
### **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Baltimore City was 226. This was lower than the average score of 233 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Baltimore City in 2011 (226) was higher than their average score in 2009 (222).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Baltimore City at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 34 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (32 points).
- The percentage of students in Baltimore City who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 17 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than that in 2009 (13 percent).
- The percentage of students in Baltimore City who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 68 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (64 percent).





# Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 21 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (20 points).
- Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2011, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, male students in Baltimore City had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 17 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (13 points).
