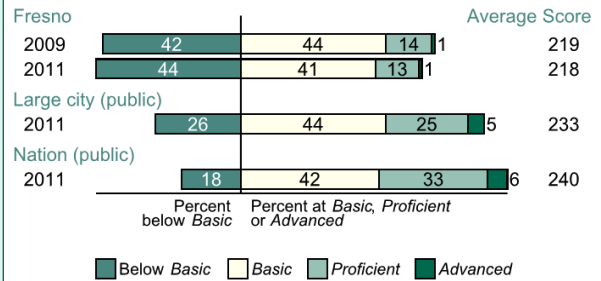


Overall Results

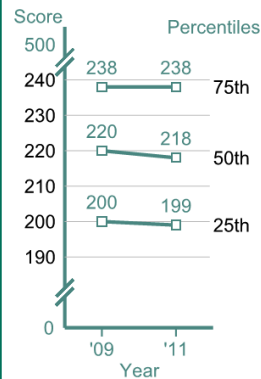
- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Fresno was 218. This was lower than the average score of 233 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Fresno in 2011 (218) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (219).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Fresno at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 39 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (38 points).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 15 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (14 percent).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 56 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (58 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

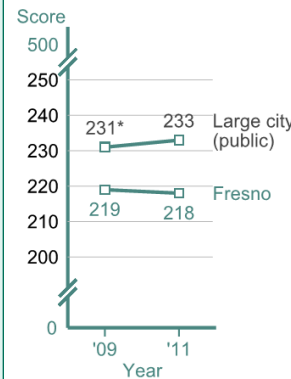

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 24 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (24 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 25 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (21 points).
- In 2011, male students in Fresno had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 37 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was wider than that in 2009 (28 points).
