

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SECTION 1 – Executive Summary

2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, requires the Wyoming Department of Education (WDE) to conduct a study on the court ordered placements of students (COPS) in Wyoming.

The purpose of this study is to provide comprehensive reporting on:

The study is also directed to look at day treatment and juvenile detention centers as cost-efficient alternatives to placements in existing institutions. The Department of Family Services (DFS) already considers day treatment to be the preferred method of placement; their next recommendation is to place the child in a treatment facility in the child's home community, if possible. Detention is usually considered as an educational option for periods less than 60 days and is viewed by this study as the least desirable locale for a child's education.

For reasons mentioned on pages 44 and 45 of this study, current day treatment and juvenile detention centers are not recommended as cost-efficient alternatives to present placements. Because the study indicated that effective treatment is the primary objective for COPS students, we do not recommend one form of placement over another, regardless of potential cost efficiency.

This study does not recommend consolidating agency functions. In addition to courts and school districts, three state agencies (Department of Family Services, Department of Education and Department of Health) are involved in managing the court-ordered placement of children. Department of Family Services is appropriately the lead agency in placing the child and monitoring the child's treatment progress. Education and Health conduct their assigned programs. No overlap of function or duplication of services was found.

A formal Attorney General's Opinion, dated September 8, 2004, concludes that the school districts are responsible for providing educational services to students residing in their districts as well as children in detention. This study recommends that responsibility for COPS students be removed from the WDE and assigned to school districts.

This study recommends that any future investigations and/or other follow-up be assigned to the DFS, who has far greater involvement with the COPS program than does the WDE.

SECTION 2 – Introduction

Senate Enrolled Act 52 (Senate File 80) was passed by both houses of the legislature and signed by the governor in March 2004. This act requires the Wyoming Department of Education (WDE) to provide comprehensive information to the Joint Interim Education and Appropriation Committees on court ordered placements of students (COPS) and children in detention. The section of the act that directs this study can be found in Exhibit A. Throughout this study we will refer to the act as 2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111.

We have concentrated our research on the Fiscal Year July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004 (FY04). During these twelve months the courts placed 581 children in 19 treatment facilities approved by both WDE and the Department of Family Services (DFS). Thirty-two of these children were placed in two or three facilities; a total of 549 unduplicated individuals were placed during this time period. Since institutions do not keep an average daily membership count (ADM), the study computed ADM for full year attendance at 282.

The study examined all three certified juvenile detention centers and one detention center operated by a county government. Another study reporting the number of juveniles held in adult detention facilities was also reviewed, showing that approximately 402 juveniles were held in adult detention centers in FY03. The 3,001 juvenile placements reported by the three certified juvenile detention centers represent “encounters” which may include multiple placements for the same juvenile.

This study found that it is as difficult to describe the average COPS student as it is to describe the average Wyoming high school student. Characteristics of the COPS student emerged from the study. Two-thirds of COPS children are male. Most of them are between 14 and 18 years of age. They have been found by the court to be in need of treatment intervention to address conditions such as drug/alcohol abuse, antisocial behavior, mental illness, etc. Treatment for these conditions is beyond the scope of public school services.

As an overview, 2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, modifies W.S. 21-13-315, the statute governing the state’s COPS program. This statute requires DFS pay residential and treatment costs and the WDE pay educational costs of court ordered placements of children in private residential treatment facilities and group homes located in Wyoming. Programs providing education services including programs for children with disabilities provided by a board of cooperative educational services (BOCES) are to bill the WDE directly for educational costs for court ordered placements. In addition, costs of all related services for children with disabilities and costs of education assessment for other children incurred as a result of court order prior to any placement are also to be billed directly to the WDE. Costs for educational services are to be paid by the department only if the educational program of the group home, residential treatment center (RTC) or the program provided by the BOCES meets the standards of W.S. 21-13-315(b) and has been approved by the department.

Data from the Department of Health’s Medicaid Program was also gathered and was included as part of the study so as to accurately present total state costs of the COPS program.

SECTION 3 – Wyoming Department of Education Purview

Three units within WDE have separate responsibilities in the COPS program.

The Finance Unit of the WDE has the primary responsibility for the administering the department's COPS program and approves and processes all billings. (Costs for COPS students to be paid by the WDE, again as required by W.S. 21-13-315, include educational services costs and related services costs; see pages 4 and 7.) Two full-time staffers in the Finance Unit are assigned to the COPS program. The Finance Unit maintains detailed records on each student, including the number of hours mandated for special educational services on a student's individual education plan (IEP). Each month the Finance Unit reviews all special services billings and verifies those billings to the IEP. If a billing includes more hours in total on a specific service than what the IEP requires, that portion of the billing is rejected and returned to the provider for correction.

The Special Initiatives Unit inspects providers to assure proper educational and special services are provided to COPS students in accordance with state and federal standards. A more complete description of this unit's activities can be found on page 5. One full-time and one part-time staff members work in this area. The Unit has been directed by the Superintendent of Public Instruction to visit "every institutional school, every year."

The School Improvement Unit conducts accreditation visits and approves educational programs offered by providers. This Unit visits every institution to verify hours of instruction, certifications of instructors, quality of the educational program, and conformance to state standards. This unit also monitors educational programs in the juvenile detention centers.

Basic Educational Services

While the primary function of the COPS program is to ensure that children placed into institutions receive appropriate educational and related services, it should be remembered, however, that the primary purpose of the COPS service providers is treatment, not education. W.S. 21-13-315(a) states, "Programs providing education services including programs for children with disabilities provided by a board of cooperative educational services, shall bill the Department of Education directly for educational costs of court ordered placements."

The statute also requires the WDE to adopt reasonable rules and regulations prescribing standards and allowable costs for educational program services funded under this section. Standards are to be designed to fit the unique populations of residential centers, group homes, programs and services provided by boards of cooperative educational services and out-of-state placement facilities." These rules are found in Chapter 14 of WDE's Rules and Regulations.

W.S. 21-13-315(f) states, "Costs of education services shall be paid by the Department of Education under this section only if the educational program of the group home or residential treatment facility or the program provided by the board of cooperative educational services meets the standards of subsection (b) of this section and has been approved by the department." All of the educational programs of the in-state providers have been approved by the WDE's

School Improvement Unit. All educational programs of out-of-state COPS providers have been approved by their state departments of education.

The Chapter 14 Rules and Regulations also state, “Allowable Education Costs are those for educational services provided directly to the court placed child as part of an organized educational curriculum designed to achieve specific identifiable, measurable educational objectives. Those services are to be provided by appropriately certified staff in an educational setting during regularly scheduled hours.” Furthermore, Chapter 14 requires that all COPS facilities’ educational programs be approved by the WDE, thereby assuring the facility adheres to statewide standards established by the Wyoming State Board of Education and the WDE. The types of educational services received by a student in a COPS placement are to be the same as students receive in school districts, hence the required WDE approval.

COPS Providers Educational Tuition Rates

Costs for the basic educational services described above are reimbursed to facilities through tuition payments. The in-state RTC facilities providing services for the Court Ordered Placement Program had not had an educational tuition rate increase since 1996. During the 2004 legislative session, tuition rate increases were requested and approved to go into effect 7/1/04. These rate increases averaged 37.5 percent across the COPS system.

COPS and Accreditation

Accreditation allows the institution to issue high school diplomas. Classes taken at the institution are transferable to the child's regular school. Under the approved designation, credits may (or may not) be transferable but diplomas cannot be issued by the institution.

The method of accreditation was modified in 2003-2004 from WDE to North Central Accreditation (NCA), which requires a yearly monitoring visit by both NCA and the WDE. Institutional schools have been initially awarded accreditation (or "approved" if the institution is in the process of meeting requirements) and will now participate in the yearly accreditation process. Nine of the eleven COPS institutions are currently accredited. The other two (Wyoming Behavioral Institute and Y.E.S. House) are approved by the WDE and will be working toward accreditation through the NCA.

One gray area currently is the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) requirement that all teachers must be endorsed in each area they teach. Previously, an "institutional endorsement" would allow that teacher to teach multiple subjects across the curriculum. This NCLB mandate would require most providers to hire additional specifically endorsed teachers. The School Improvement Unit is working with the appropriate federal agencies to clarify this situation. However, it appears that if the WDE has direct control over the institutional school, this requirement must be met in order to be accredited. If the facility is not under direct WDE control, there is more leeway. As institutional schools must be approved in order to be paid with COPS funds, this is an issue needing clarification.

COPS and Wyoming Comprehensive Assessment System (WYCAS)

The COPS providers conduct WYCAS testing at grades 4, 8, and 11. Test results do not have to be reported as part of the state's total because children in these facilities are usually not in attendance for the full school year.

COPS Positions Provided in 2004 Laws, Chapter 111

2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, authorized two positions for the WDE to carry out the provisions of the Chapter. Those positions have been filled. The COPS Program Consultant, located in the WDE Riverton office, will facilitate the collaborative efforts with DFS, WDH (Medicaid) as well as the WDE Finance, School Improvement, and Special Programs Units. This program consultant will also monitor the activities of state councils that deal with juvenile issues such as the State Advisory Council on Juvenile Justice and the Governor's Substance Abuse and Violent Crime Advisory Board. The program consultant will serve as the WDE liaison to all in-state and out-of-state COPS facilities, providing a single point of contact for facilities and the department. The program consultant will make frequent visits to the COPS facilities to provide oversight of the facilities' educational programs.

The program consultant will serve as the ESEA Title I D (Neglected & Delinquent) program coordinator. This will allow for a coordination of COPS facilities' Title I D activities as they work towards the successful transition of COPS students from incarceration back to secondary

school completion, vocation or technical training, further education, or employment, as directed by NCLB. It is envisioned that through these efforts the WDE can facilitate a consistency of approach to educational services for the students in detention centers, residential treatment centers, and BOCES.

The second position filled is that of the COPS Program Manager of the Finance Unit. This position monitors and approves billings for COPS students as well as for students in detention. The program manager continues to gather the information required under Chapter 111 and assists the program consultant in site visitations. This position will also have the responsibility to review established education tuition rates (see page 4) to assure rates are appropriate to cover the educational costs of the facility.

Special Education & Related Services

Special Education

Nationally, figures indicate that over 50 percent of juveniles placed in detention and/or RTC facilities are students with disabilities. Our study shows that in FY04, Wyoming was slightly above the national average at approximately 52 percent. During that same period the WDE reimbursed the COPS providers \$1,055,029 in special education costs and reimbursed the state's school districts slightly in excess of \$100 million for special education costs.

Chapter 7 of the WDE Rules and Regulations was promulgated under the authority found in W.S. 21-2-202(a)(xvii) and deals with services for children with disabilities. Wyoming rules, for the most part, follow federal requirements, particularly those prescribed under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) of 1997, and its subsequent amendments. They are binding on school districts and other agencies providing services for children with disabilities.

The goals of these rules are to ensure all Wyoming children with disabilities have available to them a Free Appropriate Public Education (FAPE) that emphasizes special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs and prepare them for employment and independent living, to ensure that the rights of children with disabilities and parents of such children are protected, to assist school districts and other agencies to provide for the education of all children with disabilities, and to lead to positive results for children with disabilities in Wyoming.

“Child with a disability” is defined as a child evaluated as having autism, deaf-blindness, deafness, developmental disability, emotional disability, hard of hearing, learning disability, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment including blindness, and who by reason thereof needs special education and related services.

An IEP must be developed and implemented by the school district or agency for each child with a disability aged 3 to 21 served by a school district or agency. Each eligible child placed in or *referred* to a private school or facility by the school district, agency or court must also have an IEP developed and implemented.

Requirements for IEP Team Membership, parent participation, process for meetings, content, implementation and accountability are specified in sections 8 through 15 of Chapter 7 rules.

Related Services

Related services costs, as defined in Chapter 14 of the WDE's COPS rules and regulations, include:

- a) assistive technology services,
- b) audiology, speech/language services,
- c) counseling and/or psychological services,
- d) occupational and/or physical therapy,
- e) parent counseling and training services,
- f) school health services,
- g) social work services,
- h) transition services,
- i) transportation.

The report on "COPS Expenditures by Students," included as part of this study, shows that the DFS expended \$916,648 in treatment costs and the WDE expended \$1,055,029 in related services costs in FY04. These are not duplicative services. W.S. 21-13-315(a) requires that the DFS pay treatment costs of COPS students and that the WDE pay "costs of all related services for children with disabilities and costs of education assessment for other children...."

Treatment services provided by the DFS would include those things not specifically required to assist a child with a disability, such as mental health counseling. If a treatment service is required on a student's IEP, the WDE pays the cost. If a treatment service is not provided for on the IEP and the DFS believes the treatment is necessary for the child, then the DFS pays the cost.

COPS Providers and Federal Education Funds

COPS providers receive only a small portion of the approximate \$100 million in federal funds that flow through the WDE each year. In FY04, 8 of the 11 in-state institutions received a total of \$703,607 in federal funds. The U.S. Department of Agriculture Nutrition Program paid \$413,479. The U.S. Department of Education paid \$290,128 for vocational education and neglected and delinquent youth programs.

State of Residence

WDE staff of the Finance Unit reviews the court order on every COPS child before placing student records into the COPS accounting system. The court order reflects the child's school district of residence. If there is a change in guardianship of the child during sentencing and the new guardian is out of state, WDE staff reviews the change with the Attorney General's Office to verify whether the WDE should continue to pay for the educational costs of that student. The WDE has never been instructed to continue making reimbursement on the child's behalf when the guardian's residence has changed to another state. It can therefore be stated that the COPS program does not reimburse COPS-related expenses for any child that is not a Wyoming resident at the time costs are incurred.

SECTION 4 – Wyoming Department of Family Services Purview

DFS is the lead agency in the COPS program. Their caseworkers deal with the COPS and detention students from their placement through release. This agency makes recommendations to the courts relative to child placement with specific providers. DFS, as required by W.S. 21-13-315, reimburses the providers for residential and treatment costs of the students. While DFS was very cooperative in gathering information for this study, DFS also collaborated with LSO in a separate study on COPS to be presented to the Management Audit Committee. It is the indication of this study that LSO investigated the operations of DFS quite extensively. For a review of the number of DFS employees assigned to COPS, their duties, procedures and policies, this study defers to LSO’s Program Evaluation Report.

Treatment Services

According to DFS, treatment services can involve such things as:

- a) clothing allowance,
- b) counseling,
- c) evaluation,
- d) transportation,
- e) day treatment,
- f) mentoring,
- g) family preservation,
- h) parenting, and
- i) independent living.

SECTION 5 – Wyoming Department of Health Purview

The WDH's Medicaid program is responsible for reimbursement of allowable medical costs relating to children who are court ordered into an RTC or a BOCES. During the period of this study, 7/1/03-6/30/04, the federal share of reimbursement was 64.27 percent. The required state match, paid from the School Foundation Account, was 35.73 percent.

The Medicaid program reimburses COPS providers directly for allowable medical costs in accordance with their established fee schedule. Effective July 1, 2004, the WDE will only reimburse COPS providers for medical services costs that have been denied by Medicaid.

Medicaid

Medicaid has been involved with the COPS program for some time through DFS. During the past year WDE began seeking reimbursements from Medicaid for provider services. Beginning in December of 2003, RTCs and BOCES agreed to begin submitting allowable medical services billings for children with disabilities to the Medicaid program for payment. This was the result of a coordinated effort between the WDE, Medicaid, and the COPS providers and was one of four objectives established by the COPS Stakeholders group that began facilitated meetings in November of 2002. Not all of COPS providers were prepared to begin the Medicaid reimbursement process at the same time and therefore began submitting billings to Medicaid between December of 2003 and June of 2004. As of the end of June 2004, seven COPS providers were submitting billings to Medicaid with the remaining four in-state COPS providers expected to begin that process the first of July.

2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, adds to W.S. 21-13-315 subsection (n), requiring that all COPS program providers bill the Medicaid program for allowable related services prior to billing the Department of Education.

Implementing Medicaid reimbursement has saved the WDE approximately \$336,500 during the period from December 2003 through June 2004. The WDE forecasts that with all COPS providers now on the system and submitting billings to Medicaid as of July 1, 2004 the savings during FY05 will approximate \$850,000.

In reviewing residential and treatment costs for the out-of-state providers, it was discovered that six of the eight providers are not reimbursed for these costs by DFS, but are reimbursed directly by Medicaid. Residential and treatment costs are paid for by Medicaid federal dollars. We also learned that DFS has an agreement with three in-state RTCs (Attention Home, St. Joseph's and Normative Services) who bill Medicaid directly for residential and treatment costs; Medicaid, in turn, bills DFS for the state portion. For a detailed explanation of why DFS pays two out-of-state providers and why DFS reached this agreement with three in-state providers, the study defers to the LSO Program Evaluation Report or to a future report from DFS.

SECTION 6 – Boards of Cooperative Educational Services (BOCES)

In 1969 the Legislature adopted the Boards of Cooperative Educational Services Act to “provide a method whereby school districts ...may work together to provide...services for children with disabilities, when the services can be more effectively provided through a cooperative effort.” While not all children in a BOCES are court placed, those that are have the most severe emotional, physical and learning disorders. All of them are diagnosed as special education students. Three BOCES (Northeast BOCES, Northwest BOCES, and Region V BOCES) have been formed by districts to provide these services.

Northeast BOCES

The Northeast BOCES was established in 1979. Located in Gillette, it operates the Powder River Basin Children’s Center that was opened in 1982. The 13 member districts include Campbell #1, Converse #1, Converse #2, Crook #1, Goshen #1, Johnson #1, Niobrara #1, Platte #2, Sheridan #1, Sheridan #2, Sheridan #3, Weston #1, and Weston #7.

Northeast BOCES specializes in treating children with multiple disabilities. The programs are especially designed for students diagnosed with autism, deaf-blindness, behavior issues, orthopedic impairment, mental disability, language disability, vision, hearing and health impairments and traumatic brain injury.

Students are placed at Northeast BOCES by member districts, non-member districts and the courts, up to a capacity of 40. It educates an average of 24 students per month, nine of them COPS children with an individual educational plan (IEP). Ages of students range from five to twenty-one.

Northeast BOCES has approximately 55 staff including one executive director, one educational director, one business manager, four teachers, three therapists, one counselor, fifteen paraprofessionals, twenty residential staff, and six support personnel.

Currently Northeast BOCES rents one of its cottages to Youth Emergency Services (Y.E.S. House), which is also a COPS provider.

Northwest BOCES

The Northwest BOCES was founded in 1970. It is located in Thermopolis and operates Big Horn Basin Children’s Center. It has 17 member districts which include Big Horn #1, Big Horn #2, Big Horn #3, Big Horn #4, Fremont #1, Fremont #6, Fremont #14, Fremont #21, Fremont #24, Fremont #25, Fremont #38, Hot Springs #1, Park #1, Park #6, Park #16, Washakie #1, and Washakie #2.

Northwest BOCES specializes in treating developmentally disabled and emotionally disturbed students. It provides educational, residential, therapeutic, and nursing care for children with a

developmental disability, a traumatic brain injury, and those who are medically fragile, or have an emotional or behavioral disorder.

Placement of students at Northwest BOCES comes through member and non-member districts as well as through the courts. Total capacity is 20 students, with a monthly average of 13. Five of these students typically are COPS and all have IEPs. Students' ages are six to twenty-one.

Northwest BOCES has a number of staff including an administrative director, a program director, a school social worker, a nurse, a counselor, three teachers, six educational support personnel, one consultant, nineteen residential staff, and five support services personnel.

Region V BOCES

Region V BOCES was established in 1979. It is located in Wilson (near Jackson) and operates the C-V Ranch. It has 14 member districts which include Carbon #2, Fremont #2, Fremont #14, Fremont #21, Lincoln #1, Lincoln #2, Sublette #1, Sublette #9, Sweetwater #1, Sweetwater #2, Uinta #1, Uinta #4, Uinta #6, and Teton #1.

Region V BOCES serves youth with primary emphasis on emotional and mental challenges.

The facility educates an average of 45 students per month, operating at near capacity; 24 of those students are COPS and all have an IEP. Ages of students range from six to twenty-one.

Region V is the largest of the three BOCES with a recent staff count of 117 including two administrators, eight teachers, two psychologists, five therapists, two nurses, and sixty-four support personnel. Region V BOCES also provides regional services to outlying school districts in addition to BOCES central administrative personnel, of which there are two administrators and four support personnel. Region V also operates day treatment facilities at Roosevelt Learning Center in Rock Springs and Sunrise School in Lander (see page 21).

SECTION 7 - Private Residential Treatment Centers in Wyoming

The eight private residential treatment centers in Wyoming accommodate the largest number of children in the COPS program. These institutions are considered to be non-profit, although there has been concern that at least one of the providers have paid out excessive amounts in compensation to their founders. The LSO Management Audit, anticipated to be released in November 2004, as understood by the WDE, will address this concern. In general, our study has found that the in-state treatment centers serve a valuable purpose by providing treatment in most of the larger communities of the state. We learned that DFS places a high priority on COPS children receiving treatment in their community. Most of the facilities listed below treat similar problems: substance abuse, behavior, and learning disorders.

A child can be placed in an RTC primarily in two different ways. He/she can be placed there for treatment purposes by the courts or by a legal guardian. Approximately 59 percent of the children placed in the in-state RTCs were placed there by Wyoming courts. The balance, 41 percent, were placed by legal guardians from in-state or out-of-state, or by out-of-state courts.

Attention Homes, Inc.

Attention Homes was founded in 1974. It is located in Cheyenne and operates the Virginia Hirst Boys Home and Iverson-Nelson Girls Home.

Attention Homes provides residential treatment services, foster care, crisis shelter care, home-based family intervention services using the Multisystemic Treatment (MST) program model, day education for suspended and expelled youth, and education services for court placed children. Annually, Attention Homes serves approximately 500 youth in all of their programs.

An average of twenty COPS students per month throughout the year are placed at Attention Home. During the period of the study, only three students had IEPs (the lowest ratio of special education/COPS students of all providers). Ages range from 10 to 18; total capacity is 26 students.

Attention Homes has a number of staff, including one executive director, one education director, one business manager, three teachers, three educational support personnel, two therapists, one psychologist, one psychiatrist, one nurse, 30 residential staff, and four support services personnel.

A current contract with Laramie County School District #1 provides day education for up to ten students who are expelled. Attention Homes will be leasing another facility (off-site) to provide educational services for students.

Cathedral Home for Children

Cathedral Home for Children, located in Laramie, was founded in 1910 as an orphanage. It is now a “not-for-profit interdenominational” program serving students who are troubled and traumatized, including deaf and hard-of-hearing students.

An average of 26 COPS students per month are in placement at Cathedral Home throughout the year. Only about half are on an IEP. With a capacity of 72 students, Cathedral Home educates an average of 50 students per month. The students range from 10 to 18 years in age.

Cathedral Home has approximately 150 staff including one executive director, one program director, one chief financial officer, eight administrative personnel, one education director, 12 teachers, 14 educational support personnel, one case manager, two nurses, five counselors, 60 residential staff, and three support services personnel.

Cathedral Home operates a day treatment facility at its Laramie Youth Crisis Center.

Frontier Correctional Systems, Inc.

Frontier Correctional Systems is a unique provider in that it operates a residential treatment center and a juvenile detention center under the same roof in a modern facility east of Cheyenne.

Frontier also provides day treatment and will soon open a group home. Both of these programs will be operated at the same location in Cheyenne. A vocational education program is in the North Central Association review process for accreditation and will be housed in a third location.

The educational services for the residential treatment center, the juvenile detention center, and the day treatment facility are all provided by the Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy, part of Frontier Correctional Systems, which was established in 2001. The treatment center serves students who are in need of a safe, secure and structured environment with a rigorous treatment program. It has grown to be the third largest provider for COPS students.

On average, typically, 39 COPS students throughout the year are in placement at Frontier Correctional Systems. Seventeen of these are on an IEP. Frontier educates an average of 68 students per month. Its capacity is 72 students. The students range in age from 12 to 18 years in age.

Frontier Correctional Systems has a number of staff including one executive director, four administrative personnel, one education director, seven teachers, four education paraprofessionals, 32 residential staff, and three support services personnel.

In addition to these programs offered in Cheyenne, Frontier operates the Regional Juvenile Detention Center in Casper. For a description of both detention facilities, see pages 30 through 34.

Normative Services

Normative Services was established in 1990. It is located in Sheridan and is the largest of the residential treatment centers in Wyoming. It provides education and counseling for students who have problematic behaviors, have made poor choices, and need extra help. Students range in age from 12 to 18.

Normative Services is the only RTC with a competitive sports program. The school is a member of the Wyoming High School Activities Association and competes in 1-A football, boys and girls basketball, volleyball, cross country and track. Students from Clearmont High School are eligible to play football at Normative Services; currently six Clearmont students are on their team.

An average of 68 COPS students per month are in placement at Normative Services throughout the year. Approximately 34 percent of the students would be on an IEP. Normative educates an average of 128 students per month. Its capacity is 135 students.

Staffing at Normative Services consists of one executive director, 11 administrative personnel, one education director, one special education director, nine teachers, nine education paraprofessionals, four educational support personnel, one therapist, one nurse, 47 counselor specialists, 23 residential staff, and seven support services personnel.

Normative Services is a non-profit agency of considerable recent controversy over executive compensation paid and is the subject of an LSO study (see page 39).

Red Top Meadows

Red Top Meadows was established in 1980. It is located in rural Teton County approximately ten miles south of Wilson (near Jackson). It is a private, non-profit treatment center that provides services for emotionally and/or behaviorally challenged adolescent boys.

Throughout the year, a monthly average of 13 COPS students are placed at Red Top Meadows. Eight are on an IEP. The facility educates an average of 14 students per month at full capacity. The students range in age from 12 to 17.

Red Top Meadows is staffed by one director, one wilderness director, three teachers, two therapists, two residential supervisors, nine full-time and three part-time residential staff, and one support services personnel.

St. Joseph's Children's School

Founded in 1930 as an orphanage, St. Joseph's Children's Home is a certified JCAHO and Wyoming Medicaid facility. It is located in Torrington and is a non-profit agency of the Catholic Diocese of Cheyenne. It provides intensive social skills instruction to replace a child's problem behaviors with acceptable social skills to improve family and peer relationships. It has the second highest number of COPS students in residential placement.

An average of 55 students receive educational services per month, 50 of them COPS. During the period of the study, 29 of the COPS students had IEPs. Capacity is 62 and ages include students 6 through 17.

St Joseph's Children's Home has a number of staff including one executive director, 12 administrative personnel, one psychiatrist, two psychologists, eight therapist, two nurses, 11 teachers, 11 educational support personnel, 40 residential staff, and 12 support services personnel.

The school operates a residential treatment center at its main facility and an acute stabilization and evaluation program at its separate Newell Children's Center, physically separate from St. Joseph's main facility. Its primary function is to provide youth with intensive intervention and short-term stabilization services in a secure environment. It serves 12 students with one teacher and two educational support personnel and fifteen residential staff. COPS students are housed at both this center and the main facility.

Wyoming Behavioral Institute

Wyoming Behavioral Institute was established in 1997. It is located in Casper and operates clinics in Gillette and Rock Springs. Wyoming Behavioral Institute specializes in acute stabilization of children suffering from psychiatric illnesses, drug and alcohol problems, and conduct disorders.

Three COPS students, one being on an IEP, received treatment services here during FY 2004. The Institute has a capacity of 22 students. The typical student is between 12 and 18 years old. Many of the non-COPS students are placed here for treatment by their families and physicians; these students are considered to be "hospitalized or homebound pupils" under Wyoming statute. Wyoming Behavioral is licensed as a psychiatric hospital by the WDH.

The staff includes a psychiatrist and a nurse practitioner who treat the children on a weekly basis; when a child is under acute stabilization, these staff members treat the child three times per week. The remainder of the staff consists of an executive director, three teachers, four educational support personnel, a physician's assistant, two case managers, five therapists, 12 residential staff, and seven support services personnel.

Youth Emergency Services, Inc.

Youth Emergency Services, also known as Y.E.S. House, was established in 1976. It is a private, non-profit organization located in Gillette. Its programs offer support and stabilization for at-risk youth and their families on a 24-hour basis. It provides a continuum of services from prevention through intervention and treatment. Students are placed at this facility for a variety of concerns including family conflict, physical or sexual abuse, depression or suicide attempt, oppositional behavior, substance abuse problems, excessive fear or anger, aggression or other inappropriate behavior, parental neglect, and emotional or psychiatric needs.

Y.E.S. House educates an average of 18 students per month with 10 being COPS. Four had an IEP during the period of the study. Capacity is 24 students, with ages ranging from 10 to 17.

Y.E.S. House has a number of staff including one executive director, one program director, one operations director, one development director, two administrative support personnel, one education director, two teachers, four educational support personnel, and two support services personnel.

SECTION 8 - Residential Treatment Centers Outside of Wyoming

W.S. 21-13-315 requires that if the court rejects an in-state placement recommendation of the predisposition report or multidisciplinary team (see page 25), the court must enter on the record specific findings of fact relied upon to support its decision to deviate from the recommended disposition. The court cannot order an out-of-state placement unless evidence has been presented to the court regarding the costs of the out-of-state placement together with evidence of the comparative costs of any suitable alternative in-state treatment program or facility, as determined by DFS, whether or not placement in the in-state program or facility is currently available. The court must also make an affirmative finding on the record that no placement can be made in a Wyoming institution or in a private residential treatment facility or group home located in Wyoming that can provide adequate treatment or services for the child. The court must state on the record why no in-state placement is available.

Statutes require that if an out-of-state placement is under consideration by the court, DFS must provide the court with in-state alternative placement. This information will include the name, address, program description and costs of each Wyoming institution, each private residential treatment facility, or group home that DFS has determined can provide adequate treatment or services for the child, and whether placement is available.

DFS recommends placing a child out-of-state when the child's problems are so severe that no in-state facility can treat the child. The out-of-state treatment facilities tend to have slightly longer lengths of stay and less expensive treatment costs. Below is a description of the currently approved out-of-state providers.

During the period of this study, July 1, 2003 through June 30, 2004, there were 15 children placed by court order in out-of-state facilities.

Benchmark Behavioral Health System

Benchmark Behavioral Health was established in 1995. It is located in Woods Cross, Utah, approximately ten miles north of Salt Lake City. Benchmark treats male juvenile sex offenders and youth with conduct and oppositional disorders. It places emphasis on behavioral and psycho-educational intervention. It provides the therapeutic framework for residents to gain control over abusive sexual behaviors and to facilitate pro-social interactions in the community.

One COPS student was placed at Benchmark Behavioral Health during the study period. The student was not on an IEP. Benchmark educates an average of 78 students per month. With a capacity of 80 students, their male students range in age from 13 to 18 years.

Benchmark Behavioral Health has approximately 200 staff including one executive director, one chief financial officer, one program director, five administrative personnel, one education director, seven teachers, three nurses, two psychiatrists, eight therapists, one case manager, 30 residential staff, and eight support services personnel

Colorado Boys Ranch

Colorado Boys Ranch was founded in 1959 and is located in La Junta, Colorado. It serves at-risk boys who have concurrent psychiatric, behavioral, and educational problems that prevent them from successfully functioning in their homes, schools and communities. It provides mental health services and education.

During FY04, one COPS student, with an IEP, was placed at Colorado Boys Ranch. Colorado Boys Ranch educates an average of 86 students per month, with a capacity of 92 students. Its male students range from 10 to 21 years in age.

Colorado Boys Ranch has approximately 234 staff including one chief executive officer, a chief financial officer, 24 administrators, 30 administrative support personnel, 18 professionals, 105 counselors and residential staff, and 25 support services personnel.

Copper Hills Youth Center

Copper Hills Youth Center was established in 2000. It is located in West Jordan, Utah, which is part of the Great Salt Lake City Valley. It provides a highly structured and safe environment where the students begin to work on the issues that have caused their lives to spiral out of control. Youth placed here can no longer remain in their home communities because their lives have become unmanageable. Often the students' problems are layered with drug and alcohol abuse or misuse.

Typically, five COPS students are placed at Copper Hills Youth Center throughout the year. All five are on an IEP. It educates an average of 108 students per month. Their capacity is 110 students, who range in age from 12 to 18 years.

Copper Hills Youth Center has over 300 staff including a chief executive officer, a chief operations officer, two administrative personnel, ten teachers, ten nurses, 12 therapists, two psychiatrists, 81 residential staff, and 30 support services personnel.

Copper Hills Youth is owned by KIDS Behavioral Health, LLC of Reno, Nevada.

Devereux Cleo Wallace Center

Devereux Cleo Wallace Center was founded in 1943. It is located in Westminster, Colorado and is one of Colorado's largest mental health facilities. It provides treatment of psychiatric, emotional and behavioral problems in children and adolescents.

An average of five COPS students are placed at Devereux Cleo Wallace Center in a typical year. Most are on an IEP. It educates an average of 100 students per month. Their capacity is 110 students with students ranging in age from 8 to 21 years.

Devereux Cleo Wallace Center has approximately 260 staff including an executive director, seven various program directors, four program managers, four administrative support personnel, an education director, 12 teachers, six paraprofessional education personnel, two psychiatrists, 11 clinicians, seven nurses, 80 residential staff, and ten support services personnel.

Hill Crest Behavioral Health Services

Hill Crest Behavioral Health Services was established in 1925. It operates Higdon Hill School and is located in Birmingham, Alabama. Hill Crest is a stand-alone psychiatric hospital and serves severely emotionally disturbed youth. It strives to motivate the student to make the necessary behavioral changes for successful living. It provides an academic environment which improves cognitive, affective and psychomotor skills of students and improves their interaction with others in their environment. Hill Crest provides a therapeutic environment which seeks to develop self-worth, self-control and self-sufficiency in all of its students.

Wyoming placed one COPS student for three months at Hill Crest Behavioral Health Services during the time period of this study. This student was on an IEP and was placed here because of the very specific treatment offered relative to the student's disorder. Hill Crest educates an average of 60 students per month with a capacity for 80 students. Its students range from 11 to 18 years of age.

Hill Crest Behavioral Health Services has approximately 320 staff including one chief executive officer, one chief financial officer, one chief operations officer, twenty administrative support personnel, three program (recreation, residential treatment center, and group home) directors, one clinical director, 200 mental health workers, 60 nurses, 16 therapists, 16 social workers, one principal, five teachers, one educational aide, one educational support person, and eight residential support services staff.

Intermountain Children's Home

Intermountain Children's Home was founded in 1909 and located in Helena, Montana. It provides programs for students who are troubled and traumatized, including deaf and hard-of-hearing students.

One COPS student was placed at Intermountain Children's Home throughout the study year. The student was not on an IEP. Intermountain educates an average of 30 students per month with a capacity for 32 students. Its students range from 4 to 11 years in age.

Intermountain Children's Home has approximately 104 staff including one executive director, one operations director, 30 administrative personnel, one education director, six teachers, two educational support personnel, one psychologist, two nurses, six counselors, four therapists, 20 residential personnel, and four support services personnel.

KIDS Behavioral Health

KIDS Behavioral Health was established in 2001 and is located in Butte, Montana. It is a treatment center for emotionally and behaviorally disturbed students.

Throughout the year one COPS student was placed at KIDS Behavioral Health, with an IEP. The facility educates an average of 83 students per month with a capacity of 85 students. Their students range from 5 to 18 years in age.

KIDS Behavioral Health has approximately 238 staff including one chief executive officer, one chief financial officer, four directors, three managers, ten administrative personnel, 15 teachers, one clinical director, one clinical nurse specialist, one medical director, 16 nurses, 32 therapists, four case managers, 125 residential personnel, and 12 support services personnel.

YouthTrack-Utah

YouthTrack-Utah was founded in 1989. It operates in two locations, North Logan, Utah and Brigham City, Utah. It serves "at risk youth with sexual offense issues." It specializes in the assessment, evaluation, diagnosis and treatment of male juvenile sex offenders.

One COPS student was placed at YouthTrack-Utah throughout the study year. The student was on an IEP. YouthTrack educates an average of 24 students per month with a capacity of 32 students. Their male students range from 12 to 17 years in age.

YouthTrack-Utah staff consists of one executive director, one business manager, one program director, four teachers, four educational support personnel, one clinical director, one medical coordinator, one psychiatrist, one nurse, four therapists, and nine residential staff.

The local school district provides educational resources. YouthTrack-Utah is a subsidiary of ResCare, Inc. headquartered in Louisville, Kentucky.

SECTION 9 – Other Areas of Study

Group Homes

The study is also directed to review “group homes.” RTCs do not provide group home services as part of their overall treatment services offering. The courts may place a child in a group home by court order. There are no group homes whose educational services have been approved by the WDE and, therefore, the WDE does not reimburse group homes as COPS providers. However, the DFS reimburses for residential and treatment costs if a child is court ordered into a group home.

Generally, educational services for children in group homes are the responsibility of the school districts and costs relative to children in group homes are reimbursed to the school districts through federal Title I, Part D, Subpart 2 funding. There are approximately 30 group homes throughout the state with whom various school districts work with in providing educational services to students placed there.

Frontier Corrections is seeking approval from DFS to establish a group home in Cheyenne. The educational services for this home would be provided by the Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy.

Day Treatment

The WDE was directed to review day treatment which is not a program reimbursed by the WDE through the COPS program. The determination of the Attorney General’s Office is that when a child moves from an RTC or BOCES into a day treatment program, it becomes the responsibility of the resident school district to provide for educational services. This determination was not in the form of a written opinion, but an e-mail from the AG’s Office to the WDE dated 4/17/03.

Day treatment, as its name implies, provides treatment services over and above educational services to children in need and allows the children to live at home. Educational programs vary. Day treatment is only feasible when the home setting allows for a safe and healthy environment for the child and the home is in close proximity to a facility offering a day treatment program. Increased parental interaction with the child is encouraged through day treatment programs.

The costs for services at day treatment are estimated to be less than half the cost of a residential treatment center. This is due to providing only “day” treatment and the DFS not having to pay for the residential costs and not providing for trips back to the students’ own communities. (Students in residential treatment centers are provided transportation to their respective communities, i.e., a student from Laramie County would be provided transportation to his/her home in Cheyenne a given number of times as specified on the IEP.)

Below are descriptions of day treatment programs in Wyoming operated in association with a BOCES or RTC.

Roosevelt Learning Center

Roosevelt Learning Center was established in 2001 and is located in Rock Springs. It is operated as an outreach facility by the Region V BOCES and serves the Sweetwater County school districts. It provides an extended school year to students in special education requiring services to prevent regression. Roosevelt School is also a transition facility for Region V BOCES Sweetwater County students and children coming from detention centers.

The rates charged to member districts for Roosevelt Learning Center are: tuition, \$169 per day; social work, \$150 per week; and transportation, \$63 per week. The students live in the local community and receive transportation door to door. The district pays these fees. Roosevelt's educational program is accredited by the WDE.

An average of 18 students per month attend Roosevelt. It served 28 students last year with one administrator, three teachers, one clinical social worker, and four paraprofessionals.

Sunrise School

Sunrise School was established in 1991 and is located in Lander. Region V BOCES operates Sunrise School as an outreach facility for the Fremont County school districts. Sunrise provides an extended school year to students in special education requiring services to prevent regression. Sunrise School is also a transition facility for Region V BOCES Fremont County students.

The rates for Sunrise School to the member districts are: tuition, \$145 per day; social work, \$150 per week; and transportation, \$63 per week. The students live in the community of the school and receive transportation door to door. Sunrise School's educational services are accredited by the WDE.

An average of 20 students per month attend Sunrise School. The school operates at full capacity.

Sunrise School has a staff of one administrator/teacher, one teacher, two part-time clinical social workers, and five paraprofessional staff.

Cathedral Home for Children

Cathedral Home for Children operates the Albany County Expulsion Suspension (ACES) Program at their Youth Crisis Center in Laramie. The children in this program have been suspended or expelled from their local school. Parents take their children to the Crisis Center from 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. each day. The local school provides the schoolwork to the student under a contract agreement with the student and the parent. ACES works with each family in their home for at least eight hours during a four-week period. Currently, ten students participate in ACES.

Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy

Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy has a day treatment and vocational trades program in Cheyenne, not associated with a BOCES or school district, designed for both male and female at-risk students from ages 13 to 20. Youth are placed here only by a court order. DFS pays the costs for this treatment program. The educational program is delivered by the academy. Transportation services are available but parents are encouraged to remain involved by transporting their children to the academy.

Y.E.S. House

Y.E.S. House day treatment is offered by Youth Emergency Services, Inc. It was established in September 2003 and is located in Gillette. It is a preventive program and cooperative effort with DFS. It provides structured day education services and substance abuse and mental health treatment to children while keeping them in their home and community. Students attend class year-round at the Y.E.S. House RTC. It has eight students in grades 6 to 12. DFS reimburses the costs for treatment and the school district pays the educational services costs.

SECTION 10 – Juvenile Detention

Detention, like group homes and day treatment, is another placement not reimbursed by the WDE through the COPS program. The term “detention” has been used to describe multiple situations, but a clear definition and needed detention facility standards have been subject to ongoing development through the Department of Justice, the Wyoming Advisory Council on Juvenile Justice, and the Protective Services Division of the DFS. The definition adopted by the National Juvenile Detention Association is “the temporary and safe custody of juveniles who are accused of conduct subject to the jurisdiction of the court who require a restricted environment for their own or the community’s protection while pending legal action.”

Facilities are currently certified by the DFS, Division of Protective Services, using 1998 standards. New standards more in line with the Juvenile Justice Act discussed later in this report have been developed, approved by the Governor, and are now in the process required for adoption by the state.

Educational Services and Detention

This study found that education services in detention centers are difficult to categorize. A description of services in each facility is included in the narrative of each; this section will summarize and contrast. It should be noted that services other than education are provided to juveniles in various detention facilities as well, but not through a statewide system. Examples of such services include counseling, assessment, social skills development, anger management, drug/alcohol awareness, and transition services.

Fremont County and Campbell County facilities are tied into the local school districts through shared staff and curriculum, thus oversight is provided through the WDE monitoring process. The two private facilities operated by Frontier Corrections (RJDC in Casper and Wardle Academy in Cheyenne) provide their own education staff, with the Casper facility also having access to a teacher from the local school district. Participation in education services is optional for the child placed there but encouraged. The Wardle Academy is also an RTC, so it falls under the accreditation/monitoring requirements for COPS facilities. The private facilities attempt to follow the educational programs of the home school of students but also utilize their own facility programs.

Our visits have shown that educational services are reflective of the teacher(s) in each facility and their level of commitment to this specific, unique population. Flexibility is essential since length of stay is so varied. Generally, once a juvenile is in a facility for over two days, educational services commence. If held for less than ten days, efforts are made to coordinate with the juvenile’s school of attendance for assignments; if over ten days, the juveniles in the County-run facilities are enrolled in the local district’s alternative school and follow the local curriculum, usually with individualized student plans. If a juvenile has not been enrolled in a school, options generally available include skill development (academic and employability) and work toward a GED. In the case of Campbell County, correspondence study and credit through the University of Nebraska is also an option.

Detention and DFS

Title 14 of the Wyoming Statutes, Chapter 6, Article 2 is referred to as the Juvenile Justice Act. The Act mandates that a child shall not to be held in detention or placed in shelter care or protective custody without a court order except under the following circumstances:

- To protect the person or property of others;
- To prevent the child from absconding or being removed from the jurisdiction of the court;
- To provide the child who has no parent, guardian, custodian or other responsible adult with supervision and care and returning him to the court when required.

When a child is taken into custody without a court order and is placed in detention or shelter care, the person taking custody must notify the district attorney without delay and must file a brief written statement with the district attorney setting forth the facts which led to taking the child into custody and the reason why the child was not released.

When a child is placed in detention without a court order, a petition is to be promptly filed and presented to the court. An informal detention or shelter care hearing is to be held as soon as possible but not later than 48 hours after the child is taken into custody to determine if further detention or shelter care is required pending further court action. If the allegations of the petition are denied, the court may proceed immediately to hear evidence on the petition or it may set a later time not to exceed 60 days for an adjudicatory or a transfer hearing. If the court finds that the allegations in the petition are not established as required by the Juvenile Justice Act, it shall dismiss the petition and order the child released from any detention or shelter care. A motion can also be made to a lower court to transfer the allegations of delinquency against a minor to the district or juvenile court.

If, after an adjudicatory hearing or a valid admission or confession, the court or jury finds that a child committed the acts alleging him delinquent, a decree to that effect stating the jurisdictional facts upon which the decree is based will be entered. It may then proceed immediately or at a postponed hearing within 60 days to make proper disposition of the child. During that continuance of 60 days, the court can receive reports and other evidence bearing on the disposition. The court must make an appropriate order for detention or shelter care of the child or for his release from detention subject to any terms and conditions the court deems necessary during the period of continuance.

DFS becomes aware that a child has been placed in juvenile detention when the detention hearing takes place and *only if* the child is placed in DFS custody by court order. This occurs normally through the district court system. The other courts, municipal and circuit, are not covered by Title XIV and do not normally place children in DFS custody by court order. Therefore, DFS does not normally pay the residential and/or treatment costs of these children. In municipal and circuit court systems, which are adult, these children often get fines, in some cases probation and often detention.

If the district/juvenile court places a child in DFS custody, a multidisciplinary team begins meeting shortly after the custody (detention) hearing for placement studies and recommendations. In judicial districts with a Youth Services Agency offering a continuum of services that are seen as alternatives to detention, this process may have variations. After a

petition is filed, the court orders DFS to make a predisposition study and report. While preparing the study, DFS is to consult with the child's school and district to determine the child's educational needs. The study and report are also to cover:

- The social history, environment and present condition of the child and his family;
- The performance of the child in school;
- The presence of child abuse and neglect histories, learning disabilities, physical impairments and past acts of violence;
- The presence of any mental health or substance abuse history, including current participation in mental health counseling, therapy or treatment; and
- Other matters relevant to the child's present status as a delinquent, treatment of the child or proper disposition of the case, including any information required by statute.

The multidisciplinary team includes the following:

- The child's parent(s) or guardian,
- A representative of the school district who has direct knowledge of the child,
- A representative of DFS,
- The child's mental health professional,
- The district attorney or his designee.
- Others which the court could appoint include a substance abuse specialist, a guardian ad litem appointed by the court, and other specialists or persons who have particular knowledge relating to the child or expertise in children's services.

The team reviews the child's personal and family history, school, mental health and DFS records and any other pertinent information, for the purpose of making sanction recommendations. Except for consideration at a hearing on a motion to transfer the case to another court, the court does not consider any report or recommendation under this section prior to adjudication of the allegations in the petition without the consent of the child and the child's parent(s) or guardian or custodian.

DFS is not involved unless the child is placed in their custody. As mentioned earlier, the time frame from arrest to detention hearing varies depending on when the child is arrested (weekend, weekday, late night, etc.) but the law requires a detention hearing within two days after being arrested. DFS becomes responsible for payment of the residential costs of a child placed in juvenile detention if the child is court ordered into DFS custody or if the judge orders DFS to pay residential costs even without placing the child in DFS custody.

John Burman, a professor of law at the University of Wyoming, published an article titled "Juvenile Injustice in Wyoming" in the 2004 Wyoming Law Review, Volume 4, Number 2. He makes an eloquent appeal for the creation of family courts in Wyoming. He believes that the current juvenile justice system "is not really a system at all. It is a maze, which is virtually impossible to navigate." Professor Burman writes that many children who have committed a crime (and fall under the Juvenile Justice Act) are tried as adults in municipal and circuit courts. These children often receive only punishment, not treatment or rehabilitation.

Detention Facilities

It is important to note that juvenile detention facilities under the management of local or county government are exempt from state certification. Private facilities are subject to annual certification by DFS: currently three facilities are certified through DFS as detention facilities. Two of these facilities are owned by Frontier Corrections, a private agency. Those facilities are the Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy, located in Cheyenne and the Regional Juvenile Detention Center (RJDC) in Casper. The Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy is a residential treatment facility (reimbursed through COPS) with detention beds (which are not reimbursed). The third certified facility is the Fremont County Juvenile Detention Center (FCJDC), located in Lander. This is the only certified publicly funded detention center in the state. As mentioned above, a juvenile detention facility under the management of local or county government is exempt from state certification; however, the Fremont County Juvenile Detention Center requested and received that certification. One additional detention facility, the Campbell County facility in Gillette, provides educational services to juveniles. Data for 2003 referred to below come from the Juvenile Jail Roster Report, a study by the Wyoming County Commissioners Association. One report shows data on juveniles held in Juvenile Detention Centers and one shows data on juveniles held in Adult Detention Facilities. The only Juvenile Detention Center responding was Fremont County JDC. Of Wyoming’s 23 counties, two did not participate in the Adult Detention Center survey, 14 reported holding no juveniles in their Adult Detention Center and seven reported they did hold juveniles. Below is a summary table of juveniles held by offense in Adult Jails in 2003 with the average length of stay (ALOS). Similar tables for Juvenile Detention Centers will be shown under FCJDC, as that is the only center that responded to the survey.

Fremont County Juvenile Detention Center

The Fremont County Juvenile Detention Center (FCJDC), co-located with the Fremont County Detention Facility, began serving juveniles in May 2001. Prior to that facility being available, the Fremont County Youth Services agency had developed criteria for a juvenile to be “detained” in a secure setting using the old jail and had pursued community options for juveniles not meeting those criteria. Currently the maximum capacity for detention is 28 juveniles. There are four pods, which have single bed cell design within the pod area. There are three pods for males (twenty beds) and one pod (eight beds) designated for females. All four-pod areas are simultaneously visible from the control area but the pods do not have visual contact with one another. Pods can be adjusted, depending on various population needs and gender ratios but there is no contact between male and female juveniles.

Summary of services by FCJDC:

- Juveniles in short-term detention of four days or less participate in the regular detention programming in a safe, secure environment;
- Juveniles in the facility for five days or longer receive substance abuse screening and mental health screening with written reports, math and reading assessments, learning style assessment and a discharge plan;
- Juveniles in longer-term detention of over a week receive the above services and will participate in a personalized educational program.

When long-term secure placement is needed (in general, over 60 days) it is recommended by FCJDC that a residential treatment program be utilized rather than detention.

Age of Juveniles held in FCJDC in 2003 ranged from 12 through 17, with 85 percent in the 15-16-17 age range. (Eighteen-year-olds are not held in juvenile detention but in the adult side of the Detention Center. If the juvenile has been involved in the educational program prior to turning eighteen, that person can continue to receive educational services when moved to the adult side.)

FCJDC students are enrolled in the Lander School District, with the district receiving ADM and other school funds for them just as any other school site in the district. School continues through summer.

FCJDC staff include an Intake, Assessment, and Discharge Coordinator along with a transition and detention caseworker. Both of these positions are funded through a Juvenile Accountability Block Grant. The security staff members are Fremont County Sheriff deputies with law enforcement training from the Wyoming Law Enforcement Academy.

Fremont County School District #1 provides one instructor (special education certified), one instructional aid, and a certified physical education teacher. Nutrition classes are offered through a cooperative effort with the UW Extension Service and FCSD #1.

Educational costs include the salaries and benefits for one teacher, one teaching aide and contractual providers for after-school educational programs:

- 9 month school year - \$90,868
- 3 month summer school - \$23,694
- Total for 12 months - \$114,562
- Miscellaneous costs for supplies, equipment vary

Education Revenue includes: from the Wyoming Educational Foundation Account, Fremont County School District #1 will receive an estimated \$150,370, based on the small school allowance of \$11,000 per school year and the Average Daily Membership (ADM) of 13.67 students per day this school year. This does not include any additional funding allowed for special education students.

Other costs include:

- 1) Youth services costs - \$84,000
 - Intake, assessment and discharge coordinator
 - Transition and detention caseworker
 - Juvenile Detention Administration, part-time
- 2) Fremont County Sheriff - \$337,500 (estimated)
 - Deputy salaries
 - Building utilities and maintenance

Community resources such as mental health services are utilized at no cost through various grant programs.

A per diem cost of \$100 is charged to entities outside Fremont County to use FCJDC as a regional detention center.

Campbell County Detention Facility

The Campbell County Detention Center, located in Gillette, was constructed in 1985. During FY 04, that facility reported housing 145 juveniles, none over 18 years of age. Blocks of cells used for juveniles are away from adults, as are rooms used for educational programs. Each block is comprised of eight cells, so an entire block is required any time there are female juveniles housed.

The detention facility uses the figure of \$108.41 per day as the cost to house one person.

One teacher has been provided by Campbell County School District #1 to provide education services to juveniles. That program has been operating for eight years and is coed. The detention center pays for materials and supplies. The teacher providing services reported that for the past five years, numbers of juveniles housed and receiving educational services has declined by half and attributes that to judges using more community programs such as Youth Emergency Services (YES House). The average number of days held has more than doubled, however. He stated an average number of juveniles in his classes per day to be six. Many juveniles serve their sentences weekends only so are not involved in the detention education programs.

Education programs include physical education three times per week, Plato computer tutorial programs, individual tutoring and correspondence courses from the University of Nebraska. If a student is in the facility less than ten days, assignments from school are collected and used. If a student is held longer than ten days that student is enrolled in Westwood Alternative High School within the local school district and can earn credits toward graduation through that site. If the student has not been in school, options include working toward a GED or participating in the regular curriculum. There is no summer school offered. If students aged 18-21 are special education qualified or choose to participate, they can continue in academic education programs.

Two counseling sessions per week are provided through the detention center (county funded).

Jeffery C. Wardle Academy Frontier Correctional Systems

The Jeffery C. Wardle Academy was opened in 2001. The Academy is located on a 40 acre site east of Cheyenne. The Academy is designed to provide secure residential treatment as well as detention. The Academy features a new 30,000-square-foot building. In addition there are recreation fields and an indoor horse arena. Currently the maximum capacity for detention is 32 juveniles. There are two pods for detention, which have double bed cell design, within the pod area. Both pod areas are simultaneously visible from the control area but the pods do not have visual contact with one another. Pods can be adjusted, depending on various population needs and gender ratios but there is never contact between male and female juveniles.

Summary of services:

- Four days or less: juveniles may participate in intake services. Assessments are made for suicide potential, substance abuse, physical, mental and emotional condition, etc. Within three days, students usually appear in court. If a student is housed more than two days, the educational program is initiated. This includes academic ability testing. Immediately, home schools are notified of the student's presence.
- Five days or longer: a general plan of education services is developed. Juveniles are registered as a member of the educational program and educational services are offered. Assessments are given to determine learning characteristics, subject achievement status, and course placement. Currently, detention students are given the option to attend schools or remain in their room during school hours. Those that elect to attend school receive more privileges. Juveniles who have completed schooling can participate in programs to build employability skills.
- Longer than one week: if the juvenile will be in the facility for more than ten days, records (including IEPs) are requested from the home school. When possible, available curriculum materials are secured from the home school to continue the student's current program. To fill voids in course offerings available within the facility, computer programs, which allow practice and upward movement in subject areas are used (i.e. SkillsBank, Extra Learning, Phillip Roy, etc.) GED students are assisted in exercises to develop skills within predictor areas.

Age of juveniles held at Jeffery C. Wardle Academy is 12 to 18. The average age is 14-15.

Educational Programs

The Academy provides a state-approved educational curriculum for both regular school courses for grades 5-12 and preparation for GED tests. Post level high-school coursework is offered to students in entry-level college classes and career training. The Academy is using the graduation requirements of Laramie County School District #1. Sending school districts are contacted regarding class assignments. When this is not possible, teachers use grade-appropriate assignments in the core areas to address the skills of the juvenile. The Academy uses SkillsBank, Extra Learning, and Phillip Roy programs to supplement instruction, record seat time and collect work to be included in their Body of Evidence assessments. These materials and data are sent to the juvenile's home school district upon discharge. The education program is structured in two separate settings, core subjects and electives. The "core subjects" are completed in the classroom setting using a variety of techniques to address all eight grade levels and assorted patterns of learning style and ability. The "electives" are offered using a variety of different environments and curricula. Currently, juveniles are able to earn elective credit in physical education, art, life counseling, horsemanship, experimental programming, and life skills.

A per diem cost of \$100 is charged to entities, such as city or county jails, that use the Academy as a regional detention center.

**Regional Juvenile Detention Center, Inc.
Frontier Correctional Systems**

Frontier Correctional Systems acquired the Regional Juvenile Detention Center, Inc. (RJDC) on July 5th, 2000. The RJDC is located on the third floor of the Hall of Justice in Casper. Currently the maximum capacity for detention, as certified by DFS, is 32 juveniles. There are 17 secure cells providing a total of 42 beds in arrangements from one to six beds per cell. The average ratio is 24 males and 8 females. The average daily number of juveniles is 30. In addition to the 17 secure cells there is a control room, locker room, nurse’s station, an intake area, a large day room and small day room. The day rooms are also used as classrooms and recreation areas. There is also a library/classroom/computer room, a teacher’s office, a caseworker’s office, and administrative office.

Summary of services:

- On the first day the student is considered at the intake level. The four levels at the RJDC are Intake, Orientation, Transition and Life Skills. Progression from the lowest level to the highest level depends on their level of safety and their socially appropriate behavior. Upon arrival the juvenile will complete intake procedure, shower and de-lice, receive a

uniform, be seen by the nurse, fill out the admission paperwork packet and be placed in a holding cell for 24 hours. Juveniles remain on the intake level until they complete their packet and have 24 hours in the facility. Juveniles must be successful in Transition for a period of two weeks before they can apply for the Life Skills level.

- Depending on whether or not they can maintain the safety protocol, they would then participate in the regular weekly schedule, which would remain the same whether they were at the RDJC for four days or less, five days or more, or longer than one week. These include life skills and personal hygiene in the morning, room inspections, breakfast, corrective thinking groups, anger management groups, substance abuse groups and educational classes. Educational classes are held Monday through Friday and on Saturday morning, with approximately 25 hours per week of educational time.

Age of juveniles held at RJDC is 12 to 18. The average age is 14-15.

The RJDC is using the graduation requirements of Natrona County School District and is considered to be a part of Roosevelt High School in Casper. Sending school districts are contacted regarding class assignments. When this is not possible, teachers use grade appropriate assignments in the core areas to address the splintered skills of the juvenile. The RJDC uses the A+ program from Natrona County and the SkillsBank program from the Jeffery C. Wardle Academy to supplement instruction, record seat time and collect work to be included in their Body of Evidence assessment. These materials and data are sent to the juvenile's home school district upon discharge. Since many of the juveniles are lacking in reading and writing skills, math skills and social skills, these are the areas of emphasis.

Juvenile Detention and the WDE

Detention is a placement where historically the educational costs have not been paid directly by the WDE. Under 2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, the department may pay up to \$1,000,000 during the current school year to fund educational services provided by detention facilities. This would include any juvenile detention center that provides educational services that are not reimbursed by the school districts. The Special Initiatives Unit and School Improvement Unit of the WDE will monitor the educational programs in the juvenile detention centers.

Juvenile Detention and the School Districts

The level of involvement of Wyoming's 48 school districts with their students placed in detention varies from neglect to complete supervision. The recent Attorney General's opinion states that school districts are responsible for the educational services of their students while in juvenile detention. Fremont County School District No.1, Campbell County School District No.1, and Natrona County School District No.1 are examples of complete supervision. These two programs are described on pages 27 through 29.

The study found that approximately 15 percent of those children going into Frontier Corrections (Casper & Cheyenne) were also court ordered into a RTC or BOCES from the detention facility. Conversely, 85 percent of those placed in juvenile detention were released after their time there.

We also found that approximately 25 percent of those children going into Frontier Corrections (Casper & Cheyenne) were placed there more than once during the period of the study, 7/1/03-6/30/04.

Juvenile Detention Summary

The study found that students in detention appear to receive adequate educational services while detained. The Fremont County Juvenile Detention Center begins providing personalized educational services after one week of detention, with math and reading assessments having been administered previously. At the Jeffrey C. Wardle Academy and the Regional Juvenile Detention Center, the educational program is initiated if the student is housed more than two days, and educational services are provided on the fifth day of detention. Considering the fact that most

juveniles in detention appear in court within three days and many are released from detention at that time, the time frame for educational services appears reasonable. All three of the certified juvenile detention centers mentioned above provide educational services 12 months of the year. The Campbell County Detention Facility does not provide educational services during the summer.

The WDE assures that students in detention are being provided adequate educational services by visiting these centers, reviewing their educational programs, and, if appropriate, approving those programs as required by W.S. 21-13-315. At the present time, the educational programs of the four detention centers reviewed as part of this study have been approved by the WDE. One of the two positions provided by 2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, will provide ongoing monitoring and review of the educational services provided by the detention centers.

SECTION 11 – Concurrent Studies

At this point it is important to note that 2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, asks for information on only portions of the juvenile justice system - COPS facilities defined in W.S. 21-13-315 and the as-yet undefined detention facilities. Thus, facilities such as the state-run Boys and Girls Schools and programs offered in judicial districts and counties as alternatives to detention are not included in this report. There are three concurrent initiatives and studies that should be noted here:

HB 33

HB 33, the Children and Families Initiative, authorizes a 2-year study through the Department of Family Services leading to a comprehensive plan to improve the lives and futures of all children and families in Wyoming. Paraphrasing, the plan will:

- Examine how schools, community organizations, state agencies and the judicial system can work more closely together to enhance sharing of resources and information to meet the needs of parents and children;
- Examine causes of the most serious problems facing children and families, including poverty, mental health needs, violence, the lack of adequate health care, the use of tobacco and illegal drugs and the abuse of alcohol;
- Propose changes that will result in more integrated, efficient and effective programs and cost savings.

The first report on this initiative will be made to the Joint Labor, Health and Social Services Committee by November 2004 and recommendations for the final plan will be submitted by October 2005.

SACJJ

The (Wyoming) State Advisory Council on Juvenile Justice (SACJJ) was created by W.S. 14-10-101 to:

- Advise the governor in the development and review of the state's juvenile justice planning;
- Assist communities in the formation of community juvenile services boards;
- Make recommendation for an equitable funding formula for distribution of funds to community juvenile service boards;
- Review and comment on all juvenile justice, delinquency prevention and juvenile services grant applications;
- Review the progress and accomplishments of state and local juvenile justice, delinquency prevention and juvenile services projects;
- Assist communities to collect, compile and distribute data relating to juvenile justice, delinquency prevention and juvenile services, including an inventory of programs and services available in each county of the state, and identify and make recommendations with regard to areas for which an unfulfilled need for services or programs exists;
- Develop recommendations on establishment of priorities and improvements to juvenile justice, delinquency prevention and juvenile services and report its recommendations to the governor and legislature annually, on or before December 31;

- Review and analyze the proposed budget for each entity of state government which utilizes state or federal funds to administer or provide juvenile justice programs and services and make recommendations to the governor;
- Coordinate the efficient and effective development and enhancement of state, local and regional juvenile justice programs.

This council has no full-time staff and meets quarterly. Currently, Wyoming is the only state not in compliance with the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (JJDP) Act of 1974. The SACJJ has been active in working with this Act and its provisions. One of the main reasons Wyoming is non-compliant is that not all detention facilities used for juveniles meet the criteria of that Act. As such, the state cannot receive formula grant allocations under Part B of Title II of the Act.

However, private nonprofit agencies operating statewide that propose “innovative service delivery programs designed to provide placement alternatives to existing secure confinement placements that are not consistent with the core protections of the JJDP Act” are eligible for these grant funds. The Wyoming County Commissioners Association (WCCA) applied for and received this “non-participating” funding in 1998, and was awarded the accumulated FY95, 96 and 97 amounts for a total of \$1,708,650. In 2001, the WCCA received the amounts for 1998, 1999, 2000 for a total of \$1,851,050. In 2004, WCCA was granted the amounts for 2001 and 2002, totaling \$1,229,000.

The WCCA applied for these funds in an effort to pass them through to participating counties with the goal of developing a range of secure and non-secure alternatives to incarceration and revising associated local policies to move the counties and the state toward compliance with the JJDP Act core detention requirements. These are:

- De-institutionalizing status offenders and non-offenders;
- Separating adult and juvenile offenders in secure institutions;
- Eliminating the practice of detaining or confining juveniles in adult jails and lockups;
- Addressing the disproportionate confinement of minority juveniles in secure juvenile justice system facilities and jails where such overrepresentation exists.

Uses of these funds could also include intensely supervised probation for juveniles, structured and tracked community service, home detention, along with electronic monitoring and forty-eight hour staff-secure shelter and pre/post adjudication holding. Funding could include long-term detention in proper facilities for the 3 to 5 percent who require it, as well as purchase of risk assessment software.

While these various community programs are not necessarily defined as “day programs,” they fit the intent of that term in that they are lower-cost programs offered in local communities which may be effective alternatives to detention or residential treatment facilities.

LSO – Management Audit Study

There is a second study of the COPS program currently being undertaken by the legislature. The Legislative Service Office (LSO) has requested and received financial information on FY03 and prior years' operations of the COPS program from the WDE. Similar reporting was provided by DFS to LSO. In order not to duplicate efforts, our study has concentrated on FY04. We also defer to LSO the study of issues surrounding Normative Services' executive compensation and the internal operations of DFS and the WDH.

SECTION 12 – Statistical Information

The following statistical information regarding the COPS program is provided in partial fulfillment of 2004 Laws, Chapter 111.

* The DFS historical database contains expenses over and above the residential and treatment costs of the COPS Program. DFS spent a considerable amount of time, at the request of the WDE, identifying COPS residential and treatment costs for the time period of this study, FY04. For FY04, residential and treatment costs relative to COPS represented 45.87% of the total expenditures. DFS felt that this percentage was representative of the usual annual cost incurred for these services. As such, in view of the inordinate amount of time and effort it would take the DFS to provide specific historical COPS costs for residential and treatment services, the 45.87% figure was applied to the total annual costs in the DFS database for the fiscal years FY00-FY04. Expenditures in FY2004 show an additional increase in state general fund Medicaid match as the Medicaid program began reimbursing an additional two in-state COPS providers for the costs of residential and treatment services provided by DFS.

The DFS and the WDE have seen costs associated with the COPS program double since 1997. The cost increases have been primarily associated with increases in the number of children served and in treatment costs incurred by the DFS and increases in medical costs incurred by the WDE.

Estimate of Future COPS Costs

The educational services cost paid by the WDE on behalf of the COPS program will increase effective July 1, 2004, because of the legislatively approved tuition rate increases for COPS providers. It is estimated that the provider rate increase will translate to an increase of approximately \$2.5 million in program costs over the next year. The WDE anticipates a slight increase in the average number of COPS children above the 282 level for FY04. It must be pointed out that the ADM of COPS children has increased from 253 in FY03 to 282 in FY04, an increase of 29 ADM at a time when the ADM in many of our school districts is declining. This increase has been attributed, by DFS professionals, to the increased use of methamphetamines by school-aged children. The projections by the DFS are that their monthly COPS expenditures for residential services and treatment will increase slightly (2.1 percent) to an average of \$825,660 per month. They feel the COPS caseload will show this slight increase as a result of increased illicit drug use. Based upon the DFS information, the WDE would anticipate the ADM of COPS children increasing from 282 to 288, an increase in costs of approximately \$116,500. DFS estimates COPS program costs will increase by approximately 3 percent for FY06 and FY07.

The related services (medical) costs paid by the WDE on behalf of the COPS program will decrease over the next year as a result of all providers now billing Medicaid for the allowable medical costs. It is estimated that this will amount to a savings to the COPS program of \$850,000 over the period July 1, 2004 through June 30, 2005.

2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, appropriated \$1,000,000 to be used for reimbursement of educational services provided by the juvenile detention centers. Based upon data submitted to the WDE by the juvenile detention centers for the period 7/1/03 – 6/30/04, it is estimated that approximately \$677,250 will be needed to reimburse the juvenile detention centers for educational services during FY05. This total is based upon 9,030 education days provided during FY04 at \$75.00 per day.

* Actual FY04 COPS medical costs, \$1,055,029, minus the estimated federal share of Medicaid reimbursement ($\$1,322,500 \times 64.27\% = \$849,971$) = \$205,058. These represent those estimated COPS medical costs that Medicaid will not reimburse.

Medicaid expenditure totals throughout this study include billings submitted to Medicaid by both WDE and DFS COPS facilities as well as medical professionals. Medicaid state match expenditures represent the general fund match requirement paid by WDE, DFS, and Medicaid.

SECTION 13 – Recommendations

Cost Efficient Alternatives

One of the tasks assigned to this study by 2004 Session Laws, Chapter 111, is to “examine cost-efficient alternatives to residential and group home placements including day treatment and juvenile detention facilities.”

Our recommendations take into consideration the function and mission of each facility or program as well as the cost of providing those services. The assumption is that if day treatment programs and detention facilities are available and operated effectively, fewer juveniles will need to be placed in longer term residential treatment centers. A corollary is that fewer juveniles will then progress to more involved levels in the judicial system. Other studies have stated that education is seen as the cornerstone of effective intervention. Thus, an essential component of early intervention with court-involved youth is an effective screening system to determine whether a juvenile needs a secure placement or referral to a community alternative to detention where he can continue school attendance.

DFS believes that day treatment is the first priority for placement. The second priority is to place the child for treatment within the community, if local treatment is available.

Day Treatment – At the present time W.S. 21-13-315 requires that a child be court ordered into a facility before the WDE can reimburse that facility for educational and related services costs. Furthermore, the facility must be certified by DFS and its educational program accredited by WDE.

Day treatment, as its name implies, is available during the day to provide treatment services to children in need and allows those children to live at their own or a foster home. The costs of day treatment are estimated to be approximately one-half of the cost of a residential treatment center because the child resides at home and the state is not paying residential costs. Day treatment is only feasible for those children whose home is in close proximity to a facility offering a day treatment program and whose home setting allows for a safe and healthy environment for the child.

Day treatment programs exist in Laramie, Rock Springs, Lander, Cheyenne, Casper, and Gillette. As a result, because these locations are in the larger population centers of the state, the majority of children in the COPS program would be in close proximity to a day treatment program in their home community.

When the initial placement decision is being determined by the court, the DFS advocates strongly for the child remaining under parental custody in the home if at all possible. Often, for a number of reasons, the courts must place these children in facilities providing 24-hour custodial care.

This study cannot recommend day treatment as a cost efficient alternative to residential and/or group home placement because placement considerations are determined by issues weightier and more pertinent than costs. If the DFS and the multidisciplinary team determine

that the child can remain in parental custody and that day treatment is the best course of action, that recommendation will be made to the court, and, in all likelihood, be implemented. If, however, the multidisciplinary team determines, in view of all factors, that the child cannot remain in parental custody, day treatment will not be an option. Additionally, the Attorney General's Office rendered an informal opinion that when a COPS child moves from an RTC or BOCES into a day treatment program, the school district of the child becomes responsible for educational services.

One form of usage of day treatment through the COPS program can occur when the RTC or BOCES facility to which the child has been court ordered determines that the child has progressed satisfactorily through the treatment program and is ready to transition back into the home and the community. The decision to allow the child to be placed in day treatment and return home each day is a joint decision involving the court, the multidisciplinary team, and the treatment facility to which the child was court ordered. This process occurs predominately in those RTCs and BOCES identified earlier that have a day treatment program as part of their service offerings. This study concludes that day treatment programs appear to be utilized to the extent practical considering the aforementioned constraints.

Juvenile Detention - If detention is deemed necessary, then placing the student in their home community in a detention facility with educational services as well as substance abuse and mental health screening components is best practice. As detention center personnel have reported, the function of that setting is a secure placement while information is gathered that can determine the optimum disposition of that juvenile. Once the screening is complete, with multidisciplinary team input, decisions can be made regarding residential treatment placement or alternatives to detention based on what those facilities/programs offer.

This study does not recommend placement in a juvenile detention center as a cost-efficient alternative to residential and group home placement. The detention system and its supporting statutes are predicated upon moving the child out of the detention center as soon as possible. Spending time in detention has serious consequences for students. Suspension or expulsion from school, which often accompanies detention, has been found to be a significant factor in students dropping out of school completely, not to return. This study recommends that when long-term secure placement in excess of 60 days is needed, a residential treatment program be utilized instead of detention.

While it is important that educational services be provided to children in detention, it is also important that the child be moved out of detention as soon as possible. Approximately 52 percent of the children transitioning through a detention center will have IEPs. By federal law, these children must have treatment in the least restrictive environment. We believe that educational and treatment services behind bars is the least effective locale for most children.

Consolidation of Agency Services

As described throughout this report, there are three state agencies involved by statute in the operation of the COPS program. The DFS is responsible for certifying that all group homes and residential treatment facilities meet their established standards and for paying the residential and treatment costs of court ordered children. Furthermore, the DFS is involved in the process from the very beginning, working with courts and multidisciplinary teams regarding the needs of the child and recommending appropriate placement. The WDE is responsible for certifying that the educational programs of detention facilities, RTCs, and BOCES meet the educational standards established by statute and paying the educational and related services (medical) costs of court ordered children. The Medicaid program, housed within the WDH, is responsible for reimbursement of allowable medical costs of court-ordered children.

Our review did not show any areas of duplication of services between these three state agencies and therefore this study recommends no consolidation of agency functions. Each agency performs, by statute, very specific services relative to the COPS program. We found no reason to recommend placement of the COPS program under one or two of the agencies involved because of the specific nature of the services provided by each agency and the fact that there is no overlap of services between agencies. It would simply not be feasible to move a part of the services relative to COPS from one agency to another.

DFS has social workers, child protection workers, etc. who work with courts early in the process concerning a child placed under their custody. DFS recommends appropriate placement to the courts and, by statute, must reimburse the costs of residential care (room and board) and treatment. DFS must also certify all facilities involved with child care, to include those providing services to the COPS program. To transfer the payment portion of the COPS program over which DFS has responsibility to the WDE, for example, would mean that only a portion of the total responsibilities statutorily mandated to DFS regarding the COPS program could be transferred.

The WDE is responsible for reimbursing COPS providers for the expenses of educational and related services. The WDE is also responsible for assuring that educational programs of COPS providers meet the standards established by the State Board of Education. This function is performed by an entirely different section of the WDE than the section that is responsible for reimbursement made to the providers. This section is also responsible for assuring that educational programs of the school districts meet established standards. Therefore, to move the reimbursement function for educational services and related services to DFS, for example, would mean that only a part of the COPS responsibilities assigned by statute to the WDE would be moved. From a staffing point of view, only three full-time positions in WDE are assigned full time to the COPS program. The remainder of the five positions that work in COPS have other duties and assignments within the department.

The Medicaid program within the WDH is responsible solely for reviewing the COPS billings submitted to them by providers and determining that those services are allowable for Medicaid reimbursement. This is a specialized function of WDH and does not seem appropriate for consolidation within another agency.

However, the study strongly believes that educational services can be consolidated by requiring all districts to become involved in the education of their COPS and detention students.

School District Involvement with COPS and Detention

This study has found that many of Wyoming's 48 school districts have no involvement with the education of their enrolled students outside of the walls of the schools. **We recommend that the Legislature enact statutory changes requiring school districts to supervise education and related services of the COPS and detention students.**

There are several reasons for this recommendation. School districts have the primary responsibility for the education of their resident students. When children are placed in treatment facilities by the courts, the districts need to monitor the educational programs children receive in the facilities so that transition from school to facility to school are beneficial for the children's education. The study found that, on average, students are in treatment facilities for 183 days. This transition from school to facility to school often occurs during the same school year. This study also found that approximately half of the students have an IEP which the district should continue to monitor no matter where the student is placed.

For students on an IEP, there would be no additional expense to the districts for the costs of these COPS students as the State reimburses 100 percent of the districts' special education expenses. For both the IEP student and the non-IEP student, districts receive the foundation's ADM funding. Wyoming Statute specifically allows districts to claim the ADM for a COPS student even though the state pays for all of the student's educational costs.

We recommend that separate reporting (under the School Foundation Program) be established for districts in order to reimburse them 100 percent of their COPS expenditures, similar to the reimbursements for special education. This would not cause an increase in funding overall for the state as 100 percent of the costs are currently being paid by WDE.

The Attorney General's Office recently issued a formal opinion stating that school districts are responsible for the educational services of children placed in juvenile detention. This follows with the fact that, by statute, districts are allowed to continue claiming children placed in juvenile detention, RTCs, and BOCES as part of their ADM counts and therefore bear responsibility for certain of the educational services costs.

The study finds this rationale to be even more compelling for students placed in detention facilities. Like homebound and hospitalized students (for whom the districts must provide instruction according to W.S. 21-4-402), students in detention facilities will most likely return to their districts for the completion of their studies. The average length of stay in the three major juvenile facilities is approximately 16 days. Districts need to monitor the educational activities of these students while in this short period of detention and develop a transition plan for their return to their school. Furthermore, there is an equity issue with these detention facilities as some are supported by their local school districts and some are not.

The WDE is a regulatory agency established to assist the state superintendent's general supervision of public schools. The WDE should not have direct supervision over the education of one or two groups of students. School districts need to supervise the education of all of their resident students, whether they are in the classroom, the hospital, the treatment facility, or in a juvenile detention center. We ask that the Joint Education Interim Committee consider placing responsibility of COPS students and detention students at the district level.

Future Studies

The Special Programs Unit of the WDE will provide legislative committees with future updates on their review of educational programs for detention and COPS students. However, with the data accumulated in this study giving a clear picture of the costs of the COPS program, **this study recommends that future investigations and follow-up be assigned to DFS, who has a far greater involvement with the COPS program than does WDE.** While WDE pays for tuition and related services, DFS makes the recommendation, along with the multidisciplinary team, to courts as to which facility the child should be sent. DFS interviews the child and the family. DFS investigates the underlying problems that cause the child to be placed in the program. WDE pays the educational costs and monitors the educational program with two full-time employees and several part-time staff. DFS has a staff of 133 assigned to COPS and related programs.

This study found it difficult to describe the special needs of the COPS children. In future studies DFS may be able to better address the complexities of the program, the diverse facilities, the state-of-the-art treatments, and the family environments of the students.

Additionally, the WDE recommends the creation of a coordinating council, under the auspices of DFS, with members from Health, Education and Family Services to monitor the statewide COPS program.

EXHIBIT A

2004 Laws, Chapter 111

Section 2.

(a)

The department of education shall account for and track children placed under W.S. 21-13-315 and receiving educational services.

The reporting shall provide for the length of time children are receiving services, the types of educational services received and expenditures per child.

The department of education, in consultation with legislative service office, shall combine the information reported and collected under subsection (a) of this section with comprehensive information on the number of children placed in residential treatment facilities, group homes, programs for children with disabilities provided by boards of cooperative educational services and other facilities in which children are placed from the time of detention through court disposition, and shall examine cost efficient alternatives to residential and group home placements including day treatment and juvenile detention facilities.

In addition, the report shall provide detailed information on the length of time a child is placed in a facility or program, the expenditures by the state on behalf of the child for placement in the program or facility, the child's state of residence, expenditures on behalf of the child for any medical costs, and shall include placement and expenditures for each child placed out of state.

The court, the department of family services and the department of health shall provide the department of education necessary information to compile the reports required under this section and shall cooperate with and assist the department with data collection and study efforts.

The compilation of information shall be compared to previous expenditures for these programs and services of children placed under W.S. 21-13-315 and shall provide estimates of future expenditures for these programs and services.


The information collected and compiled under subsections (a) and (b) of this section shall be assembled and reported to the joint appropriations committee and the joint education committee by 12/1/04.

\$50,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the department of education to collect and assemble the information required under this section.

Dear Dr. Blankenship:

In your letter of May 24, 2004, you requested a written opinion on the following question:

Do Wyoming statutes, either specifically or implied, require school districts to provide educational services to children resident to their district while in a juvenile detention facility?

SHORT ANSWER

Responsibility for providing educational services to children in a juvenile detention facility rests with each school district in a cooperative effort with the Department of Education.

DISCUSSION

2004 WYO. SESSION LAWS, ch. 111 § 3(b) states that “[p]rograms *shall* be provided to those children [placed in juvenile detention facilities] medically capable of receiving educational programs.” (Emphasis added). The Legislature, in enacting 2004 WYO. SESSION LAWS, ch. 111 § 3(b), appropriated funds to the Department of Education for the provision of educational

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services to students in detention and provided two (2) additional full-time positions to the Department to carry out this act as well as to monitor the quality and cost of providing educational services to students in detention. *Id.* Although the language of this Act clearly requires educational services be provided to students in detention facilities, the law is silent as to *who* is required to provide those educational services.

When interpreting statutes, the primary consideration is to determine legislative intent. *Fontaine v. Board of County Comm'rs*, 4 P.3d 890, 894 (Wyo. 2000); *State ex rel. Motor Vehicle Div. v. Holz*, 674 P.2d 732, 736 (Wyo. 1983). Legislative intent must be ascertained initially and primarily from the words used in the statute. *Allied-Signal, Inc. v. State Board of Equalization*, 813 P.2d 214, 219 (Wyo.1991); *Phillips v. Duro-Last Roofing, Inc.*, 806 P.2d 834, 837 (Wyo. 1991).

The Wyoming Supreme Court has held that, "a statute is ambiguous only if it is found to be vague or uncertain and subject to varying interpretations." *Allied-Signal, Inc. v. Wyoming State Bd. Of Equalization*, 813 P. 2d 214, 219 (Wyo. 1991), (citing *Story v. State*, 755 P.2d 228 (Wyo. 1988) *cert. denied* 498 U.S. 836, 111 S.Ct. 106, 112 L.Ed.2d 76 (1990)). When a statute is ambiguous, general principles of statutory construction apply to discover legislative intent, including consideration of the statute's purpose and the public policy it is designed to facilitate. *Wyo. Ins. Guar. Assn v. Woods*, 888 P.2d 192, 197 (Wyo. 1994).

The Supreme Court has further held that when determining the legislature's intent, "[a]ll statutes must be construed in *pari materia* and, in ascertaining the meaning of a given law, all statutes relating to the same subject or having the same general purpose must be considered and construed in harmony." *In the Matter of the Worker's Compensation Claim of Brad E. Loberg, v. State of Wyoming, ex rel.*, 2004 WY 48 ¶ 5, 88 P.3d 1045, 1048 (Wyo. 2004).

Because 2004 WYO. SESSION LAWS, ch. 111 § 3(b) does not specifically state what entity is required to provide the required educational services, additional sources must be considered, including the Wyoming Constitution, Wyoming case law and other education-related statutes, to determine the intent of the Legislature. Wyoming's Constitution provides that the legislature is to establish a system of public schools for all Wyoming children. WYO. CONST. Art. 21, § 28. Although the Legislature may establish the system of public schools, Wyoming case law reveals that the local school districts are responsible for providing education to the children residing within their district. *Washakie County Sch. Dist. Number One v. Herschler* 606 P.2d 310, 317 (Wyo. 1980). Moreover, various education statutes also look to the individual school districts to provide children within its boundaries services related to educational purposes. See generally, WYO. STAT. § 21-4-401 (requiring school districts to provide transportation or maintenance for isolated students residing within their district); WYO. STAT. § 21-4-501 (requiring school districts with no high school to pay tuition for students residing in their districts who attend school in other districts); WYO. STAT. § 21-4-102(a) (requiring children between the ages of seven and sixteen to attend school in the district within which the child resides); WYO. STAT. § 21-9-101

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(requiring school districts to have educational standards in conformity with state board of education's rules and regulations).


Because local school districts are responsible for providing educational services to the students residing in their districts, it follows from that premise that, in the absence of direction from the Legislature to the contrary, school districts are also responsible for providing educational services to children in detention. However, districts may seek reimbursement from the Department of Education for the cost of those services and the Department is responsible for monitoring the quality and cost of these services. In sum, when 2004 WYO. SESSION LAWS, ch. 111 § 3(b) is read in conjunction with the Wyoming Constitution, Wyoming case law and the other education statutes cited above, it appears that the Legislature intended to facilitate the provision of educational services to students in detention through a cooperative effort of the resident school district and the Department of Education.

The report shows the number of placements, the facilities and the costs paid by each state agency.


