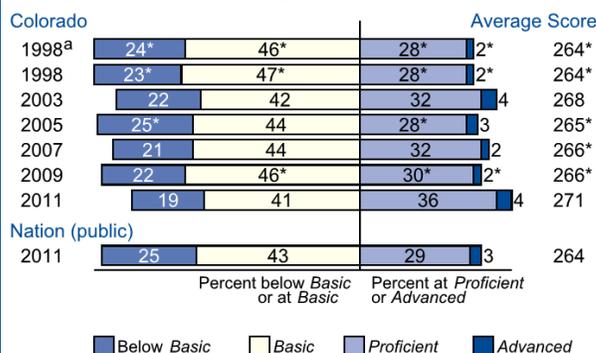


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Colorado was 271. This was higher than the average score of 264 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Colorado in 2011 (271) was higher than their average score in 2009 (266) and was higher than their average score in 1998 (264).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Colorado at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 43 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 1998 (40 points).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 40 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (32 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (30 percent).
- The percentage of students in Colorado who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 81 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (78 percent) and was greater than that in 1998 (77 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

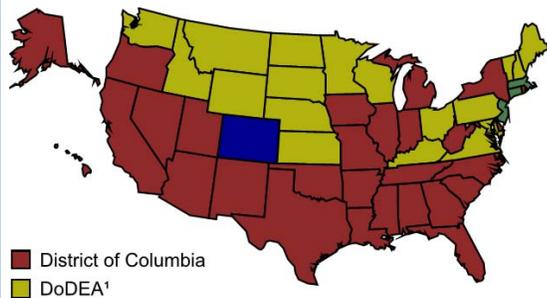

Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions

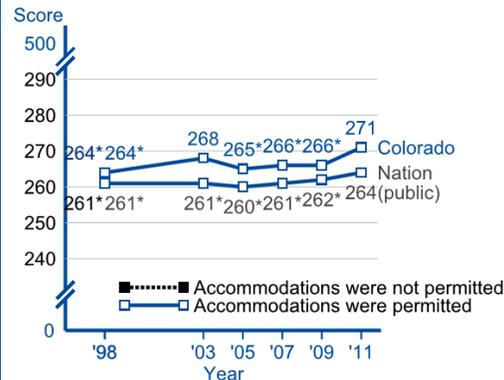

In 2011, the average score in **Colorado** (271) was

- lower than those in 3 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 29 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 19 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 21 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (22 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 24 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (26 points).
- In 2011, female students in Colorado had an average score that was higher than male students by 6 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 27 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1998 (21 points).
