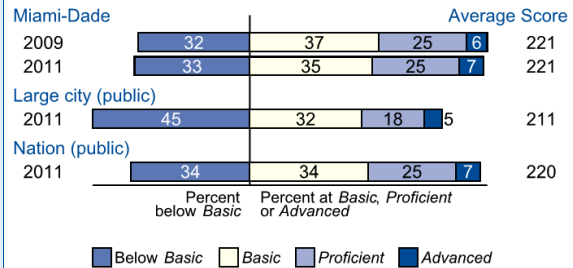


Overall Results

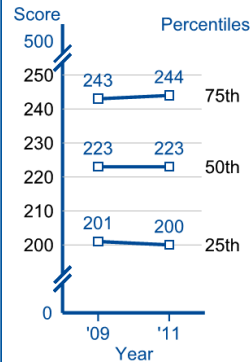
- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Miami-Dade was 221. This was higher than the average score of 211 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Miami-Dade in 2011 (221) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (221).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Miami-Dade at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 44 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (42 points).
- The percentage of students in Miami-Dade who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 32 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in Miami-Dade who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 67 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (68 percent).

Achievement-Level Percentages and Average Score Results

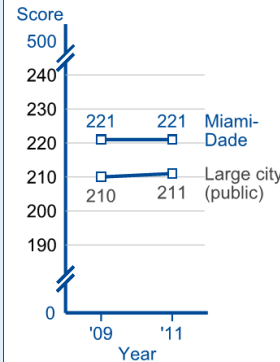

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 17 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (14 points).
- In 2011, female students in Miami-Dade had an average score that was not significantly different from male students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 21 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (20 points).
