#### **Hispanic Students**

 Hispanic Students are one of the largest minority groups in the United States, and continues to have a growing population.

 Overall, Hispanic students are less likely to enroll in college than those students of other ethnicities.

 Hispanic Students students have been found to be at a disadvantage in terms of post-secondary access and degree attainment.



#### **Hispanic Students**

 Hispanic students, on average, do not perform at the same level as students of other ethnic groups even when income and parental education are taken into account.

 Hispanic students need access to programs and initiatives that will increase their achievement and open up opportunities for college success.

 By using data, it is possible to develop pathways to success for schools and communities to increase the achievement of Hispanic students and all students.



#### The Numbers - Nation

 In 2007, nearly 1.5 million students graduated having taken the SAT®

 When students register to take the SAT, they are asked to fill out a 42-item questionnaire



#### The Population & The Instrument

- The SAT is primarily taken by juniors and seniors in high school
- The SAT is a test that measures critical reading, mathematics, and writing
- The SAT questionnaire includes questions about:
  - demographic information
  - high school coursework and activities, and
  - college preferences and aspirations










# Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort by Hispanic Origin






# Students in the SAT® Cohort by Ethnicity 2003-2007









### Female / Male Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort by Ethnicity






# Female / Male Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort by Ethnicity







### Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort by Ethnicity and CB Region






#### First Generation and Non-First Generation Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort by Ethnicity











### First Generation and Non-First Generation Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort by Hispanic Origin






#### Household Income by Ethnicity for Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort




#### Household Income by Hispanic Origin for Students in the 2007 SAT® **Cohort**




### College Aspirations of Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort







#### Degree Level Goals by Ethnicity of Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort






#### College Location Preference by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort






# College Location Preference by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort






# Plans to Seek Part Time Job by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort






### Academic Preparation of Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort







### Academic Preparation by Ethnicity of Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort






### PSAT Taker by Ethnicity of Students in the 2007 SAT® Cohort





### Level of College Preparation by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort – Calculus Course Taken









### Level of College Preparation by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort – Calculus Course Taken

#### **Mean SAT Math Scores by Calculus Course Taken**






### Level of College Preparation by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort – Physics Course Taken






#### Level of College Preparation by Ethnicity in the 2007 SAT® Cohort - Physics Course Taken
