
Overall Results

- In 2009, the average score of eighth-grade students in Colorado was 266. This was higher than the average score of 262 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Colorado in 2009 (266) was not significantly different from their average score in 2007 (266) and was not significantly different from their average score in 1998 (264).
- In 2009, the score gap between students in Colorado at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 41 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1998 (40 points).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 32 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (35 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 1998 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 78 percent in 2009. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2007 (79 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 1998 (77 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2009 to Other States/Jurisdictions



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2009, female students in Colorado had an average score that was higher than that of male students.
- In 2009, Black students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (22 points).
- In 2009, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than that of White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (26 points).
- In 2009, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than that of students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (21 points).
