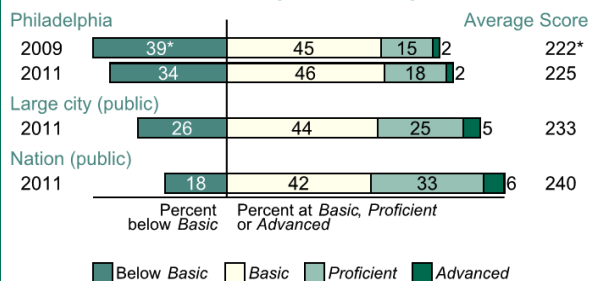


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Philadelphia was 225. This was lower than the average score of 233 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Philadelphia in 2011 (225) was higher than their average score in 2009 (222).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Philadelphia at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 38 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (37 points).
- The percentage of students in Philadelphia who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 20 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (16 percent).
- The percentage of students in Philadelphia who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 66 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (61 percent).

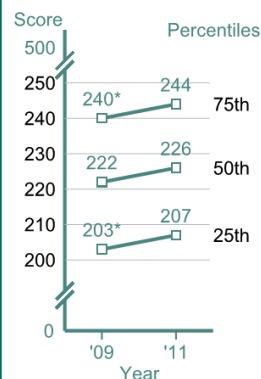
Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



* Significantly different ($p < .05$) from district's results in 2011. Significance tests were performed using unrounded numbers.

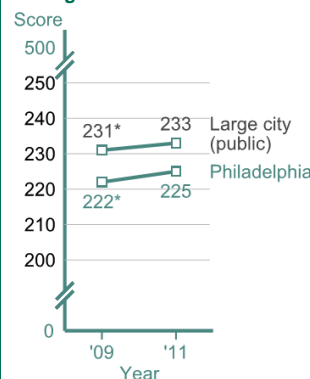

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 23 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 20 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (18 points).
- In 2011, male students in Philadelphia had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 20 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
