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STATISTICS OF EDUCATION OF THE NEGRO RACE 1925-26

This report includes statistics of the various forms of institutions that have to do with the education of the negro race in the United States. These statistics are taken from the best available information furnished by State departments of education, private high schools and academies, teacher-training institutions, and colleges, universities, and professional schools for the year 1925-26. In a few cases, as noted, where 1926 information could not be secured, the last available information is used. Much valuable information on elementary education in certain sections of the country where segregation is not practiced could not be secured, as no separate records are kept for the different races. Most of the information included in these tables is found in several other bulletins of the Bureau of Education, but it is thought to be more desirable to have this information collected into a single publication.

Table 1 gives the development of negro education from the year 1917-18 to 1926. Probably at no time in history has such rapid progress been made educationally, oftentimes under unfavorable circumstances, by any people as in this short period of nine years. According to the census of 1870, there were less than 150,000 colored people in the entire United States who had ever been in school, but by 1880 in the Southern States alone there were reported 784,707 pupils in the public schools. This number had increased to 1,296,959 in 1890; to 1,560,070 in 1900; to 1,712,137 in 1910; to 2,103,715 in 1920; and to 2,218,312 in 1926.

Table 2 shows the public-school enrollment in 18 Southern States. It is probable that there are 300,000 colored pupils in the public schools in the Northern and Western States.

Table 3 shows the average daily attendance, aggregate days attended, and number of teachers in 17 States. The number of days attended has increased 51 per cent in nine years.

Table 4 gives the enrollment by grades in public schools of 17 States where separate records of this kind are furnished. While this table shows comparatively few pupils in the high-school grades, this number is twelve times as great as during the year 1909-10, without taking into consideration the much higher standards of education in 1925-26. Thirty-three per cent of the pupils are in the first grade, while for the entire United States the rate is 17 per cent. For

the high schools the percentages are $3\frac{1}{2}$ and 15, respectively. This would indicate that extensive provision should be made for a greatly increased enrollment in the high schools in the near future.

Table 5 gives a distribution of pupils by grades in public schools in 12 States biennially, beginning with the year 1919-20 and ending with the year 1925-26. It will be noticed that, of the 474,836 pupils in 1919-20 in the first grade, 199,238 had reached the third grade in 1921-22; of these, 119,395 were in the fifth grade in 1923-24; and of the original number 56,501 had reached the seventh grade in 1925-26. Expressed in percentages, 42 per cent reached the third grade, 25.1 per cent reached the fifth grade and 11.9 per cent reached the seventh grade. Forty-two and one-half per cent of the pupils in the first grade in 1921-22 reached the third grade in 1923-24, and 27.3 per cent reached the fifth grade in 1925-26. Forty-three per cent of those in the first grade in 1923-24 reached the third grade in 1925-26. Thirty-six per cent of the high-school pupils in the first year in 1919-20 reached the third year in 1921-22; 41 per cent of those in the first year in 1921-22 reached the third year in 1923-24; and 43.8 per cent of those in the first year in 1923-24 reached the third year in 1925-26. These percentages show that in each succeeding group more pupils are being advanced to higher grades and that they are staying in school longer. During the school year 1919-20 out of 10,000 pupils in these 12 States 9 were in the fourth year of high school; in the year 1921-22, 16; in the year 1923-24 there were 23; and in 1925-26 there were 34.

Tables 6 and 7 give teachers, pupils, property, and receipts for private institutions of secondary and higher rank. In 1915-16 there were 30,803 elementary pupils in such institutions as compared with 16,663 in 1925-26. This decrease is due to the fact that many of these institutions, as they increase in rank and standards, are discontinuing their elementary departments. A few higher institutions are no longer giving any courses in secondary education, but are devoting their entire time and resources to collegiate and professional courses. Property, including endowments, has increased from \$17,323,108 to \$46,141,973, and the receipts from \$3,130,693 to \$15,686,007 annually during the 11-year period.




FIG. 1.—Growth in high-school enrollment, 1906-1926

Tables 8 to 10, inclusive, with reference to Figure 1, explain the present condition of public high schools, and show the number of teachers and pupils, kinds of schools, and their rapid growth during the past 20 years. Table 10 shows 42 per cent of high-school pupils in reorganized high schools, as compared with 58 per cent in the traditional high schools. This would indicate that the comparatively new idea of the reorganized high school is meeting with much favor.




FIG. 2.—Days per year attended by pupils—Enrollment in teacher-training courses

Tables 11 to 15, inclusive, show conditions of teacher-training institutions. Figure 2 illustrates the enrollment in public teacher-

training institutions, which is nearly three times as great in 1926 as in 1918. During the same period those institutions under private control increased their enrollment 136 per cent and nearly every college is providing courses in teacher training.

Tables 16 to 20, inclusive, give a list of privately controlled colleges, universities, and professional schools, with a full detail of the number of teachers and students, courses offered, property, receipts, and endowments.

Tables 21 to 24, inclusive, give the students, teachers, property, receipts, and expenditures of institutions receiving financial aid from the United States Government under provisions of the various acts relating to land-grant colleges, 12 of which are also listed under public teacher-training institutions. In addition to the students listed in these tables, there are reported 195 colored men and 81 colored women in northern and western land-grant colleges.

Tables 25 and 26 give lists of the public and private high schools. Many of these private institutions are extending their courses of study, with the aim of becoming fully accredited colleges.

The increasing growth of schools has made a corresponding demand for more and better trained teachers. This demand has caused increases in salaries which, though not equaling the average of \$1,277 paid both colored and white teachers throughout the United States, still promise better in the future. North Carolina and Maryland pay an average salary to all colored teachers of \$455 and \$857, respectively. The list here given shows the average salaries paid colored men and women teachers in the States reporting:

Figure 1 shows the rapid growth of the public high school since 1906, as compared with private high schools. While the private high schools and secondary departments in private colleges are making rapid progress, the public high schools have doubled their enrollment in some of the four-year periods.

Figure 2 illustrates graphically the increase in the average number of days per year attended by each pupil in the public schools, and the

increase in enrollment in public teacher-training institutions and in colleges, universities, and professional schools from 1918 to 1926. Of the 23 days' increase in the average number of days attended per pupil per year, 5 days are due to better attendance and 18 days to lengthened school term. The increase in enrollment in colleges, universities, and professional schools is 72 per cent. The increase in the preparatory departments is 13 per cent; in the professional departments, 11.5 per cent; and in the courses leading to the degrees of bachelor of arts and bachelor of science the increase is 345 per cent.
