
Overall Results

- In 2013, the average score of eighth-grade students in Connecticut was 285. This was not significantly different from the average score of 284 for public school students in the nation.
- The average score for students in Connecticut in 2013 (285) was not significantly different from their average score in 2011 (287) and was higher than their average score in 1990 (270).
- The score gap between higher performing students in Connecticut (those at the 75th percentile) and lower performing students (those at the 25th percentile) was 51 points in 2013. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1990 (50 points).
- The percentage of students in Connecticut who performed at or above the NAEP Proficient level was 37 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (38 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (22 percent).
- The percentage of students in Connecticut who performed at or above the NAEP Basic level was 74 percent in 2013. This percentage was not significantly different from that in 2011 (75 percent) and was greater than that in 1990 (60 percent).



Score Gaps for Student Groups

- In 2013, Black students had an average score that was 36 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1990 (37 points).
- In 2013, Hispanic students had an average score that was 39 points lower than White students. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1990 (42 points).
- In 2013, male students in Connecticut had an average score that was not significantly different from female students.
- In 2013, students who were eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch, an indicator of low family income, had an average score that was 34 points lower than students who were not eligible for free/reduced-price school lunch. This performance gap was not significantly different from that in 1996 (33 points).
