FOREWORD

THE PRESENT PUBLICATION continues the series of annual statistical reports by the Office of Education on land-grant colleges, which first began for the academic year 1869-70. The series is distinguished, first, by its long history of 86 years, and second, by the scope of the information regarding the individual colleges and universities in the land-grant group.

To a greater extent than previously, the Office of Education is coordinating its data collection from the land-grant colleges and universities with the program of data collection from all institutions of higher education. This procedure facilitates comparisons with other groups of institutions and makes the data more useful generally.

Certain features of the present report deserve mention. First, there is provided a summary of the numerous laws (dating from 1862) under which Federal funds are allotted to the land-grant institutions. Second, the text has been expanded to call the reader's attention to various important figures of the tables. Third, two new tables have been included on degrees conferred by the land-grant institutions (tables 10 and 11). Finally, data have been systematically introduced to show the relative magnitude of the land-grant component in American higher education. Thus, the 69 land-grant institutions, constituting 5.1 percent of the 1,344 4-year institutions of 1954-55, included 20.3 percent of the total resident college-grade enrollment in 4-year institutions in November 1954, conferred 39.3 percent of all doctoral degrees granted in the year ending June 30, 1955, and were responsible for 54.2 percent of all expenditures for organized (separately budgeted) research in the fiscal year 1955.

Significant omissions in the present report also require mention. Data on faculty and on academic-year enrollment (as distinguished from November enrollment) are not included, such data now being scheduled for collection in even-numbered years only. The traditional collection of data on enrollment in selected professional fields (such as law and medicine) was deferred until such data could be collected from all institutions. The enrollment in engineering, however, has been reported for all institutions (including the land-grant colleges and universities) in Office of Education Circular No. 468, April 1956.

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STATISTICS OF LAND-GRANT COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES, YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1955¹

DATA ON ENROLLMENT, earned degrees conferred, income, expenditures, endowment, and physical plant facilities of the 69 land-grant colleges and universities for the year ended June 30, 1955, are presented in this bulletin. Since the establishment of the Office of Education in 1867, one of its functions has been the collection and dissemination of information on the land-grant institutions.

The 69 institutions include at least one college or university in each of the States and in Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. In each of 18 States (viz, Massachusetts and 17 Southern States) there are 2 institutions which participate in the land-grant funds; in each of 30 States and in Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico there is 1 institution. Data in the tables are generally divided into two groups: (a) "52 institutions," and (b) "17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students."

Since the last report, the name of Michigan State College has been changed to Michigan State University of Agriculture and Applied Science. Tennessee Agricultural and Industrial State College is now listed as Tennessee Agricultural and Industrial State University.

In the present report, the figures for Virginia Polytechnic Institute include data for the branch institution, Radford College, Woman's Division of Virginia Polytechnic Institute, at Radford, Va.; and the figures for West Virginia University include data for the branch institution, Potomac State College of West Virginia University at Keyser, W. Va. Throughout this bulletin, where a comparison is made between the year ended June 30, 1955, and the year ended June 30, 1954, the data previously published for the year ended June 30, 1954, have been revised to include these 2 branch institutions.

STUDENTS

Enrollment, November 1954.—In the 69 land-grant institutions, the total resident enrollment in November 1954 was 428,399 (table 6). This was an increase of 29,406, or 7.4 percent, over the corresponding

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enrollment for November 1953. The resident enrollment at the undergraduate and the graduate levels increased over the November 1953 enrollment by 6.6 and 13.3 percent, respectively. For all institutions of higher education in the aggregate United States¹ during the same period, the resident enrollment increased 9.5 percent (undergraduate, 9.6 percent; graduate, 8.4 percent).

Of the 428,399 resident students enrolled in the 69 land-grant institutions in November 1954, 404,961 (94.5 percent) were enrolled in the 52 land-grant institutions, and 23,438 (5.5 percent) were enrolled in the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students. For these two groups of land-grant institutions the enrollment data for November 1954 and the percent of change from November 1953 are given in tables A and B.

Enrollment of veterans, November 1954.—In the 69 land-grant institutions, as of November 1954, 71,425 veterans were enrolled in one or more college-grade courses (table 8). This included veterans enrolled as resident (undergraduate and graduate) and extension students of college grade. The veterans were enrolled under Public Law 16 (disabled World War II veterans), Public Law 346 (World War II veterans, other than those under Public Law 16), Public Law 894 (disabled "Korean veterans"), and Public Law 550 ("Korean veterans," other than those under Public Law 894). A comparison

of veterans enrollment for the fall of 1954 with the fall of 1953 is given in table C.

In the fall of 1954, the 71,425 veterans enrolled in the 69 land-grant institutions in college-grade resident or extension courses constituted 14.7 percent of the college-grade enrollment in resident and extension courses. In the fall of 1953, the 47,949 veterans enrolled in college-grade resident or extension courses in the 69 land-grant institutions

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were 10.7 percent of the total resident and extension college-grade enrollment.

Comparison of land-grant institutions with all institutions.—The 69 land-grant institutions, which represented 3.7 percent of the 1,857 institutions of higher education in the aggregate United States in 1954-55, enrolled 17.6 percent of all resident students (17.1 percent of the undergraduate, 22.5 percent of the graduate); 33.2 percent of all college-grade extension students; 46.8 percent of all non-college-grade extension enrollment; and 12.1 percent of all non-college-grade adult education enrollment.

Perhaps a more significant picture would be given by a comparison of the enrollments in the 69 land-grant institutions with enrollments in all institutions exclusive of junior colleges. There were 1,344 institutions of higher education (exclusive of the junior colleges) in the aggregate United States in the fall of 1954. The 69 land-grant institutions, which represented 5.1 percent of the 1,344, enrolled 20.3 percent of all resident college-grade students; 20.0 percent of all undergraduate students (22.7 percent of all full-time and 8.7 percent of all part-time); 36.0 percent of all college-grade extension students; 58.6 percent of all non-college-grade extension enrollment; and 24.1 percent of all enrollment in adult education.

DEGREES

In the 69 land-grant colleges and universities, a total of 79,232 earned degrees (at the bachelor's level or above) were conferred between July 1, 1954, and June 30, 1955. This was a decrease of 25 degrees (0.03 percent) from the number conferred in the same institutions during the year ended June 30, 1954. For all of the 1,320 degree-granting institutions of higher education in the aggregate United States, the decrease for the same period was 4,254 degrees (1.2 percent).

The number of degrees granted at each level by the 69 land-grant colleges and universities during the year ended June 30, 1955, and the percent of change from the preceding year are given in table D.

Data on the total number of degrees conferred and on the number conferred in each of the major fields of study by each of the land-grant colleges and universities are reported by name of institution and by field of study in *Earned Degrees Conferred by Higher Educational Institutions* (Office of Education Circular No. 461).

Major fields of study.—The number of degrees conferred by the 69 land-grant colleges and universities during 1954-55 is shown in table 9, by major field of study, and by level of degree. The degrees are classified under 66 major fields of study. In addition, 52 of the 66 fields are further grouped into 9 broad categories of specialization—

AGRICULTURE, BIOLOGICAL SCIENCES, EDUCATION, FINE ARTS, FOREIGN LANGUAGES, HEALING ARTS AND MEDICAL SCIENCES, PHYSICAL SCIENCES, RELIGION, and SOCIAL SCIENCES.

At the first level, the 3 major fields with the greatest number of degrees (Engineering, Business and commerce exclusive of accounting, and Education) represented 37.1 percent of the 61,624 first-level degrees conferred by all land-grant institutions. At the second level, the 3 largest major fields (Education, Engineering, and Agriculture) accounted for 55.6 percent of the 14,138 second-level degrees. Of the doctorates, the 3 largest major fields (Chemistry, Agriculture, and Education) represented 35.4 percent of the 3,470 doctor's degrees.

Of the major fields, Engineering showed the greatest increase over the preceding year in the number of degrees conferred at both the first and second levels. The increases in Engineering degrees were 507, or 6.2 percent, at the first level and 160, or 9.7 percent, at the second level. Psychology increased more than any other major field in the number of degrees conferred at the doctor's level, with 72, or 36.0 percent, more doctor's degrees in 1954-55 than in 1953-54. Education showed the greatest decrease from the preceding year in the number of degrees conferred at both the first and second levels. The decreases in Education were 745, or 9.5 percent, at the first level and 100, or 1.9 percent, at the second level. These decreases are due at least in part to more precise reporting. (Instructions for reporting degrees in Education, which accompanied the questionnaire on earned degrees conferred during 1954-55, are reproduced in Office of Education Circular No. 461, *Earned Degrees Conferred by Higher Educational Institutions, 1954-55*.) Zoology decreased more than any other major field in the number of degrees conferred at the doctor's

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level, with 47, or 34.3 percent, fewer degrees in 1954-55 than in 1953-54.

Men and women receiving degrees from land-grant institutions.—Of the 79,232 degrees conferred at all levels during 1954-55 by all 69 land-grant institutions, 71.7 percent were earned by men. In the 1,320 degree-granting institutions of higher education in the aggregate United States during the same period, men earned 65.0 percent of the degrees conferred at all levels.

In the land-grant institutions, men received 69.9 percent of the first-level degrees, 74.3 percent of the second-level degrees, and 93.0 percent of the doctorates.

The number of degrees conferred by land-grant institutions in 1954-55 increased at the second level for men and at all levels for women. First-level degrees granted to men decreased 652, or 1.5 percent, from the number granted to men the previous year; on the other hand, the number granted to women increased 258, or 1.4 percent. At the second level, men and women graduates increased 1.3 and 8.8 percent, respectively. For doctorates, the men decreased 3.2 percent from the preceding year, while women increased 23.2 percent.

Of the major fields in which degrees were earned by men in land-grant institutions during 1954-55, the greatest number of first-level degrees conferred on men was in Engineering, these degrees constituting 20.1 percent of all first-level degrees granted to men in these institutions; the greatest number at the second level was in Education, these degrees constituting 29.5 percent of all second-level degrees granted to men; and the greatest number at the doctor's level was in Chemistry, these degrees constituting 13.9 percent of the doctorates earned by men.

At each level, the major field of Education ranked first in the number of degrees conferred on women graduating from land-grant colleges and universities (30.2 percent of first-level degrees, 54.2 percent of second-level degrees, and 20.1 percent of doctorates earned by women in these institutions).

Number of institutions conferring degrees in each major field.—The number of land-grant colleges and universities which conferred degrees in each major field during the year ended June 30, 1955, is shown in table 10, by level of degree conferred, and by sex of recipient. This is not necessarily a count of all land-grant institutions offering majors in each field of study, since an institution may offer a major in one or more fields in which there were no graduates for the year 1954-55.

At the first level, more of the land-grant institutions conferred degrees in Agriculture than in any other major field. All of the land-grant institutions except Massachusetts Institute of Technology

granted first-level degrees with a major in this field. At the second level, Education was reported as a major field by more of the land-grant colleges and universities than any other major field. Majors in Education were reported by 54 of the 59 institutions granting second-level degrees in 1954-55. At the doctor's level, Chemistry was reported as a major field by more of the land-grant institutions which granted doctorates during 1954-55 than any other major field. Of the 40 land-grant colleges and universities granting doctor's degrees, 31 reported majors in Chemistry.

Comparison of land-grant institutions with all institutions.—The 69 land-grant colleges and universities, which represented 5.2 percent of the 1,320 degree-granting institutions in the aggregate United States, conferred 21.4 percent of all first-level degrees, 24.3 percent of all second-level degrees, and 39.3 percent of all doctorates conferred by the 1,320 institutions during 1954-55.

The earned degrees conferred in each major field by the 69 land-grant institutions in 1954-55, expressed as a percent of all earned degrees conferred by the 1,320 degree-granting institutions in the aggregate United States during the same period, are shown in table 11.

FINANCES

Current-fund income for educational and general purposes.—The total current-fund income for educational and general purposes in the 52 institutions during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, was \$807,523,670 (table 12). This was an increase of almost \$60 million, or 7.8 percent, over the corresponding income for the year ended June 30, 1954. A comparison of educational and general income, by source, with the income for the previous year, is given in table E.

In the 52 institutions, total receipts of \$207,512,866 from the Federal Government for educational and general purposes were distributed as follows: Federal grants or contractual amounts for research, other than

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appropriations for research at experiment stations, 66.8 percent; regular appropriations¹ to land-grant institutions for instruction, facilities, research at experiment stations,² and cooperative extension,³ 29.7 percent; receipts from the Veterans' Administration for tuition and fees, 1.7 percent; and all other Federal grants or payments, 1.8 percent.

The receipts from the Veterans Administration, which declined 53.5 percent from the amount received the previous year, included tuition paid to the institutions for veterans enrolled under Public Laws 16, 346, and 894. The veterans enrolled under Public Law 550 ("Korean veterans") paid the institutions directly with funds received by them through the Veterans Administration. The tuition for veterans under Public Law 550 is included, therefore, in "tuition and fees received from students for instruction."

The total current-fund income for educational and general purposes in the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students was \$20,242,258. This was an increase of \$632,172, or 3.2 percent, over the corresponding income for the year ended June 30, 1954. A comparison of educational and general income, by source, with the corresponding income for the previous year is given in table F.

The Morrill-Nelson and Bankhead-Jones appropriations to the 17 land-grant institutions attended predominantly by Negro students for instruction and facilities were \$473,240, or 75.4 percent of the \$627,756 received from the Federal Government for educational and general purposes. These institutions do not receive funds for agricultural experiment stations or cooperative extension service directly from the Federal Government. Receipts from the Veterans Administration for tuition and fees for veterans enrolled under Public Laws 16, 346, and 894, which represented 16.9 percent of the total Federal funds for current purposes, totaled \$106,262, a decline of 45.7 percent from the receipts of the previous year. All other Federal grants or payments, including those for research, amounted to \$48,254, constituting the remaining 7.7 percent of the total receipts from the Federal Government for current purposes.

² The amounts shown in table 16 as income from the Federal Government for experiment stations do not necessarily agree with the allotments made to State Agriculture Experiment Stations as reported by the Department of Agriculture. The major differences are in Connecticut (in which State, the Federal funds for experiment stations are divided between a State station and the land-grant college station) and in Ohio (in which State the experiment station is entirely separate from the land-grant college). In other States where there are differences, the amounts of difference are small, and generally reflect unexpended balances of funds received in the previous year.

³ The amounts shown in table 16 for funds received under the Smith-Lever Act of 1914 as amended, the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1936 (section 206), and the Clarke-McNary Act (section 5) do not necessarily agree with the allotments under these acts as reported by the United States Department of Agriculture. It must be remembered, that the United States Department of Agriculture report shows "funds allotted for Cooperative Extension work in the States, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico"—these are not necessarily funds allotted to the land-grant colleges. For example, the Clarke-McNary Act specifies that the money is appropriated annually to enable the Secretary of Agriculture to cooperate with "the land-grant colleges and universities of the various States or, in his discretion, with other suitable State agencies. . . ."

Current-fund expenditures for educational and general purposes.—In the 52 institutions, a total of \$793,254,150 was spent for current educational and general purposes during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955 (table 13). This was an increase of more than \$62 million, or 8.5 percent, over the corresponding expenditures for 1953-54. In each of the seven categories for which educational and general expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, were reported, there was an increase over the preceding year, ranging from 1.5 percent increase in organized activities related to educational departments to 12.3 percent increase in extension and public services. The percentage distribution of the expenditures for educational and general purposes among the seven categories is shown in table H.

In the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students, total expenditures for educational and general purposes for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, were \$20,191,103. This was an increase of more than \$1 million, or 7.1 percent, over the corresponding expenditures for 1953-54. Increases occurred in six of the seven categories in which educational and general expenditures were reported, ranging from 0.3 percent increase for extension and public services to 88.5 percent increase for organized research (separately budgeted). Expenditures for organized activities related to educational departments decreased 7.8 percent.

The percentage distribution of the expenditures for educational and general purposes among the 7 categories reported by the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students was as follows: instruction and departmental research, 55.7 percent; operation and maintenance of the physical plant, 20.8 percent; administrative and general expense, 13.5 percent; organized activities related to educational departments, 5.1 percent; maintenance of libraries, 3.7 per-

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cent; extension and public services, 1.1 percent; and organized research, separately budgeted, 0.1 percent.

Percentage analysis of current-fund income and current-fund expenditures for 52 institutions.—The 52 institutions were classified into four groups according to the total amount of current-fund income for educational and general purposes received during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955. The percentages from seven sources of income and a miscellaneous item are given in table G for each of the four groups of institutions and for all the 52 institutions. Similarly, in table H, the 52 institutions are classified according to the amount of current-fund expenditures for educational and general purposes, with the percentages given for seven expenditure items.

Almost one-half (49.1 percent) of the income received by the 52 institutions during the year ended June 30, 1955, for educational and general purposes was from State governments; last year the corresponding percent was 50.2. For each of the four groups, a larger percent of the income for educational and general purposes was from State governments than from any other source. Last year this was true for all except the "Over \$30 million" group; in that year, the "Over \$30 million" group, which was composed of four institutions (University of California, University of Illinois, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and University of Minnesota), received a larger percent of income (42.8) from the Federal Government than from any other source. For the year ended June 30, 1955, the "Over \$30

million" group, which is composed of seven institutions (University of California, University of Illinois, Massachusetts Institute of Technology, University of Minnesota, Cornell University, Ohio State University, and University of Wisconsin), received slightly more than one-third (34.8 percent) of its income for educational and general purposes from the Federal Government. According to the data in table 16, Federal grants or contractual amounts for research accounted for 90.5 percent of the Federal funds received by the "Over \$30 million" group; the corresponding percent for last year was 94.2.

For expenditures, the "Over \$30 million" group, which is composed of six of the seven institutions mentioned above (all except Cornell University), was the only group in which the percent of total current-fund expenditures for educational and general purposes represented by expenditures for organized research exceeded the percent represented by expenditures for instruction. For this group, about two-fifths (39.8) of the expenditures for educational and general purposes was for organized research. For the 52 institutions, administration and general expense was 7.5 percent of the total expenditures for educational and general purposes. For two of the four groups, the "Over \$30 million" and the \$10-20 million groups (table H), the percentage was below 7.5. It should be remembered, however, that there is some variation among the institutions in reporting expenditures for administration and general expense. In some institutions, staff benefits (group insurance, contributions to pensions or retirement allowances, employer's social security taxes, direct pension

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payments, etc.) are included in general expense. In other institutions, staff benefits are charged to the separate departments or functions (such as instruction, operation and maintenance of the physical plant, and auxiliary enterprises). Also the reporting of expenditures for student services will vary according to the institutional organization. In some institutions, all expenditures for student services are included in administrative and general expense; in others, some student services (such as student counseling) are performed by the instructional staff and charged to instruction, while others (such as the health service) are operated as an auxiliary enterprise and are intended to be self-supporting.

Physical plant assets.—In the 52 institutions, the value of additions to physical plant assets (including appraised or nominal value of gifts) was \$174,739,722 (table 20). This was an increase of almost \$26 million or 17.3 percent over the value of additions in 1953-54. The additions were distributed as follows: 2.0 percent for land; 75.9 percent for buildings and improvements other than buildings; 22.1 percent for furniture and equipment; and less than one-half of one percent (0.03) in unfinished construction or construction materials and supplies.

For the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students, the value of additions to physical plant assets was \$15,974,148. This was an increase of over \$6 million or 65.0 percent over the value of additions in 1953-54. The \$15,974,148 in additions were distributed as follows: 0.1 percent for land, 81.9 percent for buildings and improvements other than buildings, 12.4 percent for furniture and equipment, and 5.6 percent in unfinished construction or construction materials and supplies.

In the 52 institutions, almost \$90 million were added to the plant funds during the year ended June 30, 1955 (table 21). Of this, 1.9 percent was received from the Federal Government, 72.9 percent from State governments, 0.4 percent from local governments, 13.1 percent from private gifts and grants, and 11.7 percent from "other sources except transfers and loans." In addition to the almost \$90 million, transfers to plant funds from current funds in the 52 institutions amounted to almost \$14 million; loans to plant funds from institutional funds, and plant-fund receipts from bond issues, mortgages, etc., amounted to almost \$43 million.

In the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students, over \$8 million were added to the plant funds during the year ended

June 30, 1955. Of this, 95.6 percent was from State governments, 1.2 percent from private gifts and grants, and 3.2 percent from "other sources except transfers and loans." In addition to the over \$8 million, loans to plant funds in the 17 institutions amounted to over \$1 million, and transfers from current funds amounted to \$100,000.

Total plant assets in the 52 institutions as of June 30, 1955 were valued at \$2,221,652,198 (table 22). Of this amount, \$2,070,788,391 was reported as the value of the physical plant assets and \$150,863,807 as the value of the liquid assets of plant funds. In three institutions, the amounts reported for value of physical plant assets included increased valuation (a total of \$5,353,540 for the three institutions) in buildings and/or furniture and equipment for insurance purposes. In Iowa State College, the amount reported as the value of liquid assets of plant funds included \$978,542 as undrawn balance of State appropriations for capital improvement.

Total plant assets in the 17 institutions attended predominantly by Negro students were valued at \$104,012,671. Of this amount, \$97,106,583 was reported as the value of the physical plant assets and \$6,906,088 as the value of liquid assets of plant funds.

Comparison of land-grant institutions with all institutions.—A comparison of the income and expenditure of all institutions of higher education for the year ended June 30, 1955 is not possible, since financial data for institutions of higher education other than for the land-grant colleges and universities are collected only biennially. Comparisons for the year ended June 30, 1954 (the most recent year for which financial data for all institutions of higher education are available) are given below. The 69 land-grant institutions, which represented 3.7 percent of the 1,869⁴ institutions of higher education in the aggregate United States in 1953-54, received approximately one-third (32.6 percent) of the total current-fund income for educational and general purposes received by the 1,869 institutions of higher education during 1953-54. Educational and general income by source, and the percent which the amount received by the 69 land-

The current-fund expenditures of the 69 land-grant institutions for educational and general purposes in 1953-54 were approximately one-third (32.8 percent) of the corresponding expenditures of the 1,869 institutions of higher education during the same period. Additions to physical plant assets in the 69 land-grant institutions during the year ended June 30, 1954 were 29.8 percent of the value of additions in all institutions of higher education and 31.4 percent of the additions in all 4-year institutions.

Total value of physical plant assets, as of June 30, 1954, in the 69 land-grant institutions was 26.0 percent of the value of physical plant

assets reported by all institutions of higher education, and 27.6 percent of the value reported by the 4-year institutions. Liquid assets of plant funds in the 69 land-grant institutions were 36.9 percent of the value of such funds in all institutions of higher education as of June 30, 1954, and 39.5 percent of such funds in the 4-year institutions.

APPENDIX

COLLECTION OF DATA

The data on earned degrees¹ and on enrollment were obtained from responses to questionnaires sent to all institutions of higher education in the aggregate United States. The financial data were obtained from three forms sent to the 69 land-grant institutions: (1) Financial Statistics of Institutions of Higher Education;² (2) Land-Grant Appropriations for Instruction Facilities, Research, and Cooperative Extension Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 1955; and (3) Report of the Treasurer, Land-Grant and Supplementary Morrill Funds Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 1955. Copies of the questionnaire forms which are not reproduced in other Office of Education publications are on pages 64-74.

The data in this bulletin are for the year ended June 30, 1955, with the exception of the financial statistics for the following institutions which are for the period indicated: the University of Puerto Rico, for the year ended June 30, 1954; the A. & M. College of Texas and Prairie View A. & M. College (Tex.), for the year ended August 31, 1955; and the State College of Washington, for the year ended March 31, 1955.

Data requested in the Exhibit, Selected Current Expenditure Items, on Form RSS-041-LG (55), "LAND-GRANT APPROPRIATIONS FOR INSTRUCTION FACILITIES, RESEARCH, AND COOPERATIVE EXTENSION FISCAL YEAR ENDED JUNE 30, 1955," were not reported on a uniform basis by the individual land-grant colleges and universities. Some institutions reported all expenditures for agricultural research and extension services; other institutions reported only expenditures from Federal funds for agricultural research and extension. Because of this lack of uniformity, no tabulation of these data was made by the Office of Education.

RULINGS AND INSTRUCTIONS RELATIVE TO THE LAND-GRANT ACT OF 1862

This report on the 1862 land-grant fund is called for under a decision of the Assistant Attorney General, pertaining to the acts of July 2, 1862, August 30, 1890, and March 4, 1907.

In conformity therewith, the attention of State legislatures, State officers, and officers of institutions receiving the benefit of these acts is respectfully called to the following provisions:

1. The act of July 2, 1862 (12 Stat. 503), as amended by the act of April 13, 1926 (44 Stat. 247), provides that the money derived from the sale of lands and from the sale of land scrip granted to the States for the establishment and maintenance of colleges of agriculture and mechanic arts shall be invested at a fair and reasonable rate of return to be fixed by the State legislatures and shall constitute a perpetual fund.

2. The income from such investments shall be regularly applied without diminution to the endowment, support, and maintenance of at least one college, where the leading object shall be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies, and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts.

It is held that the proceeds from rentals, sale of timber rights, water rights, or other privileges, and interest on deferred payments of purchase money, partake of the same character as the income from invested funds and must be devoted, without diminution, to the purposes as set forth above.

It is held that instruction in the industries for women is included in instruction in agriculture and the mechanic arts.

3. The income from this fund is not a fiscal year or limited fund. It must remain forever at the disposal of the institution entitled to the benefit of the fund. Nor may it ever be covered into general State funds or used for general State purposes. There can be no default to the State by the institution.

4. It is held that the act of 1890 (26 Stat. 417) with the amendment of 1907 (34 Stat. 1281) is supplementary to the act of 1862 (12 Stat. 503); therefore any default in the provisions of the act of 1862 renders the State liable to noncertification for the annual installments of the funds appropriated by the acts of 1890 and 1907.

5. In order that the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare, through the Commissioner of Education, may be able to ascertain whether or not the States are complying with the provisions of the act of 1862, the institutions receiving the benefits of that act are required to submit a statement in detail of the disbursements of the annual income received by them under said act.

6. The only restriction placed by the act of Congress of July 2, 1862, upon the expenditure of the income derived from the sale of public lands granted for the endowment of colleges of agriculture and the mechanic arts is that no part of such income may be expended for the purchase, erection, preservation, or repair of any building or buildings, nor may this income be used for the purchase of land.

RULINGS AND INSTRUCTIONS RELATIVE TO SUPPLEMENTARY MORRILL FUNDS

INTEREST MONEY. Interest accruing upon all supplementary Morrill funds . . . is interest accruing to the United States and should be covered into the U. S. Treasury as miscellaneous receipts (ruling of Comptroller General, January 16, 1933). The person duly designated to receive the funds from the Federal Government is responsible for the accounting of such interest as may be credited to the deposit account by the bank in which the deposit account is maintained.

BALANCE. Funds annually appropriated must be expended during the fiscal year for the purposes specified by the acts and cannot be allowed to accumulate in the form of an unexpended balance. If, however, the condition of the institution is such that the funds cannot be spent advantageously, an unexpended balance will be allowed to remain over to the following year, when it is shown that plans are prepared for the eventual use, not only of all unexpended balances, but also of the regular annual installments.

ANNUAL REPORT. Treasurer's reports are required on or before September 1. (Act of August 30, 1890.) Two copies should be sent to the U. S. Commissioner of Education who will forward one copy to the Secretary of Agriculture.

Attention is called to the requirements of the acts of Congress: Morrill Act of August 30, 1890 (26 Stat. L., p. 417), Nelson amendment of March 4, 1907 (34 Stat. L., p. 1281), Bankhead-Jones Act of June 29, 1935 (Public Act No. 182, Title II, Sec. 22), in aid of colleges of agriculture and mechanic arts respecting the annual reports of the treasurers of said institutions to the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare and the Secretary of Agriculture. Attention is called also to certain decisions respecting the disbursement of the funds authorized by the said acts. (See below.) The classification of subjects under the seven schedules (A to G) must be adhered to in preparing annual reports.

SUBJECT MATTER FIELDS ALLOWED. These Federal funds are to be applied only to instruction in—

A. Agriculture.—Agriculture, horticulture, forestry, agronomy, animal husbandry, dairying, veterinary science, poultry industry, apiculture, etc.

B. Mechanic arts.—Mechanics, civil, electrical, irrigation, mining, marine, railway, and experimental engineering; textile industry, farm mechanics, architecture, machine design, mechanical drawing, ceramics, stenography, typewriting, printing, shop work, drawing, etc.

C. English language.—English language, English literature, composition, rhetoric, and oratory, etc.

D. Mathematical sciences.—Mathematics, bookkeeping, and astronomy, etc.

E. Natural and physical sciences.—Chemistry, physics, biology, botany, zoology, geology, mineralogy, metallurgy, entomology, physiology, bacteriology, pharmacy, physical geography, meteorology, etc.

F. Economic sciences.—Political economy, home economics, commercial geography, sociology, etc.

G. Special preparation of teachers.—Subjects with special reference to agriculture, mechanic arts, and home economics: history of industrial education, methods and special instruction for teachers. All or a part of the funds provided by the act of March 4, 1907, may be used "for providing courses for the special preparation of instructors for teaching the elements of agriculture and mechanic arts." It is held that this language authorizes expenditures for instruction (a) in history of agriculture and industrial education, (b) in methods of teaching agriculture, mechanic arts, and home economics, and (c) for special aid and supervision given to teachers actively engaged in teaching agriculture, mechanic arts and home economics in public schools.

Fields NOT authorized. No part of the above-mentioned funds may be used for any form of extension work, and all instruction must be given at the institutions receiving these funds, except that a reasonable portion of the fund provided by the act of 1907 may be used for the instruction of teachers in agriculture, mechanic arts, and domestic science at summer schools, teachers' institutes, and by correspondence, and in supervision and directing work of these subjects in high schools.

SALARIES. These funds may be used for the payment of salaries of instructors in the allowed subjects only.

When an administrative officer also gives instruction in any of the branches of study mentioned in the act of August 30, 1890, or when an instructor gives such instruction and also devotes part of his time to giving instruction in branches of study not mentioned in the said act, ONLY A PART of such person's salary proportionate to the time devoted to giving instruction in the branches of study mentioned in the said act can be charged to these funds. In the division of time between instructional and other services, one hour of instruction shall be regarded as equivalent to two hours of administrative, supervisory, or experiment-station work.

Salaries not authorized. The salaries of *purely administrative officers*, such as treasurers, presidents, secretaries, bookkeepers, janitors, watchmen, superintendents, foremen, matrons, unskilled laborers, assistants in shops, laboratories and fields, experiment-station staff; instructors employed in research work or in collecting, classifying, and arranging specimens, collections, or exhibits; instructors in philosophy, psychology, ethics, logic, history, civil government, pedagogy, military science and tactics, ancient and modern languages (except English); and in extension work, cannot be charged to these funds.

Nor may the funds be used for the salaries of instructors improperly trained or incompetent for the positions they are supposed to fill.

FACILITIES. Purchases are authorized from these funds for apparatus, machinery, textbooks, reference books, stock, and material used in instruction, or for purposes of illustration in connection with any of the allowed subject-matter fields.

In case of machinery (such as boilers, engines, pumps, etc.) and farm stock, which are made to serve for both instructional and other purposes, the Federal funds may be charged with only an EQUITABLE PORTION of the cost of said machinery and stock.

Facilities not authorized. No portion of said money shall be applied directly or indirectly, under any pretense whatever, to the purchase, erection, preservation, or repair of any building or buildings (Act of 1890, sec. 3), nor for the permanent improvement to buildings, grounds, and farms, such as clearing, draining, and fencing of land, nor for the heating or lighting of buildings, nor for musical instruments, military equipment, furniture, cases, shelving, desks, blackboards, tables, lockers, etc.

The purchase of land is not allowable. (Ruling March 1891.)

NOTES ON LEGISLATION FOR LAND-GRANT COLLEGES AND UNIVERSITIES

Corresponding to the three major headings in the data-collection form on "Land-Grant Appropriations" (see foregoing section of Appendix), the following notes on legislation are also presented under three major headings: (1) Federal funds for instruction and facilities; (2) Federal funds for agricultural experiment stations; and (3) Federal funds for agricultural extension service. The reader interested in a detailed description of legislation affecting the land-grant colleges and universities is referred to *United States Code Annotated, Title 7, Agriculture* (West Publishing Co., St. Paul, Minn.).

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR INSTRUCTION AND FACILITIES

The *Morrill Act of 1862* (First Morrill Act), to insure the development of instruction in "agriculture and the mechanic arts" in at least one college in each State, provided that there be granted to the several States, * * * an amount of public land, to be apportioned to each State a quantity equal to thirty thousand acres for each Senator and Representative in Congress to which the States are respectively entitled by the apportionment under the census of 1860." States in which public lands were not available were issued scrip, which could be sold. The act further provided that the money received from the sale of such land, or land scrip, should be invested by the States and "the principal thereof shall forever remain unimpaired." Also, the income from this fund "shall be inviolably appropriated, by each State which may take and claim the benefit of this act, to the endowment, support, and maintenance of at least one college where the leading object shall be, without excluding other scientific and classical studies and including military tactics, to teach such branches of learning as are related to agriculture and the mechanic arts, in such manner as the legislatures of the States may respectively prescribe, in order to promote the liberal and practical education of the industrial classes in the several pursuits and professions in life."

The *Act of 1866 Amending the First Morrill Act* permitted the States to have 3 years from the date this Amendment to the Act was passed in which they might accept the provisions of the original land-grant legislation. Also, the Amendment provided that a new State might express its acceptance within 3 years from the date of its admission into the Union. All the States, including those later admitted to the Union with the exception of Oklahoma,¹ either participated in the

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1862 land-grant funds or funds granted in lieu of the 1862 land-grant funds.

The land-grant funds of 1862, not including the value of unsold land, amounted to \$63,298,523 as of June 30, 1955. One-third of the States still have some of the original land received from the 1862 land grant or from grants made in lieu of the 1862 grant. As of June 30, 1955, unsold land held by the 16 States amounted to 796,057 acres and was valued at \$6,442,265 (table 17).

For the year 1954-55, the income from the 1862 land-grant fund, or funds from land grants made in lieu of the 1862 grant, amounted to \$1,994,242. Of this amount, 89.8 percent (\$1,791,009) was derived from investments of the money received from the sale of land or scrip. The remaining 10.2 percent (\$203,233) was derived from rentals, rights, deferred payments, etc. (table 18).

The *Second Morrill Act of 1890* authorized an annual appropriation to each State and Territory "for the more complete endowment and maintenance of colleges for the benefit of agriculture and the mechanic arts now established, or which may be hereafter established," in accordance with the Morrill Act of 1862. The act provided for an appropriation of \$15,000 for each State and Territory for 1890, with an increase of \$1,000 each year over the preceding year for 10 years. Since 1900, the annual appropriation for each State and Territory has been \$25,000. The funds received by the land-grant colleges under the Second Morrill Act are "to be applied only to instruction in agriculture, the mechanic arts, the English language and the various branches of mathematical, physical, natural and economic science, with special reference to their applications in the industries of life, and to the facilities for such instruction."

The *Nelson Amendment of 1907* contained in the appropriation act for the Department of Agriculture for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1908 amended the Acts of 1862 and 1890 by increasing the annual appropriation to each State or Territory for its land-grant college, or colleges. The Amendment made an additional appropriation of \$5,000 to each State and Territory for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1908, with an increase of \$5,000 each year over the preceding year for a period of 4 years. Since 1912, the annual amount for each State and Territory under the Nelson Amendment has been \$25,000. The Nelson Amendment provided that the expenditures of the appropriations were to be governed by the provisions of the Morrill Acts of 1862 and 1890 with the exception that a portion of the funds might be used "for providing courses for the special preparation of instructors for teaching the elements of agriculture and the mechanic arts."

The *Bankhead-Jones Act of 1935, title II, section 22*, authorized annual appropriations for the "more complete endowment and sup-

port" of the land-grant colleges. The expenditures of the funds authorized under this Act and section are governed by the provisions of the land-grant Act of 1862, as amended and supplemented. Section 22 specifies that annual appropriations are to be as follows: (1) For the year 1935-36 and for each year thereafter, \$980,000 to be paid annually to each State and the Territory of Hawaii in equal shares; and (2) for 1936-37, \$500,000; for 1937-38, \$1,000,000; for 1938-39, \$1,500,000; and for each fiscal year thereafter, \$1,500,000. The appropriations listed under (2) are to be "allotted and paid annually to each of the several States and the Territory of Hawaii in the proportion which the total population of each such State and the Territory of Hawaii bears to the total population of all the States and the Territory of Hawaii, as determined by the last preceding decennial census." In 1952, section 22 was amended to include the Territory of Alaska in the distribution of the funds, and to increase the annual appropriation authorized for uniform grants to \$1,000,000 and for variable grants based on population to \$1,501,500.

At present the funds appropriated under the Second Morrill Act of 1890, the Nelson Amendment of 1907, and the Bankhead-Jones Act (section 22) as amended in 1952 amount to \$5,051,500 annually for distribution among the 69 land-grant colleges and universities. Puerto Rico receives an allotment of funds under the Second Morrill Act of 1890 and the Nelson Amendment of 1907 but does not participate in appropriations authorized in section 22 of the Bankhead-Jones Act of June 29, 1935, as amended June 12, 1952. In those States operating two land-grant institutions, the allotment is divided between the two institutions in amounts determined by the State legislature. The allotment for each institution for the year ended June 30, 1955 is reported in table 16, column 4, under the heading "Funds for instruction and facilities, Morrill-Nelson and Bankhead-Jones funds." According to a ruling of the Secretary of Interior, February 12, 1936, the funds provided by the Second Morrill Act of 1890, the Nelson Amendment of 1907, and section 22 of the Bankhead-Jones Act of 1935, have, for purposes of administration, been given the designation of "Supplementary Morrill Fund."

The legal authority for the administration of the Morrill Act of 1862 and its several amendments and supplements rests with the Secretary of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare. Apart from the certification of grants, the Secretary exercises this authority through the United States Commissioner of Education, Office of Education.

Other Federal Land Grants.—"The Ordinance of 1787, relating to the sale of 1,500,000 acres of land to the Ohio Company of Associates, made the first grant of two townships of land for a university. A

third township for the same purpose was granted with the Symmes Purchase in 1788. On the admission of Ohio, the 3 townships previously granted for purposes of seminaries of learning were confirmed to the State.¹ Tennessee and Indiana were the next States to receive similar grants. The Enabling Acts for nearly all public-land States admitted to the Union since 1816 have contained similar grants, and when omitted from the Enabling Acts, equivalent grants have been made by Congress at some other time. Some of the land thus received by 15 States (originally known as "seminary" or university grants) was set aside for the benefit of land-grant colleges; in such cases, the land was additional to that received under the First Morrill Act, and not substitutive. The income from this land was to be used for the advancement of education in the land-grant colleges. The money received from the sale of any part of the land was to be irreducible, and the income from the investment of the money was to be used by the colleges for education purposes. The value of the funds received from the sale of the land and the number of acres still unsold and their value are shown in table 17.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATIONS²

Federal funds for agricultural experiment stations, in the fiscal year 1955, were authorized under six different laws, which are summarized below. For fiscal 1956, however, these laws are virtually replaced by Public Law 352, enacted in August 1955 as an amendment to the Hatch Act of 1887. Public Law 352 has as its purpose the codifying of the various laws and appropriation authorizations relating to agricultural experiment stations into one law. In order to accomplish this purpose Public Law 352 specifically repealed the following provisions of law and reenacted them into a new law set forth in 69 Stat. 671-674; 7 U. S. Code ³ 361a-361i Laws repealed by Public Law 352 are: Bankhead-Jones Act, title I, sections 2-8 (7 U. S. C. 427a-427g); Bankhead-Jones Act, section 9 (7 U. S. C. 427h) and related provisions of section 11 (7 U. S. C. 427j) of title I, as added by title I of the Research and Marketing Act (60 Stat. 1086); Department of Agriculture Organic Act of 1944, title I, section 105 which amended Bankhead-Jones Act, title I, section 5 (7 U. S. C. 427d(c)) by adding subsection (c); Adams Act of 1906 (7 U. S. C. 366, 369, 371, 373-376, 380, 382); Purnell Act of 1925 (7 U. S. C. 361, 366, 370, 371, 373-376, 380, 382); Acts extending the benefits of the foregoing acts to the Territory of Hawaii, the Territory of Alaska,

and Puerto Rico found in: 45 Stat. 571, 49 Stat. 1553, 45 Stat. 1256, 46 Stat. 1520, such portion of the Department of Agriculture appropriation Act of 1890, approved March 2, 1889, as related to examination of soils by experimental stations (25 Stat. 841); and that part of the act of October 1, 1918 relating to Georgia agricultural Experiment station (40 Stat. 998).

The *Hatch Act of 1887* provided an annual appropriation of \$15,000 to each State or Territory, then established or to be established, for agricultural experiment stations. According to this act, "in order to aid in acquiring and diffusing among the people of the United States useful and practical information on subjects connected with agriculture; and to promote scientific investigation and experiment respecting the principles and applications of agricultural science, there shall be established under direction of the college or colleges or agricultural departments of colleges in each State or Territory established, or which may hereafter be established, * * * a department to be known and designated as an 'agricultural experiment station' * * *." At the present time there are 53 main agricultural experiment stations, one in each State, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico, except in New York and Connecticut where there are two. All except the Connecticut⁶ Agricultural Experiment Station at New Haven and the Ohio⁶ Agricultural Experiment Station at Wooster are under the administration of the land-grant college or university in the State.

The *Adams Act of 1906* authorized an additional annual appropriation "for the more complete endowment and maintenance of agricultural experiment stations now established or which may hereafter be established in accordance with the Act of Congress approved March 2, 1887" (the Hatch Act). The additional appropriation under this act was \$5,000 for the first year for each State, with an annual increase of \$2,000 thereafter for 5 years. Thus, the annual appropriation per State is \$15,000. This act provides for continuing appropriations; but since the Adams Act is considered as supplementary to the Hatch Act, Congress makes annual appropriations for the amounts specified by both acts (a total of \$30,000 to each State and Territory then established or to be established). These funds are shown in table 16, column 6, as Hatch-Adams funds.

The *Purnell Act of 1925* further increased the Federal appropriations for the experiment stations. This act authorized an additional flat grant of \$20,000 to each State and Territory for 1925-26 with annual increases of \$10,000 for the next 4 years. Since 1930, the

annual appropriation for each State under this Act has been \$60,000 (table 16, column 7).

The *Bankhead-Jones Act of 1935* authorized Federal funds for the State agricultural experiment stations, to be used for research into basic laws and principles relating to agriculture. An appropriation is made annually by Congress (the appropriation for each of the last 6 years has been \$2,863,768). For each fiscal year, the allotment to each State, Puerto Rico, or Territory is based primarily on an amount which bears the same ratio to the total appropriation as the rural population of each State, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico bears to the rural population of all the States, Puerto Rico, and the Territories as determined by the most recent decennial census. Eligibility to receive an allotment under this act requires that each State, Puerto Rico, or Territory make available from its own funds an amount equal to the Federal allotment, for research and for the establishment and maintenance of necessary facilities for the prosecution of such research. The act further provides that the amount withheld from a State, Puerto Rico, or a Territory which fails to provide an amount equal to the total which it is eligible to receive, may be allotted to the eligible States, Puerto Rico, or Territories, provided that no State, Puerto Rico, or Territory shall receive a total of more than 120 percent of its original allotment. For the year 1954-55 the land-grant institutions received Bankhead-Jones funds under title I, section 5, amounting to \$2,724,527 (table 16, column 8).

The *1946 Amendment to the Bankhead-Jones Act* authorized additional appropriations for research by agricultural experiment stations. This Amendment provided for a sum of \$2,500,000 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1947, an additional \$2,500,000 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1948, and an additional \$5,000,000 for each of the next 3 fiscal years—a total of \$20,000,000 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1951—plus such additional sums as the Congress may deem necessary. *Section 9b(1)*, of the amendment to title I provided that 20 percent of the sum appropriated for any fiscal year under this amendment be distributed equally to all States, Puerto Rico, and the Territories. *Section 9b(2)* provided that not less than 52 percent of the sum appropriated for any fiscal year under this amendment be distributed to Puerto Rico and to each State or Territory as follows: (1) one-half in an amount which bears the same ratio to the total amount to be allotted as the rural population of each State, Puerto Rico, and Territory bears to the total rural population of the States, Puerto Rico, and the Territories as determined by the most recent decennial census; (2) the remaining one-half in an amount which bears the same ratio to the total amount to be allotted as the farm population of each State, Puerto Rico, or Territory bears to the total

farm population of the 48 States, Puerto Rico, and the Territories as determined by the most recent decennial census. For the year 1954-55 the land-grant institutions received \$7,994,404 from the Federal Government under title I, sections 9b(1) and 9b(2) of the amendment to the Bankhead-Jones Act. To be eligible for funds under this amendment each State, Puerto Rico, and Territory must provide equal amounts from their own funds. Section 9b(3) provided that not more than 25 percent of the amount authorized under this amendment be allotted for cooperative research in which two or more State agricultural experiment stations are cooperating to solve problems that concern more than one State. The funds distributed under section 9b(3) are designated by the act as "Regional research fund, Office of Experiment Stations," and are to be used only for cooperative regional projects recommended by a committee of nine elected by, and representing, the directors of State agricultural experiment stations, after approval by the Secretary of Agriculture or his authorized representative. Twenty percent of the fund appropriated to carry out provisions of sections 9b(3) and 10b must be expended for marketing research. Necessary travel expense for the committee of nine is to be covered by the Regional research fund. For the year ended June 30, 1955, the land-grant colleges received \$2,667,184 under title I, section 9b(3) for Regional research projects (table 16, column 10).

The *Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946* authorized Federal funds to conduct research and service work in connection with the preparation for marketing, processing, packaging, handling, storing, transporting, distribution, and marketing of agricultural products. Section 204(b) of this act authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to make available from these funds such amounts as he may deem appropriate for allotment to State departments of agriculture, State bureaus and departments of markets, State agricultural experiment stations, or other appropriate State agencies for cooperative projects in marketing service and in marketing research. The allotments are made to the State agency or agencies best equipped and qualified to conduct the specific project to be undertaken, and the State agency or agencies shall provide equal funds. For 1954-55, the land-grant colleges and universities reported the receipt, for the State experiment stations under their management, of \$516,378 under section 204(b) of this act.

FEDERAL FUNDS FOR AGRICULTURAL EXTENSION SERVICE*

The *Smith-Lever Act of 1914* authorized cooperative agricultural Extension work between the agricultural colleges in the States and the U. S. Department of Agriculture. According to this act, "cooperative

agricultural Extension work shall consist of the giving of instruction and practical demonstrations in agriculture and home economics to persons not attending or resident in said colleges in the several communities, and imparting to such persons information and said subjects through field demonstrations, publications and otherwise * * *."

The 1953 Amendment to the Smith-Lever Act of 1914 consolidated it with nine other acts relating to Extension work. The 1953 amendment simplified administration, authorized appropriation of funds the Congress deemed necessary, and established a permanent formula for apportioning Federal funds to the States. Federal funds for the year 1954-55 reported by the land-grant colleges and universities as received under the "Smith-Lever Act, as amended June 26, 1953," amounted to \$38,208,938, or 97.7 percent of all Federal funds received by the land-grant institutions for cooperative agricultural extension work.

Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946.—Under section 204(b) of the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946, the Cooperative Extension Service has the authority and responsibility for developing and conducting educational and demonstrational marketing programs with growers, handlers, and consumers. The objectives are to increase efficiency in the marketing of agricultural products and to aid in bringing about a better balance between agricultural production and consumption. Various educational methods are used to bring about increased understanding and the adoption of the findings of research and best known practices. Work by the States, Puerto Rico, and the Territories is conducted on a matching fund basis under line projects setting forth the problems and the educational procedures to be followed. Section 205 of the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 authorized the Secretary of Agriculture to enter into contracts with States, agencies of States, private firms, and individuals for the purpose of conducting research and service work, making and compiling reports and surveys, and carrying out other functions relating thereto when in his judgment the services or functions to be proposed would be carried out more effectively, more rapidly, and at less cost than if prepared by the Department of Agriculture.

The form used in the present survey did not provide space for reporting funds received for cooperative extension under section 204 (b) of the act. It appeared, however, that all funds received for cooperative extension under the act (under section 204 (b) and under section 205) were reported on the form in the space provided for funds received under section 205. According to the United States Department of Agriculture, a total of \$924,548 (\$799,548 under section 204 (b) and \$125,000 under section 205) was distributed to Puerto Rico, the States, and Territories for cooperative extension work during the year

ended June 30, 1955. Of this amount, the land-grant colleges and universities reported a total of \$812,299 as received under the Agricultural Marketing Act of 1946 for cooperative extension work during the year ended June 30, 1955.

The *Clarke-McNary Act*, passed in 1924 and amended in 1949, provided that an amount not to exceed \$500,000 may be appropriated annually to enable the Secretary of Agriculture to cooperate with "the land-grant colleges and universities * * * or, in his discretion, with other suitable State agencies, to aid farmers through advice, education, demonstrations, and other similar means in establishing, reserving, protecting, and managing wood lots, shelter belts, wind-breaks, and other valuable forest growth, and in harvesting, utilizing and marketing the products thereof." Under this Act, Federal funds totaling \$87,055 were reported as received by the land-grant colleges and universities in 44 States and Puerto Rico for the year ended June 30, 1955.

Work previously financed by the *Farm Housing Act of July 15, 1949* was absorbed within the Smith-Lever Act, as amended.

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
