


Overall Results

- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Nebraska was 157. This was higher than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The percentage of students in Nebraska who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 38 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than the nation (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in Nebraska who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 72 percent in 2011. This percentage was greater than the nation (64 percent).



In 2011, the average score in Nebraska (157) was

- lower than those in 14 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 26 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 11 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 38 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (35 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 30 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (27 points).
- In 2011, male students in Nebraska had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 25 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from the nation (27 points).
