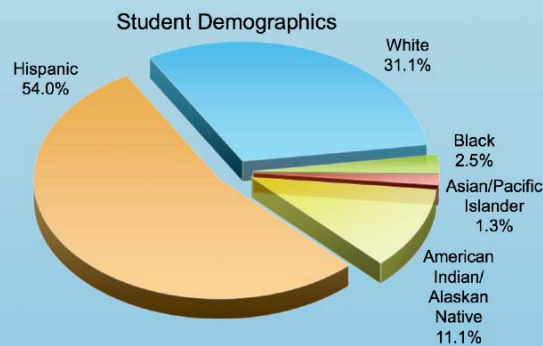

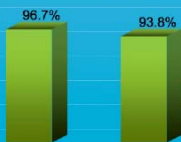

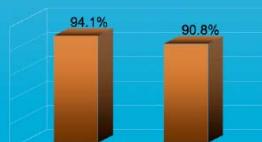
Elementary Classes Taught by Highly Qualified Teachers

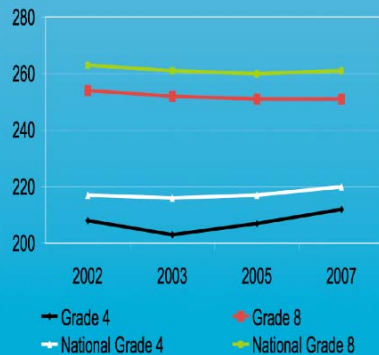

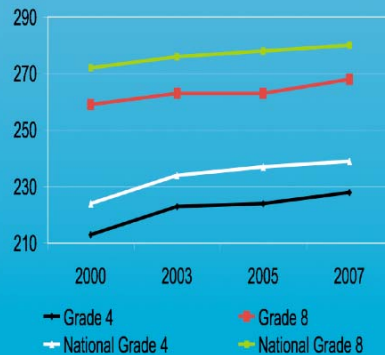

New Mexico Reading Achievement



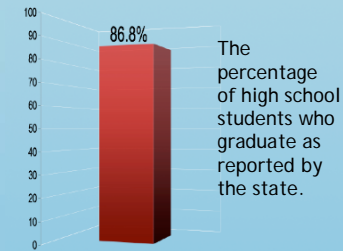
New Mexico Math Achievement

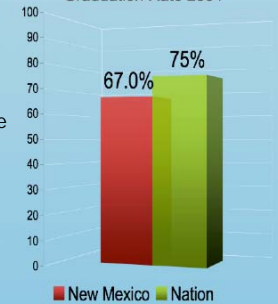
