LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL.

The subject to which it relates is of the utmost importance, not only to the upbuilding of American civilization in one of its finest forms, but also to the progress of many of those industries which underlie our civilization. While the returns upon which this monograph is based are by no means complete, even such presentation of the subject as has been found possible with the materials at hand will undoubtedly prove extremely serviceable.

INSTRUCTION IN THE FINE AND MANUAL ARTS IN THE UNITED STATES.

INTRODUCTION.

Art instruction aims to raise the standard of taste. It includes instruction in seeing and interpreting the beautiful in nature and the arts, in drawing, both free-hand and instrumental, in designing, coloring, and modeling, in manipulating paper, cloth, leather, wood, metal, or other material, to produce a result having elements of beauty.

The history of art instruction in the United States may be gathered from Education in the Industrial and Fine Arts, by Isaac Edwards Clarke, published by the Bureau of Education, 1885-1898. Its current philosophy, methods, and results may be gathered from Art Education in the Public Schools of the United States, edited by James Parton Haney, published by the American Art Annual, New York, 1908. The scope of the present monograph is limited to statistical information upon the status of Art Education in the United States in 1906-7.

Art instruction, in the broadest sense, is promoted in the United States through the cooperation of many agencies. Chief among these are the public schools, art schools, special evening schools, art educational organizations and publications (many not avowedly art educational and therefore, perhaps, more widely influential), art departments in normal schools and in colleges and universities, summer schools, handicraft societies, public libraries having departments of art, lecture courses, and local exhibitions. To gather complete returns from each and all of these agencies is manifestly impossible. To state in the form of statistical tables the potency of each is equally impossible. To take such returns as the Bureau of Education could secure, arrange in orderly fashion, and summarize; to select from the summaries the most significant totals and compare them, and to set forth in a form convenient for reference such data as may be of service to those engaged in promoting art education, is within the range of possibility, and is the purpose of this monograph.

Art instruction is of less than forty years standing in American education.

In autocratic forms of government changes in educational practice may be commanded and controlled by the central authority; in a democracy such changes are initiated by private individuals and consummated only by public sentiment. Any movement, originating with the people, and spreading outward by force of its inherent virtue, is first local in its influence, then municipal; later it affects the State, and ultimately the National Government. The movement for art instruction is no exception to this law. Originating a generation ago, in the minds of a few far-seeing men, it has made wide conquests of cities, but it has not as yet achieved legislative victories in even a majority of the States, and its influence upon the Federal Government as such is still hardly perceptible.

THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT.

The Federal Government makes no appropriations whatever for art instruction. Of the \$1,086,950 appropriated by Congress for the public schools of the District of Columbia, \$77,500 approximately goes to the maintenance of instruction in drawing and manual training.^a The cost of instruction in drawing and topography in the Military Academy at West Point and in the Naval Academy at Annapolis is about \$12,000 annually. Perhaps to these amounts should be added the annual appropriation for salaries of officials in charge of the Division of Prints in the Library of Congress, \$5,560. The appropriation for the increase of the library is made in a lump sum; and it has been impossible to determine the amount devoted to enlarging the collections which might properly be classed as promoting art education, directly or indirectly.

The recent rediscovery of a National Gallery of Art, and the acceptance by the Government of the Evans and Freer collections and of the bequest of Harriet Lane Johnston, are indications that art education may soon become a national interest, promoted here, as in other countries, by annual appropriations for the purchase of works of art and handicraft, of incalculable value in the development of public taste.

THE STATES.

The attitude of the States toward art instruction may be gathered from Table 1, page 18.

These returns show that drawing is now required by legislative enactment as a part of the course of study in the public schools in 12 of the 48 States—just one-fourth. It is approved by the state authorities and promoted by means of instruction in state normal schools, in summer schools, and in state and county institutes; by

teachers' examinations, by official courses, and by school documents, in 31 others, making a total of 43 States actively interested in the subject; in 10 of these States scholarships are maintained in art educational institutions (other than state normal schools) at an annual expenditure of more than \$100,000; and in 18 of them drawing and various handicrafts are included in the courses in reformatory institutions at an estimated total cost of about \$40,000 per year.

Forty-one States maintain a total of 138 normal schools, the returns from 88 of which are given in Table 2, pages 20-31. These schools require the services of 565 teachers of manual arts^a to instruct 31,678 students, at an annual expenditure of \$195,395.^b

Two of the States, Massachusetts and New York, employ state supervisors of art instruction, at a yearly outlay of \$3,000 each. These men are well trained, ripened by experience, and employed as agents to promote art instruction within their respective commonwealths. They visit the cities and towns, inspect schools, discuss methods, suggest courses of study, supervise instruction in drawing and handicraft in normal schools, gather information relative to their specialty, and publish annual reports under the direction of the state boards of education. No more efficient means of advancing sound art instruction in the public schools has yet been discovered. These men are unhampered by political control, and free to advocate the most approved methods without fear or favor. They are influential in the selection of city and town supervisors of drawing and have a stimulating effect upon all teachers of art and craft who come under their influence.

One State, Massachusetts, maintains a State Normal Art School, at an annual expense of about \$34,000.

This school was established by act of legislature in 1873. It is the alma mater not only of some of the foremost men in art education and in the artistic professions, but, in a very real sense, of many of the foremost art educational institutions of the United States. Among its graduates are painters such as Richard Andrew, Milton Bancroft, William Birney, Olaf M. Brauner, Wallace Bryant, Walter L. Deane, E. W. D. Hamilton, William J. Kaula, John N. Marble, A. H. Mansell, Theodore E. Richardson, Will S. Robinson, and Robert W. Vonnoh; illustrators such as Charles Wellington Furlong, Charles A. Lawrence, Walter B. Russell, and Will L. Taylor; sculptors such as Herbert S. Adams, George T. Brewster, and Herman A. MacNeil; designers such as Alfred M. Bell, John Boyle, and Minnie S. Seaver.

(stained glass), and Celeste W. Albright, Edgar W. Jenny, and Christian Roos (interiors); architects such as Charles E. Hooper, Henry H. Kendall, and Henry H. Rogers; and supervisors of drawing such as Henry Turner Bailey, editor of *The School Arts Book*; Charles M. Carter, Denver; Frank H. Collins, New York; Fred H. Daniels, Newton; Walter S. Goodenough, Brooklyn; William A. Mason, Philadelphia; Walter Sargent, Boston; and a hundred others, employed in almost every State in the Union. The two state supervisors, Mr. Eugene C. Colby, of New York, and Mr. Frederick L. Burnham, of Massachusetts, are also graduates of this school. Among graduates who have become leaders in art education in other schools are the following: Ernest A. Batchelder, director of art, Throop Polytechnic Institute, California; Bernard V. Carpenter, principal of Art School, Buffalo, N. Y.; Frank F. Frederick, director, School of Industrial Arts, Trenton, N. J.; James Hall, director, department of art, Ethical Culture School, New York; James Frederick Hopkins, director, Maryland Institute of Art, Baltimore; Leslie W. Miller, principal, School of Industrial Art, Philadelphia; Georgie L. Norton, principal, Cleveland School of Art, Cleveland, Ohio; Walter S. Perry, director, department of fine and applied arts, Pratt Institute, Brooklyn, N. Y.; William H. Varnum, director, School of Fine and Applied Arts, James Milliken University, Decatur, Ill.; William Woodward, Tulane University, New Orleans, La.

The faculty of the school, under the principalship of Mr. George H. Bartlett, consists of 20 teachers, many of them of international reputation. The students last year numbered 356.^a

In one State, New York, loan collections of wall pictures, hand photographs, and lantern slides are offered for use in all cities and towns at a merely nominal charge, transportation being paid by the State. Wall pictures are loaned for one year, hand photographs and lantern slides for such length of time as borrowers may elect, within reasonable limits. In this State, duplication of money is allowed, within limits fixed by law, on the purchase of *approved* standard wall pictures by a city (or incorporated village) school system, a union school maintaining an academic department, or a nonsectarian registered private academy.

The maximum allowances for books, pictures, and apparatus for all grades during any one school year are as follows: To a city, \$18, with a further sum based on the number of teachers at the rate of \$2 each, and a still further sum based on the number of academic departments or high schools at the rate of \$250 each; to a union school district maintaining an academic department, \$268, and \$2 additional for each teacher; to an academy, \$250.

In making application for the allowance of duplicate money, only official blanks may be used. These are sent upon request. Before purchases are made, the information called for on the official blank must be returned for approval to the education department at Albany.

These loan collections are now extensive, and are being enriched every year.^a

The total annual expenditure from the state treasuries for art instruction (not including the duplicate moneys in New York just referred to) may be summarized as follows:

MUNICIPALITIES.

Almost universally in the United States, in centers of population, the city or town is now the educational unit, free, within certain limits imposed by the State, to formulate its own courses of study, to fix the minimum requirements for its teachers, and to determine the basis for promoting its pupils and the standard of attainment for their graduation. The extent to which municipalities have fostered art instruction is therefore indicative of the people's estimate of its value.

Inquiry blanks were sent only to cities and towns having a population of 4,000 and over. Had all such municipalities made return, the figures would not have given the true totals, for in many States, notably Massachusetts, the smaller towns offer art instruction, and often combine to form districts for the supervision of which a special teacher of drawing is employed.

Of the 1,325 municipalities to which blanks were sent, returns were received from 996. The results are here treated under four headings: Elementary schools, public high schools, manual and industrial training schools, and evening schools.

Elementary schools.—The returns from these schools are given in full in Table 3, page 30, and summarized on page 68. These returns from 996 cities show that in 933, or 93.6 per cent, drawing is a required subject in elementary schools. Of the 996 cities reporting, 701, or 70.4 per cent, employ supervisors or special teachers of drawing at an average salary of \$768 per year. Handicraft of some form is found in the elementary schools of 430 cities, 288 of which employ supervisors or directors of handicraft at an average salary of \$953 per year.^b The total cost of supplies for drawing for the year 1906-7 in the 710

cities reporting this item was \$264,734, an average of about \$373 per city. As these cities have a total of 1,972,645 pupils in elementary schools, the average per pupil was 13.4 cents. The total cost of supplies for handicraft instruction for the year in the 430 cities reporting this item was \$226,649, an average of about \$527 per city. As these cities have a total of 2,066,707 pupils in elementary schools, the average expense per pupil was 10.96 cents.

In 909 cities reporting time devoted to drawing in elementary grades, the average time was eighty-four minutes per week.

In 229 cities reporting time given to handicraft, the average time devoted to it was seventy-eight minutes per week.

The 996 cities reporting employ an additional force of special teachers of drawing and handicraft to the total number of 848, at a total annual cost of \$752,025.

Hence the total annual cost of maintaining art instruction in the elementary schools of these 996 cities, so far as reported, is \$2,068,587:

Public high schools.—Under this heading are included high schools of the traditional type, offering general and college preparatory courses, into which art instruction in some form has been introduced. The returns from the 620 reporting are given in full in Table 4, page 70, and summarized on page 98.

From these returns it appears that in the 620 high schools reporting, art instruction is required in 258 and elective in 314; and that 173,981 pupils have instruction in drawing and some form of handicraft. The expenditure for teachers' salaries in this department for 1906-7, in the 419 schools reporting this item, was \$672,096. The cost of materials in the 434 schools reporting this item was \$105,043. In addition, money was spent for new equipment and reference material, in 262 schools reporting on this point, to the amount of \$93,047; and for incidentals in 196 schools reporting this item, to the amount of \$13,430. The total expenditure, therefore, by cities for art instruction in public high schools, so far as reported, was \$883,616, or \$5.08 per pupil in drawing and handicraft.

Manual and industrial training schools.—Technical high schools, manual arts high schools, manual training schools, and all similar institutions receiving pupils of high-school grade are included under this heading. These are largely city public schools, and are accordingly treated here under the general head, "municipalities." The returns are given in full in Table 5, page 102, and summarized on page 118.

In the 135 institutions reporting, manual arts studies are required in 76 and optional in 7, while 52 do not report upon this point. These schools report a total of 61,349 pupils receiving instruction in the manual arts. The salaries of manual arts teachers in 91 schools reporting this item aggregate \$1,008,617. The cost of materials for the year 1906-7 in 83 schools reporting this item was \$186,995. For new equipment and repairs, 68 schools report an expenditure for the year of a total of \$164,423, and 65 schools report an expenditure of \$207,943 for incidentals. The grand total reported as expended by cities for art instruction in technical high schools is, therefore, \$1,567,978, or about \$25.56 per manual arts pupil.

Total expended by cities.—Summarizing the totals, the aggregate sum expended for arts and handicraft instruction by the cities reporting is found to be as follows:

Nor is this all. During the past twenty years 162 manual arts libraries have been established in these institutions of high-school grade, with a total number of 134,708 volumes; and 154 local museums have been started, in the stocking of which \$145,125 have been expended. To these figures must be added \$47,222 for similar material provided for pupils in the elementary schools, making a total of \$192,347.

Evening schools.—In Massachusetts, cities of 10,000 inhabitants and over are required by law to maintain free evening drawing schools. There are 40 such cities in the State. In these cities about 130 teachers instruct annually about 4,000 pupils in such topics as free-hand and geometrical drawing, machine and architectural drawing, and design, with applications varying according to local needs. These schools bring the opportunity for self-improvement along these lines within reach of 70 per cent of the entire population of the State. Similar schools are maintained by cities in other States, but only the most fragmentary information concerning them is available. It is therefore impossible at the present time to tabulate the expenditures of municipalities for evening art instruction.

In many cities such instruction is offered in private art schools and endowed institutions, such as Cooper Union of New York, Maryland Institute of Baltimore, the Art Institute of Chicago, and the Carnegie Institute of Pittsburgh. Other classes are maintained by the Young Men's Christian associations, often with great success. Concerning all such schools and classes statistics have never been gathered by the Bureau of Education.

Popular movement for schoolroom decoration.—Public interest in art education manifests itself not only through the channels of municipal

and state organization, but more directly through cooperative work for the school children. The most notable example of such work appears in the widespread movement for schoolroom decoration. Beginning in Massachusetts with Charles C. Perkins and John D. Philbrick, in 1870, but attracting little, if any, public attention until about 1892, when Ross Turner, "The Father of Schoolroom Decoration," began his "campaign of education," the movement has spread rapidly throughout almost the entire country. It has been the work largely of teachers and supervisors of drawing, assisted by private citizens and school children. Of the thousands of dollars expended for photographs, casts, and other reproductions and works of art for schoolroom decoration during the past twenty-five years, probably less than 5 per cent has come from public funds. The money has been raised by means of private subscriptions, exhibitions, fairs, socials, entertainments, calendars designed and made by school children and sold from house to house, and many other devices such as only ingenuity backed by enthusiasm could invent. The returns given in the various tables may be summarized as follows:

Public interest in art education is shown also in the patronage given to a large number of institutions of various kinds, mostly private, offering courses in drawing, painting, design, and handicraft. These institutions may be grouped under such headings as private high schools and academies; universities, colleges, and technological schools for men, and for both men and women; colleges for women; art schools; and summer schools.

PRIVATE HIGH SCHOOLS AND ACADEMIES.

The returns from these institutions, so far as reported, are given in full in Table 6, page 122, and summarized on page 134. In the United States 197 such institutions offer manual-arts instruction, 94 require it, 77 make it an elective, 26 do not report upon this point. These institutions in 1906-7 had 21,827 students receiving art instruction. Of these schools, 89 spent \$105,252 for salaries of teachers and 90 spent \$20,190 for materials. New equipment, repairs, and incidentals brought the total amount reported up to \$121,781.

UNIVERSITIES, COLLEGES, AND TECHNOLOGICAL SCHOOLS FOR MEN,
AND FOR MEN AND WOMEN.

The returns from these institutions are given in full in Table 7, page 136, and summarized on page 148. In the 168 institutions reporting, manual-art studies are required in 48 and elective in 41, 79 not reporting this feature. Of the students in these institutions, 24,376 received instruction in manual arts. Sixty-nine of the institutions spent \$771,088 for teachers' salaries and 60 spent \$135,780 for material. New equipment, repairs, and incidentals swelled the total expenditure, so far as reported, to \$1,175,349.

COLLEGES FOR WOMEN.

The returns are given in detail in Table 8, pages 152-157, and summarized on page 158. From these it appears that in 55 institutions reporting, manual-art studies are required in 3 and elective in 18, this point not being reported on in the case of the remaining 34. A total of 3,538 students availed themselves of such instruction. Seven of these institutions maintain manual-arts libraries, aggregating 1,273 volumes. Fifteen have museum collections valued at a total of \$57,650. Twelve report class-room decorations valued at \$13,475. The total cost of equipment for manual-arts instruction in 10 institutions is reported as \$178,200. Expenditures as reported are as follows: Annual outlay for materials for manual-arts instruction, \$4,604; for instructors, \$40,635; for incidentals, \$1,370; total reported, \$46,609.

PRIVATE ART SCHOOLS, ETC.

The most complete list of private art schools and other institutions offering instruction in drawing, handicraft, and related topics is that published in the American Art Annual,^a from which Table 9, page 160, has been compiled. From this table it appears that there are in the United States at the present time 265 private art schools, employing 802 instructors. The number of students enrolled in 1906 was as follows:

Figures are not available for a statement of the annual expenditure of the people for art instruction through the instrumentality of private art schools, but it may be estimated at an amount equal at least to \$95 per pupil, or \$2,489,950.

SUMMER SCHOOLS.

The last quarter of the nineteenth century saw the rise and development in the United States of the summer school.^a Beginning with programmes calculated to improve religious instruction, the idea has been expanded and elaborated until these schools have become highly specialized. Art instruction is now the chief aim in an increasingly large number of these popular institutions. As a large percentage of those who attend are teachers in public day schools, the influence of the summer instruction is far reaching. To present a complete list of these schools is impossible. Every season witnesses the rise of new schools and the fall of old ones. No attempt has been made by the Bureau of Education to gather statistics concerning them. The list given in Table 10, page 171, though incomplete, is the best that can be prepared at the present time. It is made up from information gathered from the American Art Annual, and The School Arts Book. These schools vary in membership from a dozen students to several hundreds. The average attendance in 41 schools whose enrollment was known in the summer of 1908 was 60 students. Assuming this is the average for the 97 schools, the total membership would be approximately 5,820 students. Reckoning the average charges for board, room, supplies, and tuition at \$15 per week and the average length of the term as five weeks, the average cost per student would be \$75, or an aggregate of \$436,000.

ART MUSEUMS AND SOCIETIES.

Art museums and other organizations influential in developing taste have increased rapidly during the past forty years. The American Art Annual for 1907-8 gives the names, offices, and activities of 369 well-organized bodies influential in promoting a finer public taste. A reference list is furnished by Table 11, page 172. Some of these hold annual exhibitions of drawings, paintings, photographs, casts, or examples of fine handicraft. Some issue catalogues and bulletins of great value, often illustrated with half-tones from rare works of art. Several are beginning to issue leaflets for free distribution in the galleries, describing the principal works exhibited. Many, emulating the public libraries, are devising plans for reaching more of the great body of the people, and for making their exhibits more directly helpful to teachers and to work-

ingmen. The public libraries are increasingly active in gathering, and bringing to the attention of the public, photographic reproductions of works of art, and in developing art sections containing books of reference for students.

PUBLICATIONS.

Publications for the promotion of knowledge, taste, and skill in the realm of the arts are increasing in number and improving in quality. The list given in Table 12, page 180, is a revision of that published in the American Art Annual for 1907-8. Besides these 47 regular publications, there are scores of others not avowedly devoted to art education, which are, nevertheless, potent factors in its development; in fact, scarcely a monthly magazine or teachers' journal of any standing now ignores the arts. In every issue a department, a section, or some contributed article bears witness to the increasing interest of the American people in all matters pertaining to the fine and manual arts.

SUMMARY.

While the statistics here presented are necessarily incomplete, they make possible a rough estimate of the annual expenditure for art instruction in the United States:

This measures only in part the interest of the people of the United States in the subject of art instruction. The interest is widespread and rapidly increasing. The history of art instruction in France, Germany, and England furnishes ample data for predicting that in the near future the relation of art to industries and to national welfare will be so keenly appreciated by all our people that they will make more liberal appropriations for all effective agencies for furthering art instruction in the United States.
