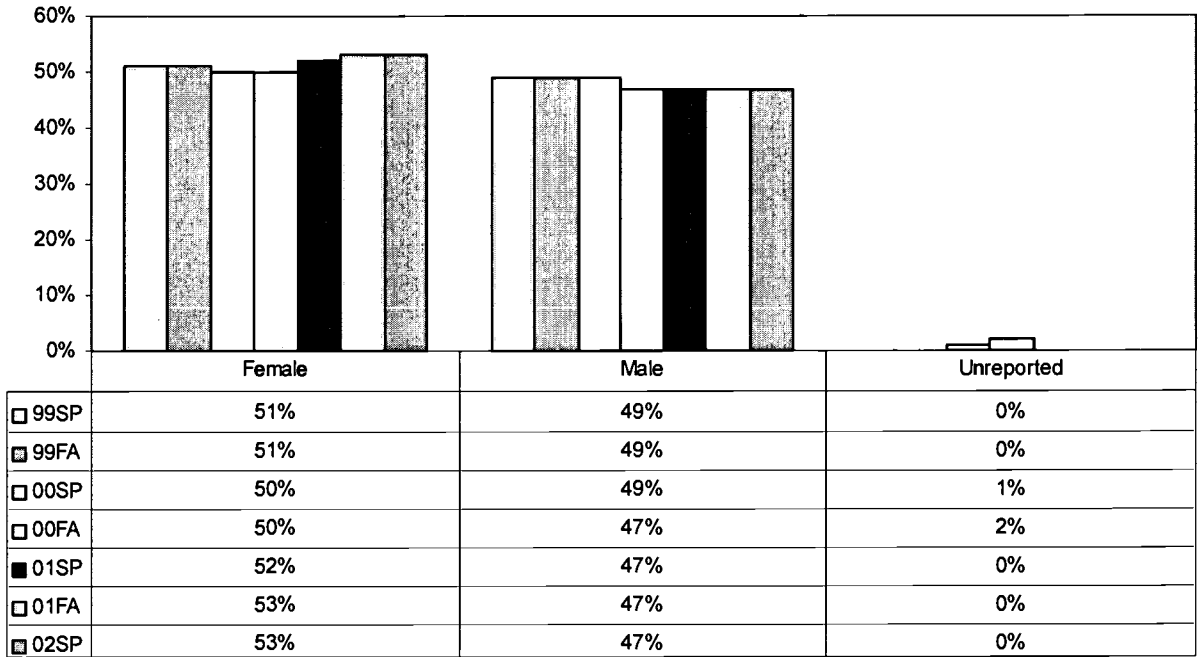

Reedley College: Student Gender

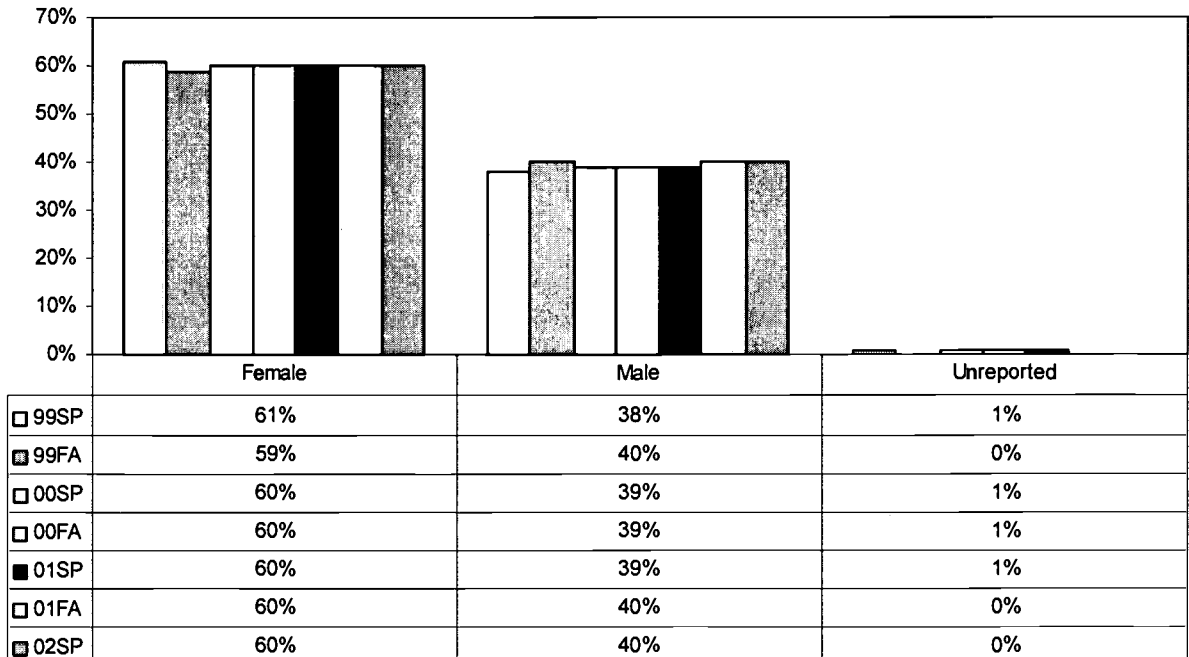

Clovis Center: Student Gender

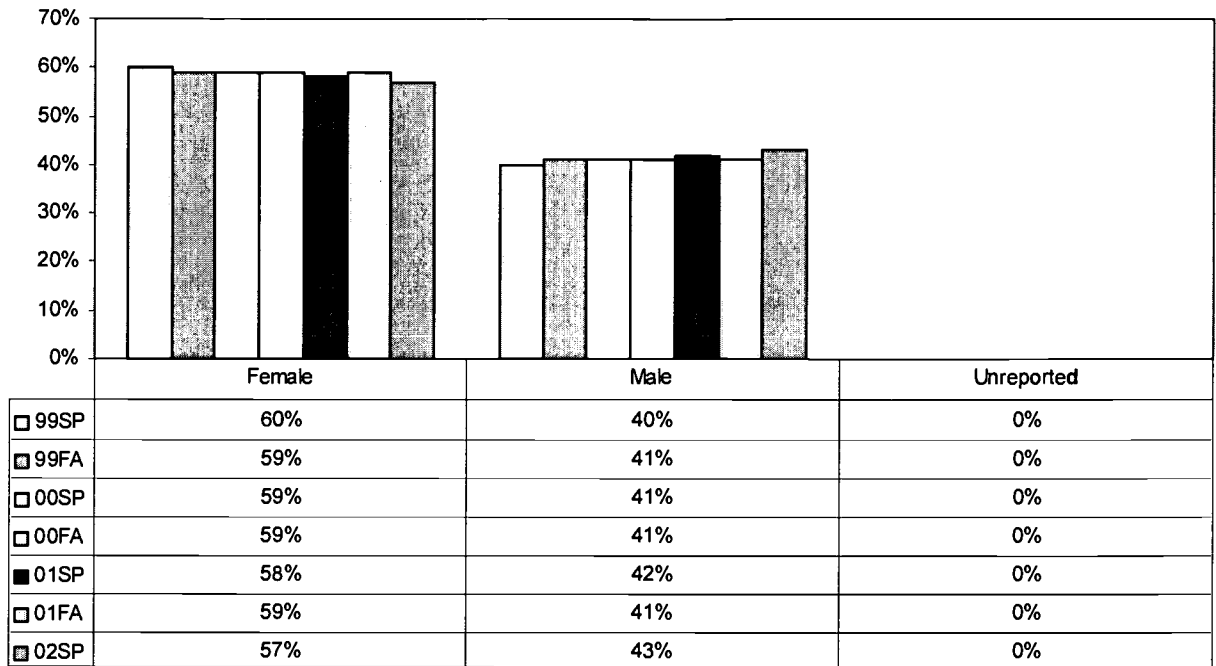

Madera Center: Student Gender

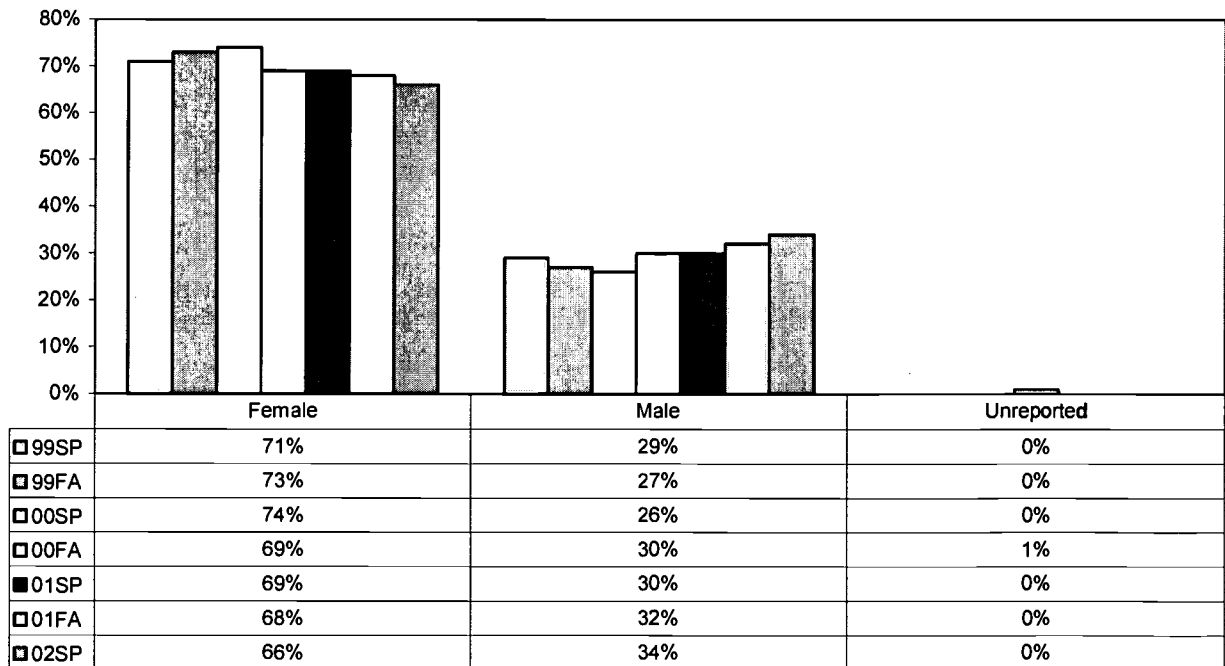
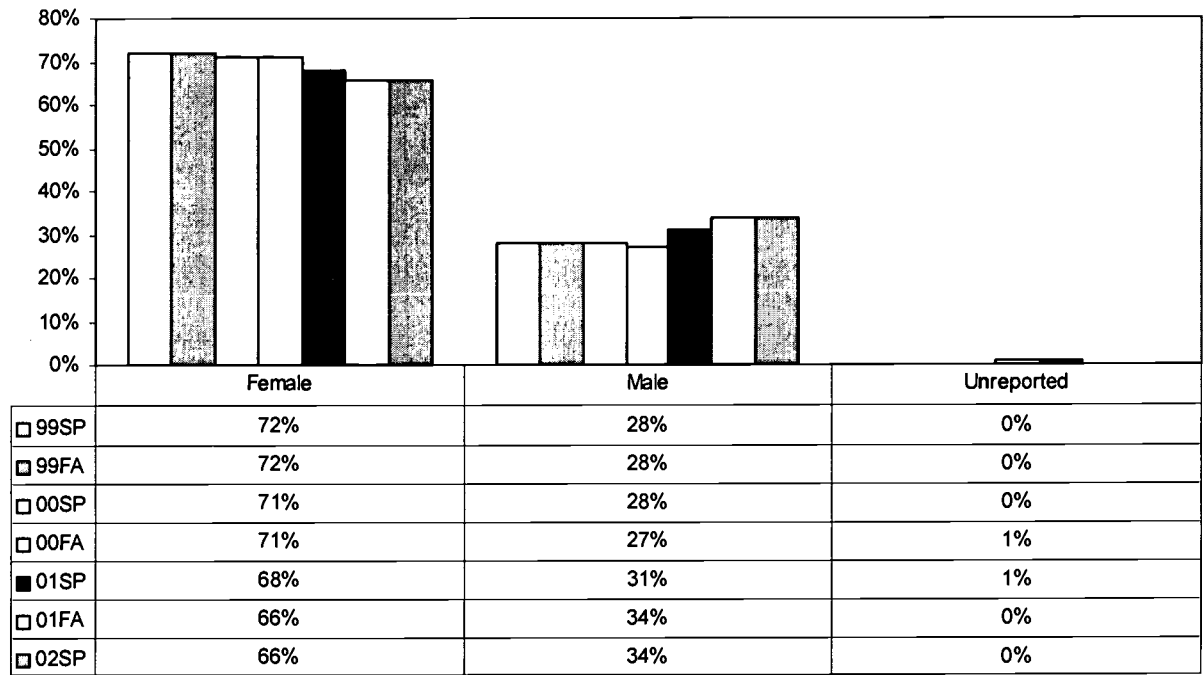

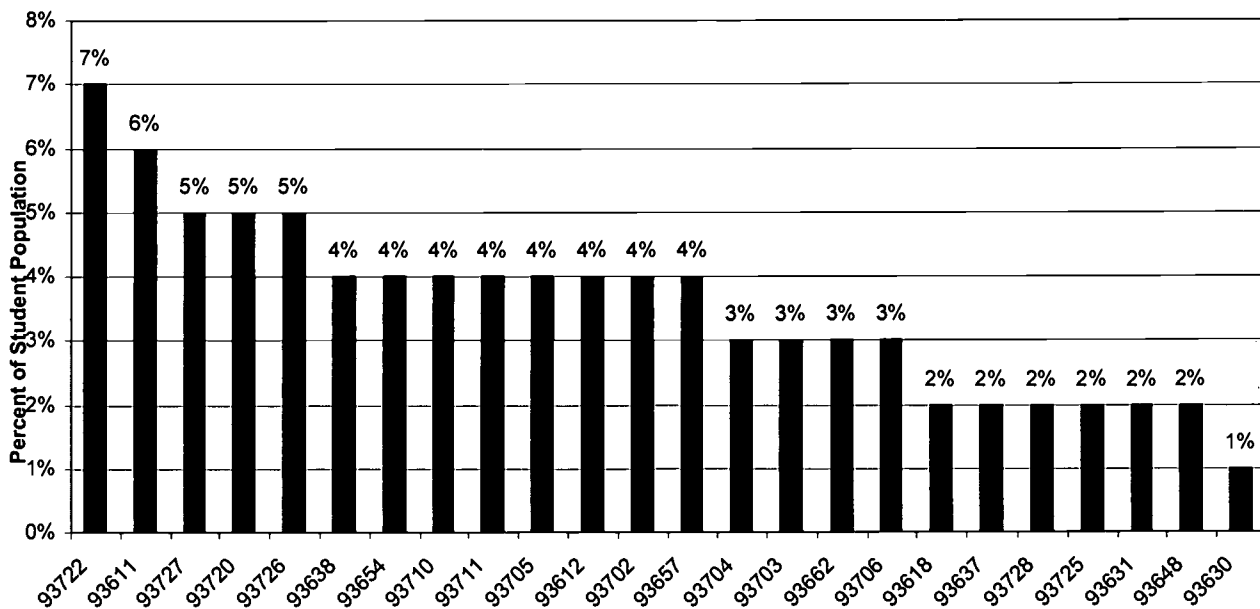

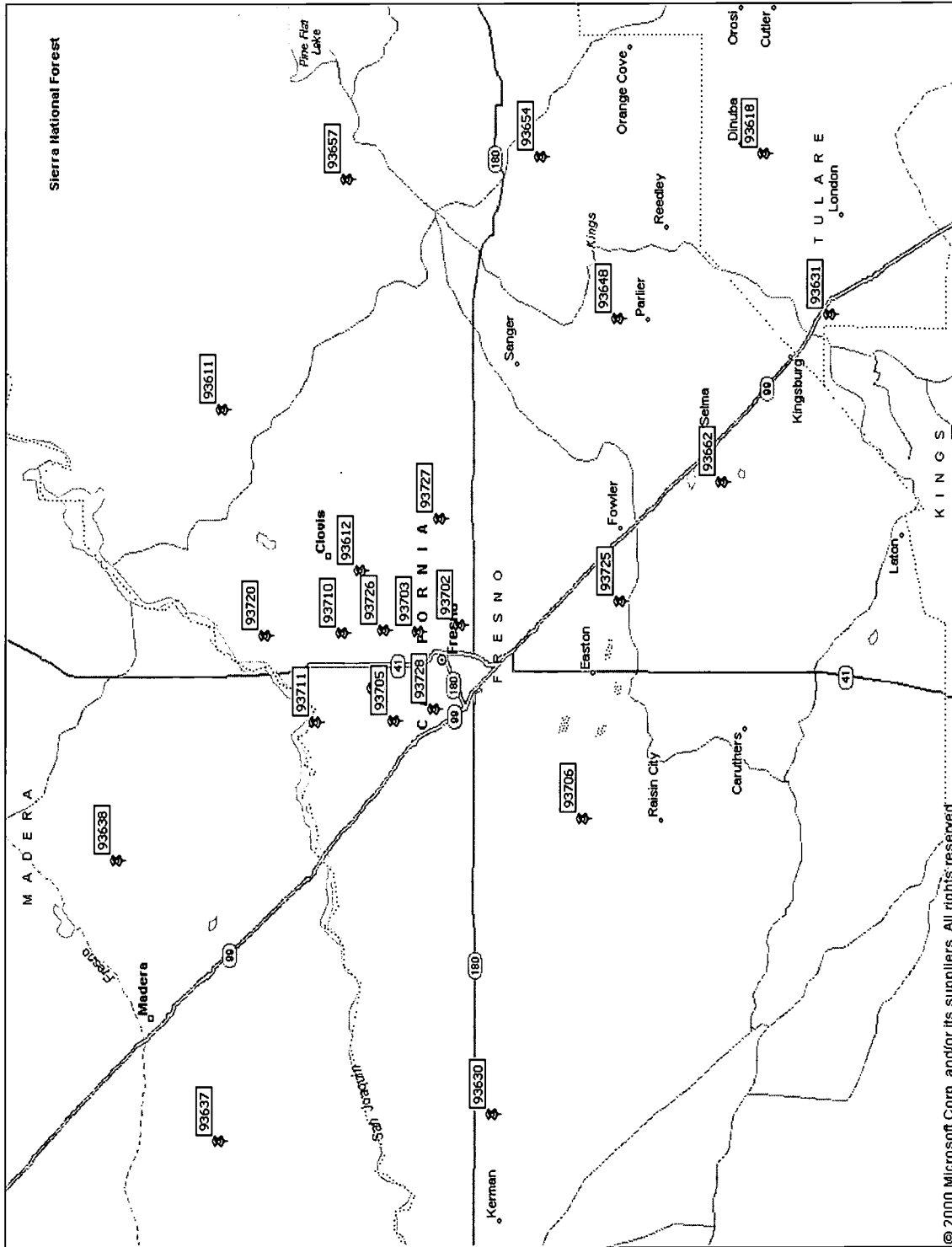
State Center Community College District Zip Codes Generating the Greatest Enrollment Fall 2001

Zip Codes Generating the Greatest Enrollment Fall 2001**

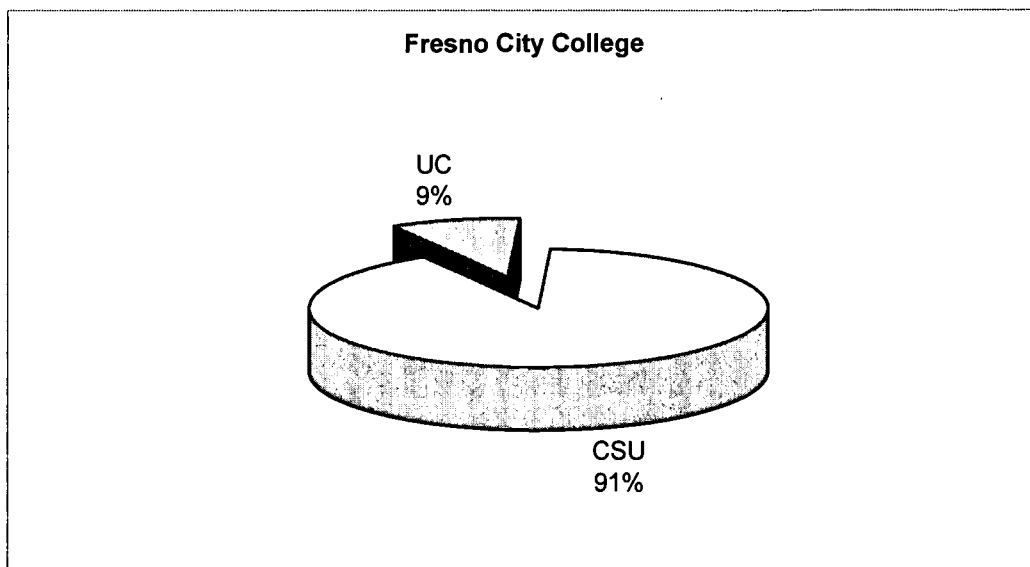

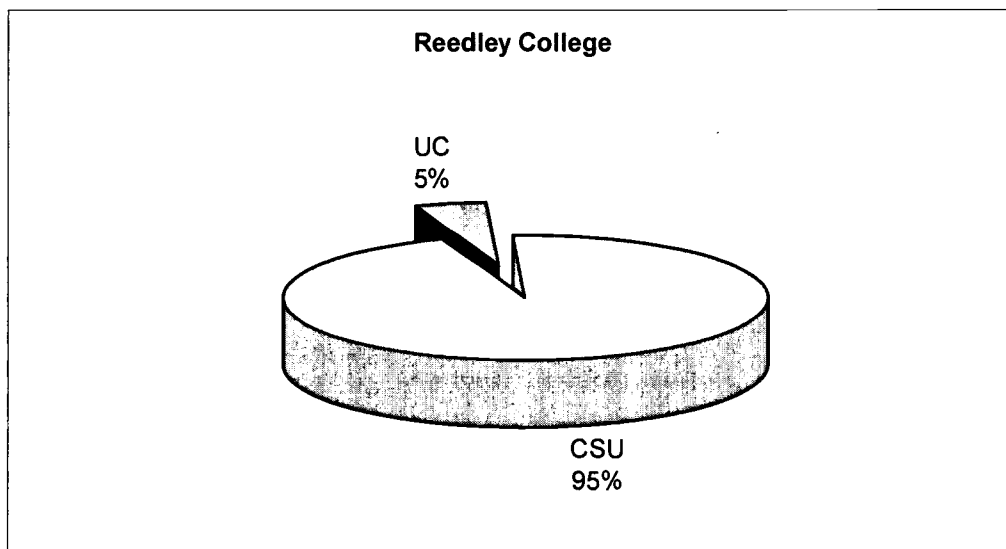
