

# Characteristics of the 100 Largest Public Elementary and Secondary School Districts in the United States: 2007–08

Statistical Analysis Report



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## Highlights

This report describes the characteristics of the 100 largest public elementary and secondary school districts in the United States and its jurisdictions. These districts are defined as the 100 largest according to the size of their student population. The information in this report was provided by state education agency officials to the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) for inclusion in the Common Core of Data (CCD). The report uses data from the 2007–08 school year and includes student membership<sup>1</sup> and staff in public schools and school districts in the 50 states and the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Bureau of Indian Education, the Department of Defense dependents schools (overseas and domestic), and the four outlying areas (American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands).<sup>2</sup> This report also includes graduate counts, high school dropout rates, and graduation rates for the 2006–07 school year and revenues and expenditures for fiscal year (FY) 2007.

Highlights of the report include the following:

- The 100 largest public school districts, representing less than 1 percent (0.6 percent) of all school districts in the United States and jurisdictions, were responsible for the education of 22 percent of all public school students (table 1).
- The 100 largest public school districts employed 21 percent of the United States and jurisdictions' public school full-time-equivalent (FTE) teachers and contained 17 percent of all public schools and 20 percent of 2006–07 school year public high school completers (table 1).
- The 100 largest public school districts had larger average school enrollments compared to the average for all school districts (677 vs. 513) as well as a higher median pupil/teacher ratio (15.4 vs. 15.2) (table 1).
- The majority of students in the 100 largest school districts were Hispanic or Black (63 percent) (table 2). The percentage of students in the 100 largest public school districts who were Hispanic was 37 percent, compared to 22 percent of students in all school districts. The percentage of students in the 100 largest school districts who were Black was 26 percent, compared to 17 percent of students in all school districts.
- In FY 2007, current expenditures per pupil in the 100 largest public school districts ranged from lows of \$6,250 in the Puerto Rico Department of Education and \$5,886 in the Alpine District, Utah to highs of \$21,801 in Boston, Massachusetts and \$20,162 in the New York City Public Schools, New York (table A-14).
- Three states—California, Florida, and Texas—accounted for 45 out of the 100 largest public school districts (table D-3).

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## Introduction

The purpose of this publication is to provide basic descriptive information about the 100 largest school districts (ranked by student membership, that is, the number of students enrolled at the beginning of the school year) for the 2007–08 school year in the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Bureau of Indian Education, the Department of Defense dependents schools (overseas and domestic), and the four outlying areas (American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands). In this report, the term “United States and jurisdictions” refers to these entities. This is different from most National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) reports, which include only the 50 states and the District of Columbia in the totals.

Over one in five public school students in the United States and jurisdictions is served by one of the 100 largest school districts (table 1). These districts are distinct from all school districts by characteristics other than just the size of their membership. They also vary by average school size, median pupil/teacher ratio, and the distribution of students in various racial and ethnic categories (tables 1 and 2).

In this report, the terms “public school districts,” “school districts,” and “elementary and secondary school districts” are used interchangeably. These include regular school districts; local supervisory unions that provide management services for a group of associated school districts; regional education service agencies that typically provide school districts with research, testing, and data processing services; state and federally operated agencies; and other agencies that do not fall into these groupings (e.g., charter schools reported as their own school

districts). A “regular school district,” a subset of “public school districts” or “school districts,” is an agency responsible for providing free public education for school-age children residing within its jurisdiction. With the exception of the New York City Public Schools, New York, all of the 100 largest districts are regular school districts.<sup>1</sup>

To provide context for the information on the 100 largest districts, tables 1–4 provide data for the United States and jurisdictions and data for the 100 largest school districts; tables 1 and 2 also include data for the 500 largest districts. Figure 1 shows the location of the 100 largest school districts. Appendix A presents basic data tables for the 100 largest school districts. Appendix D (tables D-1 to D-4) provides supplementary information about the 100 and 500 largest school districts. Table D-1 lists the 500 largest school districts with some identifying information. Table D-2 is an alphabetic list of the 500 largest districts that includes their rank by membership size. Table D-3 provides a count of the number of 100 largest districts by state. Table D-4 provides selected data for the 100 largest school districts in the 1997–98 school year for comparison with the data in table A-1 for the 2007–08 school year.

## Overview of the 100 Largest School Districts

In the 2007–08 school year, there were 17,817 operational public school districts, 100,930 operational public schools, and almost 50 million students in public schools in the United States and jurisdictions (table 1). Additionally, there were 3.2 million full-time equivalent (FTE)<sup>2</sup> teachers in the 2007–08 school year and almost 3 million high school completers in the 2006–07 school year.<sup>3</sup> The 100 largest school districts comprised less than 1 percent of all public school districts but served 22 percent of all public elementary and secondary students. These school districts contained 17 percent of all public schools and employed 21 percent of all FTE teachers. In comparison, the 500 largest school districts comprised 3 percent of all public school districts, 32 percent of public schools, and served 43 percent (21.5 million) of all public elementary and secondary students in the United States and jurisdictions.

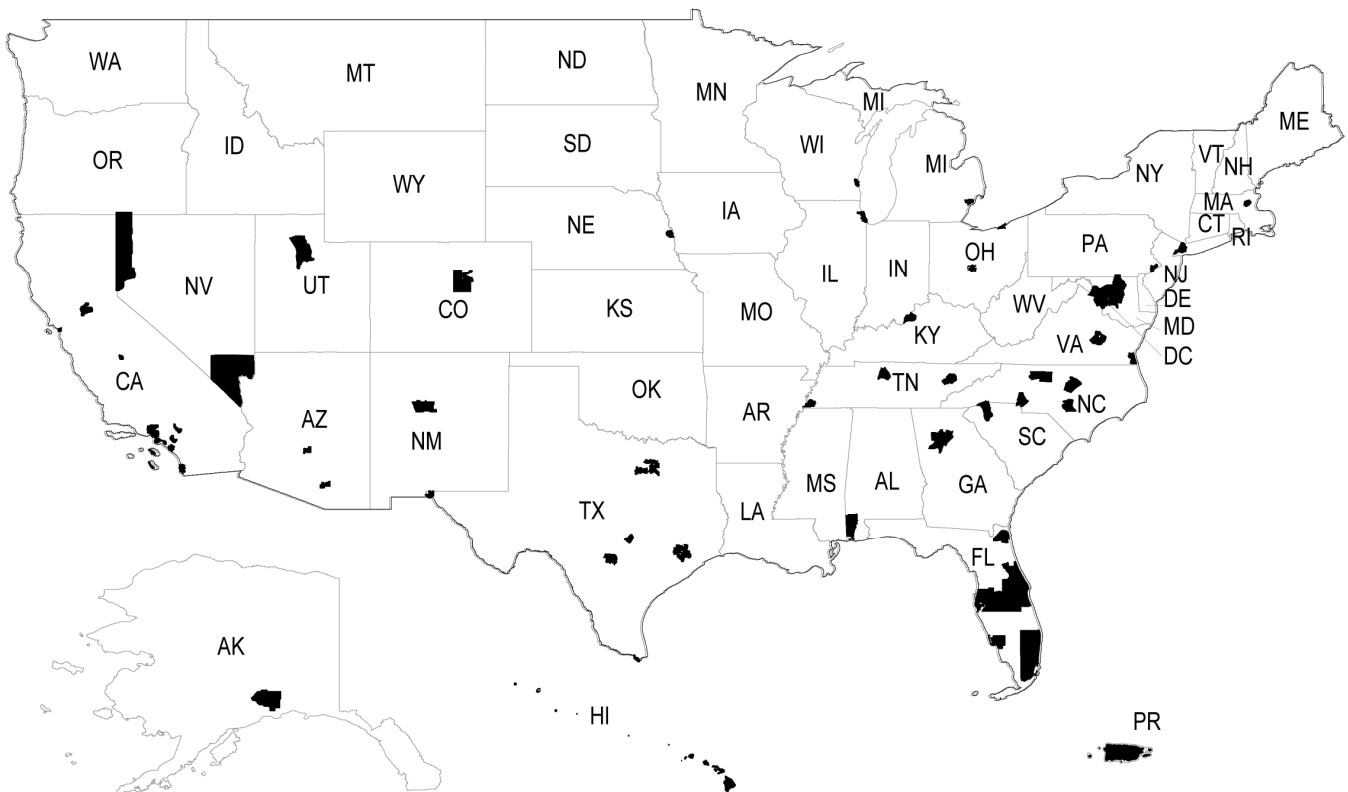

The 100 largest school districts ranged in size from 47,400 to 989,941 students in 2007–08 (table A-1). Twenty-eight of these districts served more than 100,000 students. The largest public school district was New York City Public Schools, New York, with 989,941 students enrolled in 1,454 schools. The next largest was Los Angeles Unified, California, with 693,680 students in 825 schools. The enrollment of each of these two largest districts was greater than the enrollment of each of the 26 smallest states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and the Department of Defense dependents schools (overseas and domestic).<sup>4</sup>

## Where Were the 100 Largest School Districts in 2007?

There were 28 states and jurisdictions that each had at least one of the 100 largest school districts in the 2007–08 school year (table A-1, figure 1, and table D-3). Texas had 18 districts among the 100 largest, followed by Florida with 14 and California with 13. Several other states had more than one district represented among the 100 largest: Georgia, Maryland, and Virginia each had 6; North Carolina had 5; Colorado and Utah each had 4; Tennessee had 3; and Arizona, Nevada, and Ohio each had 2. Each of the following states had one school district among the 100 largest: Alabama, Alaska, the District of Columbia, Hawaii, Illinois, Kentucky, Massachusetts, Michigan, Nebraska, New Mexico, New York, Pennsylvania, Puerto Rico, South Carolina, and Wisconsin. (The District of Columbia, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico have only one school district each for their entire jurisdiction.)

About three-quarters of the 100 largest school districts were located in coastal and Gulf Coast states (see table D-3 for a count of the 100 largest districts by state). The school districts among the 100 largest also tended to be in cities and counties with large populations, with administrative offices typically located in large cities and their

environs. Many of the districts were in states where the school districts have the same boundaries as counties. However, school district boundaries need not be the same as county, city, or town boundaries.

## How Did the 100 Largest School Districts Compare To All School Districts?

### General Characteristics

In the 2007–08 school year, each of the 100 largest school districts had at least 47,400 students, whereas 72 percent of all regular school districts had fewer than 2,500 students (tables 3 and A-1). However, these smaller districts served only 13 percent of all students; 87 percent of students were enrolled in districts of 2,500 or more students (table 3).

The average school district in the United States and jurisdictions had 5.7 schools; in comparison, the 100 largest school districts averaged 169.1 schools per district (derived from table 1). Two of the three largest districts—New York City Public Schools, New York, and the Puerto Rico Department of Education—each had more than 1,400 schools (table A-1).

## **School Characteristics**

Average regular school<sup>5</sup> size based on student membership ranged from a low of 350 students (in the Puerto Rico Department of Education) to a high of 1,472 (in the Gwinnett County School District, Georgia) in the 100 largest school districts in the 2007–08 school year (table A-2). The largest regular school in the 100 largest districts was the 6,306 student Chicago International Charter, Illinois, in the City of Chicago School District 299, Illinois.<sup>6</sup>

The 100 largest school districts had more students per school than the average school district (677 vs. 513) (table 1). Eleven of the 100 largest school districts had an average regular school size of more than 1,000 students (table A-2). In addition to larger school sizes, the 100 largest school districts also had a higher median pupil/teacher ratio than the average school district (15.4 to 1 vs. 15.2 to 1) (table 1). Among the 100 largest public school districts, Alpine District, Utah, had the highest median pupil/teacher ratio in regular schools (26.5 to 1) and the Puerto Rico Department of Education, had the smallest (12.2 to 1) (table A-3). The median pupil/teacher ratio for regular primary schools among the 100 largest public school districts was lower than that for high schools (15.2 to 1 vs. 17.1 to 1).

Of the 15,225 schools with membership in the 100 largest public school districts, 10,025 were primary schools, 2,490 were middle schools, 2,080 were high schools, and 630 were schools with other instructional levels (table A-4). The Puerto Rico Department of Education—which had the most schools with membership in total—had the largest number of primary (870) and other instructional level (185) schools of the 100 largest public school districts, whereas New York City Public Schools, New York, had the largest number of middle schools (263) and high schools (245).

*School staff.* For the United States and jurisdictions,<sup>7</sup> 51 percent of FTE staff were teachers,<sup>7</sup> while in the 100 largest districts 53 percent of staff were teachers (table A-5). Fifty-nine of the 100 largest districts reported that 50 percent or more of staff were teachers, and 8 districts reported that 60 percent or more of staff were teachers (these districts were New York City Public Schools, New York; City of Chicago School District 299, Illinois; Clark County School District, Nevada; Duval, Florida; Greenville 01, South Carolina; Washoe County School District, Nevada; San Francisco Unified, California; and Lewisville Independent School District, Texas). In 25 of the 100 largest school districts 1 percent or more of the staff were district administrators.

*Title I eligibility.* Ninety-eight of the 100 largest school districts reported data for Title I eligible schools and programs for the 2007–08 school year (table A-6). The percentage of Title I eligible schools in these districts ranged from 5 percent (in Jordan District, Utah) to 100 percent (the District of Columbia Public Schools; Santa Ana Unified, California; Cleveland Municipal City, Ohio; and Clayton County, Georgia). Within 98 of the 100 largest school districts that reported data, 60 percent of students attended a Title I eligible school, the same as the percent of all students in the United States and jurisdictions who attend Title I eligible schools (Hoffman 2009).

*Magnet schools and charter schools.* Among the 100 largest school districts there were 1,225 magnet schools<sup>8</sup> (table A-7). The largest number of magnet schools among these districts was in the City of Chicago School District 299, Illinois, with 292 magnet schools (or 46 percent of its schools and 48 percent of its students in magnet schools). There were 821 charter schools administered by the 100 largest school districts in the 2007–08 school year. This number does not include charter schools that are independent of the school district.<sup>9</sup> Three percent of the students in these districts attended one of these charter schools. In the United States and jurisdictions, there were 4,388 charter schools, including both independent and dependent charter schools,

attended by 3 percent of students in 2007–08 (Hoffman 2009). The largest number of charter schools administered by any of the 100 largest school districts was 125 schools in Los Angeles Unified, California.

### **Student Body**

Overall, the 100 largest school districts in 2007–08 enrolled 22 percent of the United States and jurisdictions' public school students (table 1). Certain student characteristics, such as race/ethnicity, poverty level, and disability status, varied across the 100 largest school districts about which the CCD collected data in 2007–08.

*Race/ethnicity.* American Indians/Alaska Natives, Asians/Pacific Islanders, Hispanics, Blacks, and Whites are the five racial/ethnic groups about which the CCD collected data in 2007–08. The 100 largest school districts served 35 percent of the 22.4 million public school students in the United States and jurisdictions who are Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, or American Indian/Alaska Native, compared to serving 12 percent of the 27.5 million students in the U.S. and jurisdictions who are White (derived from tables 1 and 2).<sup>10</sup> In 67 of the 100 largest districts, Whites comprised less than 50 percent of student membership (derived from table A-8). In more than one-third (35) of the 100 largest districts, students who were Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, or American Indian/Alaska Native comprised more than 75 percent of the student membership (table A-8). Seven of the 10 largest school districts had combined Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, and American Indian/Alaska Native student memberships of more than 75 percent.

Even with the relatively high combined Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, and American Indian/Alaska Native membership in the 100 largest school districts, 33 of the districts reported 50 percent or more of their students as White (table A-8 and table A-9). In 6 of these 33 districts, at least 75 percent of students were White (table A-9). In 13 of the 100 largest districts, half or more of the membership was Black. Twenty-three districts reported that the majority of students were Hispanic; 4 of these were among the 10 largest districts. In Hawaii, a one-district state, and San Francisco Unified, California, the majority of students were Asian/Pacific Islander.

*Free and reduced-price lunch eligibility.* The 100 largest school districts had a disproportionate percentage of students eligible for the free and reduced-price lunch program relative to all public school districts. Among the 95 largest school districts that reported free and reduced-price lunch eligibility, 52 percent of students were eligible, compared to 41 percent of students in all districts (table 2). Forty-one of these 95 districts reported 50 percent or more of their students as eligible for the free and reduced-price lunch program (table A-9).

*Students with disabilities.* Approximately 1.3 million students in the 100 largest school districts had Individualized Education Programs (IEPs) (table A-10). Students with IEPs made up 11 percent of all students in these districts, slightly lower than the percentage for the United States and jurisdictions as a whole (12 percent).<sup>11</sup> About 2 percent of the schools in the 100 largest school districts were special education schools (derived from table A-11).

*High school completers, the averaged freshman graduation rate (AFGR), and grades 9–12 dropout rate.* The number of 2006–07 high school completers in the 87 of the 100 largest school districts for which data were available ranged from 1,958 (in the Brownsville Independent School District, Texas) to 31,718 (in the Puerto Rico Department of Education) (table A-12). The AFGR<sup>12</sup> was 63 percent for the 100 largest school districts in 2006–07, as compared to a rate of 74 percent for the United States and jurisdictions (Stillwell 2009). This ranged from a low of 37 percent (in Cleveland Municipal City, Ohio) to a high of 95 percent (in Loudoun County Public Schools, Virginia). For the 99 of the 100 largest school districts for which data were available, the grade 9–12

dropout rate<sup>13</sup> was 7 percent. Among these 99 districts, this ranged from 0.7 percent (in Capistrano Unified, California) to 24 percent (in Detroit City School District, Michigan).

*Enrollment by grade level.* In the 2007–08 school year, the majority of students enrolled in the 100 largest school districts were enrolled in grades prekindergarten through grade 6 (6.1 million) followed by grades 7 through 9 (2.7 million) and grades 10 through 12 (2.3 million) (table A-13). Of the 17 of the 100 largest school districts that used ungraded status for some students, 125,750 students were assigned as ungraded students.

### **Revenues and Expenditures for Fiscal Year (FY) 2007**

All revenue and expenditure data presented in this report are in current (unadjusted) dollars. In the 2006–07 school year (FY 2007), the 100 largest school districts received approximately \$130 billion in revenues for public elementary and secondary education (table A-14). Of this approximately \$130 billion, 31 percent (\$40 billion) went to the 5 largest school districts (New York City Public Schools, New York; Los Angeles Unified, California; Puerto Rico Department of Education; City of Chicago School District 299, Illinois; and Dade, Florida). Current expenditures per pupil in FY 2007 ranged from a low of \$5,886 (in Alpine District, Utah) to a high of \$21,801 (in Boston, Massachusetts) in the 100 largest school districts in FY 2007. (See Glossary section, appendix C for definitions of specific revenues and expenditures.)

Across the 100 largest districts, state sources accounted for 45 percent of revenues, local sources for 45 percent, and federal sources for 10 percent (table A-15). Revenues from the federal government received by the 100 largest school districts constituted between 1 percent (in Loudoun County Public Schools, Virginia) and 18 percent (in the San Antonio Independent School District, Texas) and 29 percent (in the Puerto Rico Department of Education) of all revenues to the district.

The percentage of total current expenditures for instruction ranged from a low of 31 percent (in the Philadelphia City School District, Pennsylvania) to highs of 65 percent (in New York City Public Schools, New York) and 96 percent (in the Puerto Rico Department of Education) in the 100 largest school districts (table A-15).

*Expenditures for charter and private schools.* Payments by, or on behalf of, public school districts to independent charter schools and private schools are not included in the expenditures in this report. In some states these payments are made by some entity other than the public school district, and are therefore not reported on the School District Finance Survey. Information on expenditures for independent charter schools and private schools, for those school districts reporting these expenditures, can be found on the Build a Table application at <http://nces.ed.gov/ccd/bat/>.

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<sup>13</sup> The grades 9–12 dropout rate is calculated by dividing the number of grades 9–12 dropouts by the grades 9–12 enrollment. See the Methodology section, appendix B, for more information.

## Changes in the 100 Largest School Districts Between 1997 and 2007

While there has been considerable change in rank by size within the 100 largest school districts over time, the lists of school districts in 1997–98 and 2007–08 are similar. Only 16 of the 100 largest school districts in 1997–98 were not among the 100 largest school districts in 2007–08 (see table D-4 for a list of the 100 largest school districts in 1997–98).<sup>14</sup>

Between 1997–98 and 2007–08, the number of students in the 100 largest school districts increased by 4 percent, and the number of FTE teachers increased by 21 percent (table 4). However, while the numbers of students and teachers increased between these years, the proportion of the total for the United States and jurisdictions these numbers represent was essentially unchanged. For example, the 100 largest school districts included 23 percent of all students in 1997–98 and 22 percent in 2007–08.

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## Appendix A—Basic Tables

**Table A-1** presents basic data such as the number of students receiving educational services, full-time equivalent (FTE) teachers, 2006–07 completers, and number of schools for each of the 100 largest school districts. Also shown is information to fully identify each school district by its city, county and state, since the name of the district is not always sufficient for this purpose. In this and all of the other basic tables, the districts are shown in descending order of size (students in membership as of October 2007). Since the districts are displayed by the number of students, it is easy to note differences in the numbers of teachers, high school completers, and schools as they relate to districts of similar size. For example, the Baltimore County Public Schools, Maryland, though smaller in size, has more high school completers than the five districts immediately preceding it.

Tables A-2, A-3, A-4, A-6, A-8, and A-9 include only schools with student membership (or regular schools with students, as specified in tables A-2, A-3, and A-4).<sup>1</sup>

**Table A-2** provides information on school characteristics in the 100 largest school districts by displaying school size (students in membership) at different percentile levels, as well as mean school size for each district (computed using regular schools having membership). For example, in New York City Public Schools, New York, the table shows that the smallest 25 percent of schools have student memberships of 384 or less, while the largest 25 percent have student memberships of 805 or more. Dividing all the students in regular schools in the district by the number of such schools yields a mean, or average, size of 685.4 students. If all the regular schools in New York City Public Schools were listed by size, the school at the midpoint on the list (the median) would have 546 pupils in membership.

**Table A-3** presents median pupil/teacher ratios for the schools in the 100 largest school districts by instructional level. For some districts, data were not computed for some instructional levels because data were missing for more than 20 percent of schools.

**Table A-4** provides information on how many “primary,” “middle,” and “high” schools there are in the 100 largest school districts. Grade spans, defined by a school’s lowest and highest grade offered, are used to determine a school’s instructional level. The following four categories are used: *primary* (lowest grade of prekindergarten to 3; highest grade up to 8), *middle* (lowest grade 4 to 7; highest grade 4 to 9), *high* (lowest grade 7 to 12; highest grade 12), and *other* (all other configurations, including PK, K, or 1 to 12).

**Table A-5** presents the percentage distribution of different types of FTE staff in each district. Teachers represented the largest proportion of staff. “Other staff,” which made up 30 percent of the total, is defined in the appendix C—Glossary.

**Table A-6** reports the number and percentage of Title I eligible schools, the percentage of students in Title I eligible schools, and the percentage of students in Title I school-wide eligible programs. The percentage of schools that were Title I eligible ranged from 5 to 100 percent.

**Table A-7** reports magnet and charter schools. Among the 100 largest school districts, all were in states that reported the number of magnet schools or reported that magnet schools did not exist in that state. All districts in states that had charter schools reported the number of charter schools administered by that district. Many charter schools function as their own school districts, which is why a number of the districts in this report do not report any charter schools.

**Table A-8** gives the number of schools in each district in five ranges of percentage of combined Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, and American Indian/Alaska Native student membership, as well as the overall percentage of combined Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, and American Indian/Alaska Native student membership in each district. For example, in 9,248 schools, more than 80 percent of students were Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, or American Indian/Alaska Native. Across all of the 100 largest school districts, 71 percent of students were Black, Hispanic, Asian/Pacific Islander, or American Indian/Alaska Native.

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<sup>1</sup> Schools with membership are schools that have an enrollment of at least one student. In the Common Core of Data (CCD), schools can be reported legitimately with no student enrollment because students can be included in the enrollment for only a single school. For example, if a student is dually enrolled in a regular school and a vocational school, that student can only be reported in the membership of one of these schools. Total number of schools includes schools with and without membership.

**Table A-9** presents the percentage of students in each district by specific racial/ethnic categories. This table illustrates that some school districts are made up of many racial/ethnic groups while others have high concentrations of one group. For example, in Los Angeles Unified, California, 74 percent of students are Hispanic and 11 percent are Black, whereas in the New York Public Schools, New York, the proportions are closer for Hispanic and Black students (40 and 32 percent, respectively).

Also shown in table A-9 is the percentage of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch. Five districts did not report data on the number of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch. Among the 95 of the 100 largest public school districts for which data were available, the percentages of students eligible for free or reduced-price lunch under the National School Lunch Program varied greatly. This percentage ranged from a low of less than 1 percent in the Brownsville Independent School District, Texas to a high of 91 percent in the Puerto Rico Department of Education.

**Table A-10** presents the numbers of students assigned to the schools in the 100 largest school districts. It should be noted that students attending a “non-regular” school (i.e., special education, vocational education, and other or alternative education school) are often counted at their regular home school rather than the school they attend part of the day. The number and percentage of students having Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), in accordance with the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act, Part B, is also shown in table A-10. Except for IEP data, the student counts presented in this table are aggregated from the school level and may differ from counts presented elsewhere in this report that are derived from the school district level. For example, student counts from the district level could include students enrolled in the district but not assigned to a school (e.g., hospitalized or homebound students).

**Table A-11** presents the number of schools in the 100 largest districts by type of school. All but three of the districts have specialized schools devoted to special, vocational, or alternative education. This table also includes schools that do not have students. Schools may not have students for a variety of reasons, the most common being that the school serves a student population that is counted at another school. For example, students with dual enrollment in a regular school and a vocational education school would be counted in only one of these schools.

**Table A-12** presents the number of high school completers (regular diploma recipients and other completers) in the 100 largest school districts in 2006–07. Note that high school completers are reported on the CCD for the previous year (e.g., 2006–07 high school completers are reported on the 2007–08 collection). This table also presents the grades 9–12 dropout rate and the public school averaged freshman graduation rate (using diploma recipients only) for each district for 2006–07 (see appendix B—Methodology for a discussion of the calculation of the grades 9–12 dropout rate and the averaged freshman graduation rate).

**Table A-13** presents data on the number of students assigned to graded (three categories) and ungraded levels. In accounting for their students, 83 of the 100 largest districts assigned all of their students to numbered grades and 17 used the ungraded status for some students in some settings, such as special education, vocational education, and other specialized or alternative education programs. In this table, students assigned to all types of schools are counted in the grade for which they are reported. The student counts presented in this table are aggregated from the school level, and may differ from counts presented elsewhere in this report that are derived from the school district level. For example, student counts from the district level could include students enrolled in the district but not assigned to a school (e.g., hospitalized or homebound students).

**Table A-14** presents with school district revenues and expenditures and is based on fiscal year 2007 (school year 2006–07) local government financial data collected by the Governments Division of the U.S. Census Bureau. It presents the amount of revenue received by source (local, state, and federal); current expenditures and those current expenditures for instruction; and current expenditures per pupil in membership for fiscal year 2007. Data for Puerto Rico were obtained from the CCD National Public Education Financial Survey (NPEFS).

Whereas table A-14 shows with the dollar amounts of revenues and expenditures, **table A-15** presents the percentage distribution of revenues by source as well as the percentage of current expenditures spent on instruction. For example, the 100 largest school districts received 45 percent of their revenues from state sources and spent 53 percent of their current expenditures on instruction.

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## Appendix B—Methodology

The source of the data for this report is the 2007–08 Common Core of Data (CCD). There are three nonfiscal CCD surveys that collect basic descriptive data on public education in the nation: the school survey (Public School Universe Survey), local education agency survey (Local Education Agency Universe Survey), and state survey (State Nonfiscal Survey). These data are collected through the U.S. Department of Education’s Education Data Exchange Network (EDEN) data collection system. Fiscal CCD data are gathered at the state level by the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) in the National Public Education Financial Survey (NPEFS) and at the local level in the Annual Survey of Local Government Finances (F-33 series of the Census of Local Governments) conducted by the Governments Division of the U.S. Census Bureau. The most recent fiscal year for which data are available is 2007. Puerto Rico fiscal data were taken from the fiscal year 2007 NPEFS.

CCD data are provided by state education agencies (SEAs) from each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the Bureau of Indian Education, the Department of Defense dependents schools (overseas and domestic), and four outlying areas (American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands). Data for all of these states and jurisdictions are included in this report. If a data item is marked “data not available,” it indicates the state or jurisdiction did not report the data item in its CCD submission.

Districts represented in this report have various sizes and geographic locations. The District of Columbia, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico are each administered as one school district. Some districts comprise a substantial portion of a state’s total student membership, while others make up only a small fraction of membership.

### **Data Quality**

CCD data are reported by SEAs for individual schools and districts within the state, as well as for the state as a whole. Staff at NCES and the U.S. Census Bureau work with the SEAs to clean and edit the data. State coordinators correct or confirm any numbers that are challenged in the NCES edits. NCES accepts the states’ responses to these edit questions; however, in a limited number of situations, if the SEA does not provide NCES with the explanation or new data for an item, NCES will suppress or edit the data.

NCES challenges SEA data under several circumstances. Some examples of edits include numbers appearing out of range when compared to national averages, the previous year’s data, or internal state reports. If a response is logically impossible, NCES will consult with the state and replace the response with a logically acceptable alternative. For example, in the 2007–08 CCD, the following districts reported counts of zero in the following staff categories: City of Chicago District 299, Illinois, LEA administrators; and Boston, Massachusetts, library media staff. The states were consulted about these values, and as a result the values were changed to “not available.” As another example of an edit, if a reported total is less than the sum of the detail comprising that total, the total will be changed to the sum of the detail. Data may also be adjusted for confidentiality.

Counts of teachers for the District of Columbia Public Schools, District of Columbia, were underreported for charter schools within the district. Therefore, pupil/teacher ratios based on these teacher counts are suppressed in table A-3.

### **Item Nonresponse**

Some items were not available for some school districts. The following items describe nonresponse in the CCD school and agency universe surveys that affected the information presented in this report:

- no data on instructional support staff for Mobile County, Alabama;
- no data on library media staff for Boston, Massachusetts;
- no data for local education agency (LEA) administrators for the City of Chicago School District 299, Illinois;

- no pupil/teacher ratio data for other instructional levels for Pinellas, Florida, Fulton County, Georgia, and Tucson Unified District, Arizona;
- no Title I data for the Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools, North Carolina and the Tucson Unified District, Arizona, and no schoolwide Title I data for the Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools, North Carolina, the Tucson Unified District, Arizona, and the Douglas County School District No Re , Colorado;
- no data on free and reduced-price lunch eligibility for the Wake County Schools, North Carolina, the Guilford County Schools, North Carolina, the Columbus City Schools, Ohio, the Cumberland County Schools, North Carolina, and Cleveland Municipal City, Ohio;
- no data on students with IEPs for the New York City Public Schools, New York, and the Davidson County School District, Tennessee;
- no other high school completer data for the New York City Public Schools, New York, Wake County Schools, North Carolina, the Charlotte Mecklenburg Schools, North Carolina, the Detroit City School District, Michigan, the Albuquerque Public Schools, New Mexico, the Milwaukee School District, Wisconsin, the Granite School District, Utah, the Mesa Unified District, Arizona, the Guilford County Schools, North Carolina, the Tucson Unified District, Arizona, the District of Columbia Public Schools, the Cumberland County Schools, North Carolina, and the Forsyth County Schools, North Carolina ; and
- no dropout data for the Puerto Rico Department of Education.

### ***High School Completers, Grades 9–12 Dropout Rate, and Averaged Freshman Graduation Rate***

This report presents counts of high school completers, the grade 9–12 dropout rate, and an averaged freshman graduation rate. The term “high school completer” includes both diploma recipients and other high school completers, but not high school equivalency recipients. The averaged freshman graduation rate only includes diploma recipients; it does not include other high school completers or those receiving a General Education Development (GED)-based equivalency credential.

*Diploma Recipients.* These are individuals who are awarded, in a given year, a high school diploma or a diploma that recognizes some equivalent level of academic achievement. They can be thought of as students who meet or exceed the coursework and performance standards for high school completion established by the state or other relevant authorities.

*Other High School Completers.* These individuals receive a certificate of attendance or some other credential in lieu of a diploma. Students awarded this credential typically meet requirements that differ from those for a high school diploma. Some states do not issue an “other high school completion” type of certificate, but award all students who complete school a diploma regardless of what academic requirements the students have met. In order to make data as comparable as possible across states, this report includes both regular and other diploma recipients in its total number of high school completers. High school equivalency recipients are not included.

*Exclusion of High School Equivalency Recipients.* High school equivalency recipients are awarded a credential certifying that they have met state or district requirements for high school completion by passing an examination or completing some other performance requirement. High school equivalency diplomas are considered valid completion credentials, but high school equivalency recipients are not included in the total number of completers.

*Grades 9–12 dropout rate.* The grades 9–12 dropout rate estimates the percentage of public high school students who left high school between the beginning of one school year and the beginning of the next without earning a high school diploma or its equivalent (e.g., a GED) and do not meet any of the following exclusionary conditions: transfer to another public school district, private school, or state- or district-approved education program; temporary absence due to suspension or school-approved illness; or death. It is calculated by the following method:

$$\text{Dropout Rate} = \frac{[\text{Number of Grade 9 – 12 Dropouts}]}{[\text{Total Grade 9 – 12 Enrollment}]}$$

Ungraded enrollment within each agency is redistributed across other grades in proportion to the graded enrollment.

*Averaged freshman graduation rate (AFGR)*. The averaged freshman graduation rate provides an estimate of the percentage of high school students who graduate on time (i.e., within 4 years of entering 9<sup>th</sup> grade for the first time). The rate uses aggregate student enrollment data (to estimate the size of an incoming freshman class) and aggregate counts of the number of diplomas awarded 4 years later. The incoming freshman class size is estimated by summing the enrollment in 8<sup>th</sup> grade in one year, 9<sup>th</sup> grade for the next year, and 10<sup>th</sup> grade for the year after and then dividing by three. The averaging is intended to account for higher grade retentions in the 9<sup>th</sup> grade compared to 8<sup>th</sup> and 10<sup>th</sup> grades. Ungraded students reported to the CCD were prorated into the individual grade enrollment counts. Thus

$$\text{AFGR} = \left( \frac{\text{Number of diploma recipients in 2006 – 07}}{\text{Average 9th - grade enrollment}} \right) \bullet 100$$

### ***More Information on CCD Methodology***

*New York City Public Schools, New York*. New York did not report the New York City Public Schools as a single district in 2007–08. The state reported a total of 33 geographic districts comprising what had been the New York City Public Schools in previous years. For this report, data for the 33 geographic districts were aggregated to provide data for the New York City Public Schools, New York district.

For more information on CCD universe surveys and response rates, see Numbers and Types of Public Elementary and Secondary Schools From the Common Core of Data: School Year 2007–08 (Hoffman 2009), Public Elementary and Secondary School Student Enrollment and Staff Counts From the Common Core of Data: School Year 2007–08 (Sable and Noel 2009), and Public School Graduates and Dropouts From the Common Core of Data: School Year 2006–07 (Stillwell 2009). These reports discuss missing data and data quality and present state totals for CCD data items from the school, agency, and state surveys. They include state-idiosyncratic treatment of charter and magnet schools as well as schools and districts with no student membership.

*Counts of Students with Individualized Education Programs (IEPs), Colorado Districts*. Colorado did not report IEP counts for any regular school districts in 2007–08, and therefore did not have IEP counts for any of its districts that are in the 100 largest districts in the United States and jurisdictions. Instead, IEP counts were reported in special administrative unit districts that either represent data for a single regular district or for a collection of small regular districts. For the purposes of this report, the IEP counts reported for the special administrative units determined to be associated with each of the 100 largest school districts that are in Colorado were used as a count of IEPs for that district.

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## Appendix C—Glossary

**alternative education school**—A public elementary/secondary school that (1) addresses needs of students that typically cannot be met in a regular school, (2) provides nontraditional education, (3) serves as an adjunct to a regular school, or (4) falls outside the categories of regular, special education, or vocational education.

**American Indian/Alaska Native**—A person having origins in any of the original peoples of North and South America (including Central America), and who maintains tribal affiliation or community attachment. (OMB directive, 1977, 1997)

**Asian/Pacific Islander**—A person having origins in any of the original peoples of the Far East, Southeast Asia, the Indian subcontinent, or the Pacific Islands. This area includes, for example, Cambodia, China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, Thailand, Vietnam, Guam, the Philippine Islands, Samoa, and other Pacific Islands. (OMB directive, 1977)

**averaged freshman graduation rate (AFGR)**—An estimate of the number of entering high school freshman graduating in 4 years. The rate is the number of diploma recipients divided by the average of 8th graders 5 years ago, 9th graders 4 years ago, and 10th graders 3 years ago.

**Black**—A person having origins in any of the black racial groups of Africa. (OMB directive, 1977, 1997)

**Bureau of Indian Education school and district**—A school or district that is directly funded by the Bureau of Indian Education (formerly Bureau of Indian Affairs), U.S. Department of the Interior.

**charter school**—A school providing free public elementary and/or secondary education to eligible students under a specific charter granted by the state legislature or other appropriate authority, and designated by such authority to be a charter school.

**current expenditures**—Funds spent operating local public schools and local education agencies, including such expenses as salaries for school personnel, student transportation, school books and materials, and energy costs, but excluding capital outlay, interest on school debt, payments to private schools, and payments to public charter schools.

**diploma, high school**—A formal document certifying the successful completion of a secondary school program prescribed by the state education agency or other appropriate body.

**dropout**—A student who was enrolled in school at some time during the previous school year; was not enrolled at the beginning of the current school year; has not graduated from high school or completed a state- or district-approved educational program; and does not meet any of the following exclusionary conditions: has transferred to another public school district, private school, or state- or district-approved educational program; is temporarily absent due to suspension or school-approved illness; or has died. Item was first collected in 1992–93.

**dropout rate, grades 9–12, high school**—The grades 9–12 (high school) dropout rate is the percentage of students enrolled in any of grades 9 through 12 at the beginning of a school year who are dropouts as of the beginning of the subsequent school year. See also, “Dropout.”

**federal revenues**—Include direct grants-in-aid to schools or agencies, funds distributed through a state or intermediate agency, and revenues in lieu of taxes to compensate a school district for nontaxable federal institutions within a district’s boundary.

**free and reduced-price lunch eligible**—The number of students who are eligible for the Free and Reduced-Price Lunch Program under the National School Lunch Act, which provides cash subsidies for free and reduced-price lunches to students based on family size and income.

**full-time equivalency (FTE)**—The amount of time required to perform an assignment stated as a proportion of a full-time position and computed by dividing the amount of time employed by the time normally required for a full-time position.

**guidance counselors/director**—Professional staff assigned specific duties and school time for counseling students and parents, addressing learning problems, evaluating student abilities, and assisting students in career and personal development. The state applies its own standards in apportioning the aggregate of guidance counselors/directors into the elementary and secondary level components.

**high school completers**—Students who completed the course of public elementary and secondary education offered by the school district and who received a high school diploma, or who met other requirements of completion as defined by state law or policy. Does not include high school equivalency recipients.

**Hispanic**—A person of Mexican, Puerto Rican, Cuban, Central or South American, or other Spanish culture or origin, regardless of race. (OMB directive, 1977, 1997)

**Individualized Educational Program (IEP)**—A written instructional plan for students with disabilities designated as special education students under the Individuals With Disabilities Education Act (IDEA, Part B). Each plan includes a (1) statement of the child’s present levels of educational performance, (2) statement of measurable annual goals, including academic and functional goals, (3) for children with disabilities who take alternate assessments aligned to alternate achievement standards, description of benchmarks or short term objectives; (4) statement of the special education and related services and supplementary aids and services; and (5) statement of any individual accommodations that are necessary to measure the academic achievement and functional performance of the child on state and districtwide assessment; and if the IEP Team determines that the child must take an alternate assessment instead of a particular regular State or districtwide assessment of student achievement, a statement of why the child cannot participate in the regular assessment and why the particular alternate assessment selected is appropriate for the child.

**instructional aide**—Staff assigned to assist a teacher with routine activities associated with teaching (i.e., activities requiring minor decisions regarding students), such as monitoring, conducting rote exercises, operating equipment, and clerking. Include tutors if position does not require teaching credentials. Include only paid staff. Exclude volunteer aides.

**instructional coordinator and supervisor**—Staff supervising instructional programs at the school district or subdistrict level. Including supervisors of educational television staff; coordinators and supervisors of audiovisual services; curriculum coordinators and in-service training staff, including teacher mentors; Title I coordinators and home economics supervisors; and supervisory staff engaged in the development of computer-assisted instruction. School-based department chairpersons are excluded. (School-based department chairpersons are reported under “school administrator.”).

**instructional expenditures**—Current expenditures for activities directly associated with the interaction between teachers and students, including teacher salaries and benefits, supplies (such as textbooks), and purchased instructional services. (See also, “Current Expenditures”).

**instructional level**—The lowest and highest grade offered by a school determines its instructional level. The four instructional levels are: primary (lowest grade of prekindergarten to 3; highest grade up to 8), middle (lowest grade 4 to 7; highest grade 4 to 9), high (lowest grade 7 to 12; highest grade 12), and other (all other configurations, including PK, K, or 1–12).

**instructional support staff**—Includes instructional coordinators and supervisors and instructional aides. (See also, “instructional coordinator and supervisor” and “instructional aide”).

**librarian or media specialist**— A professional staff member or supervisor assigned specific duties and school time for professional library services activities. Professional library service activities include selecting, acquiring,

preparing, cataloging, and circulating books and other printed materials; planning the use of the library by students, teachers, and instructional staff; and guiding individuals in the use of library books and material maintained separately or as a part of an instructional materials center.

**library media staff**—Includes librarian or media specialist and library and media support staff. (See also, "librarian or media specialist" and "library and media support staff".)

**library and media support staff**—Staff member who renders other professional library and media services. Includes library aides and those involved in library/media support. Duties of these staff members include selecting, preparing, caring for, and making available to instructional staff, equipment, films, filmstrips, transparencies, tapes, TV programs, and similar materials maintained separately or as part of an instructional materials center. Include activities in the audiovisual center, TV studio, related work-study areas, and services provided by audiovisual personnel.

**local education agency (LEA)**—The government agency at the local level whose primary responsibility is to operate public schools or to contract for public school services.

**local revenues**—Include revenues from such sources as local property and nonproperty taxes, investments, and student activities such as textbook sales, transportation and tuition fees, and food service revenues.

**magnet school or program**—A special school or program designed to attract students of different racial/ethnic backgrounds for the purpose of reducing, preventing, or eliminating racial isolation (50 percent or more minority enrollment); and/or to provide an academic or social focus on a particular theme (e.g., science/math, performing arts, gifted/talented, or foreign language).

**outlying areas**—Includes American Samoa, Guam, the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands, and the U.S. Virgin Islands.

**per-pupil expenditures**—Current expenditures for public elementary and secondary education in a state divided by the student membership. The numbers reported here, based on membership, can be expected to be smaller than per-pupil expenditures based on average daily attendance because membership counts are generally larger than average daily attendance.

**primary school**—A school offering a low grade of prekindergarten to 3 and a high grade of 8 or lower.

**public school**—An institution that provides educational services and: (1) has one or more grade groups (prekindergarten through grade 12) or is ungraded; (2) has one or more teachers to give instruction; (3) is located in one or more buildings or sites; (4) has an assigned administrator; (5) receives public funds as primary support; and (6) is operated by an education agency.

**pupil/teacher ratio**—The ratio of pupils to teachers in a school district, based on the total number of pupils (student membership) and the total full-time-equivalent (FTE) number of teachers reported in the schools associated with the school district. The pupil/teacher ratio does not represent class size, but rather is a district-level measure of pupils and teachers.

**regular school**—A public elementary/secondary school providing instruction and education services that does not focus primarily on special education, vocational/technical education, or alternative education, or on any of the particular themes associated with magnet/special program emphasis schools.

**regular school district**—Agency responsible for providing free public education for school-age children residing within its jurisdiction. This category excludes local supervisory unions that provide management services for a group of associated school districts; regional education service agencies that typically provide school districts with research, testing, and data processing services; state and federally operated school districts; and other agencies that do not fall into these groupings.

**revenues**—Additions to assets that do not incur an obligation that must be met at some future date, do not represent exchanges of fixed assets, and are available for expenditure by the local education agencies in the state. Revenues include funds from local, intermediate, state, and federal sources.

**school administrator**—Staff whose activities are concerned with directing and managing the operation of a particular school. Category includes principals, assistant principals, and other assistants; and persons who supervise school operations, assign duties to staff members, supervise and maintain the records of the school, and coordinate school instructional activities with those of the education agency, including department chairpersons.

**schools having membership**—Schools at which students counts are greater than zero.

**schoolwide Title I eligible school**—A school that is a Title I eligible school and its percentage of low-income students is at least 40 percent. (See also “Title I Eligible School”).

**special education school**—A public elementary/secondary school that focuses primarily on special education—including instruction for any of the following students with: autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, hearing impairment, mental retardation, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, serious emotional disturbance, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, visual impairment, and other health impairments—and that adapts curriculum, materials, or instruction for students served.

**state revenues**—Include both direct funds from state governments and funds in lieu of taxation. Revenues in lieu of taxes are paid to compensate a school district for nontaxable state institutions or facilities within the district’s boundary.

**teacher**—A professional school staff member who instructs students in prekindergarten, kindergarten, grades 1–12, or ungraded classes and maintains daily student attendance records.

**Title I eligible school**—A Title I eligible school is a school designated under appropriate state and federal regulations as being high poverty and eligible for participation in programs authorized by Title I of P.L. 107-110. A Title I eligible school is one in which the percentage of children from low-income families is at least as high as the percentage of children from low-income families served by the LEA as a whole or that the LEA has designated as Title I eligible because 35 percent or more of the children are from low-income families.

**two or more races**—A person choosing more than one of the five race categories. (OMB directive, 1997)

**vocational education school**—A public elementary/secondary school that focuses primarily on providing formal preparation for semiskilled, skilled, technical, or professional occupations for high school-age students who have opted to develop or expand their employment opportunities, often in lieu of preparing for college entry.

**White**—A person having origins in any of the original peoples of Europe, North Africa, or the Middle East. (OMB directive, 1977, 1997)
