
## **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Wisconsin was 245. This was higher than the average score of 240 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Wisconsin in 2011 (245) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (244) and was higher than their average score in 1992 (229).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Wisconsin at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 38 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1992 (38 points).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 47 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (45 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (24 percent).
- The percentage of students in Wisconsin who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 86 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (85 percent) and was greater than that in 1992 (71 percent).





In 2011, the average score in Wisconsin (245) was

- lower than those in 4 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 30 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 17 states/jurisdictions

## Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 34 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (37 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 23 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1992 (25 points).
- In 2011, male students in Wisconsin had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 23 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (22 points).
