
Nation's Reading Report Card 2011 Trial Urban District Snapshot Report

Overall Results


- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Philadelphia was 199. This was lower than the average score of 211 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Philadelphia in 2011 (199) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (195).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Philadelphia at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 48 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (50 points).
- The percentage of students in Philadelphia who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 13 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (11 percent).
- The percentage of students in Philadelphia who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 43 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (39 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 22 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (24 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 26 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (28 points).
- In 2011, female students in Philadelphia had an average score that was higher than male students by 15 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 23 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (21 points).
