
#### **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of fourth-grade students in Fresno was 194. This was lower than the average score of 211 for public school students in large cities.
- The average score for students in Fresno in 2011 (194) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (197).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Fresno at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 48 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (48 points).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 11 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (12 percent).
- The percentage of students in Fresno who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 37 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (40 percent).








## Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 25 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (25 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 26 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
- In 2011, female students in Fresno had an average score that was higher than male students by 10 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 41 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
