



Comparing Kansas 2017 Supplement

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Introduction

This report provides comparisons between Kansas and relevant state groups on key demographic variables. It is a companion piece to the KASB Comparing Kansas 2017 report that helps show how factors outside of school funding may have an impact on student outcomes for each state. In addition, the Appendix contains the detailed tables supporting the summary information on student outcomes and funding as included in the Comparing Kansas report.

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Methods and Data Used

This report contains state-level statistics gathered from a variety of national data sources. The reference list for all data elements can be found at the back of this report.

Data is provided for each state, plus the United States average where available, and average amounts for each of the following comparison groups:

Aspiration:

- States that perform better overall than Kansas. Calculated using a ranking of weighted average ranks on the Postsecondary, High School Graduation, and Assessment measure ranks, as described in the KASB Comparing Kansas 2017 report.
- States are Connecticut, Illinois, Iowa, Massachusetts, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, Vermont, Wisconsin
- North Dakota was identified as an aspiration state in 2016.
- Wisconsin was not identified as an aspiration state in 2016.

Adjacent:

- States that share a border with Kansas.
- States are Colorado, Nebraska, Missouri, Oklahoma

Student Peers:

- States that are within +/- .5 standard deviations of Kansas's value on a majority of the variables found in Table One.

- States are Alaska, Arkansas, Connecticut, Illinois, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, Nebraska, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Virginia, Washington, Wisconsin
- Connecticut, Massachusetts, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, and Virginia were not identified as student peers in 2016.

Adult Peers:

- States that are within +/- .5 standard deviations of Kansas's value on a majority of the variables found in Table Two.
- States are Delaware, Georgia, Hawaii, Illinois, Maine, Michigan, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah, Washington
- Idaho was identified as an adult peer in 2016.
- Montana and North Carolina were not identified as adult peers in 2016.

Distribution Peers:

- States that are within +/- .5 standard deviations of Kansas's value on a majority of the variables found in Table Three.
- States are Alaska, Idaho, Iowa, Kentucky, Minnesota, Missouri, Nebraska, New Mexico, North Dakota, Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota, Wisconsin, Wyoming
- Indiana was identified as a distribution peer in 2016

Overall Peers:

- States that are within +/- .5 standard deviations of Kansas's value on a majority of the variables found in Tables One, Two, and Three.
- States are Alaska, Idaho, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, New Mexico, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Washington, Wisconsin
- Montana and Rhode Island were not identified as overall peers in 2016.

Table One: Students

Table One provides details on key student characteristics in each state. The key findings are as follows:

- Kansas has fewer children in poverty than our peers but more than the aspiration states.
- Kansas has more free and reduced-price lunch students than our peers and more than the aspiration states.
- Kansas has more special education students than most of our peers, but fewer than the aspiration states.
- Kansas has more students served in ELL programs than all comparison groups.
- Kansas has more white students than most of our peers, but fewer than the aspiration states.

Here are more specific details on each statistic.

Children in Poverty: Kansas ranks 18th highest in the nation in terms of children in poverty, with 17 percent of school-age children at or below the poverty line in 2015. All comparison groups had higher average percentages of children in poverty with the exception of the aspiration states, which had on average 15.2 percent of their school-age children at or below the poverty line in 2015.

Students Eligible for Free or Reduced-Price Lunch: Kansas ranks 21st highest in the nation in terms of children eligible for free or reduced-price lunch,

with 49.9 percent of students eligible for the National School Lunch Program (NSLP) in 2015. All comparison groups had lower percentages of eligible students, including the aspiration states, which had on average 40.3 percent of their students eligible for the NSLP in 2015.

Students Ages 3-21 Served Under IDEA: Kansas ranks 19th highest in the percent of students ages 3 through 21 served under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), with 14.0 percent of their students served as of 2015. All comparison groups had fewer special education students, with the exceptions of the aspiration states and the student peer states, which averaged 15.0 percent and 14.3 percent respectively.

Students in ELL Programs: Kansas ranks 9th highest in the nation in terms of students served in English Language Learner (ELL) programs, with 9.5 percent of their students served as of 2014. All comparison groups had lower percents of students served, including the aspiration states, which had an average of 5.5 percent of their students served as of 2015.

White Students: Kansas ranks 21st highest in the nation in terms of the percent of students classified as white, with 65.4 percent of students reported as white and non-Hispanic as of 2014. All other comparison groups had lower percents, with the exceptions of the aspiration states and the distribution peer states, which averaged 68.3 percent and 66.7 percent respectively.

Table Two: Adults

Table Two provides details on key adult characteristics in each state. The key findings are as follows:

- Kansas households have a lower median income than all comparison groups.
- Kansas has more adults 25 and up with at least a high school diploma than most peer groups but less than the aspiration states.
- Kansas has more adults 25 and up with at least a bachelor's degree than all comparison groups except the aspiration states.
- Kansas has more adults 25 and up with at least a graduate degree than most peer groups but less than the aspiration states.
- Kansas has fewer adults below the poverty level in the past 12 months than all comparison groups except the aspiration states.

Here are more specific details on each statistic.

Median Household Income: Kansas ranks 29th highest in the nation in terms of the median household income, with the average household earning \$54,865 as of 2015. All other comparison groups had higher median incomes, including the aspiration states, which had an average median household income of \$64,605 as of 2015.

25-Year-Olds and Older with at Least a High School Diploma: Kansas ranks 17th highest in the nation in terms of the percent of its population 25 and

older with at least a high school diploma, with 90.3 percent falling into this category as of 2015. All comparison groups had lower percentages, with the exception of the aspiration states and the overall peer states, which averaged 90.8 percent and 90.4 percent respectively.

25-Year-Olds and Older with at Least a Bachelor's Degree: Kansas ranks 17th highest in the nation in terms of the percent of its population 25 and older with at least a bachelor's degree, with 31.8 percent falling into this category as of 2015. All comparison groups had lower percentages, with the exception of the aspiration states, which averaged 34.3 percent.

25-Year-Olds and Older with at Least a Graduate Degree: Kansas ranks 19th highest in the nation in terms of the percent of its population 25 and older with at least a graduate degree, with 11.4 percent falling into this category as of 2015. All comparison groups had lower percentages, with the exception of the aspiration states and the student peer states, which averaged 13.2 percent and 12.4 percent respectively.

Income Below Poverty Level in the Past 12 Months: Kansas ranks 20th highest in the nation in terms of the percent of the adult population that has been below the poverty level in the past 12 months, with 13.0 percent of the population falling into this category as of 2015. All comparison groups had higher percentages, with the exception of the aspiration states, which had an average of 11.3 percent.

Table Three: Distribution

Table Three provides details on the distribution of the population within each state. The key findings are as follows:

- Kansas has fewer persons per square mile than all comparison groups.
- Kansas has less of its population in urbanized areas than all comparison groups except the distribution peers.
- Kansas has more of its population in urban clusters than all comparison groups.
- Kansas has slightly more of its population in urban areas than the aspiration states, but the results are mixed for the other comparison groups.
- Kansas has fewer people per square mile in urbanized areas than most peer groups but more than the aspiration states.
- Kansas has more people per square mile in urban clusters than all comparison groups.

- Kansas has fewer people per square mile in urban areas than most comparison groups but more than the aspiration states.

Here are more specific details on each statistic.

Population Per Square Mile: Kansas ranks 40th highest in population per square mile, with 35.4 persons per square mile as of 2016. All comparison groups had on average more persons per square mile, including the aspiration states, which had an average of 380.9 persons per square mile (over 10 times more than Kansas).

Percent of Total Population in Urbanized Areas: Kansas ranks 35th highest in terms of the percent of the total population in urbanized areas (urban areas with population over 50,000), with 50.2 percent of the state's population in such areas as of 2010. All other comparison groups had higher percentages of their population in urbanized areas except the distribution peer group, which had an average of 48.0 percent of the population in such areas.

Percent of Total Population in Urban Clusters: Kansas ranks 4th highest in terms of the percent of the total population in urban clusters (urban areas with population under 50,000), with 24.0 percent of the state's population in such areas as of 2010. All other comparison groups had lower percentages of their population in urbanized areas, including the aspiration states, which had an average of 11.8 percent of their populations in such areas.

Percent of Total Population in Urban Areas: Kansas ranks 25th highest in terms of the percent of the total population in urban areas (urbanized areas and urban clusters combined), with 74.2 percent of the state's population in such areas as of 2010. All other comparison groups had lower percentages of their population in urbanized areas with the exception of the student and adult peer groups and the adjacent states, which had averages of 77.8 percent, 74.7 percent, and 74.0 percent respectively.

Population Per Square Mile - Urbanized Areas: Kansas ranks 4th highest in the number of people per square mile in urbanized areas, with 2,283.1

people per square mile in such areas as of 2010. The aspiration state average was slightly lower (2,212.9), as was the average for distribution peers (2,268.4), and the averages for all other comparison groups were larger.

Population Per Square Mile - Urban Clusters: Kansas ranks 21st highest in the number of people per square mile in urban clusters, with 198.30 people per square mile in such areas as of 2010. This is higher than all comparison groups, including the aspiration states with an average of 1,576.8 people per square mile.

Population Per Square Mile - Urban Areas: Kansas ranks 21st highest in the number of people per square mile in urban areas, with 2,176.5 people per square mile in such areas as of 2010. All comparison groups had more people per square mile in such areas except the aspiration states with an average of 2,108.5 people per square mile and the distribution peers with an average of 2,086.6 people per square mile.

All comparison groups had more total revenue per pupil with the exception of the adjacent states and distribution peers, which had \$11,308 and \$11,541 respectively.

Current Spending Per Pupil (Actual Dollars): Kansas ranks 31st highest in the nation in terms of current spending per pupil; with \$10,040 per student as of 2015. All comparison groups had higher current spending per pupil with the exception of the adjacent states, which spent \$9,855.

Spending on Instruction Per Pupil (Actual Dollars): Kansas ranks 28th highest in the nation in terms of spending on instruction per pupil; with \$6,137 per student as of 2015. All comparison groups had more total revenue per pupil with the exception of the adjacent states and distribution peers, which had \$12,177 and 12,815 respectively.

Current Spending Per Pupil (Cost of Living Adjusted): Kansas ranks 26th highest in the nation in terms of current spending per pupil adjusted for state cost of living differences; with \$11,106 per student as of 2015. All comparison groups had higher current spending per pupil with the exception of the adjacent states and distribution peers, which had \$10,624 and \$11,092 respectively.

Spending on Instruction Per Pupil (Cost of Living Adjusted): Kansas ranks 25th highest in the nation in terms of spending on instruction per pupil adjusted for state cost of living differences; with \$6,789 per student as of 2015. All comparison groups had higher spending on instruction with the exception of the adjacent states and distribution peers, which had \$6,363 and \$6,553, respectively.

Average Annual Funding Per Pupil 2008-2015: Kansas ranks 27th highest in the nation in terms of the average annual funding per pupil from 2008 to 2015, with an average amount of \$11,674. Table Seven provides details on school spending allocation. The key findings are as follows:

- Kansas puts a lower percent of total revenue towards current spending than all comparison groups.
- Kansas spends a lower percent of total revenue on instruction than all comparison groups.
- Kansas has a higher percent of current spending going to instruction than all comparison groups except the Aspiration states.

Here are more specific details on each statistic.

Current Spending as Percent of Total Revenue: When looking at the percent of total spending made up by current spending, Kansas ranks 44th

with 83.3 percent of total spending going to current expenditures. This is a lower percent than all comparison groups.

Instructional Spending as Percent of Total: Kansas spends a lower percent of total revenue on instruction than all comparison groups, ranking 20th overall in the percent of total revenue going to instructional spending.

Instructional Spending as Percent of Current: Kansas has a higher percent of current spending going to instruction than all comparison groups except the aspiration states, which spend the same percent (61.1 percent). Kansas ranks 15th overall on this statistic.
