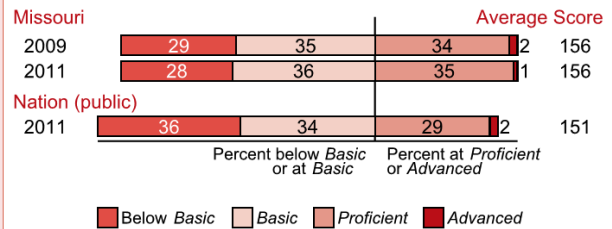


Overall Results

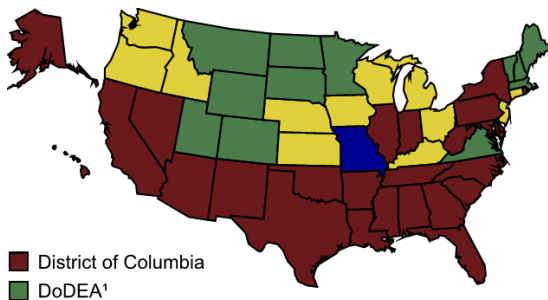
- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Missouri was 156. This was higher than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Missouri in 2011 (156) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (156).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Missouri at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 41 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (42 points).
- The percentage of students in Missouri who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 36 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (36 percent).
- The percentage of students in Missouri who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 72 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (71 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions

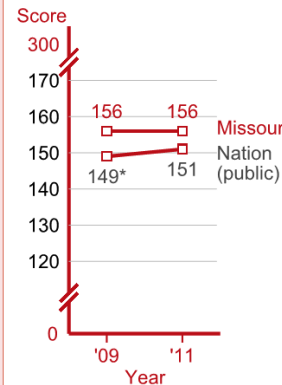

In 2011, the average score in Missouri (156) was

- lower than those in 13 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 26 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 12 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 32 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (32 points).
- Data are not reported for Hispanic students in 2011, because reporting standards were not met.
- In 2011, male students in Missouri had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 20 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (23 points).
