
## **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Illinois was 219. This was not significantly different from the average score of 220 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Illinois in 2011 (219) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (219) and was not significantly different from their average score in 2003 (216).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Illinois at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 49 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2003 (53 points).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 33 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (32 percent) and was not significantly different from that in 2003 (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in Illinois who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 65 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (65 percent) and was greater than that in 2003 (61 percent).







- lower than those in 20 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 13 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 18 states/jurisdictions

## **Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 33 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (34 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 27 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (31 points).
- In 2011, female students in Illinois had an average score that was higher than male students by 6 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 32 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2003 (35 points).
