

ABSTRACT

This annual report describes the recent history of higher education in New Mexico, but it is also intended to provide information useful in preparing for the expanded roles education must play if it is to meet the needs of the state in the coming years. The report begins with summary statements about students and their progress, tuition and financial aid, and public funding of higher education in New Mexico. In 2001, nearly 106,000 students were enrolled in New Mexico's public colleges and universities. Most (54%) were studying on-campus, with the remainder taking courses at off-campus sites. Some 54% of on-campus students are enrolled in community colleges, but since many of these are part-time students, they represent only 44% of the full-time equivalent enrollment. Eighty-seven percent of these enrolled students were New Mexico residents. In the 2000-2001 academic year, New Mexico's public colleges and universities awarded a slightly lower number of degrees (1%) than in 1999-2000; there were 5,405 bachelor's degrees awarded. On average, resident undergraduate students at the state's three research universities paid nearly \$3,100 in tuition and fees per academic year, and tuition at the three comprehensive universities averaged about \$2,232. All six universities raised tuition in the academic year. Students received nearly \$310 million in student financial assistance, and of this sum, more than \$273 million was awarded from public funding sources. Instructional programs at New Mexico's public postsecondary institutions continue to receive significant support from state funds, as detailed. Overview of the Status of Public Higher Education in New Mexico

Overall New Mexico's public institutions of higher education continue to experience a period of stability in student enrollments, program completions, comparative tuition and fee levels, financial aid resources and institutional funding. Enrollments show a seven-year period of stability, with an enrollment increase (2.6%) in 2001. Recent projections of the number of high school graduates in the state, provided by the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education, suggest that this relatively stable pattern will continue into the next decade, with annual increases of one or two percent in the number of students completing high school. While total public higher education enrollments have changed little, the mode of access is beginning to shift as students increasingly access post-secondary education opportunities through electronic or off-campus options. Since 1999, off-campus student enrollments have grown by more than 20 percent statewide, particularly at the regional comprehensive universities and selected community colleges.

The report begins with summary statements about students and their progress, tuition and financial aid, and public funding of higher education in New Mexico.

Student Enrollments

- ✓ Nearly 106,000 students are enrolled in New Mexico's public colleges and universities. Most of these students (54%) are studying on-campus, with the remainder taking courses at off-campus sites. On-campus headcount enrollment during the fall 2001 semester increased by 1.02 percent from the fall 2000. Off-campus headcount enrollments increased by 3.9 percent, continuing the upswing initiated in 1998.
- The balance of students between community college and university campuses has remained stable since 1996. 54 percent on-campus students are enrolled at community college campuses and 45.4 percent enroll at the state's universities. However, because students at community college are often enrolled on a part-time basis or taking only one or two courses, 44 percent of the full-time equivalent enrollment is at community colleges in fall 2001, with 56 percent at universities. The scenario is less balanced for off-campus enrollments where 73 percent of students enrolled (and 82.5 percent of the full-time equivalent students) are at new Mexico's university campuses.
- ✓ Eighty-seven percent of students enrolled at New Mexico's colleges and universities during fall 2001 are state residents. This figure is also essentially unchanged from past years. In addition, more than 91 percent of students enrolled off-campus are state residents. Relatively specialized institutions, such as New Mexico Military Institute and New Mexico Tech, attract greater proportions of out-of-state students, as do campuses that are near our borders with other states.
- ✓ Women continue to outnumber men enrolled at New Mexico's post-secondary institutions. In fall 2001, 56 percent of the students enrolled at the universities were women and 61 percent of the students enrolled at the community college campuses were women. Off-campus students include a greater proportion of women, at 71 percent of the enrollments. Overall, 59 percent of the state's students are women, a percentage that has changed little since 1996.
- The distribution of students enrolled at new Mexico's public institutions who identify themselves as members of racial/ethnic minority groups has remained stable since fall 1999. In fall 2001, 36 percent of the total student enrollments statewide are Hispanic, 7 percent are American Indian, 2 percent are Black, and 2 percent are Asian (other students classify themselves White, are



- residents of other countries or did not indicate an ethnic identity). Off-campus mirror this overall distribution, with the exception of students who identify themselves as American Indian.
- ✓ Statewide, the median age of undergraduate students in fall 2001 was 23 years, while the average age was 28 years of age. (There are equal numbers of students older and younger than the median age.) The median age at the universities was 21 years and that at the community college was 27 years. The average ages for undergraduates enrolled in each sector were also older: 24 years at universities and 31 years at community college. Graduate students at New Mexico universities average 35 years of age and reflected a median age of 32 years of age. Students enrolled for off-campus (extended learning) courses also tended to be older than oncampus students, with average ages of 36 years.

Completion of Degree Programs

- ✓ During the 2000-2001 academic year, New Mexico's public colleges and universities awarded a slightly lower number of degrees (1 percent) than during 1999-2000. 4,497 associate degrees or certificates were awarded in a wide range of fields, with the greatest numbers going to students studying liberal arts (often in preparation for transfer to a university) and in nursing. The predominant areas of study among the 5,405 bachelor's degree recipients were business; social sciences; and math, science, and engineering. Notably, the number of baccalaureate-level education degrees awarded showed a 9 percent increase since 1999-2000. This is the only degree level to increase since 1999-2000. The largest numbers of the 2,517 graduate degrees were awarded in the fields of education; math, science, and engineering; business; and health related professions.
- ✓ Women continue to increase their overall representation among degree recipients, with the recent exceptions of those at the baccalaureate levels. In 2000-2001, women earned 63 percent of the associate degrees awarded, 59 percent of the bachelor's degrees, 56 percent of the master's degrees, and 49 percent of the doctoral and professional degrees. Over the past decade, students from historically under-represented ethnic backgrounds have increased their numbers among degree recipients at all levels. For New Mexico's bachelor's degree recipients in 2000-2001, 33 percent classified themselves as Hispanic, 4 percent as American Indian, 3 percent as Black, and 2 percent as Asian.
- ✓ Unfortunately, the likelihood of any student completing a bachelor's degree remains lower than is desirable and is particularly low among American Indian and Black students. When degree completion by students who first enrolled in the late 1980s is tracked over a ten-year period, half of the students who first enrolled in the late 1980s is tracked over a ten-year period, half of the students who first enrolled at a research university are found to complete a degree. Fewer than one third of the students who first enrolled at a regional/comprehensive university complete a degree.

Tuition and Fees

- On the average, resident undergraduate students enrolled in New Mexico's three research universities pay nearly \$3,100 in tuition and fees per academic year. Resident undergraduate students at the three comprehensive universities pay an average of about \$2,232. All six universities raised tuition for the 2002-2003 year, with increases ranging from 2 percent to more than 9 percent.
- ✓ On the average, resident tuition and fees at New Mexico's public community colleges average nearly \$865 per academic year at branch campuses and nearly \$650 at independent community





- colleges, excluding New Mexico Military Institute. Twelve of the nineteen campuses raised tuition for 2002-2003, with increases ranging from 2.7 percent to more than 8 percent.
- ✓ Tuition and fees account for considerably different percentages of total instructional revenue across the twenty-five public institutions. On the average, however, these levels are low in comparison to other states. New Mexico ranks about 42 for universities, 45 for comprehensive universities, and 48 for community colleges amongst the fifty states, when tuition-and-fee levels are compared to per- capita income of state residents.

Student Financial Assistance

Students attending post-secondary educational institutions in New Mexico received nearly \$310 million in student financial assistance during the 2000-2001 academic year. Of this, more than \$273 million was awarded from public funding sources, including scholarships, work-study jobs, and loans. About 84 percent of this public aid for students came from federal sources and 16 percent from state sources. Total dollars awarded for state aid increased 14 percent over 1999-2000 to nearly \$49 million, due almost solely to growth in the Lottery Success Scholarship program. The total federal dollars awarded remained relatively flat at nearly \$226 million. Loans continue to account for the greatest portion of financial assistance awarded to students.

Funding of Post-Secondary Education

- The instructional programs of New Mexico's public post-secondary institutions continue to receive significant support from state funds. Across the six universities, 64.9 percent of instruction-and-general revenue budgeted for 2002-03 is projected to come from state sources and 24.4 percent from tuition and fees. Across the community college campuses, 58 percent is expected to come from state sources, 25 percent from local property tax levies, and 14 percent from tuition and fees. Remaining revenues include federal grants and other miscellaneous sources.
- Across all 25 campuses, the average instruction-and-general expenditure budgeted per full-time equivalent student was \$8,622 for 2002-03, an increase of 1.8 percent from 2001-2002. The average budgeted by universities was \$9,985; the average budgeted by community college campuses was \$6,933.
- ✓ During 2002-03, the proportion of the state's general fund available for higher education continued to decline. Only 15.6 percent of the General Fund was appropriated for higher education by the New Mexico Legislature, compared with 17% in 1996-97, and 18.8% in 1978-79.
- ✓ The New Mexico Legislature appropriated more than \$91 million for capital outlay projects in 2002. No appropriations were made in 2001. Since 1997, a total of nearly \$270 million has been appropriated to New Mexico's public colleges and universities.

Public Universities and Colleges in New Mexico

New Mexico has twenty-five publicly supported, regionally accredited campuses, located throughout the state. Most citizens are within a one-hour commute or at lest one campus and many can reach several campuses within that time. Several campuses are expanding their off-campus educational capabilities, providing additional educational opportunity for citizens. The state's universities and independent community colleges are governed by boards whose members are either appointed by the Governor or elected locally. Branches and instructional centers are governed by the boards of their parent institutions assisted by local advisory boards.






2002-2003 Revenues in Instruction and General Budgets

In 2002-03, state appropriations were projected to account for 64.9% of the instructionand-general revenues of the universities and 58.2% of those for two-year campuses.

Sources of Revenue for Instruction

Public post-secondary institutions rely upon a number of sources of revenue for their operations. As the following tables reveal, New Mexico's colleges and universities continue to rely upon state appropriations for nearly two-thirds of their operations funds for instructional programs. Universities generate most of their remaining revenue from tuition, research contracts, investments, and state-land-and-permanent-fund income. Community colleges generate most of their additional revenue from local property tax levies and tuition. (Two of the community college campuses in New Mexico-Northern New Mexico Community College and New Mexico Military Institute- do not have local property tax levies.)

Cooperative Education in New Mexico

The Commission on Higher Education (CHE) offers technical assistance to cooperative education (co-op) programs in the state and collects information about programs in the state. For the purposes of reporting, the CHE requires that to be considered as cooperative education, work placements must be degree/career related, be paid employment, and be formalized with a written agreement.

It was anticipated with the events of September 11, 2001, that cooperative education placements might decline considerably. However, only one university has reported a significant degrease in co-op placements. One university indicated a significant increase in placements.

It is worthy to note that while the actual number of cooperative education placements has declined, the issue of paid career-related work placements is evolving as a part of a more broad statewide system of school to work transition that meets the learning needs of the students as well as the workforce skill needs of the employers. This is a result of concerted partnership efforts among numerous programs (federal and state) to provide a continuum of K-16 workforce development activities, of which cooperative education is a part.

The table below reflects the current status of formalized cooperative placements at public postsecondary institutions in New Mexico, based on available data.

Private and Tribal Higher Education in New Mexico

Overview of the Status of Private and Tribal Higher Education in New Mexico

The annual report published by the Commission on Higher Education has historically focused on New Mexico's public institutions of higher education. Two years ago, for the first time, the private and Tribal post-secondary institutions currently operating in New Mexico were included in the Condition of Higher Education in New Mexico.

There are forty-two private post-secondary institutions operating in New Mexico and five Tribal colleges. Of these, all five Tribal colleges and eight of New Mexico's private higher education institutions are regionally accredited. Of the other thirty-four licensed private proprietary schools, ten are nationally accredited. Each plays a unique and important role in the scope of educational opportunities and services provided to New Mexico's citizens. A wide range of educational programs are available, from certificates in floral design and computer training to bachelor's and graduate degrees in education, business, health and the social sciences. Some programs are delivered on campus in a traditional manner, while others are delivered non-traditionally-via distance education.

The basis of the information provided here is a Commission survey. Forty-two institutions, or 89%, responded to the Commission's request for data.

Student Enrollments

- 21,508 students were reported as enrolled in New Mexico's private post-secondary and Tribal institutions during Fall 2001. Most of these students (79%) are studying on-campus, while the remained are taking courses at a site off-campus, via distance education.
- ✓ The median age of students enrolled during Fall 2001 at private and tribal post-secondary institutions ranges from 19 years of age to 42 years of age. Women represent 58.5 percent of the total enrollment of those institutions reporting sex.
- Not all institutions report student race or ethnicity. The ethnic distribution of students for Fall 2001 at New Mexico's private and Tribal post-secondary institutions that do report ethnicity are: 38.4 percent Anglo/White; 31.2 percent Hispanic;11.9 percent Native American; 2.3 percent are Black; 1.2 percent Asian; and 15 percent were reported as "Other." (These percentages are based upon only those students classifying themselves among these five categories.) It is important to note that the overall percentage of Native American students is much higher than at New Mexico's public institutions because of the inclusion of the five Tribal colleges.

Program Completions

During the 2000-2001 academic year, responding private institutions and tribal colleges awarded 10,713 certificates of completion, 1,075 diplomas and associate degrees, 1,197 bachelor's degrees, and 708 graduate degrees. The majority of certificates awarded were in the field of computer and data processing (8,289) followed by truck driving (413). The predominant areas of study among bachelor's degree recipients were business, and health-related professions. The largest numbers of graduate degrees were awarded in fields of business and education.



Private and Tribal Post-Secondary Institutions in New Mexico

New Mexico has five tribal colleges, eight regionally accredited private colleges and universities, and ten nationally accredited licensed schools in addition to the 24 licensed private proprietary institutions throughout the state. These institutions provide a myriad of additional educational opportunities for New Mexico citizens.




