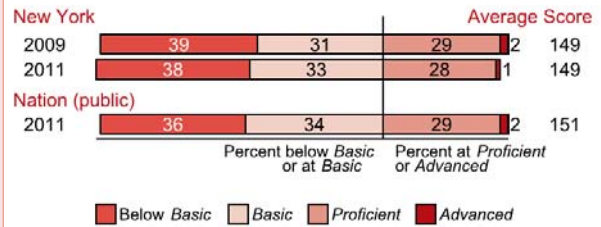


Overall Results

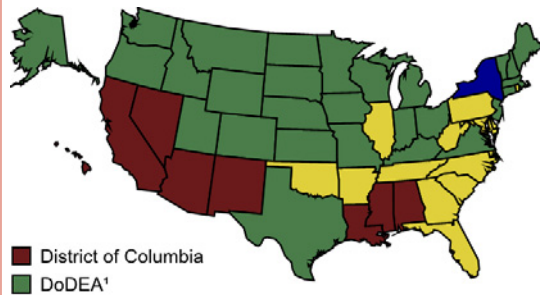
- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in New York was 149. This was lower than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in New York in 2011 (149) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (149).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in New York at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 47 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (51 points).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 29 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (31 percent).
- The percentage of students in New York who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 62 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (61 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions

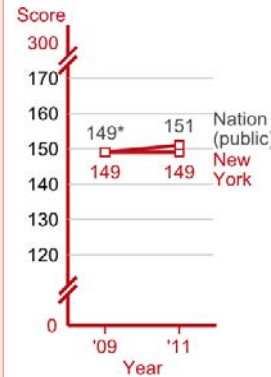

In 2011, the average score in **New York** (149) was

- lower than those in 29 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 9 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 13 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 33 points lower than White students. This performance gap was narrower than that in 2009 (41 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 33 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (39 points).
- In 2011, male students in New York had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 31 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (33 points).
