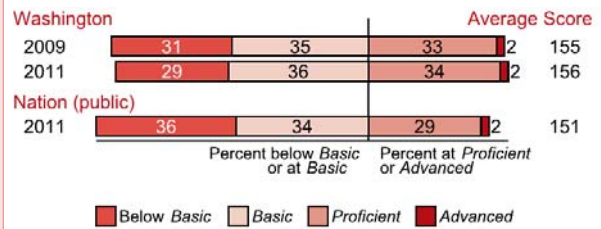


Overall Results

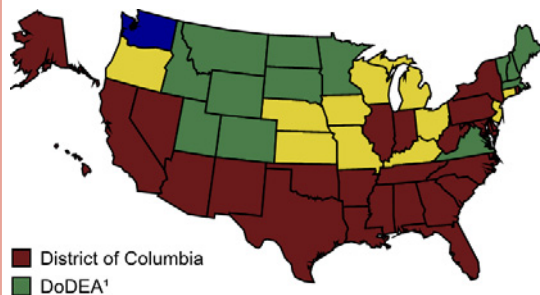
- In 2011, the average score of eighth-grade students in Washington was 156. This was higher than the average score of 151 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Washington in 2011 (156) was not significantly different from their average score in 2009 (155).
- In 2011, the score gap between students in Washington at the 75th percentile and students at the 25th percentile was 41 points. This performance gap was not significantly different from that of 2009 (44 points).
- The percentage of students in Washington who performed at or above the NAEP *Proficient* level was 35 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (34 percent).
- The percentage of students in Washington who performed at or above the NAEP *Basic* level was 71 percent in 2011. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2009 (69 percent).

Compare the Average Score in 2011 to Other States/Jurisdictions

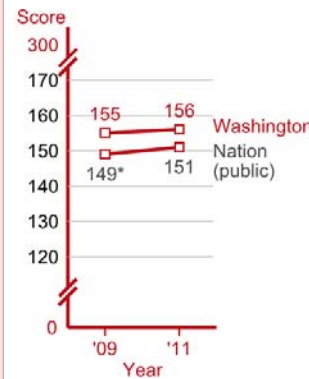

In 2011, the average score in **Washington** (156) was

- lower than those in 14 states/jurisdictions
- higher than those in 26 states/jurisdictions
- not significantly different from those in 11 states/jurisdictions

Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2011, Black students had an average score that was 30 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (27 points).
- In 2011, Hispanic students had an average score that was 23 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (29 points).
- In 2011, male students in Washington had an average score that was higher than female students by 5 points.
- In 2011, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 22 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 2009 (25 points).
