FALL 2003 COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT IN CONNECTICUT COMPREHENSIVE REPORT

Total enrollment at Connecticut's 46 colleges and universities¹ reached an all-time record of 170,624 in fall 2003. (See Tables 1 and 3.)

A November report titled, *Fall 2003 College and University Headcounts in Connecticut*, analyzed headcount enrollment by status, level, institution and sector.² This broader report discusses general trends in headcount enrollment; analyzes data on full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment; and presents demographic details on residence, race, freshmen, migration of recent high-school graduates, gender and age.

GENERAL TRENDS

The fall 2003 total of 170,624 students is the highest ever for Connecticut and eclipses last year's total of 169,748, which in turn beat a previous 13-year-old record of 169,132 set in 1989. This is the sixth consecutive year of growth since 1997 when total enrollment (154,029) was the lowest of the last quarter century.

However, this year's increase of 876 students (or 0.5%) was anemic compared to recent growth rates. Enrollment growth for the previous four years averaged 2.4 percent a year and saw a minimum of 1.8 percent growth in 2000.

Public institutions enrolled 63 percent of all students, and the independents had the other 37 percent. The 12 community colleges are the largest sector of higher education in Connecticut, enrolling more than one in every four students. The 18 regional independents are a close second. Those two sectors constitute a slight majority of statewide enrollment.

The overall statewide growth (0.5%) was consistent between the public institutions (up 0.4%) and the independents (up 0.7%.) Within the public sector, increases occurred at the University of Connecticut (UConn) campuses (up 3.0%) and across the 12 community colleges (up 0.6%.) Connecticut State University (CSU), however saw a decline (1.9%) across its four campuses.

The statewide growth masks a 3.5 percent increase in full-time enrollment and a 4.1 percent decline in part-time enrollment. Full-time students reached a low of 50.7 percent in 1992, but by 2003 reached a solid majority of 62 percent.

Especially striking is the growth in traditional students (defined here as full-time undergraduates who are younger than 25) between 1995 and 2003.

Those traditional students, however, still are a minority of the statewide total — 48 percent in 2003 vs. 39 percent in 1995.

The total fall 2003 enrollment consists of 80 percent undergraduates (52% full-time; 28% part-time), 18 percent graduate students, and two percent first-professional students (medical doctors, broadly defined; lawyers and clergy).

FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT (FTE) ENROLLMENT

FTE enrollments are a more standardized and comparable measure because they re-express the total credit hours taken by all students as the hypothetical headcount if every student were taking a full-time course load. Table 2 displays both headcount and FTE data by level for every institution, along with the percent change for each total since last year.

As shown, Table 2, the statewide headcount enrollment of 170,597³ translates into 126,529 FTE enrollment, meaning that the “average” student is just under three-fourths, full-time (.74 FTE). The 12 community colleges, whose headcount enrollment of 45,610 (26% of the state total) made it the largest of the six major sectors, falls to third place in its FTE enrollment of 24,158 — 19 percent of the state total, behind the 26 percent share of statewide FTE for the regional independents and the 21 percent for CSU.

The increase this year of 2.1 percent in FTE enrollment, compared to the 0.5 percent rise in headcount enrollment, indicates a larger average credit load. The average FTEs by sector this year are:

- .98 at the national independents (i.e., virtually all full-time)
- .83 at UConn
- .81 at the regional independents
- .73 at CSU
- .53 at the community colleges

Although total headcount this year was only 1,465 (or 0.9%) higher than the previous enrollment peak in 1989, this year's FTE of 126,529 is 15,891 (or 14.4%) above the 1989 FTE of 110,638. This largely reflects a growth in average FTE from .65 in 1989 to .74 this year, meaning more full-time students are enrolling. Tables 3 (headcount) and Table 4 (FTE) present 15 years of enrollment data.

DEMOGRAPHIC PROFILE

RESIDENCE. Total enrollment in fall 2003 is comprised of 74 percent Connecticut residents, 22 percent out-of-state students and four percent non-resident aliens. (Non-resident aliens are non-citizens who are in the U.S. on student visas.)

The percentage of out-of-state students enrolled in Connecticut colleges has been growing since 1991 except for two years that saw dips. The number of non-resident aliens, after increasing two percent in 2002 (the year following the 9/11 terrorist attacks), fell by four percent in 2003.

Table 5 displays this breakdown by level and sector during the last six years. At the undergraduate level in recent years, the in-state share of students ranges from virtually all (i.e., 97%-98%) at the community colleges and UConn regional campuses to less than 15 percent at the national independents (Connecticut College, Trinity, Wesleyan and Yale). Non-resident aliens represent a much larger share at the graduate level, especially at UConn (22%) and Yale (28%).

In the last six years (1997-2003) at the UConn Storrs campus, out-of-state undergraduates have more than doubled in raw numbers (from 1,683 to 3,553) and went from just under 15 percent of total undergraduates to over 23 percent. Although the number of in-state undergraduates has risen every year since 1995, their share of the total has fallen from 84 percent to 75 percent.

RACE/ETHNICITY. Data on race and ethnicity among college students in Connecticut for fall 2003 appear in Tables 6 (all enrollments) and 6-A (undergraduate enrollments only). Total enrollment of minority students is just over one in five (20.6%) among all students and two percentage points higher (22.6%) among undergraduates.⁴

From 1982 to 2003, the share of total minority students has well more than doubled (from 8.2% to 20.6%), with the larger increases coming in the early 1990s. The share of African Americans has just about doubled during the last 21 years, while the percentages of both Hispanics and Asian Americans have more than tripled.

As seen below, the overall minority share among college students in fall 2003 (20.6%) is just barely under the share in the general Connecticut population (20.7%) but higher than that same share among the adult population (18.5 %).

Among the four minority communities, Hispanics are the only group whose representation among college students still is significantly less than their representation in the general population, under either definition. The share of African Americans among college students (9.3%) is not much higher than the share among the general population (8.7%) but is more significantly higher compared to the adult population (7.9%).

Minority students are more underrepresented among degree recipients than they are among the general college student population. In fall 2002, the minority share of enrollment was 19.6 percent, while at the end of that academic year the minority share among those receiving degrees or certificates was 15.7 percent. That 15.7 percent share of degrees for minorities in 2002-03 is about equal to the 15.8 percent share of minority enrollments back in fall 1995. We expect that recent gains in minority enrollments will soon show up in degree production.⁵

FIRST-TIME FRESHMEN. A total of 26,811 students enrolled as first-time freshmen in fall 2003. (See Tables 7 & 8.) Of that total, 22,963 (84%) were full-time.

First-time freshmen represent 54 percent of those with freshmen status (the other 46% were enrolled in the past — either at their current college or elsewhere -- but have not earned enough credits to reach sophomore status), 22 percent of all degree-seeking undergraduates and 16 percent of all college students.

The data splits into four categories: a) Connecticut residents; b) three adjacent states (MA, NY and RI); c) the rest of New England (ME, NH and VT) and the Northeast (PA and NJ) and d) all other U.S. (41 states and DC). The data also excludes foreign students and those with unknown residence.

The sectors are arrayed from narrowest to broadest geographic diversity and show that only the combined category of national independents and the U.S. Coast Guard Academy enroll more than half of their domestic freshmen from outside Connecticut and its three neighboring states.

Eighty-three percent of first-time freshmen graduated from high school in the last year, two-thirds (68%) of all freshmen (including the foreign ones excluded in the table above) were from Connecticut and a slight majority (51%) were both recent high school graduates and from in-state. That pool of in-state, high school graduates is expected to increase until the year 2008.

Complete reporting of this data (i.e., designating recent high school graduates) has only been available for the last five years. Between 1999 and 2002, the share of first-time freshmen who were both in-state and recent high school graduates ranged between 44 and 48 percent. This year's 51 percent is the first time that a majority of incoming freshmen were both in-state and recent high-school graduates.

RECENT HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES. The data on those recent high school graduates who enroll as first-time freshmen yields two sets of numbers — a predictor of likely enrollment trends in the near future, and statewide data on in-state retention and net balance of trade.

Recent high school graduates from Connecticut who enroll in Connecticut colleges are the “seed corn” for future enrollments, especially at four-year colleges. A student who re-enrolls as a college senior in fall 2003 and graduates with the class of 2004 this spring represents one year of enrollment, while an in-state recent high school graduate who enrolls as a freshman is more likely to yield four years of enrollment, due to higher retention/graduation than other freshmen. Schools with major declines in freshmen enrollment in effect are eating their seed corn.

The next exhibit shows a 2003 statewide growth of nine percent in those “premium” freshmen and almost no change (-0.01%) in all other undergraduates. Three of the four sectors listed in the table (which enroll 88% of undergraduates) had higher growth among those freshmen than among all other undergraduates, and thus planted their seed corn. CSU saw just the opposite and by default ate their seed corn. CSU thus faces a drag on enrollment over the next few years.

Less-timely statistics on inter-state migration of recent high school graduates is available from 2000 (the last year of complete data).⁶

The top row of the table below shows that 22,812 Class of 2000 high-school graduates from Connecticut enrolled as college freshmen that fall. Of that total, 11,824 (or 52%) enrolled in a Connecticut college and the other 10,988 Connecticut high school graduates were “exported” to other states. This was the first time since regular biennial data collection began in 1992 that Connecticut retained a majority (52%) of its high school graduates who went directly to college. (Connecticut retained 46% in 1992, 47% in both 1994 and 1996 and 49% in 1998.)

The left column of this table shows that 19,613 recent high school graduates from across the U.S. enrolled in Connecticut colleges in Fall 2000. As already noted, 11,824 of them lived in Connecticut, meaning that the other 7,789 were “imported” from other states. Those 7,789 imported students less the 10,988 exported students means that Connecticut continues as a net exporter of 3,199 students.

Preliminary data for 2002 strongly suggest that the pattern for 2000 continued — i.e., that Connecticut again retained a majority of its recent high school graduates who went directly to college, but also exported more high school graduates to colleges in other states than it imported.

GENDER. The 98,972 female students enrolled in Connecticut colleges in fall 2003 constitute 58 percent of the total enrollment, with both that number and percentage representing all time records. (See Tables 9 & 10.)

According to the U.S. Census in 2000, females made up 49 percent of the Connecticut population between ages 15 and 29. (The 15-29 age bracket provides 76% of Connecticut's total college students this year.) The only age groups in the general population that are anywhere near 58 percent female are for those age 65 or over.

This increased representation of females is part of a trend that started at least 43 years earlier. Women represented 35 percent of full-time undergraduate enrolment in 1960. They were 40 percent of all enrollment in 1970, became a majority of Connecticut college students by 1978, and were at 55 percent by 1986 before first reaching 58 percent in 2002.

Because the number of Connecticut males has increased since 1976, a male in 2003 is less likely to attend college than a male 27 years ago.

The female majority is nearly uniform between undergraduates (58% female) and graduate students (59% female), although they are more likely than men to be part-time students at both levels. However, women fall just short of a majority (49%) in the first-professional fields of training medical doctors (broadly defined), lawyers and clergy. Women are extremely likely to become a majority at this level soon because they were 29 percent of first-professional students in 1976, have been above 40 percent since 1986 and first exceeded 45 percent in 2000.

This decisive female majority in college enrollment also appears in degree recipients. That majority is actually slightly magnified at that end of the education pipeline, because women received 59 percent of all degrees and awards during 2002-03, vs. their likewise 58 percent share among all enrollment at the start of that year, in fall 2002.⁵

AGE. Connecticut undergraduates in 2003 tend to be younger than their counterparts from previous years. (See Table 10A & 11.) The percent of undergraduates age 25 or older, which peaked at 37 percent in 1994, has declined every year since and was at 27 percent in fall 2003.

This general pattern holds at each of the three largest sectors in higher education in Connecticut, which together enroll 74 percent of all undergraduate students. At the community colleges, regional independents and the CSU campuses, the share of undergraduates over age 25 has decreased for at least six consecutive years — from 58 percent in 1997 to 48 percent in 2003 at the community colleges and from 30 percent then to 20-21 percent now at both regional independents and CSU. (The share of older undergraduates also seems to be declining at UConn where they fell below 10% this year, but no clear trend is evident for either the national independents or the two-year independents.)

The following exhibit shows the age distribution for both undergraduate and for combined graduate and first-professional enrollment in fall 2003.⁷ Also included in the exhibit is the Connecticut age distribution from the 2000 Census, which counted every person living in the state (regardless of her or his permanent residence) as of April 1, 2000. (Students physically in Connecticut, whether living on or off campus, should have been counted by the Census Bureau as residing in Connecticut.) Note that the census data is 3½ years older than the enrollment data.

Although there is much imprecision in this comparison, the data gives a rough sense of the share of each age bracket attending college — for example, the 41,099 Connecticut undergraduate students who are age 18 or 19 vs. the 84,014 Connecticut residents age 18 or 19 (in 2000) suggests that just under half (49%) of those 18 or 19 are undergraduates. More than a quarter (29%) of those aged 20-24 seem to be undergraduates, while only one in 25 of those between 25 and 34 (inclusive) appear to be enrolled as undergraduates.

Note the distinction between the just presented “percent attending” data and “share of the total market” data. The 36,776 undergraduates age 25 or older are a very significant share (27%) of total undergraduate enrollment. Because, however, they come from a pool of almost 2.3 million Connecticut residents age 25 or older, those 36,776 represent just 1.6 percent of that population pool.

The other 98,842 undergraduates who are under age 25 comprise the remaining 73 percent of undergraduates with reported ages. Because they come from a pool of just over 404,000 Connecticut residents aged 15-24, they represent 24.5 percent of that pool. These students under age 25 are less than three-fourths of all undergraduates, but a Connecticut resident under 25 is more than 15 times more likely (24.5% vs.1.6%) than a Connecticut resident 25 or older to be enrolled as an undergraduate.

This data is not meant to minimize the role of students age 25 or older. They represent 37

percent of all enrollment in Connecticut — 27 percent of undergraduate and 77 percent of combined graduate and first-professional students.

Among undergraduates, those 25 and older are a majority at the two-year independents, almost a majority (48%) at the community colleges and more than one-fifth at both CSU and the regional independents. Six of the 44 colleges in Connecticut that enroll undergraduates (counting the UConn branches) have more than 2,000 undergraduates 25 or older, and 24 of 44 enroll more than 500 undergraduates who are 25 or older. (Of the 20 colleges with fewer than 500 undergraduates age 25 or older, four have those older undergraduates as the majority of all undergraduates.) They are a very large potential pool of students, even though a relatively small share of them dip their toes into that pool.

“MARKET SHARE” PERSPECTIVES

Higher education’s “market share,” how Connecticut colleges are doing against various yardsticks, can be described in essentially four ways.

First is the internal composition of Connecticut’s higher education market. As discussed, that market splits 63 percent vs. 37 percent between public and independent institutions, 62 percent vs. 38 percent between full-time and part-time students; 80 percent vs. 20 percent between undergraduate and post-undergraduates, etc. Not reported, but relevant to the discussion below on national vs. regional comparisons, is that the market splits 72 percent for four-year colleges vs. 28 percent for two-year colleges.

A second type of market share measure is to express Connecticut collegiate enrollment as a percentage of various statewide totals. The fall 2003 enrollment total of 170,624 equals:

- 6.7 percent of the adult population of the state (2000 Census)
- 9.7 percent of the state’s civilian labor force (November 2003)
- 23 percent of the state’s residents who already have a bachelor’s or higher degree (2000 Census)

Adding the 39,689 people employed by the colleges in November 2003 to the enrollment of 170,624 yields 210,313 stakeholders in higher education. That expanded group equals 8.2 percent of the state’s adult population and 11.8 percent of the civilian labor force.

A third type of market share data (see above “Recent High School Graduates”), addresses the competition for high school graduates who go directly to college. In 2000, Connecticut kept more than half (52%) of its recent high school graduates who became college freshmen, which was the first time that it retained a majority in the decade of available data. Connecticut, however, still was a net exporter of new high school graduates.

The final, and weakest, type of market share data is Connecticut’s share of the U.S. total. Selecting that national comparison (rather than a regional one) implies a national market for

potential college students who have unlimited geographic mobility.

Connecticut in 2000 had 1.21 percent of the U.S. population but enrolled only 1.05 percent of all U.S. college students, which suggests under-performance in enrolling students.

Connecticut's population, however, is older than the national one, and younger people are far more likely to attend college. Connecticut's market share of U.S. college students in 2000 (1.05%) looks like over-performance based on it having only 1.00 percent of the U.S. population aged 18-24 and 1.02 percent of the population between 18 and 29.

There are also different levels of market saturation. In 2000, 31 percent of the Connecticut population age 25 or older had a bachelor's degree or higher, vs. 24 percent for the U.S. as a whole. We thus have a seven percent higher share of the population with no (or virtually no) interest in becoming degree-seeking undergraduates.

SUMMARY

The major positive findings from the fall 2003 enrollment data are:

- Records in total, full-time and FTE enrollment.
- Sixth consecutive year of growth.
- Increases (in both numbers and percentages) of minority enrollments.
- Generally healthy increases in freshmen enrollment, especially among in-state and/or recent high-school graduates.

Areas of concern include:

- Anemic growth and some areas of decline.
- Continuing gender imbalance that is approaching three females for every two males.
- Decline of enrollment of non-resident aliens.
- Decline of freshmen at CSU.

The developments that present mixed implications include:

- Increasing share of full-time enrollment.
- Growth among traditional student.
- Growth in younger student.

For these mixed news items, the positive implications relate to efficiency and the increased likelihood of timely degree completion because full-time and/or traditional and/or younger students are cheaper to teach (e.g., only an eight-hour class day) and more likely to graduate. The negative implications reflect concerns about access — an overemphasis on full-time and/or “day” students should not preclude those who must be part-time and/or night/weekend students..

The startling finding this year is the anemic growth. Three factors had pointed to more robust growth.

1. Recent growth patterns. Multi-year college careers give a certain momentum or lasting power to enrollment growth or decline. The growth rates for 2000, 2001 and 2002 were 1.8 percent, 2.5 percent and 3.1 percent respectively; the 2003 growth plummeted to 0.5 percent.
2. Higher education is a generally counter-cyclical economic sector — i.e., faring well when the economy fares badly and vice versa.⁸ Continued economic doldrums and uncertainty in the spring and summer of 2003 should have provided a boost to fall 2003 enrollment.
3. Continued growth in the pool of in-state high school graduates. The number of graduates from Connecticut public high schools rose every year from 1996 to 2002 (with a cumulative growth of 22%) and is expected to grow every year from 2003 to 2008 (with an additional cumulative growth of 18% over this period).

Several factors (including both demand side issues such as tuition increases and supply side issues such as the availability of programs and/or courses) may have exercised a damping effect on enrollment this year.

END NOTES

1. The University of Connecticut, with its main campus in Storrs, counts as one institution, but includes the UConn Health Center (its stand-alone medical and dental school in Farmington) and the three full UConn branch campuses in Avery Point, Stamford and Tri-Campus. (Tri-Campus is further broken down into its campuses in Hartford, Torrington and Waterbury.)

Not included in these statewide totals is Charter Oak State College, the state's external degree program, which enrolled 1,578 part-time undergraduates in fall 2003. Many Charter Oak students are simultaneously enrolled elsewhere in Connecticut. Students already appear in the statewide total and would be double counted if Charter Oak were included in the statewide tallies. The time-series data throughout this report consistently excludes Charter Oak from the analysis.

3. The rest of this analysis excludes the 27 part-time graduate students enrolled at St. Thomas Seminary, for whom FTE and demographic details are not available. The statewide total in all subsequent tables thus is 170,597 rather than the 170,624 total already introduced.
4. This data understates minority enrollment because four percent of all students in fall 2003 are non-resident aliens on student visas (and could be of any race), and eight percent were reported as race/ethnicity unknown. Unless all of these 12 percent are White non-Hispanic, the minority share would be higher.

There is a similar, but probably much smaller, undercount in the U.S. Census data on Connecticut. The combined share of the non-Hispanic population who are "some other" race and those who are bi- or multi-racial is 1.8 percent among the general population and 1.4 percent among those 18 or over.

Although we get timely data from Connecticut colleges every year, the national data (from which we get Connecticut residents who enroll in other states) is only collected for the fall semester of even-numbered years. That data is from the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) maintained by the National Center for Education Statistic (NCES) in the U.S. Department of Education.
7. Assumes that all college students under age 18 are in the 15-17 age bracket. Note that the totals by age are slightly smaller than they appear earlier in this report, because age was unknown for 1,057 students. Also note that the 19 graduate students who are under age 20 almost certainly are taking a graduate-level course, and likely are not matriculated and degree seeking graduate students.
8. One exception: many companies are reducing or eliminating their tuition reimbursements for their employees, especially those enrolled at the graduate level. Although this has a significant negative effect on some colleges (e.g., Rensselaer at Hartford), the statewide impact almost certainly is small.
