

2009 Science Assessment Content

Guided by a new framework, the NAEP science assessment was updated in 2009 to keep the content current with key developments in science, curriculum standards, assessments, and research. The 2009 framework organizes science content into three broad content areas.

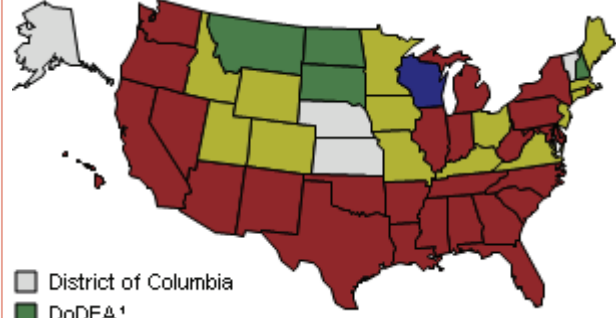
Physical science includes concepts related to properties and changes of matter, forms of energy, energy transfer and conservation, position and motion of objects, and forces affecting motion.

Life science includes concepts related to organization and development, matter and energy transformations, interdependence, heredity and reproduction, and evolution and diversity.

Earth and space sciences includes concepts related to objects in the universe, the history of the Earth, properties of Earth materials, tectonics, energy in Earth systems, climate and weather, and biogeochemical cycles.

The 2009 science assessment was composed of 143 questions at grade 4, 162 at grade 8, and 179 at grade 12. Students responded to only a portion of the questions, which included both multiple-choice questions and questions that required a written response.

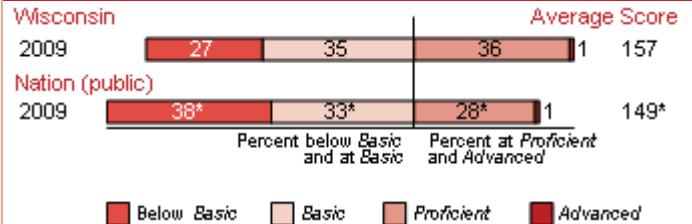
In 2009, the average score in **Wisconsin** was

- lower than those in 5 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 27 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 14 states/jurisdictions
- 5 states/jurisdictions did not participate

Overall Results

- In 2009, the average score of eighth-grade students in Wisconsin was 157. This was higher than the average score of 149 for public school students in the nation.
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 38 percent in 2009. This percentage was greater than the nation (29 percent).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 73 percent in 2009. This percentage was greater than the nation (62 percent).

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, male students in Wisconsin had an average score that was higher than female students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 44 points lower than White students. This performance gap was wider than the nation (36 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 30 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (30 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 28 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (28 points).
