In the next two years, Colorado's population will reach five million people, nearly a quarter of whom will be children. While unmatched as a place to live and raise a family, Colorado is also the state with the largest increase in the percentage of children living in poverty.

Impacting everything from health, education, earning potential and victimization rates, the effects of poverty are devastating. And as adults, we have an urgent obligation to ensure that poverty does not determine our children's future.

Since my election as Governor, I have worked to create and promote public policy that supports our children, especially those most at risk, including those living in poverty. We have forged ahead on health care and education reform, and laid the groundwork for additional future action. Understanding that education is the key to bringing children out of poverty and creating a future filled with hope and promise, I am focused on cutting the dropout rate and achievement gap in half, and doubling the number of college certificates and degrees awarded to Coloradans, over the next 10 years.

Where does all this lead? It leads to expanded opportunities for post-secondary education and training; expanded economic opportunities for better jobs and better pay; and stronger communities and families everywhere in Colorado. And it leads to many children escaping a life of poverty and pursuing the opportunity that Colorado has to offer.

This year's *KidsCount in Colorado* provides us with data about children living in poverty so that we can better understand where we are and what we need to do. I urge you to consider the information in this report closely as we look for ways to work together to ensure that every child in Colorado can fulfill their God-given potential.

Thank you to the Colorado Children's Campaign for its continued work to improve the lives of children across our great state.

For nearly 25 years, the Colorado Children's Campaign has been working to improve the lives of Colorado's more than 1.2 million kids. For 10 of these years, one of the projects we most look forward to sharing with you is the *KidsCount in Colorado!* report. The *KidsCount* report provides an annual look at the well-being of Colorado's children and offers communities information about how their own children are faring, along with specific and reliable data to help focus on where we can strive to make improvements in their lives.

For those of us at the Colorado Children's Campaign, one of the most powerful outcomes of the *KidsCount in Colorado!* report is the emerging awareness of striking, sometimes troubling, trends that are significantly impacting our children. This year, the increase in kids living in poverty is one of those troubling trends.

Between 2000 and 2006, Colorado had a 73 percent increase in the number of children living in poverty, putting our state first in the nation for the fastest growing rate of children in economic distress. By a lot of different measures, poverty is the largest obstacle to opportunity for Colorado's youngest citizens. Kids born into and growing up in poverty struggle with low educational achievement, health problems, emotional and behavioral difficulties, and a range of other issues that decrease their chance of success and often rob them of hope at an early age. Since the consequences of being poor in childhood often carry into adulthood, significant economic costs are associated with this trend. In fact, a recent study by the Human Services Policy Center found that growing up in poverty costs the U.S. \$500 billion annually in lost earnings, involvement with crime, and health costs. This is a trend our children, and our state, cannot afford.

In this year's report, the Children's Campaign focuses on this critical issue in both KidsCount! and an accompanying "white paper" that together provide information about related trends statewide and by county. This year, we also will publish a supplemental edition of *KidsCount* including county rankings and maps of each indicator. This additional information will be provided to help communities quickly see and understand how they compare to other counties in the state and in their region. We hope these additional documents will be useful to you as we all seek to give Colorado's kids the best possible future.

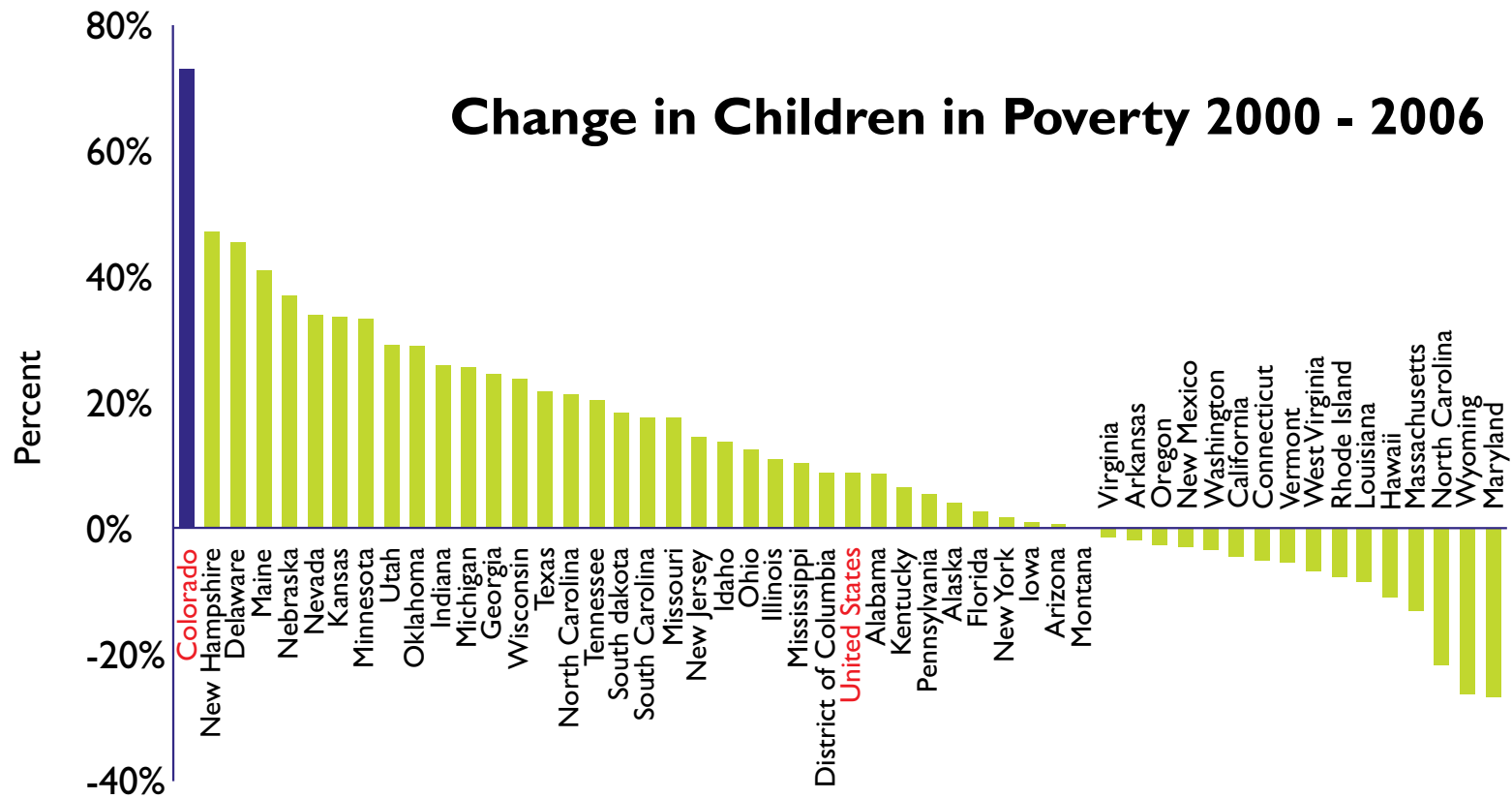


# Poverty: The Biggest Obstacle for Colorado Kids

Every year, *KidsCount in Colorado!* focuses on a range of factors critical to the well-being of our state's children. This year's report focuses on an issue that impacts almost every other factor: children living in poverty. Poverty is the biggest obstacle to opportunity for children, and between 2000 and 2006, the number of children living in poverty in Colorado increased by 73 percent - the highest increase by far of any state in the nation.<sup>1</sup> At the same time, the total number of children in the state only increased six percent.<sup>2</sup>

The numbers behind this statistic, and the children they represent, are even more troubling. Current estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau indicate that more than 180,000 of Colorado's children, or 15.7 percent, live below the federal poverty line, defined by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services as \$21,200 for a family of four.

In 2000, Colorado had 104,000 children in poverty. In just six years, 76,000 more kids were added to that number. The state's number of children living in poverty is quickly approaching the national average of 18.3 percent. In addition, approximately 82,000 children in Colorado live in extreme poverty - which is 50 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL), or only \$7,000 per year for a single mom and her child. In fact, the percentage of children living in extreme poverty had a faster rate of growth (116 percent) than any other group of poor children in the state. The largest numbers of these children are under the age of five.

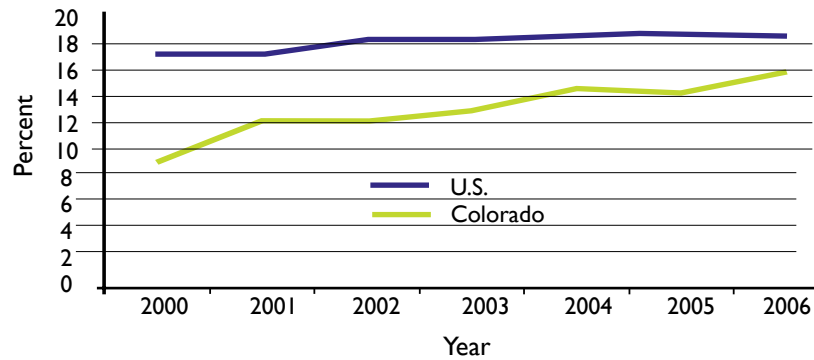

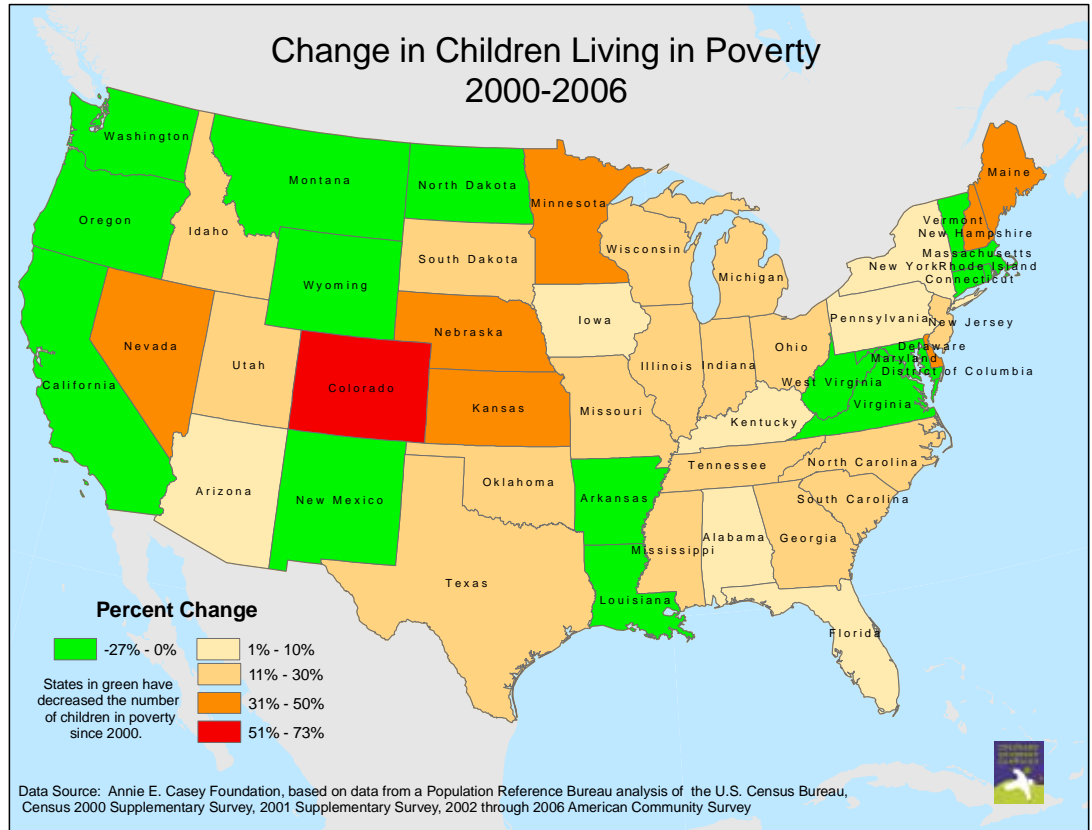
### Children Living Below the Poverty Line (100% FPL)



While Colorado and much of the rest of the nation are experiencing a rise in the percentage of children living in poverty, some states, including neighboring states like Wyoming and New Mexico, experienced decreases.<sup>3</sup> Understanding the data and the impact of this issue on our children are important steps to making sound policy and community decisions about the problem of children growing up in poverty.

# The Impacts of Poverty on Children

The increase in childhood poverty impacts some groups of children more than others. Levels of poverty vary between groups of children based on where they live, their age, ethnicity, and family structure. For example, minority families experience significantly higher rates of poverty. Regardless of ethnicity, families headed by single females have the highest rates of all.

Poverty, especially persistent poverty, has profound effects on children's physical, emotional, and cognitive health, as well as other life outcomes. The risk to Colorado's future is great. Today's children are tomorrow's parents, leaders, and labor force. In Colorado, children ages birth to four years, (widely regarded as the most critical developmental period in a child's life), make up the largest age group living in extreme poverty.

This year, *KidsCount! in Colorado 2008* focuses on what these numbers mean and how living in poverty impacts children in our state.

## A Lifetime of Ramifications<sup>4</sup>

### Children in poverty are:

- Half as likely to have access to preschool;
- Significantly less likely to be at grade level in reading, writing, and math;
- One-third more likely to experience learning disabilities and developmental delays;
- Score significantly lower on IQ tests, with the greatest disparities occurring at earlier ages;
- 1.5 times more likely to miss 10 or more days of school due to illness or injury;
- Twice as likely to repeat a grade or be suspended or expelled;
- Twice as likely to drop out of school;
- Ten times more likely to have experienced hunger in the past year;
- Nearly seven times more likely to be the victims of abuse or neglect;
- Nearly twice as likely to be unemployed as young adults;
- Twice as likely to be the victims of a violent crime and to feel unsafe in their neighborhood; and
- Three times more likely as teens to have an out of wedlock birth.

# Childhood Population in Colorado

Mirroring overall population growth in Colorado, the number of children (ages 0-18) has grown by more than 360,000 (40 percent) since 1990.<sup>5</sup> With the increase in numbers of children, there is an increase in need for health, educational, and other critical services to support them.

Within the next two years, Colorado's overall population is projected to reach five million people, with about a quarter of that number representing children. By 2028, the number of children in Colorado is projected to grow to more than 1.8 million.<sup>6</sup>

In addition to substantial increases in number, there will be changes in the demographics of our child population. By 2030, the Colorado Department of Local Affairs estimates that more than 31 percent of Colorado's total population will be classified as minority, compared to 26 percent in 2005.<sup>7</sup> Changing demographics will impact policy decisions as children's needs change, including a population with a variety of family types, languages, incomes, health care needs, and educational abilities.

# 2008 Federal Poverty Guidelines

There are several measures that define living in poverty. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) issues simplifications of the poverty thresholds primarily to determine eligibility for various federal programs.<sup>8</sup> The poverty guidelines are adjusted annually to account for inflation.

The current federal poverty measure is based on food costs. Because the average family's spending patterns have changed since the measure was devised and food is no longer the greatest expense to an American household, this measure is outdated and inadequate. Housing, health care, child care, and transportation costs have all risen dramatically. Consequently, this measure significantly underestimates the true costs of supporting a family.

According to more realistic estimates,<sup>9</sup> families need approximately twice the official poverty level to meet basic needs. This number varies with the costs of living from place to place. If the federal poverty measure were doubled for Colorado, one in three children (412,000) would be classified as living in poverty.

## Self-Sufficiency in Colorado<sup>10</sup>

According to recent figures provided by the Colorado Fiscal Policy Institute, it costs much more than the poverty threshold indicates to meet basic needs in Colorado. The self-sufficiency standard takes into account local housing costs, taxes, child care, food, transportation, health care, family structure, and the number of children in the household, in calculating what it really costs for families with children in each Colorado county to meet basic needs. For example, for a two-parent family with one infant and one preschooler living in Denver, the annual income to meet basic needs would be \$50,503.

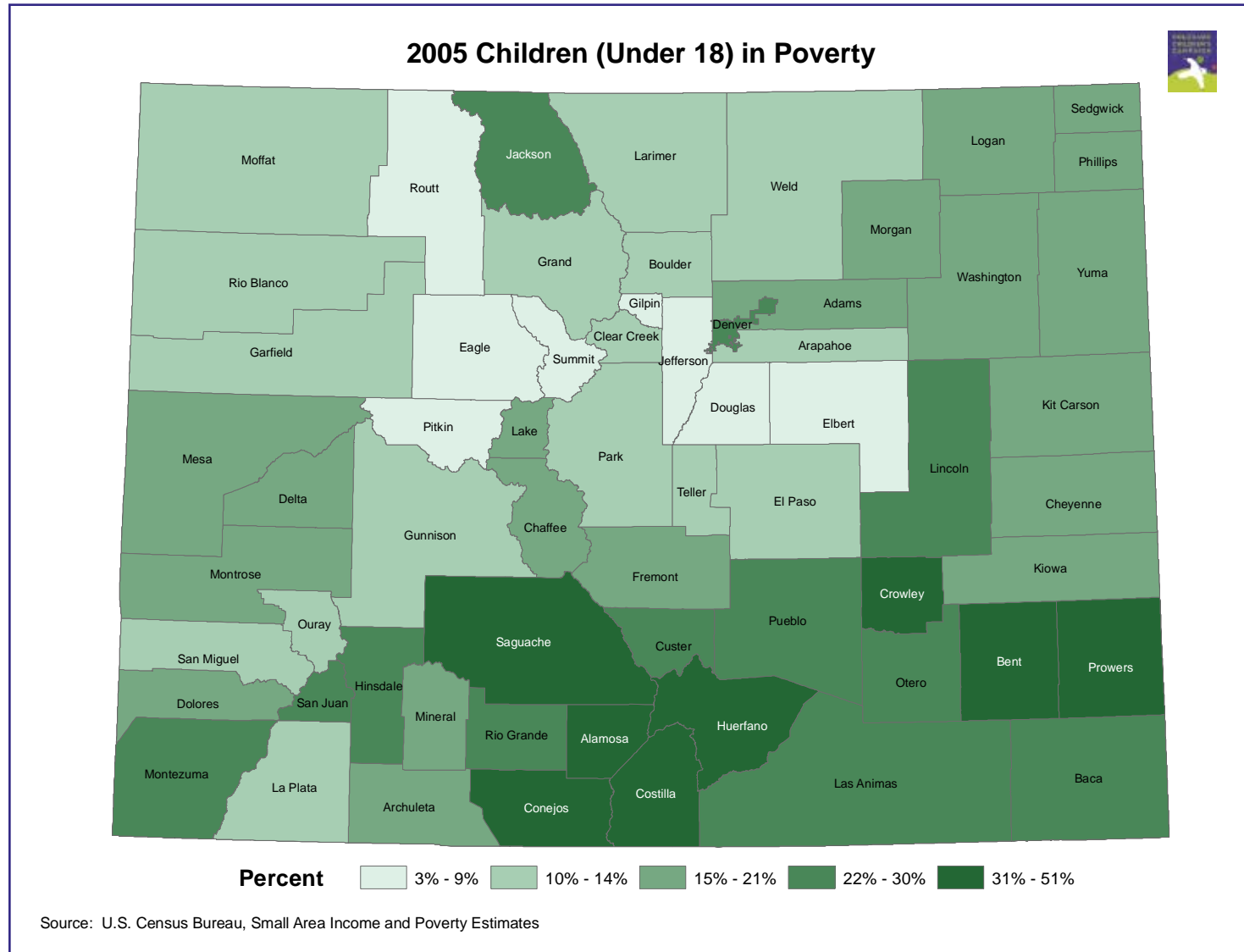

# Children in Poverty in Colorado: The Landscape

The number of children living in poverty varies by county. The urban core and the southern rural counties have higher percentages of poor children. Although the greatest number (82 percent<sup>11</sup>) of children live in the largest 11 counties (primarily urban and suburban), recognition of the pervasive poverty of children in poor rural counties is important.<sup>12</sup> Understanding which children are poor in Colorado and where they live can help us to identify appropriate policy changes and efficiently allocate resources to areas of targeted need.

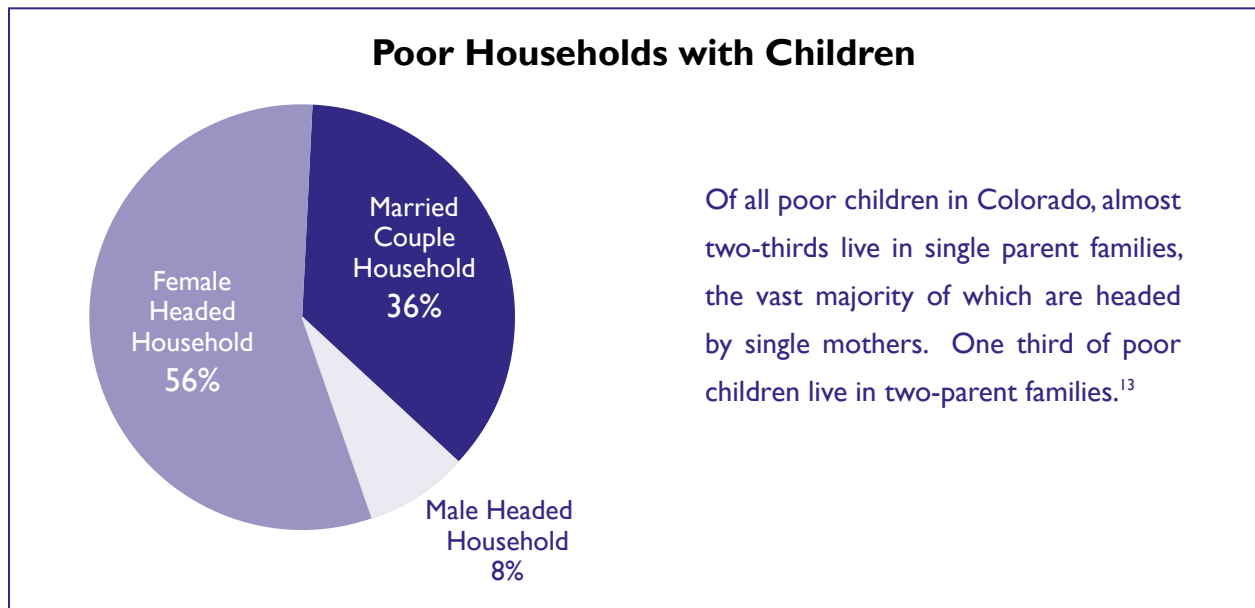

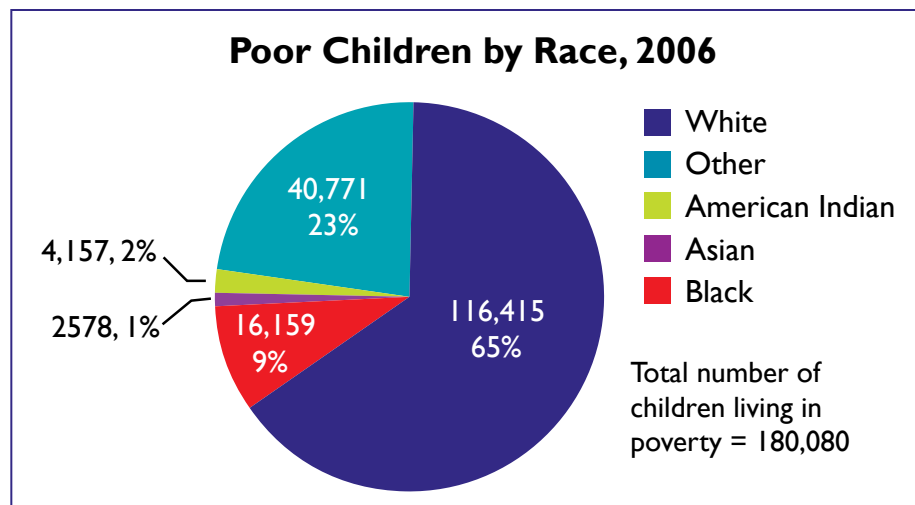

# Colorado's Poor Families with Children

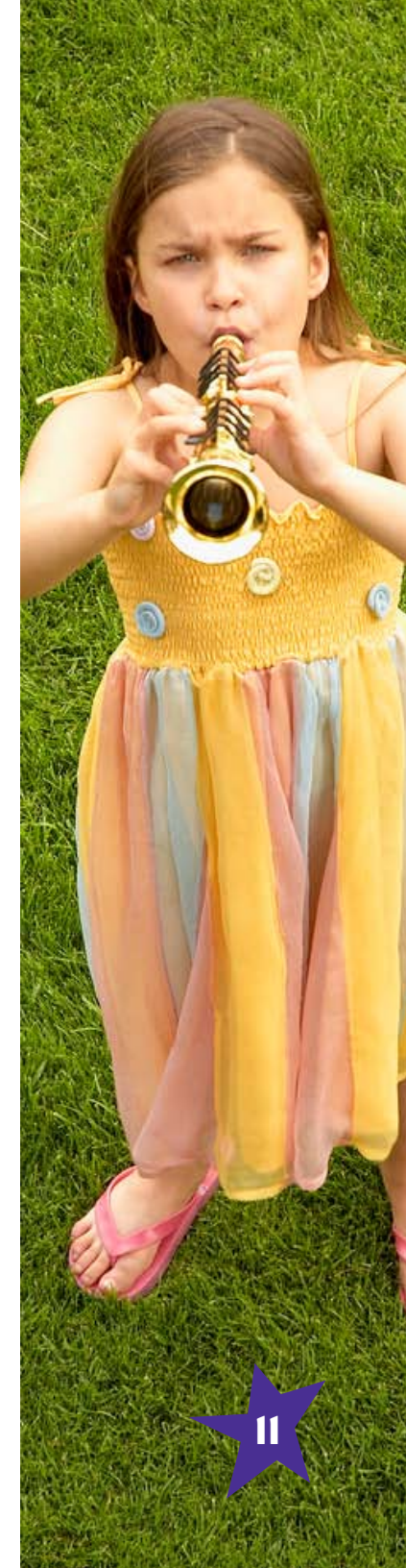
In addition to identifying where poor children live in Colorado, it is important to distinguish which ethnic groups, family types, and ages of children are impacted by poverty the most. Poverty is most prevalent in female-headed households and it adversely impacts very young children the most. In Colorado, 56 percent of all families in poverty are headed by females. Of children living in extreme poverty, children under five years of age are the largest group.



The U.S. Census Bureau tracks race and ethnicity separately. Thus, Census data on ethnicity reports on ethnically Hispanic children that are white as well as Hispanic children of other races. In the pie chart to the right, Hispanic children are included among various races. In Colorado in 2006, there were 95,600 ethnically Hispanic children living in poverty, representing 53 percent of the total.

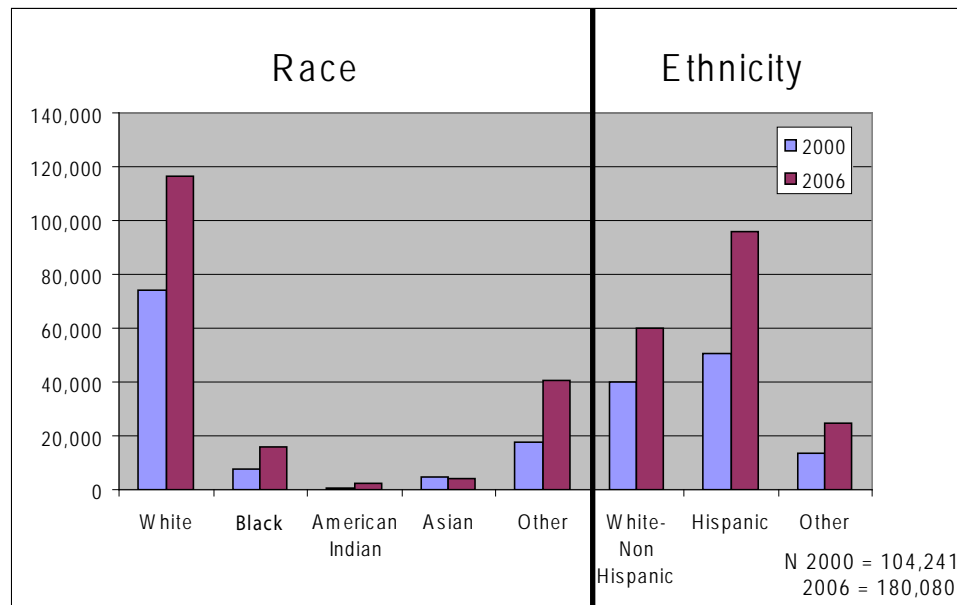
The rate of increase in the number of children in poverty varies by race and ethnicity. Non-Hispanic white children have increased their numbers of children in poverty by more than 57 percent, white-Hispanic children by 88 percent, black children by 116 percent, and American Indian children by 473 percent, since 2000.

There is also variation in the percent of children from each racial and ethnic group who live in poverty. While 13 percent of all white children live in poverty, the percentage of all black, Hispanic, or Native American children living in poverty are much higher. For example, whereas only seven percent of Colorado's poor children are black, 32 percent of all black children are in poor families. This means that black children are about two and a half times more likely to be living in poverty than white children in Colorado.

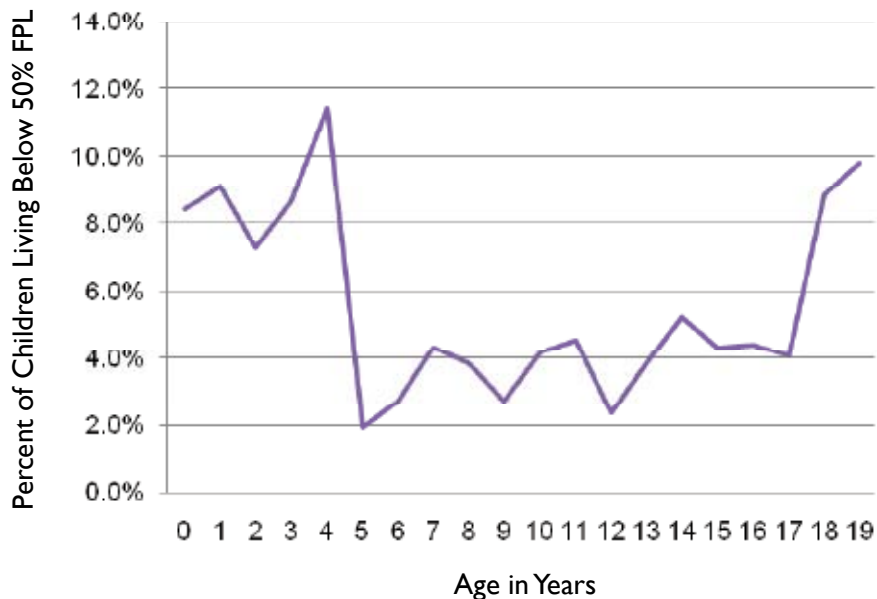

## Colorado Children Living in Extreme Poverty in 2006



In Colorado, approximately 82,000 (seven percent of our children) live in extreme poverty -- 50 percent of the federal poverty level or less. Children under the age of five are more likely than older children to suffer extreme poverty. The number of children in extreme poverty is growing faster than any other group of poor children in the state.<sup>15</sup>

The percentage of children living in extreme poverty drops considerably between ages four and five when many of these children become eligible to enter kindergarten. The drop in poverty for children entering school may be explained by an increase in their parent's income. With the children in school, primary caregivers can get and keep better paying jobs. Families in extreme poverty are almost exclusively headed by single females.<sup>16</sup>

Many negative outcomes exist for children raised in such desperate economic conditions. These include low educational achievement, health issues, and emotional and behavioral problems. Simply removing the added cost of child care and enabling more hours for work while children are in school may be enough to allow many single mothers to lift their children out of extreme poverty.

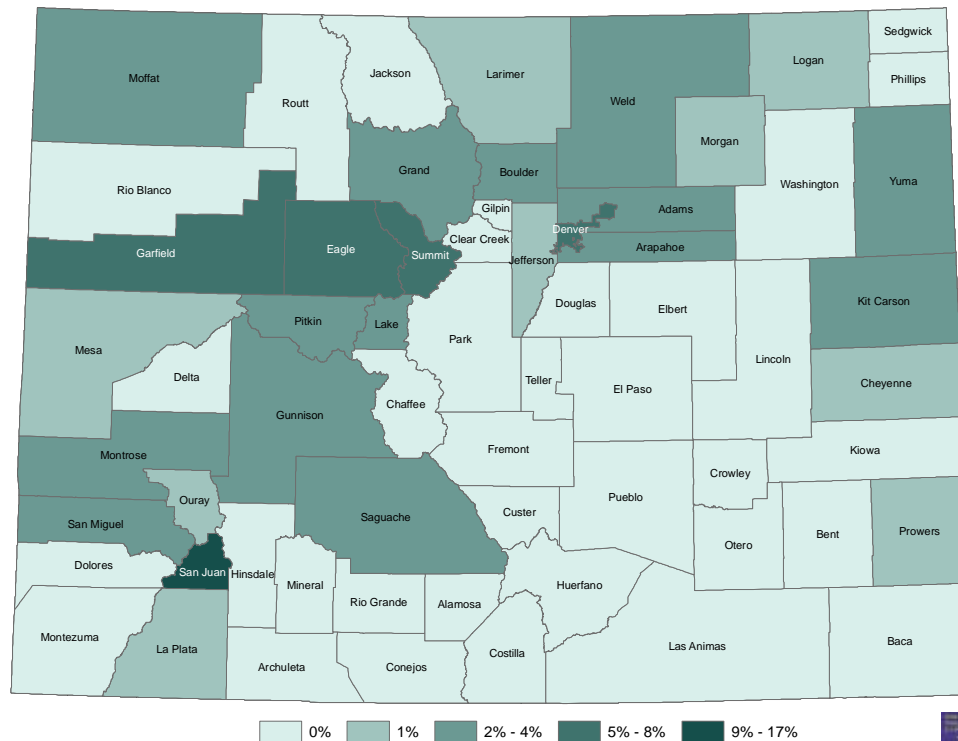


# Children in Immigrant Families

Colorado ranks 14th in the nation in the percentage of children in immigrant families. This percentage increased slightly over the last six years, growing from 18 percent to 20 percent (239,000 children). Colorado remains below the national average, which is 22 percent of children in immigrant families.

Of these Colorado children, 57 percent live in low-income (200 percent FPL) families, compared to 30 percent of children born in the United States. Children in immigrant families tend to live in married-couple families (79 percent) more often than children born in the United States (70 percent).<sup>17</sup>

## Children that have difficulty speaking English

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the share of children ages 15 to 17 that have difficulty speaking English in Colorado has stayed consistent at five or six percent since 2000. This figure is the same as the five percent national average.<sup>18</sup>

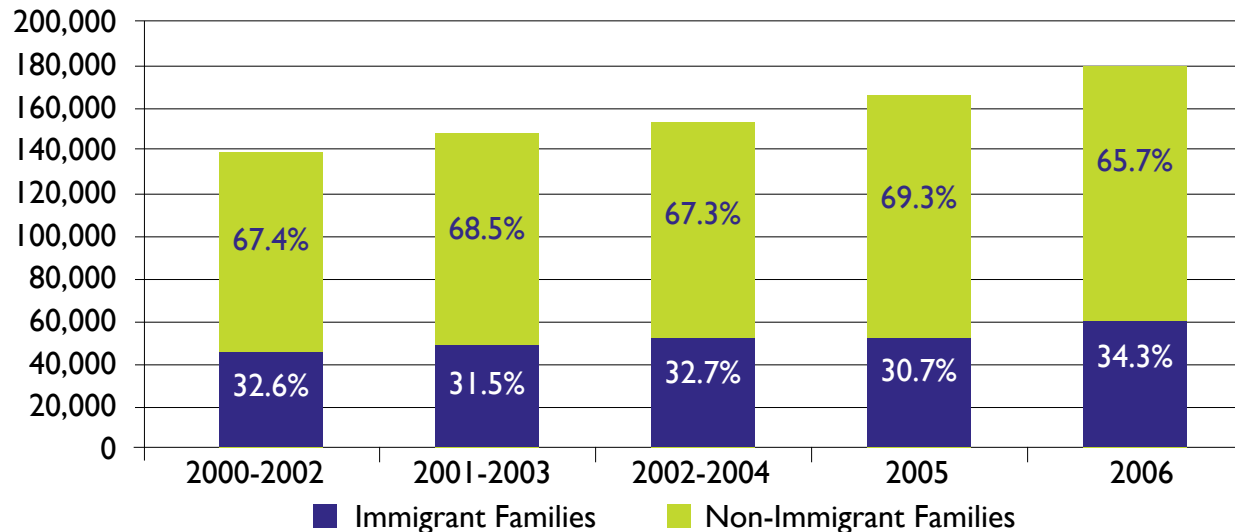

# Poverty and Immigration

Some of the increase of the children living in poverty may be due to poor families immigrating to Colorado from outside the U.S. However, most of the increase in children in poverty in our state cannot be explained by immigration. More of the increase is likely due to a combination of poor children in U.S.-born families moving from other states and non-immigrants slipping into poverty. Although there are approximately 76,000 more children living in poverty in our state since 2000, the proportions of immigrant and non-immigrant children in poverty remains relatively consistent through that time period.

Children in immigrant families are defined by the U.S. Census Bureau as children who are themselves foreign-born or reside with at least one foreign-born parent. Foreign-born is defined as either a U.S. citizen by naturalization or not a U.S. citizen. Precise estimates of Colorado families' immigration status by poverty are not available for each year from 2000 to 2004. Estimates for years 2000 through 2004 are presented by a series of three-year averages--the first year 2000 to 2002, the second year 2001 to 2003 and the third year 2002 to 2004. The 2005 data is the first year with an expanded sample and is presented by estimates with a single year of data. While this data series is not directly comparable to other estimates of poverty, the stable percentage of children in poverty living in immigrant and non-immigrant families throughout the time periods provided indicate a consistent, not increasing, impact of immigration on Colorado's poverty rates.

Using these data, we find that between 2000 and 2006, the number of children in immigrant families living in poverty in Colorado increased by 17,000 children. At the same time, the total number of children in Non-Immigrant families in Colorado living in poverty increased by 26,000.<sup>20</sup>

Immigration is a noted concern for governments and communities in Colorado. With added population comes added stress on public services and often a change in the demographic character and community needs. However, the effects of immigration vary. For most counties, high poverty does not occur consistently in the same counties that have high immigration rates.<sup>21</sup> If immigration were the driving force behind the statewide change in poverty, we would expect counties with high rates of change in their immigrant population to also experience a related spike in child poverty rates. When we examine all counties across the state, the numbers of immigrant children are not great enough to be considered a significant contributor to child poverty at the county scale. The highest percentage of immigrant school-age children are located in Summit, Eagle, Garfield, and San Juan counties.<sup>22</sup>

## Poverty and Child Nutrition

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Good nutrition is important to the growth and development of healthy children. Not only is the quality of food an issue for children's health, but having enough food also is important.

Children with poor nutrition suffer from health problems such as weight loss, fatigue, headaches, inability to concentrate, and frequent colds. As a consequence, these children are more likely to be ill and absent from school. In addition, inadequate nutrition can affect a child's development and behavior which can decrease their ability to perform in school.<sup>23</sup> Many children in Colorado are not getting the food they need each day. All children need access to healthy food and their caregivers need information and resources to make sure they get it.

Poor nutrition is most prevalent for children in families living in poverty. Inadequate wages, high food, housing and child-care costs, and lack of access to federal nutrition programs are the most common causes for childhood hunger.

The Free and Reduced Price Lunch Program offered to qualifying public school students is one resource helping to ensure children get food throughout the school day. The Federal Food Stamp Program is another key mechanism for helping low-income families buy the food they need for good health. In 2006, both Colorado and nationally, 49 percent of food stamp recipients were children.<sup>24</sup> That means that 122,000 of food stamp recipients were children in Colorado.<sup>25</sup>

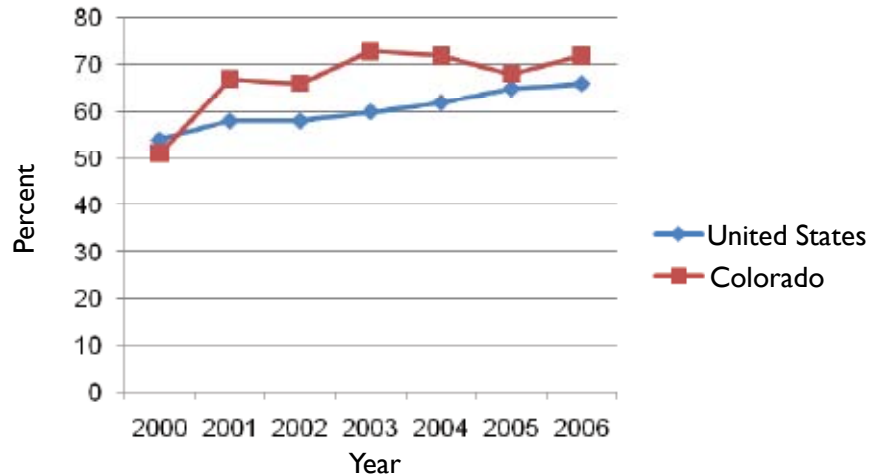

# Poverty and Housing

In 2006, Colorado ranked 41st out of 50 states with 72 percent of children living in low-income households where housing costs exceeded 30 percent of family income. This percentage is higher than the national number of 66 percent.<sup>26</sup> Households that must allocate more than 30 percent of their income to housing are less likely to have enough resources for food, clothing, medical care, or other needs for their children. Low-income households are particularly vulnerable. Since 2002, housing costs have been rising in Colorado, while median household income has remained relatively flat.<sup>27</sup>

# Homeless Children in Colorado

While being homeless is a source of physical and emotional trauma for all ages, the effect of being homeless on a child's academic achievement and social and emotional development can be dramatic. According to a report from the Colorado Statewide Homeless Count, homelessness is caused by poverty and an inability to pay for housing due to low wages, lack of affordable housing, or poor access to public assistance programs.

Nationally, the number of homeless families with children has increased significantly. In Colorado, almost two-thirds of homeless families were households with children. Most of the people who became homeless for the first time (71 percent) in Colorado in 2006 were in households with children.<sup>28</sup> According to the Colorado Department of Education, more than 12,000 school-aged children were homeless during the 2006/2007 school year.<sup>29</sup>

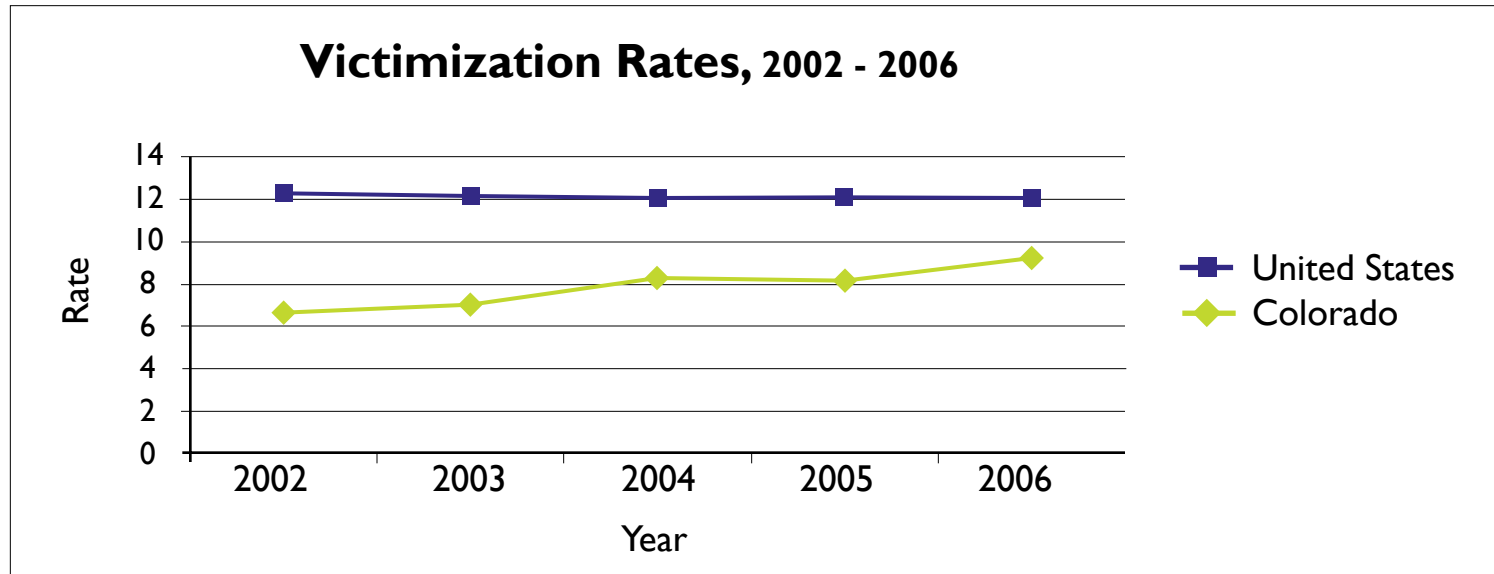

# Child Abuse and Neglect

The consequences of child abuse and neglect are profound. Children often suffer long-term health and physical effects, intellectual and cognitive development problems, and emotional, psychological, and behavioral consequences. According to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, in 2006, the national rates of child abuse and neglect decreased 1.6 percent to approximately 905,000 children. While the trend may have decreased, tragically, 1,530 of these children died.



In Colorado, the rates of child maltreatment have increased 43 percent since 2000. In 2006, 10,086 children in Colorado were victims of abuse or neglect and 60 percent were children under the age of 8. Of these, 24 children died.<sup>30</sup>

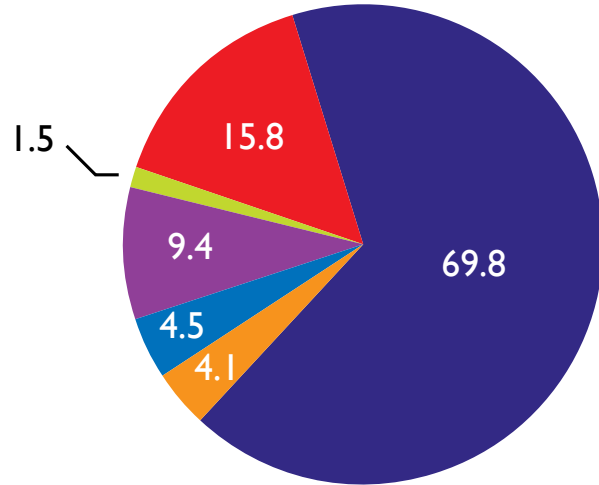
In Colorado and the nation, neglect was the most common form of child maltreatment. Of the roughly 10,000 children that were abused or neglected in 2006, Colorado reports that:

- more than 69 percent (7,585) suffered neglect;
- more than 15 percent (1,715) suffered physical abuse;
- less than 10 percent (1,024) suffered sexual abuse; and
- less than five percent (487) suffered from emotional maltreatment.<sup>31</sup>

In the U.S. almost 80 percent of perpetrators of child abuse and neglect were parents. Colorado's youngest children had the highest rate of victimization at 18.4 per 1,000 children younger than one year. Colorado provided 28,416 children with preventative care. This is a much lower rate than the national rate.<sup>32</sup>

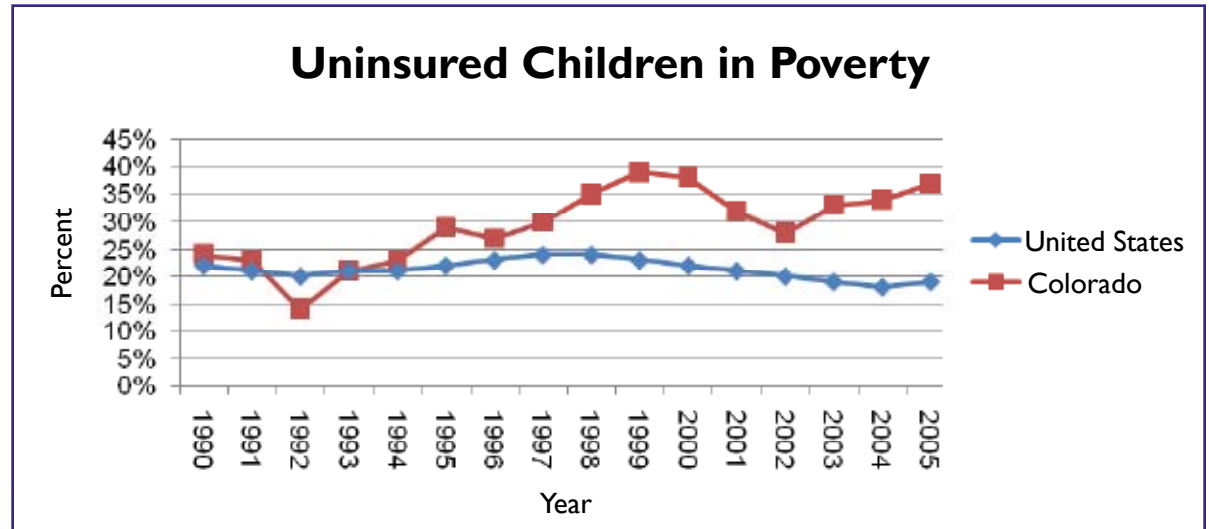
# Child Health Trends

Children need access to quality health care. They also require a healthy and supportive environment. Such a comprehensive approach is essential for a child's proper development. Colorado is improving in some children's health indicators, such as reducing the teen birth rate and increasing immunization rates. However, the state does poorly in some of the most important child health indicators, including insuring its poor children.

## *Insuring our Poor Children: Last in the Nation*

In 2005, Colorado ranked 50th - last in the nation - in children in poverty who were uninsured. With 37 percent of poor children uninsured in Colorado, we are nearly double the national average of 19 percent.<sup>33</sup>

Children in Colorado living in families that are poor are three times more likely than children from more affluent families to lack health insurance, which limits their ability to access necessary healthcare. With quality healthcare essential for children to have the best chance for life-long well-being, this trend has significant negative ramifications.



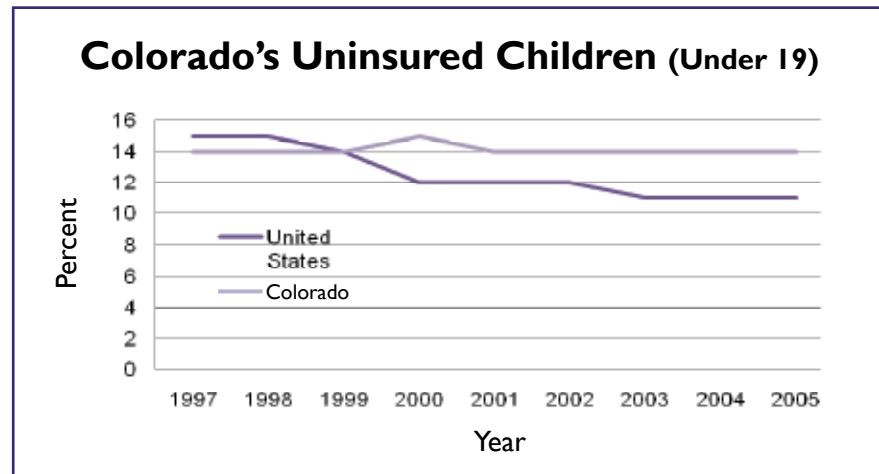
At the same time that Colorado does poorly at insuring its low-income children, it is these same children that have the greatest need for care. Children in poverty experience higher rates of infant mortality, are twice as likely to have a low birth weight, five times more likely to be in fair or poor health, three times more likely to have unmet medical needs, and twice as likely to have unmet dental care needs than their more affluent peers.<sup>34</sup>

## Other Insurance Trends

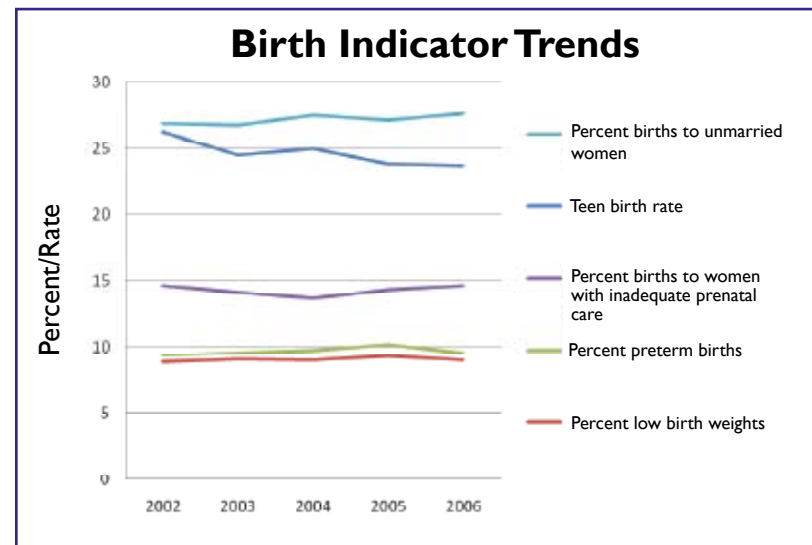
The total number of children under 19 who are uninsured in Colorado has remained relatively constant at 177,000 children, or 14 percent.<sup>35</sup> Since 1999, Colorado's percentage of uninsured children continues to be higher than the U.S. rate of 11 percent.



10 percent of children nationwide ages 0-5 were without health insurance. In Colorado, 15 percent of children 0-5 were without health insurance.<sup>36</sup>

## Birth Indicator Trends

The statewide teen birth rate has gone down slightly since 2002. However, the number of children born to unwed women and to women with inadequate prenatal care has gone up.<sup>37</sup>

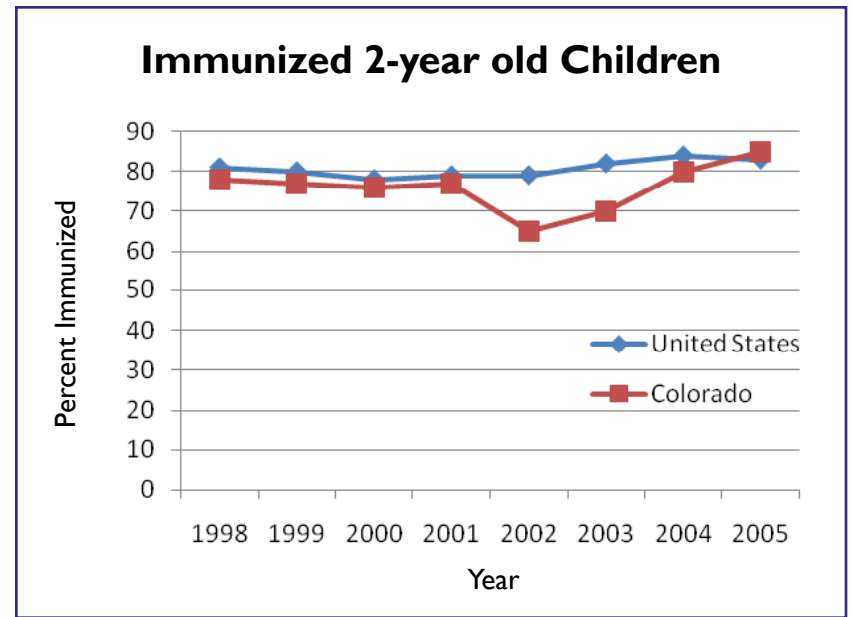

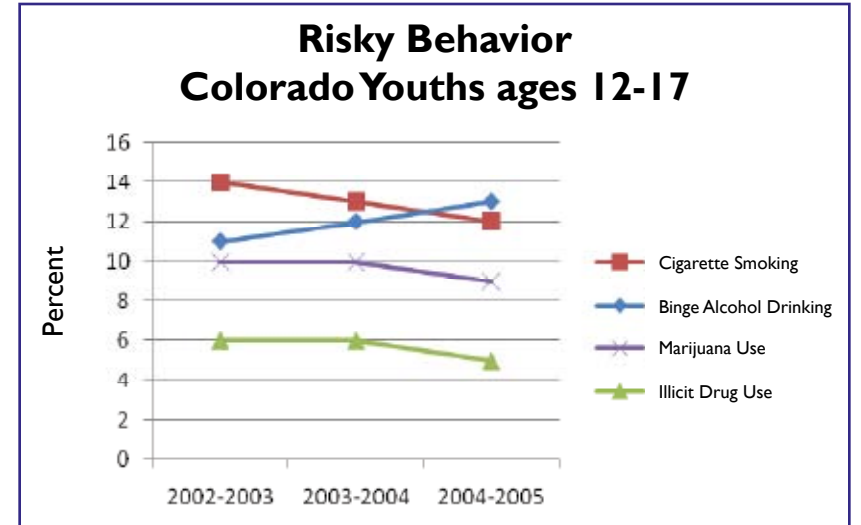
## Improving Immunization Rates

Healthcare is particularly important for young children because a child's body and mind grow and develop most during their first few years of life. Proper immunizations and medical care are essential. In 2005, Colorado ranked 17th in the nation in two year-olds who were immunized. Eighty-five percent of all our kids in this age group were immunized, compared to 83 percent nationally. This number is up five percent since 2004 and has been increasing since 2002.<sup>38</sup>



## Risky Behavior

Cigarette smoking and illicit drug and marijuana use by Colorado teens ages 12-17 has gone down slightly since 2002. This behavior mirrors the United States trend in these indicators. However, binge alcohol drinking, or drinking five or more drinks on the same occasion, is on the rise in Colorado while the national trend is going down.<sup>39</sup>

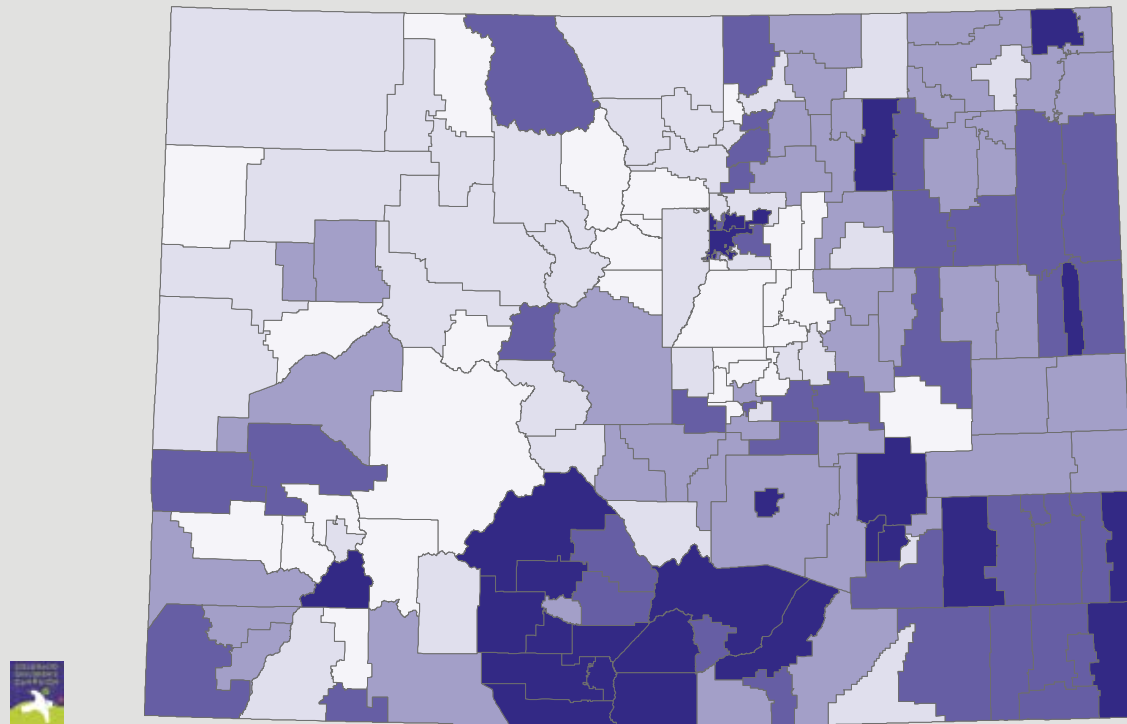


# K-12 Education

## Low Income and Achievement

This map shows the percentage of students qualifying for the Free and Reduced Price Lunch program by school district. In FY 2007-08 to qualify for reduced price lunch, a family's income must be below 185 percent of the federal poverty level, or \$38,203 for a family of four. To qualify for free lunch, a family's income must be below 130 percent, or \$26,845, for a family of four. Notice the uneven distribution of poor children in the urban center and rural school districts.<sup>40</sup> Over 270,000 Colorado school-age children qualify for Free and Reduced Price Lunch.<sup>41</sup> Children living in poverty are more likely to drop out of school, perform below grade level, miss more school due to illness or injury, and earn less as adults.

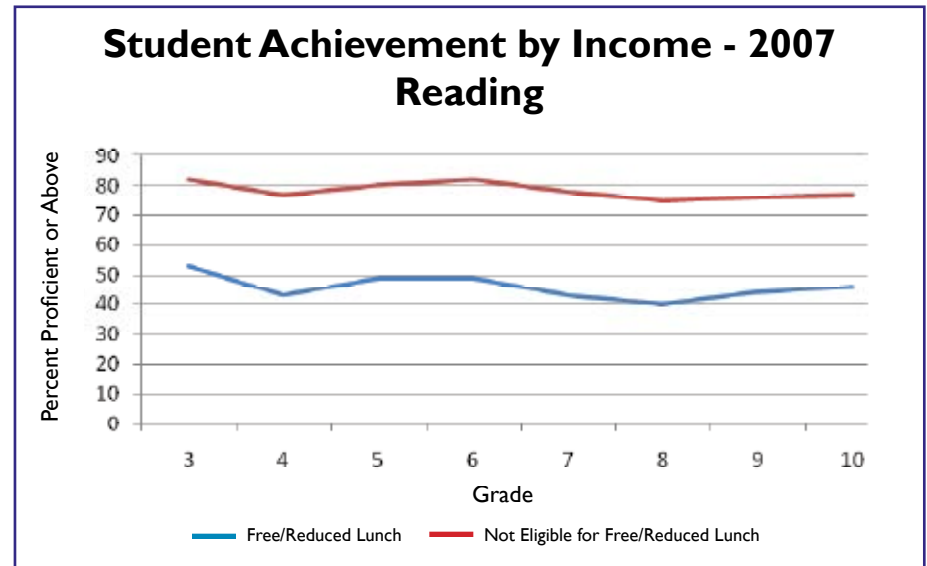
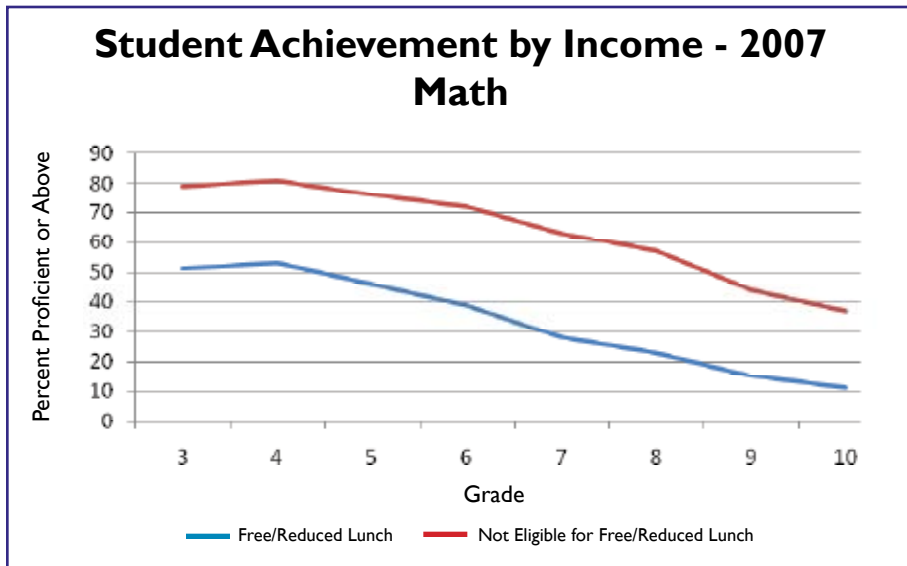

National research shows that early vocabulary growth (from birth to 36 months) is markedly impacted by income level, with children in lower socio-economic categories learning fewer words than their higher income peers. Early vocabulary growth is essential to long-term learning.<sup>42</sup>

The Colorado Student Assessment Program (CSAP) has provided a wealth of data on student achievement for all public school students in the state. CSAP results document a consistent and significant gap in student achievement in all subject areas and in all grades based on ethnicity, gender, and income.



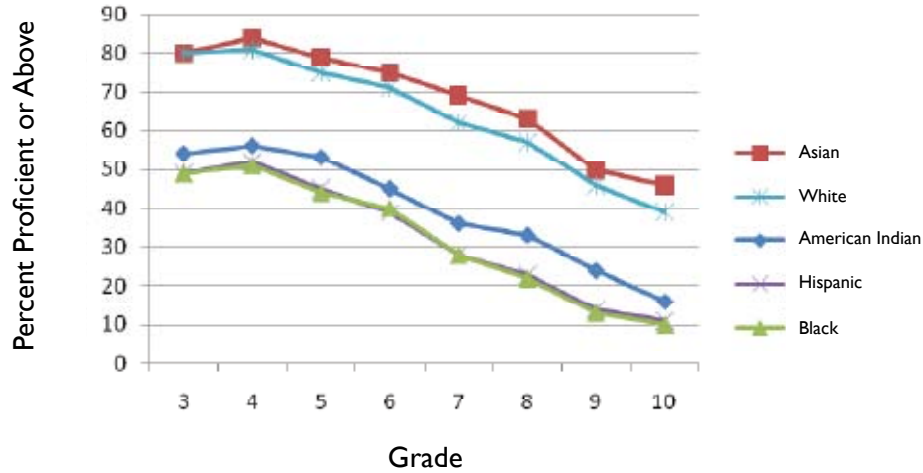
Math achievement peaks in the 4th grade and then goes down for each grade level until 10th grade, when scores are very low. There is also a consistent gap between ethnic groups of students.<sup>43</sup>

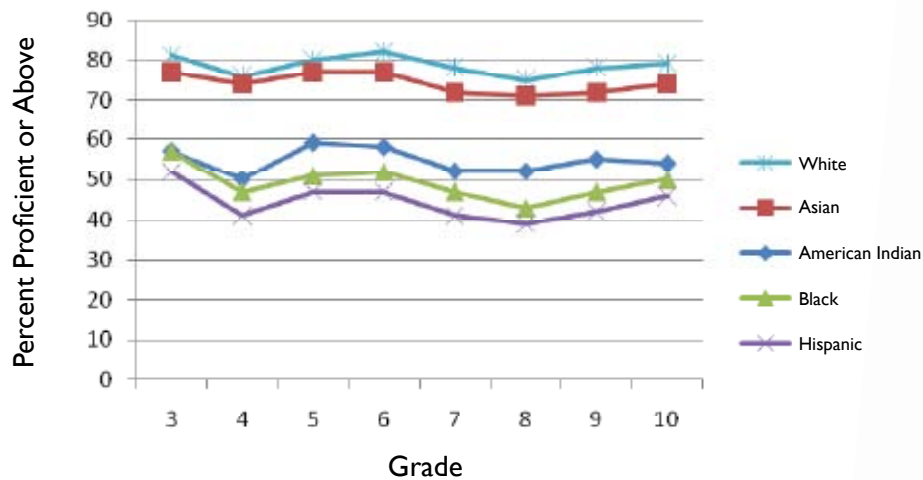

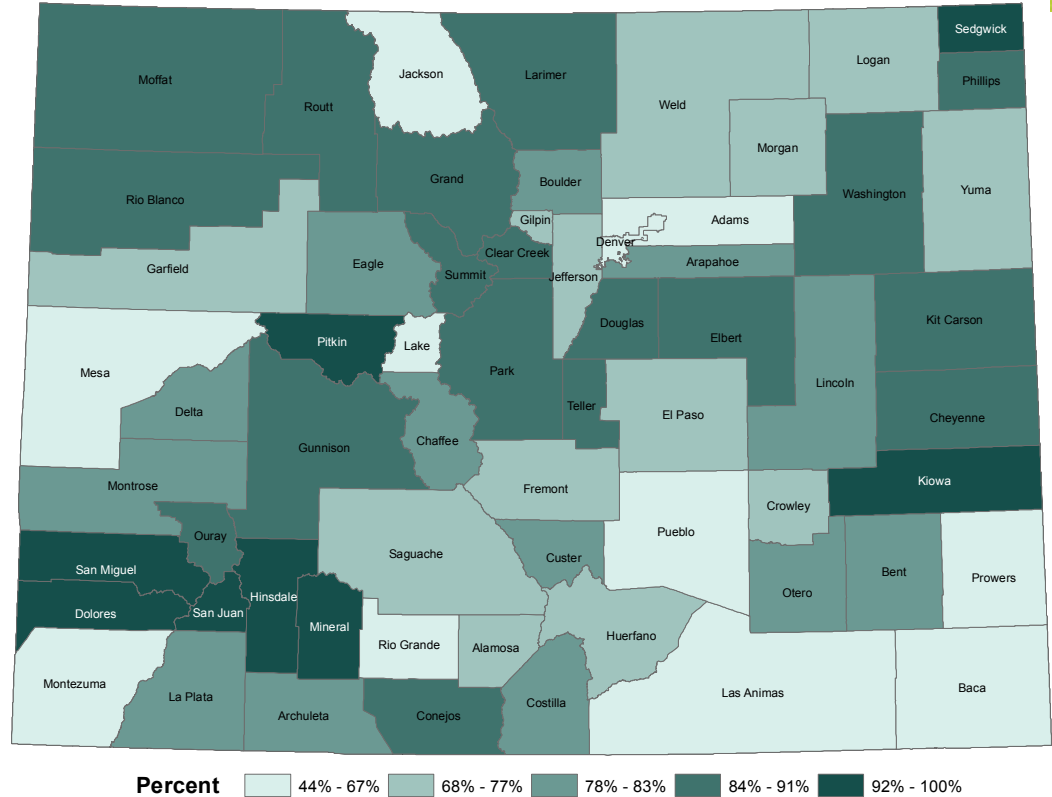
## 2006 Graduation Rates

In 2006, Colorado's statewide high school graduation rate was reported by the Colorado Department of Education as 74.1 percent.<sup>44</sup>

Colorado's graduation rates vary by county, and the lowest county rates underscore the challenges some school districts face in ensuring that poor and minority students succeed in school. In some counties, school districts with large populations of Hispanic, African-American, and low-income students reported that fewer than two-thirds, and in some cases, fewer than half, of these students graduated. These low rates are a significant component of Colorado's achievement gap.

In Colorado, graduation rates vary consistently between racial groups and by gender. Asian females are the most likely to graduate. Hispanic males are the least likely. While ethnic minority students are disproportionately represented among students who fail to graduate on time, in terms of total numbers of students, white students represent the largest group of students not graduating from high school. In 2000, approximately 42,000 white students represented 63.5 percent of the state's 9th grade enrollment. More than 8,000 of these students did not graduate from high school on time.

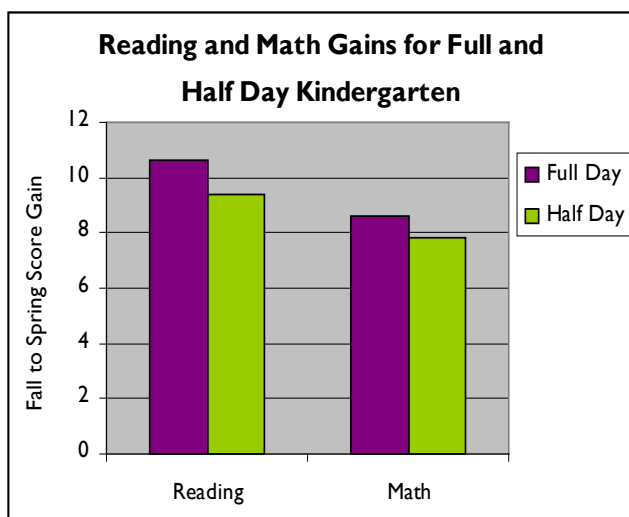

# Early Childhood Trends

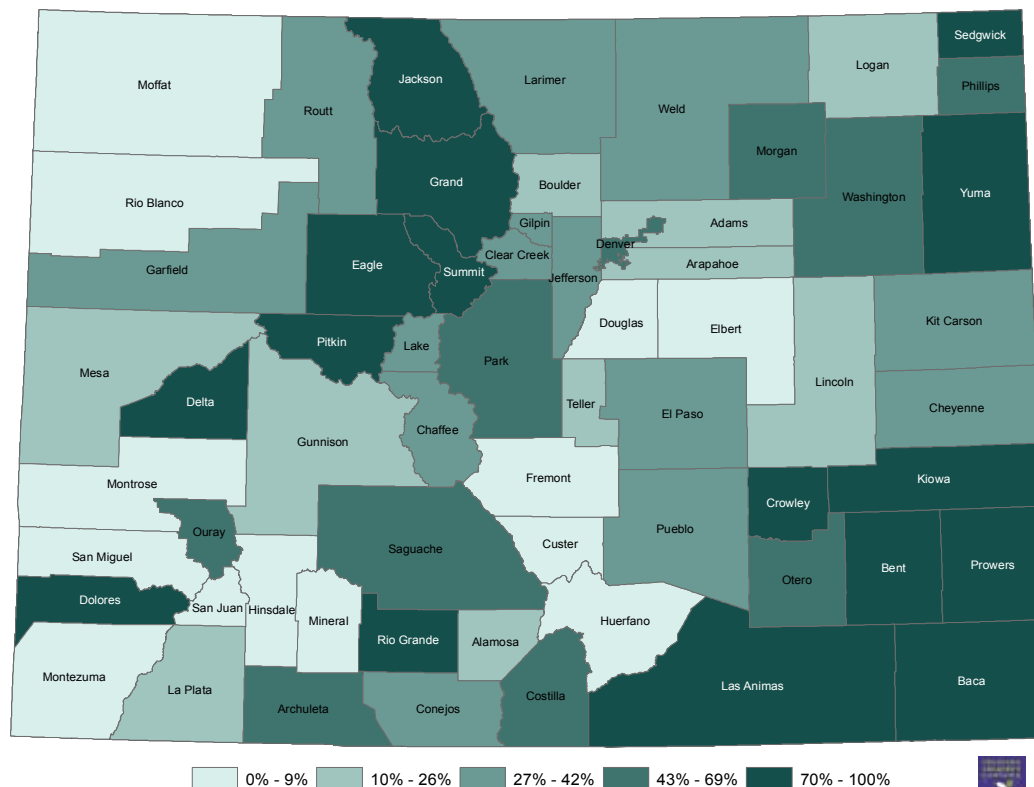
## Full-Day Kindergarten

In Colorado, 34.1 percent of kindergarten children attend full-day, publicly-funded programs in public schools, compared to 59 percent of kindergarteners nationally.<sup>46</sup> In the 2007-2008 school year, 2,454 Colorado children (3.63 percent) attended full-day kindergarten through the Colorado Preschool and Kindergarten Program (CPKP), with the rest funded through other sources such as Title I, local school district general funds and parent tuition.<sup>47</sup>

Empirical research on the effects of full- versus half-day kindergarten reveals that children who attend full-day kindergarten show significantly stronger academic gains in reading and math over the course of the kindergarten year than their counterparts in half-day kindergarten.

- Children in full-day kindergarten programs gain 12.8 percent more than children in half-day programs on reading assessments between fall and spring.
- Children in full-day kindergarten programs gain 10.3 percent more than children in half-day programs on math assessments between fall and spring.<sup>48</sup>

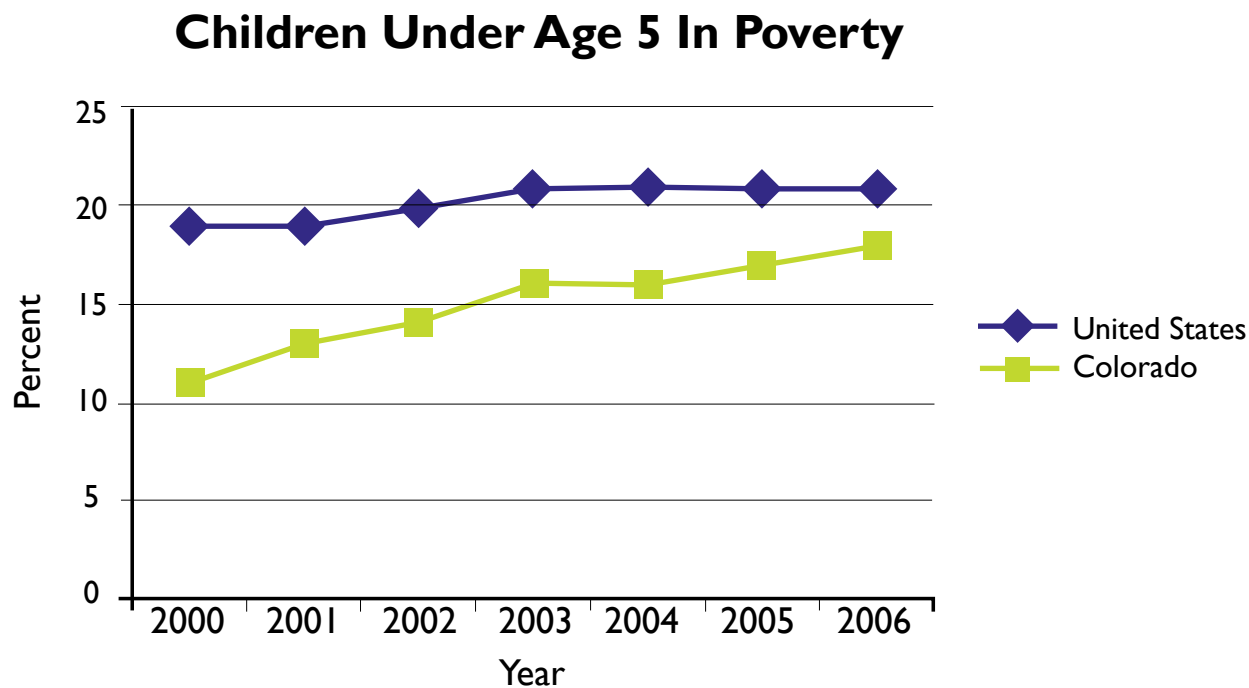

Results from programs suggest children in full-day kindergarten programs have more opportunities to engage in valuable learning activities than children in half-day programs. Children in full-day kindergarten programs spend approximately 25 minutes more per day on more self-directed activities linked with long-term learning than in half-day programs.<sup>49</sup> Additionally, children in full-day programs also spend 16 percent less time engaged in large-group, teacher-directed activities and 7 percent more time engaged in child-initiated learning such as center-based free play, leading to improved affective development, expressive ability and social skills among children.<sup>50</sup>

In addition to the impact of the length of the day, kindergarten programs that meet high quality standards are more likely to achieve the expected improvement in learning and development. Quality indicators for full-day programs include small class size and low student-teacher ratios, developmentally appropriate learning environments, and flexible classrooms that group students based on ability.

## Colorado Preschool and Kindergarten Program

As referenced previously, 18 percent (61,000) of children under the age of five live in poverty in Colorado. This number has been steadily increasing since 2000.<sup>51</sup>

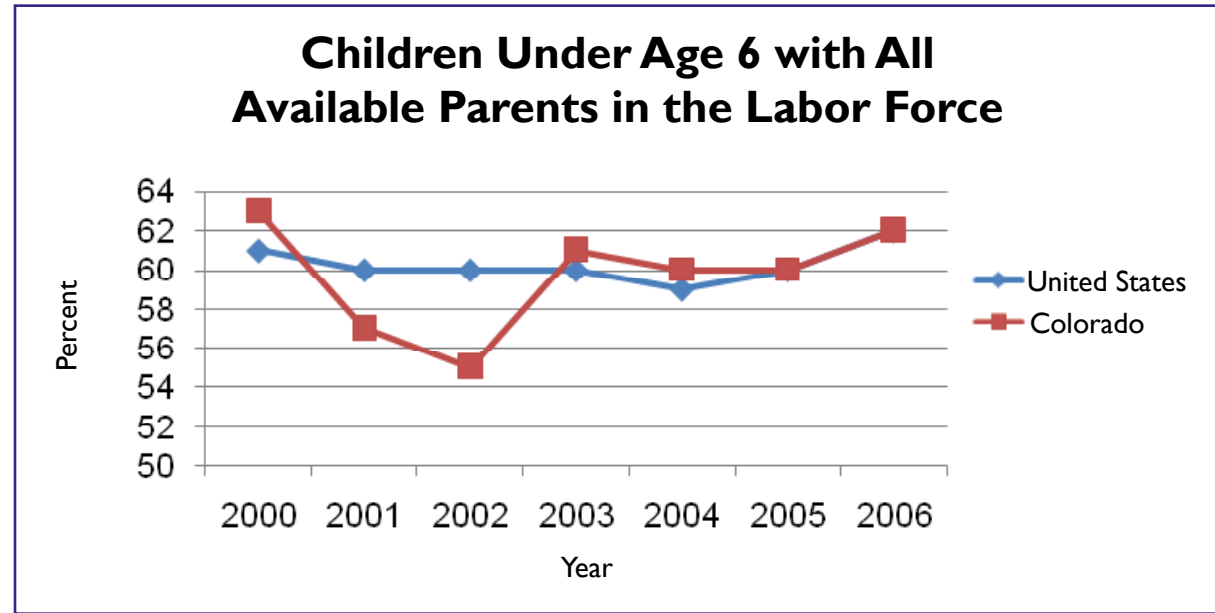

The need for high-quality early care and education to serve this at-risk group of kids is increasing. For the 2007-2008 school year, the Colorado Preschool and Kindergarten Program (CPKP) is authorized to serve 16,360 at-risk children. The number of slots available has increased since last year by 2,000. To qualify for the CPKP program, children must meet one or more risk factors, including eligibility for the federal Free and Reduced Price Lunch Program, the need for language development, drug or alcohol abuse in the family, homelessness, or parents or guardians with less than a high school education. According to a report by the Colorado Department of Education, an additional 8,205 preschool children were screened and found eligible for the CPKP program, but were unable to participate due to lack of funded slots.<sup>52</sup> It is likely that more potentially-eligible children have not been identified.



### Children Under Age 6 with All Available Parents in the Labor Force



The availability of licensed child care is important to Colorado’s workforce and families – particularly low-income, single parent households, or families where both parents are a part of the workforce.

***In 2008:***

- 98,503 total slots exist for licensed child care for children from birth through age six, serving 25.9 percent of that population;
- 8,684 slots exist for children birth to age one, serving 11.5 percent of that population;
- 10,200 slots exist for children age one, serving 13.5 percent of that population; and
- 79,619 slots exist for children ages two through four, serving 34.8 percent of that population.<sup>53</sup>

### **Young Child Population** (number)

Number of children less than 5 years of age provided by the Colorado Demography Section, Colorado Department of Local Affairs.

### **School-Aged Population** (number)

Number of children 5 through 17 years of age provided by the Colorado Demography Section, Colorado Department of Local Affairs.

### **Live Births** (number)

Number of P-12 public school students served by the McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Program during the 2006-07 school year provided by the Colorado Department of Education, based on Colorado school district submissions. The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Program serves homeless children and youth, which they define as "individuals who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence...; and includes (i) children and youths who are sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or similar reason; are living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative accommodations; are living in emergency or transitional shelters; are abandoned in hospitals; or are awaiting foster care placement; (ii) children and youths who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings...(iii) children and youths who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus train stations, or similar settings; and (iv) migratory children who qualify as homeless for the purposes of this subtitle because the children are living in circumstances described in clauses (i) through (iii)." Please note that this indicator is derived only from school or school district records. This does not represent the total number of homeless children and youth in these communities, which would include both those children who were enrolled during the year and those who were not. Additionally, children and youth in homeless situations are difficult to identify for many reasons. High mobility, fear of stigmas, and invisibility of populations not living in shelters or accessing other service agencies are examples of reported identification barriers. While the data above are based on continual district efforts in identifying students who are homeless, the complexity regarding identification challenges would indicate the actual numbers of students who are homeless in Colorado school districts and counties are most likely higher than those reported.

### **Children Under 5 Receiving WIC** (percent)

Number of infants and children under age 5 receiving services from the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children provided by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. The rate is the monthly average of number of children served by WIC per 100 children less than 5 years of age. Calculations performed by the Colorado Children's Campaign. Note: Some county WIC programs provide services to children from other counties. Conejos, Gilpin, Hinsdale, Mineral and San Juan counties did not have a WIC program in 2005 and children in these counties were served by neighboring counties. Children in Conejos, Costilla, Denver, Rio Grande and Weld counties are served both by WIC and CSFP (Commodities Supplemental Food Program), depending on the child's age.

### **Children Qualifying for Free or Reduced Lunch** (percent)

Percent of children in public school grades K-12 who qualify for free or reduced price school lunches provided by the Colorado Department of Education. Public school children qualify for free lunches if their family's income is less than 130 percent of the federal poverty level. Public school children qualify for reduced price lunches if their family's income is less than 185 percent of the federal poverty level.

Number of children under age 18 living in families with incomes below poverty level in 2005 per 100 children living in families provided by the U.S. Census Bureau, Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE).

## **School-Aged Children (Ages 5-17) in Poverty** (percent)

Number of children ages 5 through 17 living in families with incomes below poverty level in 2005 per 100 children living in families provided by the U.S. Census Bureau, Small Area Income and Poverty Estimates (SAIPE).

## **2000 Households Below Self-Sufficiency Standard** (percent)

Percent of households below Self-Sufficiency Standard provided by the Colorado Fiscal Policy Institute. The Colorado Fiscal Policy Institute has analyzed 2000 Census data to compare household composition and location with the Self-Sufficiency Standard for Colorado to determine whether each sample household has adequate income to meet their most basic needs without any public or private assistance or supports. The Self-Sufficiency Standard for Colorado describes the income required by Colorado's working families to pay for the basic needs of housing, food, child care, health care, transportation, miscellaneous costs and taxes, on a county-by-county basis. The Standard is calculated for every Colorado county and 70 different family types. The data presented are the percent of households in each county with income below the Standard associated with that family type and location.

## **CHILD AND MATERNAL HEALTH**

### **Low Birth Weight Births** (percent)

Babies born weighing 5.5 pounds or less (less than 2500 grams) per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two low birth weight births in the county.

### **Early Prenatal Care** (percent)

Births in which prenatal care was initiated in the first trimester of pregnancy per 100 live births with know start of prenatal care provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two births to mothers receiving early prenatal care in the county.

### **Women Smoking During Pregnancy** (percent)

Births in which women reported smoking during pregnancy on infant's birth certificate per 100 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Please note that these data are most likely underreported on birth certificates across the state due to mothers knowing they shouldn't smoke during pregnancy. Low numbers of events (LNE) indicates one or two births to women smoking during pregnancy in the county.

### **Infant Mortality** (rate per 1,000)

Deaths in the first year of life per 1,000 live births provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two infant deaths in the county.

Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two child deaths in the county. ## **Teen (Ages 15-19) Deaths Due to Injuries** (rate per 100,000)

Deaths due to intentional and unintentional injuries per 100,000 teens ages 15 through 19 in Colorado provided by the Health Statistics Section, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment. The data include deaths due to homicide, suicide and accidents. Low number of events (LNE) indicates one or two teen deaths in the county.

## **FY 2006-07 Children (0-18) Enrolled in CHP+** (percent)

Number of children ages 0 through 18 enrolled in Child Health Plan Plus (CHP+) during fiscal year 2006-07 provided by the Colorado Department of Health Care Policy and Finance. Data for counties with fewer than 30 clients are not reported, which is indicated by low number of events (LNE). Rate calculated by the Colorado Children's Campaign. Children under 19 years old with family incomes up to 200 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL), who do not qualify for Medicaid, are eligible for CHP+. The statistic reported in this table is the percentage of the population ages 0 through 18 who were enrolled in CHP+ at any point during FY 06-07. Important Note: The numbers used to calculate this rate include a unique count of all clients who had eligibility at any time over the course of the year. The Child Health Plan Plus numbers reported in this table do not match official budget numbers. Official budget numbers reflect an average monthly caseload over the course of a year. The official budget numbers are lower than the numbers reported in this table. The official budget numbers are a fairly stable monthly average, while this table reports every individual served at any point during the year.

Children up to the age of 6 who are in families with incomes below 133 percent of the federal poverty level (FPL) are eligible for Medicaid. Children ages 6 through 18 years old in families with incomes below 100 percent of the FPL are also eligible for Medicaid. The statistic reported in this table is the percentage of the population ages 0 through 18 who were enrolled in Medicaid at any point during FY 06-07. Important Note: The numbers used to calculate this rate include a unique count of all clients who had eligibility at any time over the course of the year. The Medicaid numbers reported in this table do not match official budget numbers. Official budget numbers reflect an average monthly caseload over the course of a year. The official budget numbers are lower than the numbers reported in this table. ## **2000 Children (Under 18) Uninsured** (percent)

Percent of children under age 18 uninsured provided by the U.S. Census Bureau, Small Area Health Insurance Estimates. The 90 percent confidence intervals range from plus or minus one percentage point for the state to over three percentage points for some counties. However, we believe this is currently the best available data on children's uninsurance rates at the county level. ### **English Language Learners** (percent)

Number of students classified as English Language Learners divided by total enrollment provided by the Colorado Department of Education. Calculations performed by the Colorado Children's Campaign.

### **Immigrant School Aged Children** (percent)

The term "immigrant children" means individuals who are ages 3-21, were not born in any State, and have not been attending one or more schools in any one or more States for more than 3 full academic years. ### **High School Graduation Rate** (percent)

The 2006 graduation data was compiled by the Colorado Department of Education.
