Success for All Schools in Michigan Gain on MEAP-Reading




Michigan elementary schools implementing the Success for All reading program made outstanding gains on the 2004 Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP)-Reading test. Fourth graders in the 15 Success for All elementary schools statewide gained an average of 11.1 percentage points from 2003 to 2004 in students meeting or exceeding standards. Michigan schools as a whole gained 4.0 points.

Schools making outstanding gains include:

- Wilson Elementary in Battle Creek: 39.3%
- Buchanan Elementary in Grand Rapids: 24.5%
- Herrington Elementary in Pontiac: 21.9%
- Cortland Elementary in Highland Park: 20.6%
- Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences (Detroit Charter School): 18.9%
- Le Baron Elementary in Pontiac: 13.4%
- Commonwealth Academy (Detroit Charter School): 13.3%
- Dort School in Flint: 11.2%

The 2004 results reflect findings in states throughout the U.S., affirming that Success for All schools gain more than other schools on state accountability measures.
