

he primary goal of AFT's Redesigning Schools To Raise Achievement (RSRA) project is to build capacity at the state, district, school, and classroom levels to improve student achievement. Through partnerships, the project can help schools and districts meet all of the 11 components of Comprehensive School Reform (CSR) as outlined in the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001.

What are the requirements of CSR?

- Proven methods and strategies based on scientifically based research
- Comprehensive design
- Professional development
- \blacksquare Measurable goals and benchmarks
- Support within the school
- Support for teachers and principals
- Parental and community involvement
- External technical support and assistance
- Annual evaluation
- Coordination of resources
- Strategies that improve academic achievement.
