OVERVIEW

This publication provides a compilation of statistical information covering Pennsylvania high school graduates in public, private and nonpublic schools for the 2004-05 school year. Information is provided on race/ethnicity, gender and intended post-high school activity of graduates, including those who are college-bound. Information is also provided on special populations of the public school graduates: economically disadvantaged, migrant, English language learner and special education.

The source of this data is an annual survey of all Pennsylvania public, private and nonpublic schools having enrollment in grade 12 or secondary ungraded. In the public sector, 598 high schools, 16 comprehensive area vocational-technical schools, 41 charter schools, four consortium-operated alternative high schools and the Scotland School for Veterans Children were surveyed. These public schools had 124,755 graduates. In the private and nonpublic sector, there were 384 high schools with 17,892 graduates. The total number of public, private and nonpublic graduates was 142,647.

For the public schools, the data collection used an individual student report via a web-based system, the Electronic Dropout/Graduate Report (EDGR). For the private and nonpublic schools, the data collection continued to be an aggregate report using a paper form.

During the 2005 calendar year, 8,511 persons, age 19 or less, took the General Educational Development (GED) test in Pennsylvania. Of those, 5,989 passed the test, thereby qualifying to receive the Commonwealth Secondary School Diploma provided they were at least age 18. Individuals less than 18 years old who pass the GED test receive the diploma when they reach age 18. In 2005, there were 5,708 diplomas issued to 18- and 19-year-old recipients.



In each of the sectors, "public" and "private and nonpublic," the total numbers of male and female graduates were very similar. Greater differences in the number of male and female graduates occurred in the public sector. In the white category of this sector there were more male than female graduates. In the black category, the female count was higher. In the private and nonpublic sector, there were more female than male graduates in both the black and the white categories.

Females and males each comprised about 50.0% of the total 2004-05 graduates. The percentages of female graduates within the racial/ethnic categories were as follows: American Indian/Alaskan Native, 53.0%; Asian/Pacific Islander, 49.7%; black, 54.4%; Hispanic, 54.3%; and white, 49.4%.

Minority graduates comprised 18.8% of the public high school graduates in 2004-05, up from 17.4% in 2003-04. Within the private and nonpublic sector, 14.1% of the graduates were minorities, compared to 13.0% in 2003-04. In both sectors from 2003-04 to 2004-05, the percentage of American Indian/Alaskan Native graduates was unchanged while the percentages of other minority graduates increased.

When compared to the total 1995-96 graduates (122,610), the total number of high school graduates in 2004-05 (142,647) represented a 16.3% increase. The total number of graduates has increased each of the last nine years. During this period, the largest increase was 3.9% from 2001-02 to 2002-03. The smallest increase was 0.3% from 1999-00 to 2000-01.

The 2004-05 public school graduate total (124,755) represented an increase of 17.7% from the 1995-96 total (105,981). The number of graduates in the private and nonpublic sector (17,892) was a 7.6% increase from the total in 1995-96 (16,629).

Since 1995-96, there has been a 1.1 percentage point increase in graduates from public schools, and a corresponding decrease in the percentage from private and nonpublic schools. For the three-year period from 1997-98 to 1999-00, the percentage of graduates in both sectors remained constant. In 2000-01, the percentage of graduates from public schools increased by 0.1 percentage point. In each sector, the percentage of graduates remained the same from 2000-01 to 2001-02. In 2002-03 and 2003-04, the percentage of graduates from public schools increased by 0.3 and 0.4 percentage point, respectively. In 2004-05, the percentages remained the same as the previous year.



The number of high school graduates planning to attend college increased from 85,666 in 1995-96 to 105,592 in 2004-05. College-bound graduates represented 71.8% of the public school graduates and 89.4% of the private and nonpublic graduates. Females in the public sector (77.3%) and in the private and nonpublic sector (90.9%) were college-bound at a greater rate than males.

Asian/Pacific Islander females had the highest college-bound percentage; Hispanic males had the lowest percentage. A larger percentage of females than males were college-bound within all racial/ethnic categories, except American Indian/Alaskan Native and Asian/Pacific Islander in the private and nonpublic sector.


COLLEGE-BOUND PUBLIC, PRIVATE AND NONPUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES

In 2004-05, 74.0% of the 142,647 graduates were college-bound, compared to 69.9% of the 122,610 graduates in 1995-96. Of the 124,755 public high school graduates in 2004-05, 71.8% were college-bound, compared to 67.5% of the 105,981 public graduates in 1995-96. Within the private and nonpublic sector in 2004-05, 89.4% of the 17,892 graduates were college-bound, compared to 85.1% of the 16,629 graduates in 1995-96.

A comparison of the post-high school activities of 1995-96 and 2004-05 high school graduates showed the college-bound private and nonpublic graduates increased from 85.1% to 89.4%. For the private and nonpublic graduates who were not college-bound, the percentages decreased for all categories.

The college-bound public graduates increased from 67.5% to 71.8%. The public graduates who were not college-bound showed percentage decreases in all categories except "unknown."

Overall, college-bound graduates increased from 69.9% to 74.0% during this period. Those who were not college-bound showed percentage decreases, except in the "unknown" category.

Pennsylvania showed an 8.5% increase in the number of graduates from 2001-02 to 2004-05. This percentage increase was second to the estimated increase for New Jersey, 19.0%. It was more than twice the estimated increase of the other contiguous states except for Maryland, 7.7%. Nationally, the estimated increase was 5.5% for the same period.

Of the six contiguous states, four had increases in the number of public high school graduates when comparing actual 2001-02 numbers with the estimated 2004-05 figures. New York and West Virginia showed decreases.

Of the 2004-05 public graduates, the largest special population was the economically disadvantaged category followed by the special education category. These two categories consisted primarily of white individuals; black individuals were next in occurrence. Graduates in the migrant category were mainly Hispanic. In the English Language Learner category, Hispanic public graduates were largest numerically, followed by Asian/Pacific Islanders.

English Language Learners included 12.9% of Hispanic public graduates, 11.4% of Asian/Pacific Islanders public graduates, and other race/ethnicity groups as follows: American Indian/Alaskan Natives (2.6%), blacks (1.3%) and whites (0.3%). Overall, 1.2% of the public graduates were English Language Learners.

APPENDIX F

GLOSSARY

- ASB AND/OR AST DEGREE An award granted by a specialized associate degree-granting institution that is authorized to award the Associate in Specialized Business (ASB) and/or the Associate in Specialized Technology (AST) degrees for certain approved programs.
- CHARTER SCHOOL An independent public school established and operated under a charter from the local board of school directors and in which students are enrolled or attend. A charter school must be organized as a public nonprofit corporation. Charter schools are exempt from most state mandates, except those insuring the health, safety and civil rights of students.
- COLLEGE-BOUND GRADUATE A high school graduate planning to enroll in a two- or four-year degree-granting college or university or a specialized associate degree-granting institution.
- COMMONWEALTH SECONDARY SCHOOL DIPLOMA A diploma issued by the Department of Education to Pennsylvania residents who successfully passed the GED test, or who completed one year or 30 semester hours of college work.
- COMPREHENSIVE AREA VOCATIONAL-TECHNICAL SCHOOL (AVTS) A school that enrolls secondary students and provides a total educational program and services for both specialized career and technical education and academic education.
- CONSORTIUM-OPERATED ALTERNATIVE HIGH SCHOOL A school formed as a result of a special program jointure, which enrolls high-risk students, or students who previously dropped out. A special program jointure is an entity established by the boards of school directors in two or more school districts, with approval of the Pennsylvania Department of Education, under Sections 1701-1709 of the Public School Code of 1949, as amended.
- ECONOMICALLY DISADVANTAGED A student who utilizes the free/reduced lunch program at their school.
- ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNER (ELL) A student whose first language is not English and who is in the process of learning English.
- GED TEST The test of General Educational Development to qualify for the Commonwealth Secondary School Diploma, which is issued by the Pennsylvania Department of Education to certify that the holder meets high school graduation requirements set by the State Board of Education.
- HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE An individual who has received formal recognition from school authorities, by the granting of a diploma, for completing a prescribed course of studies in a secondary-level school.
- MIGRANT A child who is, or whose parent or spouse is, a migratory agricultural worker, including a migrating dairy worker, or a migratory fisher, and who, in the preceding 36 months, in order to obtain or accompany such parent or spouse, in order to obtain, temporary or seasonal employment in agricultural or fishing work (a) has moved from one school district to another; (b) in a State that is comprised of a single school district, has moved from one administrative area to another within such district.
- NONPUBLIC SCHOOL A school that is privately controlled by a nonpublic entity and is financed from sources other than public taxation.

OCCUPATIONAL CATEGORIES:

- FARM WORKER Includes agricultural, forestry, fishing and related occupations such as: animal caretaker, farm worker/manager, nursery worker, fisher, hunter, trapper and forestry and logging worker/operator.
- HOMEMAKER Includes those whose primary occupation is homemaking, which involves all aspects of home and family living.
- MILITARY Includes those enlisted in the armed services, national guard, reserves or the merchant marine.

WHITE COLLAR WORKER -

Administrative support, including clerical: supervisor, computer equipment operator, secretary, interviewer, stenographer, typist, information clerk, records processing clerk, bank teller; duplicating, mail, and other office machine operator, communications equipment operator, mail and message distributing; material recording, scheduling and distributing clerk, adjuster, investigator; teacher aide and library assistant.

Executive, administrative, and managerial: accountant, auditor, purchasing agent and buyer.

Sales: cashier, sales representative, sales worker, real estate agent and travel agent.

Professional and technical: health occupations, dental hygienist, dietetics technician, emergency medical technician; social, recreation, and religious worker; artist, musician, athlete, reporter, engineering technician, science technician and computer programmer.

BLUE COLLAR WORKER -

Handlers, equipment cleaners, helpers, and laborers: nursery worker, groundskeeper, gardener, animal caretaker, timber cutting and logging, fisher, hunter, trapper; garbage collector, machine feeder, garage and service station related occupations, vehicle washer, equipment cleaner, hand packer.

Machine operators, assemblers, and inspectors: metalworking and plastic working (lathe, drilling and boring, grinding, metal plating); woodworking machine operator, printing machine operator (printing press, typesetter, compositor, photoengraver and lithographer); textile, apparel, and furnishings machine operator (laundering, dry cleaning, pressing, textile sewing, weaving); assorted materials machine operator (cementing, gluing, packaging, filling, extruding, forming, mixing and blending, painting, baking, pickling, folding, crushing and grinding; photographic process; motion picture projectionist); fabricator, assembler, and hand-working occupations (welder, cutter, trimmer, painter, engraver); production inspector, tester and sampler.

Precision production, craft and repair occupations: mechanic (aircraft, automobile, bus, truck, farm equipment, heavy equipment, heating, air conditioning, refrigeration); repairer (small engine, industrial machinery, electronics, data processing equipment, household appliance, power tools, communications equipment, bicycle, camera, watch, musical instrument, locksmith and safe, office machine, vending machine, elevator, mechanical controls and valve), millwright; construction trades occupations (supervisor, brick mason, stonemason, tile setter, carpenter, electrician, glazier,

power transmission, carpet installer, drywall installer, insulation worker, roofer, sheet metal duct installer, structural metal worker, earth driller; paving, surfacing, and tamping equipment operator); extractive occupations (oil well driller, explosives worker, mining machine operator); metal working and woodworking occupations (tool and die maker, assembler, machinist, boilermaker; grinder, filer and tool sharpener; patternmaker and model maker; engraver, precious stones and metals worker, sheet metal worker, cabinet maker and bench carpenter, furniture and wood finisher); textile, apparel, and furnishings machine worker (dressmaker, tailor, upholsterer, shoe/leather worker); assorted materials worker (hand molder, patternmaker, cutter, optical goods worker, dental laboratory technician; bookbinder, electrical and electronic equipment assembler); food production occupations (butcher, meat cutter, baker, and food batch maker); inspector, tester, grader, adjuster and calibrator; plant and system operator (water and sewage treatment plant and power plant); precision production supervisor.

Transportation and material moving occupations: motor vehicle operator (truck, bus, taxicab); chauffer, parking lot attendant; railroad transportation and water transportation occupations; material moving equipment operator (hoist and winch, crane and tower, grader, dozer, scraper, excavating and loading).

SERVICE WORKER (except private household) -

Cleaning and building service occupations: janitor, cleaner, maid, houseman, elevator operator and pest control worker.

Food service: bartender, chef, cook, food preparation worker, waiter and waitress.

Health service occupations: health aide, nursing aide, orderly and attendant.

Personal service occupations: amusement and recreation facility attendant, baggage porter and bellhop, barber, hairdresser, cosmetologist, guide and usher, child care worker, public transportation attendant and welfare service aide.

Protective service occupations: correction officer, crossing guard, detective, firefighter, fire prevention, guard, police and sheriff.

- OTHER POSTSECONDARY SCHOOL (NONDEGREE) A school licensed or approved by the state to offer a certificate, diploma or some similar type of recognition of achievement issued by the institution.
- PRIVATE SCHOOL A nonpublic school defined by the licensing regulations as one that maintains or conducts classes for the purpose of offering instruction for consideration, profit or tuition, to five or more students at one time or to 25 or more students during the school year.
- RACE/ETHNICITY CATEGORIES Categories used to describe groups to which individuals belong, identify with or belong in the eyes of the community. These categories do not denote scientific definitions of anthropological origins. However, no person may be counted in more than one racial/ethnic category.
 - AMERICAN INDIAN/ALASKAN NATIVE A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North America and who maintains cultural identification through tribal affiliation or community recognition.

- ASIAN/PACIFIC ISLANDER A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent or the Pacific Islands. This includes people from China, Japan, Korea, the Philippine Islands, Samoa, India and Vietnam.
- BLACK (NON-HISPANIC) A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa (except those of Hispanic origin).
- HISPANIC A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race.
- WHITE (NON-HISPANIC) A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa or the Middle East (except those of Hispanic origin).
- SPECIAL EDUCATION Students who are eligible for services under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and who have Individualized Education Program (IEPs) (excluding "gifted"); an IEP means a written statement for a child with disability that is developed, reviewed, and revised in a team meeting in accordance with the regulations governing Special Education programs in PA. The IEP specifies the individual educational needs of the child and what education and related services are necessary to meet the needs.
