
## **Overall Results**

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in lowa was 157. This was higher than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Iowa in 2011 (157) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (156).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in lowa at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 38 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (39 points).
- The percentage of students in Iowa who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (35 percent).
- The percentage of students in Iowa who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 73 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (72 percent).







- Department of Defense Education Activity (overseas and domestic schools). In 2011, the average score in Iowa (157) was
- lower than those in 12 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 26 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 13 states/jurisdictions

## **Score Gaps for Student Groups**

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 17 points lower than White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (26 points).
- In 2011, male students in lowa had an average score that was higher than female students by 4 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 17 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (20 points).
