
Overall Results

- In 2009, the average score of fourth-grade students in Chicago was 202. This was lower than the average score of 210 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Chicago in 2009 (202) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (201) and was higher than their average score in 2002 (193).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in Chicago at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 49 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2002 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in Chicago who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 16 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (16 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (11 percent).
- The percentage of students in Chicago who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 45 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (44 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (34 percent).


Achievement Level Percentages and Average Score Results

NOTE: Detail may not sum to totals because of rounding. Large cities are located in the urbanized areas of cities with populations of 250,000 or more.


Scores at Selected Percentiles

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, female students in Chicago had an average score that was higher than that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 34 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (35 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (28 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low income, had an average score that was 28 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (32 points).
