

Fourth Grade Achievement Gap in Charter Schools Mirrors MPS

A consistent yet troubling reality in education today is the achievement gap that exists by race and income. For example, recently released National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) scores revealed that the gap between the performances of black and white fourth-graders in public schools in Wisconsin on reading was 25 percentage points. One of the reasons that charters are such an exciting education reform is the hope that this gap will be lessened and eventually eliminated. Yet, instead of turning this system upside down, charter schools in Milwaukee are mirroring the test score gap of both MPS and the state, according to the latest test scores. Fourth grade reading scores of white charter school students were 23 percentage points higher than African American and Hispanic students; the MPS gap is 22 points. The gap in math scores in charter schools is even higher at 32 percentage points, slightly above the 25 point gap in MPS.

In 2003-04 there are 35 charter schools in the City Twenty-five received their charters of Milwaukee. from MPS, five from UWM, and five from the City of Milwaukee. These charter schools have an important mandate—freedom from burdensome regulations should spur innovation and lead to improvement in education. At this point charter schools are facing the same hurdle as traditional schools in Milwaukee. How they overcome it is critical for the parents in Milwaukee who want to ensure that their educational choice, either charter or MPS, will lead to real educational improvement for their children. There are exemplary charter and traditional public schools that eliminate the performance gap. Unfortunately, the few schools that do so cannot, on their own, improve outcomes for the city as a whole.


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
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Key Facts

- Overall demographic enrollment of charter schools resembles enrollment in traditional public schools in MPS. For example, charter schools are 60.3 percent African American compared to 59.4 percent in MPS, 19.1 percent Hispanic compared to 18 percent in MPS, and 17.1 percent white compared to 17.3 percent in MPS.
- Six of the 28 charter schools reporting 2002-03 test score data outperformed the state average score on at least one of the state-administered reading tests. These include Highland Community School, IDEAL School, Westside Academy II, and Whittier Elementary School. All of these schools received their charters from MPS. They are joined by Marva Collins Preparatory School, chartered by UWM. Bruce Guadalupe, an MPS chartered school, holds the distinction of surpassing the state average reading score for both the 4th and 8th grade tests.
- Fifteen charter schools serve fourth graders. Of these, 13 report tests for these students. Two schools have fewer than five students. For these schools DPI does not report test score data. Of the reported data, 74 of the students are white, and 437 are African American or Hispanic. For white students in charter schools, 77 percent were proficient or advanced in reading compared to 55 percent of Black/Hispanic. In math, 74 percent of white students were advanced or proficient compared to 42 percent of Black/Hispanic students.

Hispanic Enrollment Growing in Charter Schools

Milwaukee charter schools' racial breakdown still closely mirrors that of Milwaukee Public Schools, but there are some differences. This year the Hispanic student composition is one percentage point higher than in MPS. There was not much change in the percentage of African American students compared to 2002-03, with Milwaukee charter schools' percentage being slightly higher than that of MPS. A decrease in the percentage of white students in both MPS and Milwaukee charter schools occurred this year, but the loss was larger in the charter schools.

In terms of individual schools, there are now two majority Hispanic schools up from one last year. There are now 22 majority African American schools, up from 19, and there are six majority white schools, up from five.

Milwaukee Charter School Enrollment Inching Upward

Once again, Milwaukee charter school enrollment increased from last year to this year. Currently, there are 12,731 students in Milwaukee charter schools. This is a 10.7 percent increase from the 11,497 students that attended charter schools in 2002-03. Nineteen out of the 30 schools from last year had a gain in enrollment, and one school closed (YW Global Career Academy). There are five new schools this year, which accounted for 66 percent of the enrollment growth.

There were two schools that more than doubled in size from 2002-03 to 2003-04. Afro Urban Institute had the largest percent increase: enrollment went from 59 to 159 students, a 170 percent increase. The Milwaukee Leadership Training Center also more than doubled in size with a 112 percent enrollment increase.

For the second year in a row, Milwaukee Urban League Academy had the largest raw number increase, gaining 122 students. Central City Cyberschool had the largest decrease compared to last year, losing 12 percent of its enrollment, or 41 students.

Although the total Milwaukee charter school enrollment has increased every year since the program was initiated, the size of the increase has lessened each year. This year's enrollment increased 11 percent, compared to 22 percent last year. The growth from 1999-00 to 2000-01 was 305 percent. With over 22 new applications submitted this year to open charter schools in Fall 2004, we anticipate a steady increase in the number of charter school students.

MPS Charter Schools Continue to Outscore both City and UWM

Table 3 shows each of the Milwaukee charter schools and their standardized test scores as provided to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction. The data are somewhat limited due to the fact that new schools are not included, and some schools have small numbers of students taking the tests.

As in years past, MPS charter schools scored higher on average than the City and UWM chartered schools on all levels of tests. The difference is especially large on the 3rd grade reading test. The percent of 3rd grade students that scored at or above proficient for all MPS charter schools was 66 percent. The City charter schools had 40 percent of their 3rd grade students at or above proficient and the UWM schools had 35 percent of the 3rd grade students at or above proficient.

On the 4th grade WKCE 56 percent of City and 49 percent of UWM charter school students scored at or above proficient, while 62 percent of the students at MPS charter schools were at or above proficient. On the 8th grade reading test, 65 percent of MPS charter school students scored at or above proficient followed by 52 percent of the UWM charter school students. Only 40 percent of City charter school students scored at or above proficient.

On the 10th grade WKCE, MPS charter schools had a slightly higher percentage of students at or above proficient than MPS overall. The percent of both Milwaukee charter school and traditional MPS students at or above proficient is still well below the state's average.



2003-2004 Charter Schools

A Snapshot of Milwaukee Charter Schools

- Enrollment is increasing in Milwaukee charter schools, but the pace of the increase continues to slow down each year since the 2001-02 school year. Enrollment increased 10.7 percent from the 2002-03 school year, bringing the enrollment to 12,731 students. Individually, two schools, the Afro Urban Institute and the Mil
 - waukee Leadership Training Center, more than doubled in size, with increases of 170 percent and 112 percent respectively.
- This year Hispanic enrollment in Milwaukee charter schools increased by more than three percentage points, mainly due to the fact that there are now two majority Hispanic schools. Both the percent of African American students and the percent of white students decreased from last year.
- MPS charter schools scored higher than the City and UWM charter schools on state standardized tests for 2002-03.
 MPS charter schools also scored higher than traditional MPS schools on Wisconsin's 3rd, 8th, and 10th grade exams.



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
