
### **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Los Angeles was 201. This was lower than the average score of 211 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Los Angeles in 2011 (201) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (197) and was higher than their average score in 2002 (191).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Los Angeles at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 48 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2002 (52 points).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 15 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (13 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (11 percent).
- The percentage of students in Los Angeles who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 45 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (40 percent) and was greater than that in 2002 (33 percent).





# **Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 29 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (37 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 28 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2002 (38 points).
- In 2011, female students in Los Angeles had an average score that was higher than male students by 10 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 33 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was wider than that in 2002 (14 points).
